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## This Week:

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**Bill Herbert**

ALMOST five years to the day since he came home from a hot war, the CBC's special events reporter Bill Herbert is off to another one, this time the Korean fighting. On indefinite assignment he left Vancouver last week by R.C.A.F. airlift to Japan and Korea, from which he will send back special reports for broadcast over both the national and the international systems of the CBC. Primary subjects of his broadcasts will be the R.C.A.F. airlift, the Canadian destroyers and the special Canadian Army contingent which recently left to augment UN forces in Korea. Bill Herbert's reports will be heard on CBC News Roundup (Monday to Friday at 9:15-8:15 p.m.) and on Canadian Chronicle which is beamed to Europe through the CBC's International Service in Montreal. He also hopes to contribute to Capital Report (Sundays at 1:03-12:03 p.m.) with direct reports from Tokyo, Seoul and possibly Pyongyang. Bill Herbert has covered most Canadian military exercises in the past five years, including Sweetbriar.

Close-up examinations of the democratic process in three regions of Canadian life will form a series of *Citizens' Forum* broadcasts, starting on November 16. The first program will come from a meeting arranged by the Winnipeg Junior Chamber of Commerce; it will put the spotlight on local government and open up the question of citizen participation to make democracy function. On the 23rd the program will come from Windsor, Ontario, and will carry the discussion into a specific industrial field; the title will be, "Does democracy work in the labour union?" Moncton will probably be the origination point of the third in the series (on November 30); this time, attention will be focussed

on the home and a panel of interested speakers will consider whether, or to what extent, democratic principles can (or should) be applied within the family.

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Speakers on Trans-Canada this week will include Leila Orman of Vancouver, with a talk on Robert Louis Stevenson, who was born a hundred years

ago November 13 (November 18, This Week); Professor A. R. M. Lower of Queen's University, reviewing two books about President Truman (November 12, Critically Speaking); and A. W. Steward, information officer in the office of the Union of South Africa's High Commissioner to Canada, on life in South Africa (November 12, Our Special Speaker).

