The oldest continuous CBC program enters its second quarter century December 19 with its 26th annual marathon of Christmas messages



HAT WOULD CHRISTMAS be without cheery greetings from friends and relatives? Most of us take these greetings for granted, simply trusting the mailman to deliver them daily during the Christmas season. But Yuletide greetings to the inhabitants of Canada's vast northland have another meaning—the CBC Northern Messenger.

Again this year on the Friday night before Christmas (December 19), the Northern Messenger will go on the air fifteen minutes after midnight CST (11:15 p.m. in Saskatchewan and Alberta) and stay on the air until all the messages have been read. This year the Northern Messenger begins its second quarter century on the air. It is the oldest continuous radio program heard anywhere in Canada. There will be hundreds of happy greetings from people all over the world—from Bethlehem, from France, from England and Scotland, from the United States, from Holland—to their loved ones in the 250,000 square miles of Canada's north. 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Christmas Day radio schedule starts on page

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HE complete resources of radio will be brought into use once again this week, to lend richer enjoyment and deeper meaning to the Christmas celebrations taking place in millions of Canadian homes. Often great gaps of distance and time will be bridged as the Christmas microphone roams over the globe and through history in search of anything and everything that might enhance our festivities.

Always a highlight on Christmas morning is the BBC's world-ranging broadcast, to be presented this year for the 26th time. Concerning the 1958 Christmas Commonwealth program, the BBC weekly London Calling says:

"The Queen's broadcast will be preceded by the traditional feature that links the countries of the Commonwealth. The title of this year's program is The Seekers and its theme is the famous line from Tennyson's Ulysses-'To strive, to seek, to find, and not to vield'-the words that appear on the great cross erected to the memory of Captain Scott in the Antarctic. The program is a Christmas celebration of the seekers of new lands, the finders of new knowledge, and the pioneers of the Commonwealth, and it has been written by the Irish author and poet H. A. L. Craig.

"There is strong link between the great Antarctic explorers, most of whom have been moved and inspired by the 'text' of this year's Christmas program, and the builders of the British Commonwealth, and although the program will recognize more than geographical exploration, the Tennysonian line will be an appropriate one for the men and women who will be heard - the strivers, the seekers, the finders, and the undefeated people of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

"The Seekers will be narrated by the Australian actor Peter Finch. The hour preceding the Sovereign's message will begin with a 15minute prologue of interlinking words and music on the theme of pioneers, past and present, in all realms of thought and endeavour.

The music has been specially written by William Alwyn, a leading British composer, and will be conducted by Muir Mathieson; the words, again by Craig, who has collaborated closely with Alwyn in producing what will be a unique prelude, will be spoken by Peter Finch.'

H. A. L. Craig was born at Drumtarriffe, County Cork, "the son of a Church of Ireland parson with twelve parishioners." He was educated at Kilkenny College (the school of Swift, Sheridan, and Congreve) and at Trinity College. Dublin.

He began writing as a schoolboy with plays for local amateurs, and verse, some of which was published as a volume shortly after he had left school. At eighteen, he compiled an anthology of Anglo-Irish verse, which was accepted by a publisher who died before it could be printed, and it has never yet appeared to enrich a bookshelf. He has always lived by his writing, which has included verse, dramatic and film criticism, and books on subjects ranging from poker to Ben Jonson's "Discoveries," and has avoided any form of regular employment, on the grounds that since writing is so painful to him, security would too easily persuade him to give it up.

In Rome four years ago Craig married Peggy Erskine, an American lecturer in the history of art at Columbia University. She still lectures each summer at the Sarah Lawrence women's college in Florence, so the Craigs happily

spend half their year in Italy and half in Hampstead, with brief periods in Ireland.

Craig's work is well known to the BBC's overseas listeners. He made his first contribution to radio in a poetry series for the BBC's London Calling Asia series ten years ago, and since then has written many dramatic feature programs broadcast in the BBC's General Overseas Service. Two of the most recent were The Frost of Heaven, an account of the compulsions which made men go on Antarctic explorations, and The Voyage of the Beagle, marking this year's Darwin centenary.

Television at Christmas

For most people, the charm of Christmas lies in things remembered—the timeless story of the babe in the manger and three wise men who followed a star, the mulled-ale flavour and crackling yule log of the Pickwicks, the sound of voices joined in familiar carols, and all the fantasies of a thousand gaily wrapped story books. If it can conjure up just a few of these images or catch a whiff of the nostalgia they evoke, CBC-TV's Christmas schedule will have more than done its job.

