"Here is the CBC News"

THE swift pace of events in this last half of the twentieth century has created a great hunger for more and more news among people the world over. And most of these people are depending on radio and television to bring them up-to-the-minute information on local, national and international affairs. That's just what the CBC news service has been striving to do since it was formed nearly two decades ago.

In order to better understand the functions of the news service, a brief description of its organization might be helpful. The hub of activity is in Toronto, where the national radio and television newsrooms are located. Our overseas correspondents and cameramen get their assignments from there, and Canadian stories of national importance or interest are distributed from Toronto. But supplying the various regional needs in Canada are newsrooms in St. John's, Newfoundland; Halifax, Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg and Vancouver.

The Prairie Newsroom in Winnipeg is typical of these six regional operations. The staff of ten editors

prepares the great bulk of radio and television news heard and seen on CBC stations in the three prairie provinces, and provides the items from the region used on national bulletins from Toronto.

In this first article on the news service I'll deal with radio, which in spite of the explosive growth of television, has become a more important distributor of news than ever before. The main reason for the expansion of news in radio is immediacy and flexibility which television so far has not been able to match.

Direct Reports

There has been a greater use of direct reports, especially during the early morning news periods. Through these direct reports the listener is transported immediately to the spot where the news is happening, whether it be Hong Kong, London or Moscow or anywhere else in the world. Experienced CBC reporters such as James M. Minifie in Washington, Stanley Burke at the United Nations, Don Gordon in London, Douglas LaChance in Paris and Bill Stevenson in Hong Kong have become well known to Canadians through direct reports from their news beats.

We have often been asked by listeners how we get these reports so quickly from overseas. If we use London as an example, it's really quite simple. The time difference between Europe and our national newsroom works to our advantage in that much of the news of the day has broken overseas before we in Canada are out of bed. In the early morning hours editors in Toronto have been in touch with the CBC news bureau in London, which in turn has collected up to the minute reports from various

places in Western Europe where the news is happening. Most of these were fed by broadcast line to London, where they were recorded. Then at a pre-set time each morning all the European reports are fed to Toronto by broadcast line under the ocean, where they are recorded again a few minutes before they are put together in a package with reports from other world centres. Less than an hour has elapsed between the London feed and the time the first direct report program is beamed across Canada. This works fine for items where an hour or two does not make much difference to the story. But when a spot news story is in progress in Europe it must be up to the minute, so another method is used. The reporter on the scene in this case may broadcast direct to Canada by short wave radio, where his item is recorded just minutes ahead of the news or where his report may be inserted live in the Direct Report period.

Wire Service

Although direct reports have given news a greater impact, the news service still relies heavily on the outside news agencies. The wires of the Canadian Press and United Press International are fed into all CBC newsrooms. The first of these—the Canadian Press—is a co-operative news agency to which most of the newspapers in Canada belong. Stories written by reporters on these papers also go to the Canadian Press. From these newspaper stories and from copy supplied by its own reporters and correspondents the news agency files a continuous wire to all parts of Canada. Much of its international news originates with Reuters, the famous British news agency, and with Associated Press of the United States. The second news agency filing a continuous run of news into CBC locations—United Press Inter-



Television in Calgary

Last article in an 11-week series on prairie television stations

Calgary's continually stampeding CHCT-TV ranks with the top private television stations in Canada, continually leading the way with imaginative production, programming ideas and public service in the community of 72,700 TV homes which it serves.

One morning last fall a weary studio crew turned off the lights for the first time in eight days, and stumbled off to celebrate the longest stretch of continuous telecasting any Canadian station had ever put on the air. In 188 hours on the air to celebrate Canadian Television Week, with only 15 seconds interruption to replace a transmitter tube, CHCT-TV had tripled its local live programs, quadrupled the diet of feature film. With the time remaining, CHCT-TV went in for experiments, searching for new talent, a comedy show written by a station photographer, a Steve Allen-ish "Tonight" show that featured lady cops, cubs and bicycle races. For its efforts the station picked up the TV Reps Award for promotion for the second consecutive year and the Liberty Magazine "Showmanship" Award for promotion for the third year in a row.

