

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THE DEATH AROUND US

A play with a medical theme, written by a Canadian doctor, Sunday on "G.M. Presents"

THE SCENE is a hospital "somewhere in Canada." The dramatic personae are the doctors and nurse and patients, with the villain a deadly bacteria: Staphylococcus of group Pyogenes aureus, Type 75C. This is the first time this particular villain has appeared on TV or anywhere else because he is a completely new strain of bacteria.

On *G.M. Presents* this Sunday *The Death Around Us* tells the dramatic story of Type 75C, how patient and methodical detective work isolates and identifies the killer, then eliminates him. The play is written by a doctor, Arthur Murphy of Halifax; producer Leo Orenstein and set designer Edgar Krumins have consulted hospital authorities and seen around operating theatres; and a doctor well versed in operating room techniques will watch some of the rehearsals to ensure accuracy.

"This is a very dramatic story and we don't want it spoiled through blunders in background or techniques," said Orenstein.

The Death Around Us is based on a medical phenomenon which has occurred since the introduction of antibiotics. These "miracle" drugs are of course a major weapon in the medical armoury against disease. But their use brings its own problems. One is the growth of new strains of bacteria which are resistant to the known antibiotics and require new drugs to beat them.

The one way to short-circuit this circle of drugs leading to new bacteria leading to new drugs is by the methods known to medicine since Lister: antiseptic cleanliness.

"In what we are pleased to call aseptic surgery," says Dr. Rhodes, chief surgeon at the hospital, "with sterile instruments, gloves, linen,

everything we can properly sterilize, there are still pathological germs about, seeping through your mask, on the patients skin you cut, on the floor, on the walls, wafted free by every little air current.

"By all the thousand and one precautions we have learned since Lister first discovered antiseptic surgery we hold these bacteria to a number the average human body, even the sick body, can destroy . . . If a break occurs in our technique, if the bacterial count rises above that minimum, we have an infected patient."

In *The Death Around Us* such a break does occur right at a time when the new Staphylococcus is bred. Tension rises as Dr. Rhodes and his staff seek the source of the bacteria. Their only clue is the apparently irrelevant fact that all patients passing through the operating rooms are infected except those of three doctors.

Emerton Court, an English actor who recently made his entrance to Canadian television, plays Dr. Rhodes. But this is certainly not his first appearance in Canadian showbusiness. Mr. Court was a juvenile lead in a production in Vancouver in 1924. Last year he was in Vancouver again—after a 40,000 mile trip around the world—and played in a number of TV productions there.

Mr. Court has the distinction of once being directed by George Bernard Shaw. "That was in 1933," he recalls, "and the play was *On The Rocks*, which lasted only nine weeks in London. Lewis Casson was directing, but occasionally GBS would take over. When I asked him whom I should follow—him or Sir Lewis—he said, 'Listen to both of us, then do what you like, my boy. They all do.'"

In *The Death Around Us* George Luscombe plays Avery Gordon, a young surgeon; Alex McKee plays Stewart Gordon, Avery's father; Jo Fisher plays Miss Nugent, in charge of the operating room suite; E. M. Margolese plays Alex Dube, staff pathologist; and Larry Mann plays Frank Castel, head of administration.

The King Nobody Knew

Two one-hour programs on the late William Lyon Mackenzie King — March 10 and 17 on "Close-Up"

*"Never of the living, can the living judge
For too blind is the affection, or too fresh the
grudge."*

THESE WORDS of J. W. Dafoe, late editor of the Winnipeg Free Press, apply more accurately to Mackenzie King than to perhaps any other Canadian. No other was more misunderstood, more maligned, more unrevealed to his public than the man who was prime minister of Canada for 21 years, William Lyon Mackenzie King.

A decade has passed since his death, and this seemed to *Close-Up* a sufficient interval to have removed the blinkers from his worshippers and dulled the daggers of his critics. If a television biography was to be attempted, it would have to be done quickly. Most of King's early contemporaries were dead, and those who remained were dying off month by month.

To track down and interview King's intimates, I found myself in such unlikely spots as Shawnigan Lake, B.C.; Pembroke, Ont.; Annapolis, Maryland, and Devon, England.

My only personal recollection of Mackenzie King was a visit to the public gallery of the House of Commons when I was a schoolboy. The prime minister spoke, and I was terribly disappointed. I had never encountered so dull and uninspiring a personality.

Years later, as a parliamentary correspondent, I had occasion to dig into King's speeches and found my original impression confirmed.

