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JUNE KOWALCHUK, the Regina-born soprano who is pictured on our cover this week, has been a very busy girl recently—busy commuting between Toronto and Montreal each week for her own radio program on the French network; busy studying with Dr. Ernesto Vinci at the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto; and particularly busy rehearsing the role of Gilda for her CBC Opera Company debut this week in *Rigoletto*. She made her stage debut in Toronto last year, in the same role. Her weekly show in Montreal is a direct result of her triumph earlier this year in the CBC French network contest-series, *Nos Futures Etoiles*. Each week on the French network she shares the microphone with another member of the *Rigoletto* cast—William B. Williams. Since she started her serious musical studies four years ago, June Kowalchuk has become known across Canada as a concert, opera and radio artist. A frequent guest on CBC networks, she appeared in the Distinguished Artists Series last August and later gave two short-wave recitals for the CBC International Service. Last month she appeared with Gilles Lamontagne and Margaret Kerr (both in *Rigoletto*) in a concert in Quebec City. Early next year she has appointments with the Sherbrooke Symphony and the Toronto Symphony orchestras. Her ambition—an operatic career “in Canada.”

Summary of Broadcast of December 3, 1950.

Some Equipment for Handling House Plants.

Plants.

1. Shelves:
(a) Small one-pot bracket shelves may be fastened to the window casing for climbing or trailing plants.

(b) Glass window shelves either bracketed or suspended may be used to provide additional shelf space for small plants in the window area.

(c) Wall shelves placed where there is good indirect light are useful for such plants as African violets and small ferns.

2. Plant Stands:

(a) Simple pedestal stands made to measure for individual plants in a variety of heights are excellent for placing plants in and around the window area without cluttering window sills with potted plants.

(b) Fern stands for single specimens or group plantings are desirable and may be moved to desirable light situations according to time of year.

(c) Multiple shelf stands provide room for large numbers of plants in ascending groups.

3. Window boxes used outside in summer may be placed on stands inside in winter to hold groups of potted plants.

4. Indoor glass houses, sometimes called terrariums may be built with a box base to hold soil and fitted with glass walls and cover. These permit easier control of humidity and temperature. They may be heated if desired with electric bulbs. These are excellent for rooting cuttings for growing small ferns, or for a collection of succulent plants. Large glass bowls with a layer of soil in the bottom may be used in the same way.

5. Dish gardens or tray arrangements can be developed as miniature gardens for table decoration or simply as an indoor winter past-time. They are useful when suitable space is not available for growing large specimen plants. Trays of small cacti and dwarf or slow-growing succulents are especially suited to such enterprises.

A Reader's Comments.

You are to be congratulated for the very high percentage of accuracy when printing the schedules as you do. Instead of the "run of the mill" appeal to the mob with all its mediocrity, the CBC Times has come out with a publication that can give listeners a planned listening outline upon an intelligent line, and still not highbrow as some would like to interpret highbrow.

During the early days of radio a station near Regina used to play recorded classical music for dinner hour listeners. The first year brought a veritable storm of protest, while the second year brought forth some letters of approval. But when the third year arrived, the response in favour of this type of program was very heavy. An official of the station commented that some of the commendations the third and ensuing years came from those who first objected. This in some ways reminds me of network broadcasting

CBC Prairie Newsroom Editors Face Ten News Deadlines A Day

World's Most Important News Condensed To Easily-Absorbed Bulletins

Ten deadlines a day! That is the nerve-jolting job which continually faces the news editors and news writers of the Prairie news room of the CBC news service. And when each deadline arrives the news bulletin to be broadcast must contain the latest and most important news available from all corners of the world. All but

This peculiarity of radio news is one of the main reasons why CBC news editors must be highly specialized workmen. As news men, they must report the happenings of the day accurately and without bias. As radio news men, they must also achieve in their writing an added degree of clarity and simplicity not expected of news men who write for newspapers and news services. They must write for the ear, not the eye, and each editor and news writer has always to keep this in mind.

Every day the leased wires of the Canadian Press, Associated Press, Reuters, British United Press and United Press pour thousands of words into the Prairie news room of the CBC.

two of the ten news bulletins prepared daily in the CBC's Winnipeg news room are 10 minutes long — which means that each contains approximately 1,550 words, or an average of 20 to 25 individual items of news, ranging in content from a roundup of the latest international developments to a brief description of the weather, a rugby game, or perhaps of the arrival of quadruplets to a mother in England—depending on the news of the moment.

Much concentrated effort goes into the compilation of a news bulletin. The listener hears only the finished product, delivered by such well-known announcers as *Norm Micklewright, Maurice Burchell, Norm McBain, Bob Willson, George Kent, Bob Magor, Ken Dougan and Carr Pecknold*. They are the front men, the men who can make or break the quality of a news bulletin with a slip of the tongue.

They must be much more than readers. They must know and understand the news before them, must be able to transfer that understanding to the listener in such a manner that the listener will absorb immediately the full import of the news with a minimum of effort, because hearing news is not like reading it. An item in a newspaper may be re-read if it is not completely understood in the first reading, but the same piece of news, heard over the air, must be fully understood in one hearing because it is not repeated in that particular bulletin.

Because all the wire copy reaches the CBC news service in newspaper style; (that is, in a style suitable for reading) every item chosen for inclusion in CBC news bulletins must be rewritten for the listener.