TV veteran, Channel 2 manager H. S. Stewart, 34, who took over the reins in January, 1954, recently acted as chairman of a committee which drafted the CAB television Code of Ethics, an industry-written, self-enforced set of TV standards for programs and commercials, this year expects it to be officially adopted by all Canadian private television stations.

More than ten local live productions originate weekly at Channel 2, supervised by production manager Barry Gordon, an eight-year veteran of television with training in Hollywood, New York and

several other Canadian TV stations. One of these local programs, "Let's Play Charades," attracted a team of four people from Saskatchewan. For eight weeks the team drove or made airline reservations all the way from Regina to compete on the show. This team will appear in the finals of this program, first prize being a European holiday. A vocational guidance show, "I Choose a Career," produced in co-operation with a local service club, has been successfully copied by two other prairie stations.

The lead in the 'teen field on Canadian television is held by the Calgary station, which originated the first regular such show, TEEN TIME. The original producer-emcee of TEEN TIME, Ken Fobes, is now in Hollywood attending classes at the Pasadena Playhouse. His dream is an all North American television show for teenagers, which he visualizes as a network origination being fed to U.S. stations which he describes as, "a reverse hands across the border idea." Portions of the original TEEN TIME are now incorporated into the regular 90-minute Saturday afternoon JEANS AND JIMS show.

Enterprising Ed Walen heads an active local news and sports set-up that covers as many as 20,000 miles a year digging out and reporting stories of local interest.

Last year Vern Kent's photo department shot and processed more than 28 miles of local news and sports footage for use on news and sports shows.

CHCT-TV studios and offices are located in a residential district in southwest Calgary. A short-range micro-link connects the station with the transmitter, 12 miles from city centre on the old Banff Coach Road.

national—gets its news from papers in the United States and other countries, and from its own people in the field.

It's obvious that the great flow of news from CBC correspondents and the two main news agencies can't all be broadcast. The volume of copy is so great that it would be necessary to broadcast just about 24 hours a day of nothing but news to get it all in. Of course this is not practical, and anyway so much of what is received would be of little or no interest to the majority of listeners. Here's where the editors in each CBC newsroom step in. They must read everything received in the newsroom, and they must select what they consider to be the most significant of the news. After the items have been selected, the editors must sit down and write the story for you—the listener. He may have 2,000 words from various news agency despatches on one particular story. It would take an announcer about 15 minutes to read all that copy, and the listener would be bored to tears. What the editor does is take the meat from the story and write it into a script that will tell the whole story accurately and simply. He may boil it down to just 100 words, which would take less than a minute to read. This has to be done with every item used in CBC newscasts.

You can see that a great deal of responsibility rests with each editor. He has to decide what is news, and how it should be presented to you. It is for this reason that only news people of long experience and good judgment are selected to staff CBC newsrooms.

The integrity of the CBC news service is impressed upon all editors. They must work by its policy, which is based on the primary conception that this service is in the nature of a public trust; to present by radio and television all the significant news of the day's happenings in Canada and abroad factually, without bias or distortion, without tendentious comment, and in a clear and unambiguous style.

Evolution of A TV Script

CBC Winnipeg TV drama producer Arthur Zigouras describes the background of this week's play on CBWT

When I first received William Paluk's *Taken at the Flood* it was a run-of-the-mill melodrama about the 1950 Winnipeg flood, complete with gangsters, bootleggers, and all the accoutrements of a 1939 mystery.

I would have quickly discarded it except for two things: the unique conflict of ideas between the two main characters (who were in real contrast to the other cardboard characters) and the fact that the plot situation was directly related to an event that affected all of Winnipeg. It was a true local play by a local writer.

In short, I felt that *Taken at the Flood* was "right" for local production, but that it needed re-writing and re-working. Fortunately William Paluk (who is a member of my class at the University of Manitoba Evening Institute) is a serious writer. He has written many short stories, is working on a novel, and like most writers he is prepared to re-write many times, so we went to work.

