

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
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IBSEN ON TELEVISION

About CBC-TV's "Hedda Gabler" with some opinions about television in general

DURING the last hundred years of theatre in Europe and America, Henrik Ibsen, as much as any one else, has been the "players' playwright" of the performing artists. Since his first dramas began to appear on Norwegian stages in the eighteen-fifties, hundreds of eager actors and actresses have been schooled in his roles; many have risen to eminence, a few to greatness or even immortality, as interpreters of those vivid characters whose names are household words in the world of the stage. To impersonate Peer Gynt or Mrs. Alving has become an ambition, a goal, a yardstick of achievement, comparable to playing Hamlet or Lady Macbeth. Well executed, such roles constitute a badge of artistic merit, prized by their winners beyond the mundane rewards of a popular box office success.

Since the advent of Ibsen, many schools of dramatic literature, each with its variety of style in acting and staging, have come and gone in a procession of successive "isms." Repeatedly, bold protagonists of the latest fashion have declared Ibsen outmoded, *passé*, dead; but the old master has stubbornly refused to be laid. Both in the repertory theatres of Europe and in periodic revivals on Broadway and elsewhere, he has remained vigorously and fruitfully alive.

Here in Canada, we have recently experienced a noteworthy Ibsen revival in the dramatic productions of CBC-TV: the current season alone has brought *The Wild Duck*, *A Doll's House*, *An Enemy of the People* and *Hedda Gabler*. It is probably not without significance that these TV productions were preceded by some memorable radio productions of plays by Ibsen—*Ghosts*, *Little Eyolf*, *An Enemy of the People*, *The Wild Duck*, *Peer Gynt*, *A Doll's House*, and *The Master Builder*—which served to condition both public and, to some extent, performers.

The modern social dramas of Ibsen—and, indeed, similar plays by such

dramatists as Gerhart Hauptmann and Bernard Shaw—are of course ideally suited for TV production: a small cast; a simple interior setting, usually a drawing room; an uncomplicated plot; a dramatic conflict in which the forces of human character are decisive; a terse, crisp dialogue which none the less stirs the spectator's intellect as well as his emotions; and all of it as a rule easily condensed into a show of one and a half to two hours duration. While we are profoundly grateful to the CBC and to the small band of dedicated performers who have given us a few such plays, we are bound to ask: why have we not been getting more?

Of course, one can understand that a TV producer must on occasion chafe under the restrictions imposed by the technical limitations of his medium and be tempted to stray beyond the present boundaries of that medium. Furthermore, every form of art must have freedom to experiment, and to fail occasionally, if it is to stay healthy. One cannot escape the feeling, however, that the ventures into large and elaborate spectacles, which have proved so disappointing on our 21-inch screens, have been imitations of bigger and better American spectacles rather than original Canadian experimentations. Let us not be misled by what is possible in melodrama: We accept a colourless miniature view of them that hills as a tolerably adequate backdrop for a Matt Dillon western, in which the legs of galloping horses seem happily to be less susceptible to peripheral distortion than are the legs of chorus girls. (A

passionate lover of horses might disagree, but most TV viewers would probably consider verisimilitude in the other kind of legs more important.) Similarly, we accept a fuzzy shot of Central Park or Times Square in a Mike Hammer eastern. Why? Because in both cases the backdrop is little more than a diagrammatic aid to plotting the source and trajectory of the next bullet, or a necessary locus to facilitate the entrance or exit of a badman, lawman, thug or dame. We don't care if a Colorado hill looks like a lump of haggis, or if the Times Building wobbles slightly, because the business at hand makes performers and viewers equally oblivious to the mood of their milieu. On the other hand, we have every right to be extremely critical of an attempt to evoke the mood of Catfish Row which, as viewed on our TV screen recently, fell decidedly short of what the occasion demanded.

