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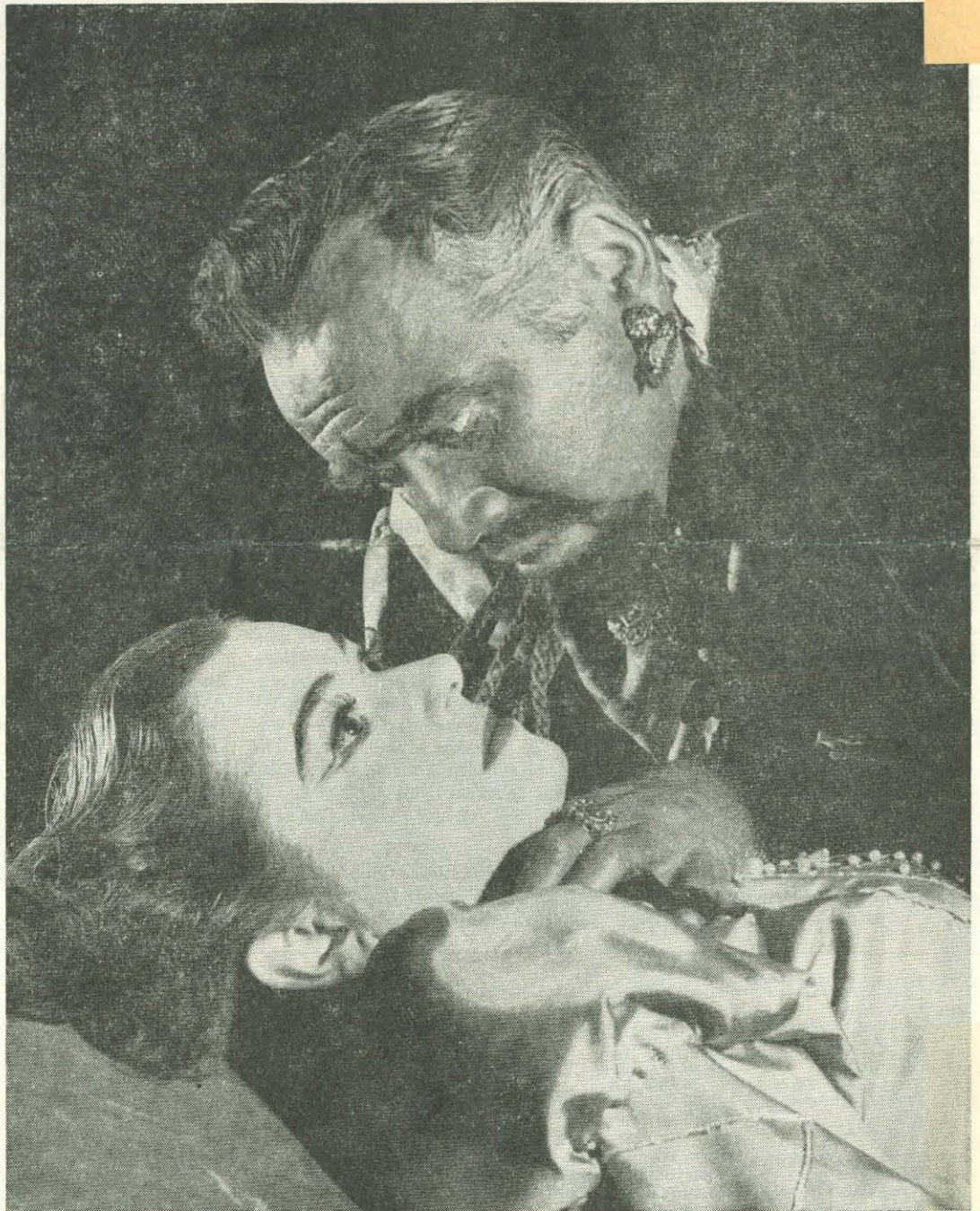


FOR our cover, Lorne Greene and Sandra Scott obliged with a scene from Shakespeare's *Othello*—in the roles of Othello and Desdemona which they will play in CBC Wednesday Night's production. This is also the week in which the *National School Broadcast* begins its serial presentation of *Julius Caesar* and (as some Shakespeare fans will feel, to cap it all) on Saturday afternoon the Metropolitan Opera Company will do Verdi's *Otello*, with its libretto based closely on Shakespeare's play. Critic Francis Toye has called *Otello* the most remarkable of all operas—"not only," he says, "because of its masterly delineation of character, its unrivalled dramatic intensity, but because of the unparalleled phenomenon of a man more than 70 years old being able to write music so passionate and so virile." Another critic claims that *Otello* is unsurpassed in any music-drama for truthfulness and simplicity of expression. "Here is power of utterance that springs, like Shakespeare's, from the depths of the human heart," he says. Those who can tune in on Wednesday evening and on Saturday afternoon will be able to judge for themselves.

