NOTHING could be farther from the truth but here, nevertheless, is a picture of Barbara Kelly and Bernard Braden in London, combing the ads for the names of booking agents with whom they might "leave their name and number" in the hope of finding a spot for themselves in the English entertainment world. In real life, both Canadians are at or near the top of the ladder in radio, in TV and on the stage in London. The photo shows them in the modest roles they have portrayed in comedy shows for BBC listeners—and now CBC Dominion is carrying a series in the same vein, specially transcribed for Canada. Each Sunday at 6:30 p.m., the Bradens set the pace—which is a fast one—in a variety show featuring also other Canadians prominent in British entertainment.

## Contemporary History

(From a broadcast by CHESTER WILMOT)

THIS may sound strange, but the writing of contemporary history is a most exciting adventure—a journey of exploration and discovery. That's particularly true if you are writing the history of a war or a campaign, because then there is so much to be discovered that could not be known, or could not be revealed at the time. During the Second War, for instance, we knew little of what was happening on "the other side of the hill"—in the enemy camp—and yet without this

knowledge we had only half the story, since war is essentially a matter of move and counter-move, of action and reaction. The historian must have both sides of the story if he is to bring out the real drama—and the truth.

Now this may seem to be rather too complex and difficult a task to be undertaken in the years immediately following a major war, and there are some historians who believe that effective history

can be written only after 10 or 20 years or more have gone by. Those who take this view argue that you can't write with any real authority until all the documentary material has become available and until you are sufficiently far away in time to take a detached view.

Let me take this second problem first—the problem of perspective. This is a real difficulty, as I have discovered during (Please turn to page 7)

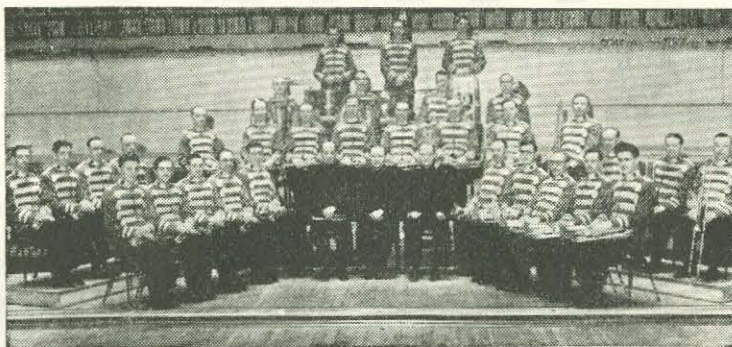

In 1940, the choir was disbanded because of the war and it was not until 1950 that it again became a musical entity, this time under the leadership of Mr. Kaufmann, conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. On March 1 of last year, it gave its first

**CBC Officials Going to England; 'Cellist to Netherlands**

Three CBC men off to England next month are A. D. Dunton, chairman of the Board of Governors; Charles Jennings, assistant director-general of programs, and R. S. Lambert, supervisor of school broadcasts. The chairman will confer with BBC officials; the other two will attend the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference in London. The schools supervisor will also attend the first International Folk Music Conference, in London—called to set up an international folk music institute.

'Cellist Cornelius Ysselstyn of Toronto who came to Canada from the Netherlands 16 years ago with his wife and daughter, hasn't been back since. In June the whole family will fly to The Hague to visit his parents and spend a month there and in Belgium and France. **BBC Hour. Fighter Pilot**, the true story of Pierre Clostermann, one of a gallant band of Free Frenchman who served as fighter pilots with the R.A.F. during the Second Great War. It is an adaptation of Clostermann's book, *The Big Show*, dramatized and produced by Alan Burgess. The book has been described as an almost unbearably vivid account of a fighter pilot's war, and Clostermann's descriptions of vicious battles between the R.A.F. and the Luftwaffe thousands of feet above the ground are intensely gripping. He shot down 23 planes and many more "probables," and was awarded the D.F.C. and bar, as well as French, Belgian and American decorations. BBC transcription.