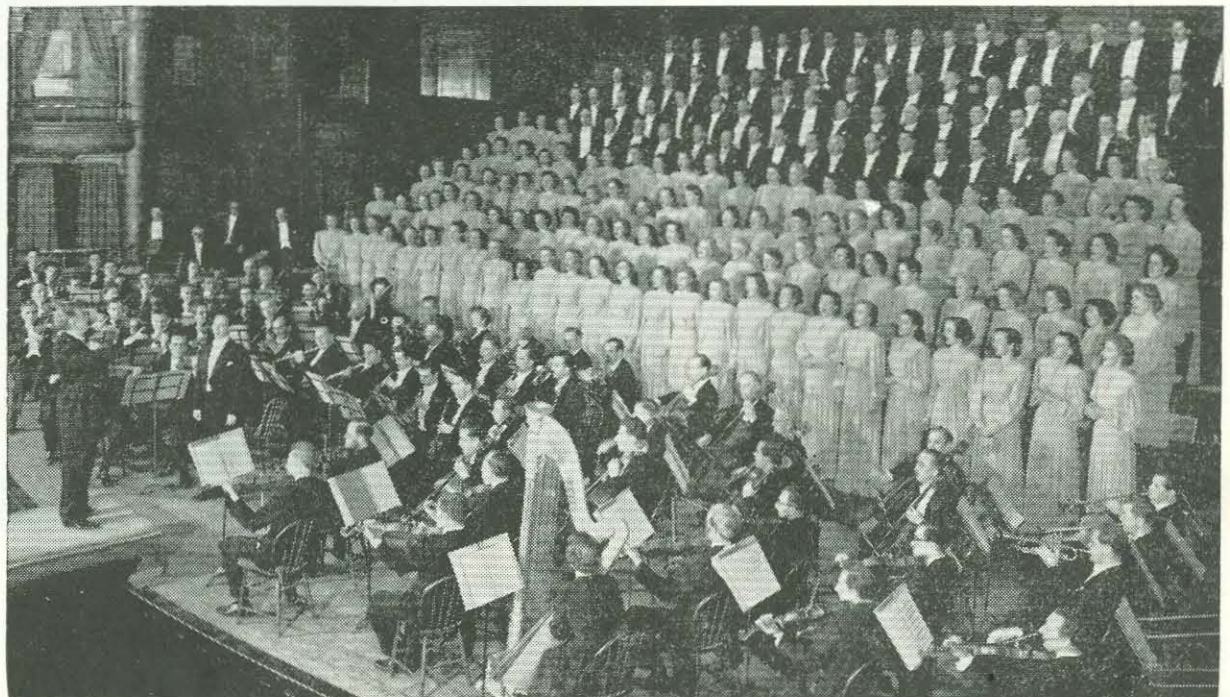

# The Pilgrim's Progress

A Preface by CANON J. E. WARD

On November 12, 19 and 26, the Sunday program *The Way of the Spirit* will present in dramatized form the story of John Bunyan and *The Pilgrim's Progress*. Canon J. E. Ward, in collaboration with Earle Grey, wrote the scripts, which will be produced at CBC Montreal by Rupert Caplan.

Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress* is a great religious allegory, one of the greatest of its kind in the English language. It is great for its spiritual insight; it is also great as literature. But when this has been said there is much yet about it to tease and baffle the mind. John Bunyan is an intriguing fellow. In some ways his work is coarse, but it is also characterized by a keen natural wit, and a great command of homely expression which is so simple and yet so profound. Having not too much schooling, he was by no means a dull or ignorant soul. His mind is saturated with the Bible, which is to say steeped in the best English of his day, and he must have read widely and pondered deeply. He lived in an age that took life seriously and was aflame with the spirit of his time. It was an age of civil and religious conflict that provided ample material for imagination and debate. All around him were determined spirits who carried a sword in one hand and the Book in the other; hearts that knew no halfway of kindly mellowness, no compromise between black and white. We go through these pages and we read the outpourings of the soul of a child of this age.

The *Progress* is the progress of a soul that was doomed to find life full of contrast, full of punishment, full of courage and despondency, with little mirth and not too much music. It is charged from end to end with the experience of the man who wrote. True he had not always been a stranger to mirth. He had had in his youth the joy of a bell-ringer. But, to the Puritan, bell ringing was sin. He had spent many an hour dancing on the village green and this too was sin. No sooner had he escaped from such levity than he was imprisoned for the very passion of the sombreness he had found. He went through all this with an imagination which could carry him to the brink of insanity or to the vision of the celestial mount. So there is nothing halfway about Bunyan's writing. It is full of dramatic contrast and depth of feeling born of a mind that had been tormented and then exalted and suffered for both. He had been both seduced by the world and armed by the Spirit. Little wonder that he wrote of life's pilgrimage with a strong pen.

I think the success of CBC Wednesday Night lay in that you assumed that we, the Canadian people, were capable of appreciating the truly great, in music and the drama, never played down nor striving too consciously to uplift, but always assumed that we were worthy of the best and gave it to us in endless array. Take our case, we have never had an opportunity to attend grand opera, or to see a great orchestra in action. Probably previous to CBC we would not have gone to either had we been able to, but now it's a different story. We are music conscious and are glad of the opportunity to listen. *Turandot* was a splendid achievement, a grand piece of work. Perhaps we can hear it again.—Mrs. S. Barber, Wellwood, Manitoba.

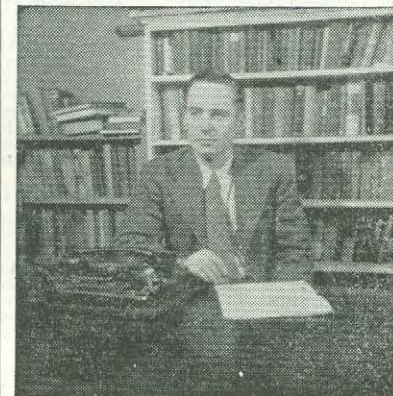

## Are We Frivolous?

An English Visitor Finds Striking Contrasts In Our Radio Fare

By MARSLAND GANDER

I quite realize that these impressions formed in a brief fortnight in your vast country may be somewhat superficial. My feelings about the essential frivolity of Canadian radio may be unjustified. In fact, during one of your excellent school broadcasts—where, by the way, sound effects do fit in more successfully than elsewhere—I heard a broadcaster propound the view that Canadians take themselves very seriously. I am aware, too, that you have many open forum discussions which probably allow a freer expression of opinion than is permitted on the BBC. I doubt, for instance, whether the BBC would allow a Canadian radio critic to broadcast what he thought about their programs. So you are perfectly entitled to tell me to mind my own business. Of course, I shan't take any notice.

