WHEN the Jamaican radio service was being organized last spring, Esse W. Ljungh, CBC national drama supervisor, went down to help out for three months and offer advice from his vast experience in radio drama production. He says he found the islanders charming. Among the most interesting was Sylvia Wynter, whom he describes as "an extremely talented actress, singer and dramatist who adores Jamaica and has a great many exciting ideas about it to express." He read her first play, *Under the Sun* (produced last year on CBC radio and in London's Royal Court Theatre), and was so impressed with its humour, pathos

and lively observations on West Indian rural attitudes to culture, religion and general mores, that he brought it back to Toronto with him and scheduled it for *CBC Wednesday Night* this week on radio.

Miss Wynter, who is married to the British Guiana novelist Jan Carew, is a graduate in modern languages of London University, and also studied Spanish at the University of Madrid. She was a dancer and choreographer, but gave these up to concentrate on acting, which she later abandoned for writing. Another of her plays, a translation and adaptation into

The Music of Christmas

On CBC Wednesday Night this week there's a program of Christmas carols given by the Festival Singers. There are two things which strike one immediately when considering Christmas music. First, the fact that there is so little of it, and, second, that what there is of it is mostly of such poor quality. One would have thought that such a great festival as Christmas would have produced some equally great works of music, but there is not (with one exception) one single great musical composition which concerns itself entirely with Christmas. The exception is the *Childhood of Christ* by Berlioz. Other great music which comes to mind in connection with Christmas is, of course, Handel's *Messiah* and Bach's *Christmas Oratorio*, but only a part of *Messiah* is connected with Christmas, and the *Christmas Oratorio* of Bach is a collection of six cantatas covering a period from Christmas Day to the Epiphany. Actually, Bach probably intended these six parts to be performed on six consecutive days, and the work itself hangs very loosely around the Christmas idea, because there are many movements interpolated from other sources having nothing to do with Christmas whatsoever.

Apart from the great compositions which we have just mentioned, Christmas music usually means carols, and the whole subject of carols is a most complex one. How carols got associated with Christmas in the first place is not

quite clear. The word "carol" really means to "dance in a ring." We have the Latin word "choraula" and the Greek "choraules" which meant a flute player for chorus dancing. Eventually, this led to choros, which was a round dance and from which the whole of classical drama evolved. I think we can best define a carol, as we know it today, as a simple song with simple music that can be understood by anybody. In the 7th century we know that the word meant something sinister and evil. By the 14th century, however, it had changed its meaning, and, though it retained its association with the dance, it had become quite respectable and is mentioned by Dante in his "Paradiso." So that the carol as we know it today is really a creation of the 15th century. We notice how very often holly, candles, cakes and mistletoe are mentioned in these songs. All these things were originally used in celebrating pagan rites long before the birth of Christ.

There are carols originating in most European countries. In France they are known as "Noels," in Germany as "Weihnachtslieder." Many of these Christmas carols are supposed to have started with the practice of installing a crib in a church during the Christmas season and were connected with the dancing which takes place round the crib. The Miracle or Mystery play was also responsible for many of the carols we know today. The pas-

toral element is much to the fore in many carols, especially French ones, and the association of shepherd life with Christmas has always been kept up, especially in countries like Italy where shepherds used to descend from the hills at Christmas and play in the streets of Naples. The music they played was, of course, of a bagpipe nature, such as Handel uses in the Pastoral Symphony in his *Messiah* and, in the original score of that work, he admits the source of this tune.

The song of angels also comes into many carols and I suppose we can say that the first real Christmas carol was that sung from the sky by the angels on a certain famous occasion.

Some Christmas carols perpetuate amusing superstitions, while others propound ideas which are anything but biblical. One of the most famous of these is "The Boar's Head" carol which is still sung as this traditional dish is carried in on Christmas Day at Queen's College, Oxford, and is a song of praise of good cheer.

