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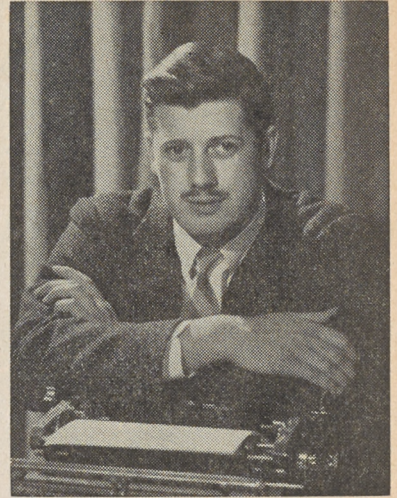

A Sportscaster's Job

takes 24 hours a day, but most of them wouldn't change it for anything, says . . .

There is one thing wrong with sportscasting.

The clock on the wall over the microphone never stops.

The second hand always ticks its way to broadcast time and if the sportscaster is at a hockey game, baseball or football game or some more delicate affair, such as a cocktail party to publicize an upcoming event, he must leave in order to get to the studio on time.

Unlike his fellow announcers with the CBC, who have their newscasts written for them by the newsroom staff, the sportscaster must compile his own material. He uses the same sources for national and international day-to-day happenings—the wire services in the newsroom—but he must keep on top of the local sports picture, and to do this he must be on the go all

the time to obtain new material. The sportscaster is his own reporter when it comes to local events although he must rely on the wire services to keep him completely covered. It stands to reason he can't be in more than one place at a time. However, there have been times when a sportscaster has covered a baseball game in the morning, a golf match in the afternoon and a football game at night.

This involves a great deal of time and sometimes, it seems, more than the 24 hours in a day.

Here in Winnipeg, where there are three professional teams, the football Blue Bombers, the hockey Warriors and the baseball Gold-eyes, life can be extremely complicated but also highly interesting.

It is necessary to keep in touch with these organizations every day,

even though it may be March and the football club is months away from its season, or June and the hockey players are spending all their time on the golf course. Winnipeg has a unique situation in that hockey, baseball and football clubs all have their offices in the Winnipeg Arena and one trip to the Arena each day may cover all fields.

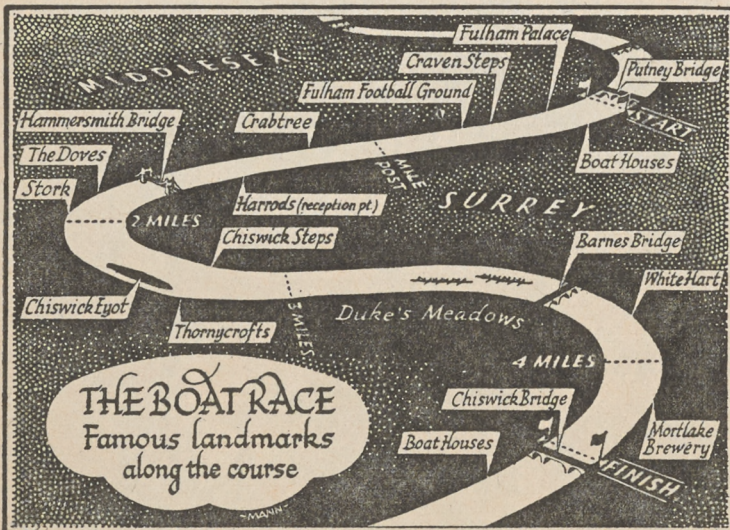
But the three professional clubs don't begin to blanket the sports field and continual touch must be kept with curling and golf, minor baseball and hockey, horse racing, boxing, etc.

Depending on the number of sportscasts daily (the average is two), the day usually starts around 6:30 in the morning. The morning sportscast must be written for broadcast around eight o'clock. The rest of the morning is usually devoted to answering mail, keeping up the files, and doing other routine jobs. The afternoon is spent making the rounds of the various organizations and then the late afternoon is devoted to preparing the supper-hour sportscast. A sportscaster's evening is usually spent in a rink, ball park or gymnasium. He gets home around 11 o'clock at night.

Rare indeed is the sportscaster who doesn't have "extra" shows besides his regular sportscasts. Such shows as *Bob Moir on Football* and *Prairie Sports Final* are among these. The preparation for these

Vanda King began in show business as a female Elvis Presley. Now a regular television performer on *Saturday Date with Billy O'Connor*, and just recently past her 16th birthday (on Feb. 28), her style is subtly becoming more sophisticated.

She enjoys singing ballads as much as the rock 'n' roll songs that launched her career at a summer resort in the Muskoka district of Ontario.

It was an only slightly subdued Vanda that viewers beheld on *'Cross-Canada Hit Parade* in her TV debut in January '57. Teen-agers were then shooting rock 'n' roll to the top of popularity polls. Since then teenage tastes seem to have changed. Ballads are appearing more often in the top ten. Vanda's tastes have changed too.

"I still like Elvis, of course," she says, "but I find I really enjoy singing the ballads."

