Brendan O'Dowda, Irish balladeer who makes his North American debut May 22 on the Joan Fairfax Show, will appear later on the Ed Sullivan and other American TV programs.

Patricia Parr, 22-year-old Toronto pianist, has been added to the list of participants appearing on the "Hour of Stars" to be presented on CBC-TV June 8. Also featured are baritone Robert Merrill and Canadian soprano Teresa Stratas, both of the Metropolitan Opera, David Adams and Lois Smith of the National Ballet, and Winnipeg Symphony conductor Victor Feldbrill.

Michael Craig, British film star, is leading man in "The Beckoning Hill" by Arthur Murphy of Halifax, May 29, on G.M. Presents. Martha Buhs, who came to Canada to appear at the Stratford Festival last summer, makes her Canadian television debut in the same play.

"A Tongue of Silver," a comic Irish fantasy of fraud and faith by Michael Dyne, will be produced by Norman Campbell on Ford Startime May 31. Dorothy Sayers' drama of human pride and divine intervention, "The Zeal of Thy House," will be produced from Toronto by Ronald Weyman on June 7.

Sidney James, who plays the role of Tony Hancock's buddy on "Hancock's Half Hour" Saturdays on CBC-TV, realizes the value of his unusual face. "I've had to work on it a bit," he says. "Late nights, card games, plenty of gin, irregular eating hours, and worrying about the tax man. I guess you might call me a character actor who's done a lot of hard work to get that character."

Frances Hyland, Saskatchewan-born actress, plays an Irish role for the second time in her career this Sunday (May 22) in James Costigan's "A Wind From the South." Her first was in "The Gentle Gunman" several years ago on CBC-TV.

Wayne and Shuster were in the control room when Hon. Alvin Hamilton, minister of northern affairs and national resources, pulled the switch illuminating a giant electric sign May 5 in Times Square, New York. The sign, advertising "Canada . . . Wonderful World at Your Doorstep," was

rented by the Government Travel Bureau for 13 weeks. Mr. Hamilton invited the Canadian comedians to the opening while they were in New York preparing for their May 8 appearance on the Ed Sullivan Show.

A collie named Tara makes his TV debut May 29 in Arthur Murphy's "The Beckoning Hill" on G.M. Presents. Tara was discovered — and "auditioned" — by producer Paul Almond. "Tara has posed for a few advertisements in the past, but he hasn't any show experience," says his owner, Miss Nora Sullivan.

The largest TV audience ever obtained by the CBC for any program was recorded during the third game of the Stanley Cup Hockey finals this year. A survey indicated an audience of 7,907,000 viewers — 73.7 per cent of all English-speaking homes equipped with a television set, and 82 per cent of all French-speaking homes with TV. The survey covered five cities in the French network and 13 in the English network.

The 18 Ohio Awards won by CBC for cultural, educational and public service programs (see last week's CBC Times) were from an available 32. In radio, CBC won seven first awards, three honourable mentions, and a special award (CBS won one first and one honourable mention, NBC won one first and two honourable mentions, the Mutual Broadcasting System won two honourable mentions). In television CBC won four first awards and three honourable mentions (CBS won four firsts and one honourable mention, NBC won one first, and ABC won one honourable mention).

Several smaller communities will be represented on Talent Caravan June 2. Technical difficulties make it impossible to originate the travelling program from certain places, so contestants from these places will travel to Toronto to take part in the series. Winners of the regional semi-finals, held in Winnipeg, Halifax, Quebec and Vancouver, will compete in a three-program final series June 9, 16 and 23. Winners of these shows will appear on the final awards shows on June 30.


IN 1937, Bertrand Russell wrote his famous "obituary" in which he stated what he thought *The Times* of London would say of him at the time of his death:

"By the death of the third Earl of Russell, or Bertrand, Russell as he preferred to call himself, at the age of ninety, a link with a very distant past is severed. His grandfather, Lord John Russell, the Victorian Prime Minister, visited Napoleon in Elba; his maternal grandmother was a friend of the Young Pretender's widow. In his youth he did work of importance in mathematical logic, but his eccentric attitude during the first world war revealed a lack of balanced judgment which increasingly affected his later writings.