The carol continued to flourish during the 16th century until the Puritans arrived and stopped the whole thing, at least for a time. It is incredible today to realize that the wretched English people had to observe Christmas Day as a fast in 1644 because it happened to fall on the last Wednesday in the month, the day which the Puritan Parliament had ordered to be kept as a monthly fast. In 1647 this doleful body went even farther and abolished Christmas altogether, and it is amusing to see an old tract of 1656 in which a Mr. Hezekiah Woodward makes fun of this, calling Christmas Day "The old Heathen's Feasting Day, in honour to Saturn their Idol-God, the Papist's Massing Day, the Profane Man's Ranting Day, the Superstitious Man's Idol Day, the Multitude's Idle Day, Satan's—that Adversary's—Working Day, the True Christian Man's Fasting Day." And after these amusing epithets, he remarks: "We are persuaded, no one thing more hindereth the Gospel work all the year long, than doth the observation of that Idol Day once in a year, having so many

days of cursed observation with it." So you see, any singing, dancing or outside signs of pleasure of any kind were quite impossible under the Puritan regime and carol singing was naturally looked upon as an appalling offence.

When the Restoration came along things took a long time to get back to normal and, throughout the 18th century, the carol was almost forgotten, at any rate in England. It is not until the following century that we begin to hear about it again. In 1820 Washington Irving on a visit to England writes that, one Christmas night in Yorkshire—"I had scarcely got into bed, when a strain of music seemed to break forth in the air just below the window. I listened and found it

proceeded from a band, which I concluded to be the waits from some neighbouring village. They went round the house playing under the windows." He goes on to say that he listened in "hushed delight" and that "even the sound of the waits, rude as may be their minstrelsy, breaks upon the mid-watches of a winter night with the effect of perfect harmony." This is our first mention of the waits. These, in ancient England, were the watchmen of the city and they used to patrol the streets during the night, playing some kind of horn to show that they were doing their job properly and also to mark the hours of the night, much like the night watchman these days clocks in at regular intervals dur-

ing his rounds. As time went on they began to get quite practiced musicians, playing on a very varied selection of instruments and eventually became formed into complete bands, wearing elaborate uniforms. Waits, therefore, should not really be connected with Christmas at all and have merely become so because they used to be much in evidence around Christmas time, playing in the streets and adding to the general merriment. Any group of amateur Christmas singers has become known in these days as the waits, which is really a misuse of a word signifying something rather dignified and musical. The singing of carols has, I am afraid, become rather a degenerate thing in many instances and nowadays is very often undertaken by groups of small children outside houses, hoping that their raucous sounds will produce some sort of bribe from indoors to move on elsewhere.

Today, there are many fine collections of carols which have great musical value and it is a pleasure to see these splendid songs being rescued from near oblivion. Fifty years or so ago, the carol was in-

deed in a pretty poor state. The churches were full of music which was really a disgrace to the buildings in which it was performed. Let us hear Sir Henry Hadow on the subject: "There has probably been," he writes, "no form of any art in the history of the world which has been so overrun by the unqualified amateur as English church music from about 1850 to 1900. Many of our professional musicians at this time stood also at a low level of culture and intelligence and were quite content to flow with the stream. At the turn of the century we were perhaps at our lowest ebb. This music was deplorably easy to write, it required little or no skill in performance, it passed by mere use and went into the hearts of the congregation, it became a habit like any other, and it is only during comparatively recent years that any serious attempts have been made to eradicate it." Hadow could write like this as recently as 1926, and he certainly does not exaggerate. I can remember so-called "carol services" at which not a single genuine carol was sung and there are so-called

carol books of the 1880's which must be seen to be believed, so dreadful are they.

I think we can trace the renaissance of the carol to the real discovery of English folk songs round about the beginning of this century. When Cecil Sharp commenced his great work of folk song exploration, the carol came back into its own with the rest of this great treasure store of music.

But, we must remember, that by no means all carols are about Christmas. There are many kinds of a general character, suitable for any time of year. There are carols bearing on the Nativity, specifically Christmas, or Christmastide saints, the Epiphany, the Passion, the Virgin and the Annunciation. Then there are the carols on other subjects, such as the Baptism of Christ and the Eucharist. And then again we have songs as Corpus Christie Carol and others with devotional text unconnected with Christmas altogether. It is strange that in England there are no Easter carols, and yet there are many on the Continent.

