Prairie Profiles

Fourth of a series by Winnipeg writer-actor Cec Montgomery on the actors and actresses heard on network drama productions from Winnipeg

4. ED McCREA

"Interests? Yes, a few—big bands, automobiles, acting, radio in all its phases, writing, and sports—especially baseball and boxing."

"When did you start in radio, Ed, and where?"

"Oh, back in 1944 in Yorkton. I spent about six months with the station there and then moved on to Saskatoon. I came back to Winnipeg and CKRC in 1945." While

there he was given leave of absence in 1946 to attend the Lorne Greene School of Acting in Toronto, where he studied (under DVA grant) with John Drainie. The school used the facilities of a local Toronto station, CKEY. The station was badly in need of an announcer at the time; a contest was held, and out of a class of 40 Ed got the job. For the rest of the term he divided his time between announcing at the station and studying with Drainie. At the end of his course Ed returned to CKRC, passing up the offer of a full-time job at

CKEY, and missing the school's graduation dinner. Shortly after arriving home, he learned that he had been named winner of the school's announcing award, *in absentia*, at the dinner. "Not just a diploma, but a refund of tuition fees as well. Boy, did I feel good!"

Ed then told me that he has the distinction of having worked for all of Winnipeg's private radio stations and for CBC (since 1947 as Bill Davis in the daily serial, *The Jacksons and Their Neighbours*).

"Talking of sports" (which we weren't), he said, "one of the things about the Bill Davis role that appealed to me was that he was the star pitcher on the Little Coulee baseball team."

"But the author has since retired Bill from baseball. He wouldn't even make a good pinch-hitter now."

Ed admits to being a frustrated ball-player. His father, the late A. E. McCrea, was a player of no mean repute (once wooed by the Montreal Royals), and he instilled in young Ed a love of the lure, background, tactics and traditions of the game. Although World War II put an end to any idea of a baseball career, Ed still loves nothing more than throwing a ball around.


Co-author of a book on automobiles (*Your Car*), Ed says he can't remember a time when he wasn't interested in cars—"not just in driving them, but in all the problems confronting owners, users, and prospective buyers."

"Getting the most enjoyment out of a car is a hobby of mine. This gets me in trouble when I'm a passenger in friends' cars. I feel compelled to point out any shortcomings to the owner."

The Hero in Modern Literature

Sidney Warhaft of the department of English, University of Manitoba, introduces a series of four radio talks in which he will discuss the modern literary hero, variously portrayed as salesman, matador, lover and opportunist

MODERN writers are no longer at home with the old view which saw in man heroic dimensions and possibilities. They cannot personally accept, for example, the outlook of the Renaissance, which, envisioning the universe as ordered and purposeful, gave to man a central role in it.

The serious author of today, having lost the conviction of the meaningfulness of life, is preoccupied with finding out what his Renaissance predecessor took for granted, namely meaning in human action, the assurance that the hero's deeds, whether good or evil, made sense not only for here and now but for all time. Thus today's theme in literature has come to be that of man in search of a soul, in search of something that has lasting significance in an otherwise pointless existence. This, in one way or another, is the theme developed by such different writers as Arthur Miller, Ernest Hemingway, D. H. Lawrence, and John Braine.

For Miller, the hero is the "common man," the salesman who sticks to his idea of himself, false though it is, right to the very end. Willy Loman (*Death of a Salesman*) although weak and self-deluding, "throws everything he has into the contest" of "claiming his whole due as a personality," and, according to Miller, he is heroic because he chooses to die for his due.

For Hemingway, on the other hand, the hero must above all be honest and strong. Like Jake Barnes in *The Sun Also Rises*, he must face the sick and violent world with a stiff upper lip, with skill and courage and self-control—and leave the crying

for the night and bed. He must be like the bull-fighter, the man who "lives life all the way up," facing the bull of existence with ceremony, courage, skill, dignity, and compassion, always keeping "an absolute purity of line . . . and always quietly and calmly letting the horn pass him close."

