VICTOR FELDBRILL

Eight years ago, when he was conducting the CBC Winnipeg Orchestra while Eric Wild was on vacation, Victor Feldbrill, then 28, included a Canadian work in each of his weekly broadcasts from Winnipeg. CBC Times quoted him at that time: "I consider it almost a duty for conductors to play Canadian works as far as possible. I think that the Canadian composer is being given a raw deal, outside of radio. In programming music for concerts—and in spite of what managers have to say about box-office appeal—Canadian compositions could easily be worked into concerts and broadcasts which, at the same time, contain the great and familiar music of the past. Perhaps it would be like taking a sugar-coated pill at first, but this unfortunate and unreasonable prejudice against our own talent can be overcome." The accompanying article tells how Mr. Feldbrill has stuck to his original plan, and how he has proved, in a striking way, to be something of a prophet.

IT COULDN'T BE DONE (BUT HE DID IT)

WHEN (or if) a great musical masterpiece is written by a Canadian composer, chances are that it will be brought to light by the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

For (as Toronto composer John Beckwith once pointed out in a CBC Times music column) since Victor Feldbrill was appointed permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra two years ago, the orchestra's programs have contained more performances of Canadian works than those of the country's other orchestras combined.

"We play five or six Canadian works each season," Mr. Feldbrill says. "So, during the next decade we'll have presented from fifty to sixty Canadian compositions. If one so-called 'masterpiece' is discovered in this way I'll be happy and consider that the orchestra has done a tremendous service."

The five or six Canadian works performed by the orchestra represent only about half the modern works programmed each season by Mr. Feldbrill. When a brochure listing the programs to be played during Mr. Feldbrill's first season with the orchestra reached Sir

Adrian Boult, conductor of the London Philharmonic Orchestra, Sir Adrian wrote to Mr. Feldbrill, congratulating him on his "bold" programming.

Mr. Feldbrill explains: "My feeling is that Winnipeg audiences are perhaps *more* receptive to a wide variety of musical experiences than the general public in some of our larger centres. In London, for example, Tchaikovsky seems to be the main item in the musical diet offered to audiences. Only the BBC orchestras can program anything contemporary."

Finally, as if to clinch his point, Mr. Feldbrill produced a clipping from one of his hometown (Toronto) newspapers. The headline—AUDIENCE WALKS OUT ON BARTOK.

"When *we* played Bartok this season the audience went wild over it!"

When he first announced his plan — 15 to 20 minutes of contemporary music at every subscription concert — Mr. Feldbrill was warned that he might cause the orchestra to lose some of its audience. The fact is that the sale of season tickets *increased*.

Does this mean that Winnipeg audiences have actually become fans of Bartok and Weinzwieg, Stravinsky and Papineau-Couture? Not at all, says Feldbrill, but it does mean that people have accepted the fact that it is not unfair to ask them to concentrate just a little harder than usual during one number on each program.

"Not long ago a subscriber told me, 'I *hated* that piece you played last night; but it will be interesting to hear what the next one will be like'. You see, we've reached the point where people admit that they look forward to our little adventure into the unknown at each concert," says Mr. Feldbrill, with an unmistakable

Young People's Concert

On this last program of the season, Leonard Bernstein will conduct a performance of Aaron Copland's opera "The Second Hurricane." It will be sung by students from New York City's High School of Music, directed by R. Sybil Mandel, chairman of the school's music department. The two-act opera, which Copland subtitled "a play-opera for high school performance," had its world premiere (and its only performance to date) on April 24, 1937, shortly after it was written. It was directed by Orson Welles. (This may be the last performance from Carnegie Hall. The building is to be demolished, and the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra has made plans to have next season's series of young people's concerts originate from an interim location before settling down in its new home at the Lincoln Centre for the Performing Arts, in 1961.)

Royal Wedding

Here's how Canadian viewers will see the ceremony shortly after it takes place

Television audiences in Canada are expected to be able to see complete coverage of the wedding of Princess Margaret and Mr. Antony Armstrong-Jones on May 6 shortly after the ceremonies are concluded in London.

