Open House

Exercise Girl Trims Own Waistline

SINCE Lorraine Thomson, a slim dancer, started demonstrating exercises twice a month on CBC-TV's Open House even *her* figure has improved.

"I've whittled an inch off my waistline since I've been the Open House exercise girl," she says. "My posture has improved and my muscles have firmed up.

"For some reason most dancers don't have very good posture. They're fine while they're dancing, but once they stop they tend to sag and slouch."

Recently, on Open House, Lorraine gave a series of exercises to help trim the figure while doing housework. She admits that before she demonstrated these exercises she didn't do them herself, but now she practices what she preaches and does them automatically.

Lorraine, a dancer on CBC since the start of television, continued dancing lessons until last year. Now, however, she finds that her exercises on Open House make it unnecessary for her to take lessons, but she still practices.

At 5 ft. 6½ ins. tall, and weighing only 120 lbs., Lorraine was worried that Open House viewers might be annoyed that such a slim girl should be demonstrating exercises to help them keep in shape.

"The reaction was the opposite," she says. "They write to say what a marvellous inspiration I give them to stick to their exercises."


Married to an investment consultant, Lorraine is the mother of two children, Francesca, nine and James, six. Francesca made a guest appearance on Open House recently when her mother demonstrated exercises for children.

Though she believes in exercises for children who need them, Lorraine thinks it unwise for children to attend dancing classes at too early an age.

"As an outlet for their excess energy and as exercise, dancing lessons are marvellous for young children, but if they intend to take dancing seriously as a career, it is better for them to start at about 10 or 12 years. At this age it will sustain their interest and they can respect the different aspects of dancing."

Lorraine was born in Regina, and started dancing when she was 15. She auditioned for the CNE Grandstand Show in 1948 and was successful.

Since then, she has danced as one of Midge Arthur's Canadettes four times and has appeared on many CBC-TV variety shows.

IT IS UNDERSTANDABLE that Betty Tomlinson, who flits from one Canadian city to another with her daily one-hour show, "Trans-Canada Matinee," longs for some of the advantages of being settled in one spot.

She would like to pursue her favourite hobby, interior decorating (turquoise is her favourite colour) if only she could stop long enough at her Toronto apartment to complete a job she started there.

She would like to join a Little Theatre group and realize her ambition to become an amateur actress. And she would like to dabble in ceramics.

But ask her why she so much enjoys her present job, and she answers without hesitation, "Because of the travel!"

Betty is in Winnipeg this month with "Trans-Canada Matinee," and we dropped in to meet her one day recently as a show drew to a close. Winding up the program, she spoke into the microphone with conversational ease that one might have expected in a chat over the back fence, rather than from a person addressing a potential audience of millions.

"We don't interview many celebrities on our program; we find most of our material through talking with the average person," she told us after the closing theme had faded out. "For instance, recently I talked with a school teacher who had developed an ingenious method of sex instruction through the use of small animals. Such people supply some of our most interesting interviews, although certainly we talk occasionally to notables such as Amita Malik, Pierrette Alarie and Leopold Simoneau, Marlene Dietrich, Michael Flanders and Gilbert Highet."

"Trans-Canada Matinee" is on the road for six months of the year, generally one month at a time, returning to Toronto for the remaining six months. Jumping from one CBC production centre to another in such a manner, Betty does her best to make each city her home while there. "I like to live in a suite, rather than a single hotel room. That way I can add personal touches to my quarters," she explains.

Betty started her CBC career in Toronto in 1951, later that year becoming women's morning commentator in Edmonton, a position she held from 1951 to 1956. Then she moved back to Toronto as producer in the public affairs department, working for such programs as Trans-Canada Matinee, This Week, Our Special Speaker, Post-News Talks and two series that now have expired, Footloose and Cross Section.

"The work was interesting, but I missed being in front of the microphone," she said. So, after two years as a producer, she went to Europe as a freelance broadcaster, sending back programs on tape. After a year, she returned to Toronto and became continuity writer and broadcaster for her present program.

