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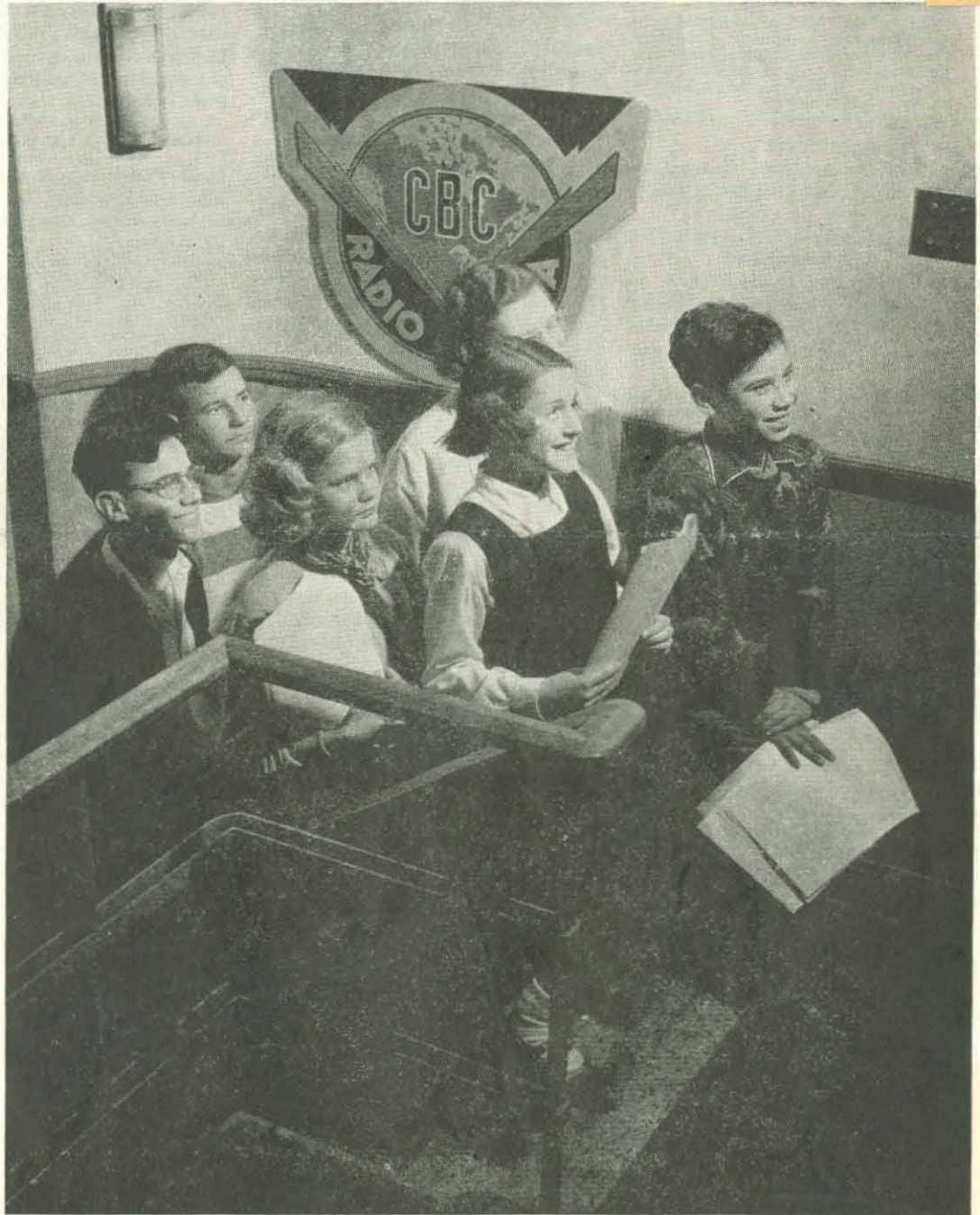
ALL across Canada hundreds of children are getting their first opportunity to act before a microphone. *Trans-Canada Children's Theatre* on Saturday mornings utilizes the talents of the amateur rather than the professional child actor. While the program each week may not be "slick" radio, it has a quality of freshness and enthusiasm all its own. Children who are selected almost, if not quite, off the street, take all the parts of the half-hour stories. They act out both familiar stories such as *Cinderella* and original stories by Canadian writers. Our cover picture was taken in Vancouver where six children from as many city schools, enter the CBC Studios for try-outs before producer Mario Prizek. The play for Saturday (June 7) will be *King Thrushbeard*, adapted from the Grimm's fairy tale by Melville Mendum.



