



CBC Times Format

Freedom of Expression

• May I say in reply to R. A. Nolan's letter in the Feb. 8-14 issue of CBC Times regarding *Close-Up's* interview with Bertrand Russell, that Mr. Nolan holds a rather surprising view of the Christian religion's influence. That a man can talk others out of their religious beliefs merely by saying that he cannot bring himself to accept the Church's teachings indicates a sad state of affairs. I do believe that Mr. Nolan and his fellow Christians are bullying those like Mr. Russell, who made it quite clear that everyone is entitled to his own opinion. It's high time that Christians reflect the toleration given them by atheists and agonistics. At any rate, *Close-Up* was, as always, superb.—T. P., Winnipeg.

• Recently a Mr. R. A. Nolan severely criticized the CBC for allowing the widely-respected British philosopher Bertrand Russell the liberty to voice his views on the beliefs of Christians. Evidently Mr. Nolan thinks that the CBC should allow only



Christians to voice their opinions on religion. If this were so, freedom of expression in our democratic land would only exist on paper. Also, who gave Mr. Nolan the authority to act as a self-appointed morals policeman for the rest of us 17 million Canadians? Mr. Nolan should exercise some of the tolerance that Christianity teaches him and show more tolerance for the views of other people on any question, even though he may be in complete disagreement with their views. He should realize that the CBC as a public communications medium is obligated to present both sides of any controversial question if freedom of expression is to continue in our country. All democracy-loving people are thankful that there is still such a body as the CBC where freedom of expression of a non-libellous nature still exists.—W. B. Danyk, Edmonton.

• Congratulations on your performance of *The Mikado*. If you have seen the film of *Madame Butterfly* you will agree that the backgrounds and the filming were superb. But if you compare it with the size of a television studio I would give an A-plus for CBC's effort. I was amazed at the costumes and props accumulated for this program. They must have had a response from Toronto's 48,000 Japanese citizens. I was also very pleased with the masterly make-up. In a number of places in the opera, however, I noticed that the Emperor arrives in a carriage. Not only was the one used not of a sort an emperor would ride in, but he is supposed to be riding on a horse! If only they had known what the chorus is singing about: *Miyosomo! Miyosomo! Oumo no nae ni. Kira Kira suru no wo non jai noh!* which interpreted means "Emperor, Emperor! What is that we see glittering ahead of your horse?"—W. Shibato, Winnipeg.

• I cannot help but join the throng and tell you how much we enjoyed your presentation of *The Mikado* last Tuesday night. I just wondered if it might not be possible for you to encourage listeners to enjoy these operas if you could publish the story in abridged form in the CBC Times the week before. "I don't give a hoot for posterity," says Nathan Cohen, easing his big frame into a chair. "Right now—and that's what concerns me most—I'm making a good living doing the things I want to do. This I've always done."

He's a script editor in the drama department of the CBC, moderator of "Fighting Words" on television and drama critic on "Audio" and "Critically Speaking" on radio. "Audio," on CJBC (Toronto), he does ad-lib.

He's edited a newspaper single-handed, put out his own magazine, "The Critic," written for quarterlies and sold plays to radio and television.

"What does it all add up to? I'll tell you—a happy guy making a living the way he wants to. As to why I've done these things, who can say? You fall into it; some mere chance throws you in that direction."

It all started in his native Sydney, N.S., in 1935, when he was twelve. He had skipped school to see his first play, "a horrible version" of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." He played hockey frequently to see movies, yet always earned good grades. University instructors at Mount Allison used to get annoyed at his absence, but he studied hard and got his B.A.

"Until university," he says, "my interest in entertainment was a nebulous thing, without form or direction. While I never wanted to be an actor, it's equally true that I didn't intend to be a critic. I just didn't know."

At university in his late teens, he was the first undergraduate to be editor of the school newspaper. After that, he came to Toronto to study

Getting Films for Television

Grace Brown, film director at CBC Winnipeg, answers listeners' questions about filmed programs on television

Now that I have been so neatly trapped by the final paragraph of Don Robertson's last article on the Technical Department, I can no longer delay telling you about the Film Department. Perhaps the following articles will answer some of your questions about films on television. At least, I hope so. Also, I hope they will explain some of the problems and will give you a better understanding of the part played by films in television.

I should imagine your first question would be "Where do you get your films?", your second question might be "What do you have to do to put films on the air?". And your third would surely be, "Why don't you show such and such a feature film?" There are other questions for which you will want answers, I am sure, but the above three are those most frequently asked. For the purpose of these articles, I shall try to answer the three questions. (If you have others, please write us and we shall endeavour to answer them through the *CBC Times*). Now to Question 1:

Where Do You Get Your Films?

In the Television Film Service in Toronto there is a Film Procurement Department. Our needs and requirements are made known to this Department and they endeavour to procure the films we request. This particular department deals only with ready-made films such as syndicated series, short subjects (cartoons, musical interludes, etc.) and feature films.

Before any film can be shown on television, all rights to its use must be cleared for use on Canadian television. Films made especially

for television are easily cleared through the producers and distributors. Special arrangements are made and extra fees are paid to the actors, musicians, writers and commentators before the film is started. However, with many documentary and feature films, no thought was given to their use on television at the time they were made and, frequently, clearance cannot be obtained from those people holding the copyrights. For instance, a film might contain footage obtained through an organization which will not, or cannot, release that footage for use on television. Sometimes the background music cannot be cleared. Occasionally, we come across a film which could be cleared for television, but the owner of the copyrights wants a prohibitive sum for this clearance. Usually, in such cases, the film is not televised. There are films which are cleared completely for use on U.S. television but not for Canadian.