In the past, carols have been used in many ways, out of doors,

in church, at concerts, at masques and in the home. You may demember that Chaucer's Clerk of Oxenford could sing his carol-like sequence "so sweetly that all the chambre rong" and many of these fine tunes are appropriate for most kinds of celebration. Percy Dearmer, who was Canon of Westminster and who, with Vaughan Williams, made one of the best collections of carols in existence, has a most amusing comment in connection with this. After stating that clubs, guilds, women's institutes, etc., should find carols a constant source of happiness and inspiration, he goes on to say: "that these gatherings of the "Pleasant Sunday Afternoon" type, where young men and women often sing "sacred" solos and duets of the most inconceivable depravity, might be made both religious and delightful if those people were encouraged to sing carols every Sunday! on such occasions many of the Christmas numbers are not out of place even in the summer or autumn, while those we have classed as Nativity or General Carols are suitable all the year round."

We must, therefore, come to the conclusion that apart from carols there is very little music of a Christmas nature and carols will always form the bulk of such music. In the 18th century, however, various compositions in Italy became known as Christmas concerti. These were concerti grossi of the familiar type by the great masters of the time, Manfredini, Corelli, Vivaldi, etc., and they were known by this name because each has a movement in it of swaying Siciliana rhythm, and written over a ground of bagpipe base, such as the one we have already mentioned in Handel's *Messiah*.

Composers today do not seem to be particularly inspired by Christmas, any more than composers of other centuries have been, and it would be nice to have some really great modern work written which could be based on this great celebration of the Christian Church. Maybe one of our Canadian composers will take the hint.

Dag Hammarskjold

The story of the top man at the U.N.—the subject of Project '60 Dec. 15 and 20 on CBC radio

WHEN Dag Hammarskjold took on the job of Secretary-General of the United Nations his salary was \$20,000 a year, tax free, plus \$35,000 a year for expenses. The pay was not high for a post which carries with it the responsibility to "bring to the attention of the Security Council any matter which in his opinion may threaten . . . international peace." More than this, the Secretary-General acts as intermediary, and often as

advisor to the U.N.'s member nations.

The other side of the job is running "the Glasshouse" — the U.N.'s headquarters in Manhattan, so called because of its 4,500 green-tinted windows. The Secretary-General can hire and fire any of

the more than 3,000 international civil servants working there. And after taking over Hammarskjold cut the U.N.'s budget by a million dollars annually through frugal housekeeping.

What sort of a man is Dag Hammarskjold? To understand him you must understand something of the nation that produced him. He comes from a long line of Swedish aristocrats with a reputation for public service. The first Hammarskjold was knighted by King Carl IX in 1610 for valour in battle. Dag Hammarskjold's father was Prime Minister of Sweden during the first world war. Dag, like his country itself, has shifted away from his father's conservative and neutralist position. Sweden is now one of the most advanced welfare states, and though she retains her policy of neutrality this does not prevent her — as it does, say, Switzerland — from joining external political organizations.

Hammarskjold is particularly interested in the economic problems of the have and the have-not nations. Perhaps this springs in part from his early training as an economist. His doctoral thesis, *Distribution of Economic Market Trends*, bore a prefatory quotation from *Alice in Wonderland*: "That's nothing to what I could say if I tried," the Duchess replied." At 27 Hammarskjold was assistant professor of economics at the University of Stockholm. He is also a Bachelor of Law.

In the early thirties Hammarskjold headed a committee on unemployment whose recommendations are said to have kept Sweden's unemployment level low. After that for many years he was a government "backroom boy" on financial matters. By 1951 he was a member of the Swedish cabinet, though not a member of the party in power. He considers himself a non-party man. "Whatever political system you have," he has said, "it must be based on respect for the individual."

Sweden has consistently resisted any pressure to force her into one

Tuesday on Project '60

Laughter in the Air

A tribute to the great era of radio comedy, featuring six of its stars

RUDY VALLEE calls himself "the Pat Boone of the Stone Age." Both he and Boone make their contemporaries swoon, "only mine take longer to get up," he says.

