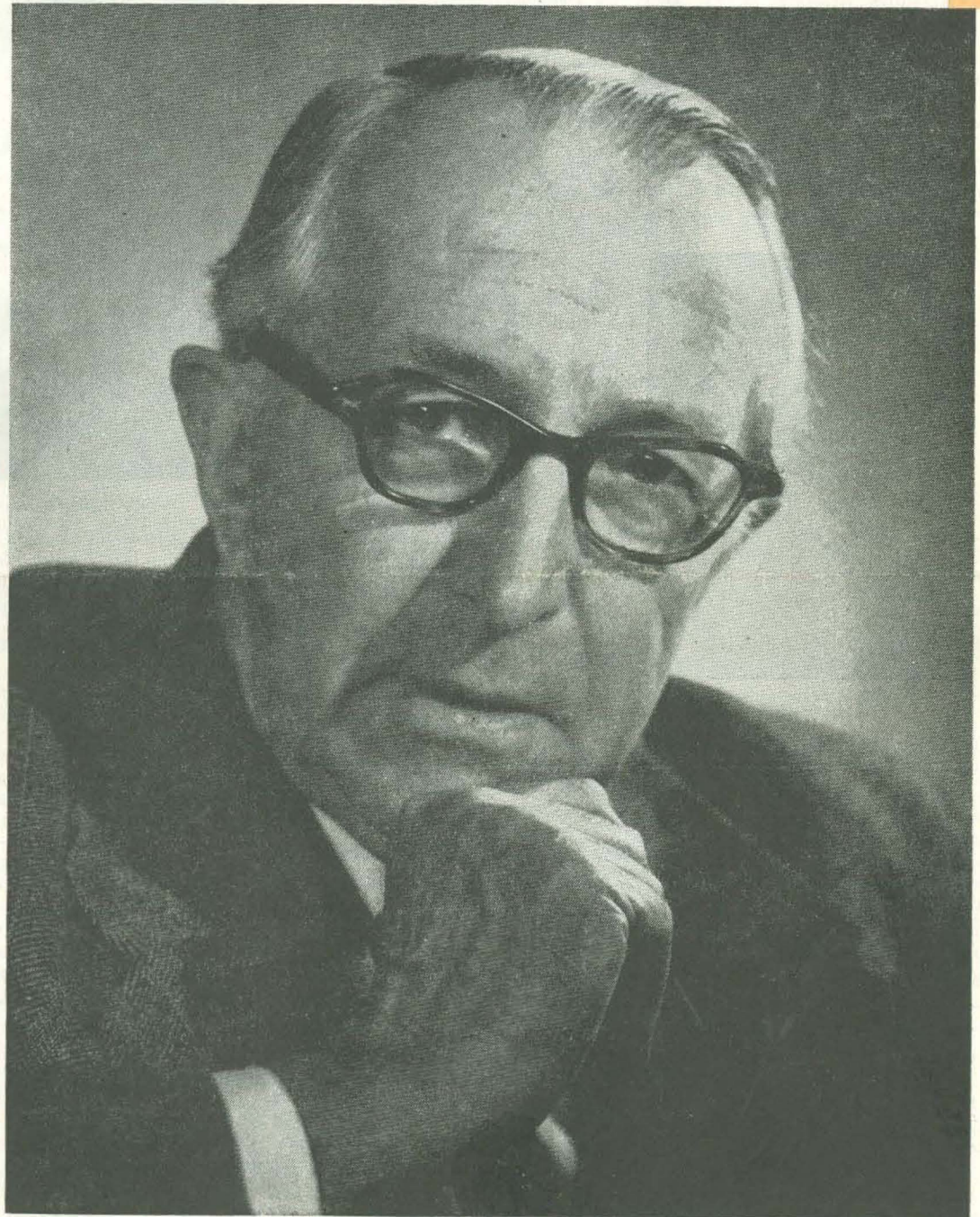

PATRIARCH of actors in Vancouver, and possibly in Canada, is E. V. Young whose voice is best known to CBC listeners from his Thursday-night broadcasts on Trans-Canada in the *Eventide* program. He is also heard frequently in CBC plays from the West Coast, and he has taken part in numerous productions by theatrical groups in and around Vancouver. Mr. Young was born a great many more years ago than most people would guess, though he is still a few years short of Winston Churchill. His interpretations of extracts from the heritage of Christian literature bring him letters of appreciation from far and wide; and many who have written to him in the nearly ten years since *Eventide* broadcasts began assume that he is a minister of the church. The program was started with the idea of providing inspiration and comfort for those whose loved ones had gone to war and was continued after the war because the response indicated a wide appeal. Some time ago, a critic wrote: "His perfect English, his mastery of emphasis and timing and his truly golden voice have made his program outstanding and brought comfort and peace to many thousands of listeners." The *Eventide* chorus is directed by Dalton Baker and Sydney Kelland is heard at the organ—every Thursday at 11:30 p.m. on CBW, 8:30 p.m. on CBK-CBX. Mr. Young is also the gifted reader of a companion

program, *Vesper Hour*, heard in western Canada on Sunday nights at 11:30 p.m. on CBW, 10:30 p.m. on CBK-CBX.