His first problem was to eliminate the gangsterism from the play. This turned out to be easy because although Bill at first thought that this was the best part of the play he found after re-working it, that the two main characters—the mysterious and incurably romantic Elaine, and the tough, cynical policeman, Jack—took over the play.

His second problem was to tighten the script to our production needs. Winnipeg's studio is small and cannot handle more than three realistic sets. Bill again had to eliminate, and in doing so he created a tauter script.

He was now at the stage where he had a good conflict growing between the boy and girl and an interesting sub-plot about money taken from a flooded building, but his resolution of the drama was weak and forced. This problem

seemed, at times, insurmountable, but, through an involvement of the two main characters, Bill finally evolved the play.

Although *Taken at the Flood* was now ready for production there were still kinks to be ironed out. The well-known television and Broadway playwright Morton Wisengrad once said that he learned a great deal about dialogue by watching actors "mangle" and "transpose" his lines—lines that he had thought were grand, great lines. Bill will go through the same process when he sits in on the rehearsals of *Taken at the Flood*. During rehearsal there are bound to be changes, deletions and questions, all of which will give Bill an insight into the difficult and delicate art of writing a play.

Thursday on "Explorations"

"Of Love and Marriage"

"It is customary (with a few exceptions) for a man to court a girl simply because he finds her enchanting and would like to be enchanted for the rest of his life. The logic of this is obscure, though the desire is intelligible enough."

These are George Whalley's views, on which he will elaborate (with the help of a number of entertaining dramatic examples) on CBC-TV's *Explorations* this Thursday evening. Whalley, a former commander in the Royal Navy, is now a professor of English at Queen's University and is the author of several books of criticism. In this program, broadly titled *Of Love and Marriage*, he will offer a literary counterpart to *A Little Study of Love* which Rita Greer Allen undertook last October in the same series.

"It is customary today to marry for love," says *Explorations* organizer Eric Koch, "and love appears to us as the only respectable motive for marriage. But until relatively recently other elements, such as social status and property, were far more important reasons for marriage than love. It is, in fact, only the emancipation of women, the ever-growing equality of the sexes, which has made love the preponderant reason for, and the justification of, marriage."

"This is George Whalley's main thesis. He is neither a social historian nor a psychiatrist, but a literary man, for whom letters, novels, poems and plays are the most revealing sources; so his talk will consist in a large part of staged excerpts from famous authors like Bernard Shaw, Eugene O'Neill, Dr. Samuel Johnson and Boris Pasternak, and from some obscure writings from as far back as the 12th century.

"One of Whalley's points is that our concept of romantic love goes back to the curious ritual of Courtly Love, to the minstrels and trouba-

dours of the Middle Ages who introduced refinement, delicacy and good manners into the art of love-making—an art which had formerly been practiced along somewhat brisker lines."

All this, Koch feels, is by no means of interest only as a kind of curiosity to the academic historian. "Our ideas of romantic love," he says, "traced back to the early Middle Ages, have a distinct bearing on mid-20th century divorce statistics. The questions arise whether marriages should be considered binding only while romantic passion lasts, and what is it, if

not permanent romantic passion, which should make marriages last permanently? Whalley's views on these questions, and those of the many writers he will draw on, should throw fresh light on some age-old problems which lie at the very roots of our private and our public lives."

Whalley, a 1936 Rhodes Scholar, regards the program as "an essay exploring the topic rather than an authoritative statement by an expert."

"I am not in possession of any answers on this subject—or on any other," he says. "In all by broadcasting I have tended to use a documentary method, relying as far as possible upon actual written material—letters, journals, poems—selecting, arranging and placing them together in such a way that



Meet Your N.H.L. Stars

Sixteenth in a series of articles on N.H.L. stars to be seen in action on Saturday night telecasts over the CBC-TV network.



16. Jean Beliveau

Jean Beliveau was undoubtedly the most publicized young player ever to enter the National Hockey League. As a Junior in the Quebec area he was labelled a sure "superstar" but he seemed reluctant to move up to the big time.

