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On radio—

The Italia Prize Dramas

CBC Wednesday Night to present Canadian productions of distinguished radio plays

SOME of the world's finest radio dramas, those winning Italia prizes over the past few years, plus vivid documentaries on subjects ranging from the building of the C.P.R. to the case of Ezra Pound, plus musical concerts by world celebrities, and by Canadian choirs, orchestras, groups and individuals—all these will make up this season's *CBC Wednesday Night*. Thus a tradition of fine broadcasting built up over the 11-year life of *CBC Wednesday Night* continues this year.

The annual Italia awards are Europe's most distinguished radio awards with more than 20 countries throughout the world taking part. This year's Italia Award was won by a CBC drama, *A Beach of Strangers*, written and produced by CBC producer John Reeves. *CBC Wednesday Night* has previously broadcast, through the BBC Transcription Service, such famous Italia prize winners as Dylan Thomas' *Under Milkweed* and *The Dock Brief*. This season, the prize-winning plays will have Canadian production. They will be heard on the first Wednesday of every month.

Following is a list of award winners to be heard, with the country of origin in parentheses—

October 7: *The Streets of Pompeii* by Henry Reed (England);

November 4: *The Face of Violence* by J. Bronowski (England);

December 2: *The Devil's Tear* by Theophile Gauthier (France);

January 6: *An Evening in Late Autumn* by Friedrich Duerrenmatt (Switzerland);

February 3: *The Homecoming* by Peter Hirche (Germany);

March 2: *True But Not to Be Believed* by Claude Aveline (France);

April 6: *The Quick and the Dead* by Herbert Eisenreich (Germany);

May 4: *Christopher Columbus* by Charles Bertin (Belgium).

CBC Wednesday Night documentaries start on November 11 with *The Fall of Quebec*, to be concluded on November 18. Joseph Schull writes and J. Frank Willis produces this four-hour documentary marking the 200th anniversary of the battle. Part 1 covers life in Quebec prior to its capture, Wolfe's preparations in England, his struggle up the St. Lawrence, the jealousy between civil and military authorities in Quebec, Wolfe's early attempts to take the city, and his resolve to scale the cliffs and reach the Plains of Abraham. Part 2 opens with the English on the Heights, and Montcalm mustering his army, and goes through the battle, then on to the final surrounding of Montreal by three English armies—and the fall of New France.

Other documentaries are as follows:

February 10: *Van Horne and the Building of the C.P.R.*, by Tommy Tweed. A two-hour documentary (Please turn to page 4)

"The Wonderful World of Entertainment"

First program of the new "Startime" series, a U.S.-Canadian venture into television entertainment of the highest order

The most star-studded, exciting entertainment series in North American television history begins Tuesday night on CBC-TV. Show-business greats from both sides of the Atlantic will pool their performing, writing and directing talents in *Startime*, a 39-week series of 90-minute and hour-long spectaculars originating with NBC in the United States and CBC in Canada. Several performers long established as top screen and stage personalities will make their TV acting debuts in the series.

The premiere this week is *The Wonderful World of Entertainment* (NBC), a revue described as "an excursion in depth into every phase of entertainment in music, drama, records, motion pictures and television" in the last three decades. It stars Rosalind Russell, Maurice Chevalier, Kate Smith, Jack Paar, Polly Bergen, and Eddie Hodges, youthful star of the Broadway hit *The Music Man*, and featured with Frank Sinatra in the film *Hole in the Head*. Rosalind Russell will act as the audience's guide as *The Wonderful World of Entertainment* unfolds on Tuesday night. Recently her name has been synonymous with that of *Auntie Mame*, the delightfully zany sophisticate whom she created on Broadway and in motion pictures. The production will be staged and choreographed by Bob Fosse, who was choreographer for the Broadway productions of *Damn Yankees*, *Pajama Game* and *Redhead*, and shared the honours in *Bells Are Ringing*. The script is by Howard Teichman, co-author of *The Solid Gold Cadillac*.

Jerry Lewis makes his TV drama debut October 13 in *The Jazz Singer*, the role created by the late Al Jolson. Lewis will make no attempt to imitate Jolson. The show's songs have all been adapted to his special style. Ingrid Bergman makes her long-awaited TV debut October 20 (NBC) in Henry James' *The Turn of the Screw*, adapted for her by James Costigan. Other NBC productions to be seen early in the series include *The Crime of Jabel Deeks*, featuring Sir Alec Guinness in his first TV dramatic appearance on this continent (the play was adapted by John D. Hess from his original *Esquire* magazine story, *The Wicked Scheme of Jabel Deeks*);

and Shirley Booth will be seen in Tennessee Williams' *The Glass Menagerie*.