"They like to see their daughter singing more lady-like songs," laughs Vanda, "although, unlike a lot of parents, mine got a big kick out of rock 'n' roll—at least when I was singing it. Vanda has stopped taking guitar lessons. Instead she is studying singing, dancing and acting. She spends three hours a week studying drama.

Canada's Eskimos say "thank you!" for
CBC's "Northern Messenger"

The Northern Messenger has been carried on the CBC for over twenty-five years and today it is listened to more than ever.

Every year from November to March, every week, on Saturday morning at 0:15 minutes and Sunday nights at 10:30 the far-away inhabitants of the Eskimo country are listening. Members of the RCMP detachments, the Hudson Bay people, missionaries and a good number of other residents get together to talk and play cards and at 0:15 minutes everyone sits back and thinks to himself "... will I get a message today?"

The Eskimos have been interested in the Northern Messenger program, they have taken part in it, and about one fourth of the messages are actually given in their language. After all, there is nearly one Eskimo out of twelve in one sanitorium or another who thinks about his relatives and friends, the snow of his country and his liberty.

Last year I made a survey among two hundred and thirty Eskimos who are under care in Manitoba hospitals and sanitoriums.

Three Questions

First Question: Do you like it at the sanitorium?

Answer: Yes, I like it very much. The white people treat us very well.

Second Question: If you had a choice between staying at the sanitorium and going home, what would you do?

Answer: Two hundred and twenty nine Eskimos out of two hundred and thirty wanted to go

home. Only one hesitated and could not make a decision. He was at the Selkirk Asylum for mentally ill people.

Third Question: I tried to make them change their minds; I said "Here at the sanitorium you have good meals, a comfortable bed, the temperature is always fine, you receive good medical care, dedicated nurses to look after you. In the north, in your igloo you will have to eat raw frozen meat, and sometimes you will not have enough. It will be cold and dark. If I were you I would stay here," Those who knew me very well smiled, those who knew me a little, looked at me with inquisitive eyes, probably thinking I was not in my right mind.

One Eskimo expressed the opinion felt by everybody when he said: "Listen Father, if tonight the doctor would tell us 'all those who want to go can do so' well, right away, tonight, I would leave the sanitorium with its comfortable beds, electric lights, good food, efficient doctors, dedicated nurses, to go back home with my wife and children."

Very often young children come to me, put their arms around my neck and whisper in my ears, "Father Rio, when will I see my mother again?"

Three weeks ago I received a letter from Jean Huaruar. After four years at the sanitorium he is back home at Rankin Inlet, three hundred miles north of Churchill. Here is what he says, "It is better to be gay than sad, but for me I cannot be gay. When my wife and children will come back with me

then I will be happy. At Rankin Inlet they asked me if we were happy at the Brandon Sanitorium and at Saint-Boniface Hospital. I answered them, "When we are sick we are not happy. At least in Eskimo country I am happier than in any other sanitorium and hospital. When I feel like sleeping I sleep, when I feel like going out I do so. Every morning I check my fish net under the ice and eat the fish."

Do Eskimos listen a lot to the Northern Messenger? Yes. For one white man I believe there are at least ten Eskimos listening. Yesterday I saw Reverend Father Joseph Choque O.M.I. of Coral Harbour (240 Eskimos); each family has a radio. At Chesterfield and Rankin Inlet (400 Eskimos) there is one radio for each family. Where there are just a few radios the Eskimos cram together to listen and to comment while smoking a pipe. Lately the CBC has done a lot to extend relations between Eskimos in sanitoriums and others living in the north. The voice of sick Eskimos has been recorded on tape machines and the messages are transmitted on Saturday and Sunday. Thanks to the graciousness of the producer, Mr. Harry Randall, I was very often invited to read on this program, messages, letters, conversations that sick Eskimos had asked me to broadcast. Furthermore missionaries and government authorities record messages in the north and send them to the sanitorium.

I have received numerous notes and letters of appreciation from the north. One of my guides wrote me six weeks ago, "I heard you, I rec-

ognized your voice, it was like you were there, at one moment of the program you looked at the clock in the studio and you started to speak faster in order to say everything you had to say. I understood everything. I thank you very much for having given me news of my wife and daughter."

Another who is more than 500 miles north of Churchill wrote me late at night "I am sleepy on Saturday and Sunday, but when you talk in Eskimo it makes me listen and makes me happy. Your voice has not changed, it is exactly the same as when we were travelling in a sleigh through storms and nice weather."

Another to whom I had given news of his baby: "We listen to you over the radio, we have radios now. You talk about the sick Eskimos in a very lively way. It sure is nice to listen. You have described our little boy very well."

A young couple living at Site No. 2 on the DEW Line tell me "We listen to you every time you speak. We heard you before Christmas. Speak often. It is your voice. Could you speak to us also. When you spoke about Celina (12 years old, paralyzed at Brandon) we understood everything. When you spoke about Antoni at Saint-Boniface there was something wrong with our radio."

The sick in sanitoriums also listen if the doctor gives them authorization. A young Eskimo woman from Brandon asked her husband at Resolute Bay, beyond the magnetic pole, "Listen carefully, and if you hear, write me what I have told you through Father Rio."