There are many reasons for these restrictions, and our Film Procurement Department in Toronto has to know these reasons. Where it is possible to clear the film our Legal Department in Toronto handles the necessary papers and advises the Film Procurement section when clearance has been obtained.

I am sure many of you have rented films from the Public Library, or the Local Film Exchange, and you wonder why we do not use these facilities for obtaining films for television. Believe me, we would like to, but we would immediately run into clearance difficulties and would also be

stepping on the toes of the television distributors. When an individual buys a film, he buys the rights to use that film in his own home or in a hall or church but he would not think of offering it to his local theatre for use, as the theatre has to deal with the film exchanges, which own the theatrical rights to the films. A television station is in much the same position as the local theatre. It must procure its film from the distributor who owns the television rights. This will explain why we have to refuse many offers for the use of prints which are in our local libraries or owned by individuals.

Once a film or film series is cleared for television in Canada, the Film Procurement Department in Toronto, on behalf of CBWT, draws up a contract which covers the use of the films over a certain period of time, at a certain rental and under specified conditions. Then a schedule is set up and the prints are brought into the Television Film Service in Toronto, where they are checked for physical quality. This sounds like a simple procedure, but it isn't. So much can go wrong. The contract can be drawn up, signed by the CBC. Then the distributor might decide to change his mind or the owner of the films might withdraw from his agreement with the distributor, with the result CBWT does not get the films at that time.

Assuming, however, that the contract is signed, and the film titles are all cleared, then you would think there would be no difficulties. But again, you are wrong. The distributor may have as many as three prints of each film, but he might have 15 different contracts with various television stations in Canada. He then has to "bicycle" the prints. This means he has to draw up a schedule for each station, allowing sufficient time for the prints to be shipped between telecasts from one station to the other. Much can happen here: The film can be mislaid, it can be lost in transit (this doesn't happen often), it can be shipped to the wrong place (this does happen more frequently than we would wish), or it can


be damaged beyond repair in projection.

From this, you might wonder how we get a print at all. However, these dreadful disasters happen only occasionally, and for the most part, the schedule is met. More and more frequently now, our Film Procurement Department arranges to procure one complete set of prints for the use of CBC stations. This set is under the control of our own Film Booking Department and this department arranges a schedule to meet the requirements of each CBC location.

We are still encountering difficulties with print quality, particularly with feature films. For instance, between January 17 and 26, three features were rejected because of poor physical quality and one simply didn't arrive—all this at a time, when our emergency standby rack was at its lowest peak in a year! I don't blame you for complaining; we complained too!

The foregoing explains where we get most of our ready-made films. Others are procured locally, but the clearance procedure has to be followed. Our local National Film Board office is particularly helpful in supplying films at short notice, as are the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways. The Manitoba Department of Industry and Commerce keeps us informed of all new films as does the local representative of the United Kingdom Information Service.

The CBC locations are producing a limited number of films which appear on all CBC stations and on many private stations. Such programs as our *Here and There* series, *Heritage* and *Explorations* are examples. Sometimes a Canadian firm is requested to produce specific films in these series. CBWT plays an active role in this film making and has produced a good number of films which have been shown on the television network. Some of the more recent films are *Schizophrenia*, which appeared on *Explorations*, and *City in White*, which was televised on February 7.

So far we have discussed only complete films, but films form a large part of our "live" programs, too. Television news is made up largely of film, shot on the spot, of sound on film interviews and short feature items on subjects in our prairie region. We have four staff cameramen who handle most of our local film requirements. No doubt you have seen them at football games, at most sporting events, at fires, conventions, or at any place where news is being made.

Film forms about 50 per cent of our weekly *Country Calendar* program. As a matter of fact, we are planning three *Country Calendar* programs completely on film—one from each of the prairie provinces. The *Mary Liz Show* uses a fair amount of local film and still pictures as do such programs as *The Warren Davis Show*, *How About That?* and *Spotlight*. The film used in these programs is usually silent, with a live commentator adding the voice. Sometimes, the items are shot in an Auricon camera, which records the sound and picture on the same film.

As Don Robertson has told you in last week's *CBC Times*, a kine-

scope recording is a reproduction of a live program on 16 mm. film. To our department these are also films and require the same attention as a ready-made film.

Next week I shall try to answer the second question: "What do you have to do to put films on the air?"

odds and ends

CBC Audience Research reports that compared to other sports, the 1958 Grey Cup football playoff had the largest measured audience to date for a live sports program carried on the combined French and English TV networks. The national rating was 66 per cent, which means the game was viewed in almost 2,000,000 Canadian homes by more than five and one-half million people. Almost a million others listened to the game by radio. For TV, only the cumulative audience for the national election of March 31, 1958, was larger.

On the subject of audiences—even the most "unpopular" among entertainment programs on the Canadian TV network (judged by the program ratings) drew audiences for each program during January of well over two million viewers, or enough to fill Canada's largest indoor arena more than one hundred times.

on radio . . .