Canadian contributions to the series start off October 27 with Arthur Miller's play *The Crucible*, adapted by Mavor Moore, with Leslie Nielsen in the leading role.

Nielsen is a Canadian actor who has won acclaim recently in British and American stage, film and TV roles. The rest of the cast includes Diana Maddox, Douglas Rain, Douglas Campbell and John Drainie. Production will be by Harvey Hart. Arthur Laurents' *Clearing in the Woods* on November 10 features American actress Nancy Wickwire, seen last spring in an off-Broadway revival of the play, and recently at the Stratford (Conn.) Festival. Bob Allen will produce. Scheduling dates will be announced later for *Summertime* by the modern Italian writer Ugo Betti, produced by Eric Till; Arthur Miller's modern version of Ibsen's *An Enemy of the People*

produced by Mario Prizker; Jean Anouilh's *Point of Departure*, produced by Paul Almond; Joseph Conrad's *Secret Agent*, adapted by Joseph Schull and produced by Harvey Hart; and the National Ballet's latest edition to its repertoire, Sir Arthur Sullivan's *Pineapple Poll*, produced by Norman Campbell.

Variety shows and musicals will be sprinkled through the rest of the *Startime* season, along with other top-flight dramatic productions.

Time For French

A new language series with Gerard Arthur

French-speaking Gerard Arthur and his English-speaking wife, Sheila, will be heard Saturday afternoons on CBC radio, beginning October 3, in a new 15-minute series for English listeners who would like to hear more spoken French.

Time for French begins each week with a brief news story from the week's headlines so that the audience may enjoy recognizing familiar names and events in another language. There will be a brief weather report, followed by a light, entertaining dialogue under the title *C'est la vie*. Monsieur, who is French, and Madame, who is English, will quarrel at the breakfast table, make plans for the fall garden clean-up, or discuss some every-day Canadian subject with wit and humour.

C'est la vie will use both languages, and the conversation will be quite easy to follow, even by listeners who understand little spoken French.

The program will be followed by *Chansonettes*, in which Jacques DesBaillets plays recordings of typically French songs and music.

tells the story of Van Horne's stubborn battle to complete the building of the C.P.R. Writer Tommy Tweed's *The Honourable Member for Kingston*, a life of Sir John A. Macdonald, was a *Wednesday Night* feature some years ago.

October 14: *Darwin Centenary* by Lister Sinclair—An investigation of science's debt to Charles Darwin on the centenary of the publication of his *The Origin of Species*.

November 25: *The Face of the City: Vancouver*—a portrait in words and sound.

December 30: *Profile of J. W. Dufoe*, a biography of the great editor of the *Winnipeg Free Press* told in taped reminiscences and interviews by the people who knew him best and worked with him. The

narrator will be one of Canada's foremost editors, George Ferguson, of the *Montreal Star*, formerly of the *Winnipeg Free Press*.

January 20: *The Case of Ezra Pound*. A biographical investigation of the poet from the days when he helped to bring about a revolution in modern writing to his activities during the second World War for which he was later accused of treason: a twentieth-century document of the artist involved in politics.

March 9: *Publishing in Canada*. A look at the literary situation in Canada today with special attention paid to book publishing, magazines, and the status and prospects of the full-time writer.

“Congratulations . . . It Was Just Awful”

“Morning Devotions” experiment provokes mixed
reaction among CBW listeners

CBC RADIO'S two daily devotional programs, *Family Worship* and *Morning Devotions* have always had large followings of faithful (in two senses) listeners. The programs are mentioned—and praised—in our audience mail as much as any other in the schedule.

Never, however, has either of the programs provoked as much comment as did the CBW (Manitoba) series on *Morning Devotions* September 7-12 when Rev. Dr. Keith Clifford of Augustine United Church in Winnipeg used all six of his programs to expound his theories on religious music.

In a nutshell, Dr. Clifford's idea is that “somehow the church has got to overcome its distinction between sacred and secular music and begin once again to express its faith in terms of the music of the people.” The music he played to illustrate his point—gospel songs by Mahalia Jackson, Maria Knight, Rosetta Tharpe, and Della Reese, and Father Geoffrey Beaumont's *20th Century Folk Mass*—brought such mixed reactions as the following:

“I found your talks most refreshing. It has been a long time since I have heard anything from my church which made me stop and think. Thank you for playing music which shook us rather hide-bound church members to our

roots.” (From a Winnipeg housewife);


“What a shock! I thought the CBC had cancelled another good old standby to cater to the jukebox gang and be as indistinguishable as possible from the private stations. I nearly turned it off before the cacophonous record was done. You could have knocked me over with a feather when it turned out to be *Morning Devotions* after all.” (A Brandon woman listener);

“Congratulations! Your week of enlightenment was greatly appreciated by me and I hope by many. Being a housewife I was particularly pleased to hear some new thoughts that I could ponder over and discuss with my friends. One or two found the music disgusting while others of us found it to be most informative. Good luck in your crusade, and may God give you strength and courage to stand up against your critics, which I'm sure will be many.” (A suburban Winnipeg housewife);

“I look forward to *Morning Devotions*, but this week it has been just awful. Just who do you think listens to *M.D.*?—Not the people who enjoy *that* music!” (Winnipeg listener).