Coverage of the wedding is scheduled to be carried by the English and French networks of the CBC on May 6, beginning at 1:00 pm E.D.T. (12 noon C.D.T. in Manitoba, 11 am M.D.T. in Saskatchewan, and 10 am M.S.T. in Alberta).

The CBC has arranged with the R.A.F. for videotapes of this important Commonwealth event to be flown non-stop from London airport to R.C.A.F. Station St. Hubert in two Vulcan Jet bombers. Special CBC equipment and technicians will provide the program directly to both networks from St. Hubert.

This procedure was adopted to provide Canadian viewing audiences with the best possible coverage of the wedding in the shortest possible time. The complete program will be preceded by selected highlights of the wedding ceremony transmitted to Canada by the "slow scan" process, a technique which utilizes the Trans-Atlantic telephone cable to transmit television pictures, and which has provided Canadian television viewers with news highlights from overseas in the past.

The wedding program material will be flown to Canada in two stages. One Vulcan will leave London Airport at noon, carrying tapes of the ceremony recorded directly at the airport up to flight time. The second Vulcan will carry taped material of the balance of the ceremony.

The program material carried by the Vulcans will be videotapes recorded by the CBC on special equipment flown to England. The tapes will be made from the BBC's television presentation.

"The Old Soak" Postponed

Don Marquis' "The Old Soak," described in last week's CBC Times (page 20), has been postponed. This CBC Stage production will now be presented on Sunday, May 29.

THEN there was the father who cut off his little boy's head to cure him of squinting. And the mother who, hearing her little girl had been run over by a steam-roller called, "I'm in the tub—just slip her under the door."

The first "joke" comes via Charles Dickens straight from the poverty of the 19th century English slums. The second comes via *Esquire* from the rebellion by the younger generation against "the bottomless tolerance and reasonableness," the "purposeful morality and goodness of the older generation," against the luxurious drudgery of North America's comfortable way of life.

At least that is now the theory of the origins of the modern "sick" joke. But how such jokes made people laugh in earlier times is something of a puzzle.

Montreal psychiatrist Dr. Karl Stern gives one view. "The sick humour of the past — for example, Lizzy Borden who gave her mother forty whacks — had a spontaneity and lack of commercialism which is not found in the sick humour of today."

Dr. Stern will discuss sick humour with fellow psychiatrist Dr. Leo Mergler, Eric MacLean, music editor of the *Montreal Star*, and Montreal writer Mac Shoub on the new Sunday radio program, *Venture*. The discussion will be sometimes clinical, sometimes tongue-in-cheek, and sometimes quite frightening as the panel considers Lennie Bruce ("His humour uses negation for its own sake, with no positive statement behind it"), Mort Sahl, and Shelley Berman (judged by the group to be the only true comedian of the three).

This brings up the whole question: should we analyze humour at all? Many people find it a fascinating pastime, and many philosophers have tried to define the causes of laughter. Other people disagree. We once interviewed Dave Brock,

Whence "Sick" Humour?

Two psychiatrists and two writers offer their explanations of a not-so-new phenomenon on *VENTURE*, a new series replacing *PROJECT '60 Sundays* on radio

the British Columbia writer who has contributed many articles and poems to *Punch*, *Time and Tide*, *Atlantic Monthly*, and various Canadian publications. He expressed a strong aversion for rigidly classifying and analyzing anything at all, and particularly humour.

"Take the nomenclature for animals here on the West Coast," he said. "The so-called sea-trout I find is not a trout at all, it's a salmon. I just get this straightened out and I find that our so-called West Coast salmon are not salmon at all but something else—I don't know what. That's the sort of mess you get into trying to be exact."

Another man we interviewed once had the same aversion. "It's rigid thinking that causes wars," he said. "People won't face up to the fact that everything is in a state of change and people must change with everything else." After the interview he left us his 'phone number: it was the wrong number because three days earlier the 'phone company had changed its dialling system.