To D. H. Lawrence the way to face the cruel and irrational world lies not through a stoical test of the self but through renewal of contact with fundamental natural forces—with the sun and moon, with the earth and flesh and love. Certainly this is the way Connie and Mellors the gamekeeper find in *Lady Chatterley's Lover*. Together they overcome all the barriers of intellectualism, industrialism, and caste, as together they dare to destroy shame and fear and to practise the primordial rites of love.

A far different kind of hero is the opportunist Joe Lampton in Braine's *Room at the Top*. A lower-class product of the English welfare state, desiring material success and social status most intensely, Joe achieves his goals by deliberately, if a trifle unhappily, sacrificing his humanity and wounding his spirit. To him, as to the other heroes, the world is a kind of slough, but, unlike the others, Joe barely hesitates to wade through it to get what he wants.

Thus the modern hero, in one way or another, reflects the view of Rimbaud that "real life is elsewhere." His existence is primarily a search for this real life, however he may define it. As in the stories of Samuel Beckett, he is a kind of bum, a spiritual bum who wanders around looking for self-definition and self-knowledge or simply success.

SUNDAY NIGHTS ON CBK, CBX — MONDAY NIGHTS ON CBW

Starting this week

with his interest in radio; a taped program called *Car Counsel*, a series containing hints on driving and car maintenance, is carried on 32 stations in Canada.

Since signing the station on the air in 1950, Ed has been connected with station CKY, where he is accounts executive and advertising representative. On CBC he is one of the most regularly heard actors

on Thursday night's *Prairie Playhouse*. Winnipeg television viewers have also seen him in several commercials for local firms.

Suddenly realizing the late hour, Ed grinned when I asked if he'd be locked out.

"I can hear Jo now," he said. "Another late show, dear?"

"I'm lucky, though," he added. "Jo has been a radio writer and

announcer herself, and she knows how time can get away with you in this business."

Before we parted I learned that Ed had been both president and actors' representative of ACTRA (Association of Canadian Television and Radio Artists) and vice-president of the Winnipeg Broadcasters' Club. As he drove away I was glad I didn't have to keep up with his schedule. He's a busy man!

SOMETIME in the early 1600's Galileo tried to measure the speed of light using two observers with lanterns stationed some distance apart. The experiments failed; Galileo could measure no time interval elapsing while light travelled between his two observers.

Galileo's failure here is not strange. After all, light travels so fast it takes only one hundred thousandth of a second to travel one mile. Even with the sun nearly ninety-three million miles away it doesn't take sunlight long to reach the earth. But when astronomers start talking in millions of light years—that is, the distance light travels in one year—when measuring the distance between heavenly bodies, the human mind can hardly comprehend. Figures cease to mean much.

"Astronomy Today" discovered

A Scientific Showman

This is but one difficulty faced by Dr. Frederick Augustus Kaempffer of the University of British Columbia in his series *Astronomy Today*, seen Sundays on CBC-TV. Dr. Kaempffer has no illusions about these difficulties. On one program recently he advised his audience to turn off their sets if the opening remarks were not understood; the rest was going to be even more difficult.

Despite the conceptual difficulties, Dr. Kaempffer has aroused considerable interest in his subject. High-school boys stop him in the street with questions and letters come from a wide range of viewers.

One reason for this interest is Dr. Kaempffer's own personality and ability to make concepts clear. For this reason, Gene Lawrence, Vancouver producer of the series, feels that Dr. Kaempffer is one of the most remarkable personalities to have been discovered by West Coast television in a number of years. The series comes at a particularly opportune time when public interest in astronomy is remarkably high, due perhaps mainly to recent developments in space satellites and the possibility of space travel in the near future.

The first half of the series dealt with aspects of cosmology, radio astronomy, the solar system, and the nature and number of celestial bodies. Programs in the second half deal with composition of the planets and the sun, a further enquiry into cosmology, and the possibility of life on other planets.

Dr. Kaempffer, who is married, with two children, does not discuss his past life very much. Now 38 years old, he was educated in Goettingen University, where he graduated in theoretical physics after also completing a course in astronomy. He has published a number of papers in these and related subjects in both Canada and overseas. He came to Canada 11 years ago at the personal invitation of Dr. Shrum, head of the Department of Physics at the University of British Columbia.

"My life began anew with my meeting with Dr. Shrum at Goettingen," says Dr. Kaempffer. "I don't want to resurrect the past."

