Anna Has a Mind of her Own —But It Can be Changed

*Madame Benoit converted her to spices—
her cleaning woman put her straight on
contemporary furnishings*

"I DON'T always want to practice what I preach," says Anna Cameron.

But as hostess on *Open House*, a program that aims at helping women viewers to be connoisseurs of everything pertaining to the home, Anna finds this is expected of her.

Open House returns to the air this Tuesday—October 13.

"I'm a hoarder and a collector of all kinds of souvenirs and knick-knacks," she says. "My apartment was becoming so cluttered with all these things and with my furniture that friends were beginning to 'tut-tut' at me. *Open House* has many series on furniture design and arrangement and they all stress contemporary uncluttered simplicity; but I liked my apartment. It was cozy, comfortable and it certainly looked lived-in.

"But what really made me decide to move and get rid of most of my stuff was an ultimatum by my cleaning woman—she said she wouldn't go on with so many things to dust."

So Anna moved into a larger apartment with more space for her furniture.

She has succeeded in carrying out the simple contemporary theme as well as maintaining the comfortable, cozy look of her home.

On the wall of her kitchen hangs an eye-catching spice holder—a picture-framed mirror with a number of shallow shelves for the spice bottles.

"Madame Benoit, *Open House's* cooking expert, is responsible for my interest in spices. I never used them before I started experimenting with her recipes," says Anna.

Now Anna has 37 different spices and herbs to choose from, including

herb-flavoured marmalade, pineapple mint, unbroken cinnamon sticks for coffee, chives, toasted onion flakes and special chiles from Mexico.

Anna has furnished her apartment with light woods and fabrics. She likes scatter rugs on the floor rather than well-to-wall carpeting.

"Wood floors should be seen," she says. "There is a lot of warmth and beauty in wood."

Anna loves splashes of colour in her home, especially burnt orange and forest green, but she prefers to see them in paintings on plain white walls and in cushions rather than in chintzes and patterned wallpapers.

Odd things used as ornaments make Anna's apartment look interesting as well as decorative. She has a German cookie, framed. It is a find from her travels in Europe last year. It is a white iced cookie made to resemble a plaque of a 17th century German church figurine and it looks as if it were hewn from white stone.

Anna has a soft spot for things oriental, including a Chinese table, lamps and a huge Japanese vase. On her wall, making an interesting-looking pattern, is a Chinese wood cut-out which she bought in an oriental shop in Toronto. Its function originally was to be fitted with similar pieces to make a screen.

Anna is always looking for bargains and is adept at improvisation. An old off-white bedspread now covers one of her chesterfields. Whenever there's a sale on, Anna's there. She buys her hats in the children's sections of department stores.

"The hats are cute and inexpensive," she says. "I'd say that very

few things I have were not bargains."

Getting back to *Open House*, a viewer wrote complaining that Anna and her co-host, Fred Davis, never did Gwen Vernon's keep-fit exercises.

"We always try to please the viewers, so Fred and I did the exercises on the show one day," Anna recalls. "For me it was disastrous. I had rather a tight dress on and as soon as I started all the buttons popped off."

Anna admits that she doesn't do the exercises at home either.

"I don't have very much time, and I like to keep up to date by watching other shows on television so, while watching, I use a passive electric vibrator.

"I think having a man like Fred on the show is an excellent idea," she says. "One of the greatest hazards of a show like *Open House*, dealing with women and aimed at women, is that it could smack of female silliness and girliness. Fred helps to avoid this. I don't think we should be too serious, but everything taken on should be done as thoroughly as possible—not superficially. And this succeeds too—we have every indication from audience ratings that many men watch the show and find it interesting."

THE FIRST CANADIANS

An eight-part series on the Indian, Saturdays on CBC radio, Starting October 10

The plight of our native people, the Indians, is being examined this year by a special Joint Parliamentary Committee set up during the last session of Parliament "to study the Indian Act and to suggest changes, after investigating Indian administration in general, and in particular the social and economic status of the Indians." To help listeners understand the work of the committee, CBC radio will present an eight-part series of talks and interviews called *The First Canadians—the Indians of Canada at Mid-Century*. They will be heard Saturday afternoons and will deal with Indian life in Canada yesterday and today, with suggestions from both Indians and white Canadians about how it can be bettered.

