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FRENCH FOR TOTS

An adaptation of the Tan-Gau method of language training, daily on CBC-TV's "Chez Helene"

CHILDREN have extraordinary powers of imitation, powers which gradually atrophy and disappear as the child grows older and develops his unique personality. At this early age the child can assimilate a new language without questioning its forms or establishing comparisons with his mother tongue. For the child, a second language is an adventure.

"A child's brain has a specialized capacity for learning languages, but it is a capacity which decreases rapidly with the passage of years," says Dr. Wilder Penfield, world-famous Montreal neurosurgeon who has urged the teaching of other languages while the minds of pupils are still plastic enough to assimilate what becomes a chore in later years at school.

But unless he comes from a bilingual home a child does not have the opportunity to learn a second language while his mind is still so plastic, i.e. in his pre-school years.

It is with this fact in mind that CBC will present *Chez Hélène*, a new series of French lessons for the lollipop set—15 minutes a day, five days a week, on television, using the radically new "Tan-Gau" system of teaching.

Tan-Gau was devised by Dr. Robert Gauthier, director of French studies for the Ontario Department of Education, using theories advanced by Dr. Tan Gwan Leong of the Burmese Department of Education, whom he met on a 1954 UNESCO mission. Consultant for the *Chez Hélène* series is Dr. Gauthier's protege, Raymond Duplantie, whose results with 500 children in Oakville public schools have received widespread attention. Within a few months of training under Duplantie, pupils were

switching, almost unconsciously, from English to French conversation in the classroom. Tan-Gau has also been instituted in several Ottawa schools, and in Quebec City schools for the teaching of English.

The basic principles of Tan-Gau are that the learning of a second tongue should follow the same procedure as that of learning the mother tongue, and should be divided into two successive and progressive steps—*comprehension* and *expression*.

Duplantie likens the comprehension phase of Tan-Gau to an incubation period, during which the learner becomes attuned to new sounds, intuits meanings through vivid illustration, and grasps speech patterns and thought units rather than isolated words.

Since Tan-Gau stresses comprehension of the spoken language first, the child is not asked (or forced) to use French in answering questions. Oral expression comes naturally, and relatively quickly, as the ear becomes attuned to the teacher's speech. Or, as Dr. Gauthier puts it, "The ear loosens the tongue." Bad habits of pronunciation are also avoided by this method because the pupil is not required to speak before he has learned the sounds thoroughly from

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The Incomparable Old Cactus

On a recent Manitoba School Broadcast Jack Wells read *Casey at the Bat* to a group of young boys and girls. In introducing Jack to the children, Gertrude McCance of the Department of Education said, "Now you all know who this is" — and indeed they all did, for Jack Wells knows everybody and everybody knows Jack.

You don't have to be a sports fan to be a Wells fan. As Jack puts it, "I don't broadcast sports for the experts; they may know four times as much about the game as I do. But I do try to give all listeners and viewers an entertaining show. I look upon sports as entertainment and feel that if I don't enjoy broadcasting games people won't enjoy listening to them and you'll soon hear the sets clicking off."

Jack's quick wit adds interest to any game. Is he, then, more colourful than accurate? "I can't buy that," he says. "I don't like a lot of pointless statistics like how many times the shortstop visited the men's room during a double-header but I always try to give the pertinent details. For example, on any given play in a football game I'll tell where the ball was scrimmaged, who carried it, how many yards he gained, who tackled him and what the resulting down and yardage situation will be."

Most sportscasters and writers are notorious "homers." Wells is not. "Becoming a homer is an occupa-

tional hazard," said Jack. "You know all the players from your home town team and naturally hope they'll win. I've had to train myself over a period of many years to avoid favouring the home team and to give an accurate picture, especially in the play-by-play broadcasts. I never have been one to live or die with the home team, but I used to feel far stronger about a loss as a fan than I ever have as a sports reporter. Really there are too many things more important in life than winning or losing a game."

With the CBC and a number of private radio stations Jack has done commentary on almost every sport you can imagine. "Everything except soccer," said Jack, "but football is probably my favourite. Baseball is the most relaxed type of sport for a broadcaster while hockey and lacrosse take the most out of him because there are so few stoppages of play and he has to be talking all the time."