"In the second world war he took no public part, having escaped to a neutral country just before its outbreak. In private conversations he was wont to say that homicidal lunatics were well employed in killing one another, but that sensible people would keep out of their way while they were doing it. Fortunately this outlook, which is reminiscent of Bentham, has become rare in this age which recognizes that heroism has a value independent of its utility.

"True, much of what was once the civilized world lies in ruins, but no right thinking person can admit that those who died for the right in this great struggle have died in vain.

"His life, for all its waywardness, had a certain anachronistic consistency, reminiscent of that of the aristocratic rebels of the early 19th century. His principles were curious but such as they were they governed his actions. In private life he showed none of the acerbities that marred his writings, but was a genial conversationalist, not devoid of human sympathy. He had many friends, but had survived almost all of them. Nevertheless to those who remained he appeared in extreme old age full of enjoyment, no doubt owing in large measure to his invariable health, for politically during his last years he was as isolated as Milton after the Restoration. He

was the last survivor of a dead epoch."

This week, Earl Russell celebrates his 88th birthday. He still shows acerbity in his writings, yet is "not devoid of human sympathy;" he is still "wayward," though his "curious principles" continue to govern his actions.

Nevertheless, some of his 1937 forecasts were not accurate. He did not take a neutral attitude when the second world war arrived two years later; indeed, he saw in Naziism an enemy of freedom which had to be destroyed, even if that implied war, as of course it did. Again, after world war two, Russell advocated the forcing of Russia, by war if necessary, to adopt the Baruch proposals for the internationalization of nuclear weapons. But once Russia had nuclear arms, Russell felt that nuclear war was the worst fate that could befall mankind, that such a war should be avoided at all costs.

This utilitarian approach to international moral problems would appeal to many of the English

philosophers whose intellectual traditions Russell has so brilliantly carried on and extended. It could be formulated: War is necessary if and only if it contributes to the greatest happiness of the greatest numbers in the long run; a nuclear war could make such a contribution only in the sense that by eliminating mankind, it would certainly eliminate unhappiness; therefore, nuclear war is not only unnecessary, it is absurd — which is just about the worst indictment in the utilitarian's moral code.

This brings Russell the full circle, to the position he took during World War One. Then he was fully opposed to the war, and was imprisoned, largely for that opposition. "I thought, as a politician, and I still think, that it would have been very much better for the world if Britain had remained neutral and the Germans had won a quick victory," Russell has said, "we should not have had either the Nazis or the communists if that had happened; because they were both products of the first world

The Bride Arrived on Time

*Thanks to the miracle of videotape—and some careful planning—
Canadian and U.S. viewers saw the Royal Wedding at
approximately the same time of day as Britons*

IT was just before 7 o'clock (EDT) on the morning of Friday, May 6, at the London (England) airport. CBC technicians were carefully watching the videotape recorders as they picked up the marriage ceremonies, direct from Westminster Abbey, of H.R.H. Princess Margaret and Mr. Antony Armstrong-Jones. The recording apparatus, all 10 tons of it, had been specially flown from Canada to do this job.

Outside on the runway, the crew of the Vulcan R.A.F. jet bomber had their plane ready for flight. Nearby, another Vulcan was being checked over by mechanics. Both planes had a 3,200-mile flight ahead of them—across the Atlantic to the R.C.A.F. station at St. Hubert, P.Q.

The CBC technicians watching the monitors at the airport saw the actual ceremony finish, the bride and groom move in to sign the register.

The technicians moved quickly and efficiently, removed the tape and rushed it to the waiting plane.

The Vulcan moved out to take-off position, waited for permission from the control tower to take off, and at 7:05 a.m. permission came, and the first tapes of the Royal Wedding were on their way to Canada.

Back inside, the CBC technicians were already recording the second half of the celebrations.

In St. Hubert, equipment was ready to feed the videotapes to the CBC-TV networks the minute they arrived. At Malton Airport, Toronto, a car was standing by to rush the tapes to CBLT in case the weather should close in over St. Hubert. It was soon obvious that the Vulcans would not need to be redirected.

