

Stereophonic Broadcasting

THE MOST recent addition to our complicated and gadget-minded era is that of stereophonic sound. Stereophonic sound is really not a very new idea as it has been in use for several years in connection with Cinemascope motion pictures in movie theatres. It is only quite recently, however, that stereophonic sound has entered the home entertainment field, and this is the result of the development of a practical method of recording stereo sound on discs.

What Stereo Attempts

The objective of a stereophonic sound system is to reproduce sound in such a manner as to give an illusion of dimension to the reproduced sound. This is accomplished by using, at the studio, a special microphone which provides separate signals from sounds originating from its right and left hand sides. Alternatively, two separate microphones may be used provided that they are placed so that one favours sounds originating from the right hand side, and the other favours sounds originating from the left. These right and left signals are then fed to separate loudspeakers placed in front of, and to the right and left of the listener. The result is to recreate for the listener a reasonable reproduction of the directional characteristics of the original sounds.

Early attempts at recording stereophonic sound on discs were rather impractical because they used two separate sets of grooves on the record, and required two pick-up heads to reproduce the sound. The present simplified method uses a single V-shaped groove but records the left hand signal on one side of the groove, and the right hand signal on the opposite side. The pick-up is so designed that it gives two separate outputs—one from each side of the groove. When these two outputs are fed to separate speakers spaced a few feet apart, very good stereophonic reproduction is achieved.

This method is quite practical and not too expensive so that the sale of stereo equipment and stereo records has been extremely good.

As a result of the wide interest in stereophonic sound, a considerable effort is now being made to find a satisfactory method of broadcasting it. Many experimental stereo broadcasts have been carried out, using two transmitters to carry the right and left hand signals to two receivers suitably spaced in the listener's home. This method, though satisfactory on an experimental basis, is not practical for general use because it requires the use of two transmitters, ties up two valuable channels for a single program, and neither transmitter has a properly balanced sound pick-up. A receiver tuned to either of these transmitters would not receive as good sound quality as it should, and therefore this is said to be a non-compatible system.


Standardization Necessary

It would be highly desirable to find a system which would permit normal reception for ordinary receivers, and also provide stereo sound for receivers designed for stereo reproduction. In a recent count, a total of 17 different systems have been suggested for this purpose. Before the manufacture and sale of receivers can be started it is essential that a standard system be chosen so that much confusion and early obsolescence of receivers may be avoided.

In the United States, a committee called the National Stereophonic Radio Committee has been set up by the industry to review the many proposed systems, and to pass their comments on to the Federal Communications Commission.

In Canada, a sub-committee of the Canadian Radio Technical Planning Board, with wide representation from industry organizations, is carrying out a similar study of the different systems. Recommendations will be made to

the Department of Transport which will then decide what standards should be used in Canada.

A basic approach to the understanding of a compatible stereo system is that of the "sum and difference signals." This is easily understood if you think of the type of pick-up which uses two separate microphones for the left and right hand signals. The "sum signal" is simply the electrical addition of the two signals from the two microphones. The "difference signal" is produced by subtracting, in an electrical circuit, the signal of one microphone from that of the other.


The "sum signal" contains all the information picked up by both microphones and, therefore, may be used for normal broadcasting. The "difference signal" contains the stereophonic information and, when properly handled, may be used to provide a stereo signal for broadcasting or recording.

Those who still remember a little high school algebra may find an interesting application for it right now. Suppose we call the signal from the right hand microphone "A" and that from the left one "B."

Meet Michael Sadlier

New drama chief's door is open to anyone with ideas that can be used in the "continuously exciting medium" of television

ALIVE! EXCITING! Endless horizons and no fences!—Michael Sadlier, newly appointed supervising producer of television drama on the CBC, is a young Irishman with boundless enthusiasm for the state of TV drama in Canada, and its future possibilities.

He speaks from many years' experience in directing and producing TV plays on both sides of the Atlantic, working with some of the top performers, writers and production teams in the business. He notes that "there's far more freedom in writing and production in Canada than in the States. Here you don't run into the pressure groups they have down there . . . agency people, clients, etc., all wanting a say in the do's and don'ts. There's no interference from outside here, so producers are free to experiment and aim high.

"Ours is a continuously exciting medium," Mr. Sadlier says, and he traces this excitement to several sources. One is the discovery of new writers. "Four new scripts have just come in through the mail, quite unsolicited. They're all good, and presto! we have four additions to the pool of writers we hope to develop. We want to plan ahead for them. Often a good writer runs thin on plots. What's more disturbing than hours spent staring at the accusing grin of a silent, monster typewriter? We're collecting germs of ideas to pass along to them . . . clippings, notes on events that should spark a human-interest story, etc. My policy will be to have the door of my office and my home telephone open to writers and members of our staff day and night."