We mention this incident because it illustrates a type of humour which the philosopher Herbert Spencer considered to be the basis of all humour. He called it "descending incongruity." We laugh (if we laugh) because the incident fixes our mind on great things (like wars) then tumbles us into triviality (like forgotten telephone numbers.) The cat wandering across the stage during Hamlet's soliloquy is an example.

In his book, *The English Sense of Humour*, Harold Nicolson offers three more theories of the causes of laughter. First, from Aristotle to Freud philosophers have suggested that the essence of my laughter is your misfortune. In

Freud, for instance, at least one cause of laughter is "the release of our subconscious instincts of sadism" (says Nicolson). Certainly, sadism (and something more) is involved in the sick joke:

Boy: Mummy, mummy, why is Dad running so hard?

Mummy: Shut up and keep firing.

Then there's the theory that laughter follows the sense of sudden freedom from restraint — the laughter of relief after physical restraint, the laughter of release from our (Freudian) inhibitions which are momentarily broken in a socially acceptable manner (for example, by the *double entendre*).

Lastly, there is Bergson's theory that we laugh when we see people acting like machines or like inanimate objects instead of like free, rational human beings. Latest example which fits this description is the laws of Parkinson. They pretend to apply physical laws, as inexorable as the law of gravity, to human situations.

There are other reasons for laughter. For instance, some time ago Vancouver humourist Eric Nicol, enthralled by his copy of the *Laundry and Dry Cleaning Journal*, came across these sentences: "The challenge facing at least some laundry operators is more than a selling one. It's a challenge of building a whole new outlook, embracing employees, methods of equipment combining to turn out acceptable work."

To most people this would be nothing but a muddled sentence. To Nicol it meant a column in the Vancouver *Province* headed: "Report on Sex Anarchies in Laundries." Embracing employees, Nicol





fearlessly pointed out, was no proper way to raise morale in the laundry industry.

This ability to take a minor absurdity and turn it into a major absurdity has been the hallmark of many fine humourists from Leacock (who galloped off in all directions) to Thurber (whose friend could never walk through the female ghost in his house but always said "Pardon me" and walked around her).

When we interviewed Nicol some years ago he suggested that the humour of illogicality is being submerged in a more sentimental and straightforward style.

"I suspect this is because so many women are getting into the humour business," he said. "Trouble with women is, they are too logical."

TV critic Dennis Braithwaite holds a different view. In a column last year he argued that Canadian humourists are too academic. This tradition, he suggests, started with Leacock. And certainly, there are many university-trained people writing humour: Nicol was a French scholar, Paul Hiebert a professor of chemistry, George Johnstone a lecturer in English; in French Canada, Doris Lussier (Pere Gideon of *The Town Above* and *The Plouffes*) is an ex-professor of philosophy, Denis Drouhin a graduate lawyer.

Braithwaite also maintains that Canada lacks TV comedians because "We just aren't very funny people — bold, imaginative, aggressive, yes, but not funny."

Like the analysis of humour, this business of relating humour to "national characteristics" is very tricky. Braithwaite suggests Canadians are too genteel and placid to say anything that might hurt someone's feelings, particularly the feelings of political figures. He contrasts this to the U.S. where a Hope will build a monologue of "not too complimentary jokes" about the president.

Yet in a discussion in *Saturday Review* British cartoonist Ronald (Please turn to page 19)



Deep in the Heart Of Texas—the BBC!

A high compliment was paid to the BBC on March 25 by Station KHFI-FM of Austin, Texas, a regular subscriber to the BBC Transcription Service.

KHFI decided to celebrate its fourth anniversary by attempting to recreate for its listeners a day of BBC transmissions beginning at 10:00 a.m. and continuing until midnight. Nothing like it has been attempted before, in Texas or anywhere else, and in writing of this "very unusual and significant affair" Mr. Roderick E. Kennedy, the owner-manager of KHFI stressed that much effort was being expended to guarantee that it will be a compliment to the extremely fine standards set by the BBC in all of its broadcast work." KHFI devotes eighty-five per cent of its time to serious and light classical music and Mr. Kennedy felt that fourteen hours of BBC programs would please its listeners "beyond imagination" and create great good will.