In the distant future, when her last Matinee cue has been taken, when the cover is on the typewriter and the last suitcase is unpacked, what would Betty Tomlinson like to do?

Enthusiastically, she answers: "I'd like to pack up again and work my way around the world as a broadcaster!"

On Explorations

Canadian History Comes to Life

A SERIES of six half-hour films dramatizing critical moments in the lives of famous figures in Canadian history has been produced by the National Film Board for telecasts on CBC television starting April 26. The series will be televised on the weekly program Explorations and afterwards will be made available to schools throughout Canada. Produced in French as well as in English, the films will be shown also on the French CBC network at a later date.

The films dramatize events in the lives of Joseph Howe, Robert Baldwin, Louis Joseph Papineau, William Lyon Mackenzie, Lord Durham and Lord Elgin, offering intimate portraits of men who influenced developments in Canada between 1834 and 1849.

"The project was initiated two years ago to fill a need," says Julian Biggs who produced the series and directed three of the films. "There just aren't any films on Canadian history."

"Our first task was to find out if we could reconstruct history realistically," said Biggs. "We tried to pick incidents that could be realistically dramatized and that would give a fairly complete picture of the men."

Lord Elgin was chosen as the subject for a pilot film which was shot in 1959, partly on location at Villa Maria convent in the western part of Montreal. The convent occupies buildings and part of the grounds that were Lord Elgin's residence.

The film, written by M. Charles Cohen and starring Andrew Allan in the title role, is subtitled Voice of the People. It won highly favourable reaction from the Canadian Education Association, the CBC and from two historians, Maurice Careless, B.A., A.M., Ph.D., professor and chairman of the Department of History, University of Toronto, and Dr. Guy Frégault,

IN MUSIC

FIVE UNUSUAL CONCERTS

FIVE UNUSUAL programs of serious music will be presented from Vancouver on CBC-TV, beginning Sunday, April 23. *Directions in Music* will offer first a performance of *Apollo and Hyacinth*, an unorthodox work by Hans Werner Henze, one of the young *avant garde* composers of Europe. It will feature mezzo-soprano Winona Denyes and a group of nine musicians conducted by John Avison.

On April 30 the well-known Vancouver piano teacher and recitalist, Lloyd Powell, for many years professor of piano at the Royal College of Music in London, England, will talk to a studio group of music students about piano music since the time of Bach. His remarks will be illustrated with excerpts from the works of Bach, Schumann, Chopin, and Bartok.

When the London Intimate Opera Company paid a two-day visit to Vancouver late in 1960, it video-taped an informal program on opera, which will be seen May 7. Four of its members take part—musical director Anthony Hopkins, well known in Britain for his BBC talks; soprano Ann Dowdall, tenor Stephen Manton, and baritone Leyland White. Hopkins discusses various types of intimate operas, and the singers illustrate his remarks with extracts ranging from Purcell to Offenbach, including selections from Thomas Arne's *Thomas and Sally*.

The Music of James Joyce will be presented May 14. The program will include *Three Fragments* from Joyce's *Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man*, in musical settings by Matyas Seibor, Hungarian com-

poser, teacher, and colleague of many English musicians, who lived in England until his death last year. The performance will illustrate the interaction possible between music and words.

In the final program on May 21, the Vancouver Cantata Singers, conducted by Hugh McLean, will sing unaccompanied secular madrigals and part-songs generally associated with the seasons of the year and representing all centuries since the 16th. The concert was filmed in attractive settings in and around Vancouver's Stanley Park.