Mr. Sadlier emphasizes that really stimulating TV drama calls for team-work, not a one-man job. He plans to work closely with writers right through the summer, preparing script material so there'll be 30 one-hour plays completed by the start of the fall season, and another 13 on the griddle. "It's the preparation that counts. The writer who sends in a play all ready for the air doesn't exist."

Another source of his excitement about his new work is the talent and enthusiasm he has found in his own department, among producers, story editors and script assistants. The result is, he says, that he doesn't feel as if he's really working, and if his job follows him around outside the CBC, so much the better. His favourite relaxations are attending the theatre and fishing; what better setting for solving some knotty production problem than standing in a brown pool teasing a speckled trout?

Michael Sadlier's deep interest in the theatre stems from no theatrical heritage. Being an imaginative child . . . at school in England, at play in County Meath near Dublin . . . it's not surprising that he was fascinated by the theatre, but he is the only member of his family to take to the world of make-believe. After the war he

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Election Night in Manitoba

**Two-way TV network set-up
between Winnipeg and
Brandon**

**Election coverage to be simul-
cast on radio and TV**

CBWT Winnipeg and CKX-TV Brandon will depart from their regular program schedules at 10:15 p.m. CDT* this Thursday to bring a large segment of Manitoba residents up-to-the-minute reports on progress in the provincial election.

The reports will also be simulcast on CBW Manitoba, CKX

that time. Following the seven-minute *Viewpoint*, coverage will alternate between Winnipeg and Brandon. Each city will be responsible for reporting on certain constituencies, and each will have its own commentator — Peter McLintock in Winnipeg, and Frank Presunka, editor of the *Glenboro Gazette*, in Brandon.

The coverage will include special reports by radio line from the Progressive-Conservative and Liberal headquarters in Winnipeg, from Liberal leader D. L. Campbell's headquarters in Portage la Prairie, and from CCF leader Lloyd Stinson's headquarters in Winnipeg.

On-camera man-in-the-street interviews will be conducted by Bill Guest.

Whenever the Canadian Press declares the winner, the reaction of all three party leaders, of the man-in-the-street, and of the Winnipeg and Brandon commentators will be brought to listeners and viewers. This portion of the program will last for 15 minutes, after which reports on the returns will be continued.

Tommy Common

Our cover subject this week, the popular *Country Hoedown* vocalist Tommy Common, began his professional career at the age of 11. The name of the show was *Microphone Moppets*, and its producer, Ian Reid, is now Tommy's agent. (Also appearing on the same CBC show was a little girl called Shirley Harmer.)

At the age of 12 Tommy sang before an audience of 15,000 people at a Boy Scout show in Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens. He continued singing while in high school, and also during the one year he spent at the University of Toronto studying electrical engineering. When he was 20, Tommy was hired as the featured singer at

Late in 1954 Tommy auditioned for *Pick the Stars*. CBC-TV producer Drew Crossan felt he was not yet ready and advised him to get a teacher. Tommy, who shys away from teachers, bought a tape-recorder instead, and by listening to himself sing corrected some faults in diction which were holding him back.

Shortly afterwards he auditioned for Arthur Godfrey and was accepted. Since then he has been called back a half dozen times as a guest. In constant demand now, Tommy has appeared on *Music Makers '59*, *Cross-Canada Hit Parade*, and other shows, in addition to *Country Hoedown*. Last year he appeared at the Hotel Bermudiana in Bermuda for two weeks. This Thursday (May 14) he will be guest on CBC radio's *Happy Gang*.

produced 26 half-hour films for distribution by RKO (comedies and melodramas), and *Sailor of Fortune*, another TV series, starring Canadian actor Lorne Greene, which shortly became one of the top-rated TV programs in Britain. Riding on that good fortune he returned to this continent and worked with several prominent TV film outfits in Canada and the States. Before joining the CBC he sold out his interests in two TV series being produced by North Star Pictures for United Artists . . . one about the Hudson's Bay Company, starring Barry Nelson, and the other *Trouble Shooter* (not a Western), starring Keenan Wynn.



struck out for the States, and being an Irishman of considerable charm, didn't take long to land summer theatre jobs. These proved to him that his interests and talents definitely lay in directing and producing.

