

# Twenty Years of History

*Born of a wartime need, the CBC's National News Service is marking its 20th anniversary this month. From a seed sown in the beginning by 25 news editors has grown one of the world's most reliable news services, with 200 top reporters producing 120 radio and 25 television newscasts daily*

ON JANUARY 1, 1941, the Australian navy minister announced in Melbourne that units of the Australian navy and an RAF flying boat had rescued 496 people, including 70 women and seven children, of British, French and Norwegian nationality from an island in the Bismarck Archipelago, where they had been landed December 21 as prisoners of the Germans. They were survivors of 10 ships sunk since the previous August.

With this top item of war news, Wells Ritchie, a new CBC editor, led off the 8:00 a.m. news bulletin January 1, 1941. The CBC National News Service, staffed at that time by about 25 news editors, was in operation. Dan McArthur, now director of special program projects, was the chief news editor.

Prior to the formation of the News Service, The Canadian Press news agency had provided special radio bulletins for broadcast by the CBC. When the service began operation, editors in Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver turned out three or four main radio newscasts a day from each of five geographical regions. There was no television and no International Service.

Today the News Service employs about 200 people who produce 120 radio and 25 television newscasts daily—in English and French—in 14 newsrooms from six regions, including Newfoundland which was added at Confederation, April 1, 1949. There are also several special daily and weekly news programs on both radio and television. In all, CBC News provides almost 15 per cent of all radio broadcasting time and seven per cent of TV network time.

Besides the regular service supplied, CBC News also contributes regular news bulletins to the

CBC's Northern Service which recently expanded its shortwave schedule. Originating in the newsroom at CBM, Montreal, the northern news bulletins total approximately 41 minutes nightly, including special voice reports and stories of interest to Canada's northern communities. Also carried in the Northern Service are the National News Bulletin, News Roundup, weather and sports reports.

Through the CBC International Service newsroom in Montreal, regular news bulletins go out in English, French and 14 other languages. The International Service also broadcasts news to Canadian ships at sea and to Canadian servicemen abroad.

For 20 years the original policy of the News Service had been a constant guide to the expanding service. It is a policy "based on the primary conception that this service is in the nature of a public trust; to present all the significant news of the day's happenings to Canada and abroad factually, without bias or distortion, without tendentious comment, and in a clear and unambiguous style."

In the early days, the News Service primarily depended upon copy from news agencies. With the advent of television in 1952, however, a more demanding role was necessary for CBC News. One effect was expansion of its foreign service to include five correspondents stationed in the world news centres — New York (UN), Paris (2), London and Washington—and a roving correspondent in Toronto. In addition news bureaus were established in Ottawa, London and Paris.

Whenever a major news story breaks anywhere in the world, a CBC correspondent is sent to the

On Festival '61

## One of the Most Powerful Operas Written

"BLOOD, BLOOD, blood, spattering every line. Madness, unbridled lust!" snarled the critics. And as for the crimson music, with its unaccustomed cacophony—a nightmarish marriage of horror and beauty, wild, tragic, neurotic!

The world wasn't ready for Richard Strauss' magnificent *Elektra*, forerunner of modern opera, and when it had its debut at the Dresden Opera House in 1909, it shocked nearly everybody, musically and dramatically. But now, as one modern critic puts it, "having supped full of far worse horrors, we recognize it as one of the most powerful and poignant among the operas of this century."

Monday night on CBC-TV *Festival '61* presents the North American premiere of *Elektra* in a new English translation by Franz Kraemer, who will also produce and direct it. The first Canadian production of the opera in any medium, it will be presented in one act of 105 minutes in duration.

Well-known Canadian writer-commentator Lister Sinclair will introduce it in a five-minute prologue, using figures created by Canadian designer Brian Jackson to explain the story.

Starring in the title role will be U.S. soprano Virginia Gordoni, and other leading performers include Greek contralto Elena Nikolaidi, Canadian soprano Ilona Kombrink, Canadian bass baritone Victor Godfrey, and American tenor Richard Cassilly.

The Toronto Symphony Orchestra, augmented to 87 players, will be conducted by its permanent director, Walter Susskind. The strikingly simple sets, picturing the courtyard of King Agamemnon's palace at Mycene, are by Trevor Williams, and the ancient

## AROUND CBC . . .

PROBABLY HOCKEY FANS have often wondered why television does not carry a complete broadcast of N.H.L. games each Saturday night, rather than first training the cameras on the play sometime during the second period.