IN the Press Gallery at the House of Commons in Ottawa it is generally conceded that Blair Fraser, Ottawa editor of Maclean's Magazine, has the confidence of as many ministers and other

government officials as almost any of the other writers. Fraser keeps readers posted on the latest in Canadian political news in his *Backstage at Ottawa* feature in each issue of Maclean's, and as a sideline he has become one of the country's best-known political commentators, heard frequently in *Capital Report* on Sunday afternoons, and on *CBC News Roundup*.

Since he began covering the Ottawa scene for Maclean's in December, 1943, he has become one

of the magazine's steadiest producers of major articles, and he has been a consistent winner of awards for "best-written articles."

A tall, prematurely grey, friendly, rather scholarly looking man with an ascetic face, Fraser isn't inclined to be anecdotal, but he is an entertaining person, nevertheless. He was born in Sydney, Cape Breton, in 1909, and 19 years later graduated in arts from Acadia University, Wolfville, Nova Scotia. (Please turn to page 6)

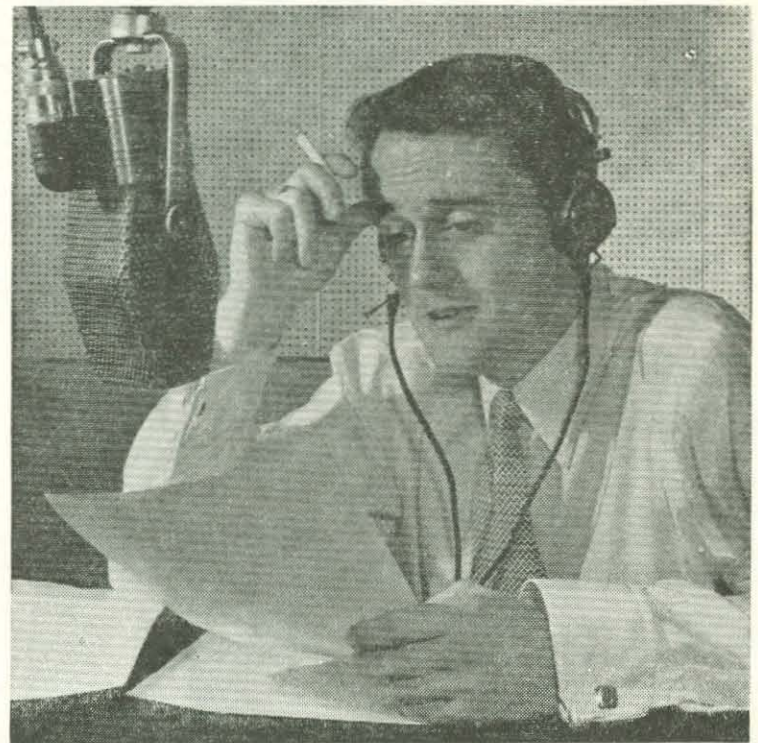

Indeed he did.

The next letter showed how families can be divided over art. It was from a lady who said: "It's so nice to have you back on the air. Of course I only listen when my husband is away. He is one of those 'sensible' people..." The next one was from a steady listener in Vermont, who is firmly convinced that old Rawhide is really John

Fisher. The card was addressed to "John Fisher, alias Rawhide." A scribbled notation on this one, in Rawhide's fist, said: "Will John Fisher sue? Get lawyer."

After examining a few postmarks the reporter was able to figure out that after the initial snow-storm of letters and cards which arrived before and immediately after Rawhide went back on the air on December 3, the mail had fallen off sharply and appeared to be averaging a mere 20 letters a day, from Canada and the northern United States. There were letters from such places as Beadle, Saskatchewan; Slaterville Springs, N.Y.; Sioux Lookout, Ontario; Detroit, Michigan; Middlebury, Vermont; both Niagara Falls; Miles City, Montana; to say nothing of the heavy mail from the Maritimes (where the inhabitants lay claim to Rawhide because that's where his program began) and many places in Quebec and Ontario.