In order to do such processing properly and with understanding, the CBC news editors must know a certain amount about many things—politics, art, sports, agriculture, etc. Each editor must have a keen sense of

Roi s'Amuse, Verdi's opera has retained all the dramatic quality of the play. The role of Rigoletto, the hunch-backed jester, has appealed to many great stage personalities and singers; and it was as the Duke of Mantua that Caruso made his debut at the Metropolitan. No coloratura soprano, it has been said, can afford not to have the role of Gilda (Rigoletto's daughter) at her command. Although this performance of Rigoletto will be the first for the CBC Opera Company, it will be the second for several members of the cast who took part in the Royal Conservatory's production in Toronto last year. And the entire company will have had the benefit of thorough coaching from a man who has directed Rigoletto in many parts of Europe, Central and South America. This man-behind-the-scene is Herman Geiger-Torel, who acts as artistic adviser for all CBC Opera Company productions and who is also stage director for the Royal Conservatory Opera Company in Toronto. It is his task to coach the singers after they have studied their roles and apply the "final polish" which is so essential to

a good performance. Many weeks before each opera broadcast, he is busy coaching singers separately and in groups on the correct interpretation of their roles.

Winnipeg Drama. Long Live the Republic, by Ben Lepkin of Winnipeg; J. W. Kent, producer. Many may not be aware of it, but the fact is that the boundaries of this fair Dominion once harboured a Republic—the Republic of Caledonia, or, as it

would be today, the Republic of Portage la Prairie. Just how profoundly this affected the course of Empire is hard to say. Lepkin's script quotes a Portage la Prairie cobbler by name MacPherson to the effect that "yon Council is divairtin' the public funds o' the Republic o' Caledonia for the ain and single purpose of alleviatin' the private and unprincipalled thairst o' President Tammas Spence and his Meenisters." History tells that for this remark MacPherson was pursued into the snowy prairies and arrested by order of President Spence, but when he was hauled before the Council of the Republic, some time in the winter of 1868, a crowd of his friends followed him and ejected the President and Council ignominiously into the snowdrifts—after which they never met again. Lepkin's amusing script, founded on fact, tells the tale of Canada's first and only republic.

news values. He must be able to recognize instantly the full importance of all items received in the news room over the battery of teletype machines.

Six editors and news writers make up the staff of the CBC's Prairie news room in Winnipeg. The senior editor is Charles G. Gunning, who has also worked in news rooms in Toronto, Vancouver and Edmonton, not only for the CBC but also for newspapers and for the Canadian Press. Associated editors, Leslie Jackson and Albert Dentry have been with the CBC news service since its establishment ten years ago, excepting for several years spent in the armed forces during the Second World War. News writer Clarence Noyes worked as a newspaper reporter before moving to the field of radio news three years ago. News writer Kathleen Sinclair joined the CBC news service six months ago, after working as a reporter and news editor in Winnipeg and Toronto. The third news writer in the Prairie news room, Norman Lacey, was a newspaper reporter in Regina and Winnipeg before moving to the CBC two years ago.

In addition to selecting, editing and processing copy received from the

various news services, all CBC editors and news writers are called upon to do a substantial share of reporting by telephone and in person. This part of their job comes to the fore particularly when big news stories develop in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and was especially emphasized last spring

during the Red River flood. In that period of crisis members of the news room staff were on-the-spot reporters much of the time, contributing to actuality news broadcasts which were aired almost constantly from the CBC's Winnipeg studios. Their reports told the flood disaster story from dikes, evacuation centres, rescue boats and the flooded homes; they helped to build momentous broadcasts for such programs as News Roundup and Saturday Magazine and for programs which were heard throughout the United States on American networks. Many of the reports were also sent overseas by the CBC's International Shortwave Service.

Other CBC programs besides News Roundup and Saturday Magazine depend substantially on the news editors

and writers for contributions. The Farm Broadcast Department and the Talks Department are constantly kept in mind by news room workers as they sift through the great piles of news copy. Items of interest to sportscasters and

women's commentators are also picked out and put aside. Each task is as important as the next, because each adds to the quality of CBC programs. And that, after all, is just as important to the CBC news editors as the production of accurate, unbiased and up-to-the-second news bulletins.

"For This Relief . . ."

Cambridge, Mass. — The point of desperation having been reached in this country, Dr. R. Clark Jones, physicist of the Polaroid corporation has announced a machine to shut off radio commercials. It is a small four-tube device like the inside of a midget radio, which automatically silences a radio during commercial announcements, and turns it on again when the yap stops. When words are subordinate to music, as in opera, it will not interrupt the singing. It works on differences between music and speech. Speech is full of short silences or pauses. The device listens for these, and after one or two syllables of speech shuts the set off and keeps it silent till one second after the voice stops.

The Passenger Pigeon.—There were millions of them in 1832; one flock alone was estimated at 2,000 million birds. But they were marketable and the salted carcasses were sold in the cities. The slaughter was on a prodigious scale. In 1875 they were still killed in huge numbers, but 20 years later they were so reduced that killing for market was prohibited. In 1906 the last wild bird was seen in the United States, and in the following year, the last one in Canada. In 1914, the last Passenger Pigeon in captivity died in Cincinnati Zoo.—Dr. Maurice Burton, on BBC.
