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

CBC Television Crews Film W.I.F.U. Games

The Game of the Week features complete football games on filmplay-by-play coverage by auricon camera. This week's game, to be shown Friday night on CBWT-Winnipeg, will be the B.C. Lions vs. the Winnipeg Blue Bombers. played in Winnipeg.

SPORTS coverage is one of the increasing demands of CBC-TV. The latest addition to CBWT's sports programming is the Friday night *Game of the Week* series which has been covering Western Interprovincial Football Union games on film. More than five hours each week is devoted to a variety of sporting events on CBWT. This includes actual competitions in football, wrestling and boxing, and feature presentation of such sports as tennis, golf, lacrosse and horseracing on such programs as Jack Wells' Sports Parade, or the Vic Obeck Show, Junior Sports, the quiz program Sports Scholar, or Football Huddle which includes a chalktalk by football notables like the Blue Bombers' Al Sherman on individual plays in recent football games.

IN HIS STEPS.

Religious drama, scripts by Clare Slater, Charles Israel, Gordon Meyers, Toronto; Margaret Adair, Montreal; Vida Archibaid, Winnipeg. Edited by Rev. Brian Freeland, CBC Toronto; Rupert Caplan, producer; from Mont-real. First cycle, the kingdom of David, by Charles Israel.

The series replaces the Way of the Spirit broadcasts of former years. Several cycles designed to cover an episode of biblical history will be presented. The first of these, running nine weeks, deals with the period of David's rule, about 1,000 B.C. The intention is to re-create in full colour and detail the lives of the people of that time and place. "We have chosen to show the establishment of the kingdom," the editor says, "because it is a theme which will appear in the New Testament plays later in the season. It was of the seed of David that Christ was born." The opening cycle outlines the development of the Hebrew nation under Saul, early

battles with the Philistines, and the classic story of the friendship of David and Jonathan. Threatened by Saul, David withdraws to the desert to organize a band of outlaws. He is anointed by Samuel. The death of Saul and Jonathan follows, and David, after a time, takes the throne. The tale of David and Bathsheba is told, and the final script deals with the building of the temple by Solomon.

Documentary program prepared by Ken Homer, special events reporter, CBC Hailfax, and Ross McNaughton, CBC operator, Halifax, during a flight to Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island. With a party of radio, TV, and news-

paper men, the two CBC representatives flew from Montreal to Churchill, Manitoba, in a C-119 of the R.C.A.F. Air Movement Unit. From Churchill they flew by R.C.A.F. North Star to Resolute Bay, in the Franklin District, N.W.T. Films made on the expedition will also be edited for use on the CBC TV network. The landscape north of Churchill, according to Homer, was "awe-inspiring." "It would be ideal," he said, "for a movie about earth men landing on another planet. The different colours and the bleak terrain were something quite outside my experience." Today's broadcast covers the flight to Resolute Bay. The return journey aboard the supply ship C. D. Howe will be described next week, with visits to Arctic Bay, Frobisher Bay, and Craig Harbour.

Betty Tomlinson

CBC Alberta Morning Commentator

As she had never seen a mountain, at least a tall one, she came to Alberta and she's never been sorry. The program she handles regularly was established when she came, but Miss Tomlinson has increased its audience and its scope by getting around the country and also by developing Calgary angles one week out of four.

She is left to decide her own topics. This was tough at first, for she knew neither the people nor the country. But she found that by following the news and, when interviewing, trying to get from one person what the average person would want to know, she gradually developed her own methods of operation, and as her listeners grew, their letters broadened the field.

As she had never taken a course in radio work, she developed her own style of delivery. She has never taken a voice lesson. When she is talking with someone on the air it is easy to be conversational . . . She trained herself to write informally and at a conversational pace. She thinks a course in journalism would help anyone interested in getting into her kind of work, and the best way to learn the radio business is to work first on a small station, just as working on a small newspaper is good training for journalism.

To be interviewed by Betty Tomlinson could be a frightening experience but for her friendliness and the fact that she gives her guest a confident feeling that even if he does not have a script, she at least knows what is going to happen . . .