When he completed his junior hockey he played with the Quebec Aces in the minor professional leagues and rumor has it that he made more money there than anyone else did in the N.H.L. Nicknamed "Le Gros Bill," Beliveau was idolized in Quebec as Maurice Richard was in Montreal and he had no desire to compete with the "Rocket."

He had short trials in the N.H.L. in 1950-51 and again in 1952-53 and looked so good both times the Canadiens realized they had to get him regardless of the cost. In those five games he scored six goals and added an assist.

In 1953, the Canadiens acquired Beliveau by giving him an unprecedented five year contract at a reported \$20,000 per year. Everyone's favourite target in his first year, the much-ballyhooed rookie suffered a fractured cheek and leg; played only 43 games and scored a

disappointing 13 goals and 21 assists.

The following season big Jean played all seventy games, netted 37 goals and was chosen to the first all-star team. In spite of his size he was still being pushed around because he shied away from over-rough play, but in 1955 he was told to "get tough." The lamb became a lion overnight; the gentlemanly Beliveau was mean and aggressive, winding up the season with 143 minutes in the penalty box. It is notable, of course, that his new style paid off with a terrific season. He scored 47 goals (the most ever scored in the N.H.L. by a centre); won the point-getting championship with 88 points; was selected to the first all-star team; and won the Hart trophy as the league's Most Valuable Player.

Beliveau followed up his great 1955-56 season with two more good years although he missed 15

games last year and his point production dropped noticeably.

His full record to the beginning of this season showed 193 goals and 218 assists in 364 regular season and play-off games. He is continuing his better than a point-a-game production this season and has a good chance at another scoring championship.

The biggest forward in the N.H.L., Beliveau stands 6 ft. 1 in., and weighs 205. He was born at Three Rivers, Quebec, on August 31, 1931.

young cousin, Molly, whom he loves, is played by Katharine Blake. Captain John Tregarthen, the captive British officer is played by Patrick MacNee, and Michael's old friend and ally, Sean Kelly, is played by Douglas Campbell.

Freedom of the estate is given Captain Tregarthen as a paroled prisoner in the custody of Michael O'Riordan. His stay at the estate is ensured by his obvious co-operation and honour and he becomes a recognized member of the manor household. Blindness has mellowed Michael's soldierly temperament, and with this new philosophical outlook, he considers John an honourable soldier and a true friend.

The atrocious and senseless slaughter of three IRA compatriots by the loathed "Black and Tan" prompts the IRA to resort to reprisals. Michael is selected to choose by lottery the name of an English prisoner to be executed. The name he draws is that of his friend and prisoner Captain John Tregarthen. Playwright Joseph O'Connor is perhaps best known for his acting ability, his first role was in *Julius Caesar* on the stage of London's Embassy Theatre in 1939. Since then he has played in modern drama and motion pictures, as well as Shakespearean theatre. He originally wrote *The Iron Harp* for Katharine Blake, but she left England before its completion, and when the play opened in Guildford, actress Linda Dixon played the role of Molly. Miss Blake's portrayal of Molly in the *Folio* presentation will be her first performance in a play she could feasibly call all her own. She started acting in London, and a role in John Gielgud's stage production of *Cradle Song* led to many others in BBC radio dramas and London theatre productions. She has also appeared in several movies, such as *Saturday Island*, *Hunted*, and *The Dark Light*. Miss Blake started in Canadian television in 1953 and has since played leading roles in many CBC-TV

Christian. Last fall he wrote a major Wednesday Night production based on Helen Waddell's *Peter Abelard*. He has written and broadcast two series of talks on poetry, has read his own verse on *Anthology* and contributed to the *Architects of Modern Thought* series. He has done several programs for CBC television, a major one being *An Introduction to Aesthetics on Exploring Minds*, a fore-runner of *Explorations*. He is currently working on a television adaptation of *Death in the Barren Ground*.

dramas. She was recently voted "best actress of 1958" in a national TV poll.

Pat McGoohan is an Irishman who has been described as "a forthright intellectual with a point of view." A quiet-spoken man, he is at his best when playing harsher characterizations such as his roles in the movies, *Hell Drivers* and *High Tide at Noon*.