This Tuesday on radio Rudy hosts *Project '60*. The program, *Laughter in the Air*, is a tribute to, and a memory of, that great era of radio comedy—an era that provided laughs for millions of North Americans during the tragedy and frustrations of the Great Depression.

Jack Benny, George Burns, Eddie Cantor, Edgar Bergen, Bing Crosby and Gertrude Berg are some of the great names who will speak, and there will be excerpts from shows like those of the late Fred Allen, and of *Amos 'n Andy*. Tony Thomas will produce the program on tape in Hollywood.

Vallee's role as host to *Laughter in the Air* is fitting: this Bachelor of Philosophy from Yale, who also found most of the musicians for his Connecticut Yankees band at that institution, was one of the first great stars of American radio. (He started in American radio in 1928 but one report says he made his radio debut in Britain while playing the Savoy Hotel.) He was also the first sleepy crooner—as distinct from the Mammy-singing bombshells—who made his fans swoon. But most of all, many of the radio greats of the thirties saw their first microphone on Rudy Vallee's *Variety Hour*.

One such is George Burns, a guest on *Laughter in the Air*. With Gracie Allen, George had hit the big time in vaudeville, earning good money. But in 1930 when an agent from Vallee's show approached him and quoted a price, George was astounded at the amount.

"We'll give you \$750 for one show," said the agent.

"How much?" gasped George.

"All right then, a thousand dollars but not a penny more."

From there they got their own radio show and Gracie achieved national fame by "losing" her brother. (Actually, Burns and Allen had achieved international fame earlier: they played on BBC radio before they went on U.S. radio.)

Many years later, as head of McCadden Corporation (film producers), George Burns could say, "The sponsors are writing me out a \$45,000 cheque to make 22 million people laugh. I don't want a good writer, I want a \$45,000 writer."

Many of the radio greats were friends back in vaudeville. George and Jack Benny, for instance. When George and Gracie married in 1926 in Cleveland, Jack who was playing in Omaha, was the only friend who knew of the ceremony. When the telephone rang in the honeymoon suite at 3 a.m. the morning after the marriage, George picked up the receiver, said, "Send up two orders of ham and eggs," and slammed down the phone. Hundreds of miles away, presumably, Benny stood there holding the phone, staring with a long, long stare at whatever audience was available to stare at.

Jack Benny attributes his long-lasting success to the character he has sustained for so long on radio and TV. His meanness, for instance. During the feud with Fred Allen, Benny was nominated to open a March of Dimes Campaign. Said Allen: "The dime hasn't been invented that would march past Jack Benny."

Then there was the time Jack heard a friend had lost \$10,000 in one night of gambling. "You know," said Jack, "I'd feel like slitting my throat next morning."

"Yeah," sympathized one of his writers, "just think: two whole day's work."

If Benny knows how to save a dime, two of his fellow comedians knew how to spend one: they are Edgar Bergen and Eddie Cantor, also appearing on *Laughter in the Air*. As a child in New York Eddie Cantor invested 50 cents in a pair of pants to make a presentable appearance in a local amateur show. He imitated a local politico, won \$5. Later Eddie worked as a singing waiter for a Coney Island restaurant. His pianist was Jimmy Durante. Eddie (like Durante) made his radio debut on Vallee's show, later on his own radio show was credited with being the first comedian to insist on a live audience.

Edgar Bergen's initial outlay was a 25 cent investment in *Herrman's Wizard's Manual* which taught him tricks and ventriloquism. The latter, of course, gave rise to Charlie McCarthy, the impertinent young man who is still copied the world over. And Bergen, too, started on radio with Rudy Vallee.

If Rudy was the first crooner, Bing Crosby is probably the greatest. There is really nothing new to say about Der Bingle; perhaps a few quotes about his diffidence, as when his brother Everett tried to persuade him to try for a radio contract in New York. He said, "Oh

Clayton Bissell (USAF, Ret.), who with Gen. Billy Mitchell proved the effectiveness of air power by sinking the captured German battleship Ostfriesland from the air in 1921, and Vice Admiral William Callaghan (USN, Ret.), first skipper of the USS Missouri, the last battleship built by the U.S. Navy.