He came to Canada in 1948 and founded the still flourishing Peterborough Summer Theatre (this is the first season he won't be with its productions), later founded the Niagara Falls Summer Theatre (now defunct), and for several years went to the Caribbean for the spring season as manager-producer of the Bermudian Theatre. In 1954 he branched out into TV in England, as director-producer for Mid-Ocean Productions, and he produced two motion pictures for ME Films. Then in 1956 he



CBC Newsmagazine Visits Germany

EAST GERMANY has become the eighth largest industrial producer in the world, the Russians claim — the standard of living is constantly improving. Yet each morning East German officials inspect a strip of land between East and West Germany and count the number of footsteps made by their fleeing compatriots. Then they plough it up again so they can count the next night's batch.

Why the contradiction between increasing production and increas-

ing refugees? Dr. Ludwig Erhard, Economics Minister of the German Federal Republic suggests an answer in an interview for *Newsmagazine* this Sunday, May 10.

"The important point is not that so much is produced, but what it is produced for," he says. "Even if it is true, I still doubt that the population there get the full benefit of it."

During their visit to Berlin *Newsmagazine* reporter Michael Maclear and photographer Phil Pendry found West Berliners prepared to stand up to anything—even another airlift—as long as the West doesn't move out its troops. They argue that only a demonstration of strength by the West will prevent war over the city.

People like Mayor Willy Brandt, the editor of the daily *Der Tagespiegel*, Dr. Silex, and the head of the refugee camps, Dr. Zimmer, tell the West Berliners' story. *Newsmagazine* cameras also go through the Brandenburg gate to the Stalin Allee, East Berlin's show-piece, and to the slums that lie behind it.

TELEVISION WITHOUT CREAM

The latest things to be hit by the effect of television are cream buns and sticky cakes, according to the organizer of the National Co-operative Bakery Exhibition held recently in the North of England. "It's no good trying to watch a cowboy program and eat a cream cake at the same time," he said. "You keep your eyes glued to the screen and sooner or later there are blobs of cream or pastry crumbs all over the carpet." He thought this was the reason for a decline in the demand for cream cakes, and an increase in the sale of small cakes without cream that could be eaten in one or two bites without so much as moving the eyes from a favourite program.

Triple Bill on "Close-Up"

This week "Close-Up" devotes a full hour to three widely varied topics: an interview with Gilbert Harding; an enquiry into drug addiction in Vancouver; and a discussion of stammering and methods of curing it



GILBERT HARDING

THERE'S MORE to truth than mere facts. Take the facts about Gilbert Harding as stated in a press release issued when he came to Toronto in 1944. The biography seems to imply a cultured, reserved, middle-class Englishman.

Born in the old cathedral town of Hereford, on the border of Wales, in 1907, Gilbert Harding was educated at the Royal School at Wolverhampton, and went from there to Queen's College, Cambridge, taking his degree in modern languages and history.

Reserved? Middleclass? This man became famous throughout Britain for his public irascibility and rudeness. At a dinner where he was guest speaker he told his audience, "I have been dragged to this third rate place for a third rate dinner for third rate people." (Next day he apologized, as he always does: "I consider myself fourth rate," he said.)

No stranger to Canada (the release continues) Mr. Harding is pleased to be back in the Dominion. "Culturally," he once said, "Canada stinks."

He's a thorough believer in radio but thinks that unless it promotes better understanding between the peoples of the world it will have failed in its mission.

"One has earned one's notoriety through the phoney media of radio

and television," he has said disgustedly.

Since his latest arrival in Canada, Mr. Harding has travelled across the country, to extend further his knowledge of the Canadian scene.

"Why is everyone so proud of being born in Vancouver? I would sooner have been born in a water closet . . . Toronto is not a very fashionable address . . . I was revolted by Ottawa."

There will be more of Gilbert Harding on *Close-Up*.

Drug Addiction

Estimates of the number of drug addicts in Vancouver range from 1,800 to 3,000, by far the largest number in Canada. "Our stock-taking in Canada's narcotics capital was prompted by a recent coroner's inquest into the death of a man from an overdose of heroin," says *Close-Up* producer, Ross McLean. "At this hearing it was disclosed that drug paraphernalia — do-it-yourself kits, including a needle and eye-dropper—could be readily bought, pre-packaged, at certain

Then, when he was 27, Korsh, the owner of a Moscow theatre, asked him to write a play, expecting an uproarious comedy. Ten days later Anton Chekhov turned up with *Ivanov* under his arm, a mixture of melodrama and tormenting scenes between a man and the two women in love with him. Chekhov had deliberately arranged each act to end with great suspense, or, as he put it, to give his audience "a sock in the jaw." Two of its chief characters die tragic deaths, and the play ends on a highly dramatic key.

Korsh was stunned by the plot, but so impressed by the quality of the writing that he stuck to his promise of production. In rehearsal and on opening night Chekhov learned a lot about human nature.