You can imagine my surprise when our interview subjects gave us these very different descriptions of Mackenzie King:

Princess Cantacuzene of Washington, D.C., an intimate of King's for a span of 50 years: "He was a colourful and brilliant sort of personality. Scintillating is the word."

Mrs. McCurdy of Kingsmere, Ont.: "We used to have to go for the mail to the other side of the lake and quite often we'd meet him there and walk back and he would quote poetry to me."

But others who knew King well were not so favourable.

W. J. Coldwell, national leader of the CCF: "I think he was a lonely old man. He had no friends, had no intimates. He was too ruthless in his dealings with his colleagues."



AT THE UNITED NATIONS

Canada's wartime prime minister, the late William Lyon Mackenzie King, was a principal speaker at the first session of the United Nations in San Francisco in 1945.

John Stevenson, Ottawa correspondent during King's period for Manchester Guardian: "I regarded him as quite devoid of any political principles. I thought in some of his tactics and habits he belonged to one of the lower orders of the human race."

Walter Turnbull, former Postmaster General and private secretary to King: "I would say that almost every member of his cabinet at some time or other would either by cold treatment or by silent treatment or by direct criticism be made to feel that Mr. King was not exactly palsy-walsy with him."

Fred Gibson, Queen's University historian: "He really wanted and needed supreme power very badly."

Some of the most revealing comments on Mackenzie King came from the long-suffering staff who served him at any hour of the day or night. I was interested to note that although each of these fine people had critical comments, each was devoted to Mr. King and willing to make whatever personal

sacrifices are required. Here are random comments:

Miss Ada Scryer, secretary: "We had the longest hours under Mr. King of any of the five prime ministers whom I served. He was exceptionally hard on his staff, never thought of them personally."

Miss Florence Zavitske, private secretary: "He would never tolerate mistakes or erasures. A letter had to be perfect, like a picture in a frame."

Edward Handie, private secretary: "He was a most considerate employer. We were expected to contribute our best to the job, as he did. Nothing less would do."

Fred McGregor, private secretary: "He was niggardly, the son of a gun, and I don't forgive him that easily. But I liked him, and I think history will record that he was one of the great men of Canada."

So diverse, so contradictory were the comments that it was difficult sometimes to believe the contributors were talking about the same man. If King's intimates could disagree so violently, I wondered, what must have been the public impression of the prime minister? We decided to find out.

Cameraman Robert Crone set up his auricon on a busy street corner and we began asking questions. I

noticed some puzzled expressions as I mentioned Mackenzie King but the truth didn't dawn on me until Crone dropped his earphones and exclaimed "You know I think half of these people don't know who King was!"

So when the next customer hesitated, I asked him outright if he knew who I meant.

"Oh sure," he said.

"Who was he?" I countered.

"Well, uh, let me see. Uh, I can't just remember at the moment."

In the next couple of hours we found a good many more who could not identify the name of Mackenzie King, including one teenager who thought he was a TV star. Most of those who did know could not suggest a single thing he had accomplished during his 21 years as prime minister.

From a list of 60 Canadians who were employees, relatives, colleagues or intimates of King, we culled 30 names that looked most promising. Of these only three declined to talk to us. One was too sick. One was too old. And one, a former cook in the King household, refused for reasons she did not explain. I had been told she was bitter about her former employer and would describe the economies he inflicted on his household including the transfer to Kingsmere of leftovers from his government-victualled railroad car. She would not say.

There were other comments, though, on the parsimony which became an obsession with King in his later years. His friends did not easily forgive this quality in a man who died a millionaire. And even the most faithful employees tired of receiving framed photos of King for Christmas year after year.

In my researches I stumbled across an example of this which would have interested the Opposition during King's lifetime. Attached to a photograph of Mr. King with a figure skater was a memorandum headed Office of the Prime Minister which read: "Attached are the photographs the P.M. wanted. They are being charged to General Affairs."

The Publisher in Canada

*A special CBC Wednesday Night feature

SOMEONE once described books as a finer world within the world. It's a world in which some unfortunate souls never set foot (perhaps, like Oscar Levant, they feel that it would take their minds off themselves too much), but in which others are continuously and deliciously drunk on words. To create a place for themselves in this finer world, Canadian writers have had to hack through a forest of indifference, prejudice and scepticism, and now if one of them gets a book published in this country and it sells 6,000, he's doing well. Of course he can't live it up for long on his 10 per cent royalties, no matter what his friends think.

