Agricultural Charm — or Civilized Primitivism?

Chester Duncan takes a look at Country Music programs on CBC-TV (Originally broadcast on "Critically Speaking")

BEING a Western boy myself, and very musical, I've always been mystified as to why Western Music (country style) isn't more attractive to me. As a matter of fact, for a long time Western Music seemed to me to be the second worst type of music, the worst being Hawaiian music.

Thank goodness there doesn't seem to be a Hawaiian program countenanced by the CBC*. Western or Country Music, however, is quite generously acknowledged, and its purpose is plain: to play wholesomely on folk possibilities, or the illusion of them, and persuade us all to be boys again.

The question for me is whether country hoedowns in broadcasting are indeed genuine folk, and not just some sentimental or commercial nonsense which we can all play at, even those of us who evidently never were boys—or never knew country matters. One is struck, for example, by the fact that so much Western Music is fed to the networks by those who are clearly and strenuously Eastern.

There are two television network programs which are nourished by this artificial fountain of ever-

lasting youth and enthusiasm: *Country Hoedown* on Fridays and *Don Messer's Jubilee* on Mondays. *Don Messer's Jubilee* is probably the more unusual and authentic since around it hovers the genuine spirit of amateurism. I can't think of any musicians or singers today in television who look less like professionals—and there's a certain advantage in that: They present an entertainment from an era before electricity in guitars. The musicians are not in costume; they allow themselves a little something in period ties, but the rest of the clothing is just their badly-fitting Monday best, and they just stand around and play, not even smiling much, which, after the dental displays on all other musicals, is quite a relief.

The playing on *Don Messer's Jubilee* I think would never be described as slick, and sometimes it's simple and clumsy in a comforting

kind of way. After the dazzling spectacles, on other programs, of perpetually smiling robots on accordions, guitars, or pianos, it's a satisfying thing to see the back of a robust pianist with just an ordinary haircut. There are square dancers on Don Messer's program, but of a quality specially designed not to make any common-or-garden square dancers among the viewers jealous, or irritated at what is often a glamorous falsification of the sport. These dancers are modest, unsophisticated, and pleasantly old-fashioned.

And speaking of charming quaintness, one cannot but be intrigued by the wholly unexpected appearance and attitude of the solo singers. There is here absolutely no attempt made to conceal the physical proportions or nice homeliness of the stars, or to take the rough edges off character by makeup. Marg Osburne sings the awful old ballads with touching sincerity and she has a ravishing smile, though her constant crinkled merriment is

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

YOUR TV ANTENNA

Several readers have written CBC Times, requesting advice on how to attain better television reception by improving their antenna systems. The following discussion of the subject has been prepared by a CBC engineer

1. Purpose

The function of the antenna is to present a receiver with one of the thousands of signals that are in the air, and to do this in the most efficient manner.

Thus it follows that perhaps an antenna should be "tuned" not only to certain stations (in much the same way as a receiver is tuned), but also made to concentrate on signals from specific directions. In fringe areas where the signal is weak it would seem desirable if the antenna could also "boost" or amplify the available signal.

2. Location

Wavelength is a very important factor in the transmission of signals by radio or television stations. This determines largely how the atmosphere, the earth, and the moisture present in both may affect transmission and reception. At broadcast radio frequencies part of the signal passes through the earth, and part through space relatively close to the earth. As frequencies go up to the television range and beyond, the waves take on more and more of the properties of light, gradually confining all transmission to that through space only. As this happens it becomes increasingly desirable to obtain line-of-sight between transmitter and receiver antennas. The earth's atmosphere will bend these waves a considerable amount to allow good reception somewhat beyond the horizon, but the higher a receiving antenna is placed, the better the signal strength obtainable (see Figure 1).

It is usually true that a building made of a dry, non-conducting material such as seasoned lumber, is transparent to radio and television signals, but lakes, rivers, trees, and

metal objects such as fences and power lines can all provide reflected signals which may affect reception. These reflections can sometimes be the entire source of signal to the antenna, but usually their presence, together with the normal signal, results in a loss of signal strength or causes a "ghost" on a TV receiver. Often both effects are experienced.

Because of such considerations, a good deal of both judgment and trial and error are involved in choosing the final location of an antenna. Having some appreciation of what happens, or can happen, to the signal before it reaches the antenna, let us reconsider the antenna itself and decide how best to make it work most efficiently.