Howard Manning

IT may have been the birds he used to listen to on his father's farm near Brantford, Ontario, or the fun he got out of joining in choruses at school, or the fact that Nelson Eddy is his 16th cousin, that helped young Howard Manning of Toronto to decide on a singing career. In any case it was a

lucky choice, because he's a radio star at 23. He started off 1952 on the right foot by landing the job of featured singer on *Bod's Scrapbook*, the new Monday-to-Friday show on Dominion at 9:45 a.m. CST, 10:45 a.m. MST.

When he was ten, Howard's school teacher decided that his soprano voice was too good to go untrained, and she persuaded his family to let him take lessons. These continued while he attended high school in Hamilton and Brantford, but they didn't interfere with his (Please turn to page 6)

In his *Laurentian Overture*, Alan Shulman set out to create a "slam-bang" overture with the themes (all of his own invention) modelled after French-Canadian folk tunes. Harmonically, the composer says, the work tends toward the moderns,

but his ultimate aim is to have the audience whistling the tunes after a single hearing. In his opinion, modern music should be "enjoyed, not endured." He is a native of Baltimore and studied at the Peabody Conservatory there before moving to New York in 1928. Zola wrote of de Maupassant that he "remained till his death essentially a writer of short stories . . . and became a master of style, the polish of whose writing was so delicate that no trace of effort was apparent." De Maupassant himself said he described nothing he had not seen. Critics, agreeing, called him the supreme observer, a writer of no inventions and no theories, who saw men as they are and did not argue whether they were good or bad. Born in 1850, he died at the early age of 43, his reason giving way. He is buried at Montparnasse. Helmut Blume is known to Canadian audi-

ences as a pianist. Last summer he was heard weekly in a series dealing with the history of opera. His adaptation of *The Devil's General* was heard last year on CBC Wednesday Night. During the war he worked with the CBC International Service.

FARM RADIO FORUM

Is the Model for Programs in Other Lands

IT'S nothing new for *National Farm Radio Forum* to be recognized in other countries as a prototype for group activity to help the farmer with his problems. Now in its 12th season, the *Forum* has gained fame around the world, and in recent years enquiries about it have been received from India, Sweden, New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, Denmark, France, Argentina, Hong Kong and Switzerland—in some cases resulting in the launching of similar projects abroad.

Later developments promise to bring the *Forum*—the world's largest

listening-group program of its kind—to the attention of adult education lists in many additional parts of the world. The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization has begun an intensive study of the *Forum* with a view to extending it to other countries. The *Forum* technique, as developed in Canada, is being publicized in Ceylon and may soon be used in Southeast Asian rehabilitation plans.

Peggy Brooks Sings. Peggy Brooks is the singing hostess in this program, sharing the vocals with Art Hallman. The instrumental part of the show is handled by the Bill Isbister Trio—Bill on piano, Stan Wilson on guitar, and Joe Niosi on bass—augmented by three sidemen—Bert Niosi on clarinet, Gordon Day on flute, and Lew Lewis on tenor sax. 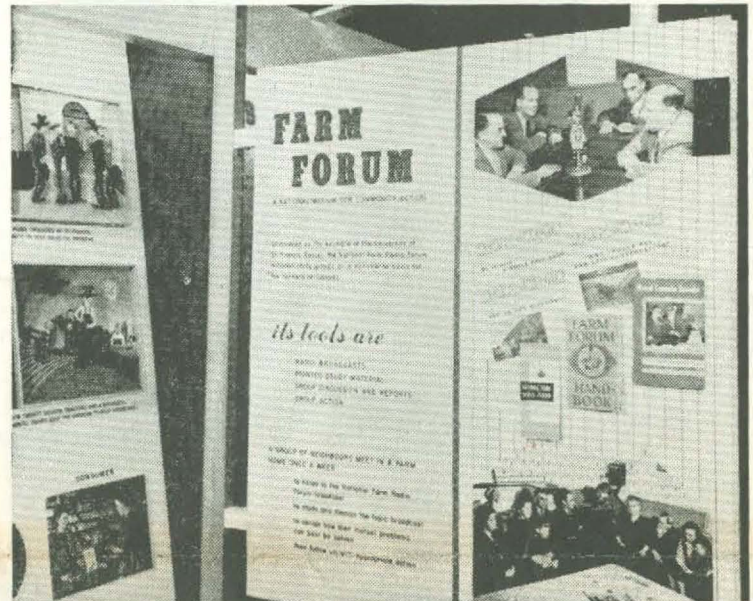

