HEALEY WILLAN'S music-drama *Deirdre*, with libretto by John Coulter—a tale of Royalty in ancient times, set in Ulster and Scotland—opens the CBC Opera Company's fourth season on October 10. Our cover shows soprano Frances James, who created the title role when the CBC-commissioned opera was first broadcast five years ago, and will sing it again in the new production conducted by Geoffrey Waddington. (More about *Deirdre* and Frances James will be found on pages four and five.) Seven operas are planned for 1951-52 season. The others are Puccini's *La Boheme* and *La Tosca*, both to be presented in Italian from Toronto, with Nicholas Goldschmidt conducting; Massenet's *Manon*, in French from Montreal, Jean Beaudet conducting; *The Marriage of Figaro* by Mozart, in English from Toronto, Nicholas Goldschmidt conducting; Britten's *Peter Grimes*, from Toronto, Geoffrey Waddington conducting; and Walter Kaufmann's *Basmatchkin*, in English from Winnipeg.



### **A new producer for Stage 52**

ESSE W. LJUNGH will take over the production of the Sunday-night *Stage* plays, when the season opens on October 7. He will produce the first four plays in the *Stage 52* series, beginning

with *The Father*, by August Strindberg, adapted by George Salverson.

Andrew Allan, whose name has been synonymous with the *Stage* series since it began eight years ago, has been granted leave of absence by the CBC and will remain in England during the winter. He was seriously ill this summer, after an operation. He went to England at the end of the *Stage 51* series to take a well-earned holiday, to carry out a CBC assignment to cover the Festival

of Britain, and to marry actress Dianne Foster, who went to England in the summer of 1950 for a movie role. Miss Foster followed this by a successful stage run and has just been signed to appear in a movie version of *Othello*, to be produced in England by Orson Welles.

Allan has produced half a dozen documentaries on the Festival of Britain, scheduled to be heard on Trans-Canada this fall. He carried on with them after his operation, suffer- (Turn to page 3)

**Stage 52.** Esse W. Ljungh will produce the first four plays in this series which opens tonight. For the first time in its history, the series will be heard throughout the United States, as well as in Canada. The ABC network will relay it each week. With Ljungh will be a new music director—Samuel Hersenhoren. The opening play is *The Father*, by August Strindberg, adapted by Gerge Salverson. Like many of Strindberg's plays, *The Father* concerns the duel of the sexes, in this case between a man and his wife over the spiritual possession of

their daughter. As her weapon, the wife drives her husband into a frantic state by doubting that he is the girl's father. The play's brutal beauty is colored by Strindberg's own tragic experiences, which brought on his periodic bursts of madness and genius.

The variations, in its original form, was scored for violin, viola and two 'cellos, but it was rearranged for the normal string quartet as a more practical ensemble and was later scored for string orchestra. It is based on Tchaikovsky's song, *Legend*.

ing a relapse in Edinburgh where he had gone to record part of the Edinburgh Festival. He has also produced a special one-hour program as a tribute to Their Royal Highnesses, Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh, to be heard on October 14. By coincidence, Allan's voice will be heard signing off this program just a minute or two before *Stage 52* gets under way in Toronto, directed by Esse Ljungh.

With Ljungh on *Stage 52*, there'll be a new music director—Samuel Hersenhoren. Lucio Agostini, whose music has contributed to the *Stage* series for several years, is taking over a one-hour musical revue, *The Sunday Night Show*, scheduled to start October 14 on Trans-Canada.

# Healey Willan's 'Deirdre'

*A music-drama in three acts, re-creating  
an ancient Celtic legend*

*Now to the music of plucked strings  
I sing again, a story  
That northern bards had sung  
For nigh two thousand years:  
Of Conochar, king of Ullah  
And of the founding girl  
His ward: that Deirdre of the Sorrows  
Who in a druid prophesy  
Was doomed to bring destruction  
Upon the men who loved her  
And who by her were loved.*

THUS the curtain rises on *Deirdre* and on the fourth season of the CBC Opera Company. The libretto was written by John Coulter, who came to Canada in 1936 on a short visit and stayed to become one of the country's influential literary figures. The work was commissioned by the CBC and when the libretto was finished it was immediately published in book form by the Macmillan Company of Canada. The score was then written by the eminent Canadian composer, Dr. Healey Willan, and the opera was given its first performance, on the CBC on April 20, 1946.