It is apt that the first special production of Christmas week should reflect the true meaning of the season. Gian-Carlo Menotti's Amahl and the Night Visitors (December 20th) is the story of a little crippled boy who is miracullously cured when he offers his crutch to the three kings to be taken as a gift to the Christ child. This Christmas opera was commissioned from Menotti in 1951 by the National Broadcasting Company and has become a perennial favourite. Sunday's offering is a delayed telecast of this year's NBC production with virtually the same cast that created the memorable roles.

Showtime on Sunday evening, offers a special Christmas musical fantasy written by Saul Ilson. It is called Andy the Handyman and tells in song and dance the adventures of a small-town "Mr. Fixit" who is drafted to the North Pole to help Santa and the elves make Christmas toys. Regulars Joyce Sullivan and Bob Goulet will handle the narration and the dance routines are being choreographed by Alan Lund.

Another pre-Christmas package for Sunday night viewers will be Lister Sinclair's television adaptation of *Pride and Prejudice* which Paul Almond will direct on *G.M. Presents*. Jane Austen fans are legion and few will want to miss seeing the Bennet girls on television.

The artistic highspot of the week will probably be Tuesday's performance of Tchaikovsky's gingerbread ballet, *The Nutcracker*, on *CBC Folio*. The National Ballet's husband - and - wife team, Lois

Christmas Eve this year will be unique for at least one member of the CBC fraternity. Rev. Brian Freeland, assistant supervisor of religious programs and author of many broadcast dramas, will make his television debut when he conducts a Christmas Eve Holy Communion Service at St. John's Convalescent Hospital in Toronto. He has conducted the midnight service there for a number of years but this will be the first time it has been televised. The stained-glass windows in the hospital chapel will be lit from the outside to en-

hance the ceremony from the visual point of view. Another thing viewers may look for is the brocade altar frontal, a gift from a well-wisher, which was used in Westminster Abbey for the coronation of Oueen Elizabeth II.

Christmas Day television begins with a filmed study of Bethlehem today as seen by Larry Henderson. A half-hour feature on Christmas in the British Isles serves as a prelude to Her Majesty's annual Christmas Message. Trans-Atlantic television still being a thing of the future, radio and television listeners will be on equal footing here. The Queen's speech will be followed by a program of traditional carols sung by the boys of Chetham's Hospital School, Manchester, England. The program, titled Here We Come A-Wassailing, was filmed in the medieval baronial hall of the hospital school.

Many youngsters (and oldsters too) will regard the scheduling of Walt Disney's film *Dumbo* as a real Christmas present. The lovable baby elephant with his enormous flapping ears is perhaps one of Disney's gayest and warmest productions.

Next we go to Winnipeg for a special half-hour Christmas Day variety show, then over to the Halifax studios for a message from CBC president J. Alphonse Ouimet, and *Operation Christmas*, a drama in which some flying-saucer men try to puzzle out the Christmas "peace on earth."

As usual, there will be some people who won't be spending Christmas at home with their families. Typical of these are the men of the Canadian armed forces serving overseas-in the Middle East with the United Nations' Emergency Force or on ships in foreign ports. Defence Minister G. R. Pearkes will introduce Christmas with the Forces, a filmed program showing how soldiers overseas are likely to spend Christmas. It will touch on the airlift from Quebec to the Middle East. Other segments were filmed at El Arrish and Rafah, headquarters of the Canadian base unit.

From Christmas overseas we move to *Christmas in Canada*, which will show some of the ways in which the feast is celebrated in Canada. Viewers will visit such places as a remote trading post in Northern Ontario to show how 17th-century customs of the Indians are still carried on. Another segment of the program will take a look at toys that made children's eyes sparkle 100 years ago — and compare them with gifts received today. Yet another portion will

come from a skiing resort in the Laurentians as chefs prepare to whet the outsize appetites of their Christmas guests. In Toronto, the cameras will look in on some new arrivals celebrating Christmas in ways traditional in the lands of their birth. Script for *Christmas in Canada* is by James Bannerman.

A roaring yule log fire will be the focal point for the Christmas Day edition of *Open House*, with the gang gathered around, mouths watering as Madame Benoit describes a traditional French Canadian Christmas dinner — suckling pig stuffed with buckwheat, ham cooked in cider and glossed with maple syrup, and seasoned goose. After dinner conversation will be provided by Fred Davis, and columnists Frank Tumpane and Greg Clark.

