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TO many listeners, the voice of J. Frank Willis has been known longer than any other on national radio. For more than twenty years he has been broadcasting to Canadians, in a great variety of programs. His reporting of the Moose River mine disaster in 1936 was an extraordinary event which gave people in all parts of North America a new understanding of the possibilities of radio. His was the voice that reported the opening of the Alaska Highway, and some of the most vivid commentaries on the Royal Visit of 1939 were also his. Frank is a Maritimer, and the sea is in his blood. For years thousands of late evening listeners waited eagerly for his *Atlantic Nocturne*, a deep, resonant voice reading poetry, often of the sea, with a quiet background of organ music. Special events have been Frank's major concern for a number of years, but he has also produced a number of important Wednesday Night features. A native of Halifax, he now lives in Toronto. On several occasions he joined the crew of the famous *Bluenose* on trips to the Grand Banks, and he was with the *SS. Nascopie* on a voyage to the Canadian Arctic. On the *Nascopie* he set new records with daily test broadcasts from far northern points. Frank is a graduate of King's College School, Windsor, N.S., and spent four years on an art scholarship in New York.



Coronation Bells

EARLY on the morning of Coronation Day Harold Pitstow and his colleagues will climb the winding staircase to the ringing chamber in

Westminster Abbey's North-West Tower, and there they will wait until the evening. Bells will ring all over the British Commonwealth—many from Canada's Prairie Provinces—on the day Her Majesty is crowned, but Pitstow will be responsible for the most important peal of all, which will be rung at the actual moment of the Coronation, and CBC listeners will be able to hear it. Pitstow will conduct the ringers in the Abbey's Coronation Peal

as he did at the Coronation of George VI, and as far as he knows the arrangements will be the same as last time. An officer stationed near the Coronation Chair will tell the ringers by telephone when the Queen has been crowned, and the bells will be rung for two minutes. They will not be rung in changes but will be "fired," or rung so that they sound as one bell, the ringers' Royal Salute. After this they will be (Please turn to page 4)

ASK THE WEATHERMAN. Talks on the weather by R. A. Hornstein of the Dominion Public Weather Office, Halifax. A large number of requests for a discussion on the relationship between the moon and weather will

be taken care of today. Mr. Hornstein will trace briefly the history of the superstitions through Confucius, Theophrastus, Virgil, Pliny, and Francis Bacon. Then he'll focus attention on the belief that the tilt of the moon indicates forthcoming fine or foul weather.

THRONE AND PEOPLE. King George V is the subject of this third broadcast in the BBC series dealing with constitutional and personal changes in relationships of throne and people in the Commonwealth since 1837. The script is by Compton Mackenzie. It is a record of faith, endurance, devotion, courage and compassion. Beginning with the King's wish to do for the Commonwealth what his father had done for the peace of Europe, it shows how from the beginning of his reign he faced disappointment after disappointment, tumult at home and aggression abroad, culminating in the first great war. The program ends with the beloved king, who at his silver jubilee some months earlier had been surprised by the warmth and affection in which his people had come to hold him, too weak almost to sign the order setting up a Council of State, but fighting to carry out his duty to the last hours of his life.

Summary of Broadcast of May 3, 1953.

Making a Lawn

- 1. The size—no bigger than can be cared for comfortably without family drudgery.
2. Area of lawns can be reduced by enlarging shrubberies and flower beds, if necessary.
3. Soil for the lawn—8-10 inches enriched loam.
4. Preparation of the soil is best spread over at least a year so rotted manure can be incorporated and the soil well settled.
5. For a firm seed-bed free from pockets of loose soil rake and roll alternately until surface firmly uniform.
6. Kind of grass seed—depends on locality, water supply, likes of the gardener, etc. Kentucky Blue is the popular lawn grass in the prairie region and the base for many commercial mixtures.
7. Time to sow—the last week of May or first week of June.
8. Rate of seeding—depends on variety used and local conditions. For Kentucky Blue, one pound to 150-200 sq. ft. Use new crop seed.
9. Depth of seeding—depends on water supply, variety of grass, etc. Kentucky Blue should be sown not over one inch deep.
10. Seeding—Broadcast seed evenly and rake in. Then roll and water with fine spray. If possible keep surface moist for ten days.
11. First mowing—when grass two to three inches high.