Or take ballet on TV: a solo, a *pas de deux*—delightful; five or six dancers, three or four couples—yes, especially if they are as good as the excellent Alan Lund Dancers, and presented against simple backgrounds. In the case of the principals of this troupe, of course, one sees not only the projection of the moment, but colourful memories of past performances that go all the way back to the Navy Show of the last war. Similarly, the projection of a familiar ballet like *Swan Lake* or *Giselle* will, if well executed, be suffused by pleasant memories of other performances. But such charitably nostalgic double-takes have a decidedly limited application. A really large ballet ensemble or an extended chorus line will invariably present the dancers' legs as a lot of wriggling, stunted carrots which can afford the viewers no pleasure whatever.

Settings can offend just as badly. From some of the most highly touted variety shows seen recently, one re-

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calls with a shudder several elaborately contrived settings—confections, rather, like a pastry cook's nightmare or the mangled remains of one of those plugs for salad dressing—with a swarm of diminutive forms, supposed to be girls, squirming among the vitiated vegetables, festooned on fairy ladders, or making a cute display of wriggling their stunted carrots upside down through individual rectangle apertures; and all of this in dim, drab, depressing black and white.

Until we get colour TV, and picture production of an entirely different order of excellence, let us leave the large and elaborate spectacle shows to the revolving stage of the legitimate theatre and to the colour photography and wide screens of the cinema, and concentrate talents and funds on the things TV can do well—like Shaw's *Candida* and Ibsen's *Hedda Gabler*.

It is possible that some of the foregoing critical remarks concern shows which were produced in the United States. One cannot always be certain,

tuning in casually. Wherever produced, however, such items form a part of the restricted TV diet of the prairie dwellers, whose opinion of them may interest the dietitian, CBC.

Hedda Gabler

Having enjoyed *An Enemy of the People* so much (for a few trifling reservations, see *CBC Times*, Mailbag, April 3-9, p. 35), I came to *Hedda Gabler* with even greater expectations. While seeing the show, however, I didn't think it gave me quite the same measure of satisfaction that I got from the *Enemy*. There were times when the performers seemed to be talking past rather than to each other, and times when the picture just wasn't adequate. Hedda descending the staircase—she did just that, she wasn't merely coming downstairs—was too indistinct to serve its purpose, on my screen at any rate. Perhaps it was my tubes (the set's, that is, though when in a carping mood, one should never ignore the possibility of deficiencies in the spectator) or, perhaps

I was seized by nostalgic yearning for some Heddas of the past. Anyhow, I kept wanting my Hedda in three dimensions, in colour, in the flesh. When that happens on a TV show, the fault may lie in ourselves, in the camera work, or in the acting. Worst of all, I thought she moved in me only the "fear" half of the spectator's reaction as prescribed by Aristotle. I feared for Hedda herself, and for the characters who were exposed to her; but I couldn't pity her as much as she deserves. She wasn't the Hedda I wanted. My Hedda—and I think, Ibsen's—may seem cold, but she is not frigid. The warmth in her is latent, inhibited. She must convince every male in the audience that *he*, given the chance, could have elicited that warmth; and she must make every female resent and fear her possession of it, and pity her failure to realize it. Hedda Gabler must be desirable, and not only to the Judge Bracks in the audience.

The next morning I felt much better about her. In retrospect I realized that I had not seen Eva Le Gallienne's or anybody else's Hedda; I had seen Joan Greenwood's, who was only then coming into focus for me. As she did, I found I could pity her: the rigid, defensive shoulders; the proud head; the pathetic, drawn mouth—hungry, yet doomed to starve, because it cannot dare to give completely (the upper lip especially was wonderfully expressive). Despite her flirtatious past, her marriage to Tesman and her impending motherhood, Hedda is still in a sense the "demi-virgin as defined by de Maupassant. Joan Greenwood's interpretation *had* managed to convey the essential fact that Hedda's snobbery, selfishness, cruelty and cowardice are only incidental symptoms. Poor Hedda! Yes, she was desirable, after all.

