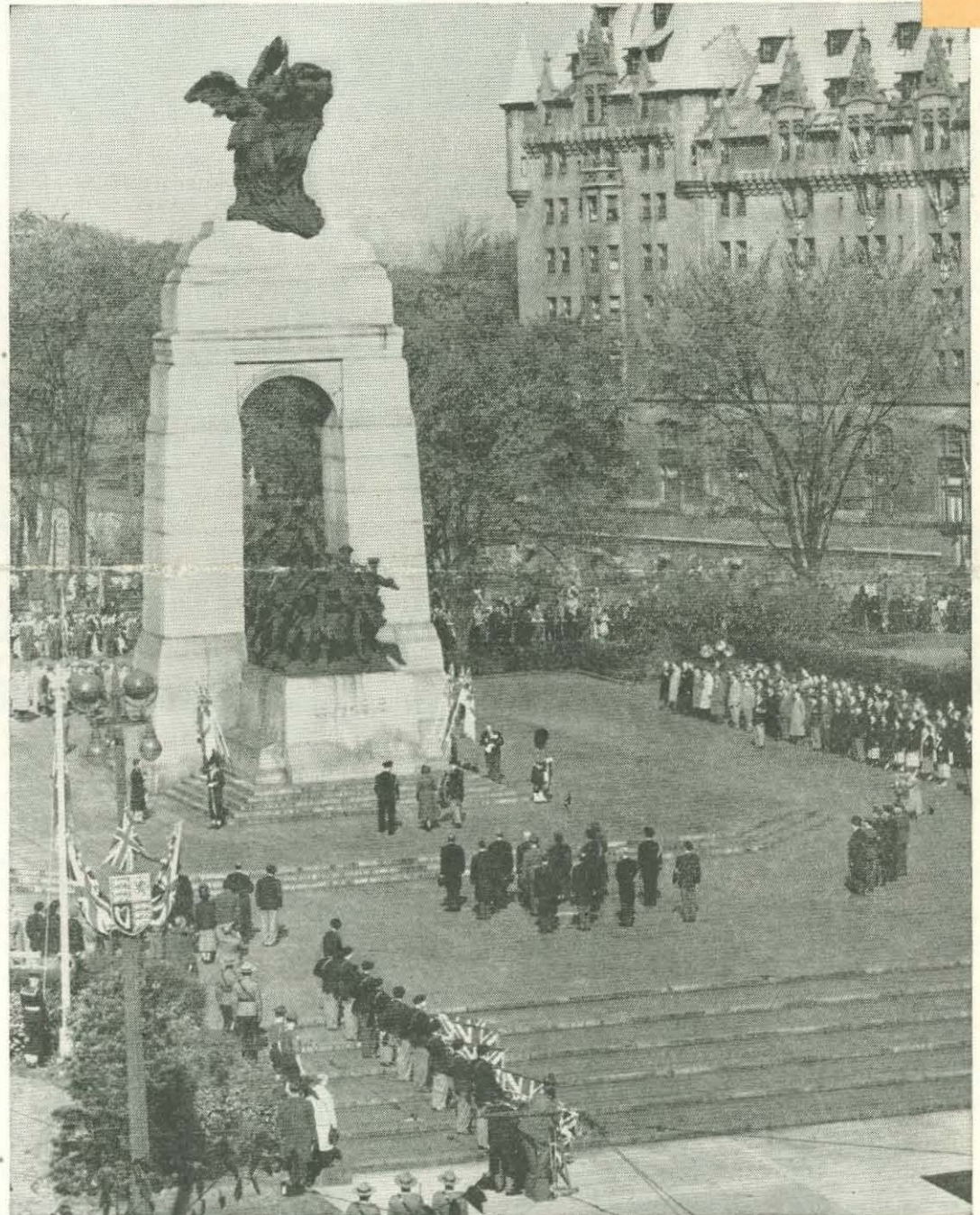
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REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY this year falls on the traditional date of November 11. On this day the people of Canada will pay tribute to the dead of two wars and of Korea; and, through national radio, they will share many special programs of reverence. The highlight will be the service to be broadcast from the Anglican Cathedral in St. John's (CBW 8:30 a.m., CBK-X 7:30 a.m.). Their visit to Canada nearly ended, Princess Elizabeth and The Duke of Edinburgh will attend the service, which will be a simple one in accordance with their expressed wish merely to observe Remembrance Day as usual at church with their people. Our cover photograph, taken on the morning of October 10, shows Princess Elizabeth, with her husband, about to place a wreath on the National War Memorial in Ottawa. CBC men are seen with their microphones on either side of the steps.

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Radio Sidelights on the Royal Tour

JUST BEFORE the State Dinner in Quebec City, the microphones on the Royal Table were removed unexpectedly and CBC staff men on duty were confronted with a problem they could not have anticipated: how to get the microphones back on the table in time for the toasts, without disturbing the regal splendour of the affair. question of finding a set of formal clothes—at that particular moment at least as scarce as hen's teeth in Quebec. Two CBC men began a search through the shops while the dinner was already in progress and, finally, at the correct moment, one of them was able to enter the hall immaculately dressed, to replace the microphones discreetly on the Royal Table.

Byng Whittaker, a CBC observer of the Royal Tour, found that actuality broadcasting from the

top of the Citadel at Quebec can be a very chilly experience. With a brisk east wind blowing he sat there shivering until the Army came to the rescue and rigged up a tent for him. From then on he sat cross-legged in comparative comfort, viewing the proceedings through the open flaps.

Ontario; official greetings, guard of honour; departure from pier for National War Memorial; Princess Elizabeth places a wreath on the Memorial, Their Royal Highnesses inspect services, veterans, cadets, scouts and guides; drive to Anglican Cathedral for Remembrance Day Service.