There was something for everyone in the selection made from the range of BBC Transcription Service programs. The "BBC Day" opened with *Restoration Anthems* from the Aldeburgh Festival, and in the course of the fourteen hours Texans who tuned in could hear not only lighter items like *The Goon Show*, the ingenious panel game *My Word* or *BBC Jazz Club*, but also such offerings from the BBC Third Program as Thomas Heywood's *A Woman Killed With Kindness* or Mahler's Eighth Symphony from the Royal Albert Hall. There were talks and short stories, and a sound picture of the Military Tattoo from the 1959 Edinburgh Festival—in short a broad selection from the BBC's three domestic sound services—Home, Light and Third. A BBC News bulletin was scheduled punctually for 9:00 p.m. preceded by the chimes of Big Ben, following the pattern familiar to all listeners in Britain. To complete the picture, the station's own British announcer was on duty so that, as Mr. Kennedy pointed out, there would not be an

Searle and American cartoonist Robert Osborne both agreed that the U.S. did not have a tradition of savage political cartooning (as exists in Britain), because Americans were much too nice, too worried about hurting someone's feelings.

In his book mentioned earlier, Nicolson compounds confusion by suggesting that real British humour is basically kindly and not at all cruel. But he distinguished between "British humour," as typified by *Punch* of a few years ago, and the "proletarian gibe" used in Cockney wit: "The wife's uncle was blown clean through the wardrobe and we never found so much as a button. I had to laugh."

Nevertheless there is a type of gentle English comedy, quite different to American comedy. Anyone who has heard the hilarious BBC production *My Word* on CBC radio has had a taste of it. In a similar tradition of English nonsense comes *Hancock's Half Hour*, also from the BBC. Tony Hancock returns from a disappointing holiday in France, disappointing be-

cause there wasn't a jellied eel stand on the whole Riviera. With him on holiday was his old pal Sidney James who insisted on paying all his expenses by British postal note. This got Tony wondering about the Post Office robbery, just before they left England and. . . . But most English fans of Tony Hancock have a rough idea of how things will progress. Those who do not should watch CBC-TV on Saturdays, starting this week.

"Wit is the armour of wisdom," says *Chambers' Encyclopedia*, "and humour is a kind of higher complacency only one degree removed from spiritual serenity."

Perhaps we should not try to analyze humour. Yet the causes of laughter lie so deep in the human psyche, and prevailing fashions of humour are so symptomatic of the state of a society, the analysis of humour will constantly attract people who wonder what makes themselves tick. And perhaps the analysis of humour should no more spoil its enjoyment than a knowledge of how taste-buds in the mouth work destroys the pleasure of a good meal.—*Brian Stewart.*

On CBC Wednesday Night

Christopher Columbus

An Italia Prize-winning drama by CHARLES BERTIN,
produced by J. FRANK WILLIS

THEY called him a lunatic, a stupid dreamer. But have you ever wondered what sort of man it really was who chased a 20-year dream across the Atlantic into the uncharted wilderness, and had the magnetism to persuade 210 other dare-devils to try it with him? Every schoolboy knows that in 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue, but not everyone is so familiar with the complex personality of this strange Genoese who was made a hero and died in neglect.

French writer Charles Bertin explored the character of Columbus, revealed it appealingly in a radio play about the last few days of his journey to America. The play, which won an Italia Award, has been translated by Ivor Barry for presentation on CBC Wednesday Night this week. Production will be by a veteran of sea tales, J. Frank Willis.

