Winnipeg Concert

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IN the back-to-school rush, pre-school youngsters are getting a head start on their older brothers and sisters this year. September 2 marks the re-opening of *Kindergarten of the Air* (CBW 9:15 a.m., CBK 12:00 noon, CBK 11:00 a.m.). One of the most widely-heard programs of the CBC, it is now in its fifth year of broadcasting. Educational authorities have been high in their praise of the show, using it extensively in organized kindergarten groups and junior-school grades. The program aims to give children who are too young to attend school or kindergarten some incentive to play constructively, using their own initiative. It also serves as a guide to mothers in teaching and playing with their children. As in other years, "teachers" Dorothy Jane Goulding and Ruth Johnson will take turns conducting the broadcasts.

Successful Immigrant

NOW a little over a year out from England, Barry Morse was born in London's East End and relates how as an office boy of 15 he read in the newspapers that Lord Leverhulme on his death bed endowed an annual scholarship at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art. "I figured out that the scholarship was worth four times as much as I was then earning and I couldn't lose a thing by making a stab at it," he says. "As I look back on

it now, I marvel at my audacity." However, he won the scholarship—Sybil Thorndike was one of the judges—and became the youngest student ever to enter the Royal Academy. "I spent the next two years open-mouthed," he recalls. "I found myself in a completely new world, with the sort of people I had never known before. And of course, I had to relearn the English language and get rid of an atrocious Cockney accent." At the end of the two years he played the title role in *Henry V*, pre-

sented before King George VI and Queen Elizabeth in honour of their Coronation Year, and won a BBC award for his radio acting.

Barry Morse was one of England's most successful younger actors when he came to Canada on a visit in May, 1951. His name had topped the stars on the marquees of London theatres; his associates for a good number of years had been many of England's stage, film, radio and television greats. Godfrey Ridout, who conducts this series, is an enthusiastic "Sullivanian" as well as Gilbertian. He directed a student production of three G. and S. operas at North Toronto Collegiate while a student himself at Upper Canada College, and he continues to direct G. and S. and other light opera productions as professional music director of the Victoria College Music Club and the Eaton Operatic Society in Toronto. At 34, he is well known as a composer, with a number of choral, orchestral and vocal works to his credit, and more than 200 background scores for the National Film Board and the CBC. His dramatic symphony *Esther* was performed on CBC Wednesday Night in 1951. Dr. Ettore Mazzoleni, one of his mentors, says Arthur Sullivan is Ridout's patron saint, and he admits that he has probably "spent more time studying this fascinating man than perhaps he deserves." But he thinks Sullivan's position as a composer of comic operas is well-earned. "In comparison with the forced German 19th century romanticism, his clarity of thought is refreshing."

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of August 24, 1952.

Planting Bulbs Indoors (third and last in a series on bulbs)

1. *What to plant:* tulips, daffodils, hyacinths and crocuses.

2. *When to plant:* as soon as bulbs are available. Bulbs deteriorate quickly on store counters. Buy and plant early.

3. *What size bulbs to buy:* For forcing use only top size bulbs except in the case of groups of hyacinths planted in pans (For these use No. 3).

4. *What kind of container:* any kind with good drainage will do.

5. *Soil:* mix good loam with sharp sand, a bit of peat, sheep manure or bonemeal to form a porous soil.

6. *Rooting bulbs:* use cool storage (40°-50°).

7. *Time in rooting:* varies with kinds and storage conditions. Must be long enough to fill pots with roots and to allow flower buds to pass through necks of bulbs.

8. *General summary:* plant early, keep moist, keep cool, keep rooting long enough.

9. *After blooming* bulbs may be saved for planting outdoors in spring. They have no further value for indoor flowering.

10. *Buy your bulbs* from firms who make it a business to know what they are selling and how it will perform. Don't hunt cheap bargains. Buy the best.

Lambert Back From Commonwealth Meet

CBC School Supervisor Reports On Education Committee Findings

FIRST details of the results of the Commonwealth Broadcasting Conference held in London during the summer were brought back to Canada by R. S. Lambert, CBC's supervisor of school broadcasts, who was one of Canada's representatives. Top broadcasting officials from Australia, Ceylon, Great Britain, India, New Zealand, Pakistan and South Africa took part in the proceedings.