Judge Brack—clever, calculating, urbane, "humane", and as selfish and cowardly as Hedda herself, is a not unfamiliar codfish Casanova of the northerly latitudes. A very grateful rôle, it demands a precise balance: just enough Casanova to make his attractiveness for Hedda seem plausible, offset by enough codfish (flavoured with the merest suspicion of the bounder) to make Hedda choose the bullet when the chips are down. Altogether, quite a fellow. Mavor Moore brought him off rather well, on the whole. In one vital respect I thought his interpretation fell a little short: neither on the night of the performance nor in later retrospect did he convince me that he really wanted

Hedda. For that reason he failed to earn the modicum of pity that should be his portion when Hedda's suicide snatches the toothsome bait away from his waiting jaws.

Douglas Rain's Tesman was appropriately dull and colourless, but almost too much so, in my opinion. The humorous aspects of Tesman's behaviour constitute the only "comic relief" in the play and can make the rôle quite rewarding, if handled cautiously. To put it paradoxically, his colourlessness can be made sufficiently colourful to earn a number of laughs and chuckles, without any danger of lapsing into the farcical. It is a rôle for a comedian who can keep himself firmly in hand.

Leo Ciceri's Lövborg was adequate, but unfortunately an important one of his few and brief scenes was spoiled for him. In TV, even more so than on the regular stage, one must be extremely careful not to let a prop or a costume steal a scene. This is what happened when Lövborg returned to Tesman's at the end of the third act: to impress the spectators with the rowdiness of the "soirée" at Diana's, Lövborg's coat had been torn to tatters, one sleeve having been ripped off entirely, so he looked like a scarecrow. Most of his scene with Hedda was shown as a close-up, with him closer to the camera and half turning his back to it, making the most of the grotesquely exaggerated costume. As a result, the spectator paid attention to the costume, and to nothing else.

Thea Elvstead and Aunt Julia should be played as soft foils to the brittle Hedda. Both are real persons, or course, with strong personalities of their own. But both radiate that feminine warmth which poor Hedda has never found a way to release. I felt that this fact had not been realized sufficiently and that, as a consequence, Hedda did not enjoy the full measure of support she should have had from these two rôles.

Generally speaking, the diction of all performers was of that high degree of excellence which one has now come to expect as a matter of course in better CBC shows. And this time the Norwegian names were handled with faultless and authoritative competence. As for the text. I was never conscious of it, a sign that Lister Sinclair had done a good job of adapting. Happily he had shown the good sense of leaving hallowed phrases like "People don't do such things" unchanged.

U.K. Film Star In First CBC Role

"IT'S VERY hard to interest an audience in a good play. Slip on a banana peel and you'll have them falling out of their seats with laughter. It's bad enough in the theatre. You can't work in a realistic way on stage. You have to sell to the gallery all the time, so there's a lack of truth in your performance. But believe me, it's much harder working in films and TV."

That was Michael Craig speaking, and from the couple of hours we spent with him over lunch the other day, we learned that he is a man who likes a challenge.

Craig, as you probably know, is one of Britain's top screen stars,

and CBC-TV producer Paul Almond was delighted to be able to sign him up for the leading role of a sheep farmer in *The Beckoning Hill*, to be presented on G.M. Presents this Sunday.

Craig is 32 years old, six feet tall, and well-built. He has a casual, offhand manner, and did not try to bypass any questions we shot at him. His smile does not come often. When it does he has a habit of narrowing his eyes and sliding them round with a devilish glance that is pure Irish. His father is a Dubliner.

We asked Craig if he would solve a mystery for us. A few years ago we had seen him in a British film called *High Tide at Noon*, supposedly set in Cape Breton (but actually shot in Devonshire, he told us), in which he spoke with what sounded to us like an unmis-

The Canadian Army Abroad

This Sunday, CBC-TV presents a 30-minute filmed documentary called *Canada's Army Abroad*. The film takes viewers to Germany to see the Canadian army units there, and also, more briefly, to the Middle East and to Indo-China.

In the Middle East, Canada is one of the seven nations supplying troops to the United Nations' Emergency Force. On the tense border between Israel and Egypt, 200 miles east of Cairo, mines lie hidden and deadly in the shifting sands, a relic of the battlefields of '57.