Already, of course, many Canadians had heard a description of the celebrations and the wedding ceremony itself, on CBC's English and French radio networks. Starting at 5:30 a.m. (EDT) Byng Whittaker, BBC commentators, and French - Canadian commentators had given Canadians a vivid description of the ceremony as it took place.

At 8:06 a.m. (EDT) the second Vulcan, carrying the remaining recording of the celebrations left London. Now, with both Vulcans streaking across the Atlantic, Thom Benson, CBC general co-ordinator in England, Roland Giguere, in charge of the French broadcast, and CBC engineer S. S. Wilson, could relax a little, the rest was up to the Vulcans and the CBC people in St. Hubert.

It was exactly 1:03 p.m.—five hours and 58 minutes and 3,200 miles from London airport, that the first Vulcan landed at St. Hubert. Eleven minutes later millions of viewers across Canada were watching the beginning of the wedding ceremonies—less than eight hours after they started.

CBC also provided the U.S. networks with their main coverage of the Royal Wedding.

The King of Instruments

About CBC's series by distinguished Canadian organists and this week's featured guest—HUGH McLEAN

THE organ recitals heard Sundays on CBC radio are designed to bring to Canadian listeners the best Canadian organists. This week the guest artist is Hugh McLean of Vancouver. Mr. McLean will play two works by Maurice Durufle: *Scherzo, Op. 2*, and *Prelude, Adagio et Choral Varie*.

Mr. McLean, who has been heard on many CBC programs, was born in Winnipeg in 1930 and educated there. He began learning the piano when he was five years old, and the organ when he was 13. He was only 15 when he had his first church appointment.

In 1947 McLean went to Vancouver as organist at the Canadian Memorial Church. His musicianship was soon recognized with a scholarship in 1949 to the Royal College of Music in England. At the Royal College he studied piano with Arthur Benjamin, the British pianist and composer who died just recently. He studied the organ under Sir William Harris, organist at St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

In 1951 McLean won still another scholarship. This one, the Dr. A. H. Mann organ students' scholarship, took him to King's College, Cambridge. He graduated from King's as a Bachelor of Music. He is also a Fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

While McLean was in Britain in 1955, Sir Arthur Bliss, Master of the Queen's Music, approached him to perform the Malcolm Arnold organ concerto with the London Philharmonic orchestra in the Royal Festival Hall before Her Majesty the Queen. Sir Adrian Boult was the conductor. Two years after this performance, McLean returned to Britain from Canada specially to play the same work with the composer himself conducting the Philharmonia orchestra.

McLean is particularly interested in 17th century organ music. This

interest began some years ago when he was asked to make a recording of the music of Purcell. Searching for an authoritative edition, McLean found there was none. He went ahead with more research and finally produced his own.

McLean's interests centre mainly round music. As a hobby he collects old music manuscripts and first edition books. He is particularly proud of two of the best known works of John Baskerville in his library: one is Baskerville's *Virgil (1757)* and the other is his *Book of Common Prayer (1761)*. His library also contains the full scores of two Lully operas published by Ballard in the early 18th century in Paris.

Maurice Durufle, whose works McLean will play, is a French composer and organist at Saint-Etienne-Du-Mont. M. Durufle was born in 1902, was a pupil at the choir school of Rouen Cathedral, then studied in Paris from 1919. In 1929 and again in 1930 he won the first prizes offered by Les Amis de l'Orgue. He has also been or-

ganist at Notre Dame and has taught at the Paris Conservatoire.

Following is a list of organists who will be heard on succeeding Sunday mornings:

May 29: Maitland Farmer, organist at All Saints' Cathedral, Halifax, will give an all-Widor program.

June 5: Hugh Bancroft, organist at All Saints' Anglican Cathedral at Edmonton.

June 12: Gerald Wheeler, organist at St. Matthew's Anglican Church in Ottawa, will play selections by Balbastre and Healey Willan.

June 19: Bernard Legace, organist at Ste. Cixte Church in Montreal and Professor of Music at the Quebec Provincial Conservatory, will play 16th and 17th century music.