As the Eskimos in their language have several words to say thank you, it leads us to believe that they have a sense of gratefulness. They have often asked me to thank the white people for all they have done and are doing for them. Therefore to all the white men and women who are helping Eskimos,

Are Actors Cattle?

A CELEBRATED film director years ago, when asked his opinion of actors is supposed to have said: "Actors? actors are cattle!"

What he meant, one gathered, was that actors, though a necessary evil, were tolerable to a director only insofar as they did precisely what the director's planning mind required of them. "Stop acting!" is a phrase which actors have sometimes heard from directors, especially in film and television. The experienced performer may recognize this inaccurate terminology as merely a plea for economy of means. The tyro may be excused for concluding that the currently fashionable "inner truth" is a substitute for dramatic training. The delicacy of the working relationship between director and actor is considerably greater, I think, than we are able to realize in the heat of rehearsal: but it imposes a responsibility on us which we shirk at our peril.

A stage director from abroad created in Canada some time ago a brilliant production, in process of which he had had to be somewhat rough on one or two of the actors. In discussion with him afterwards, he said to me: "It was

the only way I could get it out of those people. Would you have me jeopardize the whole show out of excessive concern for the tender feelings of one or two members of the company?"

Of course not. But I did talk to him awhile about how it had been in Canada with those of us concerned with theatre in one form or another. We had been nursing with both hands whatever talent came our way. We could never afford to sacrifice a performer to a performance. Always there was the necessity to consider that, as a result of any one performance, that actor's future potential would be either greater or less. We had to be sure it was greater. In countries with larger population and with a long tradition of theatre it might be possible to be more ruthless, but not with us.

In six years, mainly due to the arrival of television, Canada's corps of professional actors has been quadrupled. Theatrical talent is now on this country's import-export list. Since our quiet parish has become part of the performing world, the modes and manners of other lands have modified some of our old ways. It would be futile to resist this, and I doubt desirable. But it would be equally undesirable to abandon our own traditions of performance. Among these traditions, it seems to me, is a subtle relationship which has existed between director and actor. Even if the need to nurse talent be less urgent than it was (and I do not think it is less urgent), the special style of performance which this relationship bred is certainly worthy of our concern.

Report from China

Canadian journalist Gerald Clark and German photographer Rolf Gilhausen recently toured the Chinese mainland (an accomplishment in itself), and in five weeks photographed and documented what they saw in Red China during its "Year of the great leap forward." The result of this tour is a filmed documentary, *Report from China*, to be presented on CBC-TV April 5. The hour-long program is "a story of the most phenomenal transformation in human history," and is based on a series of articles by Gerald Clark which appeared in the *Montreal Star*.

The years of Communist control in China have been years of rapid change. In one year wheat production increased by 100 per cent, and steel production has been brought to a par with that of France.

Shanghai, a city once cherished by sailors and world travellers as a place of exciting and lusty life, lies dormant. The taverns and night-clubs have largely gone, and the

even kitchen utensils have been transformed into pig-iron for the hungry steel mills of the cities.

"What has "the year of the leap" meant to the Chinese themselves? What has the commune done to the family? What has the back-breaking, unending labour done to the race? *Report from China* is the first comprehensive documentary to come out of China in years, and vividly traces the transition of a once-lethargic state to the present-day China striving to advance "20 years in one day." With the coming of the commune, the aged have been relegated to minor tasks and the infirm have been given haven in mud-floored huts called "happy homes." China's youth are the leaders and the muscle of the country today. Privacy has been forsaken and what once was a home is now a dormitory; what once was a nursery is now a state-run kindergarten, combining education and military training. Parents work in the fields 10 hours a day, then spend a couple of hours at drill with a rifle. The commune supplies the food, the shelter and the clothing (two garments a year). Family life is clearly a thing of the past. As expressed by a battalion commander: "The family does not count any longer as the basic unit of society, at least in an

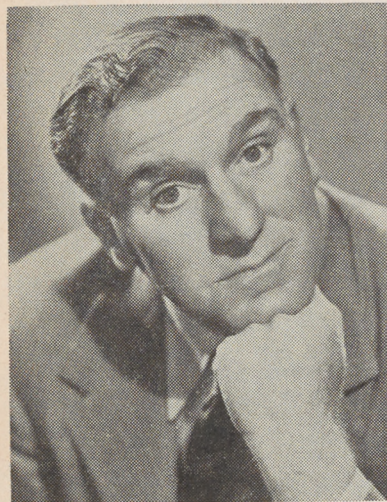

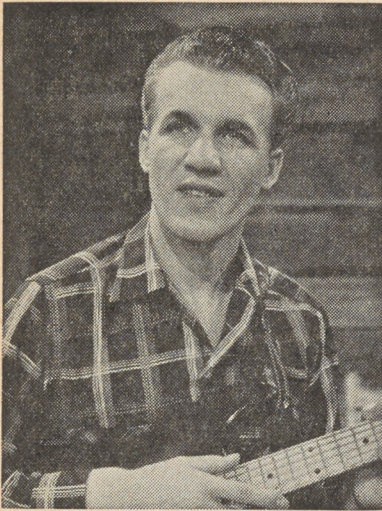

shows is detailed and requires plenty of time.

