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Our cover subjects this week are Harry Pryce, conductor of CBC radio's *Leicester Square to Broadway*, and five of his singers—Betty Phillips, Cora James, Shirley Chapman, Shirley MacDonald, and Doreen Hayes (left to right).

Leicester Square has been on CBC under its present title for the past 17 years; before that it was called *Musical Mirrors*, and it is one of the oldest programs on Canadian radio.

Originating in Vancouver under the proud producership of 39-year-old Jack Bingham, the program offers some of the spice of the English music hall and the American vaudeville stage. Harry Pryce conducts the 16-piece orchestra of Vancouver Symphony musicians, and the program has been compered for the past 12 years by the Old Stager, whose off-microphone name is Eric Vale. One of the features of the show is the barber-shop quartet, combining the harmonious voices of Horace Chapman, Len Hayman, Tom Wright and Hubert Nowell.

The orchestra has played more than 9,000 numbers in its 17 years under its present title. All the tunes played are requested by listeners, more than 40 per cent of whom live in the eastern United States. Producer Bingham receives thousands of letters annually from listeners who not only request tunes but also send sheet music.

Leicester Square recently moved from its Tuesday night period to Saturday night.

“Sick” Humour Comes Alive

WE may sometimes catch ourselves in the act of imagining that startling things like sex and juvenile delinquency are purely 20th century phenomena. Upon reflection of course we realize that our forefathers must have been able to claim at least some familiarity with these matters.

One minor but very interesting manifestation known as “sick humour” we like to consider as being essentially a by-product of our scintillating modern wit. The truth is that sick humour is quite an ancient art form, and, in various disguises, has kept the populace amused for several hundreds of years.

Some of the earliest exponents of the sick humour technique were the writers of comic epitaphs. Just as a congregation will titter delightedly when a preacher makes an exceedingly dull joke, so the epitaph writers, if they felt like being facetious, could draw a smile even in a graveyard.

The grave of Archbishop Potter in England bears this punning epitaph:

*Alack and Well-a-Day
Potter himself
Is turned to clay.*


A Sussex coroner who hanged himself has this inscription on his tombstone:

*I lived and died
By suicide.*

Nowadays such levity in a graveyard would hardly be tolerated, but if it would seem bad form to raise a snigger in a burial ground, it would certainly be the height of bad manners to laugh at a man who is just about to expire. At one time though, the most fervent disciples of the sick humour school did just that. They were the people who attended public hangings. Their progeny today are the people who can't quite resist reading the details of the murder stories in the newspapers—in other words, you and me.

People used thoroughly to enjoy public hangings. The more the criminal twitched, the more the crowd laughed, or it could have been that, due to some roguish reflex, the more the crowd laughed the more the criminal twitched. Anyway, everyone thought it was worth the trip, except the man playing the leading part, and he hadn't come along expecting to have fun in the first place. He got

She's Helping to Avoid Faux-Pas

CHIGNON, French twist, bouffant and petal cloche are words not usually included in the male vocabulary.

It was with this thought very much in mind that CBC has appointed Miss Joy Davies as fashion advisor for CBC's coverage of the royal tour. Part of her job is to provide radio and television commentators with readily understandable fashion terms which describe the royal wardrobe and yet do not sound out of place coming from a man.

This is the first time CBC has engaged a fashion advisor for a royal tour. Thom Benson, executive producer for CBC's coverage of the tour, explains why he called upon Miss Davies' services.

"On past royal tours we have not always done justice to descriptions of the Queen's clothes. The vocabulary of the average male does not include fashion phraseology such as a bell skirt, an empire line or a *décolleté*.

"So on this tour we have hired a fashion expert and commentator. She is now on CBC's national royal tour team and her chief function is to obtain full information concerning the royal wardrobe each day, rewrite these bulletins and brief the TV and radio commentators."

Miss Davies has also been doing commentary from time to time throughout the tour.

"We hope," says Mr. Benson, with a smile, "that this time we won't have an apricot organdie afternoon dress described as a blue linen suit."

These mistakes do happen—though sometimes with justification.

"The Royal family is only human," says Miss Davies. "The Queen and Princess are just as likely as any other women to change their minds at the last minute about what they will wear."

Sometimes the "mistakes" are made because inclement weather necessitates a last-minute change of costume.

At a pre-tour fashion briefing for CBC male commentators, Miss Davies showed film to illustrate some past *faux pas*. One example showed Princess Margaret in a feathery hat described incorrectly by one commentator as a straw.

