Finlay, CBC Director for the Prairie Provinces, in an address to the annual conference of the National Farm Radio Forums here June 16.

R. H. Roberts, veteran radio man of CBC Winnipeg,

will head the Saskatchewan branch as manager of the Regina studios. With him at the opening of the new studios will be R. L. Punshon, at present chief operator at CBW transmitter, Carman, Manitoba, and formerly in charge of CBK transmitter at Watrous, who will be technical supervisor at the Regina studios; and D. H. Innes, former newspaper and farm editor of Regina, newly appointed as CBC assistant farm commentator for Saskatchewan.

Working with the CBC Regina staff will be Jean Hinds, morning commentator for Saskatchewan,

who has been broadcasting from Regina since last fall.

Other appointments to the Regina staff have still to be made, Mr. Finlay said. They will include a number of technical, announcing and clerical positions. The Regina studios will be located in the Exner Building at 1840 McIntyre Street.

With the introduction of the Regina studios, CBK transmitter will be fed directly from Regina, which will also originate Saskatchewan programs going to CBC networks.

Edgar Christian, a young Englishman, starved to death early in the summer of 1927 on the barrens northeast of Great Slave Lake. A year later his body was found by a party of geologists in the lonely cabin on the Thelon River where he had died. With the body were the remains of his two companions, John Hornby and Harold Adlard. In the cabin, too, was a diary kept by Christian until he was able to write no longer-a record of the party's struggle against starvation. The central figure in the story is John Hornsby, the leader of the party.

It is an interesting coincidence that Alan King, who plays John Hornby, was at Dover College in England with Edgar Christian in the years just before the fatal expedition.



KOREAN EXPERIENCE. Journalist Phillip Deane who served in the British Navy during the Second Great War and went to Korea in 1950 as war correspondent for the London Observer, was captured and remained a prisoner in North Korea for nearly three years. In two BBC talks to be heard tonight and July 7, he will tell listeners about his experiences. Nightmare in Korea, Deane's first talk, begins with a description of the "Death March of Korea," an eight-day forced march during the winter of 1950-51. Then comes the story of hopeless waiting under almost unbearable conditions until the treatment improved. It is not a pleasant tale, and the narrator's report on prison camp conditions is sometimes needfully gruesome. In his second talk, Brainwashing and Prisoners of War, Deane analyzes Communist methods of interrogating prisoners.

Our Battered Children

Gentleness And Wonder Destroyed, Says Maritime Commentator

70 far in Canada we have avoided I very largely the sponsored children's program which is so important on American radio and television networks. Once, it seemed wise to our radio executives to spare the children the heavy barrage of high pressure advertising which will follow them for the rest of their lives. But apparently they are not to escape it after all, even for the brief interlude of childhood.

This particular program batters the children over the head with noise and hearty friendliness and screams and shouts and songs, and forces them to listen. Then it proceeds to destroy every hint of gentleness, or wonder, or imagination that a child might possess. The old and familiar stories are broken crudely to pieces and treated as vulgar jokes. The so-called characters who appear talk so rudely and so violently to each other that no child could visualize any of them with warmth or affection. The language is barbarous and the accents are worse. Even the music is not the innocent music of childhood, but popular love songs. And what I called the hearty friendliness of the program is not the real thing, but an artificial enthusiasm stimulated by much noise and excitement . . . Even the emotions of the program are false. It is a jazzed-up program that will produce an audience of jazzed-up children . . .- John Margeson, on CBC.

It Figures The Angles

A television camera with cable and monitor costs in the neighbourhood of \$25,000, but in preliminary program production you can get the same effect in lining up your "shots" and grouping your actors by using a little cardboard box that only costs about a dime to make.

It's called the Bretz Box.

This time-saver and money-saver was invented by a TV consultant in New York, Rudy Bretz. It has open-

ings cut in four sides representing the view taken by a TV camera's two-, three-, five-, or eight-inch lens in any given position.

It also serves during preliminary rehearsals to give actors an idea where the camera is likely to be during the actual production of the show . . . and saves using a real camera that might well be employed elsewhere.