In strong signal areas of both radio and television stations a great deal of signal can be wasted without too many defects showing up in reception. In areas where the signal is weaker, however, care must be taken to use every bit of it to advantage. But even in places near powerful radio and television stations, outdoor antennas are sometimes necessary for good reception because of the added noise caused by our increasing use of electrical appliances.

Without doubt, the most important aspect of any antenna is its location. During the initial installation, several possible places should be tried. Keeping in mind the practical and economic factors involved, an attempt should be made to achieve (a) a minimum amount of "ghost" images, and (b) the blackest "blacks" possible in the picture (indicating maximum signal). Almost any antenna which will provide a useable signal may be used for conducting this test.

3. Type of Antenna

After having found the best location for the antenna, the next step is to choose the best antenna for the job to be done. Usually, but not always, the best type of antenna will turn out to be the most expensive one. Every location and installation presents its own peculiar problems, and what may work well in one case may not work best in another.

The usual type of outdoor antenna is a Yagi (see Figure 2), named after its inventor. It usually takes the shape of a centre pole with horizontal bars, or "elements" fastened to it at right angles. One or more of these elements is "driven" and supplies the signal to the receiver. The other elements of the antenna serve to direct the signal to the "driver" element(s). The net effect of this arrangement is not only to provide a directional effect, but also to "boost" or amplify the signal that exists in space so that the receiver will be presented with a signal perhaps two or three times as strong as the "space signal."

This type of antenna must be pointed in the direction of maximum signal; its inherent design is such that it is "tuned" to a particular television channel; and it provides amplification. Thus it would seem to satisfy the requirements stated earlier.

The Yagi antenna does have its faults, though, and one of the most important of these is that after some period of use the antenna itself can generate noise, and this can progressively degrade the picture quality. If this is to be avoided, the centre of every element must make good electrical contact with the centre rod, and the centre rod must make good electrical contact with the earth. (This is required not only for proper functioning of

the elements, but also to provide a "drain" for static charges that build up with wind and precipitation that and to afford protection against lightning. *At the time of installation all contact points should be coated with a protective spray of paint or clear plastic to slow down the corrosion of these contact surfaces.*

Another disadvantage of the Yagi antenna is its extreme sensitivity to any conducting or reflecting material that may be located at the sides of it. Wire lath on a stucco house, foil insulation, wires, and trees all have a pronounced effect on its performance. These factors disturb both the directivity and the gain of this antenna and are usually the source of "ghosts" which appear in the picture.

How many elements must an antenna have? A qualified serviceman is perhaps the best person to decide this, in view of the many factors which must be taken into consideration. As a rough rule-of-thumb, however, in a primary or Class A service area of a station "rabbit ears" (a one-element antenna) or a two-element antenna is usually all that is required. In a secondary or Class B area, usually from two to five elements are called for. In a "fringe" area five- to ten-element antennas are required, sometimes with several antennas "stacked" and connected together. (The "stacking" of antennas to

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



"Mind you," said Charles, trying to be fair, "Rod can be a bit of a

CBC Trans-Canada listeners hear *Children's Magazine* on Sundays—at noon in Manitoba, 11 a.m. in Saskatchewan and Alberta. The two segments done by Rod and Charles typify the blend of fact and fancy pervading the whole hour-long program.

About the sketches involving science and fantasy, Rod says: "We can't really explain much in 15 minutes, so we like to take one central idea and wrap it up in a simple but humorous package."



About the animal sketches, Charles says: "Animal portraits like this must have an element of mysticism. I think children respond to the mystical note."

As for the actualities, "we like to go places where a child would like to go but can't—mainly because he is a child," said Rod.

Rod and Charles first collaborated on *The Saturday Show* last year. Their method of writing is to


get together with ideas, discuss them, divide them up fifty-fifty, and then each go separately and write his share. A natural sympathy results in sketches whose individual authorship even their friends cannot guess.

Both men have the elusive knack of writing for children without talking down to them. "We don't pretend we are children because actually we are 80 years old," said Rod. "Sometimes we are accused of being too adult, but children are more intelligent than many people give them credit for."

