Hit Parade

THE taste of Canadians is not always the same as that of their American neighbours when it comes to popular music. Even though most of the "hit parade" tunes are written in the United States, many of them enjoy more or less popularity here than in the U.S.—and for a variety of reasons.

The appeal of movies released in different Canadian cities at different times, the local preferences for certain types of "pop" music, and other factors have a great deal to do with the positioning of current songs on the Canadian hit parade.

Rehearsing for the Hit Parade

Every Saturday night at 9:00 p.m. CDT, 8:00 p.m. MDT, 7:00 p.m. MST, CBC Trans-Canada carries a program which tries to present a truly Canadian selection of popular tunes, and the selection is made after compiling weekly reports from various points across the country.

"We have reports coming in from Montreal, St. John's, Halifax, Winnipeg, Edmonton, and Vancouver," says Norman Hollingshead, the show's producer. "Our information tells us how the top ten tunes stand in each location according to

record sales, radio presentation, and other factors. Lists of the records most in demand at department stores across the country are made available to us. We also take a look at American ratings for comparison. We have found that about half of our final top ten tunes are in the same position as those on the hit parade published in Billboard Magazine."

Hollingshead had quite a problem figuring how to introduce hit parade numbers. After considerable thought he wound (Please turn to page 4)

WHENEVER the date for a provincial or federal election is announced, the CBC puts into motion procedures to enable representatives of all recognized political parties to speak to the widespread radio audience irrespective of their capacity to buy broadcasting time. Parties may also purchase time on individual private stations and on groups of private stations. But so far as CBC stations are concerned, their time is not for sale for political broadcasts; instead the CBC stations and private stations affiliated by network with them carry a certain number of political talks without charge to the parties concerned, which divide the time made available among themselves on a mutually agreeable basis.

For a federal general election the practise in recent years has been to

allot a total of about 14 hours of network time on the Trans-Canada and Dominion networks; an equal amount of time is allotted on the French network. (For provincial elections a total of about six hours is usually allotted.) The time is divided into 15 or 30-minute broadcasts, which are scheduled over a period of about six weeks ending two days before election day.



Using the power given to it by the Canadian Broadcasting Act (1936), the CBC assumes responsibility for network political broadcasting at election time, as a function of public service radio. As soon as the date of the election is announced, the CBC sends to each radio station and advertising agency a paper titled "Guiding Principles and Policies for Information of Broadcasters, Speakers and Agencies." This paper covers the following points:

1. Facilities available for political broadcasts:

A CBC national network (in the case of a general election) on which a designated amount of free time will be made available, the division of time to be mutually agreed upon by the parties involved; subsidiary hook-ups of privately-owned stations, on a commercial basis; and individual privately-owned stations, on a commercial basis.

2. Facilities not available for political broadcasts:

CBC-owned and operated stations are not available for subsidiary hook-

ups or individual-station broadcasts; privately-owned stations affiliated with CBC networks will not be available for purchase during periods the CBC has reserved for the broadcasting of network programs.

3. Subsidiary Hook-ups:

4. Individual Station Broadcasts:

(Procedure for applying).

5. Free Network Broadcasts:

All stations will be notified of the free network broadcasts agreed upon at a meeting with representatives of the parties. This meeting will be called within a few days of the announcement of the election date. Representatives of the CBC explain to representatives of the qualifying parties the regulations governing political broadcasts and tell them the total amount of network time the CBC proposes to make available. The party representatives are then left to determine among themselves a suitable division of the time. (Sometimes they decide to divide it equally among parties regardless of size; sometimes the time is divided according to the relative strengths of the various parties in the last house.)

6. CBC Reserved Time:

To ensure good listening times and good distribution geographically, the CBC places political broadcasts only in periods which it customarily reserves on private stations for CBC sustaining programs.

7. Overtime:

No speaker in a network political broadcasts may be allowed to run overtime. If necessary he will be interrupted at the end of the period.

8. Dramatized Political Broadcasts:

The material must be strictly political addresses and announcements. Any

TRANS-CANADA MATINEE.

Today: What's New in World Health—Edna May; Bachelor Dinners—Main Course; Zero to Six—Out to Tea—Mary Hill, Vancouver; News Commentary—Isabel Wilson, Toronto; Songs—Denis Drouin, Montreal.

This afternoon *Trans-Canada Matinee* begins a new series in which bachelors and "summer bachelors" come to the microphone to swap recipes and cooking hints. The first program will come from Vancouver, and the subject will be the main course of the meal. Participants will include: Marce Munro of the CBC staff, who will be chairman; Jean de Rimanczy, concert master of the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra; and Mario Prizek, a graphic artist. Each will describe a main-course dish that has established his local fame as an amateur cook. Other topics in the series will be seasonal salads, discussed by an Ottawa bachelor group; desserts, night snacks, out-door cooking, cooking up North, and "from soup to nuts."