To Winnipeg TV viewers particularly, Jack Wells is far more than a sports commentator. He is a personal friend who visits their home with the rest of the *Spotlight* crew. If a wrestling fan doesn't like the hour of that sport's telecast he phones his friend Jack to have it changed, and football fans ask Jack to put on telecasts of the Eastern football games. These, of course, are things far outside Jack's jurisdiction.

On *Spotlight* Jack has been interviewer, comedian and general Jack-of-all-trades for over five years. While his producer, Ted Benoit, calls him "totally unpredictable" Jack credits Ted with giving him a free hand which allows him really to be himself on camera. Everything Jack does is spontaneous. He claims he gets the feeling for the show from the crew. Again Ted Benoit credits it vice-versa. "The moment Jack enters the studio the entire crew gets a lift. They forget their own problems and swap gags with Jack. We are always trying to stump him but he's so natural it's almost impossible to get him flustered on camera. We have given him the wrong cues and mixed-up

idiot cards and yet he just goes on as if nothing is happening. There was a phone on Jack's desk for two years that was just a dummy, had never been connected. One day we connected the phone and had it ring while Jack was on the air talking about one of Alec Turk's wrestling matches. Without even hesitating Jack picked up the phone and said, "Yes, Alec, I'm putting the plug in now, what more do you want?"

"There was only one time when we really broke him up. One day we had a monkey on the program. When Bob Willson introduced Jack we ran a tape of his voice while we kept the camera on the monkey—'our new *Spotlight* on Sports announcer.' When we turned the camera back on Jack he was completely broken up. He was laughing so hard he couldn't even speak.

"Summing it up, I'd say Jack's personality was his main asset and the cameras have absolutely no effect on him. There's nothing phony or pretentious about Jack. In fact, the Wells family "ham" is Smokey, Jack's little dog who's a real show stealer."

Jack Wells was born in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, 47 years ago and became interested in sports early in life when his father took him to all the sporting events in that city. In 1936 he was living at the YMCA in Saskatoon and as a lark auditioned at CFQC as a sports announcer. He was asked to broadcast one period of a Saskatoon-Flin Flon hockey game while a second broadcaster did another period. The powers-that-be preferred Jack's job and he was hired. He continued at CFQC until 1939 when he went to CJAT, Trail, B.C., where he broadcast both hockey and

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I Admire All Those Busy Fingers

Not long ago in a grocery store a six-year-old came up to me and announced, "I know you're the *Busy Fingers* lady, so why don't you have busy fingers anymore?" Visions of my great pile of ironing, trousers that need patching, fruit that wanted preserving and a few dozen other things flitted across my mind, but I told my small inquisitor that we would be doing *Busy Fingers* again starting October 15.

"Good," said she, "now Mommy can get the dinner ready 'cause *Busy Fingers* keeps me out of her hair," and she skipped away.

Her candid reaction doesn't upset me in the least; I feel the same way about *Huckleberry Hound*. (The series will be heard at an earlier hour this year—5 p.m. on Thursdays.)

Many adults ask where ideas for the arts and crafts come from. The answer is, everywhere — from the children, teachers, classroom deco-

rations, the library, and just out of the blue. Perhaps the most important source is the fertile imagination of children who send their art work in to the show. Last year more than 2,600 paintings and drawings came from all over Manitoba, western Ontario and at least three states. We put nearly 300 on camera and we'll be showing pictures again this year. I am much impressed with the quality and variety of work done by the viewers. It is interesting to see the way a five- or six-year-old draws his house or a favourite playmate, and it is often inspiring to see a similar subject drawn by a teenager. Young artists are keen observers, and often capture the flavour of a situation with a freshness denied to many older persons. I hope both children and teachers will continue to send in examples of art work that say something about the places we live, the games we play and the things we think

about. It is a good way of getting acquainted.

With the help of guest artists from various schools, *Busy Fingers* will again show projects that can be done with materials generally available around the home. We'll make use of such things as old newspapers, string and toothpicks, wallpaper paste, crayons and poster paints. Some of the fifty-odd projects on my list will appeal to only the more skilled viewers, but most are selected for a more general audience.

I've been delighted to see what happens to an idea after it has been sifted through the minds of a hundred or so children. One show on crayon etching last season produced everything from a few charming flower-shaped scratches by a five-year-old to an elegant etching of old St. Andrew's Church by a high school student. It also left many mothers with hundreds of crayon flecks to clean up. Once in a while a mother complains good naturedly about the mess, and I can only console her with the fact that we have one too, since I experiment with the projects on from one to six children. (Right now we're knee-deep in toothpicks and haven't been able to eat in the dining room since Thursday.)