"The actors do not understand, talk nonsense and don't take the parts they should," he wrote despairingly to his brother Alexandre. Things hadn't improved much by opening night, as noted in another letter to Alexandre:

"Act I: I am behind the scenes in a tiny box like a prisoner's cell. Our family are trembling in a box on the pit-tier. Against all expectation I am cool and feel no excitement. The actors are excited and tense, and cross themselves. The curtain goes up. Enter the actor *beneficiaire*. He is at once presented with a bouquet, and as he doesn't know his part, I do not recognize his first remarks as my own. Kissiliovsky, on whom I placed great hopes, doesn't say a single phrase correctly. Literally, not a single one. He speaks his own. In spite of this and of the producer's blunders, the first act is a great success. Many calls.

"Act 2: A crowd of people on the stage. Visitors. The actors don't know their parts, they make a mess of the scene, talk nonsense. Every word cuts me like a knife in my back. But . . . O Muse! . . . this act is also a success. All the actors are called, I, too, am called twice. I am congratulated on the success."

But in the applause Chekhov's ears had detected a few derisive hisses, and he took his scalpel to *Ivanov* in a long series of operations that improved the play but left the original very different from the final product which *CBC Folio* will present on Tuesday night.

Once his footing in the field of "big literature" was firm, Chekhov abandoned his vaudevilles, as he called his comic work, and devoted himself to more serious writing. His play *The Seagull* was hissed down, and he vowed never to write another, but he did. Stanislavsky founded the Art Theatre in Moscow, and *The Seagull* was produced there successfully. Chekhov then wrote (and rewrote, even after publication) *Uncle Vanya*, *The Three Sisters*, and *The Cherry Orchard*.

He was perturbed by the fact that his audiences didn't always appreciate the comic side of his tragi-comedies. In a letter to another author in 1902 he wrote: "You tell me that people cry at my plays. I've heard others say the

Vancouver drug stores. Jack Webster, our reporter on this enquiry, checked this by buying such a kit with no difficulty at all."

Close-Up last September dealt with drug-addiction in an enquiry into the experiences of one Toronto addict, a teen-age girl. "This latest report," says McLean, "includes interviews with a Vancouver drug squad detective, the Vancouver coroner, the head of a private agency called Narcotics Addiction Foundation of B.C., a representative of the B.C. Pharmaceutical Association, and a typical addict, male, in his twenties, a prison sentence for addiction behind him, and still stealing to keep himself in drugs.

Stammering

same. But that was not why I wrote them. It is Stanislavsky who made my characters into cry-babies. All I wanted was to say honestly to people: Have a look at yourselves and see how bad and dreary your lives are. The important thing is that the people should realize that, for when they do, they will certainly create another and better life for themselves. I will not live to see it, but I know that it will be quite different, quite unlike our present life."

Two years later Chekhov died from consumption, at the age of 44. Since then millions of theatre-goers around the world have learned to laugh as well as cry at his sharply-focussed glimpses of life, made more appealing and timeless by their lack of moralizing. Russians know him best for his short stories, but they lack the delicacy and restraint of his dramas.

These are some of the facts dug out by *Close-Up* research assistant, Gail Hutchinson. Another fact she found was that every known race of people has stammerers except the Shoshone and Bannock Indians of Idaho.

The *Close-Up* on stammering divides into two parts. First, Percy Saltzman interviews Ernest Van Douglass, clinical teacher in psychiatry at the University of Toronto. Mr. Douglass, who heads the speech clinic, does not claim to cure his patients. Rather he "teaches them *how* to stammer;" that is, how to live with the problem and relate it to their total personality. Douglass has a more than theoretical interest. He himself stammered badly from the age of four to 24 when, after a succession of jobs, he attended the University of Glasgow to learn all he could of his problem.

The second half of this section of *Close-Up* features Bob Anderson interviewing five male patients at the clinic. They discuss their treatment, how it is helping them, what parts they found most helpful, and so forth.

All his plays worked up to their triumphs slowly. None was a first-night success. They must be savoured several times for full effect, and one Broadway critic has wondered what would be their fate if they made their debuts today.