Fighting Words

This week private stations carry the third of the special interviews being carried on Fighting Words this season. Nathan Cohen will talk with the famed Montreal psychiatrist, Dr. Karl Stern, about psychiatry, art, and literature. Stern is the author of *Pillar of Fire*, a spiritual autobiography in which he tells of his conversion from Judaism to Roman Catholicism. It won him the Christopher Award and was a best-seller in 1951. He also wrote *The Third Revolution*, a study of psychiatry and religion. Bob Learned English Second

It is not generally known that CBC-TV singing star Bob Goulet speaks French fluently—so fluently, in fact, that when he applied for an announcer's job at an Edmonton radio station, he was turned down because he spoke English with a French accent.

On *The Wayne and Shuster Hour* Nov. 16, Bob joined guest vocalist Denyse Angé, a French-Canadian from Montreal to sing a medley with a French flavour. But Bob still didn't get a chance to air his perfect French. Denyse played the part of a young French girl teaching a young Canadian boy how to speak French.

"C'est la vie," quipped Bob.

He has appeared a number of times on CBC-TV's French network. "And there, they think I speak French with an English accent," he sighed.

Bob couldn't speak a word of English until he was five years old. His grandparents were French-Canadian. His parents spoke fluent French and they wanted their son to learn the language too.

He did finally get the job at the Edmonton radio station. "This was because they lost two announcers in a week and the head announcer liked me because he thought my voice was like his."

or other of the Great Power camps. She refused to join NATO and tried to persuade Norway and Denmark to stay out by offering them a substitute Scandinavian pact. On the other hand, when Russian planes shot down a Swedish plane over the Baltic, Hammarskjold himself, then temporarily in charge of the Swedish Foreign Office, sent three stinging notes to the Russians. It is no doubt this refusal to back down to anyone that made a Swede, and Hammarskjold in particular, acceptable to all the powers.

Hammarskjold has a friendly manner. But he has the reputation of having a coldly intellectual mind combined, perhaps paradoxically, with a streak of mysticism. He is a mountaineer and fond of exploring Arctic Lapland, an admirer of the scholar-missionary Schweitzer, and a pupil of Keynes the economist. His reading takes in Joyce, Proust and Rilke.

Publicity is obnoxious to Hammarskjold and it is said he prefers the orderliness of backroom diplomacy to the flamboyant gesture in the public place. One thing is certain: international tension will never rise because of Hammarskjold saying anything he did not want to say. At one press conference he remarked, "I may be learning more from this than you are." And any reporter who has attended a Hammarskjold press conference looking for lively copy would probably agree.

Pineapple Poll

The Gilbert and Sullivan that G. & S. never heard of

"What? Quite impossible! You're way off the beam, old boy. The idea would be disastrous for all concerned!" Probably that would have been the reaction if you had suggested to any of Britain's theatrical critics that it would be possible to create a "smash hit" ballet based on *The Bumboat Woman's Story*, one of the more idiotic selections from W. S. Gilbert's *Bab Ballads*, set to a grab-bag of tunes from Sir Arthur Sullivan's operetta scores. Even some of the most ardent Gilbert and Sullivan fans were skeptical when they heard what was afoot. Why, they said, that silly Bumboat tale was written before G. and S. had even met, and was away below the standard Gilbert later set himself. And as for lifting Sullivan's tunes out of their context and tossing them together—it would be like serving salad without dressing. It just wouldn't hold together.

But it happened, and they were wrong. On March 13, 1951, the Sadler's Wells Theatre Ballet (now Britain's Royal Ballet), presented *Pineapple Poll*, a pert, exhilarating and extremely amusing frolic that turned out to be one of its outstanding successes, and confirmed the legend that Gilbert and Sullivan were made for each other—whole, or *en potpourri*. You will be able to hear and see what we mean on Tuesday night, when CBC-TV presents the North American television premiere of *Pineapple Poll* by the National Ballet of Canada on *Ford Startime*. Lillian Jarvis and Lawrence Adams will dance the leading roles, supported by Patrick Hurde, Jacqueline Iving and Patricia Neary.