Comor as Columbus

All the action takes place on board Columbus' ship, the little *Santa Maria*. Henry Comor will be heard as the 41-year-old Columbus, Joseph Shaw as his 23-year-old second-in-command, Norman Ettliger and Ivor Barry as captains of the two ships accompanying the *Santa Maria*, Tony Van Bridge as the ship's chaplain, and Jack Scott, Jeremy Wilkin, John Drainie, Alan King, Alan Nunn and Sean Mulcahy as sailors.

There have been several portraits of Columbus, but historians doubt their authenticity. Las Casas, Spanish missionary and historian, says: "He had a figure that was

above medium height, a countenance long and imposing, an aquiline nose, clear blue eyes, a light complexion, tinged with red, beard and hair blond in youth but early turned to white."

As Bertin points out, Columbus was a man of sudden impulses, with a vivid imagination, was deeply religious but very human in his frequent slips from grace. Like many impetuous men of action he was big-hearted, but inclined to be irritable when things and people oppressed him.

To Sea at 14

His father was involved in the weaving and wool-combing business, and young Christopher was hauled in to help until, at 14, he went to sea, a journey to Syria and Turkey that opened his eyes to the wonders beyond his home shores. At 26 he visited England, and some historians claim he even got as far as Iceland. At 28 he married Filippa Moniz in Lisbon. For some years he had had what we would call a "travel bug." He yearned to sail across the Atlantic to see what lay beyond — whether more water or land, he meant to find out.

He began looking around for someone to finance the expedition. King John II of Portugal thought the project stuff and nonsense, so Columbus went to Spain, and there, with the help of his brother and influential churchmen, he attracted the attention of Queen Isabella. But when she heard exactly what he was up to she would have nothing to do with it. Then, for seven years Columbus went

through the frustrating experience of alternately being called genius and fool by the court. Finally Isabella and Ferdinand agreed to sanction and help finance his trip of exploration, and a few months later, August 3, 1492, Columbus set sail for the West.

Now an admiral, he commanded the little *Santa Maria*, a galleon of 200 tons burden, only 63 feet long, with a 20-foot beam—a slow, difficult-to-manoeuvre ship. If you have ever felt uneasy in a giant modern liner, you will understand how difficult it sometimes was for Columbus to keep up the courage and patience of the 120 adventurers under him. There were 50 of them aboard the *Santa Maria*, and the others were divided between the two small ships accompanying her, the *Pinta* and the *Nina*.

Last Few Days

They were three tiny vessels heading into the unknown, now battered and whirled like tops by a vicious, hungry sea, now drifting dolefully on a green mirror. When Columbus was not pitting his strength against the force of the sea he was using his wits to battle fear, boredom, homesickness, jealousy among the crew, who were not so adventurous now, after 34 days at sea.

It is at this point that Charles Bertin's play picks them up. From what they say, and leave unsaid, emerges a most intriguing portrait of Columbus, just as he was, alone, unafraid of censure of sailor, church or crown, hard in some ways, perhaps, but determined to make his dream come true. You will sail with him those last few days until the great moment when land appeared on the horizon, and he knew he had won.

So this gives us another aspect of this intriguing problem. I do not know whether I agree with Thomas that "familiar" music is automatically "popular" music, because I have very often, at a large gathering, heard groans

from the assembly when a piece of familiar music has been played and, on these occasions, it is anything but "popular". So let us have some more suggestions, please.

As I expected, the inevitable sarcastic remarks came from various readers when they read of the "champagne" theory of pop concerts. One ventured the suggestion that, if this is the true meaning of the term, Toronto has certainly never had a pop concert and is never likely to!

Performances of Beethoven's "Missa Solemnis" (Saturday, April 30, on the New York Philharmonic broadcast) are very rare these days. In fact they have always been rare, chiefly on account of the terrible difficulties of the work. There are few singers who can cope with the solo parts and few choirs which can give an adequate account of

Paradox of Plenty

An 8-week series on the problems of overabundance in Canada

JUST two or three years ago "uranium" was a magic word, carrying with it the fever another word, "gold," once aroused. Today, the magic has gone out of "uranium." Not, like gold, because it is getting more and more difficult to find. But because there is too much of it. That is the paradox, the *Paradox of Plenty*, which a new series of radio programs of that name will investigate, Tuesday nights on the Trans-Canada Network, replacing *Project '60*.