Another commentator tried to help, suggesting that feathers must have fallen on the hat from pigeons also shown on the film.

They weren't feathers at all, Miss Davies pointed out. The hat was a petal cloche.

What, the men wanted to know, was a petal cloche? Miss Davies compromised, suggesting they describe it as a head-hugging hat made of petals.

To test the men's ability at describing fashion, she asked them to comment on what she herself was wearing.

"It's blue."

"The hat is white with a blue scarf around it."

Not good enough. The correct description, Miss Davies explained, was Mediterranean blue jersey suit, with a blouson line, matching accessories, white straw sailor hat swathed with sky blue chiffon.

It isn't sufficient to say just "blue," she explained. If the men couldn't think of a fashion term to describe the shade of blue, they were told to call it light, medium or dark blue.

When they filed out of the briefing session the men were heard to murmur, "Sky, cornflower, tur-

quoise, aqua, sapphire, royal, navy, sea, midnight . . . they all look blue."

Said Miss Davies: "Let's hope the Queen wears lots of white. Surely they can't go wrong on that!"

The Queen's wardrobe is organized into numbered ensembles. However, occasionally the Queen wears something from, say, Ensemble No. 112 with Ensemble No. 123. This is where Miss Davies' practiced eye will be useful to detect the change.

"I don't know until either the night before, or even the day of the event, what the Queen will be wearing," says Miss Davies.

Miss Davies' fashion commentaries aren't limited to the Queen's wardrobe. She describes fashions worn by other women in the royal party and by Prince Philip whose dress is watched by men's wear designers all over the world for new fashion trends.

U.S. Conductor To Moscow

Elliot Lawrence, talented young composer - conductor, has been named to conduct an orchestra of specially selected Russian musicians for the Ed Sullivan visit to Moscow in August.

Sullivan will present eight shows a week, from August 3 to August 23, at the Moscow Trades Fair, as part of the U.S.-Soviet cultural exchange program. He will also tape a 90-minute special show in the Soviet capital for presentation on the CBS Television Network in the fall.

Lawrence was chosen for the conducting assignment when Ray Bloch, the regular conductor for "The Ed Sullivan Show," decided not to make the trip to Russia. Bloch, who suggested the selection of Lawrence, explained that he did not know enough Russian to converse with the native musicians. Lawrence knows the language.

Before leaving for Europe, Lawrence will conduct the Naumberg Concert in New York City's Central Park, on July 4. He is a graduate, *cum laude*, of the University of Pennsylvania, where he won the Alumni Prize in music and the Oakley Gold Medal. He has been associated with many television shows.

CBC Winnipeg film producer Felix Lazarus has prepared a summer miscellany to be presented weekly on CBWT, Winnipeg.

See -- Hear! starts Tuesday (July 7) with a film on how a television program (*Dancing Storybook*) is produced. Later films will be on the joint air training services for the three armed forces at Rivers, Man.; life in a Mennonite town; the last survival of the famous "Cutty Sark," the operation of Winnipeg's marshalling yards; travel on the Hudson Bay Railway; the struggle for the fur trade on the Red River and the forts that were involved; and the things that happen at night in a big city.

On "The Unforeseen"

The Trial of John Nobody

The newspaper headline read: "Durgeon Will Defy Heavenly Wrath. Famed Author Lectures in Defence of Sin." No one wastes time over the dishes or gossiping with the neighbours that night. Everyone who can dig up an excuse for going downtown does, and the auditorium is crowded with those who are for sin, those who are against it, and those who might be persuaded either way. The lanky form of Durgeon, arms flailing, eyes blazing, holds them spellbound.

"If I had to select a single piece of practical advice for our young people today," his urgent voices tells them, "it would be: Go forth and sin! But sin intelligently and in moderation! Can you imagine anything duller than a life of unbroken virtue? The only people qualified to give advice about sin are sinners—like myself! God . . . if there is a God . . . should have no hesitation in destroying me, after what I have said to you here tonight. Let's see if we can't persuade him. All right, God! I invite You to destroy me! I urge You to do it! I dare You! If You are really up there, give us some proof!"