*Gardening for Mother*

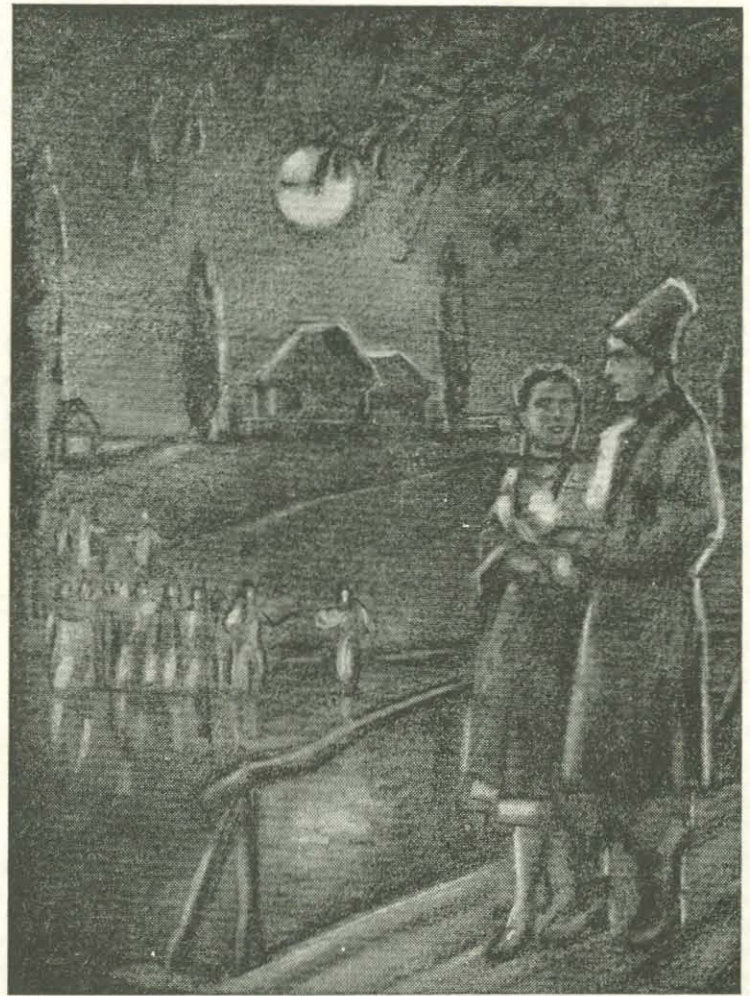
A few suggestions of things to do to help make every day Mother's Day:

1. *Many of our cemeteries* are wind-swept and barren of beauty. They need sheltering belts of trees and groups of shrubs and flowers. This is a job for community groups co-operating with municipal and other controlling authorities.

2. *We need more public parks* and recreational areas where mothers can take their children. These undertakings require enthusiastic public support.

3. *A home playground for children* should be a feature of all home grounds. It should be screened with

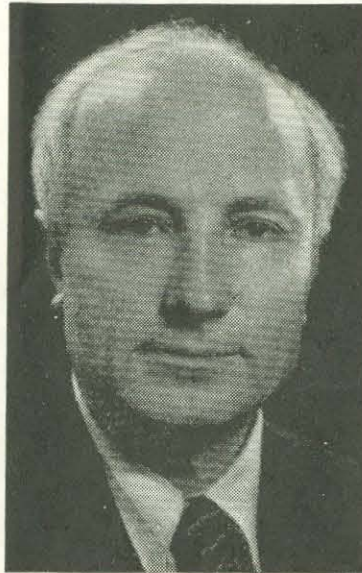

Rimsky-Korsakoff's three-act lyric opera based on a story (A May Night, or The Drowned Maidens) by Nicolai Gogol; orchestra and chorus conducted by Ivan Romanoff; Terence Gibbs, producer; from Toronto. Cast: Village Mayor—Stefan Kozakevich, baritone; Levko, his son—Dmitri Nikiforuk, tenor; Hanna, Levko's sweetheart—Victoria Bodnar, soprano; Scribe—Jan Rubes, bass; Kalenik, the village drunkard—Domety Berezenetz, baritone; Wine-Maker—Eugene Lazar, tenor; Mayor's sister-in-law—Oxana Deebrova, contralto; Pannochka, Queen of the Water-Nymphs, and first, second, and third rusalkas (water-nymphs), known as "the hen," "the raven," and "the

witch"—Feonia Skakun, Lesia Zubrack, Anastasia Meno, and Oxana Deebrova.