This Sunday's feature, *Apollo and Hyacinth*, was written in the late 1940's when its composer was in his early twenties, and is scored for mezzo-soprano, harpsichord,

and eight solo instruments. It was given its Canadian première on February 26 in CBC radio's *Concert Hall* series, conducted by John Avison. While Henze's music is not too difficult for most listeners to understand, it is like any unfamiliar work, better appreciated with a little explanation beforehand, and so Avison will precede the performance with an illustrated talk on the construction and intention of the work. It takes 15 minutes to perform and is in one movement consisting of three main sections: a slow first part, a faster, more scherzo-like middle section, and, following a harpsichord cadenza, a return to the opening theme which this time includes the

Riel: Our Last Rebel

SIR TYRONE GUTHRIE, distinguished British drama director, once called John Coulter's *Riel* "the first Canadian play of genuine

stature." It is a vividly alive portrait of one of the most controversial figures in Canadian history, Louis Riel, who was hanged in Regina for his part in the Northwest Rebellion of 1885. The play was first produced 11 years ago by the New Play Society of Toronto, and the next year it was broadcast on CBC Wednesday Night.

This Sunday *General Motors Presents* offers the first half of a two-part television adaptation. Production is by George McCowan. Bruno Gerussi plays Riel, whom Coulter calls "the John Brown of the North." Robert Christie will be seen as Sir John A. Macdonald, the role he created in the original production.

Coulter sees Riel as "a dark and haunting symbol, a most strange" (Please turn to page 15)

From his blood grew the flower that bears his name, the petals of which are marked with the mournful exclamation, Alas. In the short poem by George Trakle, the poet, while walking in the park, muses on the hyacinths blooming in front of a small Greek-like temple. This poem has been the basis of this unusual

work, which will be explained briefly by Mr. Avison before the performance.

The Nature of Things

Photosynthesis. By many steps, energy of sunlight and carbon dioxide from the atmosphere is transferred into food for plants and oxygen for the air. How this happens is explained by Dr. R. G. S. Bidwell, of the University of Toronto. Viewers will see radio-active plants revealing the nature of this process. The program points out that photosynthesis is the way in which simpler inert matter is raised to the complexity that is the essence of life.

setting of a short poem by George Trakle.

Greek mythology tells us that Hyacinth was a handsome youth who was accidentally killed by Apollo, leader of the Muses, while Apollo was teaching him to throw the discus. It is also said that Zephyrus, God of Wind, jealously deflected the discus so that it struck Hyacinth. From his spilled blood grew the hyacinth flower, the petals of which were marked with the mournful exclamation "Alas!" Hyacinth's death was celebrated by an early summer festival, called the Hyacinthis. In Trakl's poem, the poet, walking in a park, is musing on the hyacinths blooming in front of a small, Greek-like temple.

Henze has established quite a reputation outside Germany with his *Five Neapolitan Songs* and his music for the ballet *Ondine*, which had its premiere at Covent Garden two years ago. After the Second World War he studied with German composer Wolfgang Fortner and later in Paris with René Leibowitz, a leading European exponent and interpreter of dodecaphonic music. Henze's early works showed the influence of Hindemith and Stravinsky, but in 1947, with his *Violin Concerto*, he began to use the 12-tone technique, and has continued to do so in a highly original and free style ever since. Recently he has emerged as a full-fledged melodist and because of this and the influence of Italian music in his work (he has lived in Italy for several years), he has been called the least "German" of German composers. He has written a good deal of orchestral and chamber music, but his favourite medium seems to be the theatre; to it he has contributed several operas and ballets, including a new opera commissioned by the Glyndebourne Opera, with a libretto by poet W. H. Auden.

The study concerns itself mainly with the Lethbridge area of southern Alberta, where the greatest concentration of Hutterites is found.

the unsound system established by the 1791 constitutional act of William Pitt. (The act had been intended to make Canadian government more representative, although real power was still with the Executive Council, appointed by the Crown.)

The reform movement in Nova Scotia was led by Joseph Howe, publisher of *The Nova Scotian*. The film shows an incident in Howe's career in which he is summoned to court for publishing a libelous letter, submitted by a friend, which challenged the power of magistrates in Halifax. Acting as his own lawyer, Howe wins an acquittal, marking the beginning of a series of political victories which followed.

The cast: James Barron as Joseph Howe; Art Samuels as George Thompson; Basil Shapiro as Archibald; Henry Gamer as Roach; Sterndale Bennett as the Governor; William Ferguson as Haliburton, and Ursula Dapery as Susan.

and complex human being, and the most theatrical character in Canadian and perhaps in all American history. In Canada he rides our political conscience in the most extraordinary way, creating a mixture of wonder and indignation."