Arrangements for staff exchanges made at the first conference (in 1945) were reviewed and further developments planned; closer co-operation between Commonwealth countries in the news-gathering field was recommended; and a project was worked out by which writers, producers and engineers of the various countries would combine in teams to devise programs on major Commonwealth issues, the first to be dealt with being the Colombo Plan.

More details about the general work of the conference are expected with the return of Donald Manson, CBC's

general manager and chief delegate from Canada, and Charles Jennings, CBC's assistant director general of programs. CBC chairman A. Davidson Dunton attended some of the meetings.

Meanwhile, the official report of the conference's educational committee is already available. Its main recommendations all of which have to be ratified by the appropriate bodies in each country (e.g. the National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting in Canada), are:

1. Emphasis on exchanging program material, rather than complete programs, as in the past.

2. Establishment of a pool of information of all kinds on which the various Commonwealth countries may draw for their school broadcasts, with the BBC as the focal point.

3. Extension of the BBC transcription service for schools to make it a Commonwealth service, to which the other countries would be able to contribute.

4. Full recognition of the importance of education by radio particularly in areas where illiteracy is high and where teachers and equipment are in short supply, and special measures to assist these areas.

5. More direct liaison between school broadcasting officials of the various countries, as well as between producers and script-writers, to ensure successful and efficient exchange of school broadcasts and school-broadcasting material.

In Paris, at the Radio Division of UNESCO, Mr. Lambert discussed the supply of information about United Nations agencies for inclusion in Canadian school broadcasts. Gordon Fraser, head of the division, is expected to visit Canada fairly soon to carry these conversations a stage further.

developed a hobby to which he was passionately attached—exploring England's canals with Peter Scott, son of Scott of the Antarctic and an explorer in his own right.

As he left England, he says, he knew the visit would be no hurried affair. His wife, Sydney Sturgess, was "almost" a Canadian—her mother was born in Vancouver and her Canadian ancestry goes back to Edward Palmer, a Father of Confederation; and there were many relatives-in-law to visit.

A little over a year later, Morse says: "I have concluded that an actor's success is relative. I like Canada for many reasons, not the least being the new adventure I have found in the theatre here. There is a tremendous appetite for stage plays, especially among the younger generation. In the long run I think I shall get more satisfaction out of contributing, even in a small way, to the building of Canadian theatre tradition than in remaining in England's staunchly established one. I'm seriously thinking of staying."

He appeared on the Montreal stage almost the moment he arrived. He was asked to play leading roles last summer at the Mountain Playhouse. No stage series in Montreal has ever been more successful and he and his wife were starring there again this summer, with the house sold out for the entire season. In the meantime, CBC producer Rupert Caplan was giving the

BBC veteran some of the best radio roles, and Morse's acting began to take root in Canada. In 11 months he was heard on 218 broadcasts.

Listeners may find a familiar ring in his voice. He was the creator of the role of the BBC's most famous detective, Paul Temple, whose adventures

are well known in this country through the BBC transcription Service.

Morse's first London stage play was *The First Mrs. Fraser*, which starred Dame Marie Tempest and A. E. Matthews and ran for nine months. Others were: *Crisis in Heaven* with Esmond Knight, *There Shall Be No Night* with Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne, *Bullet in the Ballet* with

Leonide Massine as the principal dancer. In several his director was John Gielgud. He has played in about 15 films. In his first, *Thunder Rock*, another young actor, James Mason, made one of his initial movie performances. In *The Man Is Mine* he played opposite Glynis Johns. At the BBC, Morse played the title role in the first full-length radio presentation of *Hamlet*, a Val Gielgud production which took four hours. Also under Val Gielgud, he acted regularly in the BBC play series *The World Theatre*.

Morse has an easy tongue in any discussion, but make a reference to his second love, the canals of England, and he is really off. "Still another of England's worlds was opened up to me when I became associated with the Inland Waterways Association headed by Peter Scott and A. P. Herbert. The idea of the Association is to engender interest in the canals of England, built in the 18th century as a means of commercial transportation. They fell into disuse with the coming of the railways and have lain in various stages of decay ever since. But they are still beautiful. They were designed by England's best architects and with the most marvellous system of locks. Some of them go through what are now completely out-of-the-way corners of England."

Canned Professors.—Well-intentioned if somewhat disrespectful students at Copenhagen University are asking for more of what they call "canned professors." By this they mean tape recordings of lectures given by prominent guest speakers. This system makes outstanding lectures available to a greater number of students than would otherwise be able to hear them. —UNESCO World Review.