Many Cape Breton Islanders never really approved of the strange goings-on at Baddeck Bay in the cold first month of 1909. The climax came when young John McCurdy climbed into Alex Bell's odd-looking flying machine, the *Silver Dart*, and went racing madly across the ice. It didn't matter that the flimsy craft, looking like a big bird's skeleton, managed to rise off its motor-cycle wheels and deposit McCurdy safely half a mile away. The first powered flight in the Commonwealth by one of His Majesty's subjects was no more an occasion than when, some five years earlier, Orville and Wilbur Wright had proved their point at Kitty Hawk.

This Monday, 50 years to the day later, local old-timers will have a chance to reconsider. Another *Silver Dart*, just as odd-looking and as flimsy as the first, will rise from the ice of Baddeck Bay to mark the anniversary. But this time J. A. D. McCurdy who later became Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, will not be required to risk life and limb. Flown out to the spot by R.C.A.F. helicopter, he will watch Wing Commander Paul Hartman guide an exact replica of his history-making airplane aloft.

The helicopter will take McCurdy from the Alexander Graham Bell Museum at Baddeck where he will be interviewed by CBC's Keith Barry, to the spot four miles away from which the original take-off was made. There, as townspeople dressed in turn of the century costumes skate around the *Silver Dart*, letters from Prime Minister Diefenbaker to other Commonwealth heads will be put on board. After the aircraft has been flown over the Bell Memorial (it has been flown before!), the letters will be transferred to the helicopter and sent on their way by regular air mail service.

Silver Dart II started as a spare time project of R.C.A.F. Leading Aircraftsman Lionel McCaffrey. It was adopted by public relations conscious airforce officials and exhibited as a static display at last

year's Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto. Certain modifications were carried out to make it airworthy for the anniversary celebrations, but it remains still almost identical to the craft flown by McCurdy.

CBC radio and television will be out at Baddeck to cover the actual flight; in fact, the week's schedule contains many other programs directly or indirectly concerned with the anniversary. By week's end there should be little doubt in anyone's mind of what McCurdy's adventure meant to aviation generally and to Canadian aviation in particular.

TV viewers along the CBC's Maritime network will be able to watch the *Silver Dart* take-off at 9:30 on Monday morning. (Viewers elsewhere in Canada will see it on film on Saturday evening.)

A delayed radio broadcast of the flight will be beamed out across the country on CBC Trans-Canada on Monday morning.

On Monday evening CBC microphones will have been invited into the banquet room of the Queen Elizabeth hotel to listen in on the proceedings at a dinner of the Canadian Aeronautical Institute commemorating the anniversary. The speakers will be J. A. D. McCurdy and Governor-General Massey.

On Sunday evening McCurdy will be heard in the Trans-Canada series *Our Special Speaker* telling of another aerial adventure; his flight from Key West to Havana in 1911 for which he won—and lost—a \$10,000 prize. This was the

time when his motor fell apart over shark-infested waters. Luckily he was within gliding distance of Havana and had developed pontoons to cope with such an emergency. His was the first sea landing.

The daily *Roving Reporter* series on radio will also be devoted to aviation this week. Monday's program will deal with the morning's anniversary flight at Baddeck. On Tuesday Peter Stursberg will interview Air Marshal Robert Leckie, the first Allied pilot to shoot down a German zeppelin during the First Great War. A/M Leckie also took part in the first trans-Canada flight in 1920. On Wednesday John Rae will chat with the first man to fly over the Canadian barrens, C. H. (Punch) Dickins, now Sales Director of De Havilland Aircraft of Canada. Friday's *Roving Reporter* will feature reminiscences of the Hudson Strait air expedition, a survey of 1927-28 which plotted a northern water route for the export of grain to Europe from the port of Churchill. Telling the story will be Group Captain A. A. Lewis, a member of the expedition who later survived a two-week trek over the Atlantic ice in midwinter after a forced landing.

To return to Monday morning's anniversary flight, not all the on-lookers were unimpressed. By a coincidence, the father of Alex Lumsden, one of the two TV producers assigned to the anniversary flight, was living in Baddeck in 1909. This Methodist minister recalls that it was "a lovely, fine, crisp day with the ice surface of Baddeck Bay ideal for skating." "In my mind's eye I can see the *Silver Dart* being wheeled out on the ice surface and placed in position," he says. "And McCurdy taking his position in the pilot's seat which juts out in front from the centre of the plane—a horse and sleigh with Dr. Bell and a medical doctor (Dr. Dan MacDonald), nearby . . . No doubt my parents' comments at home had impressed on me to some degree at least that the flight heralded the dawn of a new era."

law, but soon gave it up because of ill health.

Home for a visit in 1942, he learned of a newspaper job in Glace Bay and took it. By 1945, he says, he'd had his fill of being a one-man editorial staff and unsuccessfully sought reportorial work in Toronto.

He earned his way translating Yiddish into English and vice-versa for various firms, including the Canadian Jewish News, which, in

1947, hired him as editor of its English page. There he met Gloria, a co-worker, whom he married June 15, 1947.

On their first date, he reluctantly took her suggestion that they see a stage play, "Ah Wilderness." It was exceptionally well done, he felt, so he wrote about it for his page. The editor liked it and asked Cohen to do it regularly. His answer: "Why not? It helps fill the page."

The following year, 1948, there was another "mere chance" when he met Neil Morrison, who was

then lining up CJBC's "Across the Footlights," the predecessor of "Critically Speaking." Mutually interested, they agreed Cohen would try it. Soon after, the burly Easterner was also a critic on "CJBC Views the Show," on which he's still a frequent guest. He started on "Audio" in 1949.

