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GLENN GOULD has long since proved his mastery of the pianoforte. But his mannerisms will no doubt always astound his listeners: the gloves and the special chair, the mutterings while playing, and the crouching and beating time with the free hand.

“More of his creative and energetic rhythm might go into his playing if he were to build up his strength so he could sit up erect on the austere piano stool of common usage,” said Neville Cardus of the Manchester *Guardian*. But the Soviet press (like Winthrop Sargent of the *New Yorker*, who said that as far as he was concerned Gould could stand on his head) considered Gould’s musical achievements more worthy of comment: “In Mr. Gould we have met one of the most outstanding and original contemporary musicians,” said the *Soviet Literary Gazette*.

Born in Toronto in 1932, Gould graduated from the Toronto Conservatory of Music when he was but 12. His 1954 concerts in the U.S., his 1956 recording of the *Goldberg Variations*, and his tours of Russia and Europe have brought him world fame.

Fond of modern composers, he considers Schoenberg one of the greatest, Stravinsky one of the

most over-rated. He likes jazz in small doses, but resents the intellectual who feels that listening to Charlie Parker is “an experience equal to listening to Bach’s *Art of Fugue*.”

On CBC radio’s *Project '60* this Sunday (Nov. 22) Vincent Tovell of the CBC’s Talks and Public Affairs department, a personal friend of Gould, talks with the young pianist in a one-hour program edited from a longer conversation recorded in Gould’s own home. Producer Harry J. Boyle describes the interview as “one of the most personal and revealing ever presented on radio.” Gould talks about music with wit, wisdom and engaging enthusiasm, and every once in a while he breaks off to illustrate a point at the piano. The musical parts of the program include not only some of Gould’s remarkable interpretations of piano music, but also a piano version of his string quartet and a hilarious parody of a German musician playing Bruckner. Gould also talks about his childhood, his musical training, and his little hideaway up north where he likes to work alone. (This Sunday’s program is a rebroadcast from Tuesday, November 17.)

How To Be An Interviewer

Some tips from the experts

TOUGHEST JOB on radio or TV is probably the live interview. The interviewer must ask those questions which will bring



out the personality and opinions of the man he is interviewing. And that is not easy.

"Do you think dogs ought to be sent to the moon?"

"I don't rightly know."

"Well, would you let your dog be sent to the moon?"

"I don't have a dog."

"No, but if you did have a dog?"

"I haven't really thought about it."

Trouble here lies partly in the questions which should be framed to rule out yes-no answers: "What do you think about sending dogs to the moon?"—And if the answer is a surly, "Nothing!" the interviewer must simply cut his losses and move on.


Some public figures have become adept at the monosyllabic answer. One such is Lord Attlee.

"I can remember one Attlee press conference," recalls Norman DePoe of *CBC Newsmagazine*. "He answered nothing but 'yes,' 'no,' 'maybe' and so on. Finally one newsman got tired of it all. 'Lord Attlee,' he asked, 'do you dislike the press so much you won't answer questions?'" "Well," said Lord Attlee thoughtfully, "I wouldn't say that."

How tough can an interviewer get with his subject? Pierre Berton,

with a reputation for blunt questions, says, "Depends on the traditions of the program and on who is being interviewed. We can go much further in our questions on *Close-Up* than we can on *Front Page Challenge*—two very different programs. Again, you can be tough as you like on Randolph Churchill who doesn't embarrass easily. But not on 'Mom' Whyte who deserves considerate—but honest—treatment. If you embarrass Mrs. Whyte you also embarrass the viewer, and embarrassing the viewer is fatal even though he may strongly disagree with Mrs. Whyte's opinions and actions."

"Questions should illuminate, not embarrass," says Douglas Leiter-



man, of *Close-Up*. Of course some subjects embarrass very easily when they get in front of the cameras. Leiterman discovered this when he interviewed the French poet-dramatist-philosopher, Jean Cocteau, in his home on the Riviera.

"The interview hadn't gone two minutes," Leiterman recalls, "when M. Cocteau threw up his hands and rushed from the room crying, 'No more! No more!'—then got caught at the doorway by his microphone wire. Happily, he calmed down and finally gave us a very good interview."

"Searching questions are not necessarily embarrassing or tough questions," says Berton. "When Shirley Harmer was on *Close-Up* I

couldn't just ask her what the weather was like in California. Her fans wanted to hear why her career hadn't materialized in Hollywood, yet they would have broken my arm—and rightly—had I been brutal. So I asked her honest questions and she gave honest answers. I think she won many friends by her frankness."

