WALLY KOSTER AND PETE SEEGER (Page 2)

IN a forty-week season this year the *Music '60* production staff, headed by Norman Sedawie, is producing 37 hour-long programs. That is roughly comparable in time to 16 or 17 Broadway musicals. Which is quite a chore.

We went across to Studio 7 in Toronto recently, to watch camera rehearsals for the *Hit Parade* segment of *Music '60* (which alternates weekly with the *Jack Kane* segment). As we walked into the studio Bert Niosi staggered past carrying a trumpet, a flute, a trombone, a clarinet and a sax. It turned out that in one sequence he was the Wizard of Jazz and to prove it played all these instruments, consecutively and fluently.

Joyce Hahn, even smaller and more doll-like than she looks on screen, sat placidly on the lowest of the tier of audience seats. She seemed quite oblivious to the technicians rearranging the Klieg lights above her.

"When I heard we were doing an hour show I wondered how on earth we would fill sixty minutes. But somehow we seem just as rushed now as we were in the half-hour format." Joyce broke off as a group of girls in tights flooded past us onto the floor for their number.

"Tonight I've got four or five complete changes of costume," she went on. "I've got to make one change during a minute commercial."

We suggested well, anyway, there was not much of her to change. And later, during the dress rehearsal, we timed Joyce from the moment she finished a number, dressed in tights and a sort of green tunic affair, and darted out of the studio, till when she got back, this time in a kind of white ball-gown arrangement: 54 seconds.

"The new format of *Hit Parade* is just fine," said Joyce. "We certainly got tired of singing *Green Doors* for 18 consecutive weeks, two seasons back."

The new format also seems to please *Hit Parade's* two million viewers, including the critics. "When we cut down on rock 'n' roll I thought we would get lots of complaints," said director Norman Sedawie, watching from the control booth. "But in fact we only got two or three."

Sedawie and his production staff also like the greater simplicity in sets of the new format. "We try for whiter, more airy sets," he said. "We now use on an hour-long show about as much scenery as we formerly used for a half-hour show. I think TV in general realizes it can't compete with Hollywood for spectacular sets."

The simplicity also appealed to Pete Seeger, well-known folk-singer, who sang *Good Night Irene* in casual dress with only the Gino Silvi singers as a very pleasant visual and musical background.

"I like the simplest music arrangements I can get," he told us during a break. "There are many different types of folksongs but the essential quality common to all is that anybody can sing them. No training is needed."

Pete sees folk music as a living process. "I like to take traditional elements of a folksong and sing them

the way I feel them, which might mean rearranging the elements. I'd be sorry to see certain folk forms die out, but folk songs just cannot become museum pieces."

We watched Wally Koster for a moment, singing from the front porch "of a house." (Actually, there was no house, just the porch.) A photographer shot a still publicity picture just as Wally was holding on to the word "you." He kept on singing the tune but changed the words to: "Why do you always have to shoot when I'm singing o-o-o-o with my mouth all tied up and I don't like the way you breath either;" then continued on with the regular lyrics. The photographer looked a little startled.

We turned back to Pete. "I started folksinging 25 years ago," he said. "My father is a professor of musicology. He calls me a 'city-billy.' I left College in 1938, partly through lack of money and partly through lack of marks. I wandered round the States for two years learning folksongs from old timers . . . and here I am. Actually, I started out to be a journalist, not a singer at all."

We suggested he was well out of it.

"I can't agree," he said. "I go along with Bernard Shaw that journalism is the foundation of all good writing."


It seemed like a good note to leave on. Or rather: it seemed a good note on which to leave.

The Late Movies Have Been Lousy!

—according to some viewers, and CBC Winnipeg film director GRACE BROWN admits they haven't all been "four star" productions lately (although some have). She explains why—

Like Perry Como, we get letters—and they are not all complimentary. But then, since Perry's recent show on Winnipeg we are sure all his letters are not complimentary either. A great many of ours are on the subject of feature films and, since it is impossible to reply to every letter, we once more turn to the pages of the CBC Times to answer some of your questions.

The feature film situation is a complex one and is becoming more complicated daily. We would like to keep you advised as to the prob-

lems and solutions or compromises involved. With this in mind, we shall attempt to bring our viewers up to date on the situation.