Reviewing the original production of the play, the Toronto *Globe and Mail* columnist Herbert Whitaker said: "Where the Coulter drama shines out as worthy of the stage is in the sharply explicit characterization, the unfailing humour, the economy of historical exposition, the swiftness and colour of the action . . . Mr. Coulter's *Riel* is an achievement . . . especially impressive to Canadians who have seen their history only through clouds of dust."

Now over 70, Coulter has been called "Canada's most neglected playwright." But recently the Canada Council awarded him a grant to complete a trilogy of plays based on historical figures, one of whom is Riel. Coulter is an Ulsterman who came to Canada at 47 for a short visit, married, and decided to stay here. He has published a dozen books of verse, novels, plays, and he wrote two of the CBC's earliest commissioned operas.

Another of his plays, *Sleep My Pretty One*, opened recently at Centre Stage, Toronto. Sir Laurence Olivier, who once showed great interest in it until casting and other problems changed his production plans, compared it to Ibsen's *Hedda Gabler*.

Leading roles in *Riel* will be played by Eric Clavering, Jean Cavall, Joseph Shaw, Scott Peters, John Vernon, Larry Mann, James Doohan, Max Helpmann, and many other well-known Canadian performers.

The Grandeur That Was Rome.

The second film in the series, *Gods and Men*, considers Roman ideas about this world and the next. The official gods of the Roman Empire, with Jupiter at their head as a sort of impersonal permanent under-secretary, were in effect a branch of the Roman civil service. Each god looked after a different department of life. Together they were all-powerful. In addition, local gods and goddesses in corners of the empire were tolerated by the imperial rulers because they knew far more about local needs and remedies than did the high-level immortals of official Rome.

Then, from the reflective mind of Asia sprang new beliefs, Mithraism and Christianity, which spread through the empire. The universality of the Christian message triumphed with the advent of Constantine the Great, whose significance as one of the gravediggers of the classical world Sir Mortimer Wheeler discusses in detail.

Our heritage from Rome is not only religious. The law of the Roman Empire played a great part in the formation of our own civilization. Sir Mortimer outlines some of the characteristic features of Roman law — its public nature, for instance, which extends into the free world's legal system today.

And what of the ordinary men and women for whom these laws were made? By grouping together an unique series of everyday activities recorded on stone relics in various museums, we find that the Romans emerge as hard-working, early risers, and as ready for dinner when the time came as we are 18 centuries later. When we look at their serious faces, full of individual character, we can almost think of them queuing for a bus or attending a political conference in Ottawa or Washington. The film ends with a view of a touching tribute



Felix Leclerc

The brilliant Canadian poet Félix Leclerc, author of countless songs about nature, virtuoso of the guitar and a booming basso, will be featured on "Music-Hall," Sunday, April 23, at 8:00 p.m. Some ten years ago, the renowned Maurice Chevalier on hearing Félix Leclerc's recordings in Paris was heard saying "his songs are like a glass of spring water on a hot day . . . in Leclerc, the world has found a new and refreshing spring of song and poetry."

Much of Leclerc's charm lies in the nature of his compositions: simple, down-to-earth meditations of a poet lost in a dream.

Raised in the midst of a large family in the Vaudreuil (Quebec) region, Félix Leclerc was born with the natural instincts of the lumberjacks, the coureurs du bois and the fishermen of his region. The verdant district of Vaudreuil is his home and always will be although he admits the need of "getting out" for inspiration, on occasional jaunts to Paris and other points in Europe.

The Canadian Troubadour, as he is often called, will sing some of his more popular compositions on Sunday's "Music-Hall." Among them: "L'eau de l'hiver" (Winter Waters); "Le roi heureux" (The Happy King); "Un petit soulier rose" (The Little Pink Slipper); "Présence"; "La danse la moins jolie" (The Ugly Dance); and "Complots d'enfants" (Childish Plots).