By then, he had several short stories and articles published and had written a book "which everybody very properly rejected." Some radio scripts met the same fate, but only for a while. After five adaptations in a row clicked, he was named editor of "Ford Theatre," on CBC radio, a post he held from 1951 to 1954.

"Fighting Words," he says, was a result of a casual conversation between himself and CBC producer Harvey Hart. The unrehearsed show started in December, 1952, and continues today on CBC radio and television.

"Also in there someplace," Cohen says, "I put out 16 issues of The Critic, which didn't pay." In October, 1955, he became a television script editor on a contract basis.

"Sometimes," he says, puffing on the inevitable cigarette, "when it gangs up on me and the pressure is heavy, I'll take off for a few days to read."

In addition to all the above, Cohen also has to his credit such TV scripts as "The Faces of Treason," "The Turning Point" and a story on Albert Dreyfus. Currently he is working on a Folio production about the Dead Sea scrolls, "Treasure in the Desert."

He is a regular contributor to Queen's Quarterly and similar magazines, and is a correspondent for Dancing Times of London, a leading ballet journal. Early in 1958, he started a weekly column for The Telegram.

Daughter Phyllis, 8 (in March) and Susan, 9, take much of his leisure time, and he's a habitual watcher of late movies on television.

About "Busy Fingers"

Work of child artists on CBWT inspires almost 1,000 young viewers to submit their own examples

Over 900 children's drawings, paintings and sketches have poured into CBC's Winnipeg program, *Busy Fingers*. They represent every sort of subject interesting to the 4- to 16-year-olds, and range from horses and mountains to story-book characters, snowmen, and imaginary creatures who people unlikely planets. And all possess some measure of the charm and freshness of children's art. Up to a dozen of these pictures each week find their way before the cameras on the Monday show.

"It's an exciting experience," says Betty Nickerson, hostess for *Busy Fingers*. "But it's getting more difficult to choose the pictures. Not only are there more of them every week, but they get better all the time. Nearly half come from rural areas, either from the children or selected by the teachers. Not only do we see what interests others, but we are getting better acquainted through the pictures. One particular drawing was of a schoolhouse complete with flagpole, pump and woodpile, and when we were out driving one Sunday, my eight-year-old said, 'Look Mom, there's the school you showed on *Busy Fingers*.' And it was too!"

A different art or craft technique is demonstrated by Betty on each show. With her are three guest artists, chosen either from schools or art classes, who show their way of handling the technique. "The guests not infrequently offer me advice and often figure out better methods. Sometimes, in fact, the show turns out rather differently than I'd planned. And that is why the children are on the show," Betty explains. "They know how young people work. Viewing children who see their contemporaries creating something beautiful, they feel more personally involved than

merely listening to an adult lecture.

"Working with guest artists (they range in age from 7 to 16) is thoroughly enjoyable. They are always charming, enthusiastic, and exhibit a great deal of poise. Many show a genuine creativeness that speaks well for them and their schools. We are fortunate too, in the many teachers who find time in their busy schedules to impart their interests and talents in the arts. I only wish we could give recognition to all of them."

The idea behind *Busy Fingers* is to provide some constructive ideas of "things to do" in those empty moments common to every household. With three active children of her own, Mrs. Nickerson feels that developing skills and artistic appreciation is an important, satisfying part of growing up. All *Busy Finger* projects are first

Thursday on "Explorations"**"The Roots of Our Songs"**

by ALAN MILLS



We asked Alan Mills, the popular balladeer of CBC Trans-Canada's Sunday morning "Folk Songs for Young Folk," to drop us a line about the program he is preparing for this week's "Explorations" on CBC-TV. It's called "Roots of Our Songs" and Mills will team on it with singer Helene Baillargeon. Here is what he says:

The most difficult job I've had to do in either radio or TV has been to condense all I've wanted to say about folk songs in general and Canadian folk songs in particular.

The idea of *Roots of Our Songs*, as suggested to me by the *Explorations* people, was to cover the whole subject of Canadian folk songs, their sources and their char-

acter, using various examples to illustrate my points.

Simple enough, I thought. I was particularly enthusiastic because it gave me a wonderful chance to expound my own theories about what folk songs are and particularly to point out what a lot of wonderful songs we have in our country—not only the inherited folk songs of France and the British Isles, but our own native or home-made songs.

It turned out that it wasn't simple at all. After writing about 50 minutes of script I found I'd said only half the things I wanted to say and had allowed for only a third of the songs I wanted to include for illustration. But eventually, after several days of mercilessly cutting some of my own fond theories and trimming most of the songs, we have a program which gives a fairly thorough—if skeletonized—picture of Canadian folk songs with 15 examples to illustrate their sources and character—from the early songs of our Eskimo and Indian people to those of the present day.

Some 20,000 folk songs and their variants have been collected in Canada to date and more are being found every day. About 75 per cent of them are French songs and the rest English, and while most are versions of traditional folk songs brought to Canada from France and the British Isles, at least five per cent are "home made." A large number of the other inherited songs have been changed and adapted to so many Canadian uses and have become so much a part of our people that they could now be regarded as Canadian folk songs, to the same extent that some Americanized versions of traditional British ballads are claimed as American.