You have likely read a good deal about the strike in Hollywood where the Screen Actors Guild and the Writers Guild of America have called their members out on strike until agreement is reached with the major film production studios for payment of residual rights on all films produced since 1948 when they are released to television. Other associations and unions are looking into the situation as they all want a fair share in the residuals. What all this means is simply that those individuals who worked on or appeared in feature films produced by the major studios since 1948 are asking for a percentage of the television revenue once the films are released. What it means to us, the viewers, is a delay on the release of these "post 1948 features" until such time as a fair agreement has been reached. This could take years. Meanwhile, the only post-1948 features available to television are those produced by small, independent companies. Some of these have been released and, indeed, have been telecast or are scheduled to be telecast over Channel 3, CBWT, Winnipeg. But, of course, the best of the post-48's are not available either in Canada or in the United States.

In the United States, nearly all American films produced prior to 1948 have been released to television. In Canada, this is not the

case. The RKO features have not yet been seen on Canadian television and only a few Paramount pictures have been released. We expect to contract for these features as soon as they are made available. Perhaps by late summer or early autumn, some of these films will be telecast over Channel 3. At least, we hope so.

Another problem we have encountered is the reluctance of distributors to allow us selectivity when purchasing features. This is understandable when one realizes the situation in regard to the availability of feature films. At this moment, there is an anti-trust suit pending in the United States courts because certain producers refused to sell selected films to the television stations. They insisted the stations buy all the titles offered in any given package. The eventual outcome of this suit may take years; meanwhile, the stations have under contract a great many films which they cannot use. In Canada, the same situation prevails, but on a much smaller scale.

With the selection of available films becoming more and more limited, we are encountering real problems in scheduling. As a rule, there are not more than two prints of any feature in Canada. With 50 odd TV stations all clamouring for the better titles, we cannot always secure the film we would like on a certain date. Then, too, film is fragile and prints wear out quickly if not carefully projected. Often we have to reject a print for poor quality or condition and re-schedule the film when a new print is available. Sometimes it is impossible to procure a good print because of the condition of the negative. When a print is absolutely unusable, we have no alternative but to delete the title from our contract. But we assure you every effort is made to obtain an acceptable print of the really good features.


We have been told recently that some of our features are anything but good. We are the first to concede that not all our features are good — but a great many of them are three and four star productions. During the six years CBWT has

been on the air, we have telecast approximately 2,700 feature films (including westerns). Between the years 1929 (when movies first “talked”) and 1948, there were fewer than 200 exceptional features produced. Of these, many are between 20 and 30 years old and our tastes change. What was considered a fine drama 25 years ago, may seem comical today. By the same token, certain types of comedy appear almost tragic to our present audiences. Then, too, each individual reacts differently. What you may think is a fine feature, may seem a real “dog” to your next door neighbour. And so it goes.

We have some new product under contract now — 26 J. Arthur Rank features, 52 Columbia and Universal pictures and a selected few independent 1950 to 1956 releases. Starting in April, some of these will be appearing in our schedules.

One last point—we are ever striving to procure the very best features obtainable. Just as soon as more features are released in Canada, we expect to have them on the air.

Although this article was written by the film director at CBC Winnipeg, the problems described are faced by all television stations in Canada.—Ed.

GEORGE RETZLAFF, supervising producer of TV sports, look resigned but steadfast. “The other departments have been bugging me for weeks so they can make their own program arrangements, but I just don’t know,” he said. “Here—I’ll try again.”

He picked up the phone and dialed Maple Leaf Gardens without needing to look up the number. While he talked we read the gag notice above his desk: “Staff members with a death in the family will please advise the management before 11:00 a.m. on the day of the game.”

Retzlaff hung up. “No,” he said, “we won’t know what games we’ll be telecasting, or when, until the hockey people have made up their

schedule. And they can’t do that until the last minute.”

At this stage we should explain for any newcomer to Canada that we were talking about the coverage of the Stanley Cup, North America’s top hockey trophy. We should also warn the newcomer that he can expect a number of changes in CBC programming over the next few weeks.