"Le Héros," one of the author's literary compositions for radio, will

World of Music Presents

Stratford's 63 Points of View

Performances and talks from the International Conference of Composers held at Stratford, Ont., will be presented in three programs on The World of Music, Sunday night on CBC Radio

LAST AUGUST 63 composers from 20 countries met for a week at Stratford, Ontario, to talk over the problems of their profession and to exchange 63 different and often controversial points of view about all aspects of the composer's career, particularly technical and aesthetic ones.

Some of their most convincing arguments were offered musically in five concerts of their own works, devoted to music for small orchestras, chamber music, electronic music, music for string ensemble, and for large orchestra.

It was the first large-scale International Conference of Composers ever held on this continent, and was arranged by Louis Applebaum, musical director of the Stratford Festival. Although the week was a strenuous one, it was a rousing success.

Major portions of the concerts were broadcast on CBC radio; they were also recorded by the CBC International Service, along with discussions and interviews with composers, for broadcast to overseas listeners.

Starting this week, some of the most interesting of the discussions and addresses will be presented in three broadcasts of the CBC radio series *The World of Music*, a recorded program prepared by John Beckwith which is heard Sunday nights. Beckwith is a well-known

Toronto composer, columnist, broadcaster and lecturer in the faculty of music at the University of Toronto.

The April 23 program will include an address by Alfred Frankenstein, music and art critic of the *San Francisco Chronicle*; a discussion on *The Public and the Composer*, with comments by Vassily

Kucharsky, U.S.S.R. music critic; an address from the final Conference session by Marvin Duchow, dean of music at McGill University; and recorded performances of two Canadian works: *Cello Sonata* by Otto Joachim, and *Flute Divertimento* by John Weinzweig.

The discussion of the composer and his public centres around the perennial issue of composing for public appeal versus composing for personal achievement. Frankenstein feels that the gap between the composer and his audience is 300 years old. He thinks musical criticism can help to close the gap, but insists that the music critic, if he is to be worthwhile, "must be endlessly curious about the music of our time, must constantly be exploring the new ideas and adventuring along the new frontiers of the art he has chosen to serve." Frankenstein remarks wryly that the best way for a composer to get an audience is to die.

Until his Stratford visit he had no idea that there were so many fine, enthusiastic composers in Canada. "It is not surprising that Canadians do well at a Canadian festival," he wrote in the *Toronto Star* as guest columnist during the Conference. "What is surprising is that there was a Canadian festival to start with. In 30 years' activity as music critic for U.S. newspapers, (Please turn to page 31)

Massey Lectures

THE RICH AND THE POOR

A NEW CBC public affairs venture, the *Massey Lectures*, begins Thursday night on the Trans-Canada Network. Each year, as a stimulus to thought and a contribution to knowledge, the CBC will invite an internationally distinguished scholar to broadcast a series of radio lectures giving the results of original study or research in a particular field. Former Governor-General, the Right Honourable Vincent Massey, P.C., C.H., has agreed to let his name be used for the lectures, and he will introduce the inaugural series himself.

It will consist of six half-hour talks on *The Rich Nations and the Poor Nations*, and their relation to each other, by Lady Barbara Ward Jackson, noted economist and authority on international affairs.

She is also a well-known author. Her books include *Policy for the West*, *Faith and Freedom*, *Five Ideas That Changed the World*, and, recently, *India and the West: Pattern for a Common Policy*.

Lady Jackson's lectures are subtitled: *Originations* (April 27); *The Poor Nations* (May 4); *Communism's Blue-Print* (May 11); *The Economics of Development* (May 18); *The Politics of Development* (May 25), and *Not By Bread Alone* (June 1).

Soon after the end of the series the CBC will publish the complete texts of the lectures in book form. The prices are \$1.75 for the hard-cover edition, \$1.00 for the paper-cover. Orders and enquiries should be addressed to CBC Publications, Box 500, Terminal A, Toronto 1.