None of Gilbert's particular style of topsy-turvy nonsense, his gift for slightly grotesque and satiric characterization or his bubbling wit have been lost in the shuffle from spoken words to dance. Charles Mackerras, who arranged the music, shows a remarkably imaginative feeling for the right

instruments to suggest the vocal roles, while preserving Sullivan's original orchestration whenever possible. By dividing the voice parts between the various instruments he avoids monotony and gives a saucy freshness to the well-loved melodies. He insists that "there is no original composition in *Pineapple Poll*—even the transitional passages are taken from Sullivan"—from *The Mikado*, *Trial by Jury*, *Patience*, *The Sorcerer*, *The Gondoliers*, *Princess Ida*, *Cox and Box*, *Pirates of Penzance*, *Ruddigore*, *Iolanthe*, *The Yeomen of the Guard*, *H.M.S. Pinafore*, and the Overture to *Di Ballo*.

Until 1950 it would not have been possible to do this, but when the copyright to Sullivan's music expired that year, Mackerras was quick to seize his opportunity. He was fortunate in his collaborator, John Cranko, who was responsible for the book and devising the dances. One of Europe's most inventive choreographers, he has a lively sense of humour, and his dances for *Pineapple Poll* vary from piquant, tongue-in-cheek satires to hilarious romps. Especially amusing are the burlesqued hornpipes. In London last summer he personally taught the ballet to Celia Franca, artistic director of the National Ballet, and her assistant Grant Strate, and *Pineapple Poll* is now one of the major items in the National Ballet's extensive repertoire. For Tuesday night's performance a large CBC orchestra will be conducted by George Crum, musical director of the National Ballet. Production will be by Norman Campbell. Sets by Robert Lawson and costumes by Kay Ambrose have been based on the original designs by Osbert Lancaster, political cartoonist for the London Daily Express, who described himself recently as "an Anglican graduate of Oxford with a taste for architecture, turned cartoonist, approaching middle-age

and living in Kensington." If you have read any of his books of cartoons and comment you will be prepared for the sly charm and provocativeness of his sets and costumes, and will appreciate the significance of his tag as "Absurdity Finder-in-Chief to the British Nation." His books? There is *Pillar to Post* (or, *English Architecture Without Tears*), *Homes Sweet Homes*, *The Saracen's Head*, etc., and he did the illustrations for *London Night and Day* (a guide to where the other books don't take you). He was born in London and says he sat for several law exams, failing in all of them once and in Roman Law twice, so abandoning all though of the law he studied at the Slade School of Art, and in 1939 began to contribute cartoons to the *Daily Express*. He has been at it successfully ever since. *Pineapple Poll* was his first outstanding stage work.

And now a word about the plot of *Pineapple Poll* (or *The Bumboat Woman's Story*) — and in case you are wondering what on earth a bumboat is, it is used for carrying provisions, trinkets, etc., from the shore to ships at anchor. The opening scene is a public square in Portsmouth, where the crew of Her (Victorian) Majesty's ship, *The Hot Cross Bun*, is making the most of shore leave. The time, of course, is spring. On the right stands a pub, the *Steam Packet*, where Jasper the potboy is polishing windows. A crowd of girls comes dancing in with a group of sailors, who call for mugs of beer, and Jasper is kept busy serving them. Then Pineapple Poll dances into the square in a candy-striped dress with green ribbons in her red hair. She sells ribbons and trinkets to the sailors, Jasper, who is in love with her, buys her a flower and presents it to her. She dances with him briefly, but he sees that his love is not required.

Then Captain Belaye enters, a dazzlingly dark and handsome fellow. It is he that Poll loves, and

This Endris Night

*The Christmas story in medieval prose, poetry and song
Christmas night on radio*

WHEN Sir Laurence Olivier was making the movie version of *Richard III*, he asked Peter Dimuantes to record 40 chants for him, three-quarters of which were plain-song. He chose several as background music for the film, and many movie-goers felt that their haunting, emotional quality added greatly to its impact. Dimuantes sounded as if he had grown up with church music, which, in fact, he had, and few people who enjoyed his rich tenor voice in the film were aware that he had been belting out love songs in London's West End theatres for years—in revues, musicals and operettas. He admits that he prefers light music, but with a voice and style equally suitable for sacred, operatic, romantic and saucy music, he gets calls to sing just about everything, and his versatility allows him to switch from one to the other as if he were merely changing his shirt.