Josh White is one of the small band of artists who breaks through the artificial barrier between "highbrow" and "lowbrow" music. Born in Greenville, S.C., son of a poor Methodist preacher, while still a child he earned money leading blind singers who wandered across the southern states—Blind Blake, Blind Lemon Jefferson, Blind Joe Taggard, and others. Serving an apprenticeship with some of the most famous street singers of the time, he learned his songs and developed a remarkable guitar technique. He is among the most sought-after negro artists in the United States today—a man with a sincere, intellectual approach to his work. Much of his success in England was due to recordings of folksongs like Molly Malone and The Foggy Dew, but his best work is in the songs of his own country, of which he has collected more than 500.

Wilfred Pickles' homely Yorkshire tones are known widely in England—the BBC's popularity poll of 1948 gave him an all-time record of 56 per cent, representing an audience of about 17,500,000 for every live broadcast. He is best known as the host of the BBC's popular variety show, Have a Go!, but he is also an actor, a man with a social conscience, and a lover of poetry, which he thinks should be part of the average man's life and no preserve for the "arty." He is a Masefield gold medalist in verse-speaking, and recently did a series for the BBC in which he presented various people reading selected poems, "to encourage the man in the street to make poetic discoveries for himself."

Matter of Time.

I have just finished listening to the third broadcast of the Couchiching Conference and I wish to express my appreciation of programs of this high calibre. I should like to see "Citizens' Forum" run on this principle, during the winter season.

While I am writing, I wish to suggest that the script in the program "At Home With the Lennicks," which is pure drivel, be dropped and the records be played for the full half-hour period.—J. L. McMurtrie, Winnipeg.

Religious Broadcasts.

I have been instructed by the Manitoba Conference of the United Church of Canada to inform you that at its recent Conference a resolution was passed thanking you and expressing our appreciation for the free time granted over your station for Religious Broadcasting. It is my pleasure to write you to this effect.—D. B. Sparling, Secretary Manitoba Conference.

Philosophy and the People.

I have listened with considerable interest to the series of discussions broadcast from the Couchiching Conference. On Friday evening, however, I was shocked by the incompetence displayed by Professors Carpenter, Lynch and Frye in conducting a philosophical discussion on the topic: What are the human values we wish to defend?

Their argument was so confused that at question time members of the audience asked them what they were talking about. The pathetic attempts of the panel to answer this question made me at least feel acutely embarrassed. My embarrassment, however, changed to indignation when the speakers, in effect, asserted that their discussion was carried on at an intellectual level above that of their audience. If this were true then Professors Carpenter, Lynch and Frye were guilty of a flagrant act of discourtesy towards their listeners.

However, as a professional philosopher I am able to deny that this was the case. The panel of speakers could not be understood by their audience because they themselves were unutterably confused and literally did not know what they were talking about.

The aspect of the matter that concerns me most is the probability that many listeners thought that the nonsense uttered by the speakers was philosophy, and that they then drew

their own conclusion concerning the value of philosophy. I would like to assure these listeners that one of the chief purposes of philosophy is clarification (not confusion) and that a properly conducted discussion by competent philosophers could have been intelligible, enlightening, and even enjoyable.

Finally, I would like to urge the speakers concerned, in the interests of philosophy and their own reputations, to refrain from public discussion of matters about which they are obviously incapable of thinking clearly.—Anthony M. Mardiros, Associate Professor of Philosophy, University of Alberta.

Saskatoon's Cobalt Bomb.

On last night's CBC News Roundup one of the reporters made reference to the Cobalt Bomb, stating the first one had been established at London, Ont., one was ready for export to the United States, etc.

I would like to personally take issue with this statement. Saskatoon has the first Cobalt Bomb used and has had it in operation a considerable time longer than that recently installed in London. At the Movies
with CLYDE GILMOUR

At this time of year, many a customer demands an exclusive diet of what is loosely known as "light summer entertainment." I'm afraid that quite a few of the films produced to satisfy this craving are pretty tiresome specimens, but just lately I have seen at least two brisk air-conditioned comedies which I would like to commend to your attention in case you haven't seen them already.