The narrative poem about the beautiful Deirdre and her ill-fated lovers, Naisi and Conochar, is taken from the legends of the heroic cycle, *Tales of the Red Branch of the Knights of Ulster*, which has inspired the songs and stories of countless bards in successive generations for 2,000 years. The Deirdre legend, in particular, has attracted the talents of Celtic folklore writers, and in con-

temporary times John Synge, William Butler Yeats and Lady Gregory have all brought dramas of *Deirdre* into the Abbey Theatre or the Irish Literary Theatre. It remained for John

Coulter to shape the story for opera. In the score, Dr. Willan sought to resolve the old struggle between the poem and the melody and achieve a true mating of the two complementary elements of opera. *Deirdre* is, as Dr. Willan points out, in the Wagnerian tradition of music-drama. In no way does the music change or embellish the wording of the lines. The composer has expressed in music what Mr. Coulter has said in words, heightening the meaning so that the music suggests the ideas that lie behind the words.

Since the first performance there have been a few structural changes, in the libretto and in the music. To draw the opera together into a more compact entity, the introduction to each scene by the bard will be spoken and only his first poem sung. Dr. Willan has written extra music to link the scenes and the story-teller will

A "Healthy" Role For Frances James

FRANCES JAMES is a woman who has proved in her life that marriage and a career do mix. "But," she told us, "a married woman who wants a career outside her home must feel in her heart that if she had to decide between her home and her career, then her career would have to go." She had just come from a long afternoon rehearsal for *Deirdre*. The morning had been spent wielding a dust-

mop and in private rehearsal at home; then, after an exhausting afternoon at the studios, she was homeward bound to prepare dinner for her husband, concert violinist Murray Adaskin.

"I'm living in a sort of three-ring circus right now," she said. "Besides looking after my husband and home I'm doing some recording and teaching several promising young singers. But if I can't make it home in time to have dinner ready for my husband, I always put someone in the kitchen to do it for me." During the weeks leading up to the broadcast, rehearsals at the studios numbered three, four or even five a week.

Preliminary rehearsals for *Deirdre*, she did for the most part during the summer at Canoe Lake, Ontario. She said: "I couldn't have chosen a more ideal spot. In the opera, Deirdre lived in a wild, thickly-wooded place, and her constant companion on her woodland walks was a little dappled doe. Our house is surrounded by thick forest, too, and every day a little soft-eyed doe came to my door to be fed. I called it Deirdre's Doe.

"It will be a pleasant change to sing a 'healthy' operatic role. Unlike some other operatic heroines who are either on the verge of a decline or well into one, Deirdre is bouncing with good health. She's very beautiful and emotional. Her story could almost happen today."

Crediting her cat, Twinkle, with keeping her "on the beam," she said: "Twinkle is very much a part of my practising, and what an ear for music she has! If I'm not up to par, she expresses her disapproval in the way she stalks out of the room. She has two sets of living habits. In our small city apartment, she takes over a different part of the place for a certain period each day, and relies on us for entertainment. But the minute she bounds

out of the car in Algonquin Park she's on her own. The woods are full of enchantment for her. As soon as we arrive back in Toronto she settles into semi-retirement again."

Frances James loves clothes, and she always wears something new to a broadcast. "I do a better job when I have a festive feeling." For the premiere of *Deirdre* in 1946 it was a garland of red roses for her hair—"in keeping with the youth and unsophistication of Deirdre." For *Peter Grimes* it was a hat with a seaside flavor—"a navy straw crown with a thick billow of tulle around it to resemble sea weed." She hadn't yet decided what to wear this time for *Deirdre*. It might be her new red velvet hat, suggesting the wild, dark beauty of the young Irish heroine—in any case, that would probably remain a secret until the big night.

speak against a background of his own distinctive musical theme.

Despite the beauty of the music and the phrasing in the third scene of Act 1, this scene has been deleted from the score because it was felt that, in context, it was a duplication of the conversation between Deirdre and Levercham in the previous scene, and that this repetition made it anti-climactic. The original first scene of Act 2, in which Conochar posts his warriors around the hut where Deirdre and Levercham are held prisoners, now becomes the finale of Act 1. Act 3 has only a few minor changes, although Dr. Willan has written an extra chorus describing the battle-scene; although it would not be necessary on the stage, this addition tends to bring the action more vividly to the radio listener.

# At the Movies

with CLYDE GILMOUR

You can find several interesting contrasts in acting styles in a couple of new Anglo-American or hands-across-the-sea enterprises—movies, in other words, filmed in England by Hollywood companies and with casts divided between American and British actors.