Toronto reporter Larry Henderson and his wife, Joan, who are wandering through Europe with a tape recorder and sending back to the CBC sound pictures of people, places and events, will take listeners to Italy tonight. The program starts off with a visit to St. Peter's Church in Rome on Easter Sunday, followed by Henderson's description of his audience with the Pope. Then we go to the Piazza Colonna in Rome, where most of the political philosophies of

our time are publicly debated every night; and after that the Hendersons show us the new land reform in operation. Then at the Teatro dell Opera in Rome, Henderson interviews Maestro Vincenzo, opera star Ferruccio Tagliavini, who was just back from singing at the Metropolitan Opera in New York, and Elena Rizzieri, a young soprano.

In keeping with the outdoor summer atmosphere, the music is usually chosen from the lighter classics.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of June 21, 1953.

Chiefly about Iris

1. *Four groups of iris* have been widely expanded by plant breeders, the German Bearded, the Japanese, the Siberian and the English and European Bulbous types.

2. *The Siberian grassy iris* are hardy on the prairies. Three good varieties developed at the C.E.F., Ottawa, are: Catineau, Madawaska and Rideau.

3. *The only Japanese iris* proved hardy in the prairies is the Manchurian form introduced by Dr. F. L. Skinner.

4. *The bulbous iris* are useful for greenhouse forcing but are not hardy outdoors in this region.

5. *German bearded iris* have been hybridized to include blue, white, red, pink, tan and a host of colour combinations.

6. *Modern varieties of bearded iris* need further testing in the prairie region to prove their suitability, and it is highly desirable for gardeners to co-operate in this testing program.

7. *The time to plant bearded iris* is during July. Provide good drainage.

8. *Clumps of bearded iris* should be broken up, cleared of disease, and re-set every three or four years. Young vigorous plants bloom best and are less subject to disease.

9. *Join the Canadian Iris Society.*

10. *Amateurs should gain experience* growing a few iris before embarking on heavy planting programs.

device which might be considered theatrical is prohibited. Political inter-

views and question-and-answer programs, for example, have been deemed out of order.

9. Identification of Political Broadcasts:

The speaker and his or her party will be identified before and after each broadcast.

10. General:

Political broadcasts on any federal, provincial or municipal election day, and on the two days immediately preceding such a day, are prohibited. This applies to news items of a political nature until polls are closed. Un-sponsored, non-partisan announcements exhorting people to vote are admissible.

Candidates are permitted to broadcast after the polls have closed.

The broadcasting set-up in connection with the forthcoming federal election will follow this same pattern, which has been used successfully many times in the past—notably during the last year in provincial elections in all provinces except Ontario, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. As soon as the election date has been announced the wheels will turn; the actual free-time broadcasts may start as early as ten days later. An allocation of 14 hours of network time might mean a total of 56 quarter-hour broadcasts, or a little more than nine a week for a period of six weeks.

The requirements a political party must meet to be eligible for federal free-time network broadcasts are as follows: A party must have policies on a wide range of national issues; have a recognized national leader; have a nation-wide organization established as the result of a national conference or convention; and seek the election of candidates in at least three of the provinces and put into the field a minimum of approximately one candidate for every four constituencies.

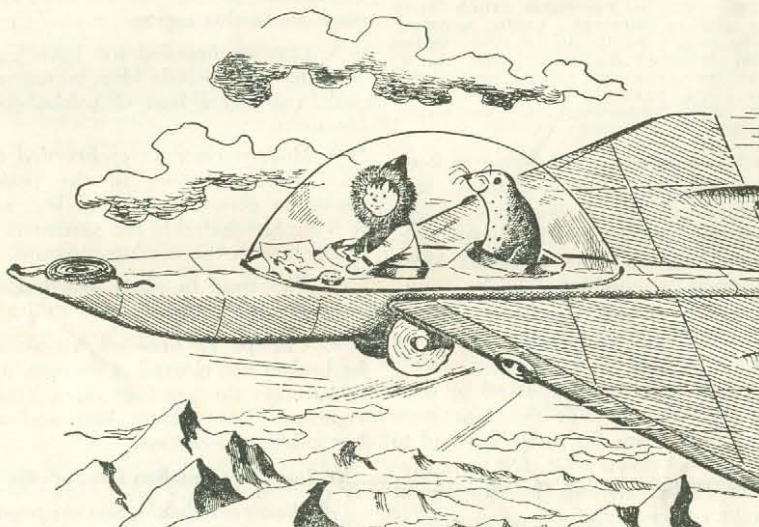