The audience stirs, excited and uncomfortable. No one notices the man sitting in the last row of the balcony—firm, sharp features, intelligent brown eyes, with a heavy scar across his lower jaw. John Nobody, Esq. He listens, but he doesn't seem to react. Then just as Durgeon cries again to God: "If You are up there, give us some sign!" Nobody suddenly raises a 30-30 rifle, aims it at Durgeon, and fires. The audience roars and stumbles to its feet. Mr. Nobody is quickly apprehended, and the crowd and witnesses divide into two camps—those who believe the shooting was a miracle and that Nobody is a divine agent of God, as he claims to be, and those who believe him to be a cold-blooded murderer.

A minister is brought into the fray, and after a series of events

he tries to establish the moral that signs, portents and miracles are not the basis of faith. Then there is another startling event that looks like a miracle.

That's the situation in *The Trial of John Nobody*, which Charles Jarrott will produce for *The Unforeseen* on CBC-TV this Wednesday night. The story has been dramatized by J. Clement from the novel by A. H. Z. Carr, well-known American contributor to the *Saturday Evening Post*, *Harpers*, *Life*, etc., and author of

such books as *How To Attract Good Luck*, *The Black Kitten*, *Juggernaut*, *Men of Power*, and *The Path of Dictatorship*.

The Trial of John Nobody will be Charles Jarrott's last CBC production before he leaves for England to produce for ABC-TV on a two-year contract. An Englishman with many years' experience as actor-producer, he came to Canada six years ago, became a Canadian citizen, and plans to return to CBC after his contract with ABC is up.



World Coverage of The Queen's Visit

The voice of Her Majesty the Queen will go throughout the Commonwealth and to many other parts of the world via the International Service of the CBC throughout the Royal Visit. I.S. and BBC producers and commentators will also use a variety of communication media to describe the overseas tour—shortwave, the trans-Atlantic cable, commercial Radio-Telephone facilities, and taped program material.

Most extensive coverage was that for the Seaway opening by the Queen and President Eisenhower on June 26. The usual foreign language programs were cancelled that day and shortwave transmitters at Sackville, N.B., beamed the complete CBC Canada radio program to listeners in Europe. The Trans-Atlantic cable simultaneously took the program to British listeners and relayed it to the Canadian Army Brigade and the Canadian Air Division in Europe. The United States Forces network also picked up this broadcast.

Other foreign language commentators were sitting in the Radio-Canada Building in Montreal watching the Seaway opening on

TV sets as space at the site was very limited. Their descriptions of what they saw on the monitor were blended with sound effects and addresses. In this way, I.S. provided up to seven different language broadcasts to Europe.

In addition to this, the BBC relayed a broadcast to Ceylon, Ghana and Nigeria for broadcast on the domestic networks. Again, eight radio networks in the Federal German Republic transmitted the cable relay broadcast in German. During all the tour, the I.S. will cover events in its German language broadcasts and from time to time will provide actuality coverage to various German networks through the Trans-Atlantic cable.

Plans for French language broadcasts are very extensive. As a tribute to the Queen, for instance, a special one hour music concert was broadcast simultaneously over the French network in Canada and the stations of *La Communauté Radiophonique des Programmes de Langue Française* which includes France, Belgium and Switzerland. This was the first direct, simultaneous link-up between Radio-Canada and the French-language networks in Europe.





The Killer Instinct

A prize-fight play by Joseph Landon, based on an episode from the life of welterweight contender Joey Barnum

When boxer Rory Calhoun takes to the ring for a televised bout, TV stations inevitably receive a few calls from people who want to know, "Is that the actor Rory Calhoun?"

It isn't, of course. But confusion will be compounded for some people this Monday when Calhoun (the actor) stars as a retired boxing idol on *Desilu Playhouse*.

Actor Calhoun is, in fact, a boxing enthusiast, and it was a conversation with his friend, the famous welterweight fighter Joey Barnum, that led to this week's *Desilu* play—*The Killer Instinct*.

Barnum told Calhoun how he at one time had ended his own career in order to develop a young Mexican boxer. Although grateful at first for Barnum's patronage, the Mexican eventually turned on Barnum, and the two men wound up bitter enemies and opponents in a brutal grudge fight.

Calhoun sensed the elements of a good television drama in the story and urged Barnum to write down all the details. Barnum did, and Calhoun personally presented the memo to the *Desilu* Studios in Hollywood. Studio chiefs quickly agreed that the tale had excellent dramatic possibilities. They assigned Joseph Landon to write the teleplay, engaged Joey Barnum to serve as technical adviser for the production, signed Rory Calhoun for the Barnum role.

One of the first major roles in Calhoun's screen career was, in fact, that of another great fighter, "Gentleman Jim" Corbett, in the 1949 motion picture *The Great John L.* The star at one time planned to turn to professional boxing himself and is today a personal friend of a number of ring luminaries.

