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ON Thursday, April 17, the *Wayne and Shuster Show* featuring Canada's top radio comedians, enters a new 17-week series, under sponsorship of the CBC. The show will be heard at the same time (CBW 8:30 p.m., CBK-CBX 7:30 p.m.) and will present the same supporting cast as it did with its previous sponsor. With the famous comedy team we will continue to hear singer Terry Dale, comedian Eric Christmas, announcer Herb May and Samuel Hersenhoren's orchestra, with Jackie Rae at the production post. It's just 20 years since Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster first combined their wits to make people laugh. The circumstances were a bit unusual, as the story on this page will show.

Cavemen Ug and Mug (alias Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster) have induced chuckles from Cape Race to Cape Cook with stories of their breath-taking discoveries of such things as transportation, frying pans and women. But the greatest of all their finds occurred quietly not 200,000 or 20,000, but a mere 20 years ago. At Harbord Collegiate Institute in Toronto a perfectly innocent second-term

teacher allotted adjoining seats to two new boys—and Ug and Mug had discovered each other!

In a matter of days (or was it minutes?) they also discovered that they had dovetailing abilities to make people laugh. When even the teachers grinned at some of their jokes, the boys began to acquire a name as pretty sharp comics. They have

been "partners in mime," as they say, ever since.

At the University of Toronto the boys continued their collaboration as producers, authors and stars of a splashy campus show, the annual University College *Follies*; and as editors of *Varsity*, the campus daily.

They first broke into radio when they were half way through a post-graduate course in English

literature. Three mornings a week for 15 minutes, over a network of Ontario stations, they entertained housewives with *Wife Preservers*, a combination of gags and what they maintain were sound hints on such homemaking problems as how to make rolled sandwiches. Easter in the Russia of the Tsars was the greatest religious festival of the year, exceeding even Christmas, and Rimsky-Korsakov's famous overture is only one of many Russian compositions celebrating the season of the Resurrection. It is distinguished by the composer's usual brilliant orchestration and tone-colouring. Rimsky-Korsakov began his career as a naval cadet, and later spent three years afloat with the navy. His first symphony (the first ever written in Russia) was composed while he was serving with the Russian navy at Gravesend, in England. Bach's *Wise Virgins Suite* was the inspiration for one of the most famous performances by Winnipeg's great Ballet troupe.

In addition to conducting and arranging, Robert McMullin is also a composer of popular as well as serious music. *Moon Scape* which the orchestra will play tonight and which has been heard once before in this series, is one of his compositions. housewives, and they had to spend their evenings thumbing through reference books and putting in frantic calls to experts.

In 1942, when they joined the Army, they thought they were leaving show business—just temporarily, of course—but it wasn't long before the truth was out and they were yanked from an officers' training course, made sergeants, and put to work writing the Canadian Army Show.

This experience taught them a lot about what makes Canadians laugh. References to familiar place names and topics of home life always brought spontaneous "yuks," and Wayne and Shuster filed their observations for use in civilian entertainment when they got home.

Their first chance to get into action again in Canadian radio was in the

*Johnny Home Show* for CBC and the War Information Board, in which they tackled rehabilitation problems with a lusty disregard for gloom. This show won them the Beaver Award for comedy writing in 1946, and they walked off with the same honour again the next year.

In September, 1946, Wayne and Shuster were signed to write and star in their own variety show on Thursday nights on Trans-Canada. They have held this spot ever since, with the exception of regular summer breaks. Several of the original crew are still with them: conductor Samuel Hersenhoren, announcer Herb May, and producer Jackie Rae. Actor-writer-comedian Bernie Braden, who had been in the *Johnny Home Show* as Gabby the Postman, carried the same routine over to the new *Wayne and Shuster Show*, and his toothless twaddle was part of the act until he went to England in 1949.

When the summer of 1947 rolled around, a warm-weather edition of the show was presented by NBC for United States listeners and carried on CBC Trans-Canada as well.

The show's first vocalist was soft-voiced Georgia Dey, who for two seasons sang romantic songs and got in on some of the gags. In the fall of 1948 the show got a new sponsor, and two newcomers joined the gang in Toronto: songstress Terry Dale, an import from Vancouver, and comedian Eric Christmas, an import from England. They're still with it. Christmas played Heathcliffe, the male war bride who followed Wayne and Shuster around like a piece of bad luck. Now he plays the almost impossible Madam Hooperdick.

