

A Musical Fantasy By James Thurber

ROBERT GOULET stars in Feb. 16
"Ford Startime" production

NORM CAMPBELL looked worried.

"It's worse than a Minotaur because it gleeps," he said.

What gleeps? we asked him.

He swallowed once, paled visibly, and muttered: "The Todal!"

What's a Todal?

"It's made of lip, and looks like a blob of glue." We appeared unconvinced, so he went on: "It's an agent of the devil sent to punish evil-doers for doing less evil than they should." He lowered his voice dramatically. "It sounds like rabbits screaming, and smells like old, unopened rooms. It's the gibbous spawn of hate and thunder and frightens octopi to death!"

We looked over our shoulder. The clack of typewriters in the outer office was suddenly menacing. Shivering slightly we remarked that the Todal sounded like a bit of James Thurber.

"It is," said Campbell. "It's *The 13 Clocks*, which we're presenting as a musical on *Ford Startime* Tuesday night. And the cameramen assigned to the show are pretty fearful about it. I've had to rally their spirits and argue with some who are demanding special 'danger pay' for the job. It's all rather terrifying, but we'll have to face up to the Todal as courageously as we can."

Campbell had made us feel pretty edgy—and looked as if he were enjoying every minute of it. In fact, if viewers get as big a kick out of watching the show as Campbell is getting out of producing it, they are in for a memorable evening. He told us that the problem of dealing with the world's worst monster on the show is only one of his production worries.

He spread the big blueprints of the floor-plan for the production across his desk and explained that the action requires six sets, ranging from a dungeon to a castle, a forest, a witch's hut, a village

square and a beach scene (including the lair of the Todal). But because the studio is too small to take them all at once, he was faced with quite a space problem. He solved it by having two sets "flown" in, that is, lowered from overhead when required.

Naturally, with this studio congestion, trying to squeeze in the orchestra would be impossible—every time an actor opened his mouth to sing he would find a violin bow nudging his tonsils. So, while the musicians are playing in Studio G in the CBC radio building in Toronto, the singers they accompany are performing before the cameras in TV Studio 7 some distance away. Campbell says the show is held together with a great electronic chain. Singers in Studio 7 hear the orchestra over loudspeakers. The microphones there must be balanced so they pick up only the pure vocal sounds without the relay from the loudspeakers. The conductor watches the action on a monitor in Studio G.

The 13 Clocks is a Thurber story dramatized and set to music by Mark Bucci. (See program notes for details).

When viewers see *The 13 Clocks* they will understand why Thurber got so much fun out of writing it. It's a different Thurber, but a Thurber at his best. In his foreword to the book he says: "I wrote *The 13 Clocks* in Bermuda, where I had gone to finish another book. The shift to this one was an example of escapism and self-indulgence. Unless modern Man wanders down these byways occasionally, I do not see how he can hope to preserve his sanity."

Mark Bucci's music complements the elfin feeling of the story so well that it surprised us to learn that he and Thurber have never met. Their sounds like a close collaboration. The score is half way between conventional musical comedy and opera, the simplest passages alternating with difficult sections that are a real challenge to the singers. Bucci is a young American who has written several operas, among them *Tale for a Deaf Ear* and *Sweet Betsey from Pike*.

"I HEARD Neil Chotem play Bach, Chopin, Rachmaninoff and his own compositions, and I was amazed at his fine musicianship and stupendous technique. I predict a great future for him."

The Chotem poll of credits hit a high spot when Artur Rubinstein made this statement in 1947, the year the versatile Neil Chotem gave his first piano recital in Montreal.

Today, if musicians, critics or the music-loving public were polled on the merits of this Saskatoon-born artist, the feeling would be basically the same. As pianist, composer, conductor or arranger, Neil has been receiving the votes of leading musicians and audiences ever since he was proclaimed a child prodigy.

Artur Rubinstein did not merely predict. He backed his conviction by advising his own manager, famed New York impresario Sol Hurok, to sign the gifted Canadian to a contract and send him on tour. Neil declined the offer for several reasons important at the time, and since then he has been too busy in Canada to cast an eye to the south.

Sooner or later, however, that big financial offer is made to leading artists. Neil's same from a well-known bandleader in the United States about three years ago. It was an offer no Canadian orchestra leader could afford to make, but one Neil also turned down. He was to receive \$1,000 per arrangement as a ghost writer. How can an arranger refuse such an offer?