It all began in 1893. Baron Stanley was the sixth Governor-General of Canada. During his term he got interested in hockey and just before he sailed for England sent ten guineas (maybe \$50 in today’s currency) to the Amateur Hockey Association to be used for a trophy.

Horace Ford, beset by the problems of his workaday world as a toy designer and his responsibilities as a husband and the son of a widowed mother, has his greatest joy in childhood memories. He recounts them over and over again to anyone who will listen. On the eve of his 35th birthday, the pressures close in on him and he returns to Randolph Street, the slum area where he grew up and the scene of his happiest memories. To his horror, he meets "the kids" he used to play with—still there and still the same. "They were the kids I played with when I was ten—the same kids," he tells his wife, Laura. The resulting effect on Horace's personality as he retreats further and further into his "incredible world" provides the play with its baffling yet dramatic climax.



One Step Beyond is seen Wednesday nights on CBC-TV, replacing *The Unforeseen*.

Actually, there is some doubt as to whether today's trophy can be called the *Stanley Cup*: over the past sixty years people have polished it, replated it, given it a new base, and added to it so that it has grown to be two or three times the size of the original.

Still, the aura surrounding it remains the same. This aura was soon established. Back in 1905, for instance, a team of contenders made their way by dogsled and ship and train for over 4,000 miles from the Yukon to play for the cup. They lost.

A few years back the CBC received many compliments for the excellence of its camera work at hockey games. Today the compliments are fewer, not because the camera work has deteriorated but because its excellence is now accepted without comment. And that pleases George Retzlaff.

"Good camera work — in hockey or any other TV coverage — is camera work the viewer doesn't notice," he explained. "It means the viewer is seeing what he wants to see, smoothly, and at the time he wants to see it."

The CBC-TV pattern of hockey coverage was set back in 1952, the year television started in Canada on a regular basis. George Retzlaff was then a cameraman. He was soon made director for the hockey coverage though still officially in the technical department of CBC. Later he was made producer. As Supervising Producer, he will control the games in the Stanley Cup semi-final coverage.

"We hope to have four cameras covering the actual games with a fifth in the dressing rooms for interviews," Retzlaff explained. "Two of the cameras sit at the centreline. No. 1 is halfway up the stand and No. 2 right up on top. No. 1 is the workhorse covering most of the game. It has a zoomar lens. This allows us to zoom in on the players so the viewer can identify them, then move out again for the larger look at the pattern of play."

The zoomar is a good example of the need for smooth unobtrusive

camera work. "If the cameraman zooms back too fast he leaves the viewers' eyeballs on the floor," said Retzlaff. "And viewers don't like that—it detracts from the game."

No. 2 camera, up on high, has a 25-inch lense which gives the viewer a close-up, particularly of play near the goals. This camera also catches the human-interest byplay, like fights, penalties, break-outs and so on.

No. 3 camera set in one of the corners gives a view of the play from a different angle. It can often give a better view of the passing pattern than the other cameras.

The fourth camera, on the opposite side of the rink to the other three, is set to get shots of coaches, players in the box, and other side-lights.

"The first requirement of a cameraman is that he know the game, said Retzlaff. For most TV work the cameraman has a list of shots required of him but of course you can't do that with a hockey game. So he must be able to anticipate what will happen next. If he sees a one or two-man break-out he must anticipate the movement of the wingers and to whom the pass will go."

Again unlike normal TV programs, each cameraman must treat his camera as if it were live throughout the game; that is, as the camera whose picture is being transmitted to the viewer. For the producer, sitting in the control booth, watches the output of all the cameras on all four monitors. He then calls for the camera which best gives the viewer the information he wants.

Commentators for the radio and TV simulcast will be—

For the Toronto Maple Leafs: Foster Hewitt (the man who gave the commentary on the first radio coverage of any hockey game over 37 years ago and who has done more than 5,000 games since then), and his son Bill Hewitt;

For the Montreal Canadiens: Danny Gallavan (who has been doing Montreal games since TV started there) and Frank Selke, Jr.