Actually, she places the onus on herself. She has to ask questions designed to develop intelligent answers without wasting time. This is no mean feat in itself, for first you must find something interesting to talk about. A

person doesn't need to have done anything out of the ordinary to be of interest, Miss Tomlinson says. The most interesting people are those who are aware of what is going on around them, regardless of where they may be. It helps if you don't take yourself too seriously . . . As for her listenersabout evenly divided between men and women-they seem to prefer stories of people and animals.-Ken Liddell, in the Calgary Herald.

PICK THE STARS. Artists auditioned by Geoffrey Waddington, CBC director of music, and Drew Crossan, CBC producer, in a recent cross-country tour, will be heard in this series. Each program will feature four or five artists, many new to CBC-TV viewers. More than 1,500 were auditioned during the tour, and 150 of professional calibre were selected. Selected performers in this series will compete in semi-finals for a prize of \$500. There will be six semi-final prizes of \$500 each, and the six winners will then compete for one of two grand prizes of \$1,000 each. Lobsters

The lobster is red-faced after he is cooked . . . green when crawling on his watery floor . . . Live lobsters are always pegged-a little wooden plug is placed in the joints of their claws . . If they were not pegged they would cling to each other like a coil of gnarled rope, each one trying to chew the other - that is, in captivity. A strange personality is Mr. Lobster. He sheds his shell several times a year when he is young. Shedding his suit must be very painful. When he kicks himself out of his clothes he is strictly naked-poor soul-he is like a piece of jelly. In a few days he becomes very hungry-he needs energy to grow a new suit of shell-and then he will eat anything. . . . They feed on fish heads, herring, and other food. A lobster can even chew a seashell. After shedding, a lobster gains about 30 per cent in weight. The only way he can grow is by bursting his shell and growing a new one. The blood of the lobster is white. When he is in a hurry, he travels backwards instead of forwards by cupping his tail in the water. -John Fisher, on CBC.

Donald Leggat In New Record Program

Winnipeg Conductor Heard Tuesday and Thursday afternoons

The immense libraries of recorded music assembled in the course of years in the CBC and among private musiclovers, have given rise in recent months to a new interest in the possibilities of recorded broadcasts. Interpolated commentaries by learned musicians have added to the attractions of these programs, both from the educational standpoint and as pure entertainment. Examples have been the opera broadcast by Dr. Boyd Neel on Saturdays, and the programs of modern music presented by Mr. John Beckwith during the summer.

A new program of this nature, and of rather special interest, is scheduled for the west on Tuesdays and Thursdays, under the title, *Listening With Leggat*, at 4:30-3:30 p.m. The commentator is Mr. Donald Leggat, conductor of the Winnipeg Philharmonic, Winnipeg Male Voice, and Winnipeg Boys' Choirs, and former staff member of the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain.

Mr. Leggat's approach to his nottoo-easy task is broad, and is aided by his own great catholicity of taste in music. A devotee of J. S. Bach, he is also intensely interested in the latest productions of modern composers. On a visit to the British Isles this summer, he had an opportunity to see and play over the ms. score of Ralph Vaughan Williams' newest work, a Christmas Cantata for four soloists, chorus, and orchestra, shortly to have its premiere at the Three Choirs' Festival. He saw also the ms. score of a Mass by Dr. Herbert Howells, who occupies Gustav Holst's old post as musical director at St. Paul's School. The new Mass is a great work, in Mr. Leggat's opinion, quite comparable to Howell's Hymnus Paradisio. Mr. Leggat went over both these scores with Dr. Howells, in the room at St. Paul's with the sign over the door, "Mr. Holst's Room," and the plaque on the wall saying that "In this room Gustav Holst worked and composed from 1920 to 1934." He sat in Holst's chair, designed by the composer himself, and in which Holst often slept.

Mr. Leggat sees his position on this recorded program as that of a host entertaining guests whom he is anxious to please. He invites suggestions from listeners, and hopes they will understand how moods may govern tastes.

"At certain times," he said, "one's mood may call for the colour and splendour of the full symphony orchestra; at others, we may prefer the purity and intimacy of the string quartets. But we seek quality at all times. Perhaps I may be forgiven for recalling Rossini's famous remark: "There are only two kinds of music-good, and bad'."