"The fact that I turned it down," says Neil, "sums up my whole atti-

tude toward the problem of Canada vs. the United States. The thing I like most about my career is that in Montreal. I have freedom to explore all aspects of whatever work I am doing. Ghostwriting made-to-order arrangements usually turns out to be an unsatisfactory affair from all points of view."

Neil Chotem has found that in Canada he may give vent to all his talents. But the very fact that he can pursue each is in itself remarkable. As Thomas Archer of the *Montreal Gazette* once commented: "Just how Mr. Chotem manages, in the midst of his major preoccupations of composing and arranging, to keep in top form as a virtuoso is his secret and our wonder."

Indeed, Neil's versatility has been admired by many critics, but it might be interesting to take a Chotem poll of those with whom he is working closely. Earl Pennington, producer of *CBC Variety Hour* on alternate Fridays over the Trans-Canada network, deals with

the musicians as a group and has the opportunity to hear their impromptu remarks at rehearsal and afterwards.

"The general attitude is one of great admiration for Neil, especially as an arranger," says the producer. "Unlike some conductors, he has an infallible ear for detecting mistakes during rehearsal, thus saving time and trouble for all concerned. Members of the orchestra have turned down lucrative engagements in order to remain with Neil."

Perhaps the most glowing tribute to Neil Chotem comes from his right-hand man and fellow conductor-composer-arranger. Michel Perrault, who plays tympani and often conducts the orchestra in his own arrangements, is one of Neil's greatest admirers.

"About four years ago," he says, "our radio show, *Music from Montreal*, had gone off the air for the summer and there was some doubt that it would return. We arranged a surprise party at my home and, under false pretenses, enticed Neil out to the house where the full orchestra was on hand to honour him. To my knowledge, it was the first time an orchestra in Montreal ever gave such a party for their conductor."

The purpose of the gathering was to present Neil with a scroll prepared by Michel on behalf of the band. It read: "To Neil Chotem, for having extracted from us, with the least possible pain, the finest work ever consistently produced on a radio series, we present our deepest admiration."

Happily, the 35-member orchestra is as prominent as ever on radio

through *CBC Variety Hour*, which is basically the same as *Music from Montreal* of recent years. The accent is on a broader field of jazz and light classics for the current show, but there is that same quality which made the earlier program so widely popular.

As for Neil Chotem himself, he is rather quiet, and inclined to look upon his talent as nothing extraordinary. Others have to speak for him in this regard and Michel Perreault is perhaps Neil's best source of publicity.

Last summer, Neil was host for *Jam on Both Sides*, a local TV show on CBMT which explored jazz and the classics. It was Neil's first excursion into the field of TV as a master of ceremonies, although he has conducted, appeared as soloist, and arranged for the CBC's French TV network on many occasions. This brings up an interesting point. Neil Chotem is as prominent among his French-speaking confrères as he is among English-speaking Canadians.

Significantly, he toured the Province of Quebec for Les Jeunesses Musicales du Canada last fall. This musical youth movement does much to bring live music by the best available talent to comparatively remote areas. Neil Chotem gave 23 concerts during the tour, including the first concert ever given at Forestville, a small community in the Baie Comeau region.

Neil found that the Quebec townspeople were exceptionally receptive to concerts and that those who were within range of TV looked forward with gusto to such prestige programs as *L'Heure du Concert*.

Neil was composing music before he reached his teens. Born in 1920 in Saskatoon, he began his formal musical training with Lyell Gustin of that city, at the age of 10. His first CBC network program came just three years later. He has also studied with Jeannette Durno, Arthur Benjamin and Michel Hirvy.

With the RCAF during the Second World War, he entertained the

troops overseas and played many times for the BBC. It was in England that he developed an interest in jazz and there that he met his wife, the former Jane Gage who was an actress and head of Neil's entertainment unit at the time.

Again, in 1953, Neil Chotem entertained the troops—this time in Japan and Korea where he spent about a month as musical director and arranger for a concert party. The quiet musician proved to be a great trouser who kept the show going with his arrangements, often under difficult circumstances. In Korea, he went out and found playable pianos and other missing instruments with which the group could carry on.

Neil has composed original music for many radio series, notably Rupert Caplan's CBC Wednesday Night dramas. His incidental music for the CBC and the National Film Board has won many awards. He has also recorded transcriptions for the CBC's International Service.

With his immense technical ability, he combines a remarkable memory. CBC producer Don McGill recalls the time Neil had been booked for a broadcast recital which was to include ten very tricky Bagatelles by Alexander Tcherepnin. In order to make sure performance rights had been cleared, McGill asked Chotem what edition of the music he was using. Neil didn't know. He hadn't seen the music for ten years!