"Our world today," Lady Jackson says, "is dominated by a complex and tragic division. One part of mankind has undergone the revolutions of modernization and has emerged on the other side to a pattern of great and increasing wealth. But most of the rest of mankind has yet to achieve any of the revolutions; they are caught off balance, before the great move-

ment of economic and social momentum can be launched. Their old traditional world is dying. The new radical world is not yet born. This being so, the gap between the rich and the poor has become inevitably the most tragic and urgent problem of our day."

In her first talk, on *Originations* (April 27), Lady Jackson traces four revolutionary forces which have played a dominant role in the economic growth of North Atlantic nations and which now affect the economics of the underdeveloped nations: the concept of equality between men and nations, the idea that material change can lead to a better world, the biological revolution in the form of rising world population, and the application of science and of the saving of capital to the economic processes of our life.

"In the last 20 or 30 years," she says, "the West has grown much more rapidly in internal production than it has in its need for imports. We are no longer in the hopeful

19th-century sense necessarily dragging up the rest of the world in our wake. . . . And so we no longer automatically exercise the same pull of development on the outside world as we did in our early days of growth and wealth.

"There is another big change which alters the relationship. It is simply that the West has completed its 'break-through' to modernization and the emergent countries have not. Above all they have not completed the first, hard, even merciless phase of early saving. The gap between those Western lands that are already 'in orbit' in their economic life, and those not yet off the ground, is tending at the moment to grow wider, not narrower. . . . It is very much easier for a rich man to invest and grow richer than for the poor man to begin investing at all. And this is true of nations as well. Nations that are not yet through the 'sound barrier' of saving are tending to get poorer, with the added com-



Ph.D., director of the Département d'Histoire at the Université d'Ottawa. The historians accepted an invitation to act as advisers for the entire series and the CBC undertook to televise the films.

Plans were begun for five more films to be televised this year and six for presentation in 1962.

"Our aim is to make the films understandable to children and still interesting to adults," said Biggs. "They have to be factual and realistic. Where it has been possible, the writers have used actual speeches and phrases found in the records of the men we are portraying.

"Our biggest problem has been casting. If the films were to be shown only on television and mostly to an adult audience, we wouldn't have worried about casting the same actor in different roles in the various films. But we felt that the same man portraying two or more different characters in the same series would disturb the children's identification of the historical figures. We want these figures to be very real to them."

"As it turned out, we ran through so many actors that we delayed two films until last summer so we could get new faces from the Stratford Festival." The six films used more than 200 actors.

In addition to his script on Lord Elgin, M. Charles Cohen wrote the Baldwin film; Joseph Schull wrote the scripts on Howe and Mackenzie. Guy Dufresne wrote (Please turn to page 27)

plication that meanwhile their populations are going steadily up."

In her lecture on *The Poor Nations* (May 4), Lady Jackson points out some of the social and cultural factors which impede economic development in the poor countries, not the least of which is the fact that in the past the best brains in the East have devoted themselves to spiritual rather than material matters.

"The profound reason for the contrast of wealth and poverty," she says, "lies in the fact that the various revolutions which have swept over the face of the Western world in the last 100 years exist at only a chaotic or embryonic stage among the poorer states. . . . The revolution of modernization has not yet driven these states into the contemporary world. The greatest drama of our time is that they will be swept onwards."

Lady Jackson goes on to say that "the chief aims of earlier societies were not this-worldly in our modern sense. Take, for instance, that significant Victorian phrase of 'making good.' We understand it in terms of making money, of achieving material success, in the broadest sense. In pre-modern society no such meaning could possibly have been attached to any activity though of as 'being good.'"

Lady Jackson points out that "we in the West had not too difficult a passage to modernity, certainly nothing compared with the really appalling dilemmas that are faced by the underdeveloped world today. So although we are perhaps beginning to see that they face almost insurmountable problems, I do not think that we have worked out our response or even perhaps fully measured our responsibility."

the only Canadian composer I had ever heard of was Healey Willan, whose choral works are often performed in the U.S. . . . That there was a Canadian League of Composers was completely news to me when I was invited to the Stratford Festival; that these composers practice in all manner of styles and media was an even more striking revelation.