June 26: Peter Hurford, organist at St. Alban's Cathedral, England, ending a North American tour, will conclude the series in a recital from Toronto.

war. The war would have been brief; there would have been nothing like so much destruction."

This fluctuation in Russell's attitude to war seems inconsistent and contradictory until the utilitarianism underlying it is understood. Then it can be made quite consistent.

Nevertheless — as Russell, the logician, quite well knows — consistency is not enough. Completeness, too, is an attribute desirable in any intellectual system. It is doubtful whether the rather glib explanation Russell offers for the benefits of neutrality in the first world war really takes into account the full complexity of the factors involved. And even many of Russell's admirers find this type of simplicity a little embarrassing.

Consistent or not, Russell has always been willing to accept the consequences of his views, whether these consequences are intellectual, moral or physical. Asked about these days during the first world war when he was deprived of his Fellowship at Trinity College, Russell has said: "I wasn't actually pelted with rotten eggs but I had an almost worse experience. I was at a meeting of pacifists at a church and it was stormed by a mixture of colonial troops and drunken viragos. The drunken viragos came in bearing boards full of rusty nails with which they clamped everybody on the head, and the colonial soldiers looked on and applauded them, and the police looked on and did nothing. Women had all their clothes torn off their backs and were badly mauled, and the viragos with rusty nails were about to attack me — I didn't quite know what one did about this — when someone went up to the police and said, 'Look, you really ought to stop those women, you know; he's a distinguished writer.' 'Oh,' said the police. 'Yes, he's a well-known philosopher.' 'Oh,' said the police. 'And he's the brother of an earl.' And then the police rushed in and saved me."

BERTRAND RUSSELL

Russell did not always have his religious scepticism nor his zest for living. One time, asked his favourite hymn, he offered "Weary of earth and laden with my sin." He was six years old at the time.

On the other hand, from his earliest days he took pleasure from the things of the mind; and mathematics in particular had an early appeal for him. "I remember I had a new tutor once who didn't know how much I knew, and I spun a penny, and he said, 'Do you know why that penny spins?' I said, 'Yes, because I make a couple with my fingers,' and he said, 'What do you know about couples?' 'Oh I know all about couples.'" — At that time, Russell was 14 years old.

Not the least attractive of Russell's qualities is his wit. "Perhaps it is the essence of a wise social system to label a number of harmless actions 'Sin,' but tolerate those who perform them. In this way the pleasure of wickedness can be obtained without harm to anyone."

Historian Philip Toynbee, in a review of Russell's book *Why I Am Not a Christian*, suggests that "In this quotation we listen, with delight, surely, to the Voltairean Russell, an urbane but deadly mocker."

Toynbee goes on to suggest that however skilful may be Russell the philosopher, however humane Russell the man, yet when it comes to moral absolutes, Russell flounders. For Russell, unlike his utilitarian forbears, maintains that cruelty is a detestable evil, in and for itself, and not because it might in the long run detract from the sum total of human happiness. But if this is so, suggests Toynbee, "then it is hard to see where this absolute comes from unless from something or someone outside and superior to ourselves."

As a logician and mathematician, the work of Russell is undoubtedly monumental. His purely philosophical works have been more open to criticism by professional philosophers. It has been said of him that, while his influence has been enormous, Russell belongs to a school of philosophy whose basic tenet is that truth belongs to no one man or no one system, and perhaps the greatest tribute he could have, philosophically, is the inclusion of Russellian ideas in the larger, anonymous body of truth. If this is so, Russell may best be known to future generations as a pamphleteer against the H-bomb. It is a reputation which would probably please him.



What is common to the Welsh, and characteristic of them as a people, is a delight in self-expression. A tongue-tied Welshman is almost a contradiction in terms. They are sociable, renowned for their hospitality, eager and sprightly in conversation, interested in things of the mind and only too willing to discuss them. This adds considerably to the pleasure of visiting their country, for they come more than halfway towards the stranger. Proud, yes: arrogant, no. Quick in the uptake: slow to wrath, but mighty fighters when they are driven to it. In all this, they haven't changed much since Shakespeare's day.—Wyn Griffith, Vice Chairman of the Arts Council of Great Britain on BBC.