A close friend of Joey Barnum, he knows well the man and the career which he will represent in *Killer Instinct*. Barnum started boxing when he was 16, and during



Rory Calhoun (right) and Michael Dante the next 17 years he fought more than 250 amateur and professional bouts, meeting the best in his class, including the then champion Bob Montgomery, Johnny Bratton, Willie Joyce, Enrique Bolanos, John Thomas, Tony Marr and Wesley Muzon. He reached the high point of his career when, as the third-ranking contender, he fought and defeated Bratton in ten rounds in 1946.

Now retired, Barnum operates a successful scrap metal business in Los Angeles, where he lives with his wife and two daughters.

She'll Give You A Cauliflower Ear

More about CBC make-up expert Irene Kalantarow

(Continued from last week's issue)

Before becoming senior make-up artist for the CBC in Toronto, Mrs. Kalantarow studied TV make-up at NBC in New York, and became proficient in the art of making prosthetic face pieces. Does the script call for a cauliflower ear, a beaky nose, a Neanderthal jaw, a hideous scar or a face like a dried-up apple? The producer doesn't turn grey overnight he puts the job in the capable and artistic hands of Mrs. Kalantarow. She makes these

facial parts out of a special vulcanized latex. How would she fashion a Durante schnoz, for instance? "Well," she said, "I take a plaster facial mask of the person who'll wear the nose, make a negative from it, then a positive. On the positive I model the nose with special clay. I make a negative of the nose, pour in beaten-up latex, cover it, and bake it for a couple of hours. The edges of the false nose must be paper thin, to blend into the skin of the wearer. Then I cover the whole face with special make-up—the ordinary stuff doesn't stick to rubber prosthetics, and the appearance of the actor is changed with a three-dimensional effect you just can't achieve with make-up alone. These facial pieces, incidentally, move with your facial muscles." Another interesting bit of make-up magic Mrs. Kalantarow has in her box of tricks is a thick plastic pancake which dries into natural-looking wrinkles. It can age its wearer 10 to 50 years.

Mrs. Kalantarow looked around the bright, attractive make-up room for Studio 7, lined with mirrors and cupboards filled with the makings of beauty and ugliness. "It's tremendously exciting work," she said. "We have 13 make-up girls here in the Toronto studios, all charming, attractive and competent. We work in such a pleasant atmosphere, because all the performers who come in for make-up are excited, keyed-up, eager to cooperate, and we're excited with them. We're rarely bothered with temperament.

Sometimes we're racing the clock—like the time we had to make up 100 performers for an opera—but it's fun. Our girls usually stay after the show to help the actors remove their make-up, and will even shampoo their hair for them. This impresses American performers enormously, that our girls should take such an interest in their work. It's how do you say it? Grease-paint fever, and it's wonderful!" Then her bright eyes caught a glimpse of the clock and she began making mental checks on the job ahead of her that afternoon. The make-up room was

Montgomery planned for a concentrated thrust to the Ruhr; General Eisenhower favoured an advance on a broad front, which was finally adopted. Monty describes the crossing of the Seine and the advance into Belgium, with the battle of Arnhem, the liberation of Brussels, the opening up of Antwerp, and the Ardennes battle.

no pity. Someone may even have recited for him that little ditty which begins:

*Bacon's not the only thing
That's cured by dangling on a
string.*

Lots of people must have felt that they were being done out of a good thing when these fascinating spectacles became restricted to privileged types like clergymen and chief wardens. Perhaps they considered that death, which is, after all, the most universal of experiences, was to some extent the property of society as a whole; or it might simply have been that they preferred their sick humour in that concentrated form, and resented authority, the despoiler of the common people, for taking away from them one of the few free spectacles that life, or death, afforded.

It would almost certainly be an exaggeration to say that the early Victorians, deprived of public hangings, turned to sick humour as a substitute; nevertheless the era that saw the last of the public executions witnessed the development of an odd humour that manifested itself in nonsense rhymes and frightening poems. Even such

writers as W. S. Gilbert were not immune. He would use a gory passage wherever he thought it would get a laugh. In his poem *Annie Protheroe* he tells of a young lady who is engaged to the public executioner. She keeps a scrap book of newspaper clippings describing his more notable jobs of work.