Last Christmas CBC Vancouver presented a musical version of the fairy tale, *The Three Bears*. It proved so popular that it is being done again this year. The music for the production was written by Vancouver composer Marjorie Adelburg with words by Joy Coghill.

Another highlight for the younger set will be the film Alice in Wonderland, produced by Lou Bunin, one of Europe's leading puppeteers who has combined live actors and puppet characters to make his fantasy characters believable. The film's prologue takes viewers to Oxford University to meet Lewis Carroll, the mathematician who told wonderful stories.

As Christmas Day draws to a close seven top-flight Canadian entertainers get together for a special hour-long variety show. They are Juliette, Bob Goulet, Wally Koster, Don Gillies, Gino Silvi and Paul Kligman. Music will be by Samuel Hersenhoren's orchestra.

CBC-TV has allowed Charles Dickens to write finis to the Christmas Day schedule with the presentation of the film, *The Pickwick Papers*, starring James Hayter, Nigel Patrick and Joyce Grenfell. And who could do it better than Mr. Pickwick?

Alice in Wonderland

Alice in Wonderland, based on Lewis Carroll's delightful novel about a little girl's adventures in a topsy-turvy world, will be a special film presentation Christmas Day on the CBC television network (check local listings for

Author Lewis Carroll wrote his famous fantasy while at Oxford University where he was a professor of mathematics. Carroll fashioned his fantasy on his own life at Oxford, using the people with whom he came in contact as models for his literary caricatures.

The film was produced by Lou Bunin, one of Europe's leading puppeteers, and by combining the use of live actors and puppets he made his fantasy characters believable.

The film begins with a prologue at Oxford University where the audience meets Lewis Carroll, a dean at the university, and his three daughters, one of whom is Alice.

Other personages include various members of the faculty, and

Oueen Victoria and her consort who pay a visit to the university. These characters become the prototypes for the fanciful creatures that inhabit Alice's fantasy world.

Thus Queen Victoria becomes, in fantasy, the Queen of Hearts; the Dean becomes the Cheshire Cat; the Vice Chancellor turns into the White Rabbit. Lewis Carroll himself becomes the Knave of Hearts.

As the Dean begins to tell his daughters the story, the audience, like Alice, slip off into the world of fantasy.

Alice in Wonderland was five years in the making. The puppets in Alice's dream were designed by producer Lou Bunin from Lewis Carroll's original drawings and word descriptions.

They will sing familiar Christmas carols and also the Mass of the Nativity, written specially by Mr. MacNutt for this program.

Larry Palef, CBC announcer, will be the narrator. He will relate the background of the hospital and will describe some of the gifts from patients and well-wishers which decorate the chapel. These include a brocade altar frontal which was used in Westminster Abbey for the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.

The deacon at the service will be Rev. Donald Anderson, who will give a short address. The subdeacon will be Neil McNish.

David Marcus Roland will produce Eucharist of Christmas Eve.

Litzenberger suffered a sophomore season letdown the following year with only 10 goals and 29 assists but has bounced back with two great seasons, last year leading the Black Hawks out of the league cellar. In 25 games so far this year he has garnered 11 goals and 12 assists for 23 points.

Ed grew up in Yorkton, Saskatchewan and learned to skate there before moving to Weyburn where he played three years as a midget and juvenile. He joined the Montreal organization during his three years with the junior Regina Pats where he played for Murray Armstrong, a coach he credits with much of his development as a hockey player.

For the 1952-53 and 1953-54 seasons, Ed moved up to the Montreal Royals and the following year he graduated to the NHL.

Litzenberger now plays centre though he's spent most of his career at right wing. He's 6' 1" and weighs 195.

Indian Children Make Creche for Christmas in Canada

There are many traditional ways to celebrate Christmas. On Christmas Day CBC-TV cameras will visit a remote trading post to show viewers how Indian children observe this occasion.

how this custom continues, and how people shut off from the world celebrate Christmas.

Christmas in Canada will take a look at toys that made a child's eves sparkle 100 years ago-and compare them with gifts children receive today.

Skiers will be seen whizzing past a window outside an indoor swimming pool when the program switches to a skiing resort in the Laurentians. CBC's cameras will invade the kitchen of the Chantecler resort at Ste. Adele-en-haut. Que., to see how the chefs cater for the hearty appetites of their Christmas guests.

Viewers will see recent arrivals to Canada celebrate Yuletide in ways traditional in the lands of their birth, and they'll also see the food that goes with the Christmas activities.