As a matter of fact, I feel like an ascetic yogi who has been living

on bread and water for about fifty years and then is suddenly obliged to exist on a diet of ice cream and candy. It's delicious, it's delightful, it's de-lovely. But oh, my, what a bellyache it can give you!

I imagine that at the end of a day's listening in Toronto a susceptible listener has rushed out, laden himself with jewellery, bought vast quantities of deodorant, filled up his car with anti-freeze mixture, spent an incredible sum on Savings Bonds, and made himself sick with candy, pausing only amid these occupations to purchase an harmonica and to ask himself the searching question: "Can anyone explain the thrill of a kiss?"—re-assuring himself with a sonorous "No, no, no." Or is it conceivable that all these exhortations fall upon deaf ears?

Well, as a matter of fact it's a wonderful tonic listening to Canadian radio—it's gin and tonic. There's a fizz and sparkle and warmth generally lacking in BBC programs. It waxes lyrical about the weather and establishes an intimacy with the listener which makes BBC announcements sound frigid formality. Said one commentator, in his farewell remarks, "And above all look after yourselves, will you?" It's so friendly. It may be like the chorus girl's smile, but so what? . . .

News presentation is altogether more dramatic, forceful and arresting than on the BBC. Bulletins are more frequent, and CBC News Roundup with its snappy delivery and world coverage is particularly effective. It may be that after a time the set form of presentation would become monotonous, but to the newcomer it speedily paints a world picture with an admirable economy of words. The BBC has a somewhat similar feature in Radio Newsreel which, however, occasionally strays off into sound pictures. As a television enthusiast I am doubtful about the use of sound effects in radio. I feel that their day is done. If they are excluded from the News Roundup they are most persistent elsewhere in your programs and I feel that the boy who works the coconuts must drop from exhaustion when his day's galloping is done. . . .

It heavily emphasized the contrasts in North American radio for me that *The Words of Jeremiah* were a passionate appeal for peace in a warring world: The last appeal for peace I heard was from the United Nations station at Lake Success and it took the form of a singing commercial. It ran—

*It may take a year or two or maybe even three—oh  
But some day all the world will be a happy family—oh  
As we make United Nations a realitee—oh  
We will see a world where we are happy safe and free—oh.*

The only possible comment is that cry of pain contained in Parliamentary reports, Hon. Members: Oh! . . .

Summary of Broadcast of November 5, 1950.

**More House Plant Formulas**

**1. Cacti:**

(a) Soil should be very porous—3 parts loam, 1 part coarse, gritty sand, broken brick and old mortar rubble.

(b) Drainage should be carefully arranged, use broken pots or broken brick to a quarter of depth of pot, then rough compost before finishing off with sifted soil mix.

(c) Full sun and heat in summer in a well drained spot in the garden prepares plants for winter. Cool quarters in winter are desirable and natural.

(d) Watering needs to be freely applied when outdoors in dry heat, but drainage must be perfect at all times. Indoors in winter water sparingly. If in a warm room, a little extra water will be required.

**2. Christmas or Crab Cactus:**

(a) While flowering and for a while later making new growth, this cactus requires a warm, moist atmosphere. For best bloom good light is required from September until spring.

(b) Watering should be heaviest from the time blooming is completed through to late summer but from September until after blooming watering should be lighter. Extremes of either excessive moisture or excessive drought should be avoided.

(c) Soil for this cactus is somewhat different from that required for other types. Use 2 parts loam, 1 part peat and 1 part gritty sand.

**3. Cyclamen:**

(a) Delivery during cold weather often causes wilting. Place in a cool

window and shade from direct sunlight. Water only if necessary.

(b) Spraying foliage daily helps to keep plant in good condition.

(c) Avoid dryness in soil. Plants heavy with leaves require considerable water.

(d) Avoid highly heated rooms or proximity of radiators. Plants prefer cool quarters during blooming season.