Douglas Campbell, who portrays the patriot Sean Kelly, is generally credited as the man who brought legitimate theatre to the small Canadian community. Leading a group of Canadian Players, he toured such unlikely theatre locales as Moosonee, Noranda and Rouyn, bringing Shakespeare and George Bernard Shaw to many people for the first time. Campbell has played important roles in the English repertory theatre and with the Old Vic.

Patrick MacNee, who plays Captain Tregarthen, made his television debut in England in 1946 and has since appeared in some 300 television dramas on the BBC and CBC. He has appeared in U.S. television drama and in several movies, notably *Les Girls* and *Until they Sail*.

Place Name Guide

W. H. Brodie, CBC's supervisor of broadcast language, has again revised and extended a guide to the pronunciation of Canadian place names, published by the CBC in 1938 and 1947 for the use of announcers. The new edition, a booklet of some 32 pages, will be available around the end of March at 50 cents a copy (from CBC Information Services, Box 500, Toronto). In his preface, Mr. Brodie says: "Even with ordinary, everyday English words the relation between spelling and pronunciation is far from consistent. From Great Britain one

might cite Hardenhuish, pronounced Harnish, or Lord Home, pronounced Hume. Similar anomalies arise in connection with Canadian names; moreover in Canada as in Great Britain there are a number of names which either have two or more alternative pronunciations in the same locality, or are pronounced differently in different parts of Canada, e.g., Dalhousie with -how in New Brunswick but with -hoo in Ontario." Pointing out that such a list of Canadian place names in common use can never be complete, Mr. Brodie adds it is no exaggeration to say that what is today a remote spot in a wilderness may in a

few years be the site of a large town. There was no Kitimat in the 1938 edition of the guide.

Allen and Allan

Robert Allen, CBC-TV's supervising producer of special programs, will leave for Britain on April 22 to produce a one-hour drama for Globe Productions, an independent TV "packaging" company which prepares special drama productions for showing on British commercial TV networks.

Discussions now are going on between Mr. Allen and officials of the British company to decide which play he will produce.

The drama will be telecast on June 5 and Allen expects to be in the United Kingdom for approximately six weeks.

Allen is conducting negotiations with Cecil Clarke, a senior official of Globe Productions. Mr. Clarke served as artistic director of the Stratford (Ont.) Festival in 1954 and directed the Festival's production of Measure for Measure that year.

Drama producer Andrew Allan can be found, these days, playing the role of Lord Elgin—the man who made self-government in Canada a reality—in the first of a new film series produced by the National Film Board. The film is being shot in a Montreal studio, and in actual locations including the former residence of Lord Elgin, now the Villa Marie convent. Allan was an actor before becoming a producer, and in this NFB film he has a role particularly suitable quite apart from his great interest in historical drama — when made up, he bears a striking resemblance to portraits of Lord Elgin.

To Judge is not to Condemn

14th-Century Mystic

Producer John Reeves describes Richard Rolle, whose "Meditation on the Passion" precedes the performance of Bach's "St. Matthew Passion" this week on CBC Wednesday Night

Richard Rolle, whose life almost exactly spanned the first half of the fourteenth century, was a hermit who devoted all of his adult years to the solitary life, to the contemplation of Divine Love, and to the instruction of others both by the written word and by personal exhortation. His influence on English religious thought, during his lifetime and afterwards, was great and has long been recognized. That he exerted an almost equally great influence on English letters has been less recognized, for the literature of his century is dominated by the giant figures of Langland and Chaucer; it is, however, true that much of the credit must be given to him for the development of a vernacular prose style and, as a writer of short lyrics, he must justly be reckoned one of the major poets of his age.

Born and raised a countryman, in Yorkshire, he was sent to Oxford for his education. There, at the age of eighteen, he received a vocation to the contemplative life, not in its perhaps easier form as a monk, but in its most austere and difficult form as a hermit. He fled from Oxford immediately and retired to a wild and desolate region in his native county. Here, dressed as a hermit and living in complete solitude, he gave himself up to the contemplation and worship of God. Shortly afterwards he emerged from solitude to preach a remarkable sermon in a country church which attracted much attention and brought him to the notice of a rich patron, who from then on provided him with the basic necessities of life so that he was enabled to ful-

fil his vocation untroubled by worldly cares.