### *Treasury of Knowledge*

(From a talk broadcast on CBC *Trans-Canada* by PROFESSOR ROY DANIELLS of the University of British Columbia.)

I WAS once by accident in the rooms occupied by a poor East Indian student attending an English university. He had very little money to come and go on, that was apparent. Yet on a shelf, high up above his few possessions, I saw a long row of books, a yard or more of neat little volumes in paper covers, bright covers of orange, green, blue and white. They were Penguins, I was told, and they sold for sixpence. That was in 1936 and many changes in prices and currencies have taken place since then, but the poor East Indian who

had so triumphantly created a private library out of nothing is still a good exemplar for us in 1952.

The Penguins had appeared in the market the year before, and were at first regarded with some doubt by book lovers . . . But now the logic of cheap books has become irresistible. In recent weeks the newspapers have let us all know that we shall have less to spend on books next year than we had last year; that taxes are rising, that

the cost of living is beating its wings to gain momentum. If our Canadian society is to preserve any considerable stratum of literate persons in it, good books must be made available by new and cheaper methods.

The secret of Penguin Books lies, of course, not only in their being cheap . . . Their real secret is in the quality and variety of the texts . . . The Penguin series includes (Please turn to page 3)

**Gaite Parisienne.** A new series from Montreal, replacing Toronto's *Musical Comedy Time*. Excerpts from French light opera.

Tonight's opera is *Le pays de sourire*, by Franz Lehar. Cast: Constance Lambert, soprano; Lucille Dansereau, soprano; Pierre Boutet, tenor; Andre Rousseau, tenor; Jean Deslauriers, conductor.

Light opera thrives in Montreal, largely due to *Les Varietes Lyriques* which gives six performances a week from September to May. *Les Varietes* was founded in 1936 by Lionel Daunais, well known as a baritone on CBC, and Charles Goulet, director of *Les Disciples de Massenet*, a Montreal choir. Its roster of stars includes Raoul Jobin, Jacques Gerard, Pierrette Alarie, Leopold Simoneau and Jean Paul Filion. Many of its younger singers are heard on the CBC French network and with the CBC Opera Company. Andre Dassary, Rudy Hiri-goyen, and Lysette Chevalier are French light opera stars who have performed with this company. Maurice Yvain's *Chanson Gitane*, and Marcel Dubel's *Brigand d'Amour* are French light operas given their world premieres in Paris. Light operas, *opera comique*, obscured by the dazzle of grand opera, nevertheless has a long tradition. *Le*

*jeu de Robin et de Marion*, produced at the French court in Naples several centuries ago, is a French opera premiered in Italy, with an English story—the tale of Robin Hood. The repertoire of *opera comique* developed since then is large, and by the turn of the 19th century it was firmly established. Luigi Cherubini (1760-1842), director of the Paris Con-



servatoire, was an early composer in this form, and his pupil Daniel Auber, whose *Fra Diavolo* is still performed, is another. Better known than either, however, is Jacques Offenbach, who was regarded as a sort of French Gilbert and Sullivan, all in one. He wrote 100 works in the *opera bouffe* genre during his lifetime (1819-1880).

novels, short stories, detective stories, poetry, plays (including Shakespeare), history, biography, story books and picture books for children, topical works on economics, politics and religion; musical scores, reproductions of paintings, guide books, handbooks, reference books, periodical reviews of films and music, translations from French, German, Italian, Latin and Greek. Perhaps the most immediately appealing are the King Penguin series, in which the text is subservient to pictures and the sets of plates range in subject matter from *Russian Icons* to *Popular Art in the United States*.

But it is not simply the number and variety that count. The point is rather that here is a grand review of the western tradition; here deployed are

the new troops of contemporary thought. Here is the reflection of the ideas by which we live . . . Here is a liberal education for a generation when the literate are no longer the well-to-do, when the widening of all horizons calls for more books; and the deeper sense of values two wars have furrowed in us calls for better books, for the best that has been thought and known, that is now thought and known.