In 1955, Neil joined the Faculty of Music at McGill University to teach regular classes in writing and arranging music for radio, television and films. For the past year and a half, however, he hasn't had the time to hold these classes. This he regrets, for many of his students were professional arrangers themselves and Neil claims he learned as much as they did from the exchange of ideas.

The Chotems have a girl and two boys: Tara, 12; Tony, 10; and Peter, 7. Neil has even dedicated lively selections to the members of his family, with the exception of little Peter who will be honoured with a Chotem composition in the near future. And why not? They're Neil's most outspoken critics.

Margaret Braidwood Returns to Canada

Stars in "Murder Anyone" this week on G.M. Presents

Margaret Braidwood, who returns to the Canadian television scene after an absence of more than two years, is impressed by "the bustle and increased professionalism" now apparent in Toronto acting circles.

The actress will star with former Winnipeg actor Douglas Rain and Emerton Court in the suspense melodrama *Murder Anyone?* on *G.M. Presents* this Sunday on the CBC-TV network. She last appeared on CBC-TV in the drama *99 Times Around the Block*, in June, 1957. Between 1953 and 1957, she played many roles in Toronto television dramas and on the stage.

Miss Braidwood and her actor-writer-husband Harry Geldard have been working on and off Broadway for the past 3½ years.

"I find New York more easy-going than Toronto," says the chestnut-haired, throaty-voiced actress. "I know most people think it's the other way 'round, but it seems to me that people aren't nearly as serious there as they are here.

Canadian television dramas, she finds, are "much more realistic" than they were when she was acting here a few years ago. And she believes "a real professionalism has developed."

Miss Braidwood is loud in her praise of Canadian performers. "Take Catherine Procter, who plays with me in *Murder Anyone?* She had an accident the day before the show was taped—fell on the subway, and had to have stitches in her head. She must have felt awful, yet she went through a strenuous day on camera without a complaint. It's a privilege to work with people like that."

Delighted with her own role in the *G.M. Presents* production, that of Jane Mannion, an attractive widow suspected of having murdered her husband, Miss Braidwood prolonged her stay in Toronto.

PIERRE MONTEUX

Monteux Conducts W.S.O. This Week

It would almost seem that there is something about conducting that is conducive to longevity. This century has seen at least three octogenarians—Toscanini, Beecham, and Monteux—still practising the most difficult of all the musical arts, apparently at the height of their powers.

An interesting indication of how much musical history has been experienced by such men presents itself on February 11: On that evening while Pierre Monteux is conducting the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, CBC-TV will be presenting Jules Massenet's *Manon*, an opera which Monteux played under the composer's direction

when he was a young violist in the Opera-Comique orchestra in Paris. Monteux recalls the incident (in a charming accent which over 25 years of residence in the U.S. has not corrected) on one of his many recordings.

Pierre Monteux was born in Paris 85 years ago, studied at the Paris Conservatory, then played in the orchestras of the Opera-Comique and the Colonne concerts and founded the Concerts Berlioz. Before and after World War I he devoted much time to conducting the Diaghilev Russian Ballet. In Europe he was also associated with the Concerts Monteux and the Orchestre Symphonique de Paris (both of which he founded) and the Concertgebouw

Dateline U.N.

First of a two-part report on "Africa - The Infant Giant." 

Second "Close-Up" On Eugenics Feb. 18

Can science, through a program of eugenics, eliminate undesirable characteristics in Man? Can Man control his heredity and thus improve the human race?

Yes, says Dr. Herman J. Muller, of the University of Indiana, American Nobel Prize winner, and advocate of a program of social rather than natural selection through applied genetics.

Dr. Muller was interviewed by Canadian author and playwright Arthur Hailey on the first of a two-part *Close-Up* study of eugenics on Feb. 11 on CBC-TV.

According to Dr. Muller, the problem faced by eugenics (the science of selective mating for best genetic results) is not techniques but education and acceptance by the public of the principles of eugenics.


Such a program, argued Dr. Muller, is scientifically feasible and ethically desirable, even necessary.

Not so, say others, who will appear on the second program in the *Close-Up* report this Thursday. Interviewer Hailey will moderate a discussion by experts who will debate the ethical and social consequences of such a program.

The panel: Dr. Wendell Stanley of the University of California at Berkeley; Father Frank J. Ewing of Fordham University in New York City, and Frank R. Scott, Canadian lawyer, poet, author (*The Canadian Constitution and Human Rights*) and member of McGill University faculty of law.