The series gets underway Oct. 10 with a talk called *Four Centuries of Change* by Dr. Frank Vallee, assistant professor of anthropology at McMaster University, and formerly a research director with the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, who has studied the Indian in several provinces. Their way of life has been changing con-

tinually since their first contacts with the white man, with increasing dependence on him. And he in turn has come to think of Indians in certain set patterns.

Life on the Reserves will be discussed October 17 by Dr. R. W. Dunning, of the department of sociology at the University of Manitoba, who has spent considerable time with the Indians, and is especially known for his prolonged first-hand study of the Ojibwas of northern Ontario. He will tell of the origin of the Indian lands in treaties signed with the various bands years ago, and will look critically at today's reserves as suitable places to live for a growing Indian population.

The *Position of the Indian Today* will be discussed on October 24 by Dr. Maurice C. Shumiatcher, Q.C., of Regina, chairman of the subcommittee on Indian Affairs of the Canadian Bar Association, who has been interested in Indian affairs for 15 years. He will talk about their political disabilities and the lack of economic opportunities open to them. On October 31 Dr. C. J. Buck of Teachers College, Regina, will look at Indian education. Three years ago he served on a three-man federal commission to study the education of our Indians, with special reference to school accommodation requirements. He will report on the types of school available for Indians and what advantage they have taken of education opportunities.

Stuart Jamieson of the department of economics and political economy at the University of British Columbia will talk about *The Trend to the Cities* on November 7. He will tell of the new trend away from the reserves, what kinds of employment the Indian is looking for in the white man's world, and the difficulties he finds in seeking and keeping a job. *Provincial Surveys and New Approaches* will be investigated on November 14 by John Melling, director of the National Commission on the Indian Canadian. He will talk about special Indian studies made by three provinces, and of the growing emphasis on community development, which many students


of the problem feel is the best solution.

Three Indian speakers will give their viewpoints on a desirable future for their people on November 21. And what do we as white Canadians, want for the Indians? The final talk, on November 28, will look at this question. The speaker is Father Andre Renaud of Ottawa, general director of the Indian and Eskimo Welfare Division of the Oblate Fathers of Canada. Father Renaud has spent three years studying the conditions of Indians in the Yukon, and has travelled extensively across Canada surveying the educational achievements of Indian children.

This week—"Morning Hymn," a special Thanksgiving program, filmed on Mr. H. Gordon Greene's farm at Ormstown, Quebec, south of Montreal. The film shows Mr. Greene as he makes his early-morning rounds of his farm property and buildings, looking at his stock, etc. It relates the farmer's thoughts about his farm and animals, and what he has to be thankful for, and portrays the personal relationship of the farmer to his farm. Even the Stars Are a Little Confused

Hermione Gingold, Everly Brothers guests on first show

EVERYBODY admits that it is a little complicated. Even Wally Koster has difficulty explaining to Joyce Hahn on the first show:

WALLY: Well Joyce, tonight we're starting our fifth year on the *Hit Parade*.

JOYCE: Bert Niosi's still with us isn't he?

WALLY: What would *Hit Parade* be without Bert Niosi?

JOYCE: Then what was Jack Kane doing here?

WALLY: He's on next week's show.

JOYCE: Next week's show? You mean we're fired already?

WALLY: No, no. It's called *Music '60*, you see.

JOYCE: You said it was *Hit Parade*.

WALLY: Well tonight *Music '60* presents an hour long *Hit Parade*. Then next week *Music '60* presents an hour long *Jack Kane Show*. And we alternate like that each week. That clear?

JOYCE: There's only one thing I want to know.

WALLY: Yeah?

JOYCE: Why won't we be on next week?

At this point, happily, the conversation breaks off for a commercial. But one thing is clear: *Hit Parade* and the *Jack Kane Show*, both an hour long, will alternate every Monday night under the title *Music '60*.

It is also pretty clear who the regulars on the shows are going to be. First, *Hit Parade*—Wally Koster returns after a summer in Winnipeg playing in *Guys and Dolls*, Joyce Hahn has among other things appeared in the *Dave King Show*, and Bert Niosi, as Wally tried to explain, is back with his orchestra. The *Hit Parade* people will present the top songs of the nation along with music from the latest LP's.

The Jack Kane Show naturally presents bandleader Kane, with lovely singer Sylvia Murphy, and Jack's orchestra.