A letter from a man in Naugatuck, Conn., said he had been so entranced with Rawhide's playing of German carols that he had placed a 70-mile long-distance call to his parents in New York State to urge them to listen also. On this one, Rawhide had scrawled: "Won't accept charges."

The next one out of the bag appeared to have been opened and read several times. It had spots on it that might have been tears but were more likely tobacco juice. It was addressed to the CBC from somewhere in Saskatchewan and said: "I think this program is one of the most childish and useless items I have listened to and the program tonight was not only an insulting imitation of the welcome recently accorded Princess Elizabeth and her husband but it was also an insult to the intelligence of the people."

Othello.

William Shakespeare's celebrated tragedy, adapted for radio and directed by Robert Christie; music written and conducted by Lucio Agostini; Alice Frick, producer; from Toronto. Cast: Othello—Lorne Greene; Desdemona—Sandra Scott; Iago—John Drainie; Emilia—Margot Christie.

Othello is generally regarded as of all Shakespeare's great plays, the one most nearly conforming to the "classical unities." It is close-knit and cleverly constructed, though less rich in poetry than the other great tragedies — *Macbeth, Lear, Hamlet* and *Antony and Cleopatra*—produced in his period of "dark vision," from 1600 to 1608. *Lear, Macbeth*, and *Antony* are drawn against the broad tapestry of nations in conflict; *Hamlet* and *Othello* are more personal, with circumstances, leading inevitably to

tragedy, created by a few. Chance is an element in both plays. Hamlet's ship is attacked by pirates, and he returns to Denmark; Desdemona drops

her handkerchief, Iago finds it, and all moves inexorably to the awful climax. *Othello* has been called the most painful and most terrible of Shakespeare's tragedies because the Moor's destruction is brought about by one man's passion for revenge, but it seems doubtful that even this is a true estimate of the strange character of Iago. Brandeis described him as a sort of disembodied intelligence, a brain without a heart and without moral restraint, which did things, not because of any special malevolence, but "merely because it could." He remains, nevertheless, perhaps the most vicious character in Shakespeare's rich roster.

science, or "scientism," which "presumes to deal with questions of spirit, freedom and values, its verdict negative in every case." The weakness of "scientism," Dr. Owen says, is its failure to do justice to the heights and depths of the human being. "The hope of the west," he says, "resides in the fact that its roots reach down to a tradition older and wiser than the scientific—a philosophical, literary, and religious tradition." True science and true religion, Dr. Owen says, never come to blows, but always cooperate in the education of mankind.

The Christies

Partners at Home and at Work

MARGOT AND BOB CHRISTIE of Toronto are partners in the home and strangers on the air. They have acted in dozens of radio plays, but they've never been cast together. Producers don't go out of their way to keep them apart. It just seems to happen that way, and it's a big source of amusement to them. Dashing from one program or rehearsal to another at the Toronto studios they often have time for only a nod in passing.

The family includes the Christies' two little girls—Dinah (nine) and Cedar (five)—Margot's sister, Helen Syme, and a beautiful cat by the name of Lavinia. They live in a wartime housing unit.

Toronto has been home to Bob all his life, but he has spent a good part of it in other places. The son of a United Church clergyman, he took to the stage soon after leaving school, and it was when he was with the John Holden Players in the West in 1931 that he met Margot, a Winnipegger, who was acting with Lady Tupper's group.

Luck (and other things) was with them when they went abroad soon afterwards. They both picked up stock company jobs in London, and later, after persistently knocking at the door of the Old Vic, they were admitted to the inner sanctum. They emerged with contracts that took them on a tour of the Continent and the Near East, doing Shakespeare, Shaw and Sheridan.

When war broke out, Bob joined the Canadian Army, and Margot found an office job in London.



MARGOT and BOB CHRISTIE of Toronto have played in dozens of network dramas—but never together. Sunday afternoons while Margot is rehearsing her role of Miss Henchbaw, the sharp-tongued school-marm in *Jake and The Kid*, Bob may be in an adjacent CBC studio growling like a giant in the story room at *Cuckoo Clock House*. And dashing to rehearsals of *Stage 52* or *Theatre Hour* the Christies often have not time for more than a brief nod at one another in passing.