A show like *Bob Moir on Football*, which has been carried on CBW for 15 weeks during each of the last two football seasons, is only 15 minutes long. But it requires one full day of writing and tape editing, in addition to the time spent lining up the show and interviewing the various personalities who appear.

Prairie Sports Final is unique in its field. Work starts on Tuesday for the Saturday night feature. The producers, Ron Hunka and Dave Cruickshank of the Outside Broadcasts department, and myself, try to line up as many "live" items as possible. This is done because the network is set up so that on Saturday nights when I, as commentator, call in Glenn Bjarnason in Edmonton or Harvey Dryden in Regina, the operator presses a button and those two commentators, sitting in the CBC studios in those respective cities, come in direct.

It's possible to build extremely interesting shows in this manner. One that comes to mind is our big opening football feature in the fall.

We line up all the western conference coaches for interviews. The B.C. coach and the Calgary coach tape their interviews because these two cities aren't connected up for the CCR push-button system. We play the Vancouver and Calgary tapes first. The other three coaches, sitting in studios in Edmonton, Calgary and Winnipeg, listen to the comments. They, in turn, then comment on what has been said and make a few statements of their own. Finally we go back to Regina and Edmonton for "rebuttals" from the coaches concerned. It makes for highly entertaining listening.

After the show is lined up on

Tuesday, it takes a couple of days to get all items confirmed. Even then, one or two items may have to be switched because of the constant change in the sports scene.

The Saturday afternoon of the show is spent in finalizing the script and rehearsing the timing. This is often difficult because of the many live items used from Regina and Edmonton and Winnipeg. Problems can arise when "switching" that can throw out the timing, such as network lines breaking down.

It's all a lot of fun, however, and I don't know one sportscaster who would trade his job for 9 to 5 hours in an office.

Of her singing lessons she says, "Giving the right interpretation to a ballad takes more technique than giving out with a swinging rock 'n' roll number."

Besides taking these lessons, Vanda spends three days a week at a business school taking a commercial course.

"If my career fails, I will always have something to fall back on," she says seriously.

Vanda's boy friends find that her busy schedule leaves little time for them. After doing school work for the first three week nights, Vanda spends Thursday evenings either at special rehearsals for the television show or just staying home with her mother.

"Usually I stay home with Mum," she says. "I like to get to bed early, too, because I've got to get up early for the show's regular rehearsals on Friday morning."

For most teen-age girls, Friday night is a big social night. For Vanda it's the night before her television show and she's at home practising.

Saturday Date ends at 8 p.m., which gives Vanda and her boy friend almost the whole evening. "We usually go to a show downtown but now and then we go dancing at one of the suburban community centres," she said.

While Vanda firmly denies that she goes steady, she does admit to "a boy I go out with most of the time."