Dr. Kaempffer prepares his own material for the series, of course, but he never uses a script. Nor is he so concerned with the seriousness of his subject not to introduce homespun anecdotes. On one occasion, for instance, he was saying that speed can cause a change in a visual perception, and cited the example of the motorist who might — questioned by the police

"This Is Your CBC Reporter"

*A little program with big names
and many surprises*

At least two of the television personalities pictured on this page—Alan Mowbray (TV's Colonel Flack) and singer Joan Fairfax, will be familiar to most western Canadian viewers. The other two—announcers Lorne Wallace and Lloyd Robertson, are very familiar to Winnipeg viewers as the hosts on CBWT's nightly *Spotlight*.

Lloyd's and Lorne's voices are also becoming increasingly familiar to prairie radio listeners; they're the regular interviewers on *CBC Reporter*, heard twice daily on CBW, CBK, and CBX.

The original purpose of the five-minute *Reporter* broadcasts was to give listeners a run-down on the day's program fare, and although this is still its main function it has recently included more and more interviews with well-known radio and TV personalities, and with producers who are invited to give listeners an idea of their plans for programs coming up in the near future.

The interviews are usually taped in Winnipeg—at the CBW studios, at one of the railway stations, or at the International Airport, and mailed to CBK and CBX, but on occasion the procedure is

reversed. For example, not long ago CBK announcer Walter Unger interviewed Regina librarian Betty Henderson about her series of *Trans-Canada Matinee* talks on children's books, and duplicate tapes were sent to the other two stations.

Among the well-known radio and TV stars interviewed by Lorne or Lloyd recently were singer George Murray, Stu Davis, Joyce Hahn, Denny Vaughan, J. Frank Willis, *Happy Gang* organist Kay Stokes, Hugh O'Brian (TV's Wyatt Earp), Joyce Sullivan, folk-singer Earl Robinson, The Mariners vocal quartet, trumpeter Clyde (*Sugar Blues*) McCoy, pops singer George LaFleche, *Prairie Schooner* vocalist Bert Whiteman, and conductor Bob McMullin.

Winnipeg Free Press music critic Ken Winters and singer Joan Maxwell appeared on *CBC Reporter* to tell listeners about the type of recordings they intended to present on *Trans-Canada Matinee*.

Dr. Fred Rainsberry, CBC supervisor of children's broadcasts, talked about plans for new children's programs on television, and about the aims of such programs.

Conductor Eric Wild and producer Tom Taylor described Winnipeg's contributions to the Handel-Haydn anniversary week on CBC radio.

Prairie Playhouse actors Jean Murray, Cec Montgomery, Ed McCrea, George Secord, and Moray Sinclair have talked about their careers; drama producer Gus Kristjanson has discussed his work; and writer Mort Forer has told listeners about drama scripts he had prepared for *Prairie Playhouse* and the *Northwest Frontier* series.

With such a variety of guests, *CBC Reporter* is something of a bag of surprises. The same program that features an interview with a rock 'n' roll winner on a talent show one day might present an interview with a winner of a Governor-General's Award the next.

The *CBC Reporter* broadcasts—both the program summary scripts and the interviews—are arranged by CBC's Information Services, the department responsible for all program publicity, for the answering of audience mail, tabulation of listeners' and viewers' comments, and publication of *CBC Times*.

CBWT-Serenade estivale

When it comes to acting technique, the Canadian style—as usual—is somewhere between Great Britain's and the United States'. "The British tend to emphasize the spoken word in their productions, concentrating on enuncia-

tion, inflection, and so on. The Americans tend to emphasize

ding each other, always ready for a laugh. But the kidding only half conceals the terrible insecurity, a desperate desire to hold on to their jobs.

bodily movement and get 'dialogue' across with a flick of the hands or a twist of the shoulder. In Canada, we tend to try to blend the two approaches," says Toronto-born David Gardner, an actor in Canada and Britain and now training as a TV producer with CBC.

"At the moment," says Gardner, "this fusion of two approaches sometimes leads to weakness. But in the long run it should result in an effective technique."