While most of our French folk songs were collected in Quebec by Dr. Marius Barbeau, others have been found in the Maritimes and Ontario. As for our English-language songs, more than 4,000 have been collected in Nova Scotia alone by Dr. Helen Creighton, several hundred more in Newfoundland by various people, about 200 in New Brunswick by Louise Manny, about 500 in Ontario by Edith Fowke and

a few have been found recently in Saskatchewan.

Our home-made folk songs include many fine historical ballads, as well as songs of work and play; love, courtship, marriage and death; of adventure and tragedy on land and on sea. While the origin of most of these songs is not known, there are several of the original song-makers whom we do know. There was Larry Gorman, for instance, a Prince Edward Islander who worked in the woods of New Brunswick and Maine in the latter part of the 19th century. He wrote many of the fine ballads that are still sung in the Eastern woodlands. Another was Arthur Scammell of Newfoundland, the school-teacher who wrote *The Squid-jiggin' Ground*. There are other song-makers, of Newfoundland and other parts of Canada, of yesterday and today, whose ballads reflect the character of our people and country.

In *Roots of Our Songs* we just scratch the surface of a compelling subject.

Meet Your N.H.L. Stars

Thirteenth in a series of articles on N.H.L. stars to be seen in action on Saturday night telecasts over the CBC-TV network.



13. Bill Gadsby

Bill Gadsby is the old pro of the New York Rangers, with 12 seasons of N.H.L. play behind him. He

broke in with the Chicago Black Hawks in 1946 as a 19-year-old and was a real favourite with Chicago fans for over eight years before being traded off to the Rangers in a four-man swap midway through the 1954-55 season.

In his three full seasons with the Manhattan Blueshirts, he's proved himself a genuine all-star, making the first team twice and the second all-stars once. A fine rushing defenseman, Gadsby last year led all blueliners in scoring, at the same time setting a club record for goals with 14. The previous high of 13 had been set by Earl Siebert 25 years ago.

In his 725 N.H.L. games, Gadsby has scored an amazing total (for a

defenseman) of 338 points with 89 goals and 249 assists. This season he is far in front of all defenders in point production and was selected to the mid-season second all-star team.

While he shoots left-handed, Gadsby plays most frequently at right defense. He moves over to the left side only on New York's deadly power play, when Andy Bathgate plays the right point position. Bill's effectiveness as a rusher is a matter of timing and heads-up play. He knows when to break quickly, when to feed passes to his forwards and when to lay back to avoid being caught out of position.

Tennessee Ernie's Formula—

“Just Be Yourself . . .”

A man with Scottish ancestry, a Tennessee accent and a folksy sense of humour, who was unknown eight years ago, is today the star of his own TV show seen over 34 Canadian stations every week. Tennessee Ernie Ford's records appeal to teenagers and adults alike and are counted among the favourites of Princess Margaret.

Ernie's formula for TV pressure is “just be yourself and the rest is easy.” In his own words his show is put together for people “who want to watch in their pyjamas and

slippers. Too much production for somebody like me is like putting a bouquet on a vinegar barrel.” The format of the Ernie Ford show is flexible and features guest stars, comedy, music and, of course, the voice of Ernie Ford. It also contains plenty of those down-on-the-farm Ernieisms which are so popular.

Ernie, christened Ernest Jennings Ford, was born forty years ago in Fordtown, Tennessee, a farming community settled by his Scottish-born grandparents. His

family later moved to a farm in nearby Bristol where he went to school and had his first job—announcing on the local radio station for \$10 a week. Ernie's singing career really started then too. He and his mother were invited by the Sheriff to sing hymns to the prisoners in jail. Hymns are still a regular part of his program but he admits that “it's nice to sing to people knowing I don't need leg-irons to make them sit still and listen.”

Ernie saved his money to pay for voice lessons at the Cincinnati Conservatory. He was encouraged to study classical singing but his money ran out and he left the Conservatory to go back to work in radio. When the war began he enlisted in the Air Corps and while stationed in California met Betty Hemminger. Though he didn't have then what she calls his “romantic moustache,” she married him a month after they met. His nickname for her is “Pumpkin.” Ernie and Betty have two sons, Jeffrey Buckner (Buck) now nine and Brion Leonard (Little Bit) aged five.

After the war Ernie wanted to settle on government farmland in Alaska. He and Betty spent their savings on a third-hand 1941 car and headed for the Yukon. They got as far as California when the car broke down and their money

ran out so Ernie turned to the only thing he knew besides farming—radio. He worked on a number of different stations and was finally signed by Cliffie Stone, a veteran of country music broadcasting, to appear regularly on his weekly Home Town Jamboree program. The records Ernie made as a member of Stone's troupe led to guest appearances on radio and TV and personal appearances in nightclubs in New York and Las Vegas. He was the first country-style musician to appear at the Palladium in London, England, and his recording of "Shotgun Boogie" became a great favourite of Princess Margaret.

Following the Palladium appearance, Ernie recorded the title song from the movie "River of No Return." It was his first real move into the field of popular music and from it he branched out into acting and comedy with guest spots on the "Red Skelton Show" and "I Love Lucy"—where he created the country bumpkin character, Cousin Ern. Then came "Sixteen Tons" and success. He put such feeling into "Sixteen Tons" that many thought he came from coal mining people himself.

Despite his new success, Ernie hasn't changed much from the man he was ten years ago. He owns a ranch where he likes to spend his spare time working hard to develop his herd of purebred Hereford cattle and raise a few chickens.