The story really begins back in 1945 when The Bomb on Hiroshima opened up the Atomic Age. Uranium was the best available fissionable material, and it turned out that Canada had large quantities of it. Tens of millions of dollars were poured into exploration and equipment to extract the mineral. Britain and the United States signed long term contracts, with options for renewal. A whole town, Elliot Lake, sprang up in Northern Ontario, built on uranium as Kitimat was built on aluminum. And if the military demand for uranium faltered, it seemed the ever in-

creasing peaceful uses of atomic energy would support the demand.

Then, late in 1959, the bad news arrived. The United States was now producing enough uranium within her borders for her needs; Britain too had an alternative supply. Neither country would pick up their options. The market for uranium shrank disastrously overnight.

The future was not altogether black. Deliveries could be stretched over a few years to soften the blow until 1966. Perhaps by then the peaceful uses for atomic energy would swell sufficiently to renew the demand. But certainly, weaker units in the industry would have to merge; less economic mines close down, and the whole future of Elliot Lake as a town was doubtful.

"On this first program in *Paradox of Plenty* we shall go to Elliot Lake and talk to miners, housewives and mine managers," said Thom Benson, who is producing the program. "We'll get the views on future plans from the mining companies and discuss possible markets with top U.S. and Canadian officials. And whatever bright

birds. Today's program should help us to realize how helpful birds are to man. Each year there is considerable loss of crop and garden produce due to the destructive habits of rodents such as mice, gophers and rats. These animals multiply very quickly and can do great damage if they are not controlled. Some of the useful "controlling agents" in this regard are the birds that keep rodents in check. When you realize that an intensive study of meadow mice carried on by the United States Biological Service concluded that a single pair of mice could have a million off-spring in a year, you will understand how important the *rodent-eating birds* are. Some of these useful birds are:

Owls - Sawwhet, short-eared, burrowing, long-eared and horned.

Hawks - Swainson's, prairie falcon, marsh harrier, and red tail.

spots there are, we will certainly investigate them."

"Uranium is not the only natural resource in Canada which faces a paradox of plenty," said Dick Halled, who is co-ordinating the series. "The next seven programs will investigate the problems of some of our other resources."

Here is a list of programs:

May 3: *Uranium*, produced by Thom Benson; May 10: *Oil*, Ron Hunka; May 17: *Coal*, Keith Barry; May 24: *Natural Gas*, Ron Hunka; May 31: *Gold*, Thom Benson; June 7: *Iron Ore*, Robert Brazil; June 14: *Forests*, John Robertson; June 21: *Atlantic Fish*, Doug Brophy.

We asked the various producers to tell us something of their plans.

"A few years ago the Prairie nights were turned into day by gigantic flaming torches as the natural gas from the oil wells was piped off and burnt - misunderstood, unwanted, a useless by-product," says Ron Hunka of CBC Winnipeg, speaking of the May 10 program.

"Today, natural gas and its associated industry stands to be the most rapidly growing part of the Canadian economy. Giant trenches have been ripped over the mountains and the plains for pipelines carrying gigantic amounts of this power to the cities of Canada. But despite the vast growth of industry depending on natural gas, hundreds of proven wells known to contain untold millions of cubic feet of gas are waiting to be exploited. And in Ottawa, the National Energy Board is studying the problems involved, problems which will be discussed on this program."

Of the program on coal, producer Keith Barry, of Halifax, says: "Coal fits our *Paradox of Plenty* theme because millions of tons of coal lie untouched in Can-

ada, yet we are using less and less of it. One problem is this: our mines lie on the eastern and western extremities of the nation while the major market areas are in the centre. Despite subsidies on transportation coal comes expensive to Central Canada.