Last year *Busy Fingers* was designed to give children something to do; this year the series will show what children *can* do. The ability and talent of my young viewers has deeply impressed me, as has the skill and understanding of the parents and teachers who work with them. I admire all those busy fingers.

his teacher. There is a third advantage, when the method is used in the classroom, in that slow learners are not held back by their reluctance to attempt expression in French.

Chez Hélène will attempt to adapt as much as possible of the Tan-Gau method to the television medium, using Helene's puppet friends and live young pupils as the "proxies" of the viewing audience. The aim of the series is to make this first, all-important, contact with a second language as pleasant for the young child as possible.

Hélène (Helene Baillargeon) will have three friends on the program—a temperamental mouse named Susie (motivated and spoken for by Corrinne Orr) and two young humans—Diane and Peter (played by Suzanne Grossmann and Anthony Tremblay).

Hélène will speak not one word of English to her friends, and, to begin with, Susie, Diane and Peter will try not to speak French. This French-English exchange is characteristic of the Tan-Gau system. (One magazine writer observed that it "takes two to Tan-Gau").

Hélène Baillargeon, one of Canada's best-known entertainers, has been singing and acting on radio since 1943, and on television since it began in Canada. She has recorded more than 40 French-Canadian and Acadian folk songs with Alan Mills, with whom she appeared on the popular English television program *Chez Nous*.

Earlier this fall Hélène attended the International Folk Song Council in Roumania as a delegate of the Canadian Folk Music Society, and later introduced Paris radio listeners to some Canadian songs.

She was born in Saint-Martin de la Beauce, and first heard the English language from her father, who was fluently bilingual. She claims that "as he had some gold teeth I thought for a long time that only people with gold teeth could talk English!"



EACH week-day morning Calgary tots attend a new television kindergarten class—*Romper Room*, on CHCT-TV. For one hour daily overworked mothers can turn their young'uns over to the expert care of *Romper Room's* teacher, Sandra Stern.

"Miss Sandy," an attractive young Calgary housewife herself, has that happy knack of getting complete attention from the romper set while talking their language without talking down to them. Married to Bob Stern, Calgary branch manager for 20th Century-Fox, Sandra has two prospective *Romper Room* viewers: Tony, 2, and Michael, 10 months.

Sandra Stern was born in London, England, 24 years ago and raised in another great metropolis, New York City. She graduated from nearby Vassar College, where she majored in drama.

After graduating from college she worked for the Ziff-Davis Publishing Company in New York as an editorial assistant. In 1956 Sandra moved to Toronto and during her short stay there taught nursery school, studied at business school and played small parts in a TV film series, *The Last of the Mohicans*.

Now a resident of Calgary, she produced and acted in a children's television show called *Junior Clubhouse*, with partner Eileen Frank.

Romper Room is a syndicated "live" show which follows formats created by its originator, Bert Claster of Romper Room, Inc. in Baltimore, Maryland. The number of stations carrying *Romper Room* grows almost daily, but at last count there were 76 in the U.S. and Canada with CHCK-TV (Regina) and CFRN-TV (Edmonton) joining CHCT-TV in the prairie region.

The Claster organization supplies the program's scripts as well as

toys, games and lessons. They audition local applicants for the role of *Romper Room* teacher on each individual station. Sandra was not considered in the original auditions held at CHCT-TV because she already had a television show and a brand new personality was desired. However, after a day of unsuccessful auditioning (35 applicants were rejected), Sandra was called down to the studios after midnight to try for the role. She clicked immediately and was signed for the series, dropping other TV commitments for the season.

Sandra was then sent to Baltimore to become "Miss Sandy." During the week of July 31-August 8, she watched other teachers demonstrate *Romper Room* teaching techniques and generally familiarized herself with their system. The show started in Calgary on September 21, and runs one hour each week-day, starting at 11:00 a.m. Sandy has six little helpers on each show—children from the same general neighbourhood selected from letters sent in by their parents.

Romper Room is directed by Calgary-born Lawrence Kimber, a graduate of the SRT Radio and Television School in New York.

