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## The West Coast Indian

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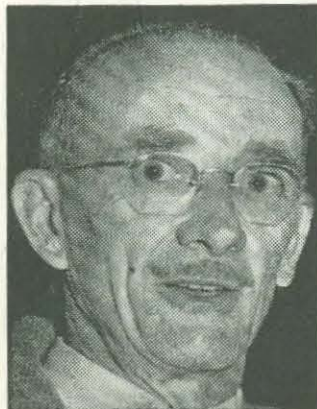

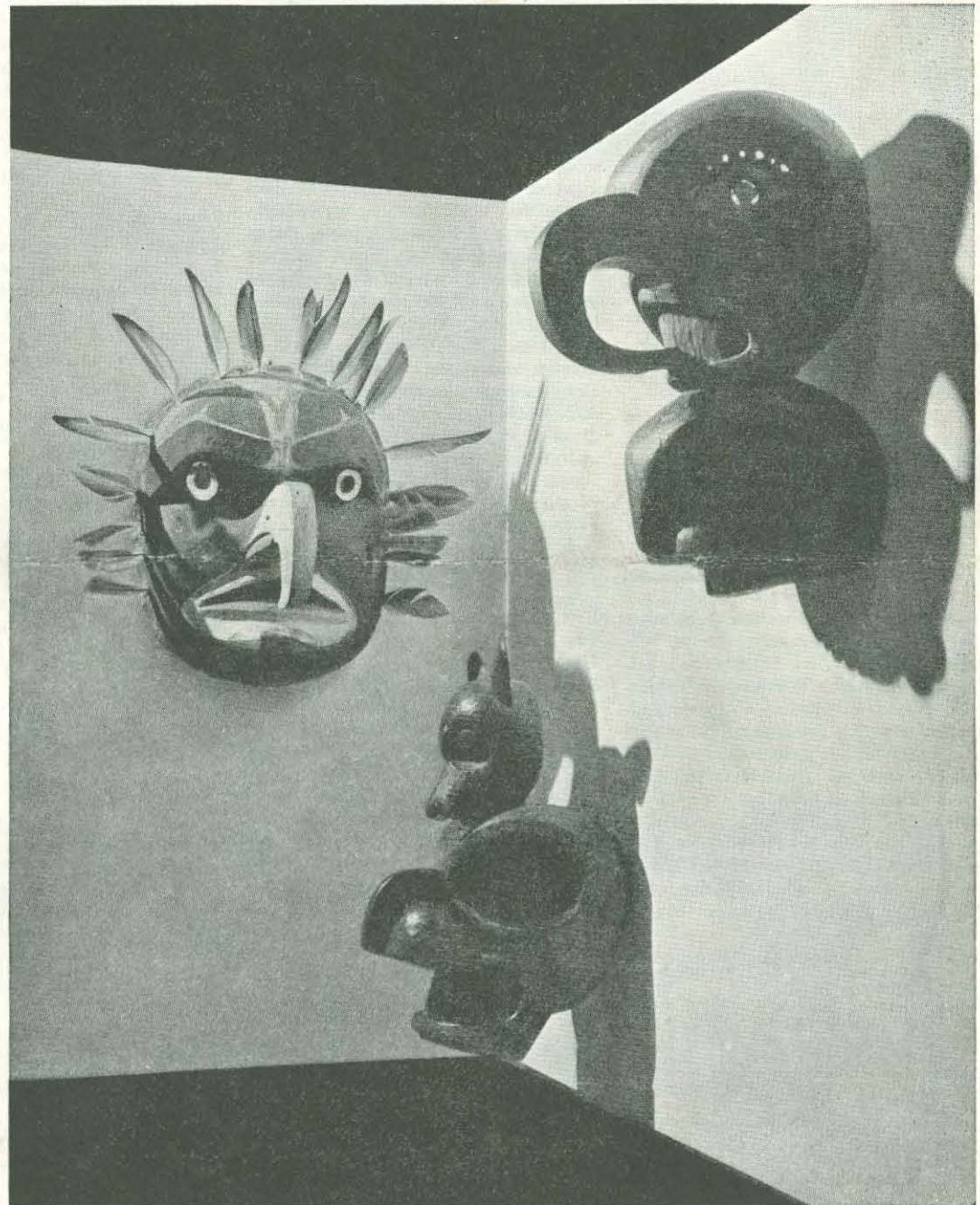
### Our Oldest Neighbours

ALTHOUGH the Indians are our oldest and closest neighbours most of us in Canada and the United States have little information and considerable misinformation about these first residents of our countries. Much of this ignorance is attributable to the reserve system under which the Indians have been governed. This artificial bar-

rier has prevented us from knowing well this interesting and impressive race of people. It has similarly hidden from us the multitude of social, economic and cultural problems and handicaps which confront them. Though they share our countries they do not share on equal terms our rights and privileges. They live, not under our laws, but under the special code of an Indian Act which imposes upon them many limitations which to us would be intolerable.