One listener prophesied: “I'm sure one would find that in every parish there would be a great schism—the older congregation vehemently opposed to such startling change and the younger members taking it up joyously.” But an 82-year-old woman wrote: “I think it is wonderful for you to do this. I remember well when we used to sing our beloved songs with the tunes of the songs of the world, but God understood. Thank you and bless you for your courage.”

The mixed reactions to the programs was no surprise to Dr. Clifford. It was, in fact, because he knew it would shock many listeners that he decided to give

was born in Transcona, Man., and educated there and at United College in Winnipeg (B.A., B.D.) and the University of London (Ph.D.). During the first part of his college years he intended to become a professional musician and studied harmony, counterpoint, composition and orchestration at the University of Manitoba and privately. He earned his way through United College by playing the trumpet in dance bands. Dr. Clifford received his Ph.D. for advanced studies in Puritanism. While in England he was also minister of a Congregationalist church in London which was noted for its congregational singing.

Morning Devotions this unusual twist.

“I find that a devotional program either promotes my stodginess or challenges me to action before God,” Dr. Clifford explains. “I think it is the responsibility of the speaker to ‘stab his listeners awake,’ so I picked a topic which seems fairly obvious to most people, but about which they don't really do much thinking—music.”

One of Dr. Clifford's colleagues, a United Church minister in rural Manitoba, was affected in the desired manner. He told Dr. Clifford that he was shocked by the first few programs, but that by the end of the series he had reassessed his thinking and was sold on the idea. (A letter to CBC from another

minister appears in our *Mailbag* column on page 18).

Why are people shocked — at least at first—by the idea of sacred words cast in the idiom of popular music? There are several reasons, Dr. Clifford believes.

In the first place, most people's ability to judge religious music is inhibited by certain conventions. Dr. Clifford points out that it is actually a tradition of the church to turn the popularity of secular music to its own uses. In the middle ages many love songs, and even drinking songs, were transformed into hymns; and the origins of the carol are purely secular. The division between secular and sacred music is a fairly modern and artificial thing.

In the second place there is among church people an aversion to the contemporary. They don't want their religion to be contained within contemporary forms. "In so thinking they are denying that God himself by taking human form became a true contemporary—and still is so far as the church is concerned," Dr. Clifford explains. He feels that a statement such as the following, sent in by a woman listener, shows a lack of understanding of the true nature of the Christian faith, that it is, in fact, tinged with heresy: "I believe that the

gospel music is to praise God and to lift the mind and soul *above the things of this world.*"

Of all the arts, Dr. Clifford points out, music has suffered most from this dislike of contemporary forms for traditional beliefs. Although there are, for example, still some people who believe that churches should be built in the architecture of the middle ages there are now many churches that stand as striking examples of the best in modern architecture. And Dr. Clifford points to the modern mural on St. Paul's College as an example of the growing re-acceptance of contemporary art in the Christian church. But people are slower in accepting any change from the type of music that "solidified" in the Protestant churches almost 100 years ago.

"Somehow or other," Dr. Clifford said in the first of his radio talks, "our gears seem to have slipped and we haven't managed to shift them ahead in order to keep up with the new pace."

". . . But why *popular* music?" Some people who do agree that more contemporary music is needed in the church have asked. To this Dr. Clifford replies that unfortunately most so-called "classical" contemporary music is of an experimental nature and not easily grasped by the layman. All church music, he believes, should be simple and easily remembered.

On the other hand, he admits that the line must be drawn somewhere. The music, whether "popular" or "classical," must be the best of its type if it is to be used in the church. Although he is sympathetic with the idea behind the use of "fox-trot hymns" sometimes heard, Dr. Clifford does not believe that they provide a wide enough framework for the expression of deep evangelical faith. And in the second of his radio talks Dr. Clifford opposed strongly "that spurious type of inspirational tune that seems to be all the rage nowadays on so many of our western-type musical shows."

Neither does Dr. Clifford believe that there is no place in the church for obviously great and timeless music from the past—such as that of Bach. What he is fighting is the idea that music *must* be (a) old and (b) unrelated to the tempo of contemporary life in order to justify its place in the church.