"Do you mind if I read you something from a book called *The Sword and the Stone*?" asked Charles, settling back anyway and reading:

"The Wart did not know what Merlyn was talking about but he liked him to talk anyway," read Charles. "He did not like grown-ups who talked down to him like a baby, but the ones who just went on talking in their usual way, leaving him to leap along in their wake, jumping at meanings, guessing,

While *CBC Times* hasn't the courage to back or refute this statement, Margaret Pope has. She is a tall, slender blonde with blue eyes who is making a career out of consumer research. She maintains that women are far from gullible about buying, and they're getting sharper every day. Rich or poor, they want the most for their money, and they are prepared to shop around until they find it—unless, of course, they discover a short-cut to satisfaction, and that's where Mrs. Pope comes in.

Instead of sampling all the gourmet coffees and ending up with a deflated food budget and half-

packages of several unsatisfactory brands, or listening to sales talk and getting stuck with a steam iron that does not live up to its advertising claims, housewives are in-

vited to take four minutes off each weekday to hear Margaret Pope's report on what's new and worthwhile on the market. She started February 1 on CBC radio's *For Consumers*, keeping listeners posted on the good and bad points of new household appliances, textiles, food, child and beauty care, safety, nutrition.

Mrs. Pope is no stranger to daytime listeners. For four years she has been a regular panelist in the *Trans-Canada Matinee* quiz on Tuesdays, in which, she says, "I have to answer all the questions from listeners which the other panelists don't. Reading the dozens of letters that come in from across the country asking for advice on this and that has given me a pretty broad picture of what the Canadian householder wants to know about, and I'm using this knowledge as a yardstick in planning my consumer reports."

A graduate in household economics of the University of Toronto, Mrs. Pope served as a tactical training officer in the Royal Canadian Navy in the late war years and then married and devoted herself to raising a family (Peter, 13, and Peggy, 11). She maintained a lively interest in consumer reports and theories and practices in household science, and recently decided to go back to college for further study. She has just completed work on her Master's

Degree in nutrition, which involved special studies in a Toronto obesity clinic, and gave her "tremendous insight into human nature."

We were curious to know how she collects her consumer information. "When I get an idea for a program," she told us, "I write the manufacturer of the product or products I want to discuss, and check their comments with the University, the federal and provincial information centres, or Departments of Health and Welfare. And the research labs of the big food, drug and textile companies offer me their latest technical papers. Of course I experiment myself with as many products as I can, and check with all my friends and acquaintances to see how satisfactory they find them."

"The only difficulty with my new job," she says, "is the fact that I mustn't mention products by brand name — just by types. When I'm talking to a chemist I can easily differentiate between a heavy-duty detergent and other kinds in scientific language, but the layman, of course, would be all at sea if I tried that, so I have to find roundabout but easily understood ways of identifying various types of products. My whole aim is to get across factual information, to make the consumer aware of manufacturing and marketing problems and improvements, and to help her to get the most for her money."

clutching at known words, and chuckling at complicated jokes as they suddenly dawned. He had the glee of a porpoise, then, pouring and leaping through the strange seas."

Charles stopped reading. "That's my ideal of writing for children," he said.

Charles Winters was born and bred in Toronto. He has taught school, taught "creative dramatics" — "I'm still not quite sure what they are," and while with the Toronto Children Players he acted, sang, and wrote plays and songs both

lyrics and music. Children's programs are his first love: "There is nothing more rewarding than working with children," he said.

Charles has no difficulty getting ideas for *Children's Magazine*. "A walk down the street is enough," he said. Still, he keeps files of



stories, paragraphs, even just a new word, ripped from newspapers and magazines.

We looked inside a file of clippings marked for possible use: there were articles entitled St. Patrick and the Myths ("There never were any snakes in Ireland"). How the Eyeball Works ("We'd like to get inside an eyeball, if we can devise a technique"—nothing is too grizzly for Rod and Charles), on the Abominable Snowman ("We hope to get another CBC first before Sir Edmund Hillary beat us — getting to be a nuisance that chap, meet him everywhere"). Hot Rod Terms for Teenage Girls ("Now how on earth can we make use of that one?"), The Right School for the Right Dog, Myths about the Moon, and many others.

The other intrepid explorer, Rod Coneybeare, was born in Belleville, Ont., and educated in Toronto. He left school at 16 to be an announcer, and while working at the radio station in Guelph wrote some plays.

"We put them on air," said Rod. "But the budget was limited and I had to play several roles. That's where I started collecting my different voices."

Some years later Rod wrote a series of scripts for CBC radio called *Out of this World*. Again he played several roles; in fact, he played all the roles. And now on *Children's Magazine* he is yet again the man of many voices.