The opera will be performed by a cast consisting largely of Toronto Ukrainians, and will be sung in a Ukrainian translation by Leonid Maidan of that city from Gogol's original Russian. For the third time this season the

centenary of Gogol's death is marked. The Cossack beyond the Danube, folk-opera by Hulak-Artemowsky, was presented last November, and Walter Kaufmann's opera The Cloak, based on Gogol's story Schinel, was heard in March. May Night, a favourite of Rimsky-Korsakoff's from childhood (he read it to his fiancee on the day he proposed to her) is from Gogol's early collection of tales, Evenings on a Farm near Dikanka (1931). The composer

gave it some of his most tuneful melodies, among them Kalenik's "hop dance" in Act I and his drunkard's chant in Act II; Pannochka's song of the water-nymphs, accompanied by two harps, in Act III; and the romantic duet by Levko and Hanna. Writing of the opera, Rimsky-Korsakoff said he had tried to introduce "the ceremonial side of folk-life which gives expression to survivals from ancient paganism." Though sun-worship had faded in Russia before the light of Christianity, he thought "the whole cycle of ceremonial songs and games to this day rests on the ancient pagan sun-worship which lives unconsciously in the people." This performance brings together Ukrainian-Canadians of varying backgrounds. Ivan Romanoff was born in Toronto. Oxana Deebrova and Domety Berezenetz are recent arrivals.

the last few years. In 1945 I set out to write a history of the war in Europe with the particular object of assessing what influence the Second Front campaign had on the defeat of Germany. But by 1948, when the Cold War with Russia began, it seemed to me that people would want to know not just the causes of Hitler's downfall, but the reasons for Stalin's triumph; how it was that although we defeated Germany we failed to prevent Russia from becoming the dominant power on the Continent. So I had to revise my perspective—to take a broader view so that I could take in this greater issue and could consider the war in Europe in the light of its consequences for us today.

In trying to do this so close to the event, I am sure to have got some aspects of the picture out of focus. That is a risk a contemporary historian has to take, but I don't believe

that on account of this risk he should shrink from the task altogether. After all, every historian tends to write for his own generation—to see things from the perspective of his own time and in relation to the current situation in which he writes.

But the contemporary historian, I think, has a great opportunity, and that is to examine the immediate past in the hope of throwing some light on present problems and giving some guide to future policy. For instance, one of the most valuable deductions from the study of wartime diplomacy is that the present Russian rulers are both patient and persistent in pursuit of their political objectives, and that Stalin demanded from Hitler very much the same things that he demanded from Churchill and Roosevelt. To appreciate this persistence, is to be forewarned in any future negotiations with the Russians. So there is, I believe, a real value in trying to reconstruct history under the shadow of the event. You may lose something in detachment and perspective, but you stand to gain a great deal in being able to show the direct connection between the past and the present.

vines and shrubs and made as attractive as possible.

4. *The view from mother's kitchen window* should be a planned beauty spot.

5. *The backyard garden* should include a salad plot not too far from the kitchen door where mother can get fresh salad materials throughout the summer.

6. A "cutting garden" where mother can snip flowers for her bouquets is very desirable.

7. *Potting soil ingredients* stored in boxes, so mother can pot up her plants, should include rotted soil, sharp sand, peat, and rotted manure.

8. A *soil screen* made with quarter-inch mesh sand screen will assist mother in mixing up potting soil properly.

9. *Mothers who do the gardening* need a complete set of the best available gardening tools.

10. *Plan to take mother on a trip* to the Canadian Gladioli Show in Regina, August 27-28.

King George VI. A radio biography for Empire Day, by John Pudney; BBC transcription. During the last year of the late king's reign, Pudney began a biographical study upon which he based this radio biography. Piecing his story together, by seeing people, reading books, and studying press files, he was fascinated by the character which emerged—"a very human, very conscientious, very forthright, very good character which lay behind the decorative facade of state occasions." He read with some astonishment a letter written by the king to a friend in February, 1950: "We want more arable land. It is extraordinary the crops that soil will grow . . ." Simple words enough, but illustrating what was an essential characteristic in the king—his profound interest in the land. The one-hour radio program sketches the king's life from his birth at Sandringham, December 14, 1895, to his recent death at the same place. His birthday was also the 34th anniversary of the death of the Prince Consort, and a day of melancholy recollection for his great-grandmother, Queen Victoria, but the old queen said: "I have a feeling it may be a blessing for the dear little boy, and may be looked upon as a gift from God." King George's sudden accession to the throne, and his heroic acceptance of crushing responsibilities during World

War II and its aftermath, form the climax of the narrative.