Children's television

No Formal Instruction— Just Useful Information

THE TV ADVENTURES of two children on a tramp steamer round the B.C. coast . . . music, people and activities of interest to teen-agers on radio's *Teen Tempo* . . . Mary Grannan's tales of make-believe . . . the child's curiosity for things and processes on *See for Yourself* . . . the combination of fact and fancy on *Radio Magazine* and *Junior Magazine* . . . the filmed adventures of *Lassie* and *Roy Rogers* — these are but some of the features of the new fall radio and TV schedules.

"We are taking programs from centres right across Canada," said Fred Rainsberry, supervisor of children's programs for CBC radio and television. "We don't demand that each region give us something supposedly unique to that region. But the mere fact that the programs originate from various points tends to give the schedule a national flavour."

The CBC is the only TV network in North America that has a department devoted solely to children's programming. The staff includes four professionally trained teachers whose experience ranges from elementary school to university. One staff member is a composer of distinction, two have had special training in psychology and one in agricultural science, and one is a professional journalist. Consultants include prominent educators with special skills in radio and TV.

Producers in the CBC children's department constantly seek new and more effective means of presentation. Programs like *Junior Magazine* use novel continuity techniques and are experimenting with the integration of film and studio techniques in a way that may have considerable influence in a wider field. Recent programs using these techniques won awards

at Columbus, Ohio, and at the Vancouver Film Festival some weeks ago.

"We don't attempt any instructional television or radio in the formal sense," said Dr. Rainsberry, "but we do try to provide the child with useful and interesting information that will enrich his background. We assume the child has a natural curiosity about the world around him and we hope to stimulate a feeling of the importance of getting along with other people, the understanding of his physical environment, and a feeling of pride in his cultural heritage."

Of the new television programs, *See for Yourself* is particularly interesting. It tells of the romance of transportation, starting with railroads. Ross Snetsinger and a new performer, Stephen Barringer, investigate the workings of a railroad, talking to some of the people involved, and railroad stories are dramatized.

This Living World is interesting both for its content and its production. Originating in Montreal, the program is identical to the French network program, *La Vie Qui Bat*, except that it is in English. The two programs have the same bilingual author, the same French-Canadian producer, the same sets, the same animals in the same situations.

"Later in the series we might have some or all of the programs in French," said Dr. Rainsberry. "The program is a fascinating one and I'm certain the children will be listening to and learning French without realizing it."

Programs like *Teen Tempo*, *Radio Magazine*, *Youth '60* and *Junior Magazine* are in part designed to develop talented Canadian children, "not in the unattractive, exhibitionist fashion so common to many so-called amateur hours," said Dr. Rainsberry, "but in a context of mature, professional talent."

Winnipeg sends a very interesting program to the network this year. It is called *Art in Action*. George Swinton, Professor of Art at the University of Manitoba,

R.C.M.P. Series Starts October 28

R.C.M.P., a new television series about the Mounties, has the official blessing of the world-famous police organization.

"This is a large-scale venture in the field of television and films, and we will co-operate to the best possible advantage," says Commissioner C. E. Rivett-Carnac.

Although *R.C.M.P.* will be shown in Great Britain and possibly in the U.S., continental Europe and South America, Canadian viewers will see it first. The series starts on the CBC-TV network October 28.

R.C.M.P. will employ top-acting and production talent from Canada, Broadway and Hollywood.

Gilles Pelletier, a named best French-Canadian actor in 1958, plays the lead role of Cpl. Jacques Gagnier. John Perkins left the cast of *Bells Are Ringing* on Broadway to play the part of Const. Frank Scott. Canadian actor-comedian Don Francks portrays Const. Mitchell. Frances Hyland and John Drainie, well known to those who watch CBC-TV, will appear in one or more episodes.

Early episodes will concern the activities of a three-man *R.C.M.P.* detachment stationed in the fictitious Canadian town of Shamattawa.

Later stories will be filmed in various parts of Canada. They will describe experiences of Mounties in the Arctic and show operations of the *R.C.M.P.* marine division.

Hollywood director Bernard Girard produced the early episodes in the series. Girard was an originator of the *Medic* series on American TV and directed 48 episodes of *You Are There*.

The first 39 stories will have been filmed when the series begins on the CBC-TV network in October. With foreign sales in Britain and

Australia, and other markets in the offing, it is almost certain there will be a second series.

Henry Fonda -The Deputy

In 1955, when Henry Fonda was filmed walking down a stretch of lonely road for a sequence in a TV dramatic show, he was reminded of a similar scene he made in the late 1930's. The picture was *The Grapes of Wrath* and it opened with Fonda leaving a truck and walking down a lonely road.

"I hadn't thought of it until now," said Fonda. "but that opening scene was lucky for me. I hope I do as well in this."

That sort of statement would be quite appropriate for a young hopeful at the beginning of his career. But does it fit an established leading man—one of Broadway's and Hollywood's most famous actors?