Gardner thinks that Canadian theatre has some advantages over the British. For instance, in Britain the classics have been played so often that a director approaching, say, Hamlet, is apt to say, 'Now how can we make it different?' This often leads to technical tricks and virtuoso effects. In Canada the director can put on the play as a play, simply and straightforwardly. The two methods Gardner suggests are being illustrated right now at Stratford with *As You Like It*, defying tradition in its opening scene of gloom, and *Othello* which critics have highly commended for its simplicity.

On the other hand, Canadian theatre and television have a good number of disadvantages compared to Britain. "The most important, I think," says Gardner, "is also the most difficult to explain. It's an attitude towards acting and the theatre held by performers, production people and most important by the public—an attitude of acceptance of acting as a profession."

David Gardner had considerable stage work in Canada, including roles at Stratford, and about 50 TV roles before going to Europe in 1957 on a Tyrone Guthrie award. He toured Europe for six months studying theatre, then spent 18 months in Britain during which time he took the lead in a West End play. "It only lasted five

Sunday on "Rhapsody"

Kids, Pizzas, and Eskimos

SONGS of the world will be featured on this week's *Rhapsody*, Sunday night on the CBC-TV network.

"We're not going to concentrate on any one country this week," says Harvey Hart, one of the four producers who alternate on *Rhapsody*. "It'll be quite international in flavour with songs from the Eskimos to the Irish."

In a way, the program is designed to show the universality of folk songs, and their appeal to young and old. The first number will be a musical suite with children in their national costumes on camera. "I will be using the children periodically throughout the program," says Hart, "cutting to them after the finish of a number, for instance, to watch the expressions on their faces."

Format of the program will change this week too. Conductor Ivan Romanoff with his orchestra and chorus will appear on camera in semiformal dress. "We'll present the numbers concert style," says Hart. "I'm not sure whether we'll have any guests but certainly some members of the chorus and orchestra will be featured."

All numbers have not yet been fixed but the program will at least contain the following:

- The opening suite with the chorus and orchestra playing to youngsters in their national costumes;
- A "food ballet" in which a group of Italian chefs-cum-dancers will show how to prepare a meal of Italian food; they will do things to pizzas that have never been done to pizzas before;
- Ivan Romanoff's chorus will bring viewers back nearer home with an Eskimo song while cameras go to some beautiful Eskimo soap carvings;

• Across the Atlantic to Ireland, now, for the Irish ballad, *The Lover's Curse*, with the chorus and orchestra.

Jan Rubes, of course, continues as host while writer Ernest Waengler does the script.

A great deal of research goes into each week's *Rhapsody*, including advice and more concrete help from almost all the foreign embassies in Ottawa. There are many other sources too; an important one on the July 5 program was Mr. Leszlo Denes, a Hungarian-born photographer, now living in New York. Mr. Denes supplied a number of remarkable pictures of Israel, the country treated on *Rhapsody* that night. These pictures, which caused considerable comment, had been exhibited in New York for the celebration of the tenth anniversary of Israel.

"The program that night was a little longer than we expected," says producer Harvey Hart, "and we had to delete some of the final credits—that for Mr. Denes among them. Maybe I could apologize to him through the *CBC Times*."

Wednesday on "Close-Up"

A Literary Jailbird

Brendan Behan's a strange one.

His play, *The Quare Fellow*, and autobiographical novel, *Borstal Boy* have drawn critical raves everywhere. Yet, interviewed for this week's *Close-Up* by Elaine Grand, Behan took sharp aim at critics.

"The average critic would say anything that comes into his head. Whether they write good about you or bad is entirely and absolutely a matter of luck," he cracked.

His own profession (writing), he described as "a good racket with no faults," then changed his mind and added, "On the other hand it makes things rather uncomfortable for you. Everybody knows you."

And everybody is getting to know Brendan Behan, perhaps more by his antics than by his literary work. Earlier this month (since the interview), Behan launched a thirsty and noisy three-day blitz on London bars, won himself a black-eye, a five shilling fine and a ticket back to Ireland. *The Quare Fellow* continues to play to a full house at London's Wyndham's Theatre.