Mario Prizek, who will produce *Ivanov* on *CBC Folio*, says "It's always difficult to do Chekhov because most of his play is *between* the lines . . . his meanings are implied rather than bluntly stated. A delicate and subtle approach to the play, and detailed analysis of motivation are required by both performers and director. Every detail of Chekhov is significant, and that's what makes cutting for TV so difficult . . . you're afraid that even the slightest cut may destroy the shape of a scene. It would be so easy to turn Chekhov's work into a sluggish, morose thing. But there's a good deal of comedy in *Ivanov*, even if the basic theme is tragic. It's alive and

The Italian Renaissance

Three programs prepared by Alan Jarvis, director of the National Gallery, Ottawa

THE first suggestion that it is proper for man to subdue nature was made in the opening chapter of the Old Testament. The same authority warns us that the worst of all sins is excessive self-confidence, or pride. For the last 500 years we in the West have made tremendous progress in knowing, and consequently, in subduing nature. Our self-confidence has grown correspondingly. We have also made substantial, but perhaps not equally successful, efforts in acquiring self-knowledge, the result of an entirely modern pre-occupation with ourselves.

This new outlook, which made these developments possible, began in the Italian Renaissance in the 15th century. Its emergence, and its moral implications, form the subject of three CBC-TV programs by Alan Jarvis, the director of the National Gallery of Canada, who will trace the beginnings of modern times as they were reflected by painters and sculptors, particularly by Leonardo da Vinci and Michelangelo.

The programs were written by Mr. Jarvis and Ron Hambleton and are to be produced by Vincent Tovell for *Explorations* on May 14, 21 and 28. The graphics artist for the series is Leo Rampen.

The first program, on May 14, is entitled *The Window*, and deals with the towering figure of the period—Leonardo da Vinci, whose approach to nature was entirely modern; it was prompted by an insatiable curiosity about the physical world. He was scientist, inventor, philosopher, and artist, and above all, he was a humanist and individualist. All these accomplishments were combined in his painting of *The Last Supper*, in which the human and divine are seen related to one another in an entirely new perspective.

The May 21 program, *The Mirror*, and that on May 28, *The Last Judgment*, deal mainly with the work of the painter and sculptor Michelangelo.

Modern Man began to emerge somewhere around the year 1000, when the bells in the monasteries began to toll at regular intervals, when man began the systematic measurement of space and time. Out of this impulse for accuracy came many things besides perspective: science, technology, double-entry bookkeeping; the tools and concepts which are uniquely modern European contributions to civilization, and which reach their culmination in the conquest of outer space and the penetration of the atom.

Modern man's preoccupation with the individual person has resulted in a science of psychology and it is, of course, no accident that, just as our traditional notions of space, time and Newtonian physics were disintegrating, a Viennese doctor, Sigmund Freud, should develop laboratory techniques and analytic methods for the study of the soul. Does this come as the end of the processes begun by Leonardo or as a new beginning? Leonardo had hoped "... that it may please God to let me expound the psychology of the habits of man in such fashion as I am describing his body." Leonardo sensed with foreboding that science might be opening a Pandora's box; Durer was possessed with a vision of the world destroying itself; Michelangelo, through years of physical and spiritual torment, painted on the walls and ceiling of the Sistine Chapel the ultimate challenge to the troubled soul of modern man: Is man the measure of all things? A fresh look at the Renaissance must also mean a fresh look into the mind and heart of modern man.

BBC Programs for French Canadians

A group of people in Britain who never need reminding—as some strangely still do—that one Canadian in four is a French Canadian are the members of the BBC's North American Service. This small but active unit, which prepares programs specially for rebroadcast in Canada and the United States, devotes an important part of its output to programs in French for French Canada.

News items and some agricultural broadcasts go out on short wave because of their topical nature; all other programs are recorded on tape and flown to Canada in order to ensure high sound quality when they are broadcast by Radio-Canada—the French network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. These programs are rebroadcast in Canada as far west as Winnipeg.

Listeners in French Canada can hear a daily BBC news report from London, which often includes the recorded voices of people in the news or sometimes takes the form of a Press review, reporting all shades of British opinion. There is also a longer weekly news commentary which presents British views on the main news story of the week, and a weekly agricultural report covering developments in British farming and visits to such events as the Smithfield Show, where exhibitors who can speak French are invited to take part. In addition, the BBC North American Service produces a monthly program *Today in Britain*, dealing with various aspects of British life of particular interest to French Canadians; several special programs for Christmas each year, and regular winter and summer series of feature programs.



PAT PATTERSON

introduces the recorded music Monday to Friday this week on "Trans-Canada Matinee." She is also heard Sunday nights on "Pat's Music Room" on some Dominion Network stations.

Sheila Innes, who produces the BBC programs for French Canada, is constantly on the move with a midget recorder gathering as many interviews with people on the spot and as many evocative sounds as possible in order to give listeners in Canada a vivid and genuine picture of life in Britain. It is not always easy to persuade English people to talk French, even when they have a fair knowledge of it; but she has found from experience that listeners in Canada, far from being critical of a lack of fluency or a poor accent, are warmly appreciative when people in England attempt to bridge the language barrier.