In Search of Ourselves. Dramatized investigations of emotional difficulties

CBC Men Back From 4,200-Mile Flight

FORTY-TWO hundred miles flying over the Canadian Arctic, possibly the wildest hinterland left in the world, is not exactly routine even for CBC announcers and technicians, who are used to all sorts of assignments. So it took George Kent, announcer, and Alex McDonald, operator of CBC Winnipeg, a little while to sort themselves out after their pre-Christmas jaunt to the Far North.

The CBC men took off from Winnipeg in an R.C.A.F. Dakota, piloted by Squadron Leader J. H. Simpson, which was carrying Christmas mail to far northern posts. They hopped first to Churchill, Manitoba, on the western shore of Hudson's Bay; thence to Coral Harbour on Southampton Island, in the northern mouth of the Bay; thence to Frobisher Bay in Baffin Land and Resolution Island off the southeast coast of Baffin, with a brief circle over Nottingham Island to drop mail; thence to Cape Hope's Advance at the northeastern tip of Ungava Bay; and back over the route to Churchill and Winnipeg again. It took a while, especially with days that dawned at

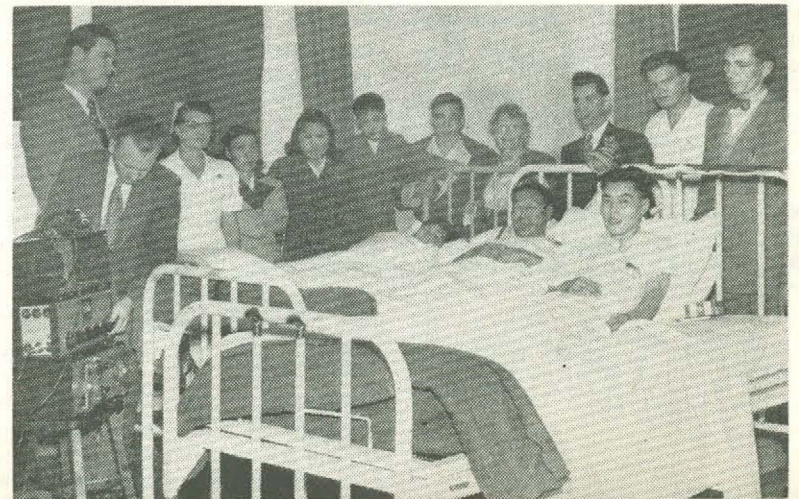

around 10:30 a.m., and sank into darkness around 4:00 p.m.

George and Alex were looking for news of the north to record for one of the CBC's Christmas Day programs dealing with people who were spending Christmas away from home, and also for general items to include in such programs as CBC News Round-up. But incidentally, while stopping off at Coral Harbour, they visited an Eskimo settlement about seven miles from the base, and heard about several Eskimos from that settlement who were in a Brandon hospital, 140 miles from Winnipeg, undergoing treatment for tuberculosis. The CBC men, acting on their own initiative, recorded messages from relatives of the hos-

pitalized men, to take home with them, and just the other day they made a special trip to Brandon to play the messages to the sick men. It was a moving little event. One elderly Eskimo wept when he heard his wife's voice speaking to him from the tape recorder.

At one time in their flight over Resolution Island, George and Alex were more than 2,000 miles from home—actually nearer Montreal than Winnipeg. They got a good view of the Atlantic Ocean. Oddly enough, it turned out to be much warmer in the eastern than in the western Arctic. At Coral Harbour, in the mouth of the Bay, it was 45 below zero; at Frobisher, about ten below.

Christopher Fry. Christopher Fry, author of *The Lady's Not For Burning*, will be heard in a talk which he has recorded for broadcast before the play. W-7:00 p.m. K-9:00 p.m. X-9:00 p.m.