"We don't mind telling the children I have to play several roles because we haven't enough budget to hire more . . ." Rod broke off, then added thoughtfully, "Now why do you think the programs I'm in never have enough money?"

We hurried on to the next question.

"I've never written for children before," he said. In fact, his last radio series *Man to Man* was NOT for children. "I manipulate the puppets Rusty the Rooster and Jerome the Giraffe on *The Friendly Giant* on CBC-TV. I speak for them too. It's the many voices again. I wish I got *paid* for every role."

We mentioned the Income Tax and he dropped the subject.

"We think of our listeners in the ten to fourteen age group," Rod went on. But it is a fact that most of their mail comes from adults. "We haven't had a letter telling us to get off the air yet. I think people like the program because it's brash and breezy."

Recently Rod and Charles got together and planned 20 sketches and six interviews for the 13 spring programs.

"We want to build a road," said Charles. "You know, ride all the earth moving machines and so on. And soon we're going to the top of a Toronto 12-storey building which is being pulled down."

Other programs will include: Why People Speak, How Soap Gets Us Clean, A Trip Through a Telephone, How a Cat Purrs, Oddballs and How They Got That Way ("This is definitely not autobiographical"), How a Worm Gets Into an Apple ("They *don't* just bore in"), and What Are Rocks?

During the past months Rod and Charles have been to many strange places. But a letter from one of their young fans leaves them puzzled:

"Dear Mr. Winter, I am writing to tell you how much I like *Children's Magazine*. I listen to it every Sunday, rain or shine, in the queerest places. I think one of the queerest places was a ditch . . ."

Charles looked worried. "I wish he had explained," he said wistfully.



with four of the six teams in the National League, missing only Montreal and Detroit, but is having his most successful season with this year's youthful Toronto club.

In seventy games last year Stanley scored only one goal, whereas by the sixtieth game of this year, he had found the net eleven times. This total made him the highest scoring defenceman in the entire League and earned him second team status on the first-half All-Star team.

Stanley's professional career began at Providence in 1946. In 1948 he was brought up to the New York Rangers and played for that club until 1952-53, when he was demoted to Vancouver. Never a favourite with the Ranger fans (they called him a figure skater), he was traded to Chicago in 1954-55 and had one of the best seasons, scoring ten goals. Two years later, he went to Boston and after another two years was traded to Toronto in 1958-59 for Jim Morrison. Still not over-rugged, Stanley's steady play balances a Toronto defence which also features such tough young competitors as Bobby Baun and Carl Brewer.

"Jealousy"

A play by SACHA GUITRY,
Sunday on CBC Stage

FOR half a century Sacha Guitry typified the Gallic "great lover" — sophisticated, charming, nonchalant, hungry-eyed, theatrical. From the time he was 16 until he died in 1957 at 72 he wrote 115 plays and 29 movie scenarios, most of them with himself in mind for the fat parts, and all of them about love, for, like most Gauls, he was an authority on the subject. He once said that "the test of an actor is whether he can make every woman in the audience fall in love with him." Guitry succeeded by just being himself on the stage, and women by the score swooned at the sound of his boudoir voice. He married five of them, all actresses. Four of his marriages ended in divorce, but the fifth, at 64 to a woman 38 years his junior, was happy.

One of the most amusing — and revealing — of his plays is *Jealousy*, with its gently witty and sardonic dialogue. Toronto actor-writer Ivor Barry has translated and adapted it for this Sunday night's *CBC Stage* production on radio.

It concerns the guilty habit some people have of accusing others of their own shortcomings — in this case, infidelity. But nothing is

more irritating than being accused of something it never occurred to you to do, and the young wife in *Jealousy* is righteously indignant. Her husband, Albert, fresh from the arms of his mistress, is so consumed with guilt that he imagines his wife is having an affair with a novelist, a smoothie who is too fond of other men's wives to consider marriage himself.

Guitry, master of the comedy of manners, saves each of his characters from brittleness by giving them very human little failings. Albert would be stuffy if it were not for the fact that the poor man has varicose veins and yearns for a French medal — but someone at the Ministry is against him, he fears. L'amour triumphs, but we won't tell you who has the last laugh.