It does, if the star is Henry Fonda. The modest and soft-spoken manner that personifies his stage and screen performances is the Fonda manner off-stage as well, making him one of the best-liked people in an industry where modesty is not reported to be over-abundant.

The actor made his television debut as star of his own series September 10 (in Canada, September 12 in the U.S.). He portrays Marshal Simon Fry in *The Deputy*, adventure series set in Arizona in the 1880's.

Fonda was born in Grand Island, Nebraska. He was raised and attended schools in Omaha, where he made an outstanding record in scholarship and athletics. He enrolled at the University of Minnesota with a journalism career in mind, earning tuition by teaching physical training in a Minneapolis settlement house. Subsequently unable to find newspaper work, Fonda worked at such varied jobs as telephone lineman, garage mechanic, iceman and window washer, before a chance visit to a new Omaha enterprise, the Community Playhouse, changed the entire course of his life. Joining the troupe at the suggestion of friends, Fonda felt

so at home as part-time actor, set designer and technician that he became one of the theatre's leaders within three years, and decided on acting as a career.

Heading east, he added to his experience with summer stock engagements in Massachusetts, Washington (D.C.), Maryland and Pennsylvania. A notable acting company which he helped found, the University Players, had among its theatrical greats such eager beginners as Margaret Sullavan, Kent Smith, Myron McCormick, Josh Logan, James Stewart and Mildred Natwick.

Fonda's first professional engagement in New York was as extra and general understudy for the Theatre Guild. It was not until the revue, *New Faces*, that his name first appeared in a playbill. Later on, he acted in a revival of *The Swan* starring Geoffrey Kerr. The latter's wife, June Walker, spotted him in the company and knew he would make an ideal leading man for her next show, *The Farmer Takes a Wife*. Fonda leaped to stardom overnight in the play.

His numerous Broadway credits since then include *Mister Roberts*, *Point of No Return*, *Caine Mutiny*, *Court Martial* and most recently, *Two for the See Saw*.

Changes Made In "Speaking French"

Prof. Jean-Paul Vinay and his "model student," glamorous Montreal fashion model Phyllis Claperton, return to the television network Saturday, October 10, for a new 26-week series of *Speaking French*.

More than 30,000 lesson summaries were mailed out to viewers from coast to coast last season. New lessons will be going out to viewers on the mailing list before the new series begins.

There will be two changes in the format of the program this year: Producer Larry Shapiro hopes to have a small group of students in the studio to participate in the lessons, and this year the entire 30 minutes will be directed towards an adult audience. (Hélène Baillargeon, who last year conducted the kindergarten portion of *Speaking French* is now working with the CBC's school broadcasts department on a daily 15-minute program of French for pre-school children. The program, as yet untitled, will be scripted by Raymond Duplantis, whose experiment with the Tan-Gau language system in the Oakville public schools has received widespread attention.)

Montreal TV critic Pat Pearce last year described *Speaking*

French as "education at its most painless." She wrote:

"Professor Vinay and his charming assistant are now old hands at all kinds of engaging visual aids to learning. Grammar, translation and pronunciation are combined in subtle and expert proportion so skillfully, indeed, that these programs have less the effect of teaching another tongue than the cheerful atmosphere of saying the same things two ways."

The lessons this year will continue with more tricks and special props and cartoons by Graeme Ross, all designed to make the program interesting to both beginners and advanced students. There will be special guests on the program from time to time, as required.

(*Speaking French* is pre-empted on most stations October 10 by a W.I.F.U. game).

About "The Man From Blackhawk"

Bob Rockwell, best known for his portrayal of Mr. Boynton in the *Our Miss Brooks* TV series, stars as an insurance investigator in the exciting series, *Man from Blackhawk*, another of the new American film series which will be shown first on CBC-TV. It starts Thursday, Oct. 1.

Rockwell portrays Sam Logan, a special investigator for the Black-

hawk Insurance Co. of Chicago in the year 1875.

Following is what the company has to say about Logan on his personal file under the heading "General Remarks": "Very stable, highly intelligent and resourceful . . . dependable for routine paperwork . . . invaluable for possibility of dangerous physical encounters . . . use where others might fail."

Producer Herb Meadow spent seven months of research on the insurance industry before his first script was written. He likes to think of *Man from Blackhawk* as a "whydunit" rather than a "who-dunit" or a western.

"Sam Logan is interested in why insurance fraud is committed as much as he is in who the guilty party is," Meadow explains. "Logan is able to understand the people who perpetrate these crimes. He never judges them, he'll never preach. He discharges his assignments successfully because he understands, and there's your "why-runit."

In filming *Man from Blackhawk*, producer Meadow used the Columbia Picture Corporation "ranch" in the San Fernando Valley. This ranch has a complete western town, 40 acres of range land, seaports and New York streets, all of which will be used in the series.



MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH

JULIAN BREAM, the celebrated performer on lute and guitar, whom many people will remember from his TV appearance at Toronto last season, with the no less celebrated tenor Peter Pears, is to be heard in the first concert of a new *Distinguished Artists* series, on Tuesday evening this week.

Of all the sources of sound, plucked strings vary most in public estimation, and have been most subject to the vagaries of fashion, at least since the maturing of "art" music, and its differentiation from the "popular" variety. Harp and lyre, and their innumerable variants, go back to the beginning of things; the instruments that can sing developed only yesterday, by comparison, and even after their appearance on the scene, those that twang held sway for a long time. For long after the orchestra had become an established medium of artistic utterance, it was unthinkable without the background

Radio - The Fall Schedule

CBC RADIO will stress a balanced entertainment week in its fall schedule of Trans-Canada network programs. New shows have been added to the schedule and some existing one given new times to provide a strong daily foundation of feature programs.

Project '60, the CBC Symphony Orchestra and Vancouver Chamber Orchestra concerts, and *Children's Magazine* have been moved to new time periods. Among new programs will be performances by a specially-organized CBC light concert orchestra, regional variety shows, a serious-music talent contest, highlights from *Trans-Canada Matinee*, short-story readings by actor John Drainie, and a series of national-music programs.

Project '60, its scope widened to include music and drama programs as well as documentaries, will be heard Tuesday evenings and repeated on Sunday afternoons. The CBC Symphony Orchestra broadcast will be heard on Friday evenings instead of Sunday evenings. A major undertaking by the orchestra later in the year will be five concerts in which all of the Beethoven symphonies will be performed. The Vancouver Chamber Orchestra concerts will be heard on Monday evenings. *Children's Magazine* (with Rod Coneybeare) will be moved from Saturday mornings to Sunday afternoons.

A 45-piece light concert orchestra has been formed by the CBC to play Saturday evening programs. Selections will range from popular music to familiar classics. Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, variety shows produced in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver will be broadcast. Canadian jazz groups will be heard on Thursday evenings, and the program *Tempo* will include

daily a segment of music by small combos.

Sir Ernest MacMillan will conduct the new talent program, and a panel of judges will grade contestants. Shows will originate in Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, with semi-finals and the final broadcast from Toronto. The program will be heard on Sunday evenings.

Matinee Highlights, a selection from the week's top features on Trans-Canada Matinee, will be heard on Sunday mornings. *Stories with John Drainie* is the title of a series of daily readings by Drainie of original short stories by Canadian writers. The programs of music of different ethnic groups in Canada originating in several Canadian cities, will be heard on Friday nights.

CBC Wednesday Night this year will include a series of recitals by celebrities, and a series of dramas which won the Italia Prize. Thursday will be primarily a talks and public affairs evening, with *Citizens' Forum* as the main program. Other programs examining major issues are also planned.

Among returning Saturday programs will be the *Metropolitan Opera* broadcasts and *Stories in French*. The French-language period on CBC radio will be extended from 15 minutes to a half-hour. *Chansonettes*, a program of French songs, will follow Gerard Arthur's readings of well-known stories by French authors.

On "CBC Stage"

Prometheus Bound

A modernized version of Aeschylus' play

PPROMETHEUS is one of our present-day heroes. It's quite wonderful what he did for us. But did he go too far? Judge for yourself when you hear his story. He was one of the Titans of Greek mythology, vigorous, audaciously defiant to the point of recklessness, but a warm, very human character, indeed. The tale goes that the great god Zeus employed him to make men out of mud and water. Then, in pity for the helpless creatures he had brought to life, Prometheus stole fire from heaven and gave it to them, and taught them many arts, including the one of self-preservation. Zeus was naturally wrathful. It's said that he planned to destroy the human race and supplant it by a new and better species, to avenge himself because man had got the better of him. To counterbalance Prometheus' gifts to man, Zeus sent Pandora to earth as the first woman, to become the wife of Prometheus' brother. With her she took a box that Zeus forbade her to open, but, having a woman's natural curiosity, she disobeyed, and let loose all the evils that have been hounding man ever since. Only Hope stayed inside.