One fan wrote a letter recently to J. Frank Willis, whose program "In Reply" is a regular feature on CBC Radio. Said the fan: "Hockey is recognized today as Canada's national sport and as such should warrant as much TV time as, say (in the East) Big Four Football. . . . Should CBC television broadcast all of the Saturday night game it would most certainly be considered a step in the right direction by the majority of viewers."

Mr. Willis replied: ". . . There are a great many viewers who would be up in arms if we offered them 2½ hours of hockey every Saturday evening—which after all is a peak family viewing time. We think the fairest thing is to give hockey fans a good part of the game, but to leave room for other popular programs, too."

If hockey were played in the afternoon, as football often is, or if the hockey season were not so long, probably the CBC's feelings would be different, concluded Mr. Willis.

NEIL McCALLUM, a former Toronto actor now working in England, will return to star in *Night Must Fall*, the Emlyn Williams play to be seen Feb. 20 on *Festival '61*. In the TV version, adapted by Hugh Webster and produced by Eric Till, McCallum will play the sinister Danny.

ANOTHER TOP NAME from the world of acting, that of Albert Dekker, will be associated with another *Festival '61* production this season. The Broadway actor will play Henry VIII in *Royal Gambit*, by Hermann Gressieker.

GEORGE GERSHWIN died as a young man, after a songwriting career that lasted just 20 years. Yet few men have had such an influence on the field of popular music, and now, 25 years after his death, his name and songs are still on the lips of almost everyone. Two forthcoming programs, one on CBC Television and one on CBC Radio, will pay tribute to the composer, who has become associated with an era. "The Gershwin Years" on Sunday, Jan. 15, will take television viewers through the period 1916-1936, when Gershwin's music laughed and cried in tune with Americans. And Friday, Jan. 27, CBC Radio will present "The Twenty Years of Gershwin"—the composer as he is remembered by his friends.

THE TORONTO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA Pops Concerts return to CBC Radio this month, with the first program broadcast Jan. 15. They will continue to be a regular Sunday afternoon feature until early in April.

### On Pronunciation

• On *Citizen's Forum*, Mr. Troyer says "municipal" in a way which Fowler's Oxford English Dictionary says is incorrect. Correct pronunciation is "muni'cipal," and he says "municip'al." He might have found that in Webster, but Webster has no standing in the world except in the U.S., and this is not the U.S. yet, and I hope it never will be.—Dr. G. S. M., Timmins, Ont.

Ed.—We referred the matter to Warner Troyer, and this was his reply:

"Although the pronunciation I used is probably American, I have always used it, following the simple, broadcaster's rule of thumb, that the easiest pronunciation is generally the best, unless prohibited by good taste and firm grammatical rule, and is the least likely to cause a 'fluff.' Like Dr. M. I think the Great Republic to the south absorbed as much of Canada as we should let her have when she moved into Oregon in the last century."

# “One of Most Powerful Operas”

The Greek legend of the tragic fate of King Agamemnon, his wife, Klytemnestra, and their children, has inspired many writers and composers before and after Richard Strauss, including Euripides, Sophocles, Goethe, Eugene O'Neill, Gluck and Offenbach. Strauss' opera was the first product of his long and successful collaboration with librettist Hugo von Hofmannsthal, who based his drama largely on Sophocles, but modernized it by making his characters the victims of their own overpowering feelings rather than of blind fate.

The scene is some time after the Trojan war. The King has been murdered by the Queen, who has installed her lover, Aegistheus, in his place. Fearing and distrusting her daughter, Elektra, she keeps her in degradation among the slaves.

Elektra, obsessed by hate, lives only for the chance to avenge her father's death. When guilt-ridden Klytemnestra is plagued by horrible dreams, she seeks Elektra's advice, and is told that only the sacrifice of a married woman by a man of her own kin will bring her peace.

Suspecting that Elektra is referring to her, Klytemnestra fears that her banished son, Orestes, will return to kill her. She is delighted when two messengers bring news of Orestes' death. Desperate, now, Elektra plans to commit the murder herself, and asks the aid of her gentler sister, Chrysothemis. But before this can be accomplished one of the messengers (Orestes in disguise) kills both the Queen and her lover. Elektra dances in mad abandon until she falls dead under the strain of her triumph.

Franz Kraemer says that as far as he knows, “the only other English translation of *Elektra* is a very old-fashioned one done when the opera was first written, and I doubt whether it was ever used.” He worked on this new one for about three months last summer.