Many thousands of miles away, in Saigon, another Canadian force, working with other members of the

International Commission, inspects all incoming ships for possible illegal entry of arms. In company with communist North Vietnamese officials, a team crosses to the north side of the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam, on routine patrol. They cross the Se Ben Hoi River with its sampans and barges, then they walk—an Indian, a Pole, a Vietnamese and a Canadian — through the rice paddies and the lonely jungle paths, just a routine patrol. Courtesies are elaborate, always carefully observed by both sides. So far, the Commission seems to have been successful in keeping the peace.

And then to West Germany, 80 miles from the Iron Curtain close to the historic town of Soest, where the headquarters of the Canadian Brigade is located. The Canadian soldiers and their families here spend about two and a half million dollars a year, bringing economic stability to the predominantly agricultural community. A few miles away from the Canadian camp is a German orphanage, the children "adopted" by the Canadians, mainly single men who, led by the chaplain, completely renovated the orphanage and its playgrounds in their spare time. The children of Canadian families, more than 4,000 of them, are taught by Canadian teachers, but in their curriculum—based on those of Ontario and Quebec — is room for instruction about local German history and customs.

The film shows a Provost rider awaiting rendezvous, with the troop of Ferret scout cars returning from a dawn patrol, Canada Day being celebrated in Germany by 5,000 officers and men, exercises at a training centre once a training ground for Hitler's armies and now echoing to the sound of a Canadian F.N. gun.

"In Western Germany, front line troops prepare for any emergency," says the narrator of *Canada's Army Abroad*. "In the jungles of Indo-China, on the sands of the Middle East, they help to smooth a path to peace. In far-off lands, 6,500 men keep a ceaseless vigil—Canada's Army Abroad."

"The small band of dedicated performers" at CBC, to whom I referred earlier, have shown what they can do. If they are permitted to give us more plays of this sort, we shall have much pleasure in store. TV theatre is a very demanding medium in which mistakes are costly and the minutiae of the performer's technique supremely important. To watch—and I mean really watch—good TV theatre is great fun; also to write about it. More Canadians ought to discover that. We make ardent and articulate hockey fans—why not ardent and articulate TV theatre fans? The twitch of a lip or the inflection of a phrase can be quite as exciting as the stick-handling of Rocket Richard. Just watch.

varied plays as *Tiger at the Gates*, *The Cocktail Party*, and *The Importance of Being Earnest*. Frances Hyland's latest starring role on CBC-TV was in *A Wind From The South*, May 22 on G.M. Presents.

In a collection called *The Best Television Plays of 1957*, the editor, Florence Britton, says of *A Tongue of Silver*, "This lovely and, for television, unique Irish folksong play was completely ignored by the major night-time hour programs. *Matinee* (on which it first appeared) is to be applauded for going off the beaten track and daring to do what others wouldn't touch."

Although he had lived in the States since 1939 Michael Dyne

was born in London in 1918 and educated in England and Switzerland. After acting experience on the London stage he went to Hollywood where he appeared in many movies. Ambitious to be a writer resulted in a stage play — unproduced — which boiled down to a TV play called *Pontius Pilate*. On the strength of this he was taken to New York and, in just a few years, had amassed more than seventy TV plays to his credit on American and British television. Apart from his many TV originals, Dyne has adapted for television a number of stories by Henry James including *The Aspern Papers*, *The Pupil*, *The American* and *The Turn of the Screw*. Dyne has a valuable collection of Oriental art, which is his hobby, and to which he devotes so much time that at the writing of *A Tongue of Silver* he did not even possess a TV set.

takably Canadian accent. As you will have noticed, most Europeans why try to imitate the way we Canadians speak usually make the mistake of barking their words and burring their R's too much, ending up with a cross between Groucho Marx and Harry Lauder. Craig didn't in the movie. We decided then that he must be a Canadian actor having a fling at work overseas. But the next time we saw him in a film he had an English accent—with no slips, either. How come? we asked.

"Well," he said, "I was born in Poona, India, where my father was in the Indian Army. When I was three we moved to England, and then in 1939 my brother and two sisters and I were sent to Toronto — I went to Upper Canada College, right through the war.

This is my first trip back in 15 years."