Then Zeus turned his attention to Prometheus, who knew the secret of how the great god would be overthrown one day. He ordered Prometheus chained to a crag in the wilderness of Mount Caucasus, to suffer interminable torment—all day an eagle preyed on his liver, which was renewed at night, ready for further torture the next day. Unflinching, Prometheus steadfastly refused to tell Zeus the secret of man's power to preserve himself. Eventually he was delivered by being swallowed up in a giant earthquake. Through his heroism we retained the nucleus of our

knowledge of science and the arts. But will this great treasure destroy us in the end? That, briefly, is the situation in Len Peterson's reworking of *Prometheus Bound*, one of a trilogy by the Greek playwright Aeschylus. If you're not a mythology fan, don't get the idea that this is just a grim, dry tale in archaic language about creatures with ideas too far removed from our philosophy to be credible. On the contrary. Peterson has modernized the language, put considerable punch into the story, rearranged the sequences but retained most of the plot, and the result is a meaty, entertaining drama which will open the latest *CBC Stage* series Sunday night on CBC radio. Esse Ljungh will produce.

"I'm staggered at how contemporary the play really is," says (Please turn to page 29)



The Growth of the Novel

A new "University of the Air" series
by Paul West

THE NOVEL as an art form goes back to the ancient Greeks, back as far as Homer's *Odyssey* of the tenth century B.C. If for centuries the classical romances lay undeveloped, at least since the 15th and 16th centuries it has flourished and matured. Today, some critics argue, the novel is dying.

Critic Paul West, Assistant Professor of English at Memorial University, St. John's, Newfoundland, believes not. He tells why in the first of a new series of *University of the Air* lectures called *The Growth of the Novel*, which starts on Monday, October 5, on CBC radio.

During the series Professor West will discuss as novels such works as *The Golden Ass* and *Pilgrim's Progress*, although they are not usually so considered.

The first lecture sees the novel's growth in terms of three views of man: man in the abstract, man in society, and man in the privacy of his own mind. Today, Professor West suggests, the three factors have merged. But the novel, with the resources and complexity of maturity, is still doing its main job: social depiction.

The classical "novel" for instance—Longus' *Daphnis and Chloe* (3rd century A.D.), and Apuleius' *The Golden Ass* (2nd century A.D.)—deals with abstract types rather than with individual psychology, subjecting a representative figure to a series of tests, grim or frivolous.

In the 16th and 17th centuries "novelists" began introducing a note of realism into their works—Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress* and Thomas Nashe's *The Unfortunate Traveller*. The 18th century brought the discipline of tighter plot, more subtle psychological insights and the use of the novel for social probing; from Daniel Defoe's

Moll Flanders to Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice*.

The 19th century saw the great age of the novel. The critical observation of society, psychological insight, and a statement of cosmology are synthesized in books like Flaubert's *Madame Bovary*, Dicken's *Great Expectations*, Dostoevsky's *Crime and Punishment* and Tolstoy's *War and Peace*.

In the twentieth century we still find novelists attempting this synthesis, but, while they often acquire a balance and proportion not inferior to the 19th century novel, yet in some way they often falter in their coherence: Lawrence's *Sons and Lovers*, Forster's *A Passage to India*, down to Pasternak's *Dr. Zhivago*. But also in this century, we have the poet's novel; inward vision and mental flux overpower any effort at social realism. The novel attempts the poet's work, neglecting the surface of things for the sometimes unrewarding depths of mind: Proust's *Remembrance of Things Past*, Joyce's *Ulysses* and Woolf's *The Waves*.

Finally, with a lecture to itself, comes the American novel possessing a tendency to turn every activity into a fable of spiritual pioneering. The American novel exposes the American's keen response to the theme of social rise in cosmic and romantic terms. In this sense the American novel evokes the abstract patterns of the classical novel



20th CENTURY FOLK MASS

Performance of Father Geoffrey Beaumont's 20th Century Folk Mass performed by Frank Weir and his Concert Orchestra, the Peter Knight Singers and Charles Young, cantor, recorded in 1957 in England. Fr. Beaumont has attempted, by use of popular-type music—even jazz—to emphasize the meaning and drama of the Mass rather than its historical beauty, and "to provide men and women living in the modern world with an expression of faith that is close to their own experience." He justifies this attempt by pointing out that the division separating religious and secular music is both artificial and comparatively recent in origin, that love songs and drinking songs were transformed into hymns in the middle ages, and that in taking over these musical forms and adapting them to their own uses the Church drew strength from their popularity. Fr. Beaumont (born in 1904) wrote songs for revues while an undergraduate at Cambridge. After qualifying as a solicitor he discovered his vocation and in 1932 he was ordained. He has been a chaplain with the Royal Marines, chaplain to Trinity College, Cambridge, and chaplain to the British Embassy in Madrid. Since 1957

he has been vicar of St. George's, Camberwell.

while attempting the same sort of social analysis as the 19th century novel: James' *Daisy Miller*, Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn*, Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby*, and Hemingway's *The Old Man and the Sea*.

Professor Paul West has been on CBC radio and TV since coming to Canada in 1957. He was born in England, and although not yet thirty has had much verse and prose published in periodicals like *The New Statesman*, *The Canadian Forum*, *Times Literary Supplement* and many others. He has also pub-

lished a number of books, critical and poetry.