"That Canada has excellent performing musicians is, of course, a fact of which we in the U.S. are well aware, but only by hearsay; actually to experience the elegant work of the CBC Symphony and the Stratford Festival orchestra, and of vocal soloists like Mary Simmons and conductors like Walter Susskind and Victor Feldbrill, is something else again, and very rewarding."

The April 30 program will include excerpts from an address on serialism by Ernst Krenek, a Viennese who has written more than 100 works, including the well-known operas *Jonny Strikes Up the Band* and *Karl V*. He has been living in the United States for some time, where he headed the department of music at Hamline University, St. Paul, Minnesota, for several years. Before that he was professor of music at Vassar College. The program will include a recording of his *Sestina* for voice and chamber orchestra.

Krenek will join U.S. composer George Rochberg in a discussion of serialism. Rochberg is chairman of the music department of the University of Pennsylvania, and director of publications for the Theo. Presser Company.

The discussion on serialism between the orthodox 12-toners and the total serialists was one of the liveliest of the week. Krenek is in favour of long, intensive study of traditional techniques before attempting serial writing. He suggested that "serialism, in order to be practiced and understood, demands new attitudes in nearly every sector of musical conscious-

ness. To acquire these one may just as well begin by getting rid of the old ones."

Also on the April 30 program will be an address on jazz by American composer Gunther Schuller, and a recording of one of his works. He feels that too many contemporary composers, "writing in a theoretical vacuum, produce works which can only be approximated in performance." He decried the "sham of writing one thing, getting another, and pretending that both are the same."

Schuller's address will be followed by Swedish composer Karl-Birger Blomdahl's discussion of his own highly successful "space-opera," *Aniara*, which contains some sequences of tape-recorded music.

The May 7 program includes excerpts from a spirited discussion of electronic music by Otto Luening and Edgar Varese from the States, and Canada's Hugh LeCaine, who describes an electronic music studio in Ottawa. It was pointed out to delegates that electronics are a resource, not a style. The musical illustrations at the Conference showed that the electronic music of the various composers was in essentially the same styles as the music they write for conventional instruments.



On Dominion Network

Concerts From Europe

CBC RADIO is offering music lovers a series of hour-long recorded programs featuring some of the top European orchestras, conductors and soloists.

The series, entitled *Concerts from Europe*, is heard Tuesdays on the Dominion radio network. Many of the performances which will be heard are not available on commercial records. The broadcasts are made available through the CBC International Service exchange plan whereby the CBC exchanges Canadian-performed programs with those of European broadcasting systems, and also through the BBC Transcription service.

Tuesday, April 18, the program will feature David Oistrakh, one of Russia's leading violinists. The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Norman del Mar, performs Beethoven's *Leonore No. 2*, an overture which the composer wrote in 1805 for his opera *Fidelio*.

Oistrakh, who plays Tchaikovsky's extremely difficult Violin Concerto in D, first played in Western Europe shortly after the Second World War and his performance exceeded expectations. With the reputation of being one of the world's greatest violinists, he has appeared in Britain many times since his first London engagement in 1954. In 1955 and 1956 he toured the United States.

About his playing of the work on this BBC transcription, which was taken at London's Royal Albert Hall last year, the critics said:

"The power and technical skill of his playing can still astonish, while in a work like the Tchaikovsky concerto his complete accord with the composer's ideas leads to an interpretation of rare understanding and beauty."

International Service material forms the program of April 25. The Chamber Orchestra of Dutch Radio, conducted by Roelof Krol,

performs Concerto for Four Harpsichords and orchestra in A Minor, by Bach. The Orchestre Fernand Oubradoux plays Mozart's Symphony in F Major, K. 43 and the Symphony Orchestra of Belgian Radio, conducted by Danie Sterne-

feld, performs the Violin Concerto in B Minor, by Saint-Saens.