The Royal Visit. Their Royal Highnesses attend a Remembrance Day service at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist, St. John's, Newfoundland. The service will be conducted by the Anglican Dean of Newfoundland, the Very Reverend Robert S. Rayson, D.D.; the sermon will be given by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland, the Right Reverend P. S. Abraham, D.D.; and the prayers will be given by the Archdeacon of Avalon, the Venerable Heber H. Gosse. The first lesson (Ecclesiasticus 44, verses 1-15) will be read by the Reverend Canon A. B. S. Stirling, senior canon and rector of St. Mary's Parish in St. John's; the second lesson (Hebrews 11, verse 32, Hebrews 12, verse 2) will be read by the Duke of Edinburgh. The service will open with one verse of *God Save the King*, followed by a one-minute silence. St. John's Cathedral was designed and executed by Sir George Gilbert Scott, and consecrated in 1850. Only the smoke-blackened walls were left after the great fire of 1892 in which most of the city of St. John's was destroyed. The cathedral was rebuilt and restored early in this century.

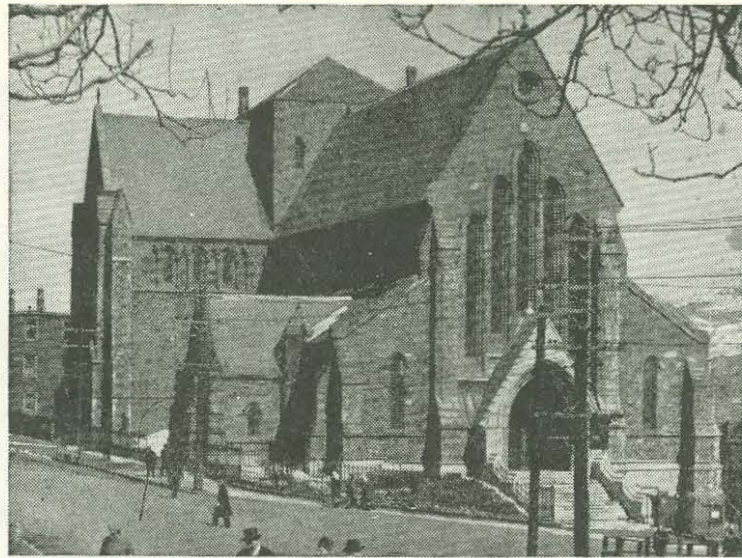

Canada bids farewell to Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh on Monday, November 12, when the royal visitors embark on the Empress of Scotland at Portugal Cove in Newfoundland. On Sunday and Monday this week the CBC will broadcast the final events of the royal couple's stay on Canadian soil. Following are the details:

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of November 4, 1951.
Begonias in Variety

Begonias offer a wide field for the indoor gardener. Here are some of the basic rules which may be modified to fit different varieties:

1. *Soil must be porous* and well supplied with humus preferably in the form of leaf mold. Here is a good general formula: 4 parts garden loam, 4 parts leaf mold, 2 parts sharp sand, 2 parts rotted cow manure. To peat add 4 heaping tablespoons of bone meal and a pint of finely broken charcoal. Peat or rotted sod may be substituted for the leaf mold but the result must provide a really porous soil.

2. *Water with rain water.* Keep soil moist but not soaked. Good drainage is essential.

3. *Begonias like shade* but don't overdo it. In summer half shade is desirable but in winter full or almost full sun may be best.

4. Moderate winter temperatures are desirable—except in the case of a few varieties—60 to 70 degrees.

5. *Humidity of the air* should be maintained at higher than present average level in prairie homes. Dry air is detrimental.

6. *Begonias are surface feeders* and build up new roots near the surface. Build up surface soil as required and don't cultivate deeply if at all.

The development of radar during the Second Great War gave radio scientists many clues to their research into the nature of the universe we live in, and there are a number of groups in Britain engaged in mapping out the radio emissions from the celestial hemisphere. Tonight's program outlines what has been happening in the field of radio-physics in the first half of this century, and describes in easily understood terms what problems face them and how they are being solved. Sir Edward Appleton, a Nobel Prize winner for physics, and bearer of one of the most famous names on the scientific side of radio telegraphy, gave his scientific advice for the program and takes part in it.

Morrow To Head

CBC Farm Dept.

The appointment of Keith Morrow as supervisor of farm broadcasts for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has been announced. He replaces A. R. Kemp, who has resigned from the Corporation.

Morrow has been succeeded as assistant supervisor of farm broadcasts by J. W. R. Graham, formerly CBC farm broadcast commentator for the Maritimes.

A native of Charlottetown, Morrow knows agriculture both in theory and practice. After graduating from the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, he worked as a dairy assistant and as an agriculturalist at the Char-

lottetown Experimental Station. While there he did seasonal announcing over station CFCY, and conducted a farm broadcast three times a week. He joined the navy in 1941, subsequently becoming a communications officer. Demobilized in 1945, he is now a lieutenant commander in the R.C.N. (R). He joined the CBC in 1945 as assistant Maritime Farm Broadcast commentator and was appointed assistant to A. R. Kemp in Toronto in January, 1950.

Bob Graham is also a navy veteran. He was born in Hillcrest, Alberta, grew up in Coaldale, and graduated from the University of Alberta after having spent a year in undergraduate study at Iowa State College. He joined the CBC in 1946 as assistant Maritime farm broadcast commentator. Two years later he went back to the West as assistant Prairie farm commentator in Alberta, and returned to the Maritimes as regional commentator in January, 1950.