Some frightening poems were intended as a sort of shock treatment to cure children of their faults. One rhymed narrative, for example, was aimed at juvenile nail biters who presumably gave up their habit in case they too would have their fingers cut off—snip, snip, snip—by the Long-Legged Scissor Man who was depicted so dreadfully in the bedtime storybook.

Just as horrid, but seeming to lack a moral altogether, were the nonsense rhymes such as this:

*Young Percival Augustus Stout
Once gouged the baby's eyeballs
out
Threw them down upon the floor
And jumped on them three times
more.
His mother called "Augustus,
Stop!"
He said, "I like to hear them
pop."*

In the early 1900's sick humour found expression in shorter rhymes. Newspapers invited readers to send

in their favourite pieces, and sometimes the results were startling. The rhymes achieved their effect from the fine unconcern expressed in the last line, like this:

*Willie poisoned father's tea;
Father died in agony.
Mother came and looked quite
vexed:*

*"Really, Will," she said. "What
next?"*

Or, a particularly disastrous one:
*Making toast at the fireside,
Nurse fell in the grate and died.
But, what makes it ten times
worse,
All the toast was burnt with
Nurse.*

As sick humour progressed, or retrogressed, depending which way you look at it, long-winded versification went out of fashion and became in time the terse sick joke that we hear today. As an example of an intermediate form, though, this sort of thing is interesting:

*Oh Mama! Just look at that great
heap of strawberry jam!
Hush hush child! That's only
Papa, run over by a tram.*

Obviously the much feared and respected Victorian father has gone, not changed into a merciful heap of strawberry jam, but into the pathetic, slightly comic figure that suffers in the modern sick joke.

Here he is, or rather, there he goes:

*Mummy, why is Daddy running
so fast across the field?*

*Don't ask questions, just keep on
shooting.*

And, later on that same day, we assume:

*Mummy, why is Daddy so pale
and still?*

Can't you dig without talking?

Psychoanalysts could ruin these sick jokes by tracing them back to a basic animosity towards the father image, if someone would make it worth their while.

Having finished with father, the sick joke mother turns on her pitiful offspring and we hear this exchange:

*Mummy, when can we get a
garbage disposal?*

Be quiet and keep chewing.

Sociologically speaking, this is an absorbing joke, because it's hard

An Honoured Rebel

The British, someone once said, have a penchant for turning their rebels into Grand Old Men. They did it to Beecham in music, to Shaw in literature, and to Russell in philosophy.

Bertrand Russell had certain obstacles to overcome before he became a rebel. His inheritance of £600 a year, for instance, embarrassed his socialistic conscience so he gave it away and since then has lived entirely on his earnings as writer and philosopher.

Then, of course, Russell came of an aristocratic family. As brother to an earl he found it very difficult to get equal treatment with his fellow pacifists from the police during World War I. When the British authorities finally overcame their reluctance to arrest the grandson of one of Britain's most famous prime ministers, he spent four months in jail for his published allegations that American troops in Britain were being used for strike breaking. For this act, Trinity College, Cambridge, took away his Fellowship but Russell used his time in prison to write a remarkable book, *An Introduction to Mathematical Philosophy*.

Once embarked on a rebellion, Russell did not hold back. Himself married four times, his views on marriage are highly unorthodox. So too were his ideas on education (though they are unorthodox no longer) which he put into practice in a private school run by himself and his wife.

By 1940 his views on these subjects, widely published in a great number of books and pamphlets, disbarred him from holding a chair at an American university when the mother of a student objected to Russell's presence on moral grounds. This left Russell stranded in the United States and only the help of a friend rescued him from a precarious financial situation.

On the other hand, certain factors helped greatly to turn Russell into a Grand Old Man. Most important, of course, is his age—87 years. His prescription for reaching that age: "Choose your ancestors wisely."

Russell's constitution allowed him to survive without ill effects a swim of several hours in a Scandinavian fjord when his plane crashed; he was then approaching 80 years of age.

Then again, Russell has been steadfastly opposed to communism for many years, though he considers himself a socialist. His book condemning Soviet communism after he visited Russia in the twenties was reprinted more than twenty years later, showing little need for reassessment. This opposition to communism has made Russell acceptable even in America

in spite of his unorthodox views on mortality, the H-bomb, and socialism.

A great help to Russell's growth as a Grand Old Man is his famous *Principia Mathematica* (written in collaboration with Alfred North Whitehead). This work is important for two reasons. First, it puts him up with the greats in this age of science and mathematics; secondly, it is completely unreadable to all but a small band of professional mathematicians. For these reasons, *Principia* gives his less abstruse writings enormous popular weight. And this is rather ironic as Russell has always stressed the need to free ourselves from uncritical acceptance of authority, in politics, religion—or science.