We wanted to know if he had gone back to England at the end of the war, and he said "No, I joined the merchant navy, went to sea for five years and by the time I was 21 had seen just about everywhere but the Far East and Australia. I was on tankers, mostly. Eventually I got a bit sick of the sea. And when I was spending three months in London at the King Edward VII Nautical College studying for my second mate's certificate—my first time ashore for any length of time in a big city as an adult—I liked it so well I decided to give up the sea for a while.

"There was a tremendous boom in the theatre just then, repertory companies were enormously popular, TV was getting into its stride, and some of my friends were having a fling at acting. I decided to have a go, too. You get a whole lot of time for reading when you're a seaman, you know. A ship's library is often pretty well stocked with good stuff. I had started to read Shakespeare and Shaw in my teens and developed a strong interest in the theatre. But I never really thought about films at the time."

How did a young, unknown seaman manage to break into the theatre? He wrote dozens of letters to theatre managers from Land's End to John O'Groats, en-

closing his picture, and a month later began work with a small repertory company in Surrey.

"I was in rep, for five years—played everything from Uncle Tom to a "Who's for tennis" juvenile. About 200 plays. Didn't make much money but I had a ball, and no responsibilities. It was when I was playing in *Man About the House* in Oxford in 1954 that an agent brought some film people to see me and signed me up with J. Arthur Rank. I was diabolical in my first few films." He made a wry face. "The camera inhibits you, but if you work every day on a picture for 14 weeks, you start to develop the necessary confidence. But it's not easy. In the theatre you can fluff a line or make some other small mistake. The camera won't let you get away with a thing."

House of Secrets, directed by Guy Green, was Craig's first big success. We asked him what films he had most enjoyed making, and he said he got a big kick out of *The Silent Enemy* in which he played a frogman (he insists on doing under-water shots and rough-and-tumble scenes himself), and *Upstairs and Downstairs*, currently playing in Canada, which not only included Craig's small son Stephen among its leading performers, but also a well-known Canadian actor, Austin Willis. Craig has high praise for Willis' acting ability.

We asked him to rattle off the names of some of his other films and he mentioned *Campbell's Kingdom*, *Nor the Moon by Night*, *Saphire*, and his two latest: *Cone*

of *Silence* with George Sanders, Peter Cushing, Bernard Lee and Andre Morell, and *Doctor in Love*. But most important in Craig's estimation is, *The Angry Silence*. He not only played in it but wrote the original story with his brother Richard Gregson. (Gregson, he told us, is the family name. He took Craig as his professional name because there was already a Michael Gregson in showbusiness over there).

What's so special about *The Angry Silence*? we asked. "Well," he said, finishing off his steak, "when I was out in Libya filming *Sea of Sand* with Richard Attenborough, Dickie told me he had just formed a film company called Beaver Films Limited, with Brian Forbes, and they were looking for a subject for their first movie. I had an idea already percolating and Dickie liked it, so I write my brother in London to get cracking on research, and when I came back we wrote it. Guy Green, who is the best lighting and cameraman in England, directed it. Forbes did the shooting script. It's a tricky, off-beat subject, so it was hard to finance, but Dickie, Brian, Guy and I all worked for expenses and percentages of the profits. Dickie stars in it, too, along with Pier Angeli, who does a brilliant job in a role quite different for her. And we're proud of the fact that when it opened in London recently it got the best notices of any film, anywhere."

Craig said he has aspirations to be a director, but would also like to produce. "The day of the producer has come back, and it's about time. For a long time a producer was little more than an accountant working in the wilderness of a big studio. I think that if you were fired with enthusiasm for a subject, producing could be terribly satisfying."

Craig said he was most impressed with the CBC's facilities in Toronto, particularly the bright, clean, adequate space for rehearsing. "In London," he said ruefully, "we rehearse TV shows in church halls, gyms, and make-shift places. And there isn't the same pace as



there is here. I find doing *The Beckoning Hill* quite exhilarating. And visiting Toronto is rather like coming home. I have two sisters living here."