“The opera is very sweet,” he tells us, “because Strauss was a simple man. He wrote a most colourful score because it was at the height of his power as a revolutionary, before he mellowed down and became more conventional. Everything he is famous for is there—great melodies, great waltzes. But they are used differently. For instance, the waltzes are introduced to highlight what the performers are saying, rather than as just waltzes.”

*Elektra*, he says, “is the hardest

opera to perform in the whole literature of opera, because it has one big emotional thing to say after another, but it is ideally suited to the intimacy of television. I prefer fairly literary librettos for *Festival '61* operas. Good book operas make better TV fare. *Elektra* is good for TV because it has a smallish cast, a simple but powerful story, and it's in one act, usually Strauss is too long for TV.”

Kraemer has produced a good many operas for CBC-TV, includ-

ing *Peter Grimes*, *Carmen*, *Eugen Onegin*, *Tosca*, *The Marriage of Figaro*, *Down in the Valley*, *The Consul*, *Don Giovanni*, and *Die Fledermaus*. He was born in Vienna in 1914. He studied at the University there for two years, then as a music pupil of Alban Berg, and continued his music study in Switzerland for a year. Early in the Second World War he came to Canada and joined the CBC International Service in 1946, where he helped prepare and deliver broadcasts to Europe. Since 1952 he has been with CBC-TV, specializing in musical programs.

The score for *Elektra* is a particularly difficult one for the orchestra. Kraemer says 27 hours of rehearsal was barely enough.

When critics were nasty about the stark terror in parts of it, Strauss was unmoved. "If my plot involves a son killing his mother," he told them firmly, "I don't want



### Rohan de Saram

## He Mixes Athletics With Chamber Music

*This brilliant young 'cellist who possesses the seeds of greatness is also tops at hockey, swimming, cricket and tennis. He makes appearances on both radio and television this week*

IF SOME OF the hardest-boiled critics are right, 21-year old 'cellist Rohan de Saram is on his way to taking the world by storm. Canadian audiences will get a chance to judge for themselves this week.

On Sunday's edition of CBC-TV's *Junior Magazine*, he plays the last two *Rococo Variations* by Tchaikovsky, and the Finale from the *Unaccompanied Sonata* for 'cello by Kodaly; and in the *Distinguished Artists* series on CBC radio Tuesday night, he plays Sonata No. 3 opus 105 by Beethoven, and the Prelude and Gigue from the 'Cello Suite in C major by Bach.

The programs were recorded in the last few days of December, when de Saram was on his way to four engagements early this month with the New York Philharmonic, and marked the young 'cellist's North American debut.

De Saram had long wanted to meet another brilliant young musician, Glenn Gould, and while he was in Toronto a visit with Gould was arranged. Gould picked him up in his big, regal-looking car which he calls "Queen Mary," and the young 'cellist was greatly impressed by the softness of the upholstery and the magic of push-button windows.

At Gould's penthouse apartment they played some Beethoven together—the third and fourth sonatas—and then, as he often does for his guests, Gould played tape recordings of electronic music and satiric-

ally funny radio programs which he and three or four close friends have put together. They call themselves the Lower Rosedale Electronic Music and Shakespeare Reading Society.

De Saram was puzzled by the fact that Gould did not offer to shake hands when they met, but realized it was a precautionary measure, not bad manners, when he was told that Gould was recuperating from a dislocated shoulder which had resulted from a jovial but too hearty slap on the back.

Later we asked Gould about the visit and he told us he was greatly impressed by de Saram's playing and by his "tremendous musicality and vitality.

"He has the most fabulous concentration, which seems to be indigenous to people trained in the East. Really, it's remarkable. I'll tell you a little incident that illustrates this. He was playing some unaccompanied Bach for me when my 'phone rang. I answered, and tried to carry on a conversation with a friend, but I couldn't hear myself talk or think above the the music, so I said: 'Rohan, do you mind stopping for just a minute?' But he was so totally absorbed in his playing that he hadn't heard either the 'phone or me, and while he went on with Bach I had to take the call on an extension. He's a charming person. I liked him very much."

Pianist Leo Barkin, who accompanies de Saram in both his CBC

appearances, has performed with so many of the world's outstanding artists that he is not easily impressed. But he describes de Saram as "extraordinarily talented. There doesn't seem to be a thing he doesn't know about music.

"That Sonata we did is not often played — it's one of Beethoven's later works, and it usually takes an older person to capture its feeling, but Rohan brought it all out."