Probably the layman who is most susceptible to this form of authori-

tarianism would be most surprised (and even shocked) at what the book discusses. As in many great works, its essential ideas are basically simple. For instance, an important discussion concerns the meaning of the word "the." Another highly important section discusses sentences like the following: "*This italicised sentence you are now reading is false.*" This sentence is puzzling because if it's true it's false, and if it's false it's true. Such self-contradictions are the bane of mathematicians.

It seems clear that Russell will be included as one of the philosophic greats of this century. His technical work in logic ensures this. His works relating to the philosophy of science have been widely read and accepted by scientists themselves: "I owe innumerable happy hours to the reading of Russell's works, something which I cannot say of any other contemporary scientific writer, with the exception of Thorstein Veblen," said Albert Einstein.

Professional philosophers, however, have been more critical of Russell's work in this sphere. True, his influence has been enormous, but Russell belongs to a school of philosophy whose basic tenet is that truth belongs to no one man and perhaps the greatest tribute he could have, philosophically, is the inclusion of Russellian ideas in the larger, anonymous body of truth. If this is so, Russell may be best known to future generations as a pamphleteer against the H-bomb. It's a reputation which would probably please him.

Old Age and the Human Body

The first of three programs on medical problems to be presented July 16, 23 and 30

IT IS a sad commentary on our culture that we need to find a way to make ourselves take a new interest in the nurturing of our children by mothering and fathering. We pay less attention to the value of this than we do to the ways of raising good wheat or potatoes . . . Psychiatrists have tried to help adults and children who have suffered lack of mothering in their infancy and early years. . . . The next stage of knowledge will, I am sure, rediscover the importance of the father to the child."

This is the opinion of a University of Toronto psychiatrist, Professor Chaisson, who speaks on mother-love in the second of three new *Explorations* programs. All three deal with medical problems. They are:

JULY 16: *Old Age and the Human Body*—a study of the biological causes and effects of old age;

JULY 23: *Children without Parents*—a study of the deprivation of mother-love and its affects on children;

JULY 30: *The Story of an Epidemic*—which shows how medical scientists set about identifying the cause of an epidemic.

The first program discusses the analogy, often drawn by the layman, between the wearing out of a machine and the "wearing out" of the human body through old age. But is the analogy an apt one? Research suggests the analogy breaks down at certain crucial points.

The third program in the series tells of an epidemic that occurred some years ago in a Toronto suburb. Children in the area were suddenly stricken with fever, rashes and other symptoms which were obviously none of the usual childish ailments. The program shows how the identity of the virus was discovered. The complexity of such "detective work"

is suggested by the fact that the families of virus to which it could have belonged ranged from the three polio viruses, through the Coxsackie A and Coxsackie B (containing around 30 different types between them) to the Echo virus with more than twenty different types. The culprit was finally tracked down to Coxsackie A 16—but the process of finding it was difficult and fascinating since an epidemic of that particular virus had occurred only once before in medical history—in South Africa.

Eurovision's 5th Birthday

The technical miracle of Eurovision, whereby 16 television services in 12 different European countries can now link up in the same program, celebrated its fifth birthday recently with a spectacular 15-minute program to which all 12 countries contributed. The task of organizing this massive link-up was undertaken by the BBC on behalf of the European Broadcasting Union. From a control room in Brussels situated in the tower of the Palais de Justice a BBC producer gave, over an omnibus talk-back circuit, the instructions to directors in the participating countries.

The countries participating in this anniversary Eurovision ex-

change were: Austria, Belgium, Britain, Denmark, France, Germany, Holland, Italy, Luxembourg, Monaco, Sweden and Switzerland.

The idea of Eurovision was already taking shape in 1950, when the BBC successfully relayed pictures of a Calais fete. The next step was an Anglo-French week in July, 1952, when 18 programs from Paris were seen simultaneously by viewers in France and Britain. In 1953 the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II was relayed to France, Belgium, Holland and Germany, and played a great part in making the continent of Europe television-conscious. On June 6, 1954, eight European countries, including Britain, joined in the first Eurovision exchange.