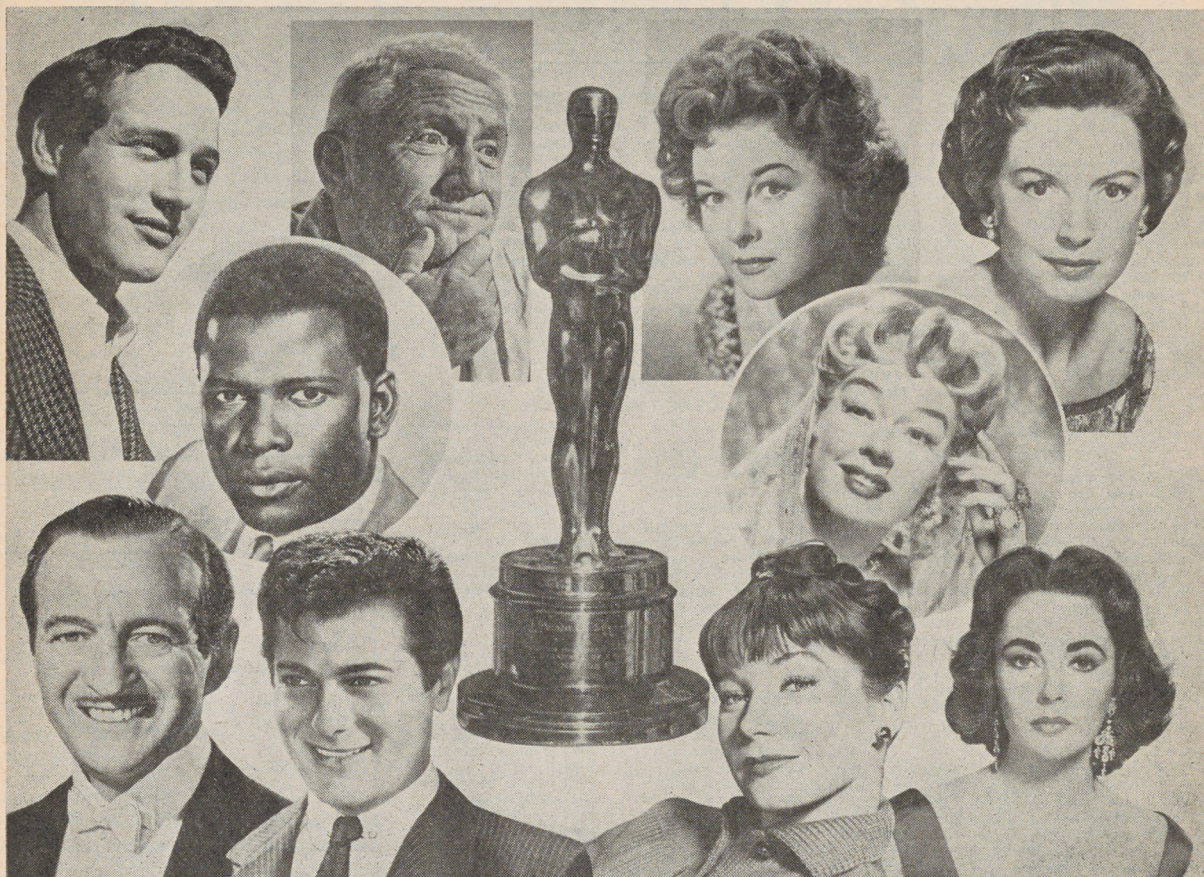

In the early days of Dominion Drama Festival I believed that the Canadian apathy towards theatre was the best measure of how much our country needed theatre. When the CBC allowed me to strike a blow for this belief by the institution of the Sunday night radio *Stages* in 1944, I was able to gather a group of players for the purpose—many of whom would not have been available at all if it had not been for the work of the D.D.F. and its contributory organizations. As for 12 years we laboured to present radio plays by Canadian writers and adaptations of standard works, gradually an audience grew. It has been said that many people across this land had their appetites whetted for live theatre by these broadcasts. Certainly I was delighted to see, when Ontario's Stratford began in 1953, how many veterans of our Sunday night shows and of the Wednesday night two-and-a-half hour Shakespeare broadcasts appeared in that glittering arena.

Our attitude had always been to work together for something in which we all believed. There was no master-and-servant relationship between director and actor. We were all servants. We were servants of the art, of the audience, and of the author. This is the way to be a healthy theatre, whether it be for broadcast, film, or stage.

The varying skills, based on the capacities which spring from varying temperaments, all of which are equally essential to theatrical presentation, must command equal respect. Not one of us can do without the other. Each of us learns the craft and serves the art. The special problem of the director is to understand the problems, personal and professional, constantly confronting those who work with him toward an end he has foreseen. During my eighteen months in television—where the need for extreme speed is an inexorable factor—I have found this strikingly true.

The peculiar problem of the actor, which must command our

protector of the weak, is presented Friday afternoons on CBC-TV.

sympathy, is that he has to play upon the most recalcitrant instrument of all—himself. His technique must always convey and control his humanity without subduing it. In short, far from being cattle, actors are most deliciously and formidably human.

economic way. We provide all the needs."

What of Chinese technological advances? For the first time in its history, China is able to export some staple foods. The Chinese class themselves as the world's largest producers of cotton, and within a decade they have been able to manufacture enough diphtheria serum to supply their own needs. Two years ago they didn't produce a tractor; last year they produced 20,000 — this year the goal is 200,000. China has an automobile manufactured at home for the first time, and Chinese scientific accomplishments may soon lead them into the atomic age. What does the future hold for the 650 million Chinese, straining to advance centuries in one year?

Columnist John Crosby, reviewing the program when it was shown on CBS-TV last December, said it left him with the feeling of

• This letter comes to you from a remote backwoods log cabin in Minnesota. By chance, turning the radio dial, in came a clear and distinct station in the welter of interference from closely contiguous American stations which I could identify from the fast, rapid fire talk, crowded with the usual overabundance of commercial advertising. From 8 to 9:30 p.m., the CBC broadcast the most wonderful program, followed by a newscast. I must say that the programs were superior to ours here in the States because of the clear enunciation, the deliberate and unhurried voices of the speakers, and contrasted to even our national programs where it seems every voice must hurry along, crowding every possible word into every second in order to make time for the far-fetched, often fanciful advertising. It is beginning to destroy the usefulness of our broadcasting. There is never time to jot down even the smallest memo of important things we might want to record. So much of what comes over our stations is lost. There is no time for it to lodge between the ears. However, it took me quite a while to learn my program was being sent forth to us from station CBW in Winnipeg as your station breaks are much less frequent than ours.—*Art A. Frieberger, Slab-sides III, Little Boy Lake, Longville, Minn.*

Musical Broadcasts

• Why, oh why, can't we hear Beethoven as Beethoven, rather than Beethoven distorted to noise? This is what I asked myself as I heard a performance of Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 (*Eroica*) on CBC Symphony March 22. The music was distorted during a crescendo, given a swooping effect during a diminuendo, and many other horrible effects too numerous to mention. For an orchestra and its conductor who put forth such excellent interpretations I should think the technician could comply and furnish them with a decent reproduction. Please do something about it in a

hurry or that concert will have the reputation of sounding like the distorted network concerts in this country.