Listeners prefer a light type of program in summer, and in the past the series has included dramatized sketches illustrating the English character, and programs reflecting the individual character of different areas of Britain. This year the theme of *L'Anglais en Va-*

MUSIC ON RADIO

By DR. BOYD NEEL, *Dean, Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto*

HANDEL'S *Ode for Saint Cecilia's Day* was a setting of Dryden, written especially for November 22 (Saint Cecilia's Day) 1739. It received its first performance at a long concert given in honour of the Saint, consisting entirely of Handel's music. So well was the program received, that Handel arranged for it to be performed several times during that winter. Unfortunately, when it came to the second performance, London was in the grip of one of the most famous frosts in history. The cold became so bitter that the Thames froze across and huge carnivals were held on the ice, coaches being driven right through the city on the river. Nobody thought of anything but the great fair on the Thames and the theatres, being poorly heated, were all closed. By February, Handel hoped that the intense cold would have modified and enabled him to hold his concert, but it was not to be, and this time a notice was put up outside the theatre saying that the performance would be postponed indefinitely, owing to the intense cold. Eventually it was not until March that the other performances took place. It is one of Handel's grandest and most joyous works. Singing in it on Saturday (May 9—New York Philharmonic) is John McCollum, whom we remember at the Opera Festival here last year.

The Haydn celebrations continue, and this week in *The Unknown Haydn* concert (Tuesday—Dominion Network) we are going to hear a cantata called *Applausus*. This was composed in 1768 for the inauguration of a new prelate in the Austrian monastery of Gott-

weig. It has a Latin text and is a conversation between the four Cardinal Virtues and Theology about the merits of monastic life—not a very exciting subject. It is not, however, this particular cantata that has made any special musical history, but an incident in connection with its first performance, at which the composer was unable to be present. He therefore sent the score with a memorandum attached to it, letting the artists know exactly how he wanted it performed and it is this document that is one of the most interesting things which has come to us from the 18th century. In it Haydn asks that his tempi be carefully observed and that "owing to the festive nature of the text, the allegros be taken a little faster than usual." He states that for an overture, the allegro and andante of any of his symphonies may be used and that, at the end of the recitatives, the orchestra should come in immediately the voice has finished. Haydn insists that the dynamic signs be strictly observed and reminds the players that there is a great difference between piano and pianissimo, forte and fortissimo and crescendo and sforzando. He insists on the strings obeying his slurs exactly and states that he wishes the viola part to be performed by two musicians "as the middle parts are sometimes more important than the melody."

He advises the copyist to write out the parts so that not all of the string instruments would have to turn the pages at the same time, as this naturally reduces the volume of sound of a small group.

There are many other things in this remarkable document, which is revealing both of Haydn's methods in performance and also of the faults commonly to be found among 18th century musicians, and we note that they are in all aspects very similar to those we encounter today.

**Dick Powell
On "Assignment"**

In 1932 a dance-band singer and musical-comedy star with an engaging grin breezed into Hollywood, was signed up by Warner Brothers, and the colourful film career of Dick Powell was launched. For ten years his romantic crooning kept his name in lights, and then he tried his hand at straight acting, making a specialty of tough, slick, private-eye roles. After a decade of unravelling screen mysteries in which a pretty girl always figured largely, Powell moved to the other side of the camera and directed his first movie. Since then he has concentrated on movie production.

Today at 55 he's a producer-director for 20th-Century-Fox, and part owner (with David Niven and Charles Boyer) and managing director of a television company, Four Star Theatre. In Hollywood Powell is known as a top flight executive with a commanding personality. He appears occasionally in his own TV productions, but acting is now just a sideline with him.

After 27 years in the film world he's busier than ever, and his friends wonder where he finds time to look after so many projects. When Tony Thomas was in Hollywood some time ago, he interviewed Powell in his office, and their recorded conversation will be heard in the second half of *Assignment* each night this week (beginning May 11), with recorded illustrations of the songs Powell made famous in his heyday as a crooner.

Starting this week

Form in Music

A new University of the Air series by Helmut Blume, Tuesday nights on CBW, CBK (9:30 p.m.), and CBX (10:30 p.m.)

EVERYONE who listens to music will agree that it's a special experience; hearing a symphony orchestra, jazz combo, instrumental soloist or brass band ushers in a unique world of sensation. Not so apparent, however, is the fact that this continually evolving world of music has an underlying structure and that its varied terrain has been defined and charted with surprising precision.