I know nothing at all of the history behind the CBC, but it is thrilling to know that somebody was far-sighted enough to realize the importance of trying to inform a democratic public instead of just trying to sell them things!—P. • I think the CBC owes it to Canada to have a strong station in Vancouver so that Americans can soak up some of the better class fare the CBC offers. It's only on rare occasions I can get the station and then the interference from another station is almost unbearable. MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH

With the virtual banishment, by radio and TV, of the once-universal piano from the domestic scene, it is curious that so many people should continue to take up the study of it, especially as it is by no means the cheapest of instruments to invest in, on the chance of becoming an acceptable performer. (The current year book of the Toronto Royal Conservatory lists about twice as many teachers of piano as of all the orchestral instruments together.)

That it retains its popularity with listeners, too, is attested by the number of recitals that continue to be given; it has not shared the decline of organ in this respect. (There would seem to be an interesting bit of social history behind this, if someone would care to unravel it.)

The programs of the piano recitals to be broadcast by the CBC this week appear to demonstrate, or at least to suggest, something else, also: that the popularity of the established repertory has not waned either. Bach, Beethoven, Brahms — the classic "Three Bs"; there is nothing here to frighten anybody, and Prokofieff is no bogeyman, at this date. Carol Anne Craigie, in the Sunday Morning Recital, plays Bach's famous *Chromatic Fantasy and Fugue*, a Brahms *Intermezzo*, and Prokofieff's *Sonata No. 3*. Ross Pratt, in his Western Artists recital from Winnipeg, on Monday, plays Beethoven — the *Bagatelle* in A and the *Sonata in E Flat*, Op. 31, No. 3.

But if the piano situation doesn't change much, other aspects of the musical scene do, and among such changes we may note the rise of the wind instrument chamber group, as represented by the Dirk Keetbaas Players, to be heard in

Sunday morning's Chamber Music. The study of wind instruments has undoubtedly been stimulated by the popularity of the modern dance band, in which they predominate, and although wind quartets and quintets are not new, they are now heard much more frequently than formerly, and their repertory is largely contemporary. On Sunday they are to play the *Arbeau Suite*, by Philip Weston, and the *Wind Quintet*, by August Klughardt. Owing to the greater differences in the tone qualities of the instruments, a wind group does not produce so smooth a blend as a corresponding group of stringed instruments, but it compensates by its greater wealth of color, and wider range of effects.

The Winnipeg Summer Concert on Sunday features Schubert's *5th Symphony*, a delightful composition in the classical tradition, typical in many ways of its author, which has deservedly gained in popularity over the years. Also included are two works by English composers. Michael Tippet, repre-

New Science Drama

An exciting eight-part BBC science adventure serial, *Satellite Seven*, begins on CBC Trans-Canada Sunday, July 5. A year or so ago this story might have been called science fiction, but events have since brought fiction precariously close to act. A young radio and television star, Tony Thomson, and his 15-year-old brother, Jake, are cruising in the Hebrides when a storm wrecks their cabin cruiser on the island of Shuna. Once the home of a remote Scottish community, Shuna has become a Government research station dotted with strange buildings and launching-gantries.

The people are even stranger: Fergus O'Neill, an Irish playwright and his daughter Bridie; Granny, who has lived there all her life and tells of ghostly voices whispering in the dark; and a group of scientists headed by Professor Max Walters, who politely but firmly forbids Tony and Jake to leave the island.

The two brothers soon find themselves caught up in an exciting chain of events. Professor Walters and his scientists, they learn, are planning to send a rocket round the moon and bring it back to Shuna. But there is a spy on the island, and for a time Tony and Jake are themselves under suspicion. A secret radio station is discovered in the cliffs on the island, and destroyed by a time bomb. Attempts are made to sabotage the timing apparatus of the rocket, called *Satellite Seven*. Last-minute preparation for a surprise launching of *Satellite Seven* are in progress, and, as the turbines, atomizers, gyros, radio-transmitters and cine-cameras receive their final check, the brothers realize that, if all goes well, within the next 24 hours they may be among the first to see pictures of the far side of the moon.



The series will likely run through September, and additional topics will be announced later.

On a recent visit to England he recorded interviews with several English novelists, including William Golding, C. P. Snow, William Plomer and Penelope Mortimer, and some of them will be heard on CBC Wednesday Night this summer.



"SICK" HUMOUR

to tell if its sheer horror is engendered by the little child chewing potato peelings or by the grinding poverty that prevents his family from having a garbage disposal.

