- When Pat Morgan, western vocalist with the CBC's Sunshine Society (Vancouver edition), comes into the studios for the Monday show he has to leave his horse outside. To show that he really is at home (however uncomfortable) in the saddle, he rigged up this studio mount. Morgan shares the vocals on the show with Betty Phillips; both are supported by a musical group led by Ray Norris; and announcer Ray Mackness manipulates the window shades to let the sunshine stream into the studio. - CBC's plans for covering the Festival of Britain—which the King in his opening message proclaimed as a demonstration of "what this old country can do"—took a forward step last week with the departure for the United Kingdom of Andrew Allan who will co-ordinate the pictures of the great event which will be broadcast frequently during the summer. There will be talks, commentaries and actualities of all kinds and a series of feature programs arranged by Allan to

depict Festival activities in London; a village festival with all its rural color; the York Festival featuring the York Mystery Plays which will be performed in the city streets for the first time in 300 years; the Shakespeare Festival at Stratfordon-Avon; the Gathering of the Clans, in Edinburgh, probably the first real gathering of this kind in 200 years; the Pageant of Wales; and the Festival of the Arts at Belfast.

• Midnight of May 31 will be the "critical moment" in the ninth decennial census; it will

take a whole month to gather in all the information, but all reports will be as of that time. The 1951 census will be much more than a mere counting of noses. It will be truly a national stocktaking which, in addition to population statistics, will provide facts and figures on our labour force, housing, income levels, business and farm conditions. Altogether 29 questions will be asked of every adult Canadian. To explain the census, Dominion statistician Herbert Marshall will broadcast on CBC Trans-Canada May 26 (This Week, CBW 5:00 p.m., CBK 4:00 p.m., CBX 3:00 p.m.).

One day a stranger in town "received an offence" insulting him so deeply that he decided to get back at the whole town-by corrupting it morally. He was surprised how completely he was able to succeed. He found that reputation is only a veneer, and that greed is a disease to which few people are immune. Mark Twain told this story over half a century ago (The Man That Corrupted Hadleyburg), departing from his usual moods of light-heartedness and nostalgia, and emerging as a bitter cynic. # A Booming Two-way Trade in Music

The story of CBC's part in a flourishing exchange scheme which sends Canadian music echoing around the globe

With the signing of an agreement between the CBC and the Polydor Recording Company, permitting this French firm to distribute a recording of Claude Champagne's Symphonie Gaspespienne for sale throughout the world, a new development in the exporting of Canadian music to other countries was concluded. The agreement is a direct result of the work of the CBC International Service in this field. The recording was by a CBC Montreal orchestra conducted by Jean Beandet.

Champagne's work was first per-formed for a Voice of Canada shortwave broadcast to Europe in 1949. It has since been performed by Les Concerts Symphoniques of Montreal, under Desire Defauw's direction.

This is the first time that a Canadian symphonic work has been distributed commercially on a world-wide scale. The French firm expects to sell it in Europe, Canada, the United States, Latin America and Australia.

The symphony is in one movement and takes 24 minutes to perform. Champagne's Suite Canadienne, also broadcast by CBC IS, was released for commercial distribution in Canada some years ago by agreement between the CBC and RCA Victor.

Although Canadian composers may feel that they are prophets without honour in their own country, it is in fact their own country which is making their music known abroad, and the agent is the CBC International Service.

For some time broadcasting systems in Europe have been exchanging programs. The CBC receives a regular flow of transcriptions from the BBC. It has also in its libraries transcriptions various other countries

Europe. Two years ago Canada, through the International Service, joined the company of nations interested not only in receiving but also in exporting material for broadcast. It opened a transcription service which supplies radio stations abroad with recordings of Canadian music. It started the service in November, 1949, in a modest way with a set of 12 programs, but by next September it will be able to supply 38 countries with weekly half-hour or quarter-hour pro-

CBC listeners in Canada are now learning how this exchange of cultural programs works. They are hearing the music Canada is sending abroad and (Continued on page 5)

# U.S. Awards for CBC Regional Shows

PROGRAMS heard on western networks of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation won three first awards this year at the 15th American Exhibition of Educational Radio Programs, held at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. The CBC International Service won an honourable mention, the only category of award given, in the field of programs designed to further international understanding.

The Institute for Education by Radio-Television, which sponsors the exhibition, announced that this year, for the first time, it was not considering programs produced by either the American or Canadian national net-

works, but only regional or local programs.

In announcing the change, the Institute recommended that Canadian programs should be included in the considerations of other United States agencies giving awards to national network programs. The Institute said that Canadian programs "frequently illustrate superb quality in both content and production, and provide wholesome competition to American networks."

One of the three first awards won this year by Canadian regional programs went to "The Seven Joys of Mary," a CBC religious program. In their citation, the judges said "CBC has devoted effort and time in research to present the story of a religious holiday that is meaningful and of spiritual value to all listeners."

The two other first awards went to school broadcasts produced by the CBC in co-operation with the western provinces. "Health Highways" was provinces. "Health Highways" was cited for "imaginative and unusual scripting and production in a field in which dull programs are common." "Listening Is Fun" was cited for "a colourful and imaginative use of fantasy in titles, scripting and production of a thoroughly comprehensible and educational series."

An honourable mention to the CBC International Service was for "Canadian Primer, the ABC of Canada," a program cited for "the courage to approach international problems with sprightliness and humour; for bringing to bear the best of radio techniques in this area (furthering international understanding) and refusing to allow its mood to be weighted down by the challenge of international relations."

some of the finest music which is being sent to us from different parts of the world, in the program International Concert (on the Trans-Canada network on Wednesday nights CBW 10:30 p.m.).

The opening broadcasts in this series are featuring Canadian music, more of which will be heard during the summer, but the last of the first group of Canadian programs will be heard May 23.

Beginning May 30, the series will present transcriptions received from Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Germany, Italy, Holland, Belgium and France.

The International Service's transcription department is the result of much labour and thought on the part of its director, CBC producer Patricia Fitzgerald, formerly of Winnipeg. Within a few weeks of its inauguration in 1949 with a set of 12 transcriptions, special Christmas and New Year's programs were added and sent out to 35 countries.

In March, 1950, the department's first catalogue was issued. It listed all music recorded up to that time and was set up with half and quarter-hour programs and with scripts in English, Spanish and Portuguese. At this time the service was given the name "Canadian Concert."

A second catalogue was issued in June, 1950.

The policy is to use Canadian artists exclusively and as much Canadian music as possible. Two dozen composers, six conductors, 13 solo artists, the Parlow String Quartet and various choirs including the Leslie Bell Singers are listed in the catalogues.

Mother's Day and Bouquets for Mother

A bouquet for mother is just about the most perfect way of expressing our love and appreciation, for mothers and flowers have so much in common. Both live to bring joy and happiness to others, and both hold up ideals of beauty to lift our thoughts above the grass and material things with which our days are cluttered.

A few ways to make every day Mother's Day:

1. Mother's view from the kitchen window needs a group of flowering shrubs, a choice perennial or two and a border of annuals.

2. Mother's window views in winter should include colour against the snow-blue spruce, red-twigged dogwood and birch.

3. Mother's backyard cutting garden should contain such things as sweet sultans, clarkia, bachelor's buttons, calendula, etc. Include some choice varieties of gladioli (Red Charm, Corona, Elizabeth the Queen, etc.),

- 5. Through Horticultural Societies and other local groups plan assistance to veterans establishing home grounds in the community.