"I think Jack Kane is one of the greatest musicians in Canadian showbusiness today," said Robert McGall, supervisor of CBC variety programs recently, announcing that the CBC had signed Kane for two years. And this opinion seems shared by show people in the

U.S. Kane has just returned from New York where he was musical director for the successful *Andy Williams Show* this summer.

Naturally, both segments of *Music '60* will be having guests. And this Monday they are Hermione Gingold, the "beauty parlour blonde" who won't trust her head to anyone outside New York in case they shrink it. She will sing a medley of songs from the Academy Award winning film, *Gigi*, in which she played a prominent role. The singing Everly Brothers, top TV and recording stars, will also be guests on the show. They will sing of course, but they will also demonstrate that some well-known western stars better practise their fast drawing.

Many of those who hear Hermione Gingold sing on Monday will never guess that she actually had singing lessons. "My voice has a sort of a rasp as if it had been strained through a cement mixer," she has said. "I studied voice and planned to sing but I got a nodule on my throat. One



"The Jazz Singer"



JERRY LEWIS

JERRY LEWIS this week makes his television debut in musical-drama as an East Side boy, a cantor's son, who cannot decide between a career in vaudeville or in liturgical music. The not-so-young who may think they recognize this drama probably do. For Lewis is portraying the role created by the late Al Jolson in *The Jazz Singer* which packed the movie houses back in 1929 as the first all-sound film.

The basic ingredients of the TV version of *The Jazz Singer* remain the same with songs forming an integral part of the drama. But the main role has been specially tailored for the talents of Jerry Lewis. He will make no attempt to duplicate the style of Al Jolson.

Jerry Lewis, of course, came to the top as a motion picture comedian with singer Dean Martin. Together they made more than 15 pictures at the box office which were highly successful financially but received very little praise from the critics. The two men broke their partnership some years ago and both have had considerable success on their own. Lewis, who is producing as well as starring in films, did so well he acquired an ulcer:

"I'm an overnight success," he said when told what his ailment was. "As a producer I've got in two pictures what it took Zanuck and De Mille twenty years to get."

Like so many comedians, Lewis himself is said to be a very insecure man, constantly clowning to cover what he considers his lack of social graces.

"Whenever I see two people together," he has said, "I give a performance."

Look magazine estimates that over the years he has given away about five million dollars. For instance, feeling sorry for a friend with a large family living in a two-room apartment (so the story goes), he bought the man a large house in the country. The man moved in, and since then will not speak to Lewis. This proves, as *Look* points out, that Lewis is not always wise in his generosity.

Lewis, now 33, was the only child of a pair of vaudeville performers. He has been a comedian and singer since he was five. In addition to his career in motion pictures he is also a star of TV and nightclubs. Since 1946 he has appeared in more than 50 TV shows and in 1956 entered the recording field with a hit record of *Rockabye Your Baby with a Dixie Melody*.

The original *The Jazz Singer* was actually first shown in New York City on October 6, 1927, but was not released generally till 1929. In the opening scene Al Jolson strode to the piano and said those simple, hardly poetic, but immortal words, "Say Ma, listen to this." Then he sang, *Mammy*. The sound revolution, which changed the motion picture industry, destroying old stars and creating new, had begun. Warner Brothers, who made *The Jazz Singer*, sunk all their capital into the new Vitaphone system in a desperate gamble to fight the big silent producers. *The Jazz Singer*

At the time, Warner Brothers had so much of their limited capital tied up in the new process they tried to persuade Jolson to accept stock in their company instead of salary. But Jolson refused; he wanted cash. And in refusing he turned down a fortune.



MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH

CBC WEDNESDAY NIGHT'S presentation this week starts with a performance by the Montreal Baroque Trio of works from the period indicated by its title—very roughly, that stretching from Monteverdi to Mozart. "Baroque" is a 20th century term for this period, and, for all its intriguing and agreeable sound, a most unsatisfactory one. For one thing, it suggests, and many people think it means, a style (in the sense of "classical" or "romantic") or an idiom (like "Mozartian" or "Handelian") which it doesn't. More seriously, it is a glaring example of that tendency to use words in several different senses, sometimes contradicting their original meaning, that seems to bedevil the whole field of musical terminology and the would-be student thereof.