During the years that followed, the devoutness of his life and the sanctity of his character brought him a large reputation. This would probably have remained merely local but for the fact that he was not only a born contemplative but

also a born writer. He wrote many Latin treatises, whose appeal was of course confined to the then narrow circle of the educated; but, apart from these, he wrote many homilies, meditations, epistles, and poems in English which circulated widely and whose popularity is attested by the great number of manuscripts in which they survive. The *Meditation on the Passion* belongs probably to his later years and shows him at his best, both as a religious thinker and as a prose stylist: it is filled with mystical ardour but never marred with gro-

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL, Dean, Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto

It is hard to believe that Alban Berg's *Wozzeck* is to have its first Metropolitan performance this season, but apparently it is so, and we are to hear the first broadcast on Saturday afternoon (March 14). Probably the most famous opera since Wagner, and the work about which more has been written and argued than anything since the *Sacre du printemps*, *Wozzeck* has by now become part of the repertoire of theatres the world over. For those of you who are listening to *Wozzeck* for the first time, a word of warning. Do not expect to hear anything like the kind of opera you are accustomed to. You will certainly be at first mystified, then maybe horrified, but eventually, if you stick it out, I guarantee that you will have an overwhelming artistic experience.

This opera is one of the few works written in the atonal system established by Schoenberg to have attained what looks rather like the status of a classic. First produced in 1925 in Berlin, under Kleiber, it

is a setting of a famous play by Buechner. The music is continuous and there are many scenes, some of which have to be changed very rapidly. A feature of the music is that each scene of the play is set in a definite musical form. For instance, the first act is entitled *Five Character Pieces* and there are five scenes with titles such as *Suite*, *Military March*, *Passacaglia*, etc., the music taking these forms. Act II is called *Six Inventions* and Scene 1 is entitled *Invention on a Theme*, Scene 2 *Invention on one note* and Scene 3 *Three Inventions on a rhythm*, etc. So that the whole opera, besides being a play set to music, is also a musical composition in the strictest form, with the play as background. The composer, however, gave a warning that we should not take too much notice of these musical forms while we are listening to the opera, but to be filled only by the idea of the whole work, an idea which far transcends

**World Hockey
 Final—"Live"
 from Prague**

Veteran hockey commentator Foster Hewitt will be in Prague, Czechoslovakia, to bring listeners a play-by-play description of the world hockey final Sunday, March 15.

With Hewitt will be Thom Benson of the CBC outside broadcasts department, who will supply the colour commentary and interview hockey celebrities between periods.

Starting time for the hockey final, which is expected to find Canada (Belleville MacFarlanes) playing Russia, is 8:00 a.m. on CBW, and 7:00 a.m. on CBK and CBX.

Immediately prior to the broadcast of the game there will be a special 15-minute world hockey review. Hewitt and Benson will give a run-down on the tournament and conduct interviews with the players.

Broadcast arrangements were made by CBC in co-operation with the European Broadcasting Union. Transmission by land line will be made from Prague to London, England, and then via the Trans-Atlantic cable to Canada.

This will mark the fourth time that Hewitt will have been behind a CBC microphone for the world hockey final. He described his first final in 1955 at Krefeld, Germany; was at Cortina, Italy, in 1956; and last year was in Oslo, Norway, when the Whitby Dunlops defeated Russia in the final. (Canada did not have a team in the 1957 world hockey championships, held in Moscow.)

The voice of Saturday night hockey in Canada for more than 20 years, Hewitt began his announcing career in 1923. This season marks his 25th year as a hockey



tesque conceits, it is passionate and personal but never lacks the common touch, it is intensely devout but never sanctimonious; and its sentiments are couched in a language at once lucid, direct, and simple-hearted, yet always eloquent.