Someone has said that a good interviewer should get the answers the layman wants to hear, but this means asking questions the layman would not think of.

"And also," says Leiterman, "questions the layman might be reluctant to ask. Canadians, I think, have a great respect for elder statesmen, 'wise men,' people in authority—and the interviewer who ignores this sense of respect can run into trouble with his audience."

"Politicians," says Berton, "are fair game."

Should the personality of the interviewer figure prominently in a TV program? Two men whose personalities comes across markedly when interviewing on TV—and seem none the less successful for it—both say the interviewer should not play a prominent part, though both qualify their assertions.

Berton: "In general, the interviewer should stay in the background. But you can't make blanket statements about this."

Fred Davis (of *Challenge* and *Open House*): "The personality of



the interviewer should emerge only to bring out the personality of the man he is interviewing."

Leiterman is more positive on the role of the interviewer. "The interviewer must often take the role of the Devil's Advocate, or at least a position opposite to his subject's," he says. "The public sometimes misunderstand this. I happen to think that neutralism in world politics has certain merits, yet I was criticized for being 'hostile' when questioning Krishna Menon on *Close-Up*."

"The interviewer's personality should remain completely in the background," says DePoe. And yet even the crisp, newsman's tech-

nique DePoe uses creates a type of personality.

"Trouble is, there are many different varieties of shows all of which are called interviews," says Berton. "There's the verbal duel, the conversation-type interview, the personality interview, the news interview, and so on. Each needs a different technique."

Different interviewers set about their programs in different ways. On *Open House* Davis likes to have little more than his opening questions prepared beforehand, and only enough time with his subject to sketch an outline, and work out any on-camera demonstrations.

"I like to converse on-air with the person I am interviewing," he

says. "And when he touches on something interesting I try to draw him out, even though my original idea was something different."

"I prepare a number of questions beforehand designed to give the show a logical structure," says Berton. "I stray from those questions at my peril. Naturally the subject must be allowed to amplify a point, but wandering too far destroys the structure, which is bad."

DePoe, who is perhaps a specialist, likes to have a few prepared questions backed up by his specialist knowledge. "In Ottawa I feel at home and can handle an unexpected answer with not much difficulty. But if I'm doing an interview on an unfamiliar topic—well, the unexpected answer can be tough."

The most important attribute of the good interviewer (according to Davis) is a genuine interest in people and processes. This should confirm young Penny Williams, the Grade 12 student who interviews on *Youth '60*.

"I think you must like people to interview them well," she says. "People are my favourite things."

Penny's biggest difficulty as a beginner is in keeping her mind on the questions and answers, and not forgetting her next question. "Particularly at first I kept thinking of whether I was holding my head correctly and what they were saying in the control room."

Again Penny will be comforted by the knowledge that some of the best in the business still have the same difficulties. Berton admits to occasionally floundering mentally; Davis says, "Even the best interviewers worry about how they are going across."

With all his skill, sometimes the interviewer misses the best part of a story. Like Cam Stockand of the CBC Vancouver newsroom who interviewed on radio a man who had walked from Montreal to Vancouver. The man told of the great distances he walked in his life, how fit he was, and so on. And when it was all over he turned to Stockand and asked, "Say, where's the city hall? Is it too far to walk?"

The Giaconda Smile

But will critic Nathan Cohen smile—at his own adaptation of Aldous Huxley's famous story?

"IT ALL BEGAN in the early 1920's," said British author Aldous Huxley writing in the *New York Times*, "when the ailing wife of a Welsh solicitor was carried off, very suddenly, after eating stewed gooseberries and drinking a glass of wine. The doctor issued a certificate of death from natural causes, but the neighbours talked. They talked so much and so persistently that at last a magistrate issued an order for the body to be exhumed. An autopsy revealed the presence of arsenic in the stomach. The bereaved solicitor was arrested, sent up for trial and after a few weeks of enormous publicity, acquitted. Justice had been done, but curiosity remained unsatisfied. For if the poor lady's husband had not administered the arsenic, who had? Because nobody was in a position to answer this question, I was forced to invent an entirely new set of circumstances, in which a solution of the mystery became possible."