A quarrel—even a literary quarrel—is no more complicated a situation than two children sitting opposite each other and saying antiphonally "Yes, it is" and "No, it isn't." Once started, there's no reason why it should ever stop, except for exhaustion or death. For quarrelling is a pathological condition; and sanity can only be restored by the accident of grace and humour. Occasionally a quarrel will dissolve in a gale of laughter and a bottle of gin. That this can ever happen at all lends a variety to quarrelling. But not much. For the prototype of quarrelling is war; and war releases an inexorable mechanism in which the gin and laughter tend to be incidental.—George Whalley on *Critically Speaking*.



This Week's Radio

13-year-old Pianist on "Concerto" Series

Concerto this Wednesday afternoon on radio has the privilege of introducing to a nation-wide audience a young (13) pianist whose musicianship and precocious technical accomplishments have astonished adjudicators, examiners and

audiences in her native Winnipeg for the past few years.

She is Diedre Irons, who will perform the *Concerto* in A Minor by Robert Schumann with an orchestra directed by Victor Feldbrill. Diedre has performed as soloist under Mr. Feldbrill's baton on two occasions earlier this season, at special concerts by the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

Like 15-year-old pianist Ailsa Lawson, who plays on *Concerto* on Feb. 18, Diedre has won both the junior and senior piano scholarships offered by the Good Deed Club to the most accomplished young pianist to perform on the club's Saturday radio broadcasts on CBC.

In the Manitoba Musical Competition Festival Diedre has won nine classes. In 1956 she was awarded the Junior Musical Club Trophy

for intermediate class instrumentalists.

Diedre started her studies with Mrs. John Howes, who was her teacher for five years. For the past two seasons she has been studying with the Winnipeg composer-pianist Sonia Eckhardt-Gramatte.

Diedre is in Grade 8 at Winnipeg's River Heights School where she accompanies the school choirs. Her hobbies include swimming and skating.

Stars Still Oblige

"We've taken out insurance against adverse listener reaction," says Ken Dalziel, producer of CBC Trans-Canada's *The Stars Oblige* (Tuesday afternoons). "We let the listeners themselves decide who the guest stars are going to be." Looking for a truly different format for a musical show last July, Dalziel went out on a limb by inviting listeners to write in every week and tell him who they would like to hear on the show.

Responding to the invitation to select the stars, listeners from British Columbia to Newfoundland send in letters weekly. "We do run into snags in getting out-of-town talent on the show, as time, distance and expense are the determining factors," says Dalziel. "When we have sufficient requests, out goes the invitation; more often than not, we receive an affirmative reply, but on a 'whenever-available' basis."

"We strive to keep the atmosphere informal," he says, "and our emcee, Barry Wood engages in home-spun chit-chat with each guest—this brings the star closer to the listener." Having the audience select guests from television as well as radio often brings listeners TV talent not normally heard on radio. Bob Goulet, Phyllis Marshall, and Tommy Common are only a few of the TV personalities heard on *The Stars Oblige* in the past.

On February 17, guest stars will be singers Lorraine Foreman,

Sylvia Grant, Bruce Webb and arranger-pianist Johnny Burt. The following Tuesday Ken Steele, Jimmy Shields and Lorraine McAlister will be heard on the show. Singers Donna Miller, Harry Mossfield and The Four Gentlemen will be guests on March 3.

"Our promise still goes," says Dalziel. "As long as requests keep coming in, we will see that *The Stars Oblige*."

The Reith Lectures

A man who has made world headlines with his tracking of earth satellites and lunar probes will be heard weekly in *The Reith Lectures*, a BBC series of six broadcasts starting this Tuesday evening on CBC Trans-Canada. His name is A. C. B. Lovell, O.B.E., F.R.S., and he is Professor of Radio Astronomy in the University of Manchester, and Director of the Jodrell Bank Experimental Station—home of the world's largest radio-telescope which in 1955 ushered in a round-the-world broadcast by picking up the sound of the stars and has been much in the news for its work in tracking space rockets.

Construction of the Jodrell telescope was Professor Lovell's idea, but tracking Sputniks is only a very small part of his work, which is, in general terms, to extend the exploration of the universe beyond the limits of conventional astronomic observation. For his six lectures, Professor Lovell has taken the title *The Individual and the Universe*, and while he is describing the universe as it is revealed to astronomers by the most advanced techniques of space exploration, he will relate their findings to philosophy and religion and to man's place in the universe.

The series opens with a brief outline of the picture of the universe as seen by the contemporary astronomer. Our knowledge of the universe has been profoundly modified in this generation by great advances both in instruments and in techniques. But, says Professor Lovell in his first lecture, *Astronomy Breaks Free*, the real revolution in astronomy came in past centuries

with the work of men like Copernicus, Kepler, Galileo and Newton.

Professor Lovell goes on to explain some of the theories about *The Origin of the Solar System* including the important recent contributions of contemporary Soviet scientists. It is made clear that any suggestions about the origin of our local planetary system are likely to have a bearing on the fundamental problem of the uniqueness of man.

Another vital question which comes up for examination in the lectures is the relationship between *Astronomy and the State*. Nowadays scientific achievement has become a matter of national importance, and with the development of astronomical techniques using radar-rockets and artificial satellites, the astronomer finds himself using instruments in which the state cannot help but be interested.

