WE Canadians do not have and do not need brilliant minds, but we must have clean, healthy ones. The glorious outdoors really cleans your mind out-cleans your mind clear out. The pioneers who made Canada were strong and healthy. We, too, must push back the bush. Get out and bush-push-breathe air, breathe air . That was Jane Mallett, speaking right out of the photograph at the right, in one of the many impeccable characterizations that have endeared her to Toronto theatre-goers. Along with her stage work, she continues to be one of the busiest of our radio players-and at the same time she's getting ready for television.

## Jane Mallett

THE scene is one of the CBC's Toronto studios. A play rehearsal, scheduled for 3:30, has finally begun at 3:33, after several minutes of resigned clock-watching. Suddenly into the control room bursts a small, quick-moving, amber-haired figure with an intensely worried expression. "Sorry, I'm late," she pants, in a slightly roughened voice. "The most dreadful thing happened! My taxi ran into a sewer excavation. We were sailing right along and then this squirrel began racing us in

Queen's Park, and . . ." The producer turns on the talk-back. "Five-minute break," he tells the cast, and settles down to listen to the dramatized story of what made Jane Mallett late-again.

Everything happens to Jane, and she makes the most of it. Her excuses are always involved and funny (one actor makes a collection of them). As a raconteur she has few equals, and her favourite stories are on herself. As a comedienne, it seems generally agreed, she has no equals in Canada. Place her in the running with actresses as well able

to handle straight dramatic roles, and the field is not at all crowded.

She was in the first of the CBC's Sunday night Stage broadcasts-Stage 44 it was then-and she has been one of the most frequently-heard actresses in the series ever since. She played Aunt Mary in John and Judy for six years. Now she is heard frequently in CBC Wednesday Night plays, Theatre Hour, The Craigs (the noon-hour farm broadcast serial for Ontario and Quebec, in which she plays Mary Walkins); (Please turn to page 2)

Brave Voyage (a daytime serial, in which she plays Mrs. Harris, a maid); and she has been in dozens of other short stories and one-occasion programs. Originally Mrs. Harris in Brave Voyage was to have faded away after a few programs, but Jane's characterization made such a hit that Mrs. Harris was retained among the regulars.

But comedy is her greatest lovedry, penetrating, and outrageously funny. For the last four seasons, Jane has added her most successful comedy roles to an already full schedule as star of the review Spring Thaw which runs annually in Toronto's Museum

Canadiana. Nova Scotia Folklore, talks by Helen Creighton of Dartmouth. Tonight: Death Sends a Warning, a talk on the belief in premonitions and "forerunners" of death and disaster.

Theatre. Her sharply-drawn satire on the "nature woman"-sharp but not malicious-was one of the highlights of last year's performance.

Jane Mallett is a Keenleyside, a family with distinguished members in the professions and in public service. Jane is immensely proud of them, and they're proud of Jane, their only contribution to the entertainment world. She was born in London, Ontario; but Regina, where she grew up, seems to her more like her home town. There was a big family of Keenleysides-six -and they were all shipped out to the west coast for the summer, and then back to Toronto to attend university as they got older. "We nearly supported the C.P.R. single-familied,' Jane recalls.

In college she gravitated naturally to dramatics, and the awakening was mutual. After getting her B.A. she went into teaching, first at Bishop Strachan School in Toronto, and then in small rural schools in the West. Finally she moved back East in search of something more stimulating. One day the mail brought a letter from her father, enclosing a large newspaper clipping about a performance by Ruth Draper. "I think this is the sort of thing you could do," he told her. "But I had beaten him to the punch," Jane says. "I had already started doing solo pieces at banquets and other social events.

She never went looking for jobsthey always came to her; but like most talented people, she has worked hard and long at polishing her craft. Her sense of timing, erratic in terms of getting to an appointed place at an appointed time, is impeccable in front of an audience. She learned it all on the job, initially as a member of George Keppie's stock company at the old Empire Theatre in Toronto.

With Keppie's company she appeared as everything from an ingenue to a grande dame, with starring roles in Elizabeth Sleeps Out, Personal Appearance, The Show-off, The Gorilla, and The Merchant of Venice. She played on the road and in Toronto, taking time out in 1932 to have her son, John. She had met (Continued on page 3)

Freddie, her husband, when they played husband-and-wife in a show at Upper Canada College, where he was, and still is, a chemistry teacher. Freddie is a long, lean Englishman; rather quiet, with a well-developed sense of humour of his own (not a defense mechanism); and through the years he has done some stage and radio acting himself, just to keep his hand in. The third member of Jane's male entourage is her architect brother, Pat, who lives with them. Jane's son, John, shows no signs of following in mother's stage footsteps. When he was 12 she asked him if he wanted to act when he grew up. "But Mom, I've been on the stage," he told her. "Remember that time at school last year-in the crowd scene?"