Later in the season one of the few recordings available of Maurice Johnstone's setting of *Dover Beach* will be heard. The work, performed on a BBC transcription, features the London Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Johnstone, with baritone Hervey Alan. The orchestra will also play Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 3 in D Minor with solo pianist Daniel Wayenberg.

Dover Beach is a setting of a poem by Matthew Arnold, which impressed the composer with its topicality in the dark days of 1942. The work was first performed by the Hallé Orchestra in Manchester the following year. Johnstone was Sir Thomas Beecham's personal

assistant and secretary for three years before he joined the music staff of the BBC in 1935. In 1953 he became head of music programs.

Among the performances to be heard are recorded concerts from several European festivals such as the Ascona Festival of 1960, the Edinburgh Festival of last year and the 1960 Aldeburgh Festival.

Two successive broadcasts will feature the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by the late Sir Thomas Beecham.

If the Royal Philharmonic were an army regiment, it could well be called "Sir Thomas Beecham's Own," for he was responsible for its formation in 1947 and was its most frequent conductor until his death earlier this year. With it he toured the United States and Canada in 1949, made innumerable recordings and gave many memorable concerts. The orchestra began its long association with the Glyndebourne Opera under Sir Thomas' baton in 1948 and is now Glyndebourne's regular orchestra and one of Britain's best concert orchestras.

In the two broadcasts, the orchestra will play Haydn's Symphony No. 101 in D (The Clock); Symphony in G Minor, by Lalo; the Overture, *The Fair Melusine*, by Mendelssohn; *Musica Da Concerto* for viola and orchestra, by Ghedini; Suite from the ballet, *Carte Blanche*, by John Addison. Frederick Riddle will be a featured violist.

CHEESE PIE

PASTRY:

- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- ½ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. garlic salt
- ⅓ cup lard
- 3-4 tbs. cold water

Sift flour, salt, garlic salt. Blend in lard and add water. Mix. Chill for 10 minutes. Then roll out to fit 9" x 9" pan.

FILLING:

- 6 slices bacon
- 3 oz. desired cheese
(Swiss or cheddar)
- 4 eggs
- 1 tbs. flour
- ½ tsp. salt
- ⅛ tsp. pepper
- 2 cups cream and milk mixture
- 1 tbs. minced green pepper
- 1 tbs. minced green onion
- a pinch of cayenne pepper

Dice bacon and fry until crisp. Drain and spread in bottom of pie shell. Cover with cheese slices.

Beat eggs slightly. Add flour and all other ingredients. Pour over cheese in pie plate and bake in a 400 degree oven for 15 minutes and then in a 325 degree oven for 30 minutes or until a silver knife inserted in pie comes out clean. Serve this as a luncheon or supper dish with a tossed salad.

"Mrs. Moriarity" Lies

• The Irish as a race are not particularly thin-skinned: their history has been much too rugged for that. They are accustomed to shrug off with good-natured tolerance most of the

caricature that passes for representation of Irish life so frequently on television. However, one or two items in Here Lies Mrs. Moriarity (G.M. Presents, March 19) cannot be condoned so easily.

To represent an Irish doctor as an illiterate peasant buffoon consorting with drunks in low-down public houses crosses the limit of even Celtic patience. Irish doctors, like doctors everywhere else, are highly-educated men who are required to spend at least six years acquiring their degrees at university medical schools of international repute in Dublin, Cork and Galway. For any Irish doctor to behave as portrayed in the production would cause his name to be stricken without compunction from the register of the Medical Association of Ireland.

The second objection is to the cheap and tawdry conduct attributed to the Priest in the closing moments of the "play". This was libel on the Priesthood of the grossest kind, and will be justly resented by Irish people everywhere. As one of the nearly 2,000,000 Canadians of Irish extraction (Mr. Diefenbaker's recent estimate) I enter a vigorous protest on both these counts.

I might add in conclusion that the use of liquor at "wakes" for the dead as shown in this play is expressly forbidden by Church authorities in Ireland, and the prohibition is observed. The spectacle of dancing at the "wake" is too outlandish for comment.—R.A.N., Edmonton.