"The Nutcracker"

CBC Folio presents National Ballet Company in popular Tchaikovsky ballet this Tuesday

The National Ballet Company of Canada will play before the biggest audience in its history this Tuesday night on CBC Folio. And the ballet it will perform, Tchaikovsky's The Nutcracker, is also likely to set some sort of record for collecting an audience that ranges from the very young to the very old.

Canada's premiere ballet company has travelled widely, and won critical acclaim, in the United States as well as in Canada, and it has appeared on Canadian television before. But on Tuesday night, the National Ballet Company will be televized for the first time since the TV network was extended from coast to coast.

Every youngster of kindergarten age is familiar with at least one segment of the music of The Nutcracker-even Spike Jones made a recording of it for children a few years ago. As for the story-well, it's of the stuff that fairy tales are made from.

It tells of a little girl named Clara. At a Christmas party, Clara receives a nutcracker-not an ordinary nutcracker, but one carved with the features of a man's face. The Nutcracker Man's jaw is hinged so that he cracks nuts between his teeth. Clara's brother, Franz, is jealous and breaks the Nutcracker Man, and Clara goes to bed, sobbing over her broken toy.

Late at night, unable to forget the Nutcracker Man, she goes downstairs and discovers that all the Christmas toys have come to life, and are fighting with an army of mice. Clara helps the toys drive off the mice and-quite suddenlythe broken Nutcracker Man turns into a handsome prince. He invites Clara to go with him to his land, the Kingdom of Sweets.

They journey through a snowstorm in which the individual snowflakes dance, and in the Kingdom of Sweets, Clara is enthralled by a divertissement-an entertainment of many different dances that fill her with wonder: the Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy, the Russian Dance, the Arab Dance, the Chinese Dance, the Dance of the Mirlitons (of Flutes) and the Waltz of the Flowers.

Principals in Tuesday's performance will be prima ballerina Lois Smith (the Snow Queen and the Sugar Plum Fairy), premier danseur David Adams (the Nutcracker Prince), and soloist Betty Pope (little Clara), assisted by the corps de ballet of the National Ballet Company of Canada. The music will be conducted by George Crum, musical director of the National Ballet. Television production will be by Norman Campbell with sets by Richard Lambert. The costumes were designed for the National Ballet by Kay Ambrose.

Strangely enough, Tchaikovsky didn't think much of the idea of The Nutcracker when it was suggested to him in 1890 - a Dumas translation of E. T. A. Hoffman's story, "The Nutcracker and the King of Mice." But he was finally persuaded to start it in January of the following year, and to complete the draft score six months later.

And although the music of The Nutcracker abounds with melody, is captivatingly scored and is clearly the work of a strong imagination, it has been said that it has never been greatly successful as a ballet. Indeed, it was not a success when first presented in St. Petersburg, then the capital of Russia, in December, 1892, as a special Christmas presentation. It was only later that the ballet, and its music, became well-liked. However, one of the criticisms of the day-that The Nutcracker was better suited to a juvenile audience-could hardly be considered as a serious objection

In spite of any alleged weakness as a ballet, the work is getting two television performances this week. CBS will also present a 90-minute version on Christmas night, two nights after CBC Folio's presentation, performed by New York's City Centre troupe, with Canadian Melissa Hayden.

The National Ballet Company of Canada has also had several invitations to appear on American networks but has turned them down because it doesn't want to be tied down with regular programs.

And perhaps this makes Tuesday night's performance even more of what it's supposed to be: a rare Christmas treat.





Why, out of all the celebrations of the Christian year, Christmas should be the one that maintains and strengthens its hold on popular affection, when outside the ranks of the religious-minded the rest are all but forgotten, is a question perhaps for the sociologists and the historians to debate, rather than the musicians. Yet musicians and music-lovers may well rejoice in its undiminishing lustre, for Christmas has inspired, and continues to inspire, a stream of music as delightful as any that has flowed from the heart and mind of man. The CBC's selection from this music affords us a sampling that lets us realize how extensive it is, and how varied in style and approach, while retaining that intangible something-that subtle "Christmassy" feeling which gives it its characteristic flavour and appeal.