The Indians are not, as is often said, a vanishing

race. They are, on the contrary, a rapidly increasing race and a race of far greater proportions than is ordinarily realized. In Canada the Indian population of approximately 140,000 (with an annual increase of 1,500) constitutes about one per cent of our total population. In the United States there are over 420,000 Indians; and in the countries south of the United States they are counted not in thousands but in millions—to make a total of thirty millions for the Indian race.

**Ukrainian Anniversary.** Ukrainian groups in many parts of Canada are joining in the celebration September 7 to 9 of the 60th anniversary of the arrival of the first Ukrainian immigrant in Canada. The immigrant himself, Vassil Eleniak of Chipman, Alberta, now 92, is expected to attend the main jubilee celebration in Winnipeg, and on this occasion CBC microphones will be busy preparing an edited actuality to be presented today. The Winnipeg jubilee celebration is expected to include exhibitions of art, costumes, and publications; historical ceremonies, possibly at the

Manitoba parliament building; concerts and banquets with performances by leading Ukrainian choral and other musical organizations. The Ukrainian Catholic Brotherhood, Ukrainian Canadian Veterans' Association, United Hetman Organization, Ukrainian National Federation, Ukrainian Self-Reliance League, and Ukrainian Workers' League are participating in the jubilee celebration. Catharine MacIver will produce the CBC program.

**BBC Hour.** First of four discussions on science — the formation of the earth and universe — under the general editorship of Professor M. L. Oliphant, F.R.S., Director of the Research School of Physical Sciences at the Australian National University, and leader of the group of British scientists who assisted in the development of atomic energy in the United States in 1943. Scripts by Martin Chisholm and Boswell Taylor; Robin Whitworth, producer; from BBC, by transcription. Physicists' knowledge of our sphere is set out simply under four heads: Speed, Temperature, Energy and Time. The discussions between laymen and experts are easily understood, and are illustrated with "Wellsian" sound-recordings. We learn that atomic motion is the reason for changes in temperature; that the source of energy is the chaotic motion of atoms; and that light, link between motion and time, seems to have no end.

**Roll Back the Years.** Ed Manning, who twirls these discs, used songs by Henry Burr on a recent program, and has since had many requests for more from people who knew the singer personally or from collectors of old records. Burr's real name was Harry McClaskey. In the early 1900's he made many records, of which, it is estimated, ten million were sold. Among the most popular were: Goodnight, Little Girl, Goodnight; In the Shade of the Old Apple Tree; Always; Just a Baby's Prayer at Twilight, and

When You and I Were Young, Maggie.

**Little Symphonies.** Orchestra conducted by Roland Leduc; George Lapenson, violinist; from Montreal.

Concerto No. 2 for Violin and Orchestra (Nicolo Paganini).

Still preserved by the city of Genoa in Italy is Paganini's famous Guarnerius violin, given him by the French merchant Livron when Paganini had to pawn his own to pay gambling debts. Later, his successful performance of a difficult ms. concerto won him a Stradivarius. He is still regarded as the most skillful technician in the history of violin virtuosity. In his lifetime he was even called "the devil's disciple" for his uncanny wizardry. He withheld many of his compositions from print, not wishing to betray his technical secrets, and most of his works have been published since his death in 1840. Despite reckless gambling, Paganini left a fortune of £80,000 to his son Achillino. George Lapenson, who will be heard in the Paganini concerto tonight, came to Canada two years ago from Europe, where he had been playing with the Universal Film Association symphony in Berlin when World War II broke out. He made his way to England via Switzerland after a number of hair-raising experiences.

# CBC Royal Visit Broadcasts

The CBC is planning extensive radio coverage of the forthcoming visit of Their Royal Highnesses Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh. From Canada, word pictures of the visit will flow to all parts of the world as the CBC makes its facilities and programs available to many countries.

Broadcasts will extend over a period of nearly five weeks and will range from the landing at Quebec City to the departure from St. John's. The operation will be the biggest single undertaking that North American radio has faced since the highly successful broadcasts of the CBC in connection with the Royal Visit of Their Majesties King George and Queen Elizabeth in 1939.