# The New Asia

## Canadian Reports on 20,000-Mile Journey in CBC Series

Paris, March.—I have recently returned from an exhausting, exhilarating, 100-day trip across half the world. It was a trip that carried me 20,000 miles, through 36 customs examinations, into as many different hotels, and deep into the interior of eight South-East Asian nations by air, jeep, bicycle, canoe, train, elephant and by my own two very weary feet. I lost 25 pounds and three pieces of luggage.

The trip arose out of an excellent scheme devised jointly by the specialized agencies of the United Nations. Their public information departments had pooled meagre resources in order to send a special journalistic mission into Asia. It was to be a new type of venture altogether. And so it was. A writer, a radio man and a photographer were singled out, introduced to one another at Geneva airport and

sent off into the wild blue with a peremptory order to act as a team. We were to "cover" the same stories at the same time, each in our own way and for our own particular fields. We were to work co-operatively. It was an excellent theory. We took it so literally that within a few weeks, French photographer Eric Schwab had dropped his cameras and was working with my tape-recorder, I was taking pictures and shorthand interview notes, and British writer and science editor Ritchie Calder was broadcasting over the national radio in Rangoon and Djakarta.

So much for the team technique. As for the trip's purpose, we had been asked to study and later describe the story of the UN family's technical assistance to under-developed Asian nations. . . .

We flew to India last autumn and worked our way over all the ground we wanted to cover. We shared adventures in the dripping jungles of Borneo, among the terraces of Java, in the teak forests of Siam, in the insurgent-overrun districts of Burma, in the plague and cholera slums of Calcutta. We pedalled through India's Bengal and Orissa provinces, and rowed from village to village in the Ganges Delta area of East Pakistan. We hunted the malarial mosquito rather than the tiger or leopard in the great Kipling-esque jungleland on the border of Tibet. We worked our way through Asian metropolises and remote, insignificant jungle villages alike. We took the high, desolate frightening road from Peshawar in Pakistan through the Khyber Pass into the deep interior of forgotten Afghanistan. It was quite a trip.

In 100 days we saw great accomplishments. We watched peoples' lives being transformed, and we saw new

hope enter long-sullen eyes. We watched UN doctors and agronomists and educators from a dozen nations building and planning a world of

**CBC Wednesday Night**

**Barabbas.** A radio adaptation by George Salverson of *Barabbas*, a novel by the Swedish author Par Lagerkvist, which won the 1951 Nobel Award for Literature and has since been translated into English by Alan Blair. Esse Ljungh, producer. From Toronto. At the time of the Passover it was the custom for the Roman Governor to release a condemned criminal to the people. Awaiting execution along with Barabbas, a notorious robber and murderer, was an obscure rabbi, the leader of a strange new sect whose activities the religious authorities considered seditious. The citizens of Jerusalem were asked to decide which of the two men should be spared, and they chose Barabbas. Lagerkvist's novel is the story of this man who only met Christ for a few fleeting moments on a balcony when the crowd cried out, "Release Barabbas." Yet for the rest of his life he was plagued by the thought that another man had died for him. He was mysteriously drawn to Golgotha to witness the crucifixion; he went to the garden, the scene of the Resurrection; and finally, like Christ, he died on a cross. In his book Lagerkvist makes Barabbas a symbol of all mankind. Christ is shown to have died for him just as He died for us.

**The Prairie Gardener**

Summary of Broadcast of April 6, 1952.

Planning the Vegetable Garden

1. A filing box with several compartments for keeping seed packets organized in groups according to approximate sowing dates is a device that saves time and seeds.

2. A planting time-table can be tacked on the lid of the seed box.

3. Make a garden plan on paper.

4. The size of the garden should be related to family labour supply and family needs. Don't make gardening drudgery.

5. Estimate the length of row required of each kind of crop.

6. Space crops in rows and between rows to allow full normal development under local moisture conditions.

7. In dry districts allow more space between plants than in well watered gardens.

8. Hand-tended gardens can be planted more closely than those machine tilled.

9. Directions of rows should be at right angles to westerly winds and if possible crosswise of garden slopes.

10. Allot warm soil locations to warm weather crops. Tomatoes ripen faster on high, loamy ground than on low, heavy soils.

11. Conserve space by succession of crops—tomatoes following radishes, late cabbage succeeding spinach, etc.

12. For long season harvests use early, medium and late varieties of such crops as peas, corn, etc.

And that, for a journalist normally committed to attend the disheartening *danse macabre* of Western Europe politics, was a rare privilege indeed, and a warming pleasure.