What's wrong? Is it the fault of the writers, publishers, booksellers or

Up developed an intense interest in the subject of their efforts. Film editor Helga Faust acquired such an affection for the late prime minister of her adopted country that she resented having to scissor some of the extended tributes of his admirers.

Allan King and Rolph Blakstad, who filmed two spiritualists King knew in London, England, were subjected to the psychic powers of one of them. She warned them not to be surprised if they saw the image of Mackenzie King lurking in the shadows when the film was telecast.

the public that publishing Canadian writing in Canada isn't making fortunes for anybody? CBC Wednesday Night intends to find out this week. Nathan Cohen, entertainment editor of the *Toronto Star* and a great reader of books, will interview authors, publishers and operators of successful book stores in Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver to learn how they feel about each other and the book business, how it has changed in the last 50 years, and its outlook for the future. Being a man who loves plain-speaking, Cohen will urge his guests not to pull their punches. He will give writers a chance to beef about publishers and vice versa, he will get booksellers into the act, and people in charge of book clubs and paperback reprints. Among those taking part are writers Hugh McLennan and Farley Mowat, publishers Jack McClelland of McClelland and Stewart, John Gray of Macmillans of Canada, Vic Knight of Reginald Saunders, managers of two Toronto bookstores: Don Quick of Tyrrell's Jack, Cole of Cole's and many others. Their comments will be limited to fiction and non-fiction. Program planner Bob McCormack says there will not be time to go into the ups and downs of the fields of text books, children's books or magazines. Production will be by Jim Murray.

Compared with Britain, where publishing firms reckon their ages in centuries (the Oxford University Press advertises itself as "Publishers of Fine Books for Nearly Five Centuries"), Canada's publishers are mere youths. The oldest of them is the Ryerson Press, which began in one room at the corner of Toronto's Queen and John Streets in 1829, and Toronto is still headquarters of the publishing business in this country, with some 35 houses centred there. British publishers began as booksellers, but in Canada it was the printers who were the first book-makers — we use the word advisedly because to embark on book publishing in the early days was a gamble with most of the odds against you. (And some publishers think the situation hasn't changed much, where Canadian books are concerned.) Until the middle of the 1800's the popu-

lation was too small and money too scarce for publishing to get a firm foot-hold in Canada. It was mostly scholarly and affluent men who had the cash, time and inclination to read extensively, and they imported their books from abroad. Added to this was the difficulty of communication, the inadequate education of the general public, and the fact that they were too busy pioneering to sit down with a book. Books were a luxury, and the few printers who indulged in publishing them less than a century ago usually had government contracts to cushion the blows of their losses.

By the turn of the century the increase in literacy and leisure time, and the great influx of British families created a wider reading public, and British publishers were quick to establish Canadian outlets for sales. Now 700 British and American publishers have agents in Canada, and since the Second Great War North American publishers have given the British some lively competition. During the war the few British books that rolled off the presses were unattractive looking because of austerity, and this gave North American publishers their opportunity to horn in on the home and school market, with slick, colourfully-jacketed books.

After the war Canadian publishing, which had begun to establish itself in a hotly competitive field, went into a slump. As the cost of materials and wages zoomed, fiction sales went down, and rivalry from luxury products was overwhelming. What could compete with nylons? Publishing a Canadian novel between 1948 and 1952 was an enormous risk few houses were prepared to take. Life-savers in the publishing world were textbooks, nonfiction and educational books, all of which faced a rising demand. Now things are looking up again, and Canada is turning out some attractive, well-made books that can hold their own in any market.

About 75 per cent of Canadian publishers own no presses—they farm out their work to job printers, but keep a firm hold on editorial supervision of the work. Cohen questions them about the progress of a book, from the time it arrives at the publishing house until it appears in the book stores, and about the economics of publishing in Canada in 1960. What is the best-seller in Canada and what did it sell? What is the *Canadian* best-seller? It might be interesting to make your own guesses and compare them with what Cohen discovers on

the rights of nations to claim waters have been contested and have been the cause of skirmishes and even wars. The issue was brought up recently by the United Kingdom claiming rights to fish in Iceland's territorial waters. At an International Conference on the Law of the Sea to be resumed in Geneva on March 17, this issue will again be brought up. The Soviet bloc is demanding a 12-mile territorial limit, the U.K. favors retention of the three-mile limit while the U.S. favors a six-mile limit with fishing rights extending to 12 miles.