Who is Brendan Behan? He admits to being born on Holles Street, Dublin, on February 9, 1923, when his father was a Republican prisoner in the same jail as the now President of the Republic, Sean T. O'Kelly. When he was nine he was enrolled in the Fianna Eireann (the Republican Boy Scouts) and when he turned 16 was transferred to the Irish Republican Army as a messenger boy.

"In actual fact," he admitted to Elaine Grand, "I was very inefficient and it is to the credit of the

minating in a charge of being drunk in a public place, and costing him a five shilling fine and a 10 shilling medical bill for treatment of a black eye. (For more details on Behan, see story this page.)

Irish Republican Army that they never made me anything but a messenger." When asked how he came to be carrying explosives when arrested in Liverpool in 1932, he admitted that he was under orders to blow up the battleship *King George V* but added that if matters had run their normal course he probably would have blown himself up.

British authorities saved him the bother. They locked him up in a borstal (reform school), lent him Thomas Hardy's *Under the Greenwood Tree*, and gave him the material for *Borstal Boy*, a sort of *Tom Brown's Schooldays* for juvenile delinquents.

Borstal was not the only prison Behan saw. Assorted spells in adult jails (for I.R.A. activities) helped produce the play *The Quare Fellow*, a play on capital punishment that has been described as "a jig on a gallows trap."

One of the questions Elaine Grand asked Behan was whether he thought fame almost invariably went hand-in-hand with self-destruction.

"I think you're right," Behan replied. "I wouldn't use the phrase destroy yourself . . . I think people do the best they can, no matter who they are, for if they've a fondness for liquor—which I very sincerely have—they drink whiskey rather than beer, which is not such a good thing . . ."

Other Behanisms: On London, Ontario . . . "a piece of impertinence in itself." On Montreal . . . "I think it's stage French. I was never there but I think it sort of acts like being French without being French." On life . . . "I don't have any purpose in life except that I'm afraid of dying." On Canada . . . "I don't think I would like to be in Canada because they work an awful lot. My wife has other work to do besides working."



• A program we liked especially was *Heritage*, which we thought was an illustration of television in its finest role: that of interpreting one part of the community to the others. The sensitivity and sympathy shown in these programs seemed to us to be of exceptional quality, and we would very much like to see more of the same type. Herein seems to lie one of the greatest opportunities of CBC: to make Canada and its peoples known to each other. We would like to have a TV program similar to an old favorite on radio—*Canadian Scene*. We would particularly like to see a series on northern Canada. How exciting a series on industries in Canada, including some of the great and imaginative enterprises such as Kitimat, Ungava, Yellowknife, could be! My teen-age son has become interested in forestry as a profession after hearing a *Canadian Scene* broadcast about forestry in New Brunswick. He would greatly enjoy seeing more about what is being done in this field across Canada. We would also like to see a television version of *Singing Stars of Tomorrow*. The effect of that radio program on the young singers of this country can never be measured. The large number of fine singers who have come to the fore—to the pride of Canada—must surely have had some connection with this program. 
Interlake District On "Manitoba Mirror"

This week little-known voices will be heard speaking out of the misty lowlands lying between Manitoba's two huge lakes. The voices will be those of people in the fishing and farming communities in the Arborg and Riverton districts 90 miles north of Winnipeg. These Interlake districts people will be speaking into the microphones of CBW's mobile radio unit, *Manitoba Mirror*, which will be broadcasting for nearly two hours a day all this week from a temporary studio on the main street of Arborg.

CBW's Bill Guest, Doris Dickson and Gren Bates will act as hosts on the programs. They will be uncovering some of the colourful sights and sounds of the Interlake towns, taking their travelling tape recorders to a thriving farm run by women, to an Icelandic church, to a wharf where plane-loads of fish come in from the north, and to a tea where both the young and the old of this Icelandic and Ukrainian settlement will gather to talk with the *Manitoba Mirror* team.

The programs will begin Monday when a local clergyman, Rev. O. Jack Larson of Ardal Lutheran Church will conduct the first of six *Morning Devotions* periods. Throughout the day five other programs will come direct from the Arborg studio, with *Morning Comment* and *Manitoba Memos* before noon, and the *Farm Broadcast* and two specially scheduled *Manitoba Mirror* programs in the afternoon.