We wondered how busy film-making actually kept a big box-office attraction like Michael Craig, and, as in our whole conversation, he gave us a direct answer. "I make about three or four films a year, and, with three or four TV shows thrown in that keeps me working about 45 to 45 weeks. Long periods of not working such as I can have could make me lazy, so I write in self-defence. My brother and I team up for film outlines and scripts. And when I'm not writing I'm usually playing cricket or golf. I'm mad on sport, actually—go to lots of boxing and football games. And I like to play poker, either at home with friends or when I'm filming on location." He gave one of his slow grins. "I always play for stakes a bit higher than I can afford. Otherwise it's no fun."

Eccentrics, Oddballs And Just Plain Nuts

common—they are determined not to give in to the hum-drum. In England, they might be called eccentrics and as such would be heirs to an honoured heritage. Hollywood might call them "kooks" and a New York cab driver might snort

"nuts!" Another word could be "oddballs."

Not so long ago there was a good deal of worry about the eccentrics were disappearing all over the world, victims of a mundane and conformist society of I.B.M. punch cards and organization men.

I'm happy to report that such fears are unwarranted. There are plenty of oddballs left, especially in New York where I live and work. When I was gathering material for *Venture's* documentary on *Oddballs and Attitudes* I found there were two New York radio programs devoted to the far out, a society which spent much of its time tracing oddballs to their lairs and countless organizations of the offbeat.

I spent an evening with the New York chapter of Civilian

MUSIC ON RADIO

By BOYD NEEL

A few weeks ago I was commenting on the almost complete neglect of the string quartets of Schubert, and this could really apply to Schumann as well, although he only wrote three works in this form. On Sunday from Montreal we can hear the A minor Quartet, Opus 41, No. 1, which is probably the most often played of the three quartets, when they are played at all. It seems a great shame that such beautiful music is so seldom heard.

Schumann wrote no chamber music until he was thirty-two years of age, and just before embarking on the quartets, he wrote to Clara: "In the compositions I write now I hear many things I can hardly indicate. . . . It is especially remarkable how my ideas are almost all canonic, and how I always discover the imitating voices later, often in inversion, in changed rhythms, etc.;" and then he goes on to tell her that he is working at string quartets. A year later he speaks of two string quartets he has just written "which are just as good as Haydn," so you see that young Schumann had quite a good

opinion of himself. A few months later he writes to a friend: "I am living through some of Beethoven's last quartets, even to the love and hate that are in them." This is a most interesting remark and bears quite a bit of thinking about when we are listening to those strange outpourings of Beethoven's last, completely deaf, days.

Whatever may be the cause that inspired Schumann's quartets, the fact remains that they are among the most beautiful ever written. We know that he studied those of Mozart and Beethoven very closely because there is a record of him ordering the scores of all their works in this form and shutting himself away with them for two months. Apparently he made many revisions to the works at various times. Mendelssohn, to whom they were dedicated, thought they were splendid, although he sorely offended Schumann when the latter was in the throes of composing them. Apparently one day Mendelssohn asked him to go for a walk and Schumann said he was too busy on the quartets, to which Mendelssohn replied, quite innocently: "Oh, you would have been much better employed going for a

"Why, of course I do! There's a great deal of evidence to prove there really are little men. They're not green, by the way, but some reports have them wearing orange corsets."

Now I must hasten to say that Miss Davis and her friends are logical, intelligent people who laugh at anyone with a non-scientific approach.

A BEACH OF STRANGERS

About the Italia Prize-winning play by John Reeves

By JAMES BANNERMAN

NOTHING more remarkable than John Reeves' *A Beach of Strangers* has ever been broadcast on CBC Wednesday Night. This long poem, in which the special possibilities of radio are explored with great skill and originality, can properly be considered an important work of art.

That such things can be said of it would be quite enough to make it remarkable even if it had no special and distinct character of its own. But *A Beach of Strangers* has its own character, and this doesn't stand out merely as a kind of achievement in a genre—though it is certainly that among other things, and indeed an achievement in several genres at once. It has formal resemblances to some of the writing of Dylan Thomas, and T. S. Eliot, and of W. H. Auden; and here and there the resemblances go deeper than form; yet the vitality of Reeves' poem excuses it from a superficial charge of derivation. What has

happened, it seems to me, is that particular forces which have imposed various ways of expression on Thomas and Eliot and Auden have imposed them on Reeves too, and that he has expressed them in somewhat similar ways but in terms fundamentally his own.