Again I would like to voice my disapproval of time-slashing to the New York Philharmonic broadcasts on Saturday evenings. The worst example I've heard yet was the broadcast of Debussy's *Pelleas et Melisande* March 21st. I heard the broadcast in its entirety the week before over the CBS network in this country and was shocked to find that the CBC started the transcription half way through Act II of the five-act opera! We could stand missing some, or all, of *Polka Party*, which always has preference over these broadcasts. I hope the CBC will try to comply with the numerous requests made in regard to these broadcasts before the current Philharmonic season ends.—*John F. Leppert, Fargo, N.D.*

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL, *Dean, Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto*

There is at least one good thing to be said for centenaries and that is that they usually enable us to hear works of the composer in question which we should be unlikely to come across in the ordinary course of events. I presume it is owing to the Handel celebrations of this year that the New York Philharmonic program on Saturday evening (April 4) consists of the *St. John Passion*, a work which has hardly ever been performed within our lifetime. But then we must always remember that Handel is still an almost unknown composer. Ask any man in the street to whistle you a tune by Handel, which is not the *Largo* or from *Messiah*, and I will bet you 99½ per cent of those asked will not be able to do so. The composer was only 18 years old when he wrote the *St. John*

Passion and it is an astonishing effort for one so young. As in most settings of the *Passion*, the Evangelist is allotted to the tenor voice, the other characters being Pilate and Jesus. The chorus represents the crowd. The music shows much of the Italian influence under which Handel was working at this time of his life. The text is in the traditional two parts, one sung before and one after the Sermon. The first part tells of the events after the scourging of Jesus to the dividing of the robe. The second part is set entirely at the foot of the Cross. As a foregoing of the glories to come, this is a remarkable composition, but of course, it cannot compare with the magnificent oratorios which Handel wrote later in his life.

The opera at the Metropolitan on Saturday afternoon (April 4) is one of the grandest of all Verdi's works—*Don Carlo*. It is strange that, although this particular work is never regarded as one of the "popular" operas, yet it is always in the repertoire of all opera houses the world over, probably on account of the number of great singing roles with which it is filled. The parts for the two bass voices—those of the King and the Grand Inquisitor—are without equal in the whole operatic field, and the soprano and contralto parts are hardly less effective. With such a cast as we are promised on Saturday (see Late Notes, page 32) this ought to be something really worth listening to.

On Sunday night (*CBC Symphony*) we shall hear the violin concerto of Ernest Bloch which I don't remember seeing on a program here for a long time. One of the best contemporary violin concertos, it has never really become a popular work, but I am sure in the

Polka Party's Donna Andert to Toronto for Trans-Canada Talent Show semi-finals

course of time will find its place in the repertoire. On the same concert the lovable *Symphonic Variations* of Dvorak can also be heard. This is one of the most original compositions of the 19th century and should be far better known than it is.

Later on Sunday evening the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra is to play Godfrey Ridout's *Two Etudes for Strings*, one of the best string works that Canada has yet produced. When they were given by the Hart House Orchestra at Brussels last summer, they were singled out by the Belgian critics as being of exceptional quality.

On CBC Wednesday night we have what is indeed a rarity in Spohr's *Double String Quartet No. 1*. This composer had enormous popularity in the early 19th century, but has almost passed into oblivion in late years. This is a great shame because he wrote some delightful music, especially the *Nonet Opus 31*, one of the best chamber works of the last hundred years. I hope the CBC

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will give it to us soon. These double quartets can be regarded in a sense as concertos for string quartet and string orchestra and are sometimes played in this way. Spohr, however, called them double quartets and intended the second quartet to be a kind of accompaniment body to the first group. These works abound with antiphonal effects, but it will probably be difficult on the radio to distinguish one group from the other owing to the nature of the medium. These are really works which, for their full enjoyment, should be seen as well as heard. (TV producers please note.)

On Sunday evening I notice there is a recording of pianist Witold Maluczynski giving a recital over the Polish radio to mark the return of the first shipment of the Polish art treasures from Canada. You may remember that, included among these treasures, were many of Chopin's autograph scores, and they have been in safekeeping in Quebec since the war. Maluczynski himself played a large part in getting them restored to Poland and this recital was given in commemoration of the event.

I am intrigued by a program on CBC Wednesday night entitled *House Party*. This is apparently a program of Edwardian music which perhaps gives the clue as to what

to expect. I sincerely hope the artists will sing and play these pieces "straight" and not try to "guy" them, because they are far funnier if taken perfectly seriously.

"Don't Give Up The Archers . . ."

The Bishop of Grantham, the Rt. Rev. Anthony Otter, has changed the time of his Lenten services from 7:00 p.m. to 7:15 p.m. because so many people listen to "The Archers."