The result was his short story, *The Giaconda Smile*. Twenty-five years later Zoltan Korda bought it and asked Huxley to write the movie scenario, which eventually turned the original anecdote into a full-scale melodrama with all stops out and Charles Boyer and Jessica Tandy in leading roles. By the time the film was completed Huxley was so interested in the subtleties and challenge of adapting from one medium to another that he decided to have a fling at transposing the story from screen play to stage play.


His first effort was a dismal failure, but a revised version was presented in 1950 at the Lyceum Theatre in New York, with Basil Rathbone and Valerie Taylor as stars.

The next tailoring job on *The Giaconda Smile* was done by Nathan Cohen, drama and enter-

tainment critic on the *Toronto Star*, and moderator of the CBC radio-TV quiz show, *Fighting Words*. He took the best of the story and the stage version, cut out any non-essentials that helped to slow down the stage play, and turned out an adaptation as gripping as any play exploring the psychological causes and effects of a murder. *CBC Stage* presents it Sunday night on CBC radio.

Mrs. Henry Sutton, a helpless invalid, is poisoned by her spinster friend, Janet Spencer, and the death is attributed to the carelessness of a nurse. Janet believes that Henry Sutton, a charming rake and art connoisseur, will marry her now that he has his freedom. But six weeks after the funeral Henry up and marries—not Janet, but a little bit of not-too-intelligent fluff he picked up somewhere. Eaten with jealousy and bitterness, Janet gets her revenge by using her own crime to implicate him. The nurse, considerably miffed at being unjustly suspected, is easily goaded into accusing Sutton of poisoning his wife. Proof is established and Sutton is tried and sentenced to death. But there is more to the story, as Cohen points up most dramatically in his *CBC Stage* script.

We asked Cohen how being a drama critic affects his appraisal of his own plays and adaptations. He says it is a big help in taking a long, objective view of his writing, as is his experience as a former CBC drama editor. He feels every drama producer should have an editing background, and every editor should have production experience. As Cohen is not noted for tossing bouquets to dramatists for any but exceptional work, he is looking forward to hearing what Cohen the critic will have to say about Cohen the adapter after Sunday night's performance.



KING WHYTE

Some Odd Facts About King Whyte

Everyone in Canada knows King Whyte as a man whose first love is fishing and hunting. It is not so well known that his second love is poetry.

And it was a program of poetry and soft music called *Moon River* which first gave him national prominence—long before *The King Whyte Show* was on television. Later he tried out a *Moon River* type of program on the BBC in London, and comments ranged from "a most beautiful program" to that of a newspaper critic who called it "a sticky mess of treacle."

Moon River originated on an American station. During his years in the U.S., King had just about his worst moment of broadcasting. He gave a cue on the Mutual Broadcasting System by saying, "This is the Columbia Broadcasting System."

In the Canadian army and overseas, King helped train radio personnel who were to take over German radio stations after the invasion. Later he became a war correspondent for Radio Luxembourg. He was one of the first to enter the infamous Belsen concentration camp and was also the only Canadian officer present when the Germans surrendered to General Montgomery.

King has fished in all parts of Canada and in most of the United

"Frankly, I got sick of playing the spineless bachelor," admits Rockwell. "Boynton was smothering me to death. I never got much personal publicity . . . but whenever I'd go into a restaurant or a supermarket I'd hear some girls titter, 'Oh, there's Mr. Boynton.' I'd duck."

Rockwell feared that he would be perpetually "typed" as a comic foil. When *Our Miss Brooks* finished production four years ago he determined never to take that type of role again.

After turning down several comedy parts Rockwell got the role of a very unfunny murderer in an episode of *State Trooper*.

"I had the stuffings knocked out of me by Rod Cameron, but I was happy," he recalls.

After playing a number of villainous roles he began to get a variety of parts but all along he yearned for a good, continuing role.

Rockwell competed with 135 other actors for the part of Sam Logan. After his audition he called the producer daily for 16 days to sell himself.

"Logan is an ideal 19th-century man," says Rockwell. "He has strong principles, amazing integrity and is completely self sufficient. He's not particularly pleasant but he's always needling, always digging for evil."

Rockwell himself is a simple, almost ingenuous fellow. He mixes easily and is a family man.

The only apparent resemblance between the two, besides their looks, is their total dedication to their work.

"I respect Logan," says Rockwell. "For nine years I've longed to play a role I could respect and now I've got it I'm not running anymore."

Mr. Boynton, the pursued, has become Sam Logan, the pursuer.