A Beach of Strangers, is a statement about life, repeated contrapuntally and melodically, and resolved at the end in a coda of power and beauty and hope. Many passages of the poem are on the face of them flatly banal, in subject and to a considerable extent in treatment. But the face of these passages is a mask that never quite hides the vivid indistinguishable soul beneath, and never blunts the sharp private agonies and joys. It is among the excellences of *A Beach of Strangers* that it recognizes how often the food of the gods is disguised as chocolate creams or ham and eggs, and that the most cloying and synthetic soft drink, taken at a moment of illumination—or at a moment of unseen light that casts a seen and uncomprehended shadow — can be the purest nectar.

The strangers of Reeves' beach, which from internal evidence is a faintly tatty stretch of the seacoast of England, are on the whole persons it would be easy and pleasant to dismiss as of no consequence. That is to say, they could be so dismissed if Reeves hadn't seen through them and been merciful to what he saw. Because of that they are people who are neither strangers nor lightly to be brushed off. They may not be you, but I must ruefully admit that most of them are me—and that this is truest when they are least admirable.

But some of the ironically-designated strangers, and in particular an old man named Popescu, have characters and are led by motives of the highest distinction. The beach, in short, has a predictably and rightly mixed crowd of bathers; though they appear on the whole to be tormented by an unmixed urge to merge, rang-

the way the bag on an upright vacuum cleaner stays open.

Well sir, when this big tube (it's one mile in diameter) gets out near the moon, say about 200,000 miles from the earth, you throw out a sky magnetic anchor that hooks onto the moon and there you are, cosily tied to the moon with a monstrous umbilical cord. Then you start regular plane services inside the tube, just the way cars drive between Windsor and Detroit under the river.

I hope that's all quite clear to you.

Now Hans Holzer—a Broadway composer and musical comedy writer—has a different avocation. He rids haunted houses of their ghosts. In the old days, haunts were exorcised by clergymen. But Holzer is up-to-date. He psycho-analyzes them. The way he explains it is this: when you find a house that's haunted, you take a medium or "sensitive" with you to the place and make contact with the ghost. Haunting is caused by a disturbed death — a person who dies by suicide, murder, or even in a troubled state of mind can't leave the scene because he or she is pretty troubled. Holzer, when he has made contact, finds the root of the neurosis or psychosis. Then he shows the ghost how silly its fears are and the lucky shade disappears into the place wherever healthy ghosts go.

For instance, the ghost of painter John LaFarge was bothered about a painting which wasn't up to scratch. Holzer persuaded him that the work of art had been damaged by a servant and all was well.

It's easy to joke about the work of Holzer, Yun Gee and Isabel Davis, but almost all of the eccentrics, or oddballs, have a good deal of solid evidence to support their strange theories. The United States air force admits there are unidentified flying objects which might — just might — be from outer space. The question of psychic phenomena is even more bewildering. Scientists admit that

many things cannot be explained and they won't rule out the possibility of ghosts, apparitions and extra-sensory perception (ESP) and psycho-kinesis (PK). In fact, Dr. J. B. Rhine of Duke University has been carrying on ESP and PK experiments for many years.

As for Psychic Florence, the woman who solves murders by reading the psyche of suspects, there's enough evidence to support her claims that she is often consulted by the police. The New York police department won't say whether individual officers have asked Florence for help, but I saw a letter from New York, Pa., chief of police, thanking Florence for her help in solving one gruesome murder. The frightening thing to me is that if the police really do use Florence, there is an element of witchcraft in their murder investigations. Remember how we all used to shudder in those African jungle movies when the horribly-masked witch doctor pointed his lion tail at the hero? And how the hero had to summon up "white man's magic" (usually a fortuitous eclipse or comet) to confound the evil devil? But perhaps the witch doctor was psychic and was right all the time. Similarly, Florence Psychic may be dead accurate when she points an umbrella.