Writing in his parish magazine as the Rector of Stoke, Lincolnshire, he says: "I don't think 'The Archers' is one of the things people should give up for Lent."

The Canadian Constitution And Human Rights

Four lectures by Prof. Frank R. Scott

The sixth CBC University of the Air series, entitled *The Canadian Constitution and Human Rights* and consisting of four weekly lectures by Frank R. Scott, Professor of Law at McGill University, will recommence on CBC Trans-Canada Tuesday, March 31. The series originally was to run from January 6 to 27 this year but was postponed after broadcast of the first lecture because of a labour dispute in Montreal. It has been rescheduled from the beginning so that listeners may follow it in sequence.

In the course of his four radio lectures, Professor Scott will touch upon such questions as: What do freedom of religion, of the press, of speech, and association mean under Canadian Law? Have we equality before the law? Is it legal for employers to discriminate between races and religions, or men and women doing the same job? His answers are given in the light of the Canadian Constitution and the British tradition of civil liberties Canadians have inherited. notes for the lectures follow:

of growth and experiment. It has its origins in English constitutional history, but Canadians had to adapt English law and institutions to their own needs and to develop new freedoms, like minority rights, which were unknown to the common law.

April 7—The Constitution of 1867 and Human Rights

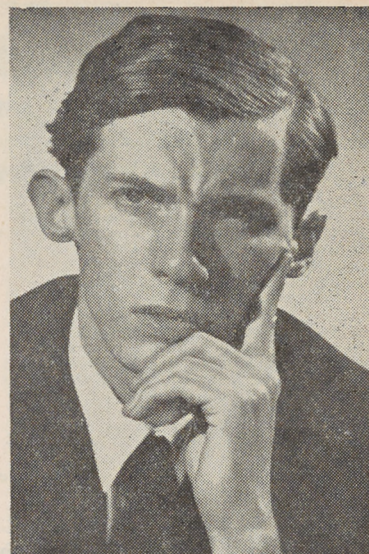
The B.N.A. Act contained basic democratic ideas, such as parliamentary democracy and the independence of the judiciary, but no formal Bill of Rights. It protected certain religious minorities and guaranteed the use of two languages but was written before industrialization confronted us with new ideas of economic rights and social security.

April 14—Growth of Freedom Concepts in Canada since 1867

The most important constitutional change since 1867 has been the evolution from colonial status through Dominion status to the position of an independent state in the world community. Internally new ideas of human rights have evolved partly by legislation and partly by judicial decisions, affecting such important concepts as school and language rights, social security, and freedom of religion, of speech, of the press and of association.

April 21—A Bill of Rights for All Canadians

A Bill of Rights presented to the Canadian Parliament on September 5, 1958, is the first attempt at a formal Declaration of Rights for the whole nation. What it includes and what it leaves out must be understood if we would measure its value as a protection for our freedoms; and the place of the province needs consideration. An alternative proposal has been made to incorporate fundamental free-

doms in an amendment to the Constitution.

Frank R. Scott, B.A., B.Litt., B.C.L., L.L.D., F.R.S.C., was born in Quebec City in 1899. He was educated at Bishop's College in Lennoxville; Magdalen College, Oxford (where he was a Rhodes Scholar); and McGill University, where he studied law. After practising law for a year, he joined the

neck that has taken days to straighten.

Any kind of a performance where the participants and the audience are all on the same level is lost on gals my size. All we ever see is an occasional bobbing head or raised arm. But it's in theatres that the whole thing comes to a head.

I always try to sit behind a vacant seat, but as soon as we are settled the vacant seat is occupied by a man-mountain who is never under six feet three and never weighs less than 250 pounds. This leaves me craning frantically to see the top right-hand corner of the screen. I tug at my husband's sleeve and whisper that I want to change seats with him. With a shuddering foreknowledge of the chain of events we are about to set in progress, he pretends he doesn't understand me. I have no intention, however, of sitting through an entire movie without seeing any of it, and I insist. He gets resignedly to his feet and so, automatically, do all the people between him and the aisle. He explains in a low apologetic voice that we're just changing seats, and everybody sits down and fishes around on the floor for things that have fallen off their laps. We have learned to make these switches bent almost double, but it doesn't make any difference. Everybody gets up anyway. Ten minutes later the 12-year-old boy in front of me goes home and his place is taken by one of the Blue Bombers. This means we have to find somewhere else to sit. Everybody in our row rises to let us out, and everybody in the new row rises to let us in. I settle down happily behind a vacant seat and then the whole thing happens again. He never actually has said so, but I am miserably aware that a times like these my husband wishes heartily that he had married somebody bigger.