One of these is *The Pride of St. Louis*, in which the versatile Dan Dailey amiably impersonates that number-one hillbilly of big-league baseball, "Dizzy" Dean. The story traces Dean's multiple career as farm-boy, pitcher, odd-job man, husband, sports commentator, and miscellaneous screwball, and to the best of my knowledge the incidents in the film stick a good deal closer to the facts than we usually find in screen biographies of living persons. Joanne Dru is both decorative and persuasive as Ol' Diz's loyal, but hot-tempered, wife.

There is hardly ever enough baseball in these baseball movies to satisfy me, and this deficiency is visible also in the case of *The Pride of St. Louis*. Dan Dailey is a bit more at home on the dance-floor than on the diamond, but he gets by quite comfortably in his few real action shots as the redoubtable "Dizzy," and the story as a whole has a breezy air which makes it, I think, well worth your casual attention.

That same recommendation be given with even more enthusiasm to another Hollywood sports comedy called *Pat and Mike*. In fact it strikes me as being one of the most delightful events of the entire celluloid season. The "Mike" of the title is a wily New York east-side sports promoter, played by Spencer Tracy. The "Pat" who goes in with him is a sensational all-round lady athlete, played by Katharine Hepburn. The adventures and the slowly-ripening mutual esteem shared by these formidable characters are often very funny stuff in this story by Ruth Gordon and Garson Kanin, the authors of *Born Yesterday*. Moreover, director George Cukor once again satisfactorily proves that Hollywood, when it really tries, can turn out a comedy which is hilarious without insulting your normal adult curiosity and intelligence.

Use Of Radio In Schools Growing

9,817 Free Receiving Licenses Issued In 1951

THERE are four "R's" in Canadian schools nowadays—readin', 'ritin', 'rithmetic, and radio—and the last of these seems to be gaining in popularity with the students. In fact, there are indications that radio receiving sets are fast becoming as much a part of school room accessories as blackboards.

From statistics supplied by the Telecommunications Division of the Department of Transport in Ottawa and the Provincial Departments of Education in the ten provinces, the CBC School Broadcast Department has compiled information dealing with the distribution of radios in Canadian schools. These figures reveal that there were 9,817 free radio receiving set licenses issued to English-speaking schools last year—an increase of 18.9 per cent over the year before. Free licenses have been presented to 43.25 per cent of the English-speaking schools in Canada. However, schools not receiving a provincial grant must purchase their license. A great many do, and in view of this fact it is quite likely that over 50 per cent of Canadian English-speaking schools are equipped with radios. This figure compares favourably with those of other countries.

The CBC works closely with various educational bodies and provincial departments of education. National School Broadcasts are planned upon the recommendation of the National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting. The preparation of a school

broadcast of this type takes two years, with producer, writer and teacher-advisor working closely together on the final script. Some scripts are written as many as four times before the program is ready to be aired. In the presentation of the broadcast the finest acting and musical talent available is utilized. Costs of originating a school broadcast for provincial distribution are shared—the province pays for the talent and the CBC provides the broadcast facilities.

Busman's Holiday

Edith Fowke (who plans *Folk Song Time* and *A Man and a Maid*) is taking a busman's holiday this summer. She and her husband are currently up to the ears in old folk songs in the library of Congress in Washington, searching out new material for future shows.

Recently she featured mining songs on the program, and there was a rush of enthusiastic mail from miners and their friends and families, asking where they could get the records or the words. From Nordegg, Alberta, a man wrote to say he liked *20 Tons of Coal and Down, Down, Down*. "The reason I am interested in these particular songs," he said, "is that this is a coal-mining town, and I am proprietor of a confectionery and restaurant where I operate a juke box. I am sure the young miners of our town would get quite a laugh from the above records." One of Mrs. Fowke's most enthusiastic listeners is Helen Creighton, the Nova Scotia folk song collector. Lately she wrote Mrs. Fowke to say she had bought a battery radio set, so she wouldn't have to race through country lanes to get back to wherever she was staying in time for *Folk Song Time*. Now she can listen in a hayfield, by the side of the road, or in a house where she is recording the songs of some old-timer. A couple of weeks ago she was recording with 87-year-old Nathan Hatt, who had nearly finished singing his 72nd song when Miss Creighton plugged in on *Folk Song Time*, and his eyes lit up with pleasure. Afterwards he sang his own versions of some of the songs on the program. She has recorded well over 100 songs this summer, half of them new to her.