"Further, demand for coal is dwindling. Until 1950, railways used 25 per cent of Canada's coal output; with the conversion to diesel that market has gone. Domestic heating and other markets are dwindling because of inroads by oil, surplus hydro and natural gas. And just a couple of years ago 98 per cent of Ontario's coal was imported from the U.S. Stockpiles of coal grow - recently Sidney had a pile of one million tons - and an unemployment crisis is imminent. That is the paradox of plenty in coal."

"Over the past ten years Canadian oil industry has spent one and a-half million dollars a day to find, produce, treat, then sell oil and its many products," said Ron Hunka, producer of the oil program. "Today, some 12 years after the Leduc discovery of oil, the industry in Canada faces many problems.

"The main one is probably the simplest: finding the oil. But there are others. Canadian wells can produce more than a million barrels a day, but their output is less than half this. One reason is the imports of crude oil from Venezuela and the United States. But some operators claim the problem is an administrative one. Whatever the cause, more oil is being found. The problem is: what will we do with it?"

Robert Brazil, of CBC Quebec, said of this program, "Since the

beginning of the industrial age, nations have measured their economic strength by the quantity of steel produced. Canada's iron mining, still in its infancy, has vast quantities of ore available. And its future may well determine the future of Canada.

"In the program we'll trace the growth of the industry and take a brief look at some of the projects now in the development stage. A few figures will point up the tremendous growth of the industry over the past few years. In 1950 we produced under two million tons of iron ore; in 1959, 25 million tons, which is an increase of nine million tons over 1958. Last year's production was worth 180 million dollars."

At the moment, Canada is exporting iron ore. When new processes become available, we may start producing pig iron and even steel. To achieve this, with the consequent increase in employment is perhaps a major problem facing this industry.

A Forest is a Long Time Growing is the suggested title for the program produced by John Robertson, of CBC Vancouver. "We will show the immense potential of this renewable resource," he said, "and the future growth of the forest industry, provided adequate financial investment is made in the forests today. Canada could cut three times the amount of trees, doubling the size of the industry. Yet present methods are said to be cutting the industry out of business."

For centuries, fishing was the major Newfoundland industry, the only one which, by its exports, brought in new wealth. The industry reached its peak in 1919-20, and then plunged downhill under the impact of world depression. Later, the production of fresh

frozen fillets helped restore it in 1939, two million pounds; today, closer to sixty million pounds.

"We have been brought up to believe that regardless of such changes in resources and processes, the inexhaustible supply of fish so close to our shores must represent the future basis of our wealth," said Doug Brophy, of CBC St. John's. "Lately, this has become a debatable question. Trawlers from many nations now congest the Grand Banks; the Portuguese say their last year's production was substantially below average.

"Most of the inshore fishermen depend still on the trap voyage from which they have to gain a year's income from four to six week's intensive fishing. Last year the trap voyages were almost complete failures in many regions. The fishing industry, in its boats and its plants, employs nearly 20,000 people. And not the least of its problems is the fact that it depends very largely on one market: the United States."

If we had no other record than the world's greatest dictionary, the tremendous multi-volume Oxford English Dictionary, we could still trace the history of England. We would know of its economics, its political systems, its wars, its discoveries, and its contact with other peoples just by examining its vocabulary.—Prof. M. H. Scargill, on "Our Special Speaker."

note of pride and satisfaction in his voice.

How does Feldbrill (or any conductor) assess the worth of a new composition and decide which composers warrant repeat performances?

That, says Mr. Feldbrill, is an easy question. You *play* the music and *listen* to it, and you *observe*.

You play the music. "Many people expect that the conductor is not only a performer but also an oracle. They think he can look at a new score that has never been played before and predict whether it will be a 'masterpiece' or not. This is impossible. Music is an art of hearing. You cannot conjure up the sounds just by studying the score; the best you can get this way is a rough estimate. Mahler, who was both a great composer and a great conductor, said that he never really knew how his *own* works would sound until he had performed them, and only after he had performed them was he ready to revise them."