2. JOHNNY BUCYK

There's a strange trend followed by many athletes in a variety of sports. For one reason or another they're unable to produce for one team, but traded to another they succeed almost immediately. Such is the story of Boston "Beast" Johnny Bucyk.

John spent four years from 1953-56 trying to crack the regular line-up of the Detroit Red Wings but never succeeded in doing more than having one good season ('54-'55) with the Wings farm club at Edmonton. Still Bucyk felt sure he could score regularly in the big leagues if given the chance. When Detroit regained Terry Sawchuk from the Bruins, the Boston team picked up Bucyk and gave him a full test on the "Uke" line with

Bronco Horvath and Vic Stasiuk, two former Detroit farmhands, who had been Johnny's mates at Edmonton. The result of the reunion is now history. They've been one of the league's top lines ever since and should be the Bruin's major threat again this year.

In his first year with Boston, Johnny Bucyk scored 21 goals and assisted on 31 more for a total of 52 points. He improved on these figures last year with 24 goals and 36 assists. In addition he was a Bruin standout in the semi-finals last year although the previous season he had gone 12 games without a single goal. In seven games last year he had six points.

The 24-year-old cigar-smoking left winger gets his nickname of "The Beast" from his reputation as one of the league's hardest-hitting forwards. A sturdy six-footer weighing 196 pounds, Johnny makes opposition players keep their heads up coming around their own nets.

Montreal Canadiens' General Manager Kenny Reardon once said of Bucyk, "he has the potential to score 100 goals a season. He can skate and shoot and has the strength to move right over defencemen rather than go around.

John Bucyk was born in Edmonton, played his amateur hockey there, and still lives in the oil town with his wife, the former Ann Smith of (you guessed it) Edmonton. It was also at Edmonton in his fine 1954-55 season that he won the Western Hockey League rookie award and set a rookie record for points—88. Many observers believe that it won't be long before Johnny is repeating this type of performance in the big leagues.

John Bucyk has a tough tradition to uphold. For years the great NHL stars have borne the number 9, a number Bucyk now shares with Maurice Richard, Gordie Howe and Andy Bathgate. Watch the big Boston left-winger in Saturday's game for signs of potential greatness which one day may rank him with the three other aforementioned "super" stars.—D. H. O'Neill.

Miracle on 34th Street

From NBC—a new version of Valentine Davies' popular Christmas story

SANTA CLAUS is up to his old bag of tricks again. Friday night he will slide down your antenna and maybe into your heart in an hour-long NBC production of Valentine Davies' *Miracle on 34th Street*. It is a delightful combination of fantasy, whimsy and warm humour for young and old and everyone who wants to believe in Santa, the fat old saint who "comes to Herald Square and wraps up the millenium in one neat package."

An elderly man called Kris Kringle (played by the late Edmund Gwenn in the movie version) is hired to be Santa Claus by Macy's a big New York department store, and casts doubt on his sanity by insisting that he really *is* the jolly man in the red suit. Among the people involved in this contretemps are an efficient but cynical department store executive who is bringing up her daughter to be a realist, and a lawyer who sets out to prove that the old man is, indeed, Santa. The courtroom scene is particularly amusing, pointing up the political and economic factors that make the judge and store presidents affirm their belief in Santa Claus.

Although the story is frankly sentimental, it keeps away from slush with its brisk good humour and clever, tongue-in-cheek dialogue which, although critical of the commercialization of Christmas which seems to begin these days before the leaves have turned, proves that it pays to believe in a Santa Claus. As Frank Church said so well in his famous letter to Virginia in the *New York Sun* on September 21, 1897: "Not believe in Santa Claus? You might as well not believe in fairies. Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most

real things in the world are those which neither children nor men can see. No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives and he lives forever."

Santa Claus, or Father Christmas, Kris Kringle or Saint Nicholas, appears to be a composite of two ancient Lycian bishops — 4th-century Nicholas of Myra, and Nicholas of Sion, who died in 564. He was venerated in the 6th century and by the 9th he had risen to super-saint in the Byzantine Empire. His popularity quickly spread, so that by the end of the middle ages more than 2,500 churches were dedicated to Saint Nicholas in the Roman faith. It was the strength of only one miracle that venerated him — he saved three generals from unjust death by Emperor Constantine. "But in the west," says *Chambers' Encyclopedia*, "a constant accretion of legends, often with great poetical charm, widened the saint's patronage. He was invoked as the protector of judges and murderers, pawnbrokers and thieves, merchants and paupers, but above all of scholars and sailors." In the Netherlands and elsewhere his feast, December 6th, is a children's holiday, on the eve of which he distributes presents to his small admirers. The English in New York accepted him from the Dutch, made him Santa Claus, and now, complete with reindeer, a fat tummy and a deep, hearty laugh, he takes over our holiday celebrations, creates more pleasurable anticipation (and January bills) than probably any other person or event, and brings out the best (or the worst) in most of us.