In 1934, with Frances Adaskin and Fred Manning, Jane presented Town Tonics, an annual production of skits and monologues that was to be one of the favourite harbingers of spring around Ontario over a period of ten years, playing in cramped auditoriums and small-town theatres. Manning recalls that Jane's best exit occurred after a scene where she played a bride, in full wedding regalia. The only means of reaching the dressing rooms overhead was by way of a ladder fastened a foot from the edge of the proscenium arch. After Jane made her grand exit from the stage she began a hasty climb to change for the next scene. Half-way up, the curtains flew out unexpectedly and revealed a startled Jane scrambling up the ladder clutching a huge bouquet in one hand, with veil and train draped around her neck, and long, full skirts hoisted over her knees. She just rolled her eyes at the sudden burst of guffaws, and struggled on up.

Around 1935, Jane spent a season in New York doing radio plays. She can't remember her radio debut; says she just found herself in radio, and that was that. She liked the excitement of the big city-goes down there often to visit her two sisters-but Canada is home, and back she came to join the John Holden stock company.

Socrates. A repeat performance of Lister Sinclair's play Socrates, based on Plato's and Xenophon's interpretations of the Greek philosopher. The cast will be largely the same as in the original performance two years ago, with Frank Peddie in the title role and other important parts played by Tommy Tweed and John Drainie. Music composed and conducted by Lucio Agostini; Esse Ljungh, producer. From Toronto. Lister Sinclair has contributed the following notes about his play: Socrates of Athens was executed on obscure political charges

in 399 B.C., and ever since then we have been trying to find out why. The only first-hand sources are the accounts of Plato and of Xenophon, and Bertrand Russell has very well pointed out that these (particularly Xenophon's) defend Socrates so well that it is very hard to understand why he should have been executed at all. My play is based, therefore, on these two sources. The causes for which Socrates was put to death have been reduced to the simple and familiar one of criticizing the established government, and in this way I hope Socrates will appear as a symbol of the right to speak one's mind, no matter how annoying it may be. But I also hope that the solution adopted by the Athenians, namely, that of suppressing criticism, should not appear as an act of unmitigated tyranny. The really terrible thing about the whole affair seems to me to have been the way in which everyone concerned acted with the best intentions. The death of Socrates and all similar incidents show us clearly that good intentions are not enough, on either side of

the argument. Perhaps Socrates himself gives us the answer when he tells us: "Do not kill others, but improve yourselves.'

Later during the war, she did as many as six shows a week in service camps, canteens and hospitals, carried on her stage and radio work, and packed hundreds of parcels for the Red Cross.

She has a profound knowledge of the theatre and theatre history, and her critical comments about radio and stage work are constructive and to the point. One producer describes her theatre all through, always on stage"-but without being boring, arty, or silly. She drives herself hard, and is never satisfied with her work. It must always be improved, no matter how small the role. She reads a lot and listens to the radio as often as her complex schedule allows - usually when she's darning her men's socks. When an idea occurs to her she does something about it right away. Her purse usually is filled with notes to herself on bits of paper: things she has promised to do for people, ideas for skits, and a variety of weird key words that could mean something only to Jane.

Sometimes she gives the impression of being disorganized, but those who know her say that's because she is interested in so many people and

# Folk-Song Riches in Nova Scotia

THE highlights of Edith Fowke's trip to the Maritimes this summer were her meetings with some of the farmers and fishermen whose songs turn up from time to time in her program Folk Song Time—Saturdays at 2:30 p.m. on CBW, 1:30 p.m. on CBK-X. Not that these old-timers originated any of the songs, but it was they who first brought them to the attention of folklorist Helen Creighton, who in turn put them on paper—and later they were recorded by professional balladeers. (Miss Creighton is currently broadcasting a series of talks on Nova Scotia folklore -Sundays at 11:15 p.m. on CBK-X, Tuesdays at 7:00 p.m. on CBW.)