Approximately thirty-five on-the-spot actuality broadcasts are tentatively scheduled from twenty-three Canadian cities. These will be supplemented by straight reports from other cities, by nightly edited versions of the day's actuality highlights, and by newscasts.

In addition to broadcasts on CBC's two national English networks, the CBC French network will provide French language coverage of all major events while the CBC International Service will beam broadcasts to all parts of the world.

Detailed planning and direction of Royal Visit broadcasts is under the supervision of A. E. Powley, head of the CBC Overseas Unit during the last world war and now in charge of the special events department.

Two travelling teams of from eight to ten persons each will be assigned full time to coverage of the Royal Visit and will be supplemented regionally by the addition of broadcasting personnel from the various CBC production points across the

country. The teams will "leap frog" across the country by air, train and car with their equipment, each team covering every other city along the route. Both teams will work together in some cities to handle heavy and complicated broadcast assignments. Hundreds of CBC personnel will be involved in the overall operation.

All cities along the Royal Visit route are now being surveyed and vantage points selected for microphone placement.

During three years at the University of Manitoba, where she is still an undergraduate in arts, Miss Rossell has acquired the degrees of A.M.M. (performer) and L.R.S.M. and A.R.C.T. (performer), and won five scholarships, a celebrity prize, and the University gold medal. She has accompanied Rose Bowl and class winners at the Manitoba Musical Festival, and has done duet and sonata work with other instrumentalists. Miss Johnston, A.M.M. (performer), has won three scholarships, two prizes, and the Manitoba Registered Music Teachers' Trophy at the 1944 Musical Festival. In addition she won the Canadian College of Organists' prize this year and the U. of M. 1951 prize. She has had wide experience in Winnipeg as an accompanist, and is at present a church organist.

# Musical Instruments and Weather

*Horns, Woodwinds, Strings—Not Musicians—  
Are Temperamental*

EVERYONE complains about the weather sometimes, and among the biggest "beefers" are musicians. But they have an excuse more legitimate than mere physical discomfort. For them, temperature extremes mean sour notes, popping strings and a sort of musical croup. We asked a few of them to tell us about their problems, and it developed that any reputation they have for being temperamental is—usually—induced by that delicate, demanding instrument they tote around like a precocious child.

Clarinetist *Cliff McKay* says: "When we complain about the heat outside on dog days, and then go into a beautifully air-conditioned studio and start growling all over again, people think we're nuts. But that cool air plays just as much havoc with the pitch of our instruments as the heat does, and it develops cracks in the wood."

Cliff cuddles his clarinet inside his jacket before a broadcast for several minutes—and it's not just because he thinks it's a pretty good instrument, but because he has to get it warmed to body temperature before it will do its stuff to his satisfaction. He says a pretty fair clarinet costs around \$325. Luckily the upkeep isn't expensive if the wood is well seasoned to start with.

The oboe is one of the most difficult instruments to learn to play—it is to the English horn as the violin is to the viola. Add the fact that it gives the A to the orchestra for tuning up (so has to be perfectly pitched) and it seems as if being an oboist is no picnic.

Perry Baumann says: "It does need a lot of pampering. Warming up before a performance takes about 15 minutes—a little longer in cold weather. When the instrument is new the wood is usually dry, and the warm-up must go slowly. So you see that you can't just whip out your oboe at a party, mumble something about just happening to have your music with you, and start tooting. It takes time."

You pay about \$700 for a good oboe—unlike the violin it decreases in value with age. Once a year Baumann sends his to a repairman in Philadelphia for adjustment. Then every three years he has it completely overhauled.