To consider come of these offerings in chronological order: the week's first salute to Christmas is sounded on the Winnipeg Sunday Concert, which features Vaughan Williams' On Christmas Night, and Finzi's Dies Natalis, the latter a setting for tenor (or soprano) and string orchestra of passages (some in prose) from the 17th-century English poet Traherne. Gerald Finzi is a contemporary English composer noted for his sensitive and sympathetic settings of words, often in a delicate, recitative-like vocal line. On Monday Halifax Concert acknowledges the season with the Sinfonia from Bach's wellknown Christmas Oratorio-actually not an oratorio at all in our sense of the term, but a series of six cantatas performed successively between Christmas Day, 1734, and January 5, 1735. Bach and his associates were nothing if not thoroughgoing in their celebrating, and such an arrangement reminds us, moreover, that Christmas used to be celebrated on and after the day, rather than before it, as it tends to be now.

On Christmas Eve the CBC Wednesday Night program includes a performance of Benjamin Britten's St. Nicholas Cantata from Toronto. This work, composed in 1948 for the centenary of Lansing College in Sussex, and heard for the first time in Canada under its composer's own direction, in a CBC Wednesday Night program in November of the following year, tells the story of St. Nicholas, patron saint of children, seamen, and travellers, and, of course, the original Santa Claus. In nine episodes it relates how he performed many charitable works, became a bishop, went to prison for his views, and on one occasion understandably declined to eat some pickled boys, even in a time of famine. It is scored for a miscellaneous group of adult and children's choirs, tenor solo, orchestra, organ and two pianos, with a narrator, and includes two well-known hymns to be sung by a "congregation"-for its intended setting is a church. Like the recently-heard Noyes Fludde and Let's Make an Opera, this work represents the development by the composer of an alternative, and simpler, style and idiom, long way removed from (for example) The Turn of the Screw-a tacit acknowledgement that "serious" music has drifted far from the "popular" brand, and of a desire to have a foot in both camps. This is not a new trend, of course; Elgar wrote Salut d'amour as well as The Dream of Gerontius, and even Beethoven wrote sets of minuets and other "popular" twiddles of that day while at work on his Ninth Symphony.

The carols to be presented by the George Little Singers on CBC Wednesday Night, represent many periods in many lands, and attest the universality of the Christmas appeal. Their frequent wide departure from our somewhat conventionalized ideas of what carols should be, and especially the rhythmic jauntiness of some of them, may be responsible for the slowness of their dissemination and general acceptance, although they are increasingly heard at carol services and concerts.

On the day itself the item of most musical interest, perhaps, is the Vespers of Christmas, to be sung by the Renaissance Singers, in the version known as the Sarum Use. A "use" is an approved local variant, in minor details, of the church's universal forms of prayer, and their plain-song music; this one, originating in Sarum—now called Salisbury—was much favoured in pre-Reformation England.

Outstanding among the non-Christmas events is the first North American performance, by the Toronto Wind Octet (Sunday morning) of a "new" Mozart work-an arrangement by him, recently unearthed in Germany, of material from his own opera Die entfuehrung aus dem Serail, for a group of wind instruments. The question of "arrangement"-the transferring of music to instruments and voices other than those for which it was originally written-was at one time a controversial one; and there are still purists who object to it on the grounds that the composer surely knew best what effects he intended when he wrote it. Unfortunately for this argument, however, the chief "offenders" were the masters themselves, who were forever transliterating their own music - and other people's-from one medium to another.

Having wandered around the world in the morning, listeners will be invited to explore their own country on Christmas afternoon via the program *Christmas Almanac*, from 11:15-5:00 p.m. CST. It will be *Almanac*'s fourth year and again the main ingredients will be music and actualities from every corner of Canada.

During the course of the afternoon there will be musical Christmas greetings from the Happy Gang in Toronto, the Shantymen of Leonard Mayoh in Halifax, folksinger Alan Mills in Montreal, Doug Parker's jazz sextet in Vancouver, the Prairie Schooner boys in Winnipeg, school choirs in Newfoundland, and Eddie Richards' popular quintet in Halifax. The Richards group will be familiar to everyone who followed CBC radio coverage of the Springhill mine disaster, for it provided interludes between reports from the minehead.

Actualities on Almanac will include a visit to the Saint John waterfront with Ken Homer, a visit to an old-style Christmas celebration on a farm in northern Saskatchewan, a radio conversation with the pilot of a BOAC jet comet flying at 20,000 feet, and interviews with a lighthouse-keeper on the west coast and with an IGY cosmic research scientist at his post in the mountains above Banff.