4. Supervision by the mother.
5. Cohesiveness of the family.

Each of the above factors is defined and a system based on 100 points per factor is used to determine the score. For example, if the discipline is firm but kindly, the score would be roughly 9 out of 100 for this factor. If it was erratic with signs of severe cruelty, the score would be about 90 out of 100. On the other hand, if discipline is severe but the family relationship looks good, the result would probably be a low score or little tendency toward delinquency. Under the scale, a score of more than 250 means there is more than a 50 per cent chance of the subject becoming a delinquent.

Delinquency has social and psychological causes. Research has made it apparent that there is no single cause either in general or in respect to specific cases. A multiplicity of external and internal factors come together to influence the behaviour of the individual child. Professor Gifford is convinced, however, that we could cut down our delinquency rate substantially if we put our present knowledge fully to work.

The professor has made a good start himself by exploding some of the myths about delinquency. He comments on four of the more persistent of several statements which he claims are false, or at best, only half-truths:

1. **TV, crime comics, etc., cause delinquency.**

"The truth is that a youngster must be *ready* for illegal activity before he can be influenced by what he sees or reads. Because a prospective delinquent can be influenced, we need to control TV and other mass media but, at the same time, we should realize that these things cannot *cause* a young-

ster to become a delinquent if he is relatively confident he can cope with his world."

2. **Working mothers cause delinquency**

"In the past 20 years, mothers have taken quite a beating about child-rearing in general and delinquency in particular. As social scientists learn more about serious delinquency, however, they are finding that a youngster's relationship with his father has more to do with it than his relationship with mother. This is true for boys and girls. There is no single cause of delinquency, but it looks more and more as though the focal point of all causes is the relationship of the father to a particular child. The fact that mother works has little or nothing to do with it."

3. **Church-going prevents it.**

"Ministers and church members frequently provide the trustworthy

Broadcasters Adopt New Training Plan

The television section of the Western Association of Broadcasters recently announced a plan to make "on-the-job" training at member stations available to new television licencees.

G. Blair Nelson, president of the Association, said that the member stations had formulated the plan because of their awareness of the shortage of trained TV personnel.

In the past, individual stations have offered their facilities for the training of new personnel of other stations, but it is believed that this is the first time that any group of broadcasters has worked out a training plan to assist new licencees.

Mr. Nelson, who is general manager of CFQC-TV in Saskatoon, pointed out that the new plan will not only benefit the operators of new stations, but will also make it possible for new employees to receive practical training as soon as they are engaged, without having to wait for the new stations to become operative.

Following is an outline of the programs:

1. *Physical Qualifications and Basic Grip*

Stan Leonard explains that anyone with a full set of limbs qualifies as a golfer from the physical standpoint, and no one has to be a giant to hit the long ball—which for many golfers just beginning seems to be their first desire. He also explains the basic grip for holding the clubs — the essential prerequisites for good play.

2. *Club Size and Swing and Drive*

Stress is laid on the golfer choosing the correct-sized club to insure accuracy. The necessity for good stance of body and feet to enable the golfer to drive accurately is emphasized.

3. *Fairway Woods*

Distinguishing between fairway woods, and the different types of stance suitable for varying terrain.

4. *Long and Middle Irons*

Golfers must have specific clubs

for specific situations. The uses of 2, 3, 4 and 5 are explained.

5. *Short Irons and Wedges*

Explanations of the uses of irons 6, 7, 8 and 9 and particular attention to divot action.

6. *Approaches and pitches*

The approach to the green with the differences explained in the pitching on long flag and short flag greens and the running or dropping of a ball.

7. *Fairway Bunker*

The fairway and a study of sand irons and their purposes and a demonstration of the full swing for long shots from various lie situations.

8. *Short Bunker*

The edge of the green in short bunkers and how to play a notoriously tough shot—the buried ball.

9. *Chipping*

Chipping a ball from every conceivable lie situation onto the green.

10. *Downhill, Uphill and Sidehill Lies*

Stress in this lesson is on stance and footing on downhill, uphill and sidehill lies with varying situations of the fairway anywhere from tee to green.

11. *Trouble Spots*

Keeping out of the rough, water shots, deliberate slicing and hooking to circumvent hazards.

12. *Putting*

Stan demonstrates putting on the green with loop and angle putts.