The Lady's Not For Burning. Drama by Christopher Fry; Alec Clunes as Thomas Mendip, Pamela Brown as Jennet Jourdemaine; from BBC, by transcription. The play is about a witch-hunt in a small English market town in the early 15th century, and the action takes place in the house of Hebble Tyson, the mayor. But it is hopeless to try describe the play because, as one critic put it, *The Lady*

defies classification. Perhaps the author's own comments, which appeared as a foreword in the first edition of the play in book form, throw a little light on the subject. He says:

"It might be helpful if the producer thinks in terms of light, of inconsistent April sunshine, of sunset, twilight and full moon; of human intelligences in a dance together, sometimes with nothing but buoyancy, sometimes with a seriousness which has been sufficiently mocked by distress to be able to mock back . . . The comedy is a climate of damp and dry, of spirit and matter playing April with each other, and the climate is the comedy."

Why should Fry be so explicit in his directions to the producer? He gives his own answer in a talk recorded for broadcast before the play:

"We know what the world looks like and what the action of men looks like in everyday, newspaper terms. But the knowledge makes for dismay and suffocation of the spirit. If the theatre can help us to see ourselves and the world freshly, as though we

had just rounded the corner into life, then it will be what entertainment should be: a holiday which sets us up to continue living at the top of our bent. Nothing could be so wildly, perilously, incomprehensively fantastic as reality itself, and we may as well dare to look at it, and like it."

Although the play centres around a witch-hunt, Fry insists it is "a romantic comedy set in the 15th century, more or less exactly." And, after all, he should know.

ect, will take 15 months. The chairman is O. J. J. Shugg, public relations director for the Dairy Farmers of Canada, who has long been associated with radio and farm movements. Associated with him are: W. W. Drummond and Norman High of the Ontario Agricultural College; Gordon Brown, James Giffen, Carl Williams, J. H. Sword and R. Alex Sims, all of the University of Toronto; Edward G. Pleva of the University of Western Ontario; Leonard Harman of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture; A. K. Morrow of the CBC; and J. R. Kidd of the Canadian Association for Adult Education.

The National Farm Radio Forum is a joint project of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, the Canadian Association for Adult Education and the Canadian Broadcasting Corpora-

tion, and its "tools" are summarized thus: radio broadcasts, printed study material distributed in conjunction with them, group discussion and reports, and group action. The Forum's motto is, "Read, listen, discuss, act!"

Also to be studied under the UNESCO project are radio broadcasting and listening techniques; the printed word as used in connection with the broadcasts; other forum programs such as Citizens' Forum and Choc des idées; and the relationship of Farm Forum to the CBC's noon-hour farm broadcasts which are heard regionally each weekday across Canada.

In Ceylon next month, Farm Forum will get international attention at the Colombo Plan Exhibition, arranged by 15 countries including Canada. The Canadian display will show features of Canadian agriculture, farm co-operatives, hydro-electric power development, road construction, engineering projects, health and welfare services, and the National Farm Radio Forum.

Southeast Asia's need for education explains the presence of the Forum in the display. Three-fourths of the people in India, Ceylon and other countries in the region cannot read or write. A way must be found to teach them many things quickly, and the Farm Forum technique may hold the key. Even where people can't read, they can meet to listen to a broadcast and study their mutual problems.

In the State of Bombay, in India, the Forum method has already been used with some success. The Indian delegation which attended the 1949 conference in Guelph, Ontario, of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers took the idea home with them, after hearing about Canada's program, and a few months later it was reported in a news despatch that 57 Farm Forum centres had been set up in Bombay.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of January 13, 1952.

The Garden Moisture Supply

1. *Water* as the main constituent of plant sap acts as a carrier of plant foods and products. The availability of adequate moisture in the soil is an important factor limiting the production of garden crops.

2. *The availability of soil moisture* depends in large measure on physical conditions in the soil. *Humus* is the great soil conditioner in the matter of moisture retention and use.

3. *Keeping soil well supplied with humus* is a first requisite in conserving soil moisture supplied, and reduces dependency on artificial watering.

4. *Fall ploughing* and the addition of manure in the fall rather than the

spring puts the soil in better moisture holding condition at planting time. If gardens must be ploughed in the spring floating and packing to make a firm seed bed is desirable. Manure should be finely divided and thoroughly incorporated.

5. *Mulching the garden* with finely divided manure, chopped straw, grass clippings and sawdust will aid in conserving soil moisture.

6. *One hundred per cent weed control* is an effective way of saving soil moisture for the use of crops.

7. *Spacing plants far enough apart* so that each plant has enough soil moisture is important. Early thinning of seedling plants also helps.

8. *Farm dugouts* for irrigating farm gardens are a profitable investment.

9. *Community gardens* served by a dugout will solve the water problem for groups of town and village gardens.