Sick humour is not, of course, limited to the narrow confines of the sick joke. It has one interesting variation in the type of greeting card that you can buy for your friends on their wedding anniversaries, all bordered in black and expressing your deepest sympathy. This, however, is inverted sick humour, intended to sadden a glad occasion. The pure form of sick humour makes capital out of sad, tragic, or even solemn occasions.

Some of the truest forms can be encountered in our everyday lives. A good example may be found in the case of the announcer who grinned at us from our television screens on March 27 last and wished us a Happy Good Friday. If he'd encouraged us to spend a meditative Good Friday, or even a quiet one, he'd have made good sense, but there's just enough fiendish incongruity about the expression A Happy Good Friday to enable us to recognize sick humour come alive. On a non-liturgical plane it would make just as much sense to wish a company director A Merry Board Meeting, or express the hope that a student may have a rollicking examination.

The announcer's unfortunate choice of phrase may well be put

down to a momentary lapse. There's no such excuse, however, for the packaged food manufacturers who every year offer us that gastronomical paradox, the "Delicious Lenten Dish." Fasting, we must assume, can be fun if we eat their product. Poor logic, but good sick humour.

Among the most faithful practitioners of the sick humour technique are our restaurant keepers. As we leave their establishments they allow us to eat, free of charge, little peppermints which are kept on a saucer by the cash register. As we all know, one of the prime functions of the peppermint is to combat indigestion. Some restaurant keepers may hand out this free medication to help quiet their consciences, but most of them give out peppermints as a joke in rather poor taste. This knowledge makes each mint seem like a little crystallized cackle of restaurant-keeper's laughter; he's telling us to have a happy indigestion.

Footloose in Luxembourg

If you ever visit the tiny country of Luxembourg — just a dot on the map—here's a word of warning. Go easy on the accelerator, or you'll be in and out of the place before you know it. It's just 62 miles from top to bottom, 37 across, and its 300,000 people (a fifth of them farmers) occupy only 998 square miles of Europe. But in that little area is some of the continent's loveliest countryside. Luxuriant pastures spread their bright green through the southern lowlands, and the hum of industry is a steady one. In the wildly beautiful north ruined castles (the country abounds in them, and none is less than 400 years old) stand guard over sleepy whitewashed houses nestling in the valleys below. Steep slopes, some of them rising 1,700 feet, covered with dark green spruce and stunted oaks, are veined by the roads that wind up and down and around to the delight of the lucky tourist who isn't in a hurry. Like Betty Tomlinson, Canadian freelance broadcaster, who took her tape-recorder to Luxembourg to find out what makes the little Grand Duchy tick. You'll hear the sound picture of her trip on CBC Trans-Canada this Thursday night.

Miss Tomlinson recorded conversations with Luxembourg businessmen, school teachers, housewives, the Minister of State, Robert Werner, and with men at Radio Luxembourg, which, until the Second World War, was the most powerful station and the only commercial one, in Europe. It was from there that the infamous Lord Haw-Haw broadcast after the station was taken over by the Germans. There's a good deal of music in the program, recorded during the changing of the guard at the Grand Ducal Palace, and at the famous annual fete on the Sunday before Ascension Day, when for 13 centuries the townspeople have danced all day through the streets, five steps forward and three back, to the tune of a weird, haunting melody.

Later in the series listeners will be taken on footloose jaunts to the English canals with Lyn Harrington, the West Indies with Babs Brown, Jamaica with Vic Reid, Trinidad with Bill Scott, Corsica with Barbara Wace, Khartoum with Marjory Whitelaw, an Indian village with Rosette Renshaw, Iceland with Lyn Harrington, Mexico with Saul Field, Australia with Dorothea Hare, Russia with Larry Henderson, and China with Marjorie McEnaney.

sented by his *Divertimento on English Themes*, made a considerable name for himself a couple of decades ago, notably with *A Child of Our Time*, a sort of secular oratorio, in which he showed himself deeply concerned with the human and personal problems arising out of 20th century upheavals. Quite different in style and outlook was E. J. Moeran, whose *Whythorne's Shadow* is to be played—an enthusiast for folksong, the spirit of which is manifest in many of the things he did.

Concert Hall, on Friday night, presents Irene Salemka, soprano; accompanied by John Newmark she is to sing a program which will contain excerpts from Stravinsky's opera, *The Rake's Progress*, based on scenes suggested by Hogarth's famous series of paintings. It is in the composer's later neo-classical manner, as it has been called, with reminiscences and derivations from past styles, conveyed in his own personal idiom, and with some highly effective writing for the voice.