Women my size usually abandon the top shelves in kitchen cupboards to the vegetable-slicer that took off a hunk of thumb the last time it was used, the doughnut-

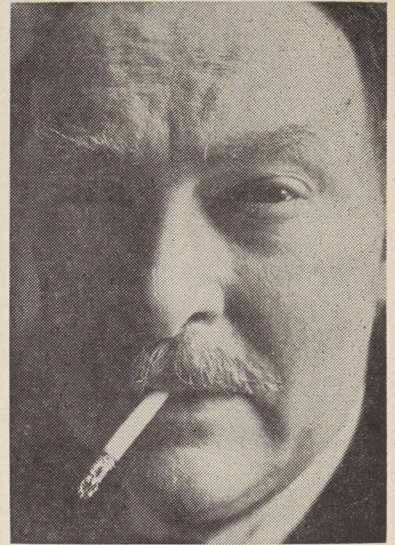
maker the bottom keeps falling out of, the electric corn-popper that has carbonized every kernel that ever touched it, and stuff like that. Everything in use is crammed onto shelves we can reach. Life is too short to spend it hopping up and down step-stools.

Unfortunately, most of the advantages of being petite come early, in the budding teen stage. This is the period when most of the girls are shooting up like young corn, while the boys are standing in front of mirrors, stretching their necks, and stiffening their knees and sending away secretly for body-building courses. That is when the small girl has her heyday and things are never so good again. The boys grow and grow and become bigger than the girls and the little ladies find themselves fighting it out on an equal footing with the rest of their sex. To those among us who have confused an advantageous size with a fatal attraction for men this comes as a nasty shock.

Being small, I've naturally taken an interest in other small women and how they cope with their size. Myself, I wear high heels whenever possible, never buy a dress unless I think it makes me look taller, and avoid at all costs squashed-down hats. I never have held with going around being just too tiny for words, but I've never been able to deal with the whole thing in the ruthless way a friend of mine has.

She's smaller than I am, I know, though I haven't ventured to ask her exact height. She eliminates the whole problem by facing the world with the presence of somebody eight feet tall. You always have the vague feeling when you see her that somebody of ambassadorial rank should have announced her arrival. She scorns the high heels and other reeds on which I lean so heavily. She never thinks of herself as small and nobody else dares to. I admire her tremendously.

I do not admire, and believe strongly that nobody else does either, the woman who makes a life work out of being a dear little

thing. We've all been subjected to her at one time or another. You know—the one who puts her tiny adorable feet into a man's size 12 overshoes at parties and clumps around making everybody's teeth ache. This is the real peril in being undersized. At some time in your life, usually early, you're going to meet somebody who thinks being little is cute. To take this seriously is absolutely fatal. For every person who feels this way there are at least 25 who don't, and the ratio grows steadily more lopsided as the years progress. Anthology

Radio's literary magazine moves to Friday

Webster defines anthology as meaning, "any collection of literary works in verse or prose, or both, representative of an age, a national literature, a literary type, an author or the like." Program organizer Robert Weaver defines CBC Trans-Canada's weekly program *Anthology*, which moves to a new day and time this week (Friday nights) as "a general literary magazine of middle-serious range, not highbrow and not lowbrow." "Anthology," says Weaver, "is not meant as an outlet for poetry and fiction in themselves, as we try constantly to give listeners information and critical analyses of literary work from Canada and other countries."

The radio program started in October, 1954, but is an outgrowth of an earlier program which ran for a decade, called *Canadian Short Stories*. *Anthology* is based on Canadian poetry and fiction primarily, and has in the past brought listeners a resume of the works of poets and writers often before the actual publishing of their works. Although Canadian literature is stressed, works from abroad are often brought to the listener. Some time ago, A. D. Hope, an Australian poet, presented a reading of his poems. Prior to that a reading from *The Watch That Ends the Night*, Hugh McLennan's latest book, received warm acclaim from listeners. Other program highlights of the past have included a discussion of the writings of controversial French authoress Françoise Sagan. The well-known Canadian poet, Ralph Gustafson, now living in New York has read his own poetry on *Anthology*. Gustafson edited the Penguin anthology of Canadian poetry.

On April 3, W. E. Collin of the University of Western Ontario will talk about young novelists in French Canada. He has contributed articles on French Canadian writers to such magazines as

Queen's Quarterly, University of Toronto Quarterly, The Canadian Forum and The Tamarack Review. On the same program, Canadian poet Al Purdie will read some of his own work. A short story, *The Decision*, by Toronto writer Hugh Garner will be read on next week's program. On April 17 there will be a poetry reading by Ron Bates of the English department of the University of Western Ontario. Bates is the author of *The Wandering World*, a book of poetry being brought out later this month by the Macmillan company. On the same program West Indies novelist Victor Reid will discuss the new school of writers in the West Indies.

Plans for the balance of the season include readings from two unpublished novels by young Winnipeg writers, Jack Parr and David Williamson; poet James Reaney (*A Suite of Nettles*) will comment on the novels. *Anthology* listeners will also be hearing excerpts from a collection of Irving Layton's poetry published under the title *A Red Carpet for the Sun*, and a short novel *The Double Hook*, by Sheila Watson. An interview with publisher Jack McClelland on May 1 should be of particular interest. There are also plans for a feature on the work of the Canada Council in the literary field.

With this season ending at the end of May, Weaver is already mulling over plans for next winter's programming. One of his ideas, not yet fully worked out, is a literary contest for university undergraduates, prompted by the feeling that "the present crop are going to have a lot to contribute."