When she's not preparing programs for her *Romper Room*-mates, Miss Sandy's favourite pastimes are reading, listening to classical music and good jazz, writing music for children, and all types of sports.

you know what the current estimates of safety are?

Your child may some day be a member of a minority group and suffer racial or other discrimination? Can you distinguish between prejudice and fact in matters of racial characteristics (if there are such characteristics)?

Your real income may be getting less as inflation increases? Do you understand something of the causes of inflation?

It may be that you do not want to worry about such problems. But do the morning headlines leave you with an unpleasant feeling? Oddly enough, a closer look at the problems behind these headlines might well make them less frightening, because more understandable. And that is one function of *Citizens' Forum* and *Soundings*.

"Problems facing us today seem so massive, so impersonal, and often so technical that we feel helpless before them," said Art Stinson, CBC program organizer with *Citizens' Forum*. "So we turn away from them, only to have them nagging at us still more. So throughout the series, no matter what the topic we discuss, the underlying question to which the panel members will suggest answers, is, what can an individual do to help solve this problem? And this applies even to problems like H-bomb tests over which nations seem to be impotent."

This emphasis on the responsibility of the individual is particularly obvious in the first two programs coupled under the title:

You, the Jury. The questions are: *Should Drug Addicts Go to Jail?* and *Should We Censor Obscenity?*

"Format for these will be sort of a television courtroom," says Stinson. "The viewer will be invited to take an empty jury chair and listen first to the evidence of a number of experts on the problems and then to a discussion. The verdict, of course, is left to the viewers."

Other shows will differ in format. The program on racial discrimination which will come from Winnipeg, will have a group of perhaps 20 or 30 people in a seminar. "Not all will be able to have a say, of course, in half an hour," said Stinson, "but as we hope to have people from Winnipeg's many ethnic groups, we should get some interesting and useful comments."

Citizens' Forum appears on both CBC radio (Thursdays) and television (Sundays). Both start this week.

Soundings (Thursday evenings, replacing *Footlose*) will explore similar problems, but on a documentary basis. In particular, *Soundings* will concern itself with Canadian problems.

"Canada is a vital, dynamic country whose face is ever changing," says program organizer Reeves Haggan. "Often these changes make headlines; often they are quiet and imperceptible. In *Soundings* Canada's top broadcasters will visit various parts of the country and investigate these changes, from the effects of slum clearance to perhaps a comparison of the living



lacrosse for Trail and Nelson. In 1940 he returned to Saskatoon to join the Army with a number of his sports friends but was unexpectedly turned down on account of a supposedly bad heart which had never bothered him before and never has since. He returned to CFQC where he stayed until June, 1941 and then moved to Winnipeg and station CJRC (now CKRC). Jack and his long-time buddy, Moe Simovitch, teamed at CJRC for broadcasts of many sports in the years between 1941 and 1948, when Jack left that station to work as a freelancer.

In 1950 Jack signed a contract with CKY which limited his broadcast work to that private station and the CBC network. Television came to Winnipeg on May 31, 1954. Jack Wells came to television in Winnipeg several days later with a 15-minute program every Friday. In the fall of the same year his sports reports were incorporated into *Spotlight* and he has done the show week-daily ever since.

Jack has also done the *Football Huddle* show for the last five seasons,

two years with Al Sherman and three with Bud Grant—"two fellows who are almost direct opposites." On the "Huddle" Jack's versatility is exemplified. He's commentator, interviewer, personality and announcer. "One of my biggest helps," states producer Frank Rasler, "Is that Jack can so easily 'open doors' for me. He supplies the contacts with visiting players, coaches and officials. It's really amazing how Jack seems to know everybody even remotely connected with the league by his first name. If we want to interview Johnny Bright for instance, it's simply a matter of having Jack call the Edmonton executive and along comes Bright. In spite of this first name relationship, Jack claims that he "doesn't knock around too much with the athletes." (As a matter of fact, there is hardly one of the 400 employees in the CBC building in Winnipeg that Jack can't call by his or her first name.)