13. *Common Player Faults*

Common faults including errors in basic swing correction and inadvertent hooking and slicing, and resume of previous programs.

On CBC Wednesday Night

"The Tin Flute"

The prize-winning novel by Manitoba-born author GABRIELLE ROY, adapted for radio by LEN PETERSON

A SWARM of ragged children were playing on the sidewalks in the midst of refuse. Thin, sad-looking women appeared at evil-smelling doorways, blinking at the sunlight that lay among the garbage cans. Mothers with listless faces sat at the windows, giving suck to their babies. Everywhere there were windowpanes stuffed with rags or sealed with oiled paper. Everywhere there were shrill voices, the wailing of infants, or cries of pain coming from behind tight-closed shutters."

Saint-Henri, a railway-factory slum huddled beside the Lachine Canal in Montreal. The time: the first months of the Second World War. Out of its shabby restaurants, gaudy movie theatres and squalid homes Canadian novelist Gabrielle Roy plucked five ordinary characters and gave universal significance to their story of love and struggle for life just one jump ahead of destitution. They appeared in 1947 in her best-selling novel *The Tin Flute*. It won her the *Prix Femina* (she was the first Canadian writer to be awarded this major Parisian literary award), it was a Literary Guild book-club selection, and it was sold to the movies for \$100,000.

The Tin Flute has been dramatized by Len Peterson for a radio presentation on CBC Wednesday Night this week. Production will be by Rupert Caplan in the Montreal studios.

This poignant, ironic drama concerns the large Lacasse family. Florentine, the oldest child, works as a waitress in the five-and-ten, where many men make advances

to her—some flattering, some insulting. When Jean Levesque turns up at her counter one day with his bold black eyes and teasing smile, she thinks perhaps he offers an escape from the narrow misery of her life. As she struggles to reconcile her own happiness with Jean's burning ambition, her story unfolds as a penetrating study of human motives and emotions. *The Tin Flute* offers something quite new in heroines. Florentine is not noble, intelligent, pious, gorgeous, outstanding in any way. She is a skinny little thing with only the fleeting beauty of youth and the pitiful dreams of the trapped.

Equally interesting is the story of Florentine's mother, whose youth

This Friday afternoon's National School Broadcast provides an interesting introduction to the man who will conduct the CBC Symphony Orchestra broadcast the same evening. Susan Fletcher will interview Sir Ernest MacMillan in the third of four *Canadian Artists* programs.

Sir Ernest will tell of some of the interesting experiences that led him to choose music as a career when he was a young boy in Toronto — and how he found it possible to combine his other boyhood interests with his interest in music.

What he does not tell is that he was considered a child prodigy and that he continually amazed church congregations and concert audiences with his organ playing when he was only ten or twelve.

As a young man, Sir Ernest spent a number of years in Europe,

studying and working with some of the great teachers and musicians of the day. In 1914 he was attending a music festival in Germany when the First World War broke out. He was interned as an enemy alien and spent four years in a prisoner-of-war camp.

After his return to Canada he soon made an international reputation as an organist, composer and conductor, and educator. In 1932 he was appointed conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, a position he held until his retirement 25 years later. Sir Ernest was knighted by King George V in 1935 for his contributions to music.

On the National School Broadcast Sir Ernest will recall some of the memorable incidents of his career, mention some of the personal friendships he has made, and tell stories of some of the world's greatest performers with whom he has worked.

Part of the program will consist of a performance of Sir Ernest's *A Saint Malo*, a sketch for string orchestra, based on a French-Canadian song.

has served Canada in many countries, about her family, and about her contributions to human welfare through her work with the Red Cross and the St. John Ambulance voluntary aid department. (Repeated from Trans-Canada Matinee 27/3/60).

Countess of Aberdeen. A former chatelaine of Rideau Hall, Lady Aberdeen, resided there when her husband was Governor-General, from 1893 to 1898. She founded the Victorian Order of Nurses, the National Council of Women, and the May Court Club in Ottawa. Her diaries have recently been placed in the Canadian archives and from them Lita Rose Betcherman, Ottawa club woman and freelance broadcaster, has gleaned a character study of this somewhat formidable woman. keeps coming back to haunt her. But her zest for living and hope for her family keep bubbling up to overcome some of her regrets and most of the grim darkness of her life.