# The Peacetime Uses of Atomic Energy

Below, THOM BENSON of the CBC tells about his three weeks at Chalk River, Ontario, preparing the documentary which will be broadcast on the CBC Trans-Canada network on Sunday, June 1, 8:00 p.m. on CBW, 7:00 p.m. on CBK, 6:00 p.m. on CBX.

SO far as I have been able to ascertain, this is the first time a major documentary on atomic energy has been prepared for broadcast—indeed, the first time that a broadcaster has been allowed to enter an atomic plant for the purpose of preparing material.

From the listeners' point of view, a documentary on the atomic pile at Chalk River, Ontario, was thought to be a "natural" by the officials in charge of the CBC's recently expanded special events department. Everyone is interested in atomic energy—a little afraid of it, perhaps, because of the implications involved in its use as a weapon of war. But we have also heard much of its potential use by man in his peacetime pursuits. This is the theme of the program—"the peacetime uses of atomic energy."

One of the first questions to be answered, of course, is, "What is

atomic energy?" Now, that's not an easy question to answer. But Dr. David Keys, a well-known scientist and teacher, gives the answer in terms which will be understood by everyone, without at the same time offending those who might have a scientific turn of mind. He tells us how an atomic pile is constructed, how it is controlled, what causes a chain reaction; and he illustrates with the use of sound the different rays given off by radioactive material which has been irradiated in the pile. Dr. Keys tells all about it—nothing is withheld.

I talked with the people who live and work with atomic energy, discovered how it feels to live forever in the "shadow" of an atomic pile, and investigated whether the people who are closest to the mysteries of atomic fission are different from other people. I talked with Dr. C. J. Mackenzie, the president of Atomic Energy of Canada, Limited, and found out why the atomic plant was located at Chalk River. I questioned Campbell Tait, a radiation hazard control officer, about the precautions taken at the plant to safeguard the lives and health of those who work there. I found that "security" is not a word to be taken lightly at Chalk River.

With Dr. A. J. Ciprianni I went on a trip to find radio-active pine-weevils with Geiger counters, learning how the weevils become radioactive and

how this research is helping to conserve our forests. I learned, too, how atomic energy will soon effect every aspect of our daily lives—the things we eat and drink, our health, our very way of life.

On Sunday night we shall also hear about the new pile which is now in

**T**HE number of younger men seeking careers in radio and deliberately preparing themselves for them has increased in recent years, and the CBC among other radio organizations has had the stimulating experience of welcoming staff members newly come from college or university, who never-

theless have a sound theoretical knowledge of the medium and a shrewd understanding of its possibilities.

Dr. McKie: A Fancy (Orlando Gibbons); Voluntary of the 100th Psalm (Henry Purcell); Passacaglia and Fugue in C Minor (Bach). Choir: God Is Gone Up (William Croft); O King of Glory (Healey Willan).

David Walker, assistant talks producer at CBC Winnipeg, who joined the Corporation last summer, is one of these younger members whose grounding in the modern form of journalism represented by the CBC Department of Talks and Public Affairs goes back, in a sense, to the previous generation. Son of a journalist of life-long experience, who is now editor-in-chief of the Department of Labour publications branch at Ottawa, David set his sights on journalism from early schooldays. His preparations have included a B.A. degree from Queen's, with honours in economics, history, and English; and a Master of Science degree in journalism from Columbia University, New York.

In New York, Mr. Walker specialized in radio journalism, and one of the projects he worked on was a daily facsimile service of news and features supplied from a master station at Columbia to up-state New York, chiefly for the benefit of farmers. He spent a good deal of time at Flushing Meadow covering U.N. activities, and while there interviewed, among others, Malik of Russia and Malik of Lebanon, Mrs. Edith Sampson of the United States delegation and the late Dr. Gerald Riddell and Lester Pearson of Canada. There he also met the CBC's representatives, Bernard Trotter, formerly of Winnipeg; Dorothy Fletcher, and Peter Stursberg, and formed the connection which was ultimately to lead him back to Canada and the CBC staff.