Guitry was not only author and actor, but producer and theatre manager as well in his 67-year stage and film career. Sacha was not his real name, of course. But with a mundane handle like Alexandre Pierre Georges Guitry he can't be blamed for adopting something a little more theatrical. He was born in St. Petersburg (now Leningrad), where his father, the noted French actor Lucien Guitry, was appearing on contract to Russia's imperial theatres. At the age of five young Sacha made his stage debut before the Czar in a pantomime written by his father and Russian actor Davidoff. He spent his summers in France, his winters in Russia, and said he finished his education without having ever begun it, for he attended at least 12 schools, an irrepressible lad with greasepaint in his veins.

At 16 his first play, a one-acter called *Le Page*, was turned into an opera bouffe with favourable reviews. He continued acting and in 1905, at 20, he wrote his first big success, a comedy titled *Nono*. For many years Guitry wrote popular plays with roles for himself, his first wife, Yvonne Printemps, and his father, and the three Guitrys were the rage of Paris. Their partnership ended with the elder Guitry's death in 1925. Sacha Guitry continued to write and act

form an array is done mainly to increase the directional characteristics of the antenna system. This increased directivity improves the gain of the system slightly, but it is not doubled, as might be thought).

A close relative of the Yagi antenna is the All-Channel antenna. This usually looks like a combination of elements of different shapes and sizes which appear to have been fastened together almost at random. The performance of this type of antenna is generally poorer than that obtained from a comparable antenna designed for use on one specific channel. It is useful in Class A or B signal areas, but it is not suitable for fringe area reception.

It should be noted that while the Yagi type of antenna seems to be the most popular, it is by no means the only one suitable for TV reception. There are several other types which because of their cost and size are seldom used.

A feeling has grown up that because radio stations can be picked up easily with little or no antenna, that the antenna is therefore of secondary importance. Actually, the antenna is the only means of providing a signal to a receiver, and in fringe areas a good antenna is really as important as a good receiver.

It should always be remembered, however, that the antenna system (including the special wire connecting it to the receiver) is but one link in the chain bringing programs to your living room. A radio or television station does its utmost to provide as much signal to as large an area as possible, but from this point on it is up to the antenna, the receiver, and the whims of Mother Nature to determine what your reception quality will be. — *R. R. Dutka.*

in hit plays, musicals and then films that were popular for their sparkling dialogue and wit—sound—ing simple but cleverly timed.

Having conquered the Continent he spread his charm over Britain and the United States, and not always as the romantic boulevardier and humourist. Occasionally he sounded a serious note, as in *Pasteur*, a play about the French scientist, which many critics feel is his crowning achievement. He was a hasty perfectionist. People who watched him work as actor and director were amazed at the way he could combine speed — he always seemed to be racing against

time—with almost finicky attention to small details.

After the Second World War Guitry was arrested, accused of sympathizing with the enemy during the occupation of France, was imprisoned for two months, and then cleared of all charges against him. He described his experiences during and after the war with humour and bitterness in two books: *Four Years of Occupation* and *Sixty Days in Prison*. Until he was 70 his years hung lightly on his elegantly clad shoulders, and he continued to be one of France's most colourful showbusiness personalities — vital, original, still romantic.

The last film he directed was *Lovers and Thieves* in the spring

of 1957, a few weeks before he died at 72. He felt that "to abandon your play to another actor was like giving your child to an orphanage," but he was so weak from neuritis and paralysis that he was forced to give his last acting plum to another. He insisted on directing, wrapped in a red plaid blanket in a wheelchair. One admirer recalls him as thin and wasted but — incredibly — looking more alive than anyone else on the set. Before shooting began he called the cast together and said: "You have heard that I am dying. Well, it's true. All the more reason to keep laughing while one still can, eh?" And despite his suffering he was his old witty self through the four-week production. When it was over he sat huddled in his chair for a few minutes, eyes closed, grey-faced. Then he slowly raised his head, adjusted his black fedora jauntily, and said: "Well done, children. And now, if you will excuse me, I'm late for an assignment." A short time after he died in his art-filled home on the Paris Left Bank, near the Eiffel Tower. Just before his final curtain he murmured: "I must not miss my cue."

Sacha Guitry's prime purpose in his plays and films was to amuse. While other writers pondered and sweated in their efforts to get a message across, Guitry set his audience laughing at themselves. One of the secrets of his success is the fact that he could take a slight situation and mould it into a sharply-defined vignette of life in which each of his audience saw himself mirrored. While he did not invent love, he certainly showed that it can move mountains, and that it is undoubtedly here to stay.