After broadcasting sports for over 23 years what events in Jack's career are especially noteworthy? Jack says, "The most difficult job I ever had was a radio broadcast of the deciding game in the Allan Cup Senior Hockey playoffs in 1941. The Regina Rangers were playing the Sydney Millionaires early in May. There had been a terrific thunderstorm that day and when I got to the rink I saw that the ice was covered with fog. I was broadcasting from one end of the ice and I could only see as far as the nearest blue line. Once the puck left my end of the rink I had to guess what was going on. I must have been living right because all of the goals were scored in my end of the rink. Regina won 3 to 0, and I at least avoided

Arthur Miller's "The Crucible"

Regina-born actor Leslie Nielsen stars in CBC's first contribution to new U.S.-Canada television series

IT IS Salem, Massachusetts, 1692 and the Puritan community firmly believes in witches. One spring night a group of girls go to the woods to conjure, with the help of a black slave. As they are dancing in ecstasy, the father of one of them arrives; he is the Reverend Parris, and with him is a local farmer, John Proctor. The girls, frightened by their discovery, get hysterical. The community decides they are possessed by devils. And soon, on the unsupported testimony of the hysterical girls, innocent, respectable women are being condemned by the courts for witchcraft, and hangings and jailings are common. And though the evil itself passes, John Proctor is led to tragedy by his own honour.

Arthur Miller's famous play *The Crucible* is this week's contribution to *Startime*, by CBC-TV studios. Mavor Moore adapted the drama for TV and Harvey Hart will produce it. The cast includes Leslie Nielsen (as John Proctor), Ann Wedgeworth (as Abigail, leading spirit in denouncing "witches"), Dianna Maddox, Douglas Rain, Douglas Campbell, John Drainie and Portia White.

Regina-born Leslie Nielsen made his first Canadian TV appearance last October playing opposite Frances Hyland in *Panic at Parth Bay* on the *First Performance* series.

Nielsen, who now lives in Hollywood, has appeared in several films and has played leading roles in such U.S. television shows as *Studio One*, *Kraft Theatre*, *Suspense*, *Climax*, and *Alfred Hitchcock Presents*.

Nielsen's father was a member of the R.C.M.P., and as a result much of Leslie's childhood was spent in the wilds of Canada. The family eventually made its home in Edmonton, where Leslie attended Victoria High School.

During the second world war Nielsen served in the R.C.A.F., and following his discharge he

took a course at Lorne Greene's Academy of Radio Arts in Toronto. He won a scholarship from the academy and went to the Neighbourhood Playhouse in New York where he came to the attention of former CBC producer Fletcher Markle and found work as a radio actor and in summer stock. After leaving the Playhouse he trained at the famous Actors' Studio in New York.

Nielsen then entered television and soon won stardom, appearing in featured roles in some 150 shows. In 1954 Paramount brought him to Hollywood for a featured role in *The Vagabond King*. Shortly afterwards he signed a long-term contract with M.G.M., and appeared in such films as *Ransom*, *The Opposite Sex*, and *Hot Summer Night*. In 1956 M.G.M. loaned Nielsen to Universal-International for the role of the bachelor in *Tammy and the Bachelor*, with Debbie Reynolds. Early last year Nielsen requested a release from his M.G.M. contract so that he could be free to accept TV roles.

His appearance in *The Crucible* this Tuesday will be his second in

an Arthur Miller play on CBC-TV; last season he played the role of the son in Miller's *Death of a Salesman*. He is also being seen currently in the leading role in the *Swamp Fox* series on *Walt Disney Presents*.

Radio listeners in Calgary will remember Nielsen as "Stay-Up Stan, the All Night Record Man" on CJCJ (now CKXL) during 1947. Halifax contralto Portia White, acclaimed by critics in the 1940's as "the Marian Anderson of Canada," will make her television debut in tonight's play. Miss White will portray Lituba, a Barbados negress who accompanies the Salem girls during their conjuring and chants as they dance in the moonlit woods.

"R.C.M.P." Debut This Week

*New weekly film series starts this Wednesday—
host of Canadian TV stars in cast*

REAL STORIES of the most colourful law enforcement agency in the world, The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, are the basis of *R.C.M.P.*, the exciting new television series which starts on CBC-TV this Wednesday night (October 28). For the first time in history, adventures of the red-coated "Mounties" will be shown on television with the official blessing of the commissioner of the force.

R.C.M.P. — the official name of the series—is the story of a three-man detachment of mounties at the small (population 4,031) Canadian village of Shamattawa. Members of the detachment are responsible for maintaining the law in the village and countryside for 200 miles around.