John Roberts, program organizer in the CBC music department, says: "Rohan's intellect is astonishingly developed for someone so young, and this is very much reflected in his playing. I'd say he's a front-rank 'cellist, and an extremely nice guy, too."

But music is not the only thing that de Saram shines at. He's a keen athlete—hockey, swimming, cricket, and his tennis is in the professional class. Dreamy and remote from the world as he appears sometimes, he can be as quick and light on his feet and his co-ordination is exceptional.

Rohan was born in Sheffield, Yorkshire, but spent most of his childhood in Ceylon. When he was three or four he learned to play the piano—plays it very well now, according to Leo Barkin. Then at nine, he was introduced to the 'cello. After two lessons his teacher, Polish 'cellist Martin Hohermann, told his parents that they had a prodigy on their hands. He advised the de Sarams to take Rohan to Europe to prepare for a serious music career, and suggested they get the great Pablo Casals' opinion.

When the tiny, dark-eyed boy had played for him, Casals nodded and said: "Go to it, my boy!" Encouraged by this approval by the

master, the de Sarams stinted no effort in training Rohan.

When he was 14 he made his TV debut in England in the BBC children's series *All Your Own*. His playing astonished the critics. Later he won a scholarship to Oxford. Like a lot of outstanding musicians, he is a whiz at mathematics, but at Oxford he decided to concentrate on filling the gaps in his education, and studied philosophy, history and English literature.

He has studied with Casals on several occasions for two or three months at a time, at the famous 'cellist's present abode in Puerto Rico, a beautiful new place he has built overlooking the sea, with one wall entirely of glass.

Casals has predicted a brilliant future for his young pupil. "There are few of his generation who have such gifts," he said recently.

De Saram says he realizes the extent of Casals' help "only as time goes on, through my own experience. The influence of a man like that remains all your life." He says he doesn't have too much time for study in England, but sometimes he plays to Sir John Barbirolli, who criticizes and advises him.

After his four concerts in New York in Hunter College auditorium with the Philharmonic, he gives a recital in Bermuda, and then begins a heavy concert schedule all over Britain. He hopes to return to Canada next fall.

Famed British actor Sir John Gielgud takes the lead in "Oedipus at Colonus," a Greek tragedy by Sophocles, originally broadcast by the BBC


"Here is the number of the slaughtered French."

Since then, of course, Gielgud has reached the epitome of success as an actor in the theatrical world. His career earned him a knighthood in 1953 and it has also earned him the respect and admiration of the critics and public throughout the world.

Actually, the success of Gielgud's career is not too surprising since he belongs to one of the most famous theatrical families in the world. He is the great-nephew of Ellen Terry and a close relative to two other great actresses — Mable Terry-Lewis and Phyllis Neilson-Terry.

Sir John's older brother, Val, is also a prominent personality in British drama and the head of BBC Drama (sound). Val was an actor of note before joining the BBC and has written several books, mostly on drama broadcasting, stage and

radio plays and has been a successful producer and director.

Although Sir John and Val are brothers and are both active in the theatrical world, they have seldom collaborated in play production. When they do, however, it is a memorable occasion.

Such is the case in *Oedipus at Colonus*, a 90-minute production by Val Gielgud with Sir John in the lead role. Originally broadcast on the BBC's *Third Program*, March 17, 1959, this BBC transcription will be heard on CBC Trans-Canada radio this Wednesday.

Prior to *Oedipus at Colonus*, the last time Sir John and Val worked together on a play was when Val produced *Hamlet* for radio in the 1930's with his brother in the title role. They have not acted together since 1925 when Val was his brother's understudy in *The Cherry Orchard* at the Lyric Theatre, Hammersmith, London.

*Oedipus at Colonus*, first produced in 401 B.C., was written by Sophocles when he was 90 years

# Gielgud Plays Oedipus

old. It is a work imbued with a bitterness uncharacteristic of the supposedly happy, tender poet, though uncorroborated accounts tell of strife in his last days with his son, Iophon, which may well have coloured his inspiration.

Briefly, the play deals with the tragic last days of Oedipus, blind and deserted except by his daughter Antigone. He had torn out his eyes after his horrific discovery that he had unwittingly killed his father and married his mother.

Chamber's Encyclopaedia says:

"No play of any dramatist surpasses this one for its mellow and tender beauty of language; the famous ode in which the chorus, old men of Colonnus, celebrate their native place is but one of many passages of noble poetry."