Fighting Words

The regular theme is in two parts. The first part is the introduction to "Three Coins in the Fountain," played by the Melachrino Orchestra, and is available on Victor label LPM 1955. The second part is "Idol of Paris" by Spoliansky, and is available on Columbia Entree label RL 3029 in the U.S. only. These selections were chosen by Michael Sadlier, supervising producer of the series, at the beginning of the 1959 "General Motors Presents" series. They have been used on all the programs, except one, since then. The exception was "Love Story, 1910" on December 6, 1959, when the theme used was "Fantasia Romanica" by Renzo Rossellini.

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

LISTENING to *Fidelio* from the Metropolitan the other day, I was once more convinced that it is a great mistake to play the 3rd Leonore Overture after the dungeon scene, as was done on this occasion. This fashion was started by Mahler and many conductors have since adopted the idea, including Toscanini. The argument always is that this great composition is far too long and involved a piece with which to start the evening and that the opening duet of the opera is a sad anticlimax if the Overture is played at the beginning. But surely Beethoven wrote it to be played at the beginning and he never conceived it as being played anywhere else.

If it is played after the dungeon scene, what is the usual result? We have just been thrust to the depths of our being by one of the most exciting scenes in all dramatic literature and we are immediately plunged back into much of the music to which we have just been listening, so that not only is the impact of the dungeon scene immediately taken away, but the force of the famous Overture is

also lessened to a great extent. We hear much of Florestan's song once more and then some of the music of the dungeon scene including the two famous trumpet calls, which on being heard for the second time, become almost meaningless in the overture when played at this point.

If the 3rd Leonore Overture is too long and elaborate to be played at the beginning of the evening, then so are the overtures to *The Flying Dutchman* (Metropolitan, March 5) and *Tannhauser* (in the original version), but I have never heard performances of either of these operas where the overture was omitted or played later on. What then is the argument for playing the Leonore No. 3 towards the end of the opera? The whole

calculated effect of the sudden transition from the gloom of the dungeon to the bright sunlight of the prison yard, obviously carefully thought out by Beethoven, is completely destroyed. Probably this argument will never be settled satisfactorily, and it would be interesting to have readers' views on the subject.

I see that Sir Thomas Beecham is to conduct the Sibelius 7th Symphony on Sunday afternoon. Beecham became a champion of Sibelius just before the last war and gave a huge festival of his works in London at which many of the lesser known compositions were played. It is interesting to notice the harmonic similarity of the clos-

the program. What are Canadian tastes in fiction and non-fiction? How do they compare with the ones in the States and Britain? Booksellers have their say, and tell how they can forecast a book's future.

Cohen asks authors how they write, how they feel about Canadian opportunities, how they protect their rights, and how they work through agents. Some of the writers feel that Canadian publishers are really not interested in Canadian books because they don't make money. Others feel that their books are not given their fair share of publicity and promotion, either by publishers or booksellers.

The program also includes reports on publishing in the United States, Britain, Australia and the French language press in Canada. There will be news about the book clubs, and how the paperbacks are doing. We learned that a book that sells only 4,000 in hard covers may hit 100,000 in paperbacks! Cohen queries writers and publishers about how they are affected by sales to movies, TV and radio.

What can a really successful book do financially in Canada for its author, publisher and bookseller? What is the most all three can expect from a failure? Cohen gets answers to these questions, too.

For the public the rewards of reading have never been greater. Virginia Woolf summed them up neatly when she wrote: "I have sometimes dreamed that when the Day of Judgment dawns and the great conquerors and lawyers and statesmen come to receive their awards - their crowns, their laurels, their names carved indelibly upon imperishable marble—the Almighty will turn to Peter and will say, not without a certain envy when He sees us coming with our books under our arms: "Look, these need no reward. We have nothing to give them here. They have loved reading."

ing bars of this symphony to the *Valse Triste*, a composition so far removed in every way from the symphony that it takes one a little while to place the likeness when one hears it for the first time. It shows that the "fingerprints" of a great composer can turn up in the most unexpected places.