AS the series drew to the close of its 14th year, ten young Winnipeg musicians received \$50 scholarships on Saturday, April 25, from the sponsor of the Eaton Good Deed Club, heard regularly on CBW at 10:30 a.m. on Saturdays. Presentations were made by John Bruce, Berythe Birse and Chester Duncan were the adjudicators.

No program gives more pleasure to CBW's hardworking staffs than this. Each Saturday morning through the winter season crowds of young pixies haunt CBW's corridors. Ordinary drab routine is suspended, and youthful high spirits take over. Normally about 150 youngsters visit the studios each Saturday, and about 12 participate in the program. The busy choral conductor is Cora James, and Harold Green, always patient and unruffled, accompanies the young musicians. Talent is chosen and general arrangements made by Joan Sherman of the Eaton staff. Alfred Parr of CBC is the producer, and Bob Willson the CBC announcer.

The Club offers nine scholarships each year—junior and senior in four

classes, vocal, violin, accordion, and piano—and one for elocution. A total of 120 competed this year. Winners in past years have been Donna Grescoe, violinist, and Ted Komar, well-known accordionist.

His book, designed as the first half of a two-volume biography, shows another way. Tweed is a member of the Champlain Society, and has done a good deal of research in Canadiana.



Manitoba Election

Party Representatives Allocate Free Network Time

REPRESENTATIVES of the principal political parties taking part in the Manitoba election, 1953, met at the offices of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation on Wednesday, April 29, to discuss the allocation of free network time as provided by the CBC regulations governing Political and Controversial Broadcasting.

Parties qualifying for CBC free time and represented at the meeting were:

- Liberal—Hon. R. D. Turner, provincial treasurer; Hon. W. C. Miller, minister of education. Progressive Conservative—Mr. Errick Willis. C.C.F.—Mr. Lloyd Stinson. Social Credit—Rev. H. W. Regal, Mr. T. Hunter. Attending on behalf of the CBC were J. N. Mogridge, Station Manager, CBW; Miss C. C. MacIver and David Walker, CBC Talks Department; and R. J. Kerr, CBC Broadcast Regulations Division, Toronto.

It was explained that an invitation had been sent to the Labour Progressive Party. This party advised that it was placing only one candidate in the field and therefore would not qualify under the "White Paper" policy governing free time series broadcasts.

Principles and policies governing provincial election campaigns were reviewed. Representatives were advised that if on Nomination Day any party did not have at least 15 candidates nominated—one for every four constituencies—regulations would require cancellation of their remaining free time broadcasts.

The parties agreed on equal distribution of the CBC Dominion network periods, and that broadcast time on Trans-Canada network would be split evenly with three 15-minute periods for each party, with a draw for the two extra 15-minute periods and equal distribution on the final night. The Liberal and Social Credit parties won

CBC policies and rulings concerning political and controversial broad-

casting in Provincial General Elections, as contained in a "White Paper" issued by the Board of Governors, and revised to May, 1948, are in part as follows:

"For the purposes of broadcasting arrangements, the campaign will be held to begin on the date of dissolution of the legislature, or, if the date of polling is announced before dissolution, on a day to be determined by the Corporation, but not later than the date of dissolution.

"The privilege of free network time for political broadcasting will be granted to bona fide parties which are provincial in extent and which reflect a substantial body of opinion throughout the province. While it is impossible to lay down an exact definition it is suggested that such a party would meet all of the following requirements:

- (1) Have policies on a wide range of provincial issues.
(2) Have a recognized provincial leader.
(3) Have a province-wide organization established as a result of a provincial conference or convention.
(4) Put into the field at least one candidate for every four constituencies.

"A designated amount of free time will be made available by the CBC on a provincial network in the province concerned to participating parties. The division of such time will be mutually agreed upon by the parties involved.

"Subsidiary hookups of privately-owned stations within the province concerned may be purchased by participating parties. Such hook-ups will be arranged by and through the Corporation in its capacity as the network authority. No subsidiary hook-ups will be authorized during a period for which a provincial free political broadcast is scheduled, and stations carrying the free network broadcasts must maintain one quarter-hour immediately preceding and following such broadcasts free of political broadcasting.