Whether you are a cynical Scrooge or a sentimental Mr. Pickwick, *Miracle on 34th Street* is recommended as a pleasant — and slightly intoxicating — aperitif to the holiday season.



EFREM KURTZ

Cosmopolitan Conductor

Efrem Kurtz, who will conduct the nine symphonies of Beethoven on six consecutive CBC Symphony broadcasts beginning November 20, is one of the two pupils of Artur Nikish, one of the greatest conductors who ever lived. Nikish was, like Kurtz, a noted interpreter of Beethoven, and one of the first conductors to conduct habitually without a score.

Born in Russia 59 years ago this month, Kurtz studied at the famous conservatory in his native St. Petersburg (with composers Nikolay Tcherepnin and Alexander Glazunov), at the University of Riga, and at the Stern Conservatory in Berlin.

He made his debut as a conductor in 1922 in Berlin, deputizing for Nikish in a dance program given by Isadora Duncan.

In 1928, after conducting the Stuttgart Philharmonic Orchestra for four years, he was chosen by Anna Pavlova to conduct her tour-

ing ballet company, and he made three world tours with her group before leaving it to direct concerts in Europe.

Next he toured South America, Australia, and Europe as a conductor, and spent two years as director of the Salzburg Festival. In 1933 he returned to the theatre as conductor of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, and for nine years his name was synonymous with this famous group.

Mr. Kurtz became an American citizen during his tenure as conductor of the Kansas City Phil-

harmonic Orchestra (1943-48). While he was conductor of this orchestra and, later, of the Houston Symphony Orchestra, he filled many guest engagements with orchestras in the U.S., Cuba, Mexico, England and Europe. He is now recording conductor for E.M.I. (Electrical Music Industries) Ltd. of England.

On November 13 Mr. Kurtz conducted the CBC Symphony Orchestra in a program which included Mozart's Flute Concerto in G, with his wife, Elain Shaffer, as soloist.

MUSIC ON RADIO

by DR. BOYD NEEL

The saxophone recital discussed by Dr. Neel in this week's column is not carried in the prairies. We are printing his comments because we think many readers might be interested in them.

SAXOPHONE recitals are very uncommon, probably on account of the somewhat limited repertoire available to that instrument (I am thinking now, of course, of so-called "straight music"). Why this should be, I am not sure, but I cannot think of any great chamber work which includes the saxophone, and yet in the hands of a fine player, it can be a most expressive instrument. It dates from about the middle of the 19th century when the Belgian instrument maker, Adolphe Sax, tried to create something which would have the conical bore of the double reed instruments and yet use a single reed as in the clarinet, with its cylindrical bore. It is, therefore, a hybrid, and extremely useful to military bands, as it forms a useful link between the woodwind and brass sections.

Actually there are twelve different kinds of saxophones, but we only hear two or three of these in general use. The best known works are, I suppose, the *Rhapsody* which Debussy wrote for saxophone and orchestra and the concerto of Glazounov, which is sometimes heard in concert programs. The French composers have always been rather fond of it in their scores and men like Bizet, Saint-Saëns, Delibes and Schmitt have written for it to quite an extent. Vincent D'Indy in his opera *Fervaal* has included a quartet of saxophones in his score. Mahler has used it and also Hindemith, but probably the most famous use of the instrument is in Vaughan Williams' ballet *Job*, where it is introduced unforget-

tably into the scene where Job's comforters appear to him. Richard Strauss has a quartet of saxophones in his *Domestic Symphony*, but it has always puzzled me as to why he says that this should only be used "in cases of extreme necessity." Just what the "cases of extreme necessity" could be, I have not the slightest idea, but I suppose it can be left to the imagination of the listeners.