On Thursday afternoon the Ottawa Philharmonic plays a Suite from Hugo Wolf's only opera *Der Corregidor*. For those readers who love the songs of this composer (and I hope that includes everybody), this will be an interesting thing to which to listen. On the stage, *Corregidor* may be a failure, but it is a glorious failure and it can certainly take its place among the most beautiful operas ever written. The story is the same as that used by de Falla in his ballet, *The Three-Cornered Hat*, and actually two of Wolf's most famous songs appear in the opera. These are *In dem Schatten meiner Locken* and *Herz, versage nicht geschwind*. *Corregidor* still has occasional performances in Europe (I remember Sir John Barbirolli conducting a splendid one in London some twenty years ago) and there was also a fine one under Bruno Walter at Salzburg Festival some years ago, but it seems to have dropped out of the repertory of the great opera houses.

Claramae Turner
On CBC Radio

American contralto Claramae Turner, described as "a rare artist of voluptuous voice and stunning presence" will be heard in this week's CBC Wednesday Night's Celebrity Concert. She has sung 75 roles with the Metropolitan, the San Francisco, and the Chicago Lyric Operas, has appeared on Broadway and in the film version of *Carousel*. Gian-Carlo Menotti chose her to create the role of Madame Flora, an unkempt hag

obsessed with evil, in *The Medium*, which she did with hair-raising success.

Born in Southern California and brought up in Eureka on the Northern California coast, Miss Turner began her career in the chorus of the San Francisco Opera and she advises aspiring singers not to turn up their noses at small starts. "The small start is the best thing that can happen to you," she says. "It serves as a challenge, allows room to grow as it offers unhurried opportunities to gain the background of solid, varied experience without which no professional career can stand secure."

After her sixth year with the San Francisco Opera, her first in solo parts, she tackled New York. "I was still a beginner," she recalls, "but my series of small starts had given me skills I could not possibly have had otherwise. I felt secure singing before an audience; I could work alone or with others; I had a large repertory of songs and styles and languages; I could handle myself on a stage. Though I still had to prove myself, I felt more professional than if I'd sat around a vocal studio waiting for the big break."

Since her appearance in *The Medium* Miss Turner has piled success on success in opera, concert hall, Broadway and the movies.

working in both popular and classical fields. The same man who wrote the ballet *Postscript* (now in the repertoire of the National Ballet) for the Montreal Theatre Ballet also arranges and conducts the jazz heard on the *CBC Variety Hour* alternate Friday afternoons on CBC radio.



Art Morrow

Art moves not only in classical and popular, but also in French and English, musical circles in Montreal. His other current assignment, in addition to the English network's *Variety Hour*, is arranging and conducting for the French television network series *G.M. Vous Invite* (seen in Winnipeg as *Radio-Canada Vous Invite*). He uses the same group of 21 musicians formed in 1958 for the radio series *Meet Mr. Morrow*, on both shows. On the *Variety Hour* the band concentrates on varied renditions of its favourite form of expression—jazz. Each program features small instrumental groups, taken from the band, and vocalists. (See page 30 for details on this week's show). On TV the band demonstrates its versatility by handling a wide range of musical chores, from light concert music to accompaniments for animal acts.

Music has enthralled Art since he first discovered the piano, but apart from a few lessons on that instrument, he is completely self-taught. By the age of 12 he had taught himself to play piano, ukelele, harmonica, guitar and banjo. Xylophone and accordion came next, and by the time he was playing in Johnny Holmes' orchestra he was concentrating on saxophone and clarinet, doubling on flute, trumpet and trombone. Last year a photographer caught him peering out from behind a tuba!

During the war Art joined the army as a bandsman, but he was soon transferred overseas as orchestra leader for the Tin Hats Revue. "It was then that I learned

about big-scale showbusiness, especially timing," says Art.

When he returned home to Montreal, Art was immediately engaged as an arranger by many leading conductors. His first job as a radio conductor was on the English network show, *Sunshine Society*. Many other series followed. In 1955 he made his French TV debut as a musical director, and the next year he was appointed conductor-arranger on *Music-Hall*, the popular variety show which regularly outstrips the Ed Sullivan Show in Montreal TV ratings.

Last spring the Art Morrow Orchestra made a very successful appearance at the Montreal Forum to help launch the local Place des Arts campaign for a concert hall. This was the only jazz contribution to a program that was almost entirely classical, and the critics made special mention of the precision and enthusiasm of Morrow's organization. Art believes that jazz is gaining increasing recognition as a musical art form in its own right.

He also believes that Montreal jazzmen are losing the inferiority complex they once had in spite of the fact that their city was the training ground in the '40's for such jazz giants as Oscar Peterson and Maynard Ferguson.

Art commutes to Montreal from his home in nearby Dorval, where he lives with his wife, Denyse, and their three sons.—*Bob Warner*.
