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A Busy Musician

DONALD LEGGAT, who will conduct a performance of Sir Arthur Bliss' *Pastoral (Lie Strewn the White Flocks)* on CBC Wednesday Night this week, is the permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Philharmonic Choir, the Winnipeg Male Voice Choir, and the Winnipeg Boys' Choir. As such, he inherits a great tradition. A succession of brilliant young Englishmen (Mr. Leggat is a Scot from Invernesshire) have occupied this position, and have made Winnipeg choral music famous throughout Canada and abroad. Some of Mr. Leggat's predecessors have been Hugh Ross, now head of the Scola Cantorum of New York, Douglas Clarke of Montreal, Bernard Naylor, and James Robertson, now a musical director of the Sadler's Wells Opera Company.

Mr. Leggat, an associate of the Royal College of Music, came to Winnipeg from England last September, fresh from engagements at the Edinburgh Festival and at the Canterbury Festival of Music and Drama. He had been also on the staff of the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain, a very important publicly-supported institution for the training of young musicians from 13 to 19 years, who meet and live in communities three times a year during the summer holidays. In



this institution, Mr. Leggat's work was chiefly administrative, and in his new post he has had an opportunity to apply some of this knowledge and experience.

One of Mr. Leggat's most vivid recollections of his work in England was a performance of incidental music for a pageant of the life of St. Augustine, *Enduring Stones*, by Edward Percy. This was presented outdoors, in the cloisters of Canterbury Cathedral, surrounded by the very

"enduring stones" of which the author wrote. The grass quadrangle of the cloisters, and the glaucous or terrace, were floodlit, and the music amplified for the large audience.

Mr. Leggat studied organ and piano, theory, composition, and conducting at the Royal College, and spent much time listening to performances by England's greatest conductors. He was for some time a special commissioner for the Royal School of Church Music, an (Please turn to page 2)

Canada's welcome to the athletes who will be coming in July to compete in the British Empire Games at Vancouver will be heard in a one-hour broadcast previewing the 1954 Games and including a message of welcome from the Governor-General. Transcriptions have been sent to radio stations and networks in all Commonwealth countries participating. A feature of the broadcast will be voice-messages from many outstanding Commonwealth athletes, including Roger Bannister who on May 6 achieved one of the greatest feats in track history by running a mile in less than four minutes. The broadcast will also bring a valedictory on the Fourth British Empire Games which were held in Auckland, New Zealand, in 1950; an address by Sir Arthur Porritt, chairman of the British Empire and Commonwealth Games Federation; and the first performance of a fanfare specially composed for the Games by Howard Cable. The fanfare will be the theme-music of the Games, and will often be heard during the next two months and at the Games. Thom Benson has arranged and will narrate the program, which will be produced by J. Frank Willis.

advisory position in which he travelled throughout the country assisting choirmasters and choirs in Anglican churches in the performance of difficult oratorios, or in their general routine.

In Winnipeg, Mr. Leggat believes his position is unique and uniquely favourable. With a boys' choir and two adult choirs under the same conductor, he feels that the opportunity for long term development is excellent. The Winnipeg Boys' Choir he regards as a first class organization, capable of big things, and it will also provide recruits in years to come for the Male Voice and Philharmonic Choirs. Prospects for the maintenance of the great Winnipeg tradition of choral music he thinks, are good.

Valuable Idleness.—It took me nearly twenty years of my adult life to learn the value to mind and body of daily periods of doing nothing. Twenty years is quite a time; particularly if we consider that excessive "busy-ness" can, and quite often does, lead to catastrophe; to nervous irritability and all that may follow.—Gwenda Hollander, on BBC.

A portrait of Saskatchewan, script and production by Michael Hind-Smith of CBC Winnipeg, opens this program's 1954 series; voices and stories of ten Saskatchewan residents, including a wheat farmer, a petroleum engineer, an Indian trapper, a housewife, and a prospector.