Gilles Pelletier plays the part of Corporal Jacques Gagnier, the N.C.O. in charge of the detachment. A 35-year-old veteran of the force with 17 years' service, Gagnier is a gourmet, an excellent amateur chef, a collector of Eskimo carvings, a first-class policeman with a mystery hinging on his unmarried status. Executive producer F. R. Crawley first had the idea of obtaining Pelletier for the lead role not only because he is one of Canada's most accomplished actors but because he would give "a Gallic approach to police work that will add interest, and enable us to have two distinctive characterizations in the lead roles."

For the other lead, he chose New York actor John Perkins, who plays the part of Constable Frank Scott. Perkins left the cast of *The Bells Are Ringing* on Broadway to join *R.C.M.P.* He and Pelletier appear together in nearly every episode of the series.

Third member of the detachment is Constable Mitchell, played by Canadian actor-singer Don Francks. Constable Mitchell is the detachment handyman who yearns for a

posting to one of the force's three crime detection laboratories.

R.C.M.P. is not just a cops-'n-robbers series. Nor does it concern itself with the "scarlet-coated riders of the plains." It is entertaining television fare for television viewers of all ages.

Thirty-nine exciting stories of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police have been related to the life and times of the Shamattawa detachment by some of Canada's best known writers, including George Salverson, Munro Scott, and Charles E. Israel. Members of the detachment find themselves involved in life-and-death struggles with crazed killers, rescuing a lost trapper in a raging blizzard, thwarting a bank hold-up in a hail of machine gun fire, rounding up safe-crackers and miscellaneous law breakers, performing an emergency appendectomy, investigating a rape case. Then there's the routine of the detachment itself — the paper work, the inspections. Occasionally a member of the detach-

This Living World

2,000-letter-a-week French TV series for children comes to English network

English-speaking youngsters are being introduced this year to secrets of the great spectacle of life outdoors, when CBC French Television presents under the title *This Living World*, an English version of the popular French network program *La vie qui bat* ("The Life That Beats").

Wonders and mysteries of the natural world, little known facts about creatures ranging in size from earthworms to elephants, curious processes in the vegetable world — all these are unfolded for young viewers every Thursday on CBC-TV by Steve Bloomer, host on the summer television series *World Passport*.

To help, Steve impart such interesting oddments, as how you tell heads from tails in the earthworm family, and how many legs on a millipede (200), producer Adelin Bouchard will arrange demonstrations in the studio with live (and sometimes wild) animals, and include filmed episodes showing animals in their natural settings. All the resources available to television including special sets and animation techniques will be used to stimulate viewer interest and curiosity about the world around us.

In addition there will be weekly questions graded for different age levels, and prizes will be given for the best answers mailed to *This Living World*, CBC Box 6000, Montreal, Quebec. The program is designed to interest all ages, from the very young to older viewers who have retained a lively curiosity.

Host Steve Bloomer starred for several years on a program for questioning young minds called *The Finder*, a production of the St. Louis, Missouri, Educational - TV station ETV-KETC.

An accomplished musician and commercial artist, he has also a well-developed knack for model and toy building, and a thorough grounding in natural history.

Scripts for *This Living World* and *La vie qui bat* are written by

Frank Varon, who has several seasons of scripting for the French series behind him, programs which have drawn letters from viewers at the rate of about 2,000 a week.

MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH

OF ALL the musical nations of the world, Britain is that in which opera has flourished least. Indeed, it may be said never to have taken any real root there, since the country has never produced a body of native composers of opera, working in a characteristic style, and rising to heights comparable to its achievements in choral, orchestral and chamber music. Such opera as it has enjoyed has been mainly exotic—the work of expatriate foreign musicians living there, or simply imported performances of the standard Italian, French and German classics.

The explanation usually advanced is that British are not an “operatic” people; that while they enjoy it passively as an imported foreign luxury, it does not arouse in their composers a creative urge like that which produced the splendours of Elizabethan music, or the fine flowering of instrumental and choral music and songs of the 20th century renaissance; nor does it inspire in the public a liking for it strong enough to constitute a real demand.