For a great actor like Sir John Gielgud, the role of Oedipus, which he had never played before the BBC production, offers magnificent opportunity for his superb gift of using language to stir the mind and thrill the heart.

The play itself is a new translation by C. A. Trypanis, professor of Byzantine and modern Greek languages and literature at Oxford. He was born at Chios in Greece and educated at Athens, Berlin and Munich Universities.

The music was specially composed by John Hotchkis.

After the BBC Third Program broadcast two years ago, the production drew critical acclaim.

The review which appeared in *The Listener* said that Val Gielgud "achieved that blending of sound, music and voices which made his earlier production (*The Persians*) so memorable."

"In *Oedipus at Colonnus*" the chorus plays a less important part and the technique of breaking its speech-in-unison might have appeared odd if the dramatic persons had not also been given depth.

"By the use of different pitches and background resonances the main parts were, however, given

the extra dimension. The result was that a play was heard which had stereophonic dimensions without the use of stereophonic devices. In the centre was the noble voice of Sir John Gielgud.

"Mr. Hotchkis, whose music made such a fine foil to the verse, did not try to force the words with his music. He simply gave them accent and thus added to the feeling of dramatic compulsion which permeated the whole work."

During the fall and winter of 1958-59, Sir John Gielgud toured North America with a one-man show, a performance which held Broadway audiences breathless. The recital was entitled *The Ages of Man* and was an anthology of readings from Shakespeare's plays and sonnets collected under the headings Youth, Manhood and Old Age.



be her first appearance in an English translation.

At the CBC's Toronto studios she rehearsed steadily for three weeks, sometimes up to 12 hours a day, and it was exhausting work, for she had to sing and act at top emotional level most of the time—she is on stage for all but seven minutes of the performance. Canadian television audiences have seen her in the leading role of Menotti's *The Saint of Bleeker Street* and as Santuzza in NBC's production of *Cavalleria Rusticana*. Three months ago she scored a success in Switzerland as Manon in Puccini's *Manon Lescaut*.

The great question whether or not the West is in a position to issue its own challenge to Communism does not concern productive techniques. It does arise, however, the moment we consider social techniques. It's here, I believe, that the Western system wins hands down; basically because, it is what Karl Popper called "an open society." By this, he meant a society which is not dominated by a belief in a single dogmatic truth—a society in which all else must be heresy. An open society admits that there may be different ways of achieving the same end; and it leaves one free to decide empirically which way is the most appropriate in a given set of circumstances. Above all, it is a society which believes that whatever else you have, you still need the hard school of experience. — Alan Day, *Reader in Economics in London University.*



**"Pulcinella"**

First performed in Paris in 1920 by the Diaghilev ballet company from Russia, "Pulcinella" was an immediate success. In Thursday's presentation of this ballet suite, the scenario will be slightly modified to present a humorous incursion in the world of the Italian Grand Opera. Todd Bolender, choreographer for the New York City Ballet, the Metropolitan Opera and the Spoleto Festivals in Italy, has set the choreography. He will also be one of the featured dancers, along with Eric Hyrst, Margaret Mercier, Milenka Niederlova, Véronique Landory, Brudon Paige and Roger Rochon. Soprano Micheline Tessier, tenor Pierre Bouquet and Basso Peter Van Ginkel will render the vocal partition.


**"Sinfonietta"**

London-born Eric Hyrst, who has set the choreography for the second dance number, "Sinfonietta," by Albert Roussel, is well-known throughout the world for his numerous successful appearances. He began his training at the age of 9, and was subsequently featured in London with the Metropolitan Ballet, in Havana with the Alicia Alonzo troupe, in America with the New York City Ballet, the Winnipeg Royal Ballet and, finally, as lead male dancer with the Grands Ballets canadiens

He will be featured with Margaret Mercier in "Sinfonietta," composed in 1934 by French composer Albert Roussel.

**Gold and Fizdale**

The names of Arthur Gold and Robert Fizdale are in the roster of top Canadian performers. The du-pianists will be featured in the last part of L'Heure du Concert, in the "Concerto for Two Pianos, Percussion and Orchestra" by the Hungarian composer Béla Bartok. Bartok's works are deeply rooted in tradition, yet he somehow managed to elude the "ordinary" and became one of the very few modern composers to impose himself on the public. He is today considered one of the five leading contemporary composers, alongside Stravinsky, Webern, Schoenberg and Alban Berg. To counteract Stravinsky's vigour and dynamism, Bartok let loose with his boundless imagination. Yet, his success was long to come,

and it is only after the end of the second world war that his works were played.