It was toward the end of the school year at Columbia that David heard from the CBC, and he made a flying trip to Toronto, using up the last dollar of his savings, to meet officials of the Corporation. But when he had completed his studies at Columbia, there was a job waiting for him. He spent three weeks in the CBC Talks Department at Toronto, and then moved to Winnipeg as assistant producer.

Though a Canadian of several generations, David's family background is unusual. His grandfather went from Western Ontario to India as a missionary, and his father and some other members of the family were born there. Actually, when Mr. Walker senior returned from India at the age of twelve, he spoke Telagou better than English. But he re-mastered his native tongue sufficiently to become a journalist of distinction, working on the Ottawa Citizen and Toronto Globe before taking the editorship of Dominion Government labour publications.

David Walker was feature editor of the Queen's Journal for two of his undergraduate years, and also did some work on the university radio station at Kingston. While in New York, he was also the local stringer for the Ottawa Journal.

He did a bit of TV work, too—more harrowing than radio, he reports, but fascinating.

*The Versatile Whistler.* Public taste in music has, to my mind, been definitely developed and elevated, particularly in the last several years, due to the influence of radio. It is most interesting to hear a subway worker, for instance, finish whistling "The Little White Cloud that Cried" and promptly offer as his next selection part of Mozart's "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik."—Pianist John Coveart, of Toronto.

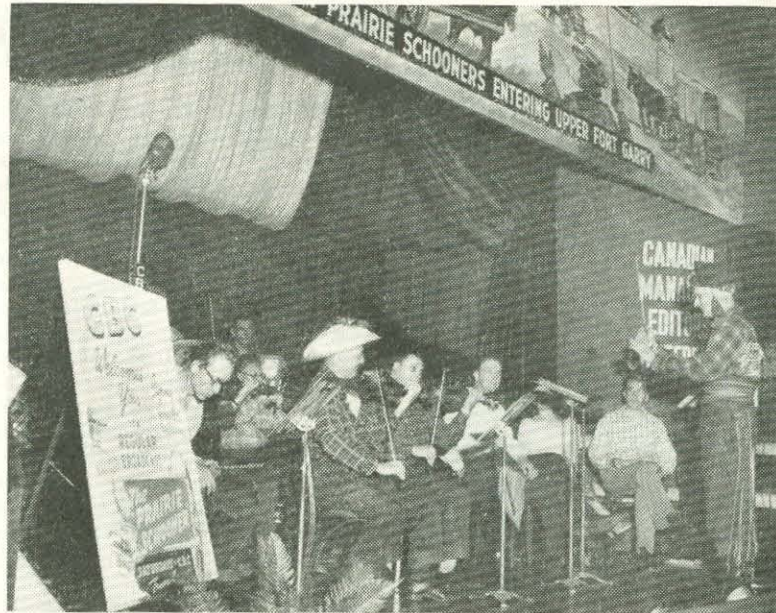


Maxine Ware

RUSS CARRIER, CBC announcer, who prefaced the program with an interesting account of the origin of the Schooner program and the world-wide audience it has gained through CBC International Service, has a moment of relaxation while the orchestra plays. Soloists on this occasion were CORA JAMES, soprano, and JAMES DUNCAN, baritone. After the broadcast, the orchestra entertained the editors and their ladies at a lively western hoedown.

Trooping of the Colour. This Thursday, in London, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth will take the salute at the traditional ceremony of "trooping of the colour" by the Brigade of Guards, in honour of the Queen's official birthday which is being celebrated on June 5 in the United Kingdom. A BBC account of the event will be carried to Canadian listeners via CBC Trans-Canada. It will be the second

time Her Majesty has taken the salute at the parade—she did so last year as the King's deputy during his illness. The intricate military ritual and pageantry of the parade go back to the 18th century, when the regiment which provided the King's guard for the day trooped its colour, or standard, and lodged it in a safe place as a rallying point for the King's men. This year the colour of the Scots

Guards will be trooped. The other regiments in the brigade are the Cold-Stream Guards, the Irish Guards and the Welsh Guards.

Altogether, I spent three weeks "on location," and operator Fred McCord of CBC Ottawa was on the scene for the last three days during the production of the program.