* * *

Science is indeed a remarkable and productive way of thinking. Since the man who contributes to scientific knowledge today does so by standing on the shoulders of his scientific predecessor of yesterday there is some excuse for the assertion that only in science has progress any definite meaning. Just the same, although a scientist may accumulate knowledge, wisdom is as difficult for him to acquire as for anyone else. — *Magnus Pyke, F.R.S.E., on BBC.*

Wilkinson's reminiscences of his many years in the Arctic are illustrated by some fascinating film slides and photographs, highlights include film of the birth of an Eskimo baby in an igloo; Eskimos setting out and hunting Narwhal Whales—an exciting change in their lives, usually occupied by the day-to-day grind of hunting seals for food. The illustrations answer some of the questions put to Wilkinson—why do men go north, what draws them to the bleak and lonely land? Wilkinson has dedicated the past 15

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

THIS is an amazingly varied week and, glancing through the programs, one is reminded once again of the astonishing amount of good music that can be heard in one week on the CBC.

Hungarian composers are very much to the fore and Kodaly, Bartok and Kadosa can all be heard at various times. The Kodaly work is the set of variations he wrote on the Hungarian folk song *The Peacock* and dates from 1939. The work was commissioned for the fiftieth anniversary of the Concertgebouw Orchestra in Amsterdam and has remained in the repertoire of most orchestras ever since. In this work Kodaly was able to solve one of the old problems of Hungarian music—i.e. the blending of the national style with western techniques. The tune on which the Variations are based is a Magyar folk song having a very oriental tinge to it. The whole work is one of the finest orchestral pieces of our time. It will be heard on the New York Philharmonic broadcast of March 19.

Of Bartok it is scarcely necessary to write, so famous is his name in the musical world, but it is interesting to note how the two great Hungarians, while working simultaneously, evolved very definite individualistic styles both based very securely on the folk music of their country. The same New York Philharmonic broadcast will feature the suite from his opera *The Miraculous Mandarin*, and that of the following week (March 26) features Rudolph Serkin in a performance of his Piano Concerto No. 1.

The third Hungarian composer, Pal Kadosa, has not become nearly so well known outside his own country and he is a considerably younger man than the other two

and has been much influenced by both of them. He was for many years a piano professor at the Fodor School in Budapest and he was the founder of a group of young progressive musicians known as the Modern Magyar Music Society, which was eventually incorporated into the Union for New Hungarian Music founded in 1911 by Bartok and Kodaly. Kadosa became the general secretary of the organization. Kadosa's work is also very much influenced by Hungarian folk music, but, as in the case of his two senior compatriots, he has managed to evolve an individual

style while using the folk music as his background. Kadosa's Quintet for Wind Instruments, Op. 49A, will be played by the CBC Woodwind Ensemble Sunday afternoon on CBK and CBX, Tuesday night on CBW.

On Friday evening we can hear the 3rd Symphony of Walter Piston at the CBC Symphony concert. Piston is of Italian descent, his grandfather being Antonio Pistone who settled in Maine during the nineteenth century. Probably as to seem more American, the final "e" was dropped from the family name

The Contemplative Life

A 60-minute exploration of the realm of silence in the modern world

THE life of the contemplative is one of hardship and sacrifice which are made as nothing by serenity and joy.

During this season of Lent, CBC radio's *Project '60* (Tuesday night) will present a special program dedicated to the contemplative way of life. This hour-long study of a world within a world is in two parts.

First, *Project '60* goes to two contemplative orders in Canada: the Benedictine monks of St. Benoit du Lac, Quebec, and the Anglican Sisters of St. John the Divine in Toronto.

"We dwell on the 'why?' of the contemplative life rather than the 'how?'," said producer Rupert Caplan, a frequent retreatant at the Benedictine monastery. "Our purpose is to explore the realm of Silence in a modern world where cacophony is accepted and hyperactivity encouraged."

The Contemplative Life explains both ways of life: the completely

enclosed life led by such orders as the Carmelites, and the mixed way of life where contemplation leads to works of mercy.

The need to live away from the world, at least temporarily, is felt by many, and a Montreal businessman, Murray Ballantyne, tells why he goes on retreats. A young Toronto man discusses why he left the monastery after a year-and-a-half there, and how he is adjusting to his life in the world again. And Montreal actress Margaret Cunningham recalls the time when her daughter left home to enter a convent.