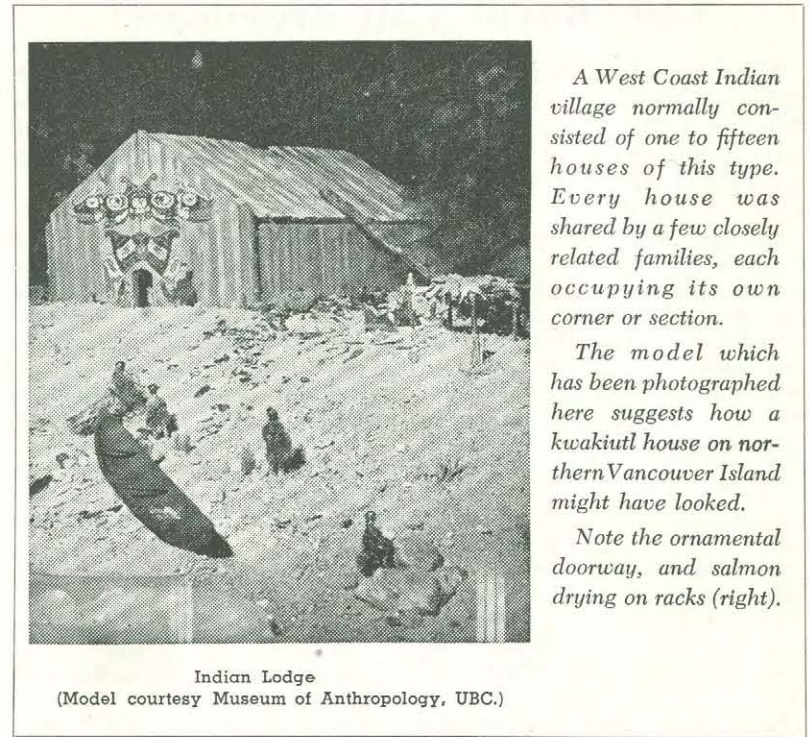
Like most far-sighted 'cellists, *Cornelius Ysselstyn* has this weather problem more or less licked. He always carries four bridges of different heights with him. No matter how much the heat or cold make his fingerboard shrink and stretch he has a bridge to

**CBC Wednesday Night**

**The Canadian Indians.** This week's Wednesday Night includes a two-hour program devoted to Canada's Indians, chiefly those of the Pacific Coast, to be presented from CBC's Vancouver studios. There are three principal divisions of the program, as follows: *Indian Life.* Documentary study by Roderick Haig-Brown; from Vancouver. Mr. Haig-Brown deals with the background of Indian life, and describes influences pre-dating the arrival of the white men which may still affect the Indian in today's

society. He suggests that the outlawing of the *pollatch*, the lavish feast and profusion of gifts given by one chief or clan to another, means more to the Indian than the mere denial of a traditional ceremony, because it takes away one way of improving his prestige in the Indian community. Effects of the white man's laws on the Indian in past years, and what effect they may have in the future, will be considered in this documentary broadcast.

*Indian Music.* This will be a half hour of music based on Indian themes, by a CBC orchestra conducted by Jean de Rimanczy. It will include such numbers as the Haida Indian Love Songs by Jean Coulthard Adams of Vancouver.

*Momatikum.* Free verse drama by Dorothy Livesay McNair; music by John Avison; Ross McLean, Robert Allan, Raymond Whitehouse, producers; from Vancouver. The play is a study of the conflict between older and younger generations among Canadian Indians. A young Indian girl, Emma, as a result of studies at the government's Indian school, has been weaned away from the customs and superstitions of her tribe, whose village is built around a sacred fountain to irrigate the land. The elders are opposed. Emma, momentarily surrendering to superstition, finds herself the centre of a serious conflict. Common sense prevails. John Avison's incidental music for the play is based on Indian themes.

**Distinguished Artists.** Cecile Henderson, pianist. From Winnipeg.

Mrs. Henderson's program consists of numbers by Claude Debussy, to whose work she has given special study: *Reflets dans l'eau*; *General Lavine Eccentric*; *Feux d'Artifice*; *La terrasse des audiences du clair de*

*lune*; *Poissons d'or*; *Suite, Pour le piano* (Prelude, Sarabande, Toccata.) Cecile Henderson is a native of Windsor, Ont., who holds laureate and licentiate diplomas from the



Quebec Conservatory of Music. She did post-graduate work with Frederick Boothroyd of London and Louis Seigel of New York, and was a regular performer on Detroit radio stations before coming West to Winnipeg. Her CBC recitals and concertos have been frequent and brilliant, and she has been chosen to accompany the Winnipeg Ballet in some of its most ambitious performances. Claude Achille Debussy's prelude to Mallarme's poem, *L'Après midi d'un faune*, placed him rather definitely among the group of impressionist poets of whom Baudelaire, Verlaine and Mallarme were the leaders. As Monet, leading impressionist painter, took light to be "the chief personage in a picture," so in Debussy tone became the chief personage in a composition. Yet his individuality was very marked, and it is difficult to class him with any group. The characteristic impressionist technique of *suggestion* rather than statement—"to name an object," said Mallarme, "is to sacrifice three-quarters of the enjoyment of guessing it bit by bit"—is his to the highest degree, but there is much more in his music than a mere technique. Its elfin poetic charm is indescribable, but remains its chief characteristic.