You observe. "As a performer I depend on the response of audiences *over a number of years and after repeated hearings*, to help me decide which composers are going to make the grade. Composers, too, should take note of the response to their music over a period of time."

Mr. Feldbrill does not pretend that he has not been criticized for his ideas. He has been told that he would "kill the box-office," and that Winnipeg audiences weren't sophisticated enough to accept modern music. And he has proved both charges to be wrong. Another charge, which is more difficult to disprove in the same practical sort of way, is that modern music is all "derivative," and that the orchestra's time would therefore be better spent performing the masterworks from which the new works have been "derived."

"I love that charge because it makes me laugh," says Feldbrill. "What music isn't at least partially derivative? A composer can't deny his past or his national heritage. Everything he writes is based on

what he's heard; it's part of his being. The music of the greatest composers could be called "derivative," but so what? Is Beethoven's music any less great because of the obvious influence of Haydn in it?"

Nevertheless, he asserts, although a good composer borrows from the past, at the same time he stamps his works with his own individual trade mark. The Toronto composer Harry Somers is one of the Canadians who has achieved this, he feels. A 12-tone composition by Somers, for example, no more sounds like a 12-tone composition by Schönberg than Beethoven sounds like Haydn.

What about Mr. Feldbrill's own preferences in modern music?

"Actually," he says, "at the moment I'm one of those lucky people who couldn't care less if a work is written in the tone-row system or constructed entirely of four notes. But I must admit a tremendous pull towards the music of Bartok. I feel that more than anyone else he has succeeded in combining the elements of his own country's music with the internationally accepted modern techniques." In Canada, Mr. Feldbrill says, this is more difficult because there are so many national backgrounds. The only "purely national" music is that of the Eskimos and Indians, and some composers (notably John Weinzweig) have actually tried to use these native melodies in their compositions.

But no matter how Canadian composers decide to write, the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra will continue to play their works regularly. For, Mr. Feldbrill says, "As a Canadian performer in Canada I feel a great responsibility to the Canadian composer of symphonic music. A pianist-composer can play his own works, a composer of chamber music can easily get a good quartet to play his works for him — even if only privately. But unless Canadian conductors help the writer of orchestral music he may never really get a chance to hear and assess his own work."

Finally — "Just as we've put forward Canadian performers who

don't have to take a back seat to anyone, there is no reason why our composers shouldn't compare with the finest in the world.

"But their music has to be *played* if it is to be recognized, and we can't expect conductors of other countries to do it first."

The CBC broadcasts of the Winnipeg Symphony's concerts always include the contemporary work, and tangible evidence that Mr. Feldbrill's performances of Canadian works are attracting attention came recently in the form of a letter from Frank P. Gill, music editor of the Detroit Times. "Just recently," he wrote, "on a Sunday evening the CBC broadcast from Winnipeg a new work by a Canadian composer, Barbara Pentland. Quite a few people in this area who heard it, myself included, were very much impressed by the work, and I wonder whether it is possible to obtain a tape of this performance for private listening. We know all too few Canadian compositions in the United States, and I would be interested in writing something on this and on the composer if you can furnish me with any details about her."

It is interesting to note that the work Mr. Gill refers to is the one Mr. Feldbrill describes as "the most *avant garde* I have ever conducted in Winnipeg." A modern work apparently need not be innocuous or "safe" to attract attention.

What about the orchestra members? "Generally, orchestral players are not too different from audiences, and think they would like to be comfortable and never strained too much. Actually, however, orchestral musicians (like audiences) find that they don't like a regular bland diet and are quite likely to complain if they are subject to 'the same old things' all the time."

During rehearsal of a new work, Mr. Feldbrill sometimes tells his players: "I know you may not like this piece, but we've got to play it as well as we can."

"No orchestra has ever let me down on a new work," says Feldbrill.

But if the day comes when certain Canadian works become such standard repertoire pieces that they can be heard as often as necessary to understand them, one conductor and his orchestra may be responsible.