The challenge of wartime problems draws on the energies of these struggling people like a second wind. It brings a new excitement and meaning into their lives, and government checks rescue them from squalor.

Miss Roy writes of people rather than social problems. Reviewing the book in the Toronto Globe and Mail, William Arthur Deacon wrote: "Everything in *The Tin Flute*, and every person, is unremarkable, yet the patience, the skill of phrasing, of steering the story from point to point, gives this novel power that captivates the imagination of readers. Here are the common people in their misery. Here are their pitiful sorrows and joys. work of art. Consequently, even the minor characters will be remembered and quoted."

Except that it has a tougher fibre, *The Tin Flute* may remind listeners of *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*. Miss Roy matches the most refined feeling with the most accurate, tangy language. She writes warmly and affectionately of the poor and unemployed of Saint-Henri, but her sentiment is unsalted by tears. There is no melodrama in her book. Her characters are all normal.

She got her knowledge of them first-hand. Early in the war she roomed in Saint-Henri when she was short of funds, and used to spend hours walking through the streets, watching and listening to the little human dramas being played out in its sooty, noisy shops and houses. It was just after her return from France, and she was earning her living writing for French-Canadian periodicals and devoting two or three months each year to her novel. It appeared first in French, under the title of *Bonheur d'Occasion*.

Miss Roy is not Quebec-born, but comes from an old pioneer family in St. Boniface, Manitoba. She is the youngest of eight. She taught school for a while, but found it "empty and dreary," so got into theatricals with *Le Cercle Moliere*, while she saved for a trip to Europe. She had been writing short stories in both French and English since she was 12. She studied dramatics in London and Paris, and toured Southern France on foot before returning to Canada and getting to know Saint-Henri and its people. Since her success with *The Tin Flute* she has written two other novels: *Where Nest the Water Hen*, and *The Cashier*.

Bow Bells To Broadway

The Barry Morse story Tuesday on “Project '60”

THE Barry Morse story is a little like Eliza Doolittle's. He was born a cockney with an accent as thick as a London pea-souper. Now he speaks as impeccably as any Englishman could hope to. The only trace of his cockney heritage is in his quick movements, his shrewdness, and his wit.

Morse was born in Bethnal Green, a London slum district, over the shop where his dad sold tobacco, newspapers and off-licence beer. His parents never saw a play in their lives, and when Barry left school at 14 to become an errand boy for a glass bottle manufacturer at 15 shillings a week, none of them had the slightest interest in the theatre. Wheeling about London on his bike, Barry picked up the news that Lord Leverhume on his deathbed had endowed an annual scholarship at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art. What interested the lad particularly was the fact that it was worth four times

what he was making as a delivery boy — fabulous riches! Then he learned that there was to be a public Academy performance, and he went round to see what this acting stuff was all about. It was his first visit to a theatre, his first glimpse of that other world that was to dominate his life from then on.

With impudent assurance he told himself he could do better than any of those blokes up on the stage, and boldly decided to enter the men's competition for the scholarship. He was just 15, com-

peting with 200 others, "and looking back on it now, I marvel at my audacity!" he recalls. He was told he would have to prepare two scenes to perform. Never having read a play he skinned round to the public library to see what he could find in the drama section. Having a liberal inheritance of cockney wisdom, he chose a scene from Galsworthy's *The Silver Box*—the cockney navvy testifying on a witness stand. Then he began looking around for something a little more lad-dee-dah, and when his eyes lit on the posh-sounding name of Algernon in Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest*, he knew he had found what he wanted.

He won. Sybil Thorndyke was one of the judges, and years later she told him that the effect of the skinny young cockney playing the dandy's part was unbearably funny, but also rather poignant, because he was so sincere. Morse was the youngest student ever to enroll at the Academy. During his two years there he worked hard at shedding his cockney accent, listening carefully to his fellow students, among them Joan Greenwood and Pamela Brown.