Mr. Hailey has also filmed an interview with Dr. Thomas Anderson of the Cancer Research Institute in Philadelphia about the electron microscope, an important development in the study of eugenics. The electron microscope enables the examination of individual particles. It is capable of enlarging on a scale that would make a pinhead seem two miles wide.

Arthur Hailey made an important "first" on CBC-TV in 1956 when his play, *Flight Into Danger*,

was telecast. Since then *Flight Into Danger* has been made into a novel, a movie, and been translated into several languages.

Mr. Hailey is also the author of another novel, *The Final Diagnosis*.

Two Busy Pianists —Parks and Sim

THE many listeners who have phoned or written CBC to say how much they enjoy *Rhythm and Romance* Thursday mornings on radio can thank conductor Eric Wild.

It was Eric who got the two pianists who are featured on the program—Winnifred Sim and Mitch Parks — together. As musical director of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, he suggested that the two be used to play the accompaniments for one of the company's productions. Winnifred and Mitch realized that they "clicked" as a two-piano team, and began preparing a radio program. After only two "on-air auditions," they were given the present series.

Sharing the program with Winnifred and Mitch is vocalist Reg Gibson. Reg is well known to radio listeners and to viewers of television stations which carry certain Winnipeg programs (e.g. *Happyland*).

Youthful-looking Mitch Parks is actually one of Winnipeg's veteran broadcasters. He came to Winnipeg from his native Kamsack, Saskatchewan, as a teen-ager, and was soon playing two-piano numbers on radio with Bert Pearl in the latter's pre-*Happy Gang* days, 25 years ago. During the '40's Mitch was heard regularly with Percy Burdett in two-piano series on the CBC network. It is only with *Rhythm and Romance*

that he has returned to this particular field, but he has been one of Winnipeg's busiest musicians in the years between. He has been associated with practically every Winnipeg orchestra, including the Winnipeg Symphony, as either pianist or trumpeter. He was musical director on Winnipeg's first television series, *Cabaret*, in 1954, and he is currently busy as vocal coach and rehearsal pianist on the CBC-TV network program, *Stage Door*. And a new Wednesday morning radio series, *Guesting With Mitch*, is keeping him even busier developing new vocal talent.

Winnifred Sim is best known, perhaps, as one of Winnipeg's busiest accompanists. She is heard regularly on song recitals on CBC and during the Manitoba Musical Competition Festival has accompanied as many as 106 competitors during the two-week musical mara-

thon! Born in Winnipeg, Mrs. Sim has been organist and choirmaster at Sparling United Church for the past 14 years, and accompanist of the Winnipeg Ladies' Choir for the past 10 years. She also teaches piano, and somehow finds time to raise two pre-school children.

IN 1890 we find Elgar writing in a letter: "My Overture is finished and I do not think will be liked, but that must take its chance." The work in question was the Overture *Froissart* and it was Elgar's first orchestral success in the concert world. It was first given at the Three Choirs Festival and called forth quite friendly comments from most of the critics. Some of the observations were: "There is upon it, what surprises no one—the mark of youth and inexperience; but it shows that with further thought and study, Mr. Elgar will do good work" and, again, "*Froissart* was much applauded—the Prophet had honour even in his own country." Many years later, H. C. Colles, the famous critic of the times, wrote that, "it might almost be said that Elgar's whole output is a series of variations on one melody which is the essence of his being." Those who know Elgar's music well, will see the point of Colles' remark and there is more than a grain of truth in it.

Froissart is the least played of Elgar's three concert overtures,

Commission now studying architecture across Canada," said Frank Freedman, of the *Project '60* staff. "The Minister of Defence, Mr. Pearkes will speak and so will Mr. A. W. Trueman of the Canada Council. There'll be men connected with the National Safety League, with the Canadian Labour Congress and mayors of many communities from St. John's to Victoria. All these and more will give their views on *Canada-1980*."

The program will conclude with a discussion of the non-material side of Canada's growth. "Perhaps an artist, a writer and a minister—we have not yet decided who—will discuss what the future is likely to bring them," said Freedman.

When *Project '60* began on CBC Trans-Canada last October, Harry Boyle, who was in charge of the program, told *CBC Times*, "There never was a time when people thirsted for knowledge quite as much as they do now. and *Hidden Persuaders*, all of which were well received. Possibly most influential was *The Invisible Rain*, a 90-minute study of the perils of fall-out from The Bombs. Toronto *Telegram* critic gave a full column resume of the program because "it provided something to think about besides the price of beef and a Canadian flag." Pat Pearce of the *Montreal Star* said, "a wholly admirable and altogether absorbing radio documentary."