Now this may be true of today, or of the recent past. But a glance at the earlier history of the form tells a somewhat different story. Opera in England originally developed out of the older masque, a form that reached its highest degree of elaboration in England, where it gradually merged into the newer conception evolved in Italy. It flourished greatly in the 17th century, and was actually allowed to continue by the Puritans, under Cromwell, when all the other theatres were closed; and this circumstance, in fact, was one of the two main causes of its subsequent decline. At the restoration of the monarchy the theatres were re-

opened, mainly with a very frivolous, not to say licentious type of entertainment, in competition with which opera lost ground.

The other circumstance that militated against the growth of a native English opera was the early death, in 1695, of Henry Purcell, whose opera *The Faery Queen* is to be presented from Vancouver in CBC Wednesday Night this week. For Purcell was a very great genius, who, it is believed, could easily have counteracted the baneful results of the invasion of the country by hordes of foreign musicians—mostly inferior—which began at that time. But he died, leaving no successor; the foreigner triumphed, and England did not become an “operatic” country—though whether that was an unmitigated tragedy is open to argument.

The Faery Queen is not regarded as his masterpiece, though it contains some agreeable music. Its “book” was freely adapted from Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*—by some now-forgotten scribbler—very freely, since he introduced a drunken poet, monkeys, Chinese dancers and similar improvements into it. Purcell (who, I once heard the late Gustav Holst declare, had “no artistic conscience”) set it in 1692.

Canadian music is to the fore this week. Kendall Taylor, distinguished English pianist, is to include the *Sonata* by Murray Adaskin in his *Distinguished Artists* Recital on Tuesday. Ann Stephenson, soprano, is to give a program of songs by Canadian composers on Friday evening.

the embarrassment of not knowing who scored the goals.

"I guess there can never be a perfect job of sportscasting but the one I was most personally satisfied with, was my first Grey Cup commentary. I think that game, the 1948 Calgary victory over Ottawa, was the best game I've ever called. I had been on every previous broadcast since 1941 as colour man or interviewee, but this was the first time I had ever done play-by-play.

"One of the most regrettable instances occurred during the 1954 Grey Cup telecast. Edmonton's defensive end, Frankie Anderson, was wearing tackle Jim Weatherall's number. Anderson played probably the greatest game of his life and you guessed it—I gave all the credit to Weatherall, who wasn't even dressed. I wrote later to Frankie to apologize for spoiling his big day and congratulate him on the tremendous game."

George Kent, who produces the WIFU telecasts, is a meticulous man, a real stickler for detail. He's always striving for perfection and takes great pride in the quality of his work. How does he get along with Jack?

"I find he has a capacity for work exceeded only by his capacity for fun and I'll admit that occasionally I've wished it was the other way around. Though a fun-loving guy, he's also one of the best home-loving guys I know.

"Old Cactus is the most relaxed guy in the business. More than once I've seen him cat nap before an important telecast while the rest of us lunched on finger nails."

As every *Spotlight* viewer knows Jack is married to a Swedish girl named "Flicka." That's his own nickname for her—it means "girl" in Swedish. Her real name is Marguerite, "Same spelling as the cigars," quipped Jack. They have 3 children.

The Faery Queen

Purcell's long-lost masterpiece is first program in a new series of "Intimate Operas"

A LIGHTHEARTED romantic opera that was lost for 200 years, a new French Canadian opera, and a new jazz opera commissioned by the CBC will highlight the coming opera season on CBC radio. For the second year, as an excursion into the realms of fresh and seldom-heard music, *CBC Wednesday Night* will present three intimate or chamber operas, instead of the traditional grand operas. Because the chamber opera is written for a small, intimate audience, it makes particularly good radio fare.

The first of the three, Purcell's *The Faery Queen*, which disappeared mysteriously a few years

after its premiere in 1692 and was not found until 1901, will be heard this Wednesday night in a broadcast from the Vancouver studios. It is hoped that a new French-Canadian opera will be the second production; and the third, if it is ready in time for broadcast in the late winter or early spring, will be a new jazz opera with music by Norman Symonds and libretto by John Reeves (mentioned in a profile of Reeves in the last edition of *CBC Times*). The jazz opera, of which there are very few in existence, has been commissioned by the CBC, and Terence Gibbs, assistant to the CBC director of music, says he "has a feeling it will be top-flight."