John Roast was one of the most interesting. The songs he sang for Mrs. Fowke and her husband included The Crocodile, a sea chantey about a fabulous animal like the great Derby Ram, and a romantic ghost song called William and Margaret. "Mr. Roast lives at Chezzetoock a tiny village a few miles from Musquadoboit Harbour," Mrs. Fowke related. "I asked him if he knew Canaday-I-O, a famous lumberman's song. He didn't, but he knew a much older song about a sailor who was going to 'that beautiful country called Canaday-I-O'. This was the original song from which were derived not only the lumbermans' song, but also the American ballad, The Buffalo Skinners.

"One afternoon, we went along with Helen Creighton while she recorded songs sung by a man with the remarkable name of Grace Clergy! She also took us to see old Ben Henneberry, who is 87 and laid up with a bad heart. He was one of the first to sing folk songs for her, back in 1928 when he was living on Devil's Island. One of Miss Creighton's best women singers is a Mrs. Duncan, well over 80, who protests that her voice is gone. But she's as spry as a cricket and can still convey the charm of some of the old romantic love songs.

things, more than she has time for. Like her feet, her mind travels so fast that she's usually talking about two or three subjects at once, leaving her listeners to finish sentences and connect thoughts.

In recent weeks, Jane Mallett has added television to her repertoire of media, getting back into greasepaint for a closed-circuit television play at CBC Toronto. "I dreaded it," she says, "but it turned out not so different from stage acting, although quite a challenge. I think it's going to be fun." Acting before cameras isn't anything new for her, for last spring she made a film for the National Film Board (so far not released), based on some of the high-jinks in Spring Thaw. They called her one-take Mallett, but she didn't like the standing around on cold sets and getting up early in the morning.

When she made the transition from stage to radio, an old friend said to Freddie: "She's taking on a tough job. The competition is terrific." He is said to have replied, with more truth than originality, "But there's always room for the cream to come to the top." That's Jane Mallett-zany, charming, and a great actress.-J.G.



keenly-awaited 1951 opus from producer Darryl F. Zanuck and writerdirector Joseph L. Mankiewicz, who last year gave us ALL ABOUT EVE. Their new film is not nearly so notable as its predecessor, but it contains enough smart dialogue and reasonably grown-up philosophy to make it an item worth seeing. "An item worth hearing" might be a more illuminating way of saying this, because the title is all too indicative of the film's relentless wordiness . . .

While we're on the subject of movies intended for customers other than the bubble-gum set, I'd like to put in a word for a Hollywood crimedrama called THE PROWLER. This is not recommended for sheltered children or for older ticket-buyers who want all films to fit cozily into the category of "light entertainment." Adults less restricted in their appetites are likely to agree that here is a picture which chooses a harsh but honest story and tells it with an integrity and vitality sufficient to command respect on either side of the Atlantic. It concerns a sordid and murderous love affair between a crooked policeman and the restless wife of a middle-aged radio disk-jockey. - From Critically Speaking.

# **Tokyo Performance** of "The Mikado"

RECENTLY Japan had its first opportunity to see The Mikado by Gilbert and Sullivan-complete with a Japanese cast. The performance took place in Tokyo and Norman McBain, CBC correspondent in Korea and the Far East, was there to see it.

The opera, he reported, was presented by The International War-Bereaved Mothers' Association and

commemorated the signing of the Japanese Peace Treaty. Evidently, it all went off very well although language presented a major difficulty and McBain said that sprightly pattersongs sung in English by a Japanese chorus had to be heard to be appreciated. Nevertheless, the audience-soldiers and Japanese citizensloved them, and the show was an enormous success.

Most of the old jokes were still there, but there were one or two topical additions. For example, when Ko-Ko and Pooh-Bah were trying to decide on a victim for the execution and Ko-Ko was suggested, he remarked: "Old samuri never die-they only fade away." That one, according to McBain, had a mixed reception.

After the final curtain, he went back-stage and, with the aid of an interpreter, talked to members of the cast. Mihu Nigato, the Yum-Yum of the performance, remarked that the big problem they had to overcome was to convince the cast that The Mikado was a satire on English life of the time and not a caricature of things Japanese. Miss Nigato paid Gilbert and Sullivan a compliment by saying that she thought the music truly suggested Japan.

The cast had been working on the show periodically for four years, but the actual performance was the first time that they had sung the entire opera. They have also been rehearsing The Old Maid and The Thief by Menotti and Puccini's Madam Butterfly, although there has been no performance yet of either of these. Much credit for the Mikado production went to an American sergeant who had been working with the cast ever since they started singing in English.

McBain congratulated the singers on a good workmanlike job in a language they neither spoke nor understood. As he left he heard a tonguein-cheek remark: "The make-up sure was good," a soldier said. "Why you'd almost swear the cast was Japanese.