Programs for young people will be another important feature of the week. The *CBC Farm Club* broadcast for 4-H Club members and the *Manitoba Mirror Quiz* for junior high school students will come from the stage of the Community Hall, and so will the national network *Stu Davis Show*.



The three Strauss love songs which Miss Maxwell will sing remained unknown until last year when the German musicologist, Otto Albrecht discovered them in the possession of the niece of Lotte Speyer, the young girl for whom Strauss wrote them in 1883. The 19-year-old composer met Fraulein Speyer at a resort near Munich and corresponded with her for four years. She kept the manuscripts to herself, and willed them to her niece, who also kept their existence a secret until 1958. The songs were performed in public for the first time last December by the German soprano Elisabeth Schwarzkopf in her only Carnegie Hall recital of the season. Tonight's performance will be the first in Canada.

pears that even people in Saskatchewan sometimes think they're one and the same thing. They're not, although they're closely related. The museum is a year-round collection of exhibits; Pion-Era is a show, once a year—a week in which those exhibits go into action. The museum is the parent; Pion-Era is the child.

In Saskatoon I was talking with Mr. J. L. Phelps—Joe Phelps, who is the man most responsible for getting that museum started in 1947. He told me a story that shows how deep can go the love of a man for a machine. It concerns one of the exhibits that His Royal Highness, the Prince Philip, will likely have a chance to examine. Now I confess that I'm wholly inadequate to describe this object of wonder; I never worked on a threshing gang. But I can tell the story about it.

It's a North-West Return Flue Steam Engine and wooden separator, made at Stillwater, Minnesota. Mr. Phelps told me it's the only pair of its kind on the North American continent, so far as they know. A farmer in Manitoba bought it and had it shipped from Stillwater to Manitoba, where he used it in harvesting. Then, after the combine came in, he turned his farm over to his nephew. The engine and separator were then housed in a shed. The uncle kept possession of these treasures, although he left them in the shed, and moved to Minnesota.

On one occasion the nephew wanted the shed for storing grain,

so he moved the old threshing equipment out of its shelter. Somehow word of this heresy reached the uncle in Minnesota. He didn't wait to write; he wired "Put them back!" So, back they went into the shed.

Mr. Phelps knew of the machinery and wanted it for the Western Development Museum. But the nephew said to him, "Oh, you'll never get that away from my uncle!"

Later, in '48 or '49, Mr. Phelps was in Minnesota and went to call on the uncle. At first the old man was adamant. That North West Return Flue Steam Engine and Separator was his; no museum was going to get it. But his wife reasoned with him: "What good does it do you now? If it's in a museum you'll know it's getting good care."

At last the uncle said to Mr. Phelps, "I don't know anything about the museum, but I know you. I'll let you take it—but mind, any time I want it I can come and get it."

So they made out the necessary papers, Mr. Phelps got the engine and the separator, and they're now in the museum, where, no doubt, they contribute their own special bit to the history of the prairies, visible in the museum.

Then, one evening I went with Mrs. Joe Phelps and Mrs. Peter Denholm to have another look at the pioneer rooms in the museum—old fashioned parlour, dining-room, kitchen, and craft room (where they demonstrate spinning and other early household activities).

and Alberta can hear their latest adventure dramatized under the title of *Paul Temple and the Vandike Affair*.

Martyn C. Webster, who has produced all the Temple radio serials for the BBC, first saw their creator 25 years ago, playing in a revue given by students of Birmingham University. "One of the cast," he recalls, "a slim nervous young man, unconsciously succeeded in giving a very bad impersonation of Noel Coward. I was firmly putting a black mark against his name on the program when I noticed that he had written the best item in the revue. So, instead, I made a note to remember him, and I wrote the name Francis Durbridge in my book."

The following week Durbridge walked into his office with what Webster naturally thought was a revue sketch. "To my embarrassment it was a full-length radio play on a serious subject. That night I started to read it and just couldn't put it down. I rang him next day to say how much I liked it." The play, called *Promotion*, was repeated three or four times on radio. It was followed by many more plays, sketches, and lyrics for topical revues, all of which he

wrote with the same zest and competence.