NO HIGHWAY IN THE SKY is the title of one of these pictures; and I wish to recommend it in spite of the performance given by James Stewart in the leading role, that of an American scientist working in England. It is an interesting, entertaining and unusual story and the picture certainly has enough good points about it to be worth seeing. The gangling and earnest Mr. Stewart has done a good deal of splendid work in Hollywood since his return from the war (*The Stratton Story*, *Broken Arrow* and *The Jackpot*). With his latest efforts, I am sorry to report, he is right back in his old prewar groove as the shambling, lovable, tongue-tied lout. The role is one which perhaps is easy to over-act, and the usually dependable Mr. Stewart has yielded to the temptation. On the credit side, the film offers a pair of delightful feminine performances by the perpetual Marlene Dietrich as a famous film star, and the English actress Glynis Johns as an airline stewardess. The lady Marlene manages to be interesting even when she just lights a cigarette and takes her time about blowing out the match—and if that isn't par for the course, I'd like to know what is.

The other film I'd like to mention is *Captain Horatio Hornblower*, a technicolour job with Gregory Peck in the title role as the Royal Navy superman created by C. S. Forester.

The picture, or most of it anyway, is quite good fun in the way that adventure books for boys used to be quite good fun. It has a sort of genial, mock-serious excitement. Gregory Peck plays his role with just the right touch of faint, tongue-in-cheek understatement. However, he fails to render plausible or even interesting a contrived and lumbering romance between Hornblower and an aristocratic English beauty—played by Virginia Mayo. The film is properly loaded to the gunwales with spectacular incidents. It is certain to make a tremendous hit with children, and I'm pretty sure that most of their elders will find it, as I did, anything but boring. The jaunty musical score is by Robert Farnon.—*From Critically Speaking.*

## The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of September 30, 1951.

### Fall Roundup in the Garden

1. *Plant tulips this week.* Plant six to ten inches deep according to whether soil is heavy or sandy loam. Plant in moisture and mulch heavily. Early planting and mulching give the bulbs extra time in which to root before freeze-up and prolong dormancy in the spring so that bloom does not appear too early.

2. *Frosted potatoes* are a bad risk in storage. All frosted tubers must be removed before the sound tubers are brought indoors. Sort twice, once when gathering, and second after a week or two in a covered pile in the field.

3. *Storage bins* for potatoes and root crops should be cleared and thoroughly disinfected before the crop is stored.

4. *Roots that tend to shrivel in storage* such as beets, turnips, parsnips and carrots should be stored at 36°-40° or packed in dry sand, peat or sawdust. Such crops should be kept in covered piles in the field until they have lost some heat and all surface moisture.

5. *A vegetable storage room* in the basement should be well insulated

against heat on the furnace room side and be provided with a window ventilator.

6. *Winter rhubarb* indoors calls for digging roots after well frosted, planting in a box of sand or cinders, storage until Christmas, then supplied with moisture and a little heat. No light is required.

7. *Dig gladioli corms and dahlia tubers* during the next two weeks. In digging dahlias great care is necessary as tubers with broken necks are useless. Dahlia tubers can be packed in dry sand, peat or sawdust. Gladioli corms after cleaning may be stored in paper bags or trays.

## "Like Father . . ."

Jim Peddie, 16-year-old son of Toronto actor Frank Peddie, shows signs of following in his father's footsteps. Jim has been spending the summer in Britain and on the Continent with an acting troupe from Upper Canada College in Toronto. The group—21 strong—has presented Thornton Wilders' *Our Town* to audiences in several cities and colleges in England and Scotland. The day their ship docked they opened in Liverpool, then took in a performance of *The Tempest* at Stratford-on-Avon, and after that performed in London, Harrow, Rugby, at Wellington College, Edinburgh and Bedford. Before returning to Canada recently they had rides in jet fighters and submarine chasers, and spent a week in Paris. Jim played Simon Stinson, a choir-master. He made his first stage appearance last year with the College production of *My Sister Eileen*. flation problems. Three programs this season will be a "study in enterprise," an attempt to find out how small business, trade unions and consumer co-operatives get started in the Canada of 1951.

Titles for the first six broadcasts are: "Don't Lose Your Shirt on the Market!" (Oct. 25); "Advertising—Magic or Menace?" (Nov. 1); "Education—For What?" (Nov. 8); "The Nation's Headache—Inflation" (Nov. 15); "How Can We Fight Inflation?" (Nov. 22); and "Co-operation Pays Off" (Nov. 29).

"Cross Section" is planned by the talks and public affairs department of the CBC in consultation with the country's national business and labour

organizations, and is under the supervision of Eugene Hallman of the CBC. Representatives of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Canadian Congress of Labor, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, and the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada are frequently heard in the series. Experts from business, labour, government and universities assist in making each production an accurate and up-to-the-minute report on the subject—whether it is a story of Canada's new industrial wealth or a drama of labor-management co-operation in a particular factory.