This year is the bi-centenary of the birth of Henry Purcell; (1659-1695) one of England's greatest and most original composers. In the flurry of musical salutes to Handel, Haydn and one or two others whose anniversaries are being celebrated this year, Purcell has been rather left out of the picture. *The Faery Queen* should make up for that. It is really more of a masque than a straight opera. English poet and dramatist Elkanah Settle freely adapted it from Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, and it was first produced in the spring of 1692 at the Dorset Gardens Theatre in London, when the composer was 33. The *Select Songs* from the opera, published that year by Hepinstall, is the only part of the music that appeared in print during Purcell's lifetime. In 1700 the German theorist, organist, conductor and composer Johann Pepusch arrived in London, where he made his home for many years as operatic arranger-conductor, and in October of that year the score for *The Faery Queen* disappeared. It is believed that Pepusch was the culprit. The theatre patentees offered a reward of £20 to the

finder, but Pepusch kept mum. Later it is believed to have fallen into the hands of William Savage, vicar-choral and master of choristers at St. Paul's, London, in 1748. And R. J. S. Stevens, composer and organist at Temple Church and the Charterhouse in the late 18th century, is thought to have had it in his possession.

Of course, all this is conjecture. The score was gone, and only hints dropped through the centuries indicated that it still existed. The amusing part of the mystery is the fact that no one knows exactly *why* it was left hidden away. Perhaps it was because Purcell was many years ahead of his time. The opera's music is scintillating and strangely up to date. By a fortunate accident the theatre copy was uncovered in the library of the Royal Academy of Music in 1901. The whole work, edited by J. S. Shedlock, was published by the Purcell Society in 1903.

The Faery Queen contains some beautiful things quite unconnected with the original play, and it is rather interesting to note that Purcell used none of Shakespeare's words in his songs.



when he does have something to say on these matters, Lord Beaverbrook has definite views.

Leiterman: Is it possible for unworthy men to become publishers of great newspapers?

Beaverbrook: Well, no, because in order to build up a great newspaper you've got to be worthy of your charge . . . You've got to have character within; unless you have character within you can't build up a great newspaper.

character within you you can't build up a great newspaper.

L: But does one man, even with character and the highest principles, have the right to mould public opinion?

B: Well, of course. It's good for public opinion to have such a man attempting to mould it.

Talking of his own newspapers (which include the *London Daily Express*, circulation: 4 million) he says it is nonsense to charge they feature a heavy diet of crime and scandal. "They are just as high class as the *Guardian* and the *Times*."

Max Aitken was born in Maple, near Toronto, on May 25, 1879, of

Scottish extraction with a dash of Irish. His father was a minister, and the family lived frugally on \$1,200 a year.

Young Max left school aged about 11 and was not much older when he founded his first paper, *The Leader*, with the masthead: "We lead. Let others follow who can." Aitken senior stopped the paper because he found his son working on it on Sundays.

Until he was 21 Max tried many things: University, the law, and running a bowling alley in Calgary. And then, "On a journey through Montreal and Toronto I arranged for myself various insurance agencies in St. John and there set up business." He was 19. Two years later he merged two Nova Scotian banks, his first really big deal.

In 1908 he achieved possibly his greatest financial success in merging all but one of the 14 cement companies across Canada. How much did he make? "Oh, I can't remember, but a reasonable sum."

In 1910, Aitken, then 31, liquidated and went to Britain. For a short period he was a British Conservative Member of Parliament but then decided he preferred working behind the political scenes.

During World War Two he made history as the Minister for Aircraft Production. One man described Beaverbrook's ministry as "A fantastic fairy-tale of war."

Many men have said many things about Beaverbrook. "He is a pedlar of dreams," said Howard Spring . . . "One of the greatest ten men living," said Arnold Bennett . . . He has "a long record of political intrigue and political instability, with an insatiable appetite for power," said Earl Attlee.

ment leaves Shamattawa on a temporary duty elsewhere to be witness in an Arctic murder trial, to go “underground” in order to obtain evidence on a narcotics peddler, to attend a refresher course at Ottawa.

Crawley Films, Limited, of Ottawa, who produced the series for the CBC, the BBC and Crawley, McConnell Limited, were determined from the outset that the series would make the fullest possible use of the pool of Canadian talent developed by CBC-TV. Frances Hyland, Lloyd Bochner,

John Drainie, Eric House, Douglas Rain, Katherine Blake and Jack Creley all appear in episodes of the series. So, too, do Toby Robins, Murray Westgate, Bruno Gerussi, Ed McNamara, James Doohan and William Needles.