Although he has often stated his belief that mankind's survival will depend on scientific research, Professor Lovell is not the type of intellectual who buries himself in his laboratory. Married, and the father of five children, he is from England's West Country and was educated at Kingswood School in Bristol. He is a keen cricketer and gardener, collects unusual plants, and is an amateur musician of no small attainment. In early middle age, he shares the family and sporting pleasures of the ordinary layman.

Heinz Unger

Awarded Mahler Medal

To conduct first Canadian performance of Mahler's Symphony No. 5 on CBC Wednesday Night

Another memorable occasion will transpire this week in the already abundant musical life of Dr. Heinz Unger, the German-born conductor whose busy schedule includes both international appearances as a guest conductor and directorship of Toronto's York Concert Society.

The Bruckner Society of America recently awarded the society's Mahler Medal to Dr. Unger in appreciation of his efforts on behalf of Mahler's music in Canada. Wednesday evening on the stage of Toronto's Massey Hall, the medal will be presented to Dr. Unger by Dr. Geoffrey Waddington, the CBC's director of music and a patron of the York Concert Society. Dr. Unger will then conduct the Toronto Symphony orchestra in

the first Canadian performance of Gustav Mahler's Fifth Symphony. The presentation ceremony and the performance of the symphony will be broadcast as part of CBC Wednesday Night.

Dr. Unger is the second conductor in Canada to be awarded the medal. Past recipients of this honour have included Walter Kaufmann (former conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra), Bruno Walter, Otto Klemperer, Leonard Bernstein, Fritz Reiner, Dimitri Metropoulos, Eugene Ormandy, and Sir Eugene Goossens, who has been guest conductor of the CBC Symphony Orchestra this month.

Unger's unwavering devotion to the music of Mahler dates back to

an evening in pre-war Munich when as a young man he listened entranced to a performance of Mahler's *Song of the Earth* conducted by Bruno Walter. The experience left an indelible mark; he vowed to do all in his power to make Mahler's work current in the concert hall. Through subsequent years, with leading orchestras in many places, he has kept the vow.

In retrospect, Dr. Unger admits his love of Mahler's music is purely personal but he believes everyone could profit musically by listening to Mahler, whose musical expression has particular cogency for man in this modern age.

It should not be construed, however, that Dr. Unger is a "one-composer conductor" for this would be unfair to his musical instincts and untrue to his conducting history. Critics have praised his interpretations of Beethoven, Brahms, Mozart, Schumann, Tchaikovsky, and other "standards" of the concert hall. He also takes a keen interest in the contemporary musical scene—a facet of his musical life

CANADA IN THE CARIBBEAN

A popular tourist conception of the West Indies usually includes the sound of surf, gay laughter, ice tinkling in glasses, lushly orchestrated music, and travel folder scenes of moonlit romance and dancing. It's an attractive picture that annually brings about a winter migration of people from colder climes to the sunny Indies.

Joining this year's migration, however, were 200 or more Canadians whose journey was not prompted by a holiday mood. They were members of a Canadian Chamber of Commerce delegation and exhibitors at Canada's trade fairs in Kingston (January 16 to 25) and Port-of-Spain (February 20 to March 1). Their interest was to sell more Canadian goods in the Western Hemisphere's newest nation—the Federation of the West Indies—and their picture is quite different from the popular tourist conception.

To piece together the picture of Canada-West Indies trade, CBC producer Bob Brazil has planned a two-part documentary called *Canada in the Caribbean*, to be presented this Friday (February 20) and next (February 27) on

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

This looks as though it is going to be a very interesting week for music lovers. First, the opera from the Metropolitan on Saturday (Feb. 21) is Verdi's *Macbeth*, one of his lesser-known works, but one of his most magnificent. It is performed quite frequently in Europe and has been one of the mainstays of the Glyndebourne Festival for the last 20 years and has been revived there many times. With such a magnificent cast as that of Saturday afternoon, we should get a fine performance of this masterpiece. What a pity the Metropolitan is not bringing it to Toronto in May! Surely it is high time they brought something a little out of the well-trodden path of repertoire operas.

Later on Saturday (Feb. 21) in the evening, we can hear the New York Philharmonic concert, at which I notice Bernstein is going to do the *Sheherazade* by Ravel followed by the *Scheherazade* by

Rimsky-Korsakoff. What a good idea in program planning! Although bearing the same name, one could not think of any two works more unlike each other: on the one hand, the extrovert bouncy ballet of Rimsky-Korsakoff, and on the other, the dream-like fragrance of Ravel's music to Klingsor's poems. The soloist is Jenny Tourel.

The Sunday Toronto Symphony *Pop* contains an excellent Canadian work which I had the pleasure of presenting at the Brussels World Fair this last summer, where it scored a great success. This is the *Divertimento* by Oskar Morawetz—a cheerful sunny composition which anybody can appreciate at first hearing. It was given its first performance by the Hart House Orchestra at the Stratford Festival of 1955 and since then has been played a great deal all over the world. I notice also that a *Suite* by Josef Suk is down for Sunday after-

noon. This delightful composer, who incidentally was the son-in-law of Dvorak, is far too seldom heard in this country and I hope that Mr. Susskind, with his expert knowledge of Czech music, will give us some more of this composer in the near future.

On Sunday evening we have a typical Goossens program, which contains only one familiar work—the Second Symphony of Brahms. There is the *Bartholomew Fair* overture of Iain Hamilton, a young British composer who is making a great name for himself and who writes music which can be appreciated at first hearing. Also in the program is a *Suite sur des aires de la vieille France* by Fuleihan. This is an Armenian composer of much excellence, whose works I have had great pleasure in performing myself in the past, and I imagine this suite will turn out to be most interesting. Also, I am delighted to see Murray Adaskin's *Suite for Orchestra* in the same program. This easy-going work should be delightful to listen to and altogether this

promises to be a concert out of the ordinary.