When producer John Reeves was devising a program for this Christmas night on CBC radio, telling the Christmas story in prose and poetry from medieval texts, he signed up the drama quartet from his successful summer series *Four's Company* (Mavor Moore, Diana Maddox, John Drainie and Ruth Springfield), and persuaded Dimuantes (now living in Toronto) to intersperse the readings with plainsong. Reeves says he chose the medieval period because it had the "greatest purity of faith," and he used the opening phrase of a medieval carol for his program title: *This Endris Night*. It promises to be a warmly expressive interpretation of the Bethlehem story, presented simply, in the fine dramatic tradition established by the quartet in its long summer run on CBC radio.

We asked Dimuantes to tell us about himself, and he started off

Christmas Almanac

*Holiday visits to all parts of
Canada on CBC radio*

Christmas Day *Almanac* this year goes out into the country and the smaller centres across Canada. French Canadian fiddlers and folk-singers from Ste. Adele, Quebec, a choir from Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, a visit with a patrol in an R.C.M.P. cruiser in Saskatchewan, and an Indian choral service from Lytton, British Columbia, are but a few of the items. Mr. H. G. Walker, General Manager of CBC English Network Broadcasting, will open *Almanac* with the season's greetings.

Planning for the program actually began *last* Christmas Day when Dick Halhed and Norman Hollingshead, Christmas Radio Co-ordinators, took notes of the mistakes and good points of last year's *Almanac*. The notes were put on file, then brought out again on September 11 when the two men held their first planning meeting for this year. Over the past three months the file has grown to include more than 60 memos, letters and telegrams between Toronto and production points across Canada, making suggestions, confirming them, shuffling them around till, at the time of going to press, a pretty firm schedule was made (see pages 32-33). But: "You line up an interview and think it's fine," says Halhed, "but people die, move away, get mad about something—and that means another change. There are dozens of people involved all across the country in a show like this. So you might well see some changes between now and Christmas."—Even so, *Almanac* is likely to make a pleasant way of preparing for Christmas dinner.



started. Many of Molly's remarks have now gone into folklore:

"Sammy, a boy of your age and structure already!"

"If it's nobody I'll call back."

No tribute to radio comedy could omit a tape of the voice of the late Fred Allen. Allen started in showbusiness with a juggling act. He was still a lad, juggling in a theatre, when the manager came on the stage to kid him and asked, "Where do you think you learned to juggle?"—The embarrassed lad came back with: "I took a correspondence course in baggage smashing."

Soon Allen was on the circuit with jokes like: "My uncle is a Southern planter. He's an undertaker in Alabamer."

Fred Allen made Broadway in 1922 in *The Passing Show*—to which he attributes the passing of the live theatre. In 1932 he entered radio in a show called *The Bath Club*.

Clifton Fadiman saw Allen as epitomising the revolt against authoritarianism and stuffed-shirt-ism. He has likened the comedian to an eagle which Allen once interviewed on his show and which, half way through the interview, took off and began flying over the studio audience, to caustic ad libs from Allen. The result was the longest studio laugh ever clocked—45 minutes.

First the give-away shows which Allen hated—so rightly, as it turns out—and then TV, which he regarded as a soulless monster, took away Fred Allen's audience. But many of those who listen to *Laughter in the Air* will wistfully remember their youth.