The *Meditation* follows the events of the Passion, describing and commenting on them in chronological order. The radio version of the text (in which the English has been slightly modernized) treats each step of the Passion as a separate section, and between each section there has been interpolated a short passage of rhymed verse from a fourteenth century poem which bears the same title as Rolle's work and is close to him both in spirit and style; so much so, in fact, that the poem contains quotations from Rolle and was quite obviously written under his influence. The larger part of the script, however, is Rolle's prose and, as such, it is hoped the broadcast will reflect one of the great achievements of the Age of Faith.

The ones which command support among a great many contem-

An Australian Looks at Canada

by FRED ALEXANDER, Head of the History Department, University of Western Australia

(from a broadcast on the CBC Trans-Canada network)

Most English-speaking Canadians and an increasing minority of French-Canadians today recognize and accept the hard fact of American cultural penetration in a host of different ways. Obvious examples are provided by periodical literature and comic strips; by American-type TV and radio programs; and by many of the gadgets which contribute to the everyday life north as well as south of the "undefended frontier."

But this is only one side of the picture. On the other side should be put the evident determination of responsible Canadians to offset this pervasive penetration from the south by deliberate concentration on improved facilities for the maintenance and development of a distinctively Canadian way of life—political, social, literary, artistic, and, if I may use the word in its broadest sense, spiritual.

Of this determination to fight to preserve a distinctive Canadian cultural identity two examples must suffice: Canadian universities and the CBC.

Higher education in Canada is evidently fighting hard to develop its own characteristics. In the many universities I visited I was impressed by the greater importance devoted to standards of undergraduate teaching and by the greater reluctance to accept purely utilitarian fields of activity than is

porary astronomers are the evolutionary theories. The Abbe Lemaitre, for example, postulates a primaevial atom which disintegrated between twenty and sixty thousand millions years ago and thus started the process by which the universe evolved to its present state. Speculation about what was before this event takes us beyond the beginning of time, out of physics into metaphysics.

The last of Dr. Lovell's talks, next Tuesday, will also deal with the origin of the universe.

customary in many universities south of the border. I was impressed, too, by the persistence of Old World traditions in many Canadian universities, English-speaking as well as French-speaking.

As to my second example, the CBC, all I can say here is that I see this institution as the greatest single instrument for preserving and strengthening a distinctive Canadian outlook in matters political, social, and cultural, not only against too pervasive a penetration from the south but also against the potentially centrifugal forces of Canada's own history and geography.

This last point is of great importance. No foreign observer who works his way across Canada from coast to coast could ignore the continuing though changing strength of the forces of regionalism which he encounters. There is, for example, the southward pull he detects in British Columbia, where the Rockies are almost an intellectual as well as a physical barrier. Further east he's impressed by the staidness and lack of variety in the prairie provinces, by the smug self-satisfaction met with in Ontario by the persistent particularism of Quebec, and by the rather sad eco-

The text of the "St. Matthew Passion" is based on the 27th and 28th Chapters of St. Matthew, and was written by Christian Friedrich Henrici in 1728. Bach completed the musical setting of it in 1729 and the work was first performed on Good Friday of that year in the Thomaskirche, Leipzig. After Bach's death it was not performed until Mendelssohn revived it, against considerable opposition, and had it performed by the Singakademie in Berlin in 1829.

Among the soloists in tonight's performance are two Winnipeg singers—soprano Belva Boroditsky, who has been singing in opera in England and Europe, and bass Peter Van Ginkel, who is studying in Montreal. (Full cast this page).

George Little and the Montreal Bach choir toured the United Kingdom and several European cities last summer and received an ovation of cheering at the Edinburgh Festival, the chief engagement on the tour. Founded nearly seven years ago by George Little, the choir is composed of 30 young men and women. A Professor Fosbery is attempting to collect the authentic, indigenous stories, tall tales and folk songs of the prairies from the residents of Level Plains, Saskatchewan.

The residents of Level Plains are suspicious of the professor, who is working under a Canada Council grant, for Wilbur Botts, the local

M.P., had told them what the Canada Council meant — "Fifty million dollars of the taxpayers' money down the drain for culture! Fifty million dollars to support old-maid poets and long-haired artists you couldn't tell whether their pictures was upside down!"