The term came into music from architecture, where it was used to describe a style of building common in Europe in the 17th and 18th centuries, a style characterized by a great deal of ornamentation—curves and twists, curlicues and grotesquerie in general. As much of this came to be regarded as in doubtful taste, "baroque" came to connote the gawdy, bizarre, eccentric, vulgar. In this sense it was used by writers of the period, like the celebrated musical historian Burney, and present-day dictionaries give "grotesque, whimsical, extravagant" descriptions that would hardly have flattered such august practitioners as Purcell, Corelli, Bach or Haydn. In applying the word to music, the intention apparently was to designate certain kinds of melody, ornamented (with runs, skips, trills and assorted twiddles) in such profusion as to call to mind the excesses of baroque building—a practice that

was very common in opera and keyboard music, and by no means unknown in orchestral and chamber music. Moreover, in those days it was the custom for performers to add their own embellishments over and above whatever the composer might have provided in the way of decoration, and the effect, in the hands of the more exuberant, must have been decidedly extravagant at times.

However, the practice of free spontaneous variation of one's part is now frowned on, in the concert hall at any rate, and whatever impression the music now labelled "baroque" may produce on us, we rarely find it grotesque, coarse or vulgar. On the contrary, a certain aristocratic elegance usually distinguishes it. Listeners to the G major trio of Carl Stamitz (who died in 1801), on Wednesday evening, may well detect that quality in it, for he came of a remarkable musical family, which may justly be ranked among the aristocrats of the art. The celebrated Mannheim orchestra, which his father established, and with which he was himself closely associated, laid the foundations of modern orchestral techniques and disciplines, and was the first to approach modern standards of performance. Defi-

nately not the people to encourage decorative freedom with the text, or other manifestations of whimsicality or extravagance.

When the celebrity concert is heard in the land, then you may know that the season is nigh. The bulk of Wednesday night is to be given over to a celebrity concert by Brazilian pianist Guiomar Novaes, whose program, while not perhaps particularly adventurous, has yet all the qualities of a recital in the grand manner, calculated as it is to display various facts of the players' capabilities — Scarlatti sonatas for classical elegance and disciplined brilliance, Bach's *Chromatic Fantasy and Fugue*, for the same plus control of intricate texture, and power of modelling elaborate structures, Schumann's *Papillons*, for airy fantasy, Brahms and Chopin for deep seriousness and romantic fire, Debussy for colour and the power of suggestion.

Item . . . Canadian composer Leslie Mann's *Introduction, pastoral and Fugue on a French-Canadian Air* will be played in the Sunday afternoon *Winnipeg Concert*, in a program that will also include Samuel Barber's best-known work, his *Adagio for Strings*.





stocky, tweedy and very practical-looking person discussing the refreshingly different, artistic programming that is the Boyle trademark. He appears as down-to-earth as the Ontario farmland he sprang from, but his Irish ancestors passed on to him enough imagination for ten.

"The theme this year," he said, "is entertainment with a purpose. And the purpose differs with each show. There never was a time when people thirsted for knowledge more than they do now. Radio has its limitations, but it's one of the best ways of getting a lot of information across, and being entertaining at the same time."

An enthusiastic conversationalist himself, Boyle bemoans the lost art of conversation, and in the second show, Tuesday night, he'll demonstrate what an exciting thing a good conversation is between articulate people. In a room in Ottawa's Chateau Laurier he assembled art critic Allan Jarvis, novelist Nicholas Monsarrat, scientist Dr. Ned Steacie, historian Dr. Frank Underhill and journalist Peter Stursberg. The conversational ball was started rolling, and it went on from there, with no artificial stimulus, to explore such topics as the morality of government, the future of the arts in Canada, the CBC, international ethics, and other interesting topics. "You can't put a group like that together and not have *something* happen!" says Boyle. "It did . . . the air sparkled with wit, contradictions, practical ideas and pipe dreams." A tape-recorder took it all down in the two-hour session, and the result was edited down to a most entertaining and informative hour for *Project '60*. It will be presented under the title of *The Mind at Work*.