On Christmas evening the mind's eye will have opportunities to wander south and north, rather than east and west. First, to the tropics and beyond for an hour-long report on how people spend Christmas there; the show is called *Green Christmas* and there will be interviews with people in such countries

as Argentina, Brazil, Ceylon and Thailand. Then on Northern Messenger, an hour of greetings and entertainment directed from the people of southern Canada to their fellow-countrymen in the north and especially in the vicinity of Whitehorse, only recently joined to the CBC radio network for regular program service; this show will include polka and other lively dance music and messages from Government and CBC officials.

Adaptations by George Woodcock of several of the medieval English mystery plays, which gave market-square audiences the history of the world in dramatic form from the fall of Lucifer to the birth of Christ, will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night from Vancouver. To be heard are *The Fall*

noted Irish author, has written the script for this year's BBC Commonwealth Christmas broadcast, "The Seekers," described on page 3. of Lucifer, from the cycle of plays that became associated with Coventry, The Fall of Man, from the York cycle, Abraham and Isaac from the Broome cycle, The Annunciation and The Nativity, from the York cycle, and The First Shepherd's Play, from the Wakefield cycle. There will be a simple commentary linking the plays, which will be produced by Gerald Newman.

The Vespers of Christmas Day

The Vespers of Christmas Day, according to the Sarum Use, will be sung by the Renaissance Singers of Montreal under the direction of Donald Mackey, on Christmas Day on the Trans - Canada Network (5:08 p.m. in Manitoba, 4:08 p.m. in Saskatchewan and Alberta).

The Sarum Vespers is taken from the Sarum Breviary as used in the English Church at Salisbury (Sarum) and in many other parts of England in pre-Reformation times. The books of the Sarum rite furnished the English reformers with their main material for the first Book of Common Prayer in 1549.

The plainsong of the Sarum rite was a local modification, in details only, of the Roman rite. In the Vespers of Christmas it will be sung in English, according to the adaptation of the late Dr. G. H. Palmer — an adaptation which is now widely used in the monastic communities of the Church of England.

The Psalter forms the core of this Office, and Psalms 110, 111 and 112 will be heard, each framed with its proper Antiphon. The Magnificat (Luke I, 46), the Biblical song known as the Canticle of Mary, has since the sixth century been the focal point of Vespers. It will be sung to the First Mode

Psalm - tone, with fauxbourdons composed by Healey Willan. The Magnificat, like each of the Psalms, is enclosed by its appropriate Antiphon. Also to be heard on the broadcast are the Responsorium, The Word was made Flesh, and

the Office Hymn, From lands that see the sun arise.

The Renaissance Singers is a group of 16 which has been heard on the CBC during the past two years, particularly on Good Friday and Sunday Chorale broadcasts. Donald Mackey, who is the director, is organist of the Church of the Messiah in Montreal, and music-teacher at Westmount High School.

guages, mostly English, French, and Eskimo.

Early in December the messages begin to arrive at the office of producer Harry Randall, who edits them and has them typed and arranged in the order in which they will be read—that is alphabetically according to the name of the person to whom they are directed.

Following the pattern established in 25 years of service, the four announcers—Norm Micklewright, Bob Willson, Lorne Wallace and Leo Remillard—will read all the English and French messages until they are completed. Then recordings of mes-sages from Eskimos in hospitals and sanitariums in the "south" (Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta) will be played for their friends "down north." Eskimos across the North eagerly await the transmission of these messages in their own language each Christmas. They're heard in points ranging from Labrador almost to the North Pole, and on to the tip of the Yukon. Unlike other means of communication, the Messenger always "gets through."

Listening to the weekly Northern Messenger (shorter programs are heard each Friday night from November to April) has become a tradition across the north. For people in many of the most remote areas it is the only regular contact with friends. The Northern Messenger also offsets the propoganda influence of the only other broadcasts available in many of these areas—those from the U.S.S.R.
Although the Northern Messenger

is intended mainly for inhabitants of the North and their friends in the South, many Canadians find listening to the Christmas edition a heart-warming experience each year.

In addition to the Friday night Northern Messenger, the CBC will again present a special Christmas Northern Messenger on Christmas Day at 10:00 p.m. on CBW, CBK, CBX. On this broadcast such public figures as the federal minister of northern affairs, the minister of transport, northern bishops of the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches, and the president of the CBC will give their greetings to the residents of Canada's north. Personal messages will also be given by a few of the most regular Northern Messenger service users. The messages will be interspersed with music by Jake Park and his pop-ular *Polka Party* band and vocalists Kerr Wilson and Donna Andert.

Harry Randall, who has produced the Northern Messenger series for the past seven seasons, will express his own warm feelings for his listeners on the Christmas Day program.