Dominion Magazine is designed to present magazine-type features describing life in Canada. This year it centres on Canadian provinces, starting with Saskatchewan. Each program will be produced in the province concerned, and may include commentaries on the province's political affairs, human interest features, or actuality or humorous items. Saskatchewan has an area of more than 250,000 square miles, and a population of more than 850,000. It breaks down into three economic divisions - wheat on the southern plains, wheat and oil in the central section around Saskatoon, and prospecting, lumbering, fishing, trapping and mining in the northland fanning out from the gateway city of Prince Albert. Dilworth To Address Humanities Meeting

It brings together teachers of the humanities and laymen interested in the humanities, including former teachers. It meets annually at the same time as other learned societies which this year are convening in Winnipeg.

The Prairie Gardener

Summary of Broadcast of May 16, 1954

Setting Out Plants:

(1) *Moving plants* involves a major operation. For normal growth the roots and tops of plants are nicely balanced. Transplanting destroys much of the root system and creates temporary unbalance.

(2) *The main safeguards* in transplanting are:

(a) *Prepare plants* for moving by "hardening" well in advance, and watering a few hours previous to the operation.

(b) *Set plants firmly* in contact with moist soil so roots can go to work as quickly as possible.

(c) *Prune top growth* if necessary to restore some measure of balance between intake and outgo of water.

(d) *Shade plants* in hot dry weather for a day or two.

(3) *In buying plants* to set out, look for:

(a) *Young vigorous plants* rather than big old ones.

(b) *Bushy dwarf plants* rather than leggy ones.

(c) *Plants well spaced* and not overcrowded in box.

(d) *Plants ready to bloom* rather than plants already flowering.

(e) *Plants under variety name.* Know the pedigree of the plants you buy.

(f) *Buy plants from experienced growers* who can give you the best advice.

TALK ON DORSET. Arthur Bush, English broadcaster, will describe the Dorset countryside, as preliminary to tonight's play. Dorset is a county of chalk hills, many Roman and early English ruins, fertile valleys, dairies,

and the famous quarries which produce Portland stone and marble.

SIX MEN OF DORSET.

Six Men of Dorset, drama by Miles Malleson and H. Brooks; radio adaptation by Margot Lassner and John Carter; Esse Ljungh, producer; from Toronto.

In 1831, with the Industrial Revolution in full march, men in Dorset as well as other English counties got seven shillings a week for field and farm work and had nothing from the harvest; men, women, and children were herded into spinning mills and locked there for 14 hours a day—three shillings a week; children were beaten into wakefulness by foremen. When in desperation the people revolted, hundreds were sentenced to death and hundreds more deported. Strangely, it was a prosperous England in which these things happened, a country no longer at war, though in a state of economic change and political unrest—the rich richer than ever, the poor poorer. Among the poorest were the village labourers of Tolpuddle, in Dorset. The play tells of their attempt to improve their living standard by lawful means, legal since recent legislation permitting labour unions. George Loveless, chief among them, works in a rich farmer's fields for starvation wages, and to keep his pregnant wife, Betsy, and her three children, has to toil all week over stones in a quarry. He is a good man, a lay preacher drawing cold comfort from the bible. Spurred to action by his wife, he forms a secret branch of a labour union. They are betrayed, and a gentry-laden court, on the strength of an archaic law forbidding secret oaths, sentences the six members to imprisonment in Australia. But working England rose to their support, and throughout the country they became known as "the Tolpuddle martyrs." The play deals

with this early battle to win rights for working men.

Five of the original "six men of Dorset" whose story is told tonight emigrated to Canada after the events of the play, and settled in and around the London, Ont. district. Fred Landon, former newspaperman and vice-president of the University of Western Ontario, tells their story.

WINNIPEG PHILHARMONIC CHOIR.

Pastoral (Lie Strewn the White Flocks), by Sir Arthur Bliss. Winnipeg Philharmonic Choir and CBC Orchestra conducted by Donald Leggat; Gladys Whitehead, soprano; Dirk Keetbaas, flutist; Norman Lucas, producer; from Winnipeg.