The October 20 program explores with tongue in cheek the effects of the use of motivational research in advertising on the

average man in this age of consumerism. Titled *The Hidden Persuaders*, it's a drama with commentary based on the best-selling book on motivational research by Vance Packard. The story takes you through a whole day in the life of Mr. Middle-Majority, who is a statistic to the manufacturers and their advertising agencies. In his waking hours at breakfast, through city traffic, in the office and at home with his family and neighbours, this average North American consumer is bombarded with 5,000 advertising messages a day. Mr. Middle-Majority is really a split personality — the irrational man, catered to by the advertisers, and the rational man, his alter-ego, who does understand what is happening to him, his money and his philosophy of life. throughout is by Vance Packard, who presents some startling research on uses of persuasion based on the findings of psychiatry. The second guest commentator is Dr. Ernest Dichter, president of the Institute for Motivational Research, and pioneer in this new science. There's a comedy touch in the script when Nemesis, the voice of persuasion, appears as the radio disk-jockey, the boss, the grocery store clerk, and the status-seeking neighbour. At the end of the program Nemesis begins to sound remarkably like that of Big Brother in an Orwellian fantasy. The program is illustrated with actual quotations and comments by well-known Canadians in advertising, business, politics and theology.

Typical of any series planned by Harry Boyle is a touch of sentiment and nostalgia, and this is supplied on October 27 by *The Evening of the Year*, a tone poem for autumn, marking the first time the sight-through-sound technique has been applied to a musical setting. Boyle commissioned Canadian poet Ronald Hambleton, presently in England on a Canada Council Fellowship, to write a narrative and modern lyric script. Lucio Agostini has developed an original score for 20-piece orchestra.

On November 10 *Project '60* repeats a highly successful program from last season - *The Battle of Ortona*. Glen Gould is interviewed November 17 by a friend of his, Vincent Tovell, a producer in the CBC talks and public affairs department Gould is world famous as an extraordinarily gifted concert pianist, but he's also known as a bit of an eccentric, unapproachable on the subject of his personal life and mannerisms. "*Project '60*," says Boyle, "dispels this legend in one of the most personal, revealing interviews ever presented on radio." Gould discusses music and his own interpretations with wit, wisdom and engaging enthusiasm. He's a lively conversationalist on a great many subjects. Every once in a while he breaks off to illustrate a

point or to give one of his remarkable interpretations of Bach, Sibelius, Schoenberg, Morawetz, Burchner, an amusing parody of German music, and a piano interpretation of his own string quartet. He discusses living in Canada, his childhood, his musical training, his little hideaway up north, and why he likes to work there alone.

Other features, as yet unscheduled, include *The Political Puff*, which Boyle describes as "a satirical review taking its cue from the French Canadians who work in the small cafes in Quebec City and Montreal. There'll be some devastating samples of political satire, and some music and song." *The Highland Heart* highlights the legend and lore that makes the Cape Bretoner the individual he is. "We've been working on this one for two years," says Boyle. "And we're very pleased with the fact that we've lined up American conductor Leonard Bernstein and Rogers and Hammerstein to do shows for us along the lines of the interview with Glenn Gould. In another show you'll hear the only recording Dylan Thomas' mother ever made. She's heard talking to Colin Edwards, a distant relative, about her reaction to her son's eminence. We'll have a program on radiation and its effect on genetics. Another is a report of the miracle of survival in the wartime Warsaw ghetto, as told by people who lived through it. Donald Mackay has been gathering material and speaking to survivors in London, Poland and New York, and Max Rosenfeld has interviewed others in Israel. There will also be a first-hand report on Denmark and its unexpected parallels with Canada.

A Tribute to Darwin

A 60-minute documentary written and narrated by Lister Sinclair

FOR YEARS Charles Darwin worked on his theory of evolution, constantly delaying publication in order to strengthen further the already huge masses of evidence he had accumulated. Only when he found that his great, but now overshadowed, contemporary, Wallace, had reached and was about to publish similar conclusions did he finally, on November 4, 1859, publish his small greenbacked book called *On the Origin of Species by Means of Natural Selection or the Preservation of the Favoured Races in the Struggle for Life.*

Such a title would hardly place a book on today's best seller lists. Nevertheless, so influential has *The Origin of Species* been, the centenary of its publication is being honoured throughout the world. CBC Wednesday Night pays its tribute (both to the book and to the author who was born 150 years ago this year) with a special hour-long documentary this week. Lister Sinclair wrote and narrates the documentary which will have a number of Toronto actors playing the dramatized portions.

"The great theory will be explained in Darwin's own words," says program organizer, David

Walker. "The man himself will be described through extracts from his writings, sketches written by his son, and commentaries by scientists who knew him. Modern scientists including Sir Julian Huxley will tell of their debt to his work.

Julian Huxley has said of Darwin: "What he did was to open doors to a newer, truer, nobler picture of human destiny."