Although his name was now well known and his work broadcast in many countries, he was not satisfied. Webster had for some time been contemplating the possibility of producing a drama serial featuring a detective especially created for radio. Durbridge, as it happened, had been thinking along the same lines, and it was suggested that he have a shot at creating the first BBC radio sleuth. Next morning he rang up to say: "I've already thought of a name . . . Paul Temple . . . how does it sound to you?" It sounded just right to the producer and to listeners also for, on the morning following the final episode of the first serial, over 7,000 letters had been received asking for more. Peter Coke plays Paul Temple, and his wife, Steve, is played by Marjorie Westbury.

Mrs. Denholm is convener of Rooms for the museum, and she has done a loving job, not only of collecting things for them, but also of finding out, as much as possible, the history of each one. Mrs. Denholm, by the way, is going to Britain this summer, and I think she can hardly wait to get at those old castles. She's a lady who will appreciate every stitch of embroidery in the covering of an old chair, or every hand-hammered spout on an old kettle.

In my notebook I have fleeting scraps of what Mrs. Denholm had to say about the treasures she knows so well. While we were still in the parlour: "This tall writing desk . . . black walnut . . . magnificently carved . . . tall chair to match . . . with solid leather seat . . . hand-carved panel on back . . . originally belonging to a woman of Spanish ancestry." And Mrs. Denholm called my particular attention to the curtains on the window—hand-crocheted lace panels made a hundred years ago in Denmark. A Saskatoon resident, the daughter of the lady who made them, donated them to the museum. They hang in graceful folds, but Mrs. Denholm said that when they're stretched out they're at least six feet across.

As we continued through the museum Mrs. Denholm seemed to be missing something. "Where," she asked, "did we put Nellie McClung's mother's parasol?" You see, Nellie McClung, the famous Canadian writer, had donated some of her family treasures to the museum, the parasol among them. Mrs. Denholm finally relaxed; she'd spotted it—in a showcase full of models dressed in old-time fashions.

It would be a pity to leave many of these old things mouldering in

attics or stuffed into an old box in the corner of the garage. In the museum they're in loving hands. The museum does, of course, need a great deal more space—a place for storage and a place for showing exhibits a few at a time. That may come.

Certainly when the Queen and the Prince visit the Museum—and their visit will be hurried indeed—they'll get at least a glimpse of a collection such as they could see no other place in Canada.

—argue that the red traffic light he had been approaching appeared green to him. Actually, such a change would occur only were the driver travelling at many thousands of miles an hour—"and that," said Dr. Kaempffer, "would be too fast even for our B.C. Minister of Highways. . . ."

Non-British Columbians might not get the reference. The B.C. Minister of Highways, known in the local newspapers as "Flying Phil," has on three occasions been charged with speeding on provincial roads.

What does a physicist-and-astronomer feel about the chances of mankind having a future?—Dr. Kaempffer is evasive.

"I think the probability exists that life will continue even if a cataclysmic event took place on earth," he says. And even were humanity wiped out, he adds with grim comfort, that does not mean the end of life itself."

Contrasts for violin, clarinet and piano _____ Bartok
Trio for violin, clarinet and piano (1946) _____ Krenek

Bartok's curious "Contrasts" was commissioned by violinist Joseph Szigeti and clarinetist Benny Goodman, and completed in 1938. The first of its three movements, entitled "Verbunkos," is described as a Hungarian recruiting dance, and is founded on tunes traditionally played on the Magyar "tarogato," a primitive kind of clarinet. The slow middle movement is called "Piheno" ("relaxation"), and the concluding "Sebes" is a quick piece exploiting some characteristic Bulgarian rhythms. The writing is brilliant, especially in the clarinet and violin cadenzas. An unusual feature of the work is the abnormal tuning of the violin re-

quired in some of the passages. Many violinists use two violins in performing this work—one tuned traditionally, and the other as indicated by the composer.

Clarinetist Emilio Iacurto is a promising young musician of considerable talent. In 1953, at the age of 17, he was a finalist in the clarinet competition at the International Music Contest in Geneva. Hyman Bress and Charles Reiner are well-known Montreal musicians. Mr. Bress is leader of the Montreal String Quartet.