To enable listeners to trace this underlying structure of music and to readily identify the varied forms that have been evolved around it is the intriguing objective of *Form in Music*, the seventh *University of the Air* radio series which starts this Tuesday on CBC Trans-Canada. Leading the weekly excursions into musical terrain will be Helmut Blume, professional pianist and associate professor in the Faculty of Music, McGill University, who has been a popular guide in matters musical on CBC radio over the years and whose two *Music to See* series on CBC-TV's *Explorations* drew many enthusiastic letters. Mr. Blume will play selections on the

piano by way of illustration throughout the series.

In his introduction to *Form in Music*, Mr. Blume says in part, "Form in music, and musical forms, are actually two different things. Form in music is created in time, the time required to evolve any rhythmic pattern, melody or movement. Musical forms, on the other hand, are compositional moulds in which to apply, exercise and shape the formative principle of music, e.g. *fugue, sonata, symphony, cantata, concerto, song, or a march* for that matter. In this series we will be examining both aspects—firstly, form in music as the essence of all musical expression, and secondly, musical forms as the product of musical practice and tradition." His notes for the weekly sessions follow:

May 12th

Rhythm, Phrase and Melody

The basis of traditional musical expression is the element of rhythmic and motivitic repetition. A waltz by any other rhythm is not a waltz! The element of motivitic

Twenty-three-year-old Anne Fielding is a native New Yorker and a graduate of the School of Performing Arts. Villain or Hero?

On CBC Wednesday Night, a play by Thomas Gilchrist,

about the trial of the famous Captain Kidd

Thomas Gilchrist, the author of *The King's Commission* to be heard on CBC Wednesday Night this week, says his play about the trial of Captain Kidd is "something I had to write."

A mariner of more than 30 years' experience, Mr. Gilchrist has sailed in the wake of the now notorious Kidd, over "the alleged courses of his piratical voyage in the Indian Ocean, the Atlantic Ocean of the North Sea."

Mr. Gilchrist has attempted to prove that Kidd, far from being a scourge of the seas, was actually a loyal subject of the King.

Captain Kidd was hanged in chains from Tilbury Point, near London, "as a warning to all mariners" after his trial on charges of piracy, 250 years ago.

Mr. Gilchrist comments:

"It was some 30 years ago that I first came upon a reference to the possible innocence of Captain

Kidd. Thereafter, I found myself probing, as opportunity afforded, along the Spanish Main, among written records and in the museums of London and New York. It must be admitted that on dry land my own time and opportunities for investigation were about as limited as were those of Kidd after his capture. I have had recourse to the works of numerous published researchers, and to those patient and industrious people, I herewith tender my profound gratitude.


"Concluding, for my part, with an examination of the trial of Captain Kidd, reported verbatim in Howell's "State Trials," there emerged the distinct odour of a crime which must rank with the gravest in history—the crime of a King and his Cabinet against the honour of one of his most courageous and devoted subjects.

"For it appears that Kidd wanted no part of what was essentially a private enterprise bent upon large, but slightly irregular, profits. When, however, his orders came in the name of a Royal Commission, addressed by His Majesty to 'our trusty and well-beloved Captain William Kidd,' he was in no position to refuse the ship he was required to command. But what with war and politics, trade and the anger of the Great Mogul of India, the plot of the Peers became a monster that threatened to devour them.

"In separating fact, fiction, romance, legend, truth and perjury, I have tried to be as objective with Captain Kidd as a fellow-mariner and a brother-Scot may be. Yet I must here record my personal indignation when I find such eminent purists as Sir Patrick Hastings and the late Lord Birkenhead perpetuating Kidd's infamy, regard-

less of the fresh evidence at their disposal.

"May their spirits be on deck with the ghost of Captain Kidd when we appeal the verdict on May 13th."

repetition is dominant in practically all folk-songs and traditional themes as well as in the construction of all musical forms.

May 19th

Theme and Variations

One of the earliest forms of instrumental composition. A theme is put through a series of variants of increasing complexity involving rhythmical, tonal, modulatory and melodic mutations. Examples: Eliz-

abethan keyboard variations; Handel: Blacksmith Variations; Bach: Goldberg Variations; Beethoven: 32 Variations; Mendelssohn: Variations Serieuses; and variations by Brahms and Handel.

May 26th

Suite

A series of movements in the mould of dances: *allemande, courante, sarabande, gavotte, bourree, minuet, passepied, pavane, bransle, gigue*, etc.; their history and use.

June 2nd

Fugue

The term itself means "flight, escape," a whimsical way of describing the function of the fugue's theme which gets a head-start on the other voices in a contrapuntal composition and reappears in all voices like the trail in a musical paper chase.