This work by the present Master of the Queen's Music, dedicated to Edward Elgar, was first performed in London in 1929. It is a setting of seven short poems by various authors, generally in the pastoral Virgil-Theocritus vein, and while the work attains unity through the composer's steady consistency of mood throughout, each poem, like each movement of a symphony, has its own individuality. The verses are: *The Shepherd's Holyday*, by Ben Jonson (1573-1637); *A Hymn to Pan*, John Fletcher (1579-1625); *Pan and Echo*, by Angelo Poliziano (1454-1494), translation by Geoffrey Dunlop; *The Naiads' Music*, *The Pigeon Song*, and *The Shepherd's Night Song*, by Robert Nichols (1893-1944); *The Song of the Reapers*, by Theocritus (3rd century B.C.), translation by Andrew Lang; and *Shepherds All and Maidens Fair*, by Fletcher. The mood runs through the shepherd's day, from Jonson's Pan, whose "morn now riseth and invites to sports, to dances, and delights," to Fletcher's "So farewell; Thus I end my evening's knell." Sir Arthur Bliss was

born in London in 1891, and studied at Cambridge and at the Royal College of Music under Stanford and Vaughan Williams. He lived for a time in California. Some of his works have been the music for H. G. Wells' film, *Things to Come*, and *Checkmate*, a ballet. He was BBC Musical Director from 1941 to 1944. The office of Master of the Queen's Music, which he now holds, has existed since 1626, when Charles I conferred the title on Nicholas Lanier. Others who have held it are Maurice Greene, William Boyce, John Stanley, Walter Parrett, Sir Edward Elgar, Sir Walford Davies, and Sir Arnold Bax. Donald Leggat (see article, page 1) is the regular conductor of the Winnipeg Philharmonic Choir, the Winnipeg Male Voice Choir, and the Winnipeg Boys' Choir.

The Art of Suggestion

(By PAUL LEGENDRE of CBC Montreal)

AFTER much groping and patient searching radio has opened up a new medium for theatrical expression, substituting for visual decor a "decor" or atmosphere of sound. And even if it has not been able to escape completely the laws of ordinary theatre, still it has formed its own rules of esthetics which, as we know, oblige it to use numerous artifices—musical sequences, varied sound effects, differentiated voices, and so on.

For our part, we believe that radio drama is the art of suggestion par excellence, for here the listener's imagination, left to its creative fancy, reigns supreme. His sensitivity, sharpened in the extreme, is the sensitivity of the blind. Indeed, must he not from instinct construct his own personal decor, from his memories and dreams create his own images? In the silence of his living-room, is not his mind, calm and free from the physical distractions of the theatre, stage-settings and moving figures, more susceptible to suggestion? Moreover, in true drama, it is the word which is trump, and the decor only a secondary element.

tain exultation of our spiritual faculties, a bewitching illusion.

Again, the actor at the microphone is closer to the public; in one sense, he is in a better position to impose his presence than the actor on the stage. One of the pioneers of broadcasting in France, Pierre Shaeffer, has written on this subject: "Though deprived of a face, of the power of visual expression, of hands and of body, the voice of the man speaking at the microphone is not disembodied. On the contrary, it conveys the personality with extreme fidelity, even with indiscretion." As the microphone captures a true picture of his personality, one can readily understand that a radio actor's voice, depending on whether it is persuasive or not, can heighten or detract from the intensity or interest of the play's theme, as well as the appeal of its form.

But this voice, which exacts the intimate participation of the listener, is well able to convey faithfully all the sensations it expresses, to the extent that it reflects an authentic character. To take the place of gestures, the voice must become concentrated, all-significant. And because the microphone catches the least breath or sound-shading, amplifying them all, each phrase, each word that it delivers to the listener is capable of setting his thoughts and feelings in motion.

And is it not because of this miracle of timbres, this mysterious power of suggestion, that the drama has been able to leave the stage for the studio, and continue, though somewhat modified and curtailed, to capture the public interest?

The same leader's *Somewhere A Voice Is Calling*, with musical saw solo — which some people think is a theremin — is another top rating. George does get requests, and does fill them, but they are not mentioned on the air. If you want a particular tune, just drop him a line