At the end of his course he played the title role in *Henry V* before King George VI and Queen Elizabeth in coronation year, and won a BBC award for his radio acting. Then he toured for five years with various road companies, during which he met and married Sydney Sturgess, another repertory player. He acted in over 200 roles, two performances a day, sometimes two plays a week — a rugged apprenticeship that undermined his health and sent him off to a TB sanitarium for seven months.

When he was fit again he made his London's West End debut in *The First Mrs. Fraser*, which starred Dame Marie Tempest and A. E. Matthews and ran for nine

months. After that he had his ups and downs for a while and then a run of stage successes, including the title role in Irwin Shaw's *The Assassins*. He made 15 films, and became a well-known radio and TV actor.

In 1951 the Morses and their two children came to Canada to visit Sydney's relatives—and stayed. Now Morse is as close to being a radio-TV-stage star as it is possible for an actor to be in Canada. His face and voice probably are more familiar to Canadian audiences than any other performer's. And he has had two Broadways flings—a flop and a success. Recently his experiment with a one-man show, a combination of lecture and concert, got enthusiastic reviews. He is planning a one-man spectacular along similar lines for CBC-TV next year, and when time permits he hopes to arrange a tour.

Sydney Sturgess, too, has chalked up many fine performances on stage, radio and TV in this country, and the Morse children—Melanie, 14, and Hayward, 12, are the busiest youngsters in television these days. Hayward was seen recently with Ingrid Bergman in *The Turn of the Screw*, and with Maurice Evans in *The Browning Version*.

You will meet them all on CBC radio this Tuesday night when *Project '60* presents *Bow Bells to Broadway*, the story of what makes an actor. Toronto actress Antoinette Bower, who has prepared this hour-long visit with the Morses, points out that she makes no effort to present them as the folks next door. They're theatrical people through and through, she says, and that's how you will find them.

Reports on activities at the Manitoba Winter Fair at Brandon will be carried on CBC radio and TV this week. Part of the Manitoba Farm Broadcast (12:15 p.m. on CBW) will originate from the Brandon Arena Monday to Thursday. A special 25-minute report on fair activities will also be heard Monday to Thursday at 7 p.m. on CBW, in the last 25-minute segment of "Tempo." The CBC Farm Club on Saturday morning will deal with youth activities at the fair. A special "live" television program will originate from the Brandon Arena Friday night on CBWT and CKX-TV. The Winnipeg station will carry a full hour of this program; the Brandon station will carry the first half-hour of it. This program will be filmed for presentation the following Sunday (April 3) on private stations wishing to carry it. CKX-TV will carry a special local half-hour program from the fair at 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

adult relationship a troubled youngster needs. It is this sense of belonging to the community through a church, rather than merely attending services every Sunday, which can have an effect in preventing delinquency."

4. Recreation prevents it.

"We have more facilities for recreation now than we ever had, yet our delinquency rate is slowly rising. Recreation has tremendous value and we all need it, but the evidence we have indicates that the great majority of present and future delinquents are already in athletic leagues and sports programs or on the fringes of them."

These views will help set the pace for the CBC broadcast under the direction of program organizer Helen Carscallen and Montreal producer Margaret Howes.

The McGill University professor has had plenty of opportunity to observe offenders. As counsellor to the Bathurst Community Club in Toronto, he spent 15 months working with the so-called "Beanery Boys." He also spent two years as program director at Toronto's Central Neighbourhood House and five years as director of group activities at Norton Psychiatric Clinic in Louisville, Kentucky. Besides his present work at McGill's School of Social Work, he is consultant to Montreal's Mental Hygiene Institute.

In defense of teen-agers, who often feel very much maligned by the blanket of criticism cast upon them, Professor Gifford points out the fallacy that delinquency is a teen-age problem, the myth that all teen-agers are delinquents at heart. This image is unfair and dangerous.

"It is true that delinquency appears most frequently in the 'teens,'" says the professor, "but these anti-social youths are a small minority and their attitudes are not contagious. A person in good physical health can withstand an experience that would give a sicklier person pneumonia—and the same is true for emotionally healthy teen-agers. Most of them will not develop anti-social attitudes from contact with those who have them. Delinquency is only contagious among those few youngsters who are susceptible."




Happyland