Not all were "problem programs." The Vincent Tovell conversation with Glenn Gould was so successful *Project '60* plans a repeat, while *My Son Dylan*, a conversation with the mother of Dylan Thomas, shortly before she died, "contained an emotional wallop because of its simplicity and sincerity," said Boyle.

On occasions, some of *Project '60's* fans have been critical of individual programs. For instance, some felt that experiments like the light-hearted *Balladeers* was out of place in a series which should be devoted to important and serious themes. But a nostalgic piece like *Laughter in the Air*, recorded in Hollywood with veterans of radio comedy, was generally accepted with delight—and rated a full page review in *Variety Annual*.

Boyle and his staff have many plans for the future *Project '60* programs. Planned, but still tentative, are investigations of Uganda and Israel, a trip around the world from London via Moscow, Hong Kong and Canada, an illustrated report on why people seek the cloistered life, a documentary on cattle drives in British Columbia, a musically illustrated conversation with Rodgers and Hammerstein, and an examination of the complacent state of the western world.

Cockaigne being of course by far the most popular, with *In the South* a moderate second. *Froissart* we seldom hear, but it is of enormous interest to students of Elgar,

as it contains every germ of the great works that were to come later on. At the head of the score is a quotation from Keats: "When chivalry lifted up her lance on high," and apparently the work was inspired by a reading of Scott's *Old Mortality*, in which there is a conversation concerning "the true chivalrous feeling of the great historian Froissart when he describes "the death of the gallant and high-bred Knight, of whom it was a pity to see the fall, such was his loyalty to his king, pure faith to his religion, hardihood towards his enemy and fidelity to his lady love." So you see Elgar had plenty of material to work on in tackling this subject. Much of it is, of course, immature and weak, but some of the themes are magnificent and the whole thing goes with great zest and abandon. We can hear it from Ottawa on Thursday afternoon.

At the same concert the *Tintagel* of Arnold Bax is being played. This is probably the most successful of Bax's orchestral works and has a clarity and feeling of directness which are often lacking in his symphonies. It would seem that Bax needed the stimulus of some external idea for his best work, because, next to *Tintagel*, we should put the *Garden of Fand* as his next most successful orchestral effort. Legendary subjects always had a fascination for him. Those listeners who know Tintagel Castle will agree that the composer has caught the atmosphere of this fascinating spot in an astonishing way. To stand on the cliffs looking over the ruins, while the great Atlantic rollers thunder in over the rocks, is a most dramatic experience never to be forgotten. Not only has Bax captured this surge of the ocean,

Hockey - - - Too Rough?

A three-city roundtable discussion on "Prairie Sports Final"

Prairie Sports Final (Saturdays) scores another first this week—an inter-city roundtable discussion on rough hockey.

Two popular western sports writers—Scotty Melville of the *Regina Leader Post* and Vince Leah

of the *Winnipeg Tribune*—have both suggested that minor hockey is becoming too rough, and that the blame might be laid on the National Hockey League, where it is alleged the game is allowed to be "too wide open."

Discussing rough play in hockey will be Melville in Regina, Leah in Winnipeg, and Trent Frayne and Punch Imlach in Toronto. (Frayne is *Sports Final's* regular eastern correspondent; Imlach is the coach and general manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs.)

Producer of the program is David Cruickshank of CBC *Outside Broadcasts*, who will also act as moderator from the Winnipeg studios.

Cruickshank says: "Through the use of special technical facilities, the CBC is able to present live roundtable discussions, linking widely separated parts of the country. This type of broadcast is new to sports programs; the first was on *Prairie Sports Final* this fall. Listener comment on similar broadcasts has been highly enthusiastic, and we expect that this week's subject and the participants will prove of special interest to those who enjoy our national game."

I remember hearing her in Mozart's *Idomeneo* at Glyndebourne some eight or nine years ago, when she was hardly known outside her native Sweden. It was quite obvious, even then, that this was going to be an extraordinary talent and so it has turned out. Great singers such as this stimulate revivals of great operas which would otherwise not be heard very often these days. The Met has been much criticized during recent years for its neglect of Wagner, but, as Mr. Bing so rightly says, "what is the good of giving Wagner if you can't get the voices to sing it"? The advent of Miss Nilsson has brought Wagner back into the repertory and the recent performances of *Tristan and Isolde* have certainly brought Wagner back into the limelight in that historic house.