Part 2 of *The Contemplative Life* is an outstanding documentary: *Seclusion* by Sergio Zavoli, a program giving a reproduction in English of the Italian documentary *Clausura*. This documentary won the *Italia Prize* in 1958.

The original program, *Clausura*, consisted of recordings made in a Carmelite convent of ceremonies

and interviews with nuns, and gave a vivid picture of the day-to-day life of an enclosed community:

"After many years of life here in the convent our spirits are very simplified" . . . "The greatest difficulty is that of obedience. Young persons today have stronger personalities and they do not have as much discipline as they had some time ago."

This production in English, made by the BBC, has the famous British actress Flora Robson speaking as Mother Sub-prioress, and Hugh Burden as the reporter. Producer Christopher Sykes has retained all the original sound effects.

The members of the cast aimed, by a minute study of the Italian recording, to reproduce in detail not only the matter but the expression and mood of the original. They succeeded so well they achieved "not so much perfect mimicry as a complete emotional identification with their parts," wrote critic David Paul.

Seclusion gives the hearer the astonishing experience and privilege of entering for a short time behind the walls of a convent and learning a little about the hardship, sacrifice, serenity and joy in the life of an enclosed nun.

"The Children's Crusade"

A "musical legend" by GABRIEL PIERNE, performed by children's choirs, the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, The Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and soloists

IT WAS one of the strangest, most tragic events in history. Just imagine 50,000 children of assorted ages, conditions and backgrounds, setting out from the cities and villages of Europe for the Holy Land, to recover Jerusalem from the Turks in the name of the Cross. The year was 1212, between the Fourth and Fifth Crusades, during the pontificate of the great Innocent III. "The very children put us to shame," he wrote. "While we sleep they go forth gladly to conquer the Holy Land." It is amazing that no one stopped them. But their Crusade began in a small way which some adults could not take seriously, and by the time it had swelled to its staggering size, those who might have prevented its tragic consequences probably felt that childish innocence might succeed where force had hailed.

It began when Etienne, a French shepherd boy, part fanatic, part dreamer, gathered a group of children around him, declared that he had a divine mission, and would lead his followers dry-shod through the seas to Jerusalem. His flashing eyes and fervent promises induced thousands of children to follow him. With only vague plans they set out, Etienne riding on a wagon at the head of his unarmed army. Carrying makeshift crosses and singing hymns they tramped across France, crying: "Lord Jesus, restore to us the Holy Cross." As they wound their way through the sleepy villages boys and girls stole from their houses to join them —

"no bolts, no bars, no fear of fathers or love of mothers could hold them back."

Their numbers gradually swelling to 30,000, the boys and girls straggled towards the port of Marseille, hoping to cross over to Jerusalem on the dry bed of the sea. At Marseille Etienne evidently thought better of his promises about walking across the water, and arranged for his army to embark in seven vessels. After two days at sea an overwhelming storm blew up and off St. Peter's Isle two of the ships went down with all on board. The remaining five reached Alexandria and Algiers, where the children were kidnapped by slave-dealers and sold into Egypt.

Meanwhile, in Cologne, a German child called Nicolas gathered together about 20,000 children with similar promises, and led them off to Italy. It was a harrowing trip. Many of them died from fatigue and heat, disease and starvation. Only a quarter of them reached Genoa. There the citizens, alarmed by the throngs of hollow-eyed, staggering children who had invaded their town, ordered them to leave. Some wound their way home, and others found service in Italian towns and villages. All that remains of the expedition is an after-echo in the legend of the Pied Piper of Hamelin.



and Walter Piston has spent most of his life in the eastern United States. Since 1926, he has been a member of the faculty at Harvard University, where he is the Naumburg Professor of Music. Famous as a teacher, as well as a composer, his four books on technical subjects are acknowledged to be classics of their kind. He has written six symphonies, several orchestral suites and a great amount of chamber music and can be considered one of the leaders of American musical thought today.

The Children's Crusade was a complete failure. But the naive purity of faith which inspired it is a beautiful symbol of medieval civilization.