Tuesday (Dominion and French networks) the Montreal Symphony has Bruckner's Eighth Symphony in C Minor. This is one of the best works of this composer and, with the Seventh Symphony, probably represents the finest portion of his output. For many years the Bruckner symphonies were performed in adulterated versions which had been edited by well-meaning friends of the composer, who seemed to imagine that he was incapable of orchestrating his own works properly. Today, we usually hear them in the original versions which were republished about 25 years ago and which startled the musical world into finding that it had been performing these works for many years in a way quite contrary to the composer's original intentions.

As usual the Vancouver Chamber Orchestra gives us music of great interest on Thursday evening. Their program includes a *Notturmo for Strings and Harp* by Irving Fine. This is an American composer who studied with Walter Piston and Nadia Boulanger and was at one time professor at Harvard. There is also a *Rhapsodie Concertante* by Ben Weber, another American composer, not as yet very well known outside the United States. Both these works should be extremely well worth hearing.

On Friday evening on *CBC Concert Hall*, Dr. Charles Peaker is to give an all-Bach recital on the organ and I strongly advise readers to listen to this, if they are able. One of Canada's finest organists, Dr. Peaker's performance, if unconventional at times, are always of the greatest interest.

underlined by his work with The York Concert Society. Now embarking on its seventh season, the society has arranged public performances of fine symphonic music of all periods, conducted by Dr. Unger, including a number of infrequently performed works, compositions by Canadian composers, and placing emphasis on Canadian soloists.

Documentation of Unger's status as an eminent Mahlerian would not be complete without additional noteworthy data. In January, 1958, he directed the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and the Bach-Elgar Choir of Hamilton in the first Canadian performance of Mahler's gigantic Second ("Resurrection") Symphony, with Lois Marshall and Claramae Turner as soloists. Last summer he joined the honorary board of directors of the newly formed Gustav Mahler Society of America, the invitation coming from Mrs. Alma Mahler Werfel, widow of the composer. In a recent tour abroad he conducted major

orchestras in England, Germany and Spain and directed the BBC Symphony in a performance of Mahler's *Song of the Earth* which was recorded for broadcast next year as part of the Mahler centenary celebrations. He has been invited by the BBC to record further Mahler works for the same project.

Now in his 63rd year, Heinz Unger was born in Berlin and received his education at the universities of Berlin and Munich and at the Conservatory of Berlin. From 1919 to 1933 his musical activities in Germany included conducting the Berlin Philharmonic and founding and conducting his own mixed choir. He was guest conductor of a number of German orchestras and also conducted in Oslo, Vienna, and in many Russian cities. In 1933, Dr. Unger left Berlin as the Nazis took over and moved to London, England, where he became a naturalized British subject. He was the conductor of the Northern Philharmonic Orchestra in Leeds and guest conducted many of the major British symphony orchestras.

During his residence in England he made many guest appearances abroad and in 1937 visited Canada for the first time as a guest conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. He liked what he saw and during the war years looked forward to returning. In 1947 his hopes were realized and he has lived in Toronto since that time.

In 1952, Dr. Unger conducted a series of public concerts for the Argentine State Radio in Buenos Aires and in 1954 the series was repeated. In 1955-56 he was invited by the late William Furtwaengler to conduct concerts by the Berlin Philharmonic—and so it has gone, as Dr. Unger has maintained his international reputation while contributing substantially to the musical life of his adopted country through the York Concert Society, and appearances with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, the Promenade Symphony Orchestra, the CBC in Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver and Montreal, and concerts at the Stratford music festivals.

CBC Trans-Canada. The documentary will employ narration, on-location sounds and music and special interviews to trace the development of the trade, exploring its strengths and weaknesses and considering the future prospects.

Canada in the Caribbean opens with Canadian and West Indian voices in business discussion over a background of bustling trade fair sounds. Trade between Canada and the West Indies is nothing new, it asserts, but has been going on for over 300 years. At one time Bluenose schooners called in at West Indian ports with salt cod and timber and took on rum and sugar for the return voyage. Later the C.N.R. "Lady" boats plied steadily between the two countries and their arrivals were important and joyous punctuations in the life of the islands. The schooners and Lady boats established a sentimental and commercial link between Canada and the West Indies which still is strong even though, for the most part, foreign ships now carry the

commerce between the two countries. Yet, in spite of this enduring link, certain problems hamper trade.

What are these problems? Well, let's start with bananas. "Day O, Day O . . ."—remember the *Banana Boat Song* which swept the country not so long ago? The women of Jamaica sang it for years before it made the hit parade, and for good reason. When the banana boat calls at a West Indian port it's a big day there; it means work for everyone—the men stacking "stems" inside the ship, the women carrying the heavy

stems on their heads, the check clerk with a bell keeping count. It does not, however, mean bananas for Canada. Jamaican bananas go to Britain, not Canada, and in showing why, the documentary will reveal the reason as part of a larger problem which unties all West Indian-Canadian trade—the West Indies' dollar shortage.

In a continuing survey in sound, reasons are sought for Canada's great effort to sell more in this relatively difficult market and how she can actively improve trade.