But when the residents of Level Plains learn that Professor Fosbery is willing to pay for "authentic folk literature," and think of the payments due on their curling rink, they are soon telling Mr. Botts—"If I was you, Wilbur I'd keep my big blabbermouth shut about the Canada Council! Ain't you learned yet, Wilbur, that a nation's greatness is founded on its culture?"

Soon the local curling enthusiasts are preparing their own versions of songs available on L.P. records, and passing them off to the unknowing professor as "songs my mother taught me." Professor Fosbery finds them "superb examples of ballad adaptation with incremental repetition."

conomic remoteness of the once highly significant Maritime provinces. All these regional factors I felt and must objectively record, yet they are outweighed in my final analysis by the potentially unifying influence I kept encountering throughout Canada. The CBC is one concrete manifestation of this widespread belief in Canada's destiny as a nation; I would add others less tangible but no less significant. Among these I'd stress the latent idealism of the Canadian peoples, as revealed, for example, in their responsiveness in a variety of ways to religious influence, Protestant as well as Catholic.

the individual fate of *Wozzeck*, the chief character.

Much of the vocal writing can be described as "musically defined speech." Rhythm and intonation are written out exactly, but in the execution, each note is only defined in the moment when it is articulated. Immediately afterwards the voice drops or rises as in natural speech. I haven't space here to tell you the whole story, but Milton Cross will, of course, do that on Saturday. I know that the whole thing sounds rather forbidding when described in this way, but you will find, especially in the orchestral interludes, a weird unearthly beauty unlike that of any other composition I know. Don't miss *Wozzeck*.

On Sunday night on the CBC Symphony concert you will be able to hear one of Handel's most beautiful cantatas and the final scene from *Capriccio*, which was the last opera Richard Strauss wrote. The whole work takes the form of a discussion as to the relative importance of words and music in an opera, so that we have, in other words, an opera on the subject of opera. The different characters argue for and against the words or music being predominant, as the case may be. There is a Countess who is the central figure, and each character finds his attitude to opera reflected symbolically in his relationship to her. It is an ingenious idea, but it always seems to me it never quite comes off in performance and although the music is of great beauty, especially the final scene which you will hear and where the Countess is left alone on the stage, the whole thing seems to lack dramatic impact.

I notice that the Ottawa Orchestra is to perform Handel's *Water Music* in the "original version" on Friday afternoon. I am especially interested because I didn't know that it had ever been decided what the "original version" really was! The collection of pieces by Handel which has become known through the years as the *Water Music* consists of about 26 movements from which various suites have been made by different arrangers. That some of this music must have been performed at the water parties which were fashionable in Handel's time, is quite probable, but we do know that the oft-repeated story of Handel having written it to put the King in a good mood after the estrangement between him and the composer is just a legend, although a very good one. We know this because, in recent years, it has been discovered that the particular water party at which some of these pieces may have been played took place three years after the King and Handel had been reconciled.

On Tuesday evening I see the Toronto Symphony Orchestra (Dominion and French Networks) has a bit of Wagner down in its program. The argument as to whether the music from Wagner's

operas, other, that is, than the set overtures, should be performed at concerts, has raged for years. There is much to be said both for and against. Tovey described a Wagner program as "bleeding chunks of butcher's meat" and protested all his life against small sections of this wonderful music being torn from its context, thus making it all but meaningless. On the other hand, if these pieces were not performed occasionally at concerts, the vast majority of people would never hear them at all, because Wagnerian performances on a proper scale are few and far between. The excerpt to be heard on Tuesday night, from the first act of *The Twilight of the Gods*, is played in the theatre when the curtain is down between two scenes while Siegfried is supposed to be making his journey down the Rhine. Owing to the very nature of the continuous music of Wagner's operas, the piece neither begins nor ends anywhere. Some conductors have tried to get over this difficulty by adding a few bars at the beginning and end in order to make it into more of a concert piece, but that, of course, is not really legitimate. Wagner, we know, disliked these concert performances, but from sheer financial necessity, had to give so many of them during his lifetime, that I think he eventually became more or less resigned to them.