Moved by the poignancy of the story, French composer-conductor Gabriel Pierné set it to music in 1902. He based his libretto on the poem by Marcel Schwob, in which the shipwrecked children see a vision of Christ and are united with Him in Eternal Life. This extremely sensitive, graceful oratorio "made" Pierné. Its first Toronto performance was by the Mendelssohn Choir under Dr. A. S. Vogt in 1919, and the choir has given numerous performances since then. CBC Wednesday Night presents another on CBC radio this week. The Toronto Mendelssohn Choir will be joined by the Girls' Choirs of Bishop Strachan School and Branksome Hall, and the Boys' Choir from Grace-Church-on-the-Hill, the Toronto Symphony Orchestra under Walter Susskind, and four soloists: Hazelanne Guloien, Elizabeth Elliott, Mary Morrison and John McCollum.

The essential thing, I think, for a person of my age-seventy-two-is not to allow the brain to become atrophied. The brain is an organ of the body and should be used. **Douglas Rain
On Acting**

Winnipeg-born actor Douglas Rain is the subject of the first half of this week's National School Broadcast. Mr. Rain will be interviewed by actress-writer-producer Susan Fletcher in the second of four *Canadian Artists* programs. The other Canadian artists to be interviewed by Miss Fletcher are poet E. J. Pratt (March 18), conductor Sir Ernest MacMillan (April 1), and Eskimo carvers Kiawak and Eegeevudluk (April 8).

Miss Fletcher's interview with Mr. Rain is intended to give Grade 5 to 8 students a glimpse of a professional actor's life in Canada today.

Douglas Rain has been an actor for nearly all of his 30 years. As a boy he acted in school plays and in CBC radio dramas from Winnipeg. Later he performed with the Winnipeg Little Theatre, and the University Theatre. Following studies at the Old Vic School in England, he joined the Old Vic Theatre Company. He returned to Canada in 1953 to become part of an exciting new theatrical venture that was to become world famous — the Stratford Shakespearean Festival.

One of the most versatile of Canadian actors, Mr. Rain says that acting in Canada appeals to him because of the interesting variety of work available and because of the constant challenge to play new roles or to create new interpretations of old roles.

In the interview he speaks of the kinds of opportunities available in Canada today for young people interested in acting as a profession.

perhaps inordinate. Nevertheless, shining through her very unslicked performances, with breaths coming anywhere at all, is an image of what you hoped Mother would be, before you found out she was tone deaf and a little cruel. Marg certainly goes with apple pie and milk and Sunday evenings with hymns around the piano and other good lost things.

And then there is Charlie, who is bigger than his voice, I'm sorry to say, who plays guitar in the group, and who comes out at the end with a strange little dance that has only to be seen not to be believed.


So all this adds up to a program that is unique in Canadian television for its homeliness and agricultural charm, and it's nice to know that such dear old things are not just characters in 19th century fiction, but alive and, like Charlie, kicking.

Country Hoedown, on Fridays, is so well rehearsed and performed that it's bound to give pleasure because we always get some pleasure out of anything well done. In contrast to the Don Messer show, this one is absolutely professional and slick, and it's in this atmosphere of deadly competence that one begins to have some doubt about the worth of what is being done. Some of the music is original folk, but

it's been subjected to such clever manipulation and grooming that it's about as rural as the mock pastoralism of an 18th-century court. (Significantly enough, one of the sponsors presents a deodorant for our attention). The players are technically first rate, but they seem always on the point of adopting the fixed smiles and automation of quick jazz. The square dancers, similarly, are almost a ballet in their virtuosity.

There's an almost complete masquerade in cowboy outfits of the dude variety, and in this rural fancy-dress party Gordie Tapp could only be the travelling salesman. He is a very bright performer, and his vitality is infectious, but one always feels that the creamed corn of the show is a little bland for his adult appetite.

Yet *Country Hoedown* has some very good features: It has a good company spirit, so that what they're doing looks like lots of fun. It has the three Hames sisters, who work very hard and very steadily in numbers which are redeemed from flatness mainly by the performers' spirit and beauty. They are appropriately dressed, with household motions light and free — pretty and yet wholesome, wholesome but yet lyric. Tommy Common, a good-looking young man, sings with

good tone and understanding. Tommy Hunter, a very friendly giant, is massively relaxed about having a certain distinctive style, though his voice doesn't always do what he wants it to do. There's a certain dedicated, ethereal quality to some of his performances; with a strange smile he closes his eyes and then, opening them, looks towards Heaven. King Ganam, an excellent fiddler, looks like an ascetic knight just back from the Crusades, or perhaps a romantic gun-fighter who plays Bach and sips coffee between murders.

So in general, it's hokum, I guess, but fiendishly well done, very much of a mid-20th century version of the cult of civilized primitivism.