Darwin's contemporaries by no means all agreed. Just what Darwin and the system of thought which he represented meant to the younger generation of Victorians is very strikingly seen in such a book as *Father and Son* in which the author, Edmund Gosse, tells of his relationship with his father, the eminent theologian and naturalist—before Darwin, the two were often combined—of the middle 19th century. It was the elder Gosse whose attempt to refute Darwin still has a special niche in the hall of notoriety, if not of fame.

His father (says Edmund Gosse) argued that "There had been no gradual modification of the surface of the earth, or slow development of organic forms, but when the catastrophic act of creation took place the world presented, instantly, the structural appearance of a planet on which life had long existed."

The press of the day took this to mean that the Creator (according to Gosse's theory) had created the earth and deliberately tested man's faith by putting fossils in the rocks.

Both theologians and scientists found such deception on the part of the Creator unacceptable and Gosse the elder had little but ridicule for his theory. The battle between theologian and scientist was a battle between apes and angels, and attempts like that of Gosse to be on both sides (or neither side) had to fail.

Darwin stated the theory as "Growth by reproduction; inheritance which is almost implied by reproduction; variability, from the indirect and direct action of the conditions of life, and from use and disuse; a ratio of increase so high as to lead to a struggle for life, and as a consequence, to natural selection, entailing divergence of character and the extinction of less improved forms . . .

"There is grandeur in this view of life, with its several powers, having been originally breathed by the Creator into a few forms or into one; and that, while this planet has gone cycling on, according to the fixed law of gravity, from so simple a beginning, endless forms most beautiful and most wonderful have been and are being evolved."

Darwin himself was friendly, kindly, intensely honest and at times light-hearted, much loved by his children. But he was also subject to bouts of illness, an illness whose apparent lack of any physical basis even led some of his acquaintances to think he was shamming. Many explanations have been given for these bouts of illness. Darwin is a fascinating object of speculation for the Freudian, of course; other writers have suggested his illness was the result of his loss of religious belief and the severity of his conscience; still others that his illness was simply a more-or-less unconscious method of pushing away the attention—favourable or unfavourable — which the world was giving him so he could continue uninterrupted by his work. Whatever the explanation, Darwin lived for more than 70 years; in his youth he underwent the considerable hardships of his voyage on the Beagle (1831-36)

when he amassed much evidence for his theories, and he accomplished an enormous amount of work in his lifetime. If Darwin was indeed a neurotic, then the world of science perhaps owes much to his neurosis.

The Chinese Family of Today

An exclusive four-part series Fridays on Trans-Canada Matinee



Marjorie McEnaney

This month, Mrs. McEnaney and *Trans-Canada Matinee* present a study of the Chinese family as it is today: what has happened to the ubiquitous mother-in-law? Do old people have any status in the Communist state? Is children's play all organized? Mrs. McEnaney answers these questions in an exclusive report for *Matinee*.

Mrs. McEnaney was invited to visit China by the Chinese People's Association for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries. She travelled by plane from Prague to Peking by Soviet TU104 jet ("six miles up, 600 miles an hour and about 10 hours flying time") and on her return from Moscow to London in a similar aircraft. The Chinese told Mrs. McEnaney that she was the first English-speaking woman journalist invited to visit their country.

Her first report, on women in China today, will be heard on *Matinee* on Friday, October 9. (This was not announced in last week's *CBC Times*. Listeners who missed the first talk can hear it this Sunday, October 11, at 10:30 a.m., on *Matinee Highlights*.) Subsequent talks dealing with children, old people, and leisure time will be heard on October 16, 23 and 30.

ONE OF the least-known and most-wondered-about spots on the globe today is China. Few North Americans have had an opportunity to see for themselves just what is happening in that vast land today. Even fewer journalists have managed to see beyond the bamboo curtain.

One of the few who has is Marjorie McEnaney of Toronto. Mrs. McEnaney, in the company of four other Canadians—a teacher, an anthropologist, an author and a pediatrician, spent the month of August in China.

She visited communes near Shanghai and Peking, attended about a dozen Chinese banquets ("you name it, I've eaten it"), talked to people in universities and institutes, in hospitals and

nurseries, in the factories and the communes ("the working centre is the Chinese family's whole life; the nurseries, schools and hospitals surround the factories, the recreation, social and political life is right there"). She met people everywhere and talked to them, through an interpreter when necessary. ("Most of the intellectuals—the doctors in hospitals, for example—speak English," she said.)