Long John Nebel, who runs an all-night radio show on New York's WOR, has interviewed almost every prominent "far-out" individual in the United States. He has a panel of experts who generally

debunk the space travellers and psychics. But I get the impression that most of his listeners (including psychiatrists, mathematicians, foreign correspondents) wistfully want the contactees and encourters to be proven right.

Jean Shepherd, another WOR broadcaster, doesn't need flying saucer men to make his life interesting. He has always felt that people should live freer, happier lives and he believes that there are "night people and "day people." The night people are more daring, more lively and happier in his book. Once he asked his listeners to go out and fly kites in Washington Square Park. Seven hundred turned up with kites and in five minutes were dispersed by squads of police.

Another time, Jean Shepherd asked a late night audience to indicate their support. Any listeners with sports cars, he said, should drive down to Times Square and eat hot-dogs. Within an hour the Times Square area was plugged solidly with MGs, Triumphs and Thunderbirds and solemn sports car owners eating hot-dogs and listening to Jean on their auto radios.

Then there are the New York Enthusiasts, a group of 500 to 1,000 New Yorkers who regularly visit everything from Harlem evangelists to spiritualist seances. These attractive and interesting people are determined that life will not be dull, and their energetic director, Hans Hacker, organizes forays into every conceivable corner of New York. What I like about them is that they are open-minded and they have fun. What I don't like about them is that they have to organize into groups to do it.

ing from a sort of starved and sniggering lubricity to a wholesome and straightforward desire.

I don't remember ever to have read a poem of unquestionable decency in which there was anything like so strong an undercurrent of rut—an instinct not as a rule counted one of the things that are fondly thought to set man apart from other animals. It seems to me to be one of the salient merits of this very meritorious work that its essential cleanliness isn't obscured by what in less honest hands than Reeves' might well be veils of shoddiness. He has now and again clothed Aphrodite in pretty cheap underwear, but has almost never let its vulgarity shroud the lovely lines of her body.

I think the quality that runs through and informs *A Beach of Strangers* is respect for its material—the human condition, so lamentable and wonderful, so bound yet so free to long for freedom. It is as I said a statement about life; and it ends, as I implied, in hope. Reeves appears to believe that it is possible for us all to feel a divine discontent at our strangerhood, and a virtue in us to strive for brotherhood instead—not the facile notion of it that makes the heart swell smugly and the eyes sting with too-ready tears, but a concept that takes into account the difficulty of reaching out to those who are nearest to us on the beach, the uncountable changes of failing to touch them even if we make the effort, and the one glorious chance that we shall succeed.

walk with us." Schumann took much umbrage at this and it was some time before the two were reconciled.

The quartets were immediately approved in the musical circles of Leipzig, but they made slow headway in other centres. The critics, especially in England, seemed to dislike them, and for a long time it was taken for granted that Schumann could not write for strings. The chief trouble with the works seems to be the passages which suggest the piano and would have probably been more effective on that instrument. Some passages were at first pronounced to be "uncomfortable" by violinists, but nowadays such things are taken for granted when players have to contend with music far more difficult than these simple sounding pieces.

Ebenezer Prout, who was always quick to find fault with anything, considered that Schumann in these works had successfully "thought quartet" and had made the strings sound "richly and characteristically." He found the music "beautiful, strongly original and very characteristic of the composer's innermost nature."

Maybe the CBC will give us the pleasure of hearing the other two string quartets at some other time.

On Sunday morning the "Three Romances," a Suite for oboe and piano, also by Schumann, can be heard. These are quite slight pieces which make companions to the three better known works for clarinet and piano. These have been described in a derogatory sense as "salon" music. It seems a pity that this term has become to mean something which is musically rather poor, because originally "salon" music was the music produced at the fashionable salons of the 18th century at which composers such as Schumann, Chopin and Liszt would introduce their works to an extremely erudite audience. Just how the term came to mean something rather cheap and nasty, I cannot say.

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Barber of Seville