The way in which the world of jazz music has taken up the saxophone has always seemed to me a little ironical, because the first time the instrument ever appeared in a public performance was in 1844 in a biblical oratorio called *The Last King of Judah*, and I am sure the worthy composer of this piece little thought of what he was bringing into the world of music. In a recital by Paul Brodie on Sunday morning, we shall hear music, as we would expect, entirely by French composers.

The Spohr celebrations continue and on Sunday morning (Tuesday night on CBW) we shall hear yet another work for wind ensemble and piano—the Quintet, Opus 52. I am sure that, since the death of this composer, so much of his music has not been heard in so short a time before. One can rightly say that once you have heard one work, you have heard them all; but Spohr is always charming, sometimes witty, and not by any means always boring, as the historians would have us believe.

On Project '60

A Visit To Denmark

CRoss off Hans Christian Andersen, Victor Borge and Hamlet, and what other product of Denmark you can name? Disgraceful, isn't it, that Canada's neighbour across the top of the world is so little known to us.

Most Canadian travellers on the Continent forego the pleasures of Denmark for the naughty or nice attractions of Paris or the sunny, old-world atmosphere of Rome. But the little country of storks and fairy-tale islands is well worth a visit, as Anne Francis and Tony Thomas discovered when they went there recently to tape-record a sound picture for Tuesday night's *Project '60* on CBC radio. They are the same team, listeners will remember, who prepared the lively picture of West Germany for *Project '59* last year.

The world Denmark means "the field of the Dane." An English writer just returned from Denmark described it as a single, big, green meadow with a grazing cow. Fields they certainly have, for it is the land of the small farmer, very little soil is untilled, and a high percentage of exports are farm products. Thomas and Miss Francis visited some neat little farms, including one where pigs are so streamlined that they do not even squeal. They also investigated some of Denmark's urban industries, and took their microphone into a brewery which exports beer to every country in the world except Russia.

No Dane lives more than 50 miles from the sea—in fact, the country is really a series of islands linked by interesting ferries and splendid bridges. Seafarers from all over the world are welcomed to the harbour of the capital city, Copenhagen, and wished godspeed by the dainty little bronze mermaids of Hans Christian Andersen's fairy tale, who keeps watch at the entrance. Some vessels can come right in to the city's leading square and anchor close to a host

of cafes strung along one side for the refreshment of both full-time and play-time tars. *Project '60* visits the square and talks to some of the people lounging there. And you will be taken to Copenhagen's famous Tivoli pleasure gardens, built over a century ago between the ancient bastions which guarded the city long ago, and to the Hans Christian Andersen memorial home.

But this three-dimensional look at Denmark is no mere travelogue. *Project '60* pokes its inquisitive microphone into Danish homes, businesses, schools and organizations and discovers that the Scandinavian reputation for progressive thinking is more fact than fiction. A new mortality is exposed and explained. Courtship, marriage, divorce and birth control are discussed with startling frankness. Of the 35,000 marriages each year in Denmark, 20 per cent end in divorce. The standard of living is very high, but in spite of the abundance in this advanced welfare state, and the fact that the Danes are noted for their gaiety and love of fun, they have a high incidence of suicide, gastric ulcers and schizophrenia. A Danish psychiatrist gives his views on this paradoxical situation. There is a visit to a reform school, as well as to public school classes and youth centres.

Among the noted Danes you will meet are Foreign Minister Kragg; their favourite humourist, Mogens Lind; composer Knudage Riisager; and one of their most renowned writers, Baroness Blixen, a favourite of the American Book of the

Month Club, whose nom de plume is Isak Dinesen. In an exclusive interview Baroness Blixen, now in her 70's, tells Anne Francis about her life in Denmark's not-so-Vic-

torian 1890's. Early in her life the Baroness spent 17 years in the East African Highlands, far from other white people, and began to write her "deliciously diabolic" tales to amuse herself in the rainy season. One of her best-known novels is *The Angelic Avengers*. Her most recent short stories have appeared in the *Saturday Evening Post* and the *Ladies Home Journal*.

Denmark claims to be the oldest uninterrupted kingdom in the world, and no visit would be complete without a look at the royal palaces and a glimpse of the informal royal family, who share the life of the people and have great capacity for enjoying themselves. Attractive Queen Ingrid can often be seen doing her own shopping in Copenhagen, and at her country residence she sometimes does the cooking while tall King Frederik indulges in a spot of vacuum cleaning. The King is rated one of the best orchestra conductors in Denmark, has a passion for sports and body-building, and once learned the time-table of the Danish state railway by heart.