Today Nathan Cohen talks with Dr. Karl Stern, famed Montreal psychiatrist, about psychiatry, art and literature. by explaining his name. His parents were Lithuanians, but he was born in Yorkshire, and it was in the north of England that he began his musical career. "At concerts in the park," he said, "I was the little fellow in short pants who was lifted onto the bandstand to sing a trembling solo." He was a boy soprano for years in a church choir, and then shortly after his teen-age voice had floundered around and finally settled on its present tenor level, he joined the Royal Navy, was blown up at sea, spent nine months in hospital and was pensioned off. He won a scholarship to the Royal Academy (where he met his wife) and stepped from there into six years in London's West End. "I got my first big chance at the Scale Theatre in a production featuring more "greats" than I have ever appeared with in one show since! It was *Alice in Wonderland*, with Sybil Thorndyke as the White Queen. Richard Adinsell wrote the music, Clemence Dane adapted the book, Neil Mathieson conducted, Ivor Novello staged it, and Esme Church produced. I was just an understudy when rehearsals began. One of the actors was indisposed and couldn't read his lines, so on the second day I suddenly had a script thrust into my hands and was told to strut my stuff. In five days I had to learn two acts and six songs. But it was the sort of break show people dream about!" Later he took over the lead in *Bless the Bride* on short notice, appeared in *Latin Quarter* at the Casino, was in *Piccadilly Hayride* with Alan and Blanche Lund just before they were married, and in *Sauce Piquante* at the Cambridge Theatre, where he played a chef with Audrey Hepburn as his helper.

His films include *The Master of Bankdam*, *The Laughing Lady*, *Arrivederci Roma* (in which he sang all the background songs), and an American puppet version of *Alice in Wonderland*—he dubbed in the voice of the White Rabbit—and he has even sung in Maori and Zulu.

He managed to keep his careers in religious and secular music running smoothly side by side. He sang in the Brompton Oratorio Choir in London, and often broadcast rare works with the Schola Polyphonica. One time he was asked to teach some English choir boys to sing like the Sistine Choir—their voices were to be used as background in a film shot around St. Peter's in Rome. "That was one of the trickiest but most interesting jobs I ever tackled," he told us. "I had to teach them the words phonetically, of course, so I wrote them on a huge blackboard, and we sweated it out for three weeks. Then I trotted boys and blackboard down to the Shepparton studios, Neil Mathieson conducted, and they did a remarkable job at imitating the Italian accent."

We asked him what had brought him to Canada, and he said that glowing reports of the opportunities for artists opening up here had leaked into the West End, and because he had visited Halifax and liked it when he was in the navy, he decided to come over and see for himself. Two-and-a-half years ago Dimuantes, his wife Joan, and their four children settled in Toronto and they are very glad they did. Joan teaches at the Koenig School of Speech and Drama. At first Peter took any job that came along, including moving furniture and driving trucks. John Reeves gave him his first break on CBC radio, and gradually he picked up the threads of his career. Now he has many successful CBC operatic and light musical shows to his credit on both radio and TV.

West Indian terms of Garcia Lorca's tragedy *Yerma* (The Barren One), was also broadcast by the BBC. She was born in Cuba of Jamaican parents, and drew the story of *Under the Sun* from memories of visits with her grandparents in remote rural areas of Jamaica.

Here are a few quotations to give you the gist of it. Recollect Mass Moses, "who did lead

we up out of the starvation, and did find we Hebron, a goodly land, a new Canaan in which to enter." But later, "recollect we as chaff in the hands of the hurricane winds that did sweep we up and out we house, and we house out after we. Recollect the hungriness, the sore distress, the nothing that did remain to we." Who was the rascal who stepped out of the straight-and-narrow and brought misfortune to Hebron? Miss Gatha, Mass Moses' widow, points her long stern finger at Elder Obadiah, "a man new married to a young, soft mulatto girl with skin like bright silk."

As you can see, the Jamaican dialect has a delightful rhythm to it—you can feel how easily music fits into these people's daily lives. And its fluid transition from earthiness to lyricism, from old-world formality to bluntness, is most refreshing. The dialect may seem strange to our ears for the first couple of minutes, but after that Miss Wynter's writing, which Esse Ljungh describes as "tremendously strong," sweeps away barriers and it is almost impossible for the listener not to be completely wrapped up in the tensely emotional atmosphere of the play. Reproducing the softly musical Jamaican cadences offers a challenge to the cast, headed by John Drainie as Obadiah, but Ljungh has had some special dialect recordings sent up from Jamaica to act as guides.

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