We met a host of tireless, often heroic, workers in each country. They were all fighting for a new break for Asia, each in his or her own way. Above that crowd of names and faces, eight stand out for me. It is the stories of these eight which I intend to tell in my talks on the CBC Trans-Canada network.

From Montana, U.S.A.

Since coming to Montana and "discovering" the CBC I have become an enthusiastic listener. These past few days my admiration has increased by leaps and bounds, your handling of the news of the King's death has been perfect. How different to the way the news was given on an American station. After the announcement of the death, and a summary of the King's life, the news reader, with hardly a pause, said "Now, let's talk about bread," and gave a commercial for a certain brand of bread. Is it surprising that I have such an admiration for the CBC?—Mrs. James Else, Saco, Montana.

### Soap Opera Opposition.

This letter is the end result of a chain of reactions starting with a program put on by Rawhide called "Ma Gherkin." That show stimulated me to listen critically to the soap operas, and since I was on holidays I could listen to a good many. I had to give up at the end of the second day through sheer nausea. This statement is not intended to be hyperbole but is sincerely meant. I have never in my life been exposed to such a collection of trashy programs . . . There was emphasis it seemed on all anti-social conduct the authors could think of.

Although I do not have to, and in fact cannot, listen to these programs most of the time, I wish to enter a sincere and very much felt protest against airing such unhealthy material

so much of the day . . . I am sure that daytime listeners would thank the CBC for more healthy and adult broadcasting during that time.—W. O. Chubb, Portage la Prairie, Man.

### Our Special Speaker.

I don't want any opinion suppressed in Canada, and so I hope you won't suppress my view that Mr. Peter MacLintock's "special speaking" on Sunday night would have been better left unspoken. Mr. MacLintock talked about the Canadian governor-general, in a rather crudely, outspoken manner which would be bound to offend some people's feelings in this rather delicate matter. And if it offended some Canadians, how much more would it offend the people of England? There may be some Canadians who think this doesn't matter, who think that baiting the Englishmen is a good game and somehow makes Canada more independent. They could take a lesson from our American neighbours, who are definitely showing signs of a new realization that manners may count for something in international affairs. They—and some Canadians, too—are beginning to realize that there can be real danger in the parlour game they have been playing so blithely for so many years—of ridiculing and maligning European (including English) ways, European culture, European traditionalism, European manners. More experienced than we apparently are in international affairs, the Americans show signs of a vivid and slightly panicky realization of what it would mean to have the whole of Europe looking at us with hostile eyes from one side, and the whole of

Asia from the other.—J.J.D., Winnipeg, Man.

**Opera Stars and Stories.** This program of operatic recordings returns again this year following the conclusion of the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts.



Helmut Blume

Helmut Blume will again be at the microphone but his narration will be more concentrated on lesser-known anecdotes about opera composers, famous productions and the performing stars rather than on the history of opera as last year. As well as presenting the noted stars of today, the program will recall some of the great operatic voices of the past such as those of Nellie Melba, Paul Plancon, Galli Curci, Emma Calve and Antonio Scotti. Many of the recordings will be from the CBC's record library in Montreal but almost as many more will be collectors' items from Mr. Blume's personal library and from those of his many musician friends. Mr. Blume is a concert pianist who has toured Canada, the United States

and many countries of Europe. From Montreal.

**Music by Mozart.** This recorded program will offer a sort of Cook's Tour of the Koechel Catalogue of Mozart's works. Allan Sangster will write commentary for each recording, telling about the music and about Mozart as he was when he wrote it. From Toronto.

Minuet for Piano in G Major (Koechel No. 1); Piano Concerto in F Major (K.37); Overture, Apollo and Hyacinth (K.38); Cassation in G Major (K.63).

Mozart kept only the scrappiest records of his prodigious output and it was not until 1862-71 years after his death—that Ludwig Ritter von Koechel, an Austrian botanist and mineralogist, went to work on a catalogue. The result was the *Koechel Verzeichnis*, a complete guide to Mozart's works, chronologically numbered with indications of the themes and instruments employed. Koechel No. 1—the earliest surviving work of Mozart—was composed when he was five years old. A simple piano tune, it will open this series. Allan Sangster follows the Koechel catalogue in a roughly chronological exploration of the music of this man whose life saw so much tragedy and so little happiness.

with the performances, presents a selected group of festival choristers and soloists in a half-hour broadcast, heralding the 3rd annual festival, which takes place in Winnipeg April 21-22.