Bannerman of the book by Dr. E. A. Corbett. An informal account of his years in the extension department of the University of Alberta, it's filled with unusual stories about usual and delightful people. In his introduction to the book Leonard W. Brockington describes it as "a great Canadian documentary lightened with glimpses of a lovable personality."

"Here also," Mr. Brockington says, are a richness of stories and character sketches and hundreds of human touches which make the pages sparkle in the eyes of the reader as the personality of the author sparkles in the company of his friends."

Among the incidents: One time Dr. Corbett arrived in a small Alberta community to deliver a lecture and found that the lecture hall had disappeared. Some rapid detection showed that a farmer had hauled it out of town to use it for storing surplus wheat. The lecture was delayed until the audience had hitched up several teams and towed the hall back to town. Another time the hand-crank for his portable movie projector disappeared just before he was due to begin an illustrated lecture in a small farming community. The audience had to sit there until a drunken blacksmith had manufactured a new one.

Peterson. "I chose it originally because it deals with a lot of questions we're asking ourselves about our dilemma today. But after working on it I found it was even more pointed than I had thought. It hits home in a lot of areas and makes us think . . . those old Greek writers knew as much about life as anyone, even if they did live 2,000

years ago! We can learn a lot from them. Aeschylus nailed down quite a few things that had been puzzling me."

He goes on to say that one of the problems in adapting Greek mythology is making the old characters pertinent and convincing to a contemporary audience. He felt that none of the translations of Prometheus Bound was quite right for broadcasting. Because none had been done by a playwright, the dramatic potential hadn't been used fully, and the figures of speech were too involved, so Peterson did a tailoring job on the story, with interesting results. He thinks that the play "is especially good for radio because it hasn't much physical action, but it's a very powerful story and moves along nicely. I'm working in close collaboration with arranger-conductor Morris Surdin to make up for visual aids with some rather eloquent music."

Aeschylus has given Peterson some powerful material to work with. The ancient Greek is a master of contrasts in dealing with the dark mysteries of fate, with the forces of destiny working through divine will and human passion, which he reveals with shuddering

intensity. But he gave more to the theatre than words. He introduced the raised stage, the elaborate tragic costume, and the second actor, making possible a clash of interests and characters. It's said that he was killed when an eagle mistook his bald head for a stone and dropped a tortoise on it to break the shell.

of plucked-string tone that the harpsichord provided. But for the past two centuries or so, interest in the plucked strings has waxed and waned, from almost fanatical addiction to almost total neglect—and this interest, moreover, shifts about in a curious way from one section of the body politic to another. The harp was a widely cultivated domestic instrument in the early 19th century, when it was almost unknown in the orchestra and concert hall; and in my own up-and-coming days, to have revealed even a sneaking interest in, say, the mandoline, in my part of the world, would definitely have been to downgrade yourself from the ranks of the elite—although the instrument had enjoyed a considerable vogue a generation or so before.

Why these things should be so, I have no idea. It may be that at times when the singing tone of bowed string and pipe is the ideal to be admired and cultivated, the thinner, drier sounds of plucked strings fall less gratefully on the ear, and produce some revulsion. Or social factors may have something to do with it; plucked strings have always been beloved of the masses, and perhaps the fluctuating interest of the musically liter-

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ate in some subtle way reflects the alternating manifestations of the aristocratic and plebeian spirits, so peculiarly characteristic of intellectual and artistic development. But such speculations, though interesting, are not very profitable.

The esteem in which the lute was once held can be gauged from the list of composers on whom Mr. Bream has drawn for his program—Robert Johnson, Philip Rosseter, Daniel Batchelor, John Dowland—giants in their 16th century day, and some of them masters whose fame still rings down the ages. Soon after their time, the lute virtually disappeared from sight, to be revived only in the last few years—there are still only a handful of concert-calibre players in the world. The guitar, while it never suffered the total eclipse of the lute, had its own ups and downs; in our own day it has made a strong come-back as an instrument of high artistic capacity, through the example and influence of such masters as Segovia. On it, Mr. Bream will play music by Bach and Villa-Lobos, and some Variations on a Theme of Mozart, by Fernando Sor, who died in 1829, and whose level of attainment with it, as both composer and player, earned him the title of the "Beethoven of the Guitar."

The week's music generally offers a pleasingly variegated blend of old names and new. Pepusch, contemporary of Handel in England, who shares the Sunday morning Chamber Music program of the Baroque Trio of Montreal, with Couperin as the composer of the Sonata by which he is here represented. The Winnipeg Concert of Sunday afternoon divides its program between Holzbauer, Schubert and the contemporary English composer Francis Baines, playing the latter's Symphony For Chamber Orchestra, his best known work.