MARY LIZ SHOW and OPEN HOUSE to mark coming of age of Volunteer Bureau of Winnipeg

SPECIAL guest on the *Mary Liz Show* this Thursday is the Dowager Marchioness of Reading, whose pioneering efforts brought a great organization — the Women's Voluntary Services in Britain — into being thousands of miles from Winnipeg.

Lady Reading will be in Winnipeg to take part in the celebration of the 21st anniversary of the Volunteer Bureau of the Welfare Council of Greater Winnipeg, one of many organizations modeled after the one founded by Lady Reading.

A film of an address by Lady Reading, given at the Volunteer Bureau's anniversary party Wednesday Night at the Winnipeg Civic Auditorium, will be seen Friday on *Open House*. (For more details on this segment of Friday's *Open House*, see program notes, pages 16-17).

Lady Reading was born in Constantinople in 1894. During the First World War she worked as a V.A.D. with the British Red Cross

Society. In 1931, the year following her marriage to Lord Reading, she became head of the Personal Service League, which she reorganized to supply clothing to unemployed people in the distressed areas of Britain. During World War II, as chairman of the Women's Voluntary Services for Civil Defence, Lady Reading worked unceasingly to make British women aware not only of their responsibilities, but also of their ability to accept them.

Following the war, the Secretary of State for Home Affairs requested that the W.V.S. continue, to deal with problems of the post-war period. Since that time it has been an active instrument in assisting the network of social services throughout Britain.

Lady Reading has not channeled all her energies in one direction. In 1935 she served on the Ullswater Royal Commission on Broadcasting. Later she was appointed a member of the British

Broadcasting Corporation's advisory Council, and in 1946 she became a governor of the BBC and served as its vice-chairman until 1950. She also organized Women's Home Industries, a non-profit making company to assist the dollar drive in Great Britain by providing an outlet through which the work of expert needlewomen could be marketed. W.H.I. is today known for its beautiful products which are sold by leading fashion houses throughout the world.

Another of her interests was Britain's housing situation. Lady Reading has served on the Central Housing Advisory Committee, the Bailey Committee on Housing Interiors, and sub-committees dealing with Rural Housing. Standards of Fitness for Habitation, and Slum Clearance. She has also served on the Factory and Welfare Board of the Ministry of Labour and the National Advisory Committee on employment of older men and women.

In 1941 Lady Reading was appointed a Dame of the Order of the British Empire, and in 1944 was raised to Dame Grand Cross of the Order. In 1958 she was created one of the first Life Peers, and became one of the first four women to take a seat in the House of Lords. In 1947 Lady Reading was made Hon. D. Litt. of Reading University, and in 1951 Dame of Justice and Grace of the Order of St. John.

Lady Reading has often visited the United States to speak on Britain's voluntary work. On one of her visits she addressed all the state directors of Civil Defence. American honours which she has received include the American Red Cross Civilian Service Bar and Silver Medal, the Chi-Omega National Achievement Award, and Honourary Doctor of Laws Degrees from Smith College and Yale University.

IN A MANNER OF SPEAKING

About a new Sunday feature and its host

EACH year the major recording companies put out many discs featuring the spoken word—from Hugh Griffiths reading Dylan Thomas' *Return to Swansea*, a reading of Milton's famous pamphlet on censorship called *Aeropagistica*, to a conversation between American iconoclast H. L. Mencken and a Baltimore Sun reporter.

Normal radio schedules do not have a place for these recordings. So CBC Trans-Canada recently began a new Sunday evening program called *In a Manner of Speaking*. The first program featured the recordings just mentioned.

"I'll be introducing the records and linking them with some continuity," says Hugh Webster, who arranges the program. "For instance, I explained that this conversation with Mencken is the only one in existence. Mencken hated radio and electronic gimmicks and was persuaded to make the recording only with a little flattery, by arguing that it would be a record for posterity rather than mere entertainment."