He has since become known as the most reasonable of the "new wave" composers, his works being more accessible to his audience than those of his fellow-composers.

L'Heure du Concert, is produced in Montreal by Pierre Mercure, for the CBC French TV network.

## Network Service

The CBC's microwave network, longest of its kind in the world, began on July 1, 1958, serving 38 TV stations from coast to coast. Nine other stations were served by kinescope recordings. Of the 58 TV stations and satellite transmitters on the air at present, 13 are CBC owned, and all stations serve as outlets for the national network TV programs produced through CBC. TV is available to 92 per cent of the population of Canada. On April 1, 1960, it was estimated that 3,500,000 Canadian homes had TV receivers.

scene with a cameraman to report the event through Canadian eyes. In the past year CBC reporting teams have moved in their search for news from the Congo to Cuba; covered provincial elections in Canada and the United States presidential campaign and election.

In addition to staff and freelance newsmen, CBC News has more than 100 accredited cameramen at home and overseas. While the service has become more self-dependent in recent years, the need for close alliances with major news and film agencies continues.

In another development, CBC News took a lead with private stations to establish a co-operative newsfilm agency in Canada which now has 13 members. It is also a partner with the BBC, the Australian Broadcasting Commission, the Rank Organization and Reuters News Agency in the British Commonwealth International Newsfilm Agency, a world-wide distributor of news on film.

What lies ahead for CBC News, which in 1959 was described by the CBC board of directors as "of prime importance in the over-all CBC service?"

Chief News Editor Bill Hogg has this to say:

"The last five of our 20 years—especially since the advent of television — have already set our course in accordance with public needs, and within the Corporation's national purposes and policy. The major change has been our move into the news-gathering field at home and the notable progress made in covering international events abroad. We cannot stand still; we must go forward.

"TV news must be self-reliant, must have its own reporters and cameramen on the spot when the news is breaking; the news dispatches from the agencies, while still supplying an essential basic service, are not enough. Nor, of course, can they deliver the on-the-spot voice and actuality reporting that has increasingly become the hall-mark of a good radio news operation."

## A Name for the "Baby"

*Seldom have new parents been faced with more of a dilemma than was Ross McLean in choosing a name for his "baby," the new program "Q for Quest." But, resolving to break free from CBC titling tradition, he came up with a name that is bright, yet dignified*

ASIDE FROM lending my name to a hefty nephew about a year ago I haven't had too much direct experience with the naming of children — yet. I have some names saved up in case the need arises some day. Mostly though I name programs. And that isn't easy either.

Except for *Close-Up*, all of my recent titles have vanished into limbo with the programs they described. *Tabloid* is gone now — peacefully drugged to death at the behest of a pill manufacturer. *Stopwatch and Listen* is now nothing but a trauma. *Long Shot*, the obverse of *Close-Up* in every way, is long shot. *Living*, my all-time favourite program title, is dead and forgotten. *Let's See* disappeared seven years ago.

As a program title, *Close-Up* flourished. This season a U.S. network launched a public affairs documentary series by the same name. Making a single concession to originality and applying characteristic hard-sell, the Americans added an exclamation mark to the title. *Close-Up!* is the name of their show.

Now I begin a new venture with a greater feeling of excitement than I can ever remember having before. And, of course, it must be called something.

In its planning stages during the past eight months I came to call it *Vista*, a title so wishy-washily precious and downright dreadful that I knew I would never be tempted to hang onto it. That sometimes happens to working titles.

When the time came to fix upon a replacement, I found it the hardest name search I had ever engaged in. The title needed to have dignity but not a formidable amount. It had to describe a series

that was not easily describable. I wanted it to be catchy but not too cute. It had to escape artiness. It had to break free of the recent CBC titling tradition which had led Pierre Berton to suggest a dozen new series with titles like *Pretext* and *Hindsight*.

Well, I'm darned if it accomplishes all that. My one hope is that in time it will mean what it means. We're calling the program *Q for Quest*.

I know the verb "quest" means "to go begging," thank you. But the noun means "a journey in search of adventure" and "a heroic expedition in search of a particular object." Why not take the trip with us?

## CBC Television

Saute onions in butter until shiny. Add sugar. Combine with consomme and simmer from 20-25 minutes. Serve in soup bowls and garnish with croutons, chopped onion greens and sprinkle with parmesan cheese.

- ¼ tsp. basil