June 9th

Minuet-and-Trio

A compositional form which does not apply only to a Minuet and Trio. The *Impromptus* of Schubert, the *Polonaises* and *Nocturnes* of Chopin, the *Intermezzi* of Brahms and many other compositions are written in this form which is called "ternary," because it consists of three units: an opening section, the middle-section of Trio, and the Repeat of the first section—a unit pattern of A-B-A.

June 16th

Sonata-form and the Form of a Sonata

"Sonata-form" is the form in which many first movements of sonatas, symphonies, concertos and chamber music pieces like Trios, Quartets, etc., are written. Its three units are the Exposition, the Development and the Recapitulation, the last section usually with an added Coda or "tail-piece." The term "Sonata-form" is a teaser. It does not refer to the "form of a Sonata" (which varies in individual cases as to number and type of movements), but to the constructional pattern of any one movement (which may not be that of a Sonata at all! Some Concert Overtures, for example, are written in "Sonata-form.") Additional forms of individual Sonata - movements:

Rondo, modified Sonata-form, Minuet and Trio (Scherzo), Theme and Variations.

cances begins with a program on holiday camps, which includes a contribution—in French—from Billy Butlin of holiday camp fame, and will range over the great variety of holidays available to people in Britain, from the conventional seaside holiday to sporting holidays, youth hostel holidays, holidays spent visiting beauty spots or festivals such as Stratford, Glydebourne, and the Mystery plays of York and Chester, working holidays for students and—what might seem the most suitable holiday for an Englishman—a voluntary stay at Salisbury Research Establishment for the Common Cold; and finally a visit to a holiday house of the British Association of Mixed Clubs and Girls' Clubs.

In the autumn, listeners in Canada will be able to hear a continuation of a series of BBC documentaries, which began last autumn, about contemporary artistic life in Britain, and has included such distinguished speakers as Sir Arthur Bliss and Lennox Berkeley on music, Beryl Grey on the ballet, and Joyce Grenfell on her own inimitable brand of comedy. In the coming autumn various authorities will talk about architecture, interior decoration, sculpture, and painting.—*Reprinted from BBC London Letter.*

Then the sum signal $S = A + B$
 The difference signal $D = A - B$
 If we wish to regain the right hand signal "A," we simply add the sum and difference signals.

$$\begin{aligned} S &= A + B \\ D &= A - B \end{aligned}$$

$$S + D = 2A$$

To regain the left hand signal, we simply subtract.

$$\begin{aligned} S &= A + B \\ D &= A - B \end{aligned}$$

$$S - D = 2B$$

Just ignore the figure 2 as this merely indicates the relative volume which you would hear. The reason for incorporating this bit of algebra in the system is very important—it is one way of setting up a compatible stereo system.

With an FM transmitter, for example, the sum signal is transmitted in the normal manner (except for a slight reduction in level) and an ordinary FM receiver re-

ceives a normal, well balanced signal. The difference signal (A - B) may be transmitted on a sub-carrier which would not be heard on a normal FM receiver. (If you don't know what a sub-carrier is don't worry—you are not alone.) On the other hand, an FM receiver designed for stereo reception would pick out this inaudible sub-carrier with its difference signal and by performing the simple algebra outlined above would reconstitute the right and left hand signals. Then, when these signals are few to separate loudspeakers, the result is stereophonic sound in your living room.

Several of the proposed stereo systems are basically variations on the above theme, but there are others which are quite different. At least two proposals make use of the "precedence effect"—a characteristic of hearing which causes a listener to think a sound comes from the direction from which it is heard first. Another suggestion is to transmit the left and right hand signals on the upper and lower sidebands of a broadcast band transmitter. There are other proposals which would transmit the sum signal a normal amplitude modulation of a broadcast band transmitter and send the difference signal as phase modulation of the carrier.

The Canadian and United States committees which have been assigned the task of studying these proposals have a difficult and important task. They must consider not only the technical aspects of the problem, but also the practical and economic factors which must

be favourable if a successful system is to be established. The purchasing public has the final say in the success or failure of a venture of this type. It seems probable that adequate technical performance can be achieved at a reasonable cost, and perhaps the most uncertain factor is that of continued interest. Is stereo sound something that most people will welcome as a permanent addition to their homes, or will it be only an interesting and passing novelty? The answer to this question can only come with the passing of time. At any rate, it seems likely that FM broadcasting will receive much more attention than it has over the past several years, and it may well be that the combination of a stereophonic system with FM may arouse sufficient interest to justify the establishment of a special high quality broadcasting service for discriminating listeners.