applied to Indians is misleading—frequently, even to themselves. Although Canadian Indians are commonly proud of their racial name and opposed to anything that will make them lose it, they represent many degrees and varieties of culture. Some are nomadic while others live continuously in the same place or locality. The political institutions and cultural patterns of some are essentially simple while those of others are relatively complex and highly developed. Physically too, they differ widely and undoubtedly come from different racial stocks and from different waves of invasion of this continent. Similarly, their closeness to, or remoteness from, white centres shows itself in the varying extents to which they have adapted the techniques of western civilization. This lack of homogeneity has worked against the establishment of close co-operation among Indians, and has confronted legislators with serious difficulties.

In recent years the importance of the Indians in our civilization has commenced, tardily, to be recognized. After much investigation, debate and delay, the Canadian Indian Act was revised and passed this year. And the people of Canada are commencing to display a new and greater concern about the Indians and their important relationship to the life of this country. It is a matter of both justice and self-

interest that they should do so for these Indian neighbours are men and women like ourselves; and like ourselves they have a cultural contribution to make to Canadian life.

fit it. And except when the 'cello is actually in use he keeps it in a specially insulated case so the joints won't spring when the thermometer zooms up.

Of course, like everyone who plays a stringed instrument, he has little control over the inevitable popping of a string at inconvenient moments. But, when it does happen he continues on three strings until he can find the necessary three-minute interval to change the string. He has had a set of steel strings for about 11 years. Most of them last about two years, and cost roughly \$36 to replace.

Leo Barkin says: "Even if you don't own the best instrument in the world, you can make up for any lack of quality it may have by getting to know it really well. That is, if you're not a pianist! In my work I play a dozen or more different pianos. Each has its own peculiarities. I have my pets, of course, but even they don't speak well at times. The CBC takes excellent care of its pianos—one Steinway is always under lock for special occasions. But the hot weather plays havoc with the tuning."

Gordon Day is glad he decided to take up the flute as a boy instead of the bass fiddle—his transportation problem is so simple. He has two silver flutes, valued at about \$600 each. "If you want to go all out for style," he says, "you can get gold flutes for about \$1,500 and platinum for \$2,600. The

upkeep isn't heavy. The pads have to be replaced every two years or so, and an overhauling costs roughly \$25.

"Unlike the oboe, the flute heats up very quickly—takes about 15 seconds. But a flautist has to come to an understanding with the building superintendent where he works. If the air conditioning is turned on all of a sudden, the flute might drop a quarter of a tone. Heat is my biggest headache, because perspiring hands make playing very difficult."

If anyone suggest going rustic and playing out-of-doors in the cool of the evening, Thomas Burry has to turn thumbs down. His kettle drums are practically useless outside after the dew begins to fall, and inside he's continually waging war against the effects of dampness. Most of the other drums he plays are similarly affected. It takes him about 20 minutes to warm up and tune his equipment.

**PEACH MELBA**

With Fresh or Canned Fruit

Peel fresh, firm peaches and cut in halves. Have syrup ready, made of equal parts sugar and water, flavored with vanilla and boiled several minutes. Poach peach halves in hot syrup until transparent but not mushy. Drain and chill. When using canned peaches, save the canned juice, and to each can add half a cup of sugar and vanilla. Boil several minutes. Allow the canned peach halves to poach in this syrup. Drain and chill. The melba sauce serves 10. To make it, mix one cup of sugar, two tablespoons of cornstarch, and a quarter teaspoon of salt. Put three cups canned raspberries and their juice in a pot and heat to boiling point. Stir in the sugar-cornstarch mixture. Cook slowly, stirring constantly until the sauce is thick and

clear. Remove from heat. Strain, if sauce without seeds is preferred. Chill. On the bottom of a serving dish place a layer of small scoops of vanilla ice cream. On top of that put a layer of inverted peach halves. Over all pour the chilled melba sauce and serve at once.

2. Early digging of potatoes not only prevents frost damage, but also reduces infection with disease spores dropped from the foliage.

3. Field storage in pits or covered piles permits after-digging ripening of the tubers in preparation for winter storage. Potato tops should never be used to cover piles in the field as this encourages the carrying over of disease. Use clean straw or hay.

4. Potato seed may be selected at digging time. This should not be done haphazardly. Select best hills of uniform, true-to-variety type. However in most cases gardeners would be well advised to buy certified seed from growers or dealers next spring. It pays to use certified seed.