We asked Webster the aims of the program. "Essentially I'm trying to let listeners hear men with something to say saying it, men who were really committed to what they are saying. Nowadays we seem to have a perverse admiration for the strong silent man when in fact such men are only silent because they have nothing to say. On the other hand we also admire men

—or pay big money to men—who stand up and talk a great deal without believing a word they say themselves, and knowing that the public doesn't believe them either. Politicians and commercial announcers, for instance.

"The sort of men that listeners will hear on this program would not understand either of these attitudes," Webster went on. "They believe passionately and stood up in public and said so. Their intellectual activity was not confined to crossword puzzles. I'll be ranging from BBC recordings of men like Shaw and Russell to CBC recordings of great journalists like the late Matthew Halton."

In 1948, after several years with the Fleet Air Arm of the Royal Navy, Edinburgh-born Hugh Webster came to Canada because his family was coming here. He had no idea of taking up acting; in fact, he had rather vague plans to be an artist. For two years he earned a living in any way he could: as a lineman with the Ontario Hydro, clearing bush, truck driver, taxi-driver, and so on.

Then he joined the YMCA so he could use the gym and the pool but instead joined, on impulse, a drama group, read for a part in Agatha Christie's *Ten Little Indians*, and got it. This led to two more roles that summer of 1948-49: *Tons of Money* at the "Y" and *Berkley Square* at Hart House.

By now Webster knew what he wanted to do, and decided he would have to learn his profession from the bottom. A scholarship to the Sterndale Bennett theatre school paid for his tuition but he still had to eat. This he achieved by working as a copy-boy at the *Globe and Mail*, as a bell-hop at Wasaga beach during the summer, and by teaching other students.

Looking back on those early years, Webster recalls that he

MUSIC ON RADIO

By BOYD NEEL

THIS is certainly Tchaikovsky week. We have not had much of this composer's work lately and some of the pieces to be heard this week on CBC are not those which are commonly played.

Tchaikovsky is almost an unknown composer. This may sound a strange statement, but if each one of us asks himself how many of the Russian master's works he knows, the number will turn out to be extremely small. Yet his output was enormous.

The Fifth Symphony is to be heard on Saturday (May 21) from New York and the Second Symphony from Winnipeg on Sunday evening. This latter is one of his most delightful pieces and should be heard far more often than it is. On Tuesday evening on the Dominion Network we can hear two movements from the Third Suite in G—the *Elegy* and *Theme and Variations*. The Variations are often played apart from the Suite and have become well known in the concert hall, but the other three movements are hardly known at all, so that this chance of hearing the *Elegy* should be taken by all lovers of this composer. In the same program we can hear the Symphonic Ballad *The Voyevoda*. This has nothing to do with the Tchaikovsky opera of the same title, which was written much earlier.

The Voyevoda is a fine work and deserves more frequent performance, but it is only by a stroke of luck that there are ever any performances of it at all. The story is this: It had its first performance at one of Siloti's concerts. Tchaikovsky was asked to conduct, and during the concert he had one of his bad nervous attacks (he used

At this same concert we can hear the *Serenade Melancolique* for violin and orchestra, which is also a piece worth hearing now and then.

It is extraordinary how the public seems willing to hear the same few works of this Russian master over and over again. For instance, why is the first piano concerto always played and hardly ever the second or third, both of which are by no means negligible compositions? Again, why are only the Variations from the Third Suite ever normally heard, when all three Suites contain much magnificent music which, I am sure, the average listener would love, did he but know it. The Introduction and Fugue of the First Suite is one of Tchaikovsky's finest movements and the Scherzo Burlesque of the Second Suite is one of the most exhilarating pieces of music that I know, containing parts for four piano accordions, as well as all the usual orchestral instruments.

Regarding my remarks on "sacred" music last week, somebody has suggested that the definition is extremely easy, it is all music written to be performed in church. Now, as the Oxford Dictionary tells us that sacred means "esteemed especially dear or acceptable to a deity," I am afraid I cannot accept this definition, because we have all heard much music in church which could not by any possible stretch of the imagination be esteemed by any deity whatsoever, and would certainly not be acceptable, so poor is a lot of stuff we hear at the average church services. Therefore, I am afraid that this definition just won't do and I ask for further enlightenment from readers.
