Secret of the World

A COMIC TRAGEDY by Ted Allan about three generations of a Montreal family, which will open in London's West End next Fall, will have its world premiere on CBC Wednesday Night May 10. The author will be heard as Sam, a labour leader whose political faith is suddenly and completely shattered. Production will be by Esse W. Ljungh.

The original stage version of *The Secret of the World* goes into rehearsal in England in mid-August, with Allan playing Sam, and with Miriam Carlin, currently featured in the London laugh riot, *Fings Ain't Wot They Used Ter Be*, as his wife, Marian. After a run in the English provinces, the play will move into a London theatre.

Allan has been writing and acting in England for over seven years, but he still has strong ties with Canada, and he was anxious to have *The Secret of the World* make its debut here. He has been working on it for a long time, and to him the play is a kind of culmination of all his writing.

Alice Frick, policy editor for the CBC drama department, who has had many years' experience with radio drama scripts, says: "I've read lots of plays, but not one in which a schizo (Sam) is so completely realized in dramatic terms as this one is. It's a most moving play."

Its author was born in Montreal 45 years ago. After 12 years spent writing and roaming through Europe, the United States, Mexico, Central America and the West Indies, including fighting in the Spanish Civil War and service as correspondent and broadcaster for the American Office of War Information in the Second World War, he returned to Canada in 1949 and settled in Toronto. There he wrote magazine articles and plays for the CBC, did a little radio acting, and, in collaboration with Sydney Gordon, wrote *The Scalpel and the Sword*, a biography of Dr. Norman Bethune, the famous Canadian surgeon.

In 1954 Allan went to England "to learn as much as possible about

the theatre." He has had considerable success there, writing for the stage, radio, TV, and films, and acting on stage and in TV. His play *Double Image*, which he wrote with a Scotsman, Roger Macdougall, ran for eight months in London, as a Laurence Olivier production, was translated into French and has run in Paris as *Gog and Magog* for nearly two years, and is expected to be seen on Broadway as *Alter Ego*.

Alice Frick, who has known Allan and his work for years, says: "Quite a few of Ted's plays have been autobiographical. *The Secret of the World* seems to be a distillation of his childhood experiences and the working out of certain ideas he has had for a long time.

"To me its most important theme is the continuum of certain family things. The central character is the father, Sam, in his late forties, who has been a trade union organizer and a member of the Communist Party, but who has become disillusioned after the denunciation of Stalin and the revelation of Stalin's crimes. He finds that the union he has organized and headed for a long time is split by this turn of events. Some union members continue to be communist, but Sam feels he can't without being untrue to his ideals. Because of this he is defeated in the next union election and loses his job.

"He is also disturbed by some of his childhood memories, and by his earlier experiences in the International Brigade in the Spanish Civil War. He develops schizoid tendencies and goes off his rocker from time to time. But the play clearly indicates that his mental problems are partly caused by certain pressures and influences on him through his mother and his childhood.

"In my opinion the whole theme of the play can best be summed up with the passage in Ezekiel which says: 'The fathers have eaten sour grapes and the children's teeth are set on edge.'

Miss Frick points out that the play is not so much political as a study in family relations.

With the CBC and the Canadian Army as your hosts, you can travel the length of the Alaska Highway in just half an hour Saturday, May 20, when the Outside Broadcasts Department presents *Road to the Midnight Sun*.

Ron Hunka, Outside Broadcasts regional supervisor, and cameraman Steve Solilo last October shot some 5,000 feet of film during a two-week tour of the 1,500 mile highway, one of the world's greatest roads. They selected the best 1,200 feet of film for telecast, and producer Don Browne-Wilkinson added his talents to mould it into a program. Music is by Ted Komar.

Hunka and Solilo, both of Winnipeg, flew to Dawson Creek, B.C., officially Mile 0, and drove with one of the Canadian Army's patrolling vehicles to the northern terminal, Fairbanks, Alaska. Sixty miles out of Dawson Creek, the pavement ended, but travelling still was smooth—the road is known as the best all-weather gravel highway in the world.

Rolling through majestic mountains, the travellers soon encountered snow. "But Alaska was sunny and warm," says Hunka. "And after crossing the Alaska border, we were on pavement for the remainder of the 200 miles into Fairbanks. The pavement was rough, though, due to frost boils."

The camera visits the communities of Fort Nelson, Watson Lake and Whitehorse, as well as the terminals.

The Alaska Highway, a joint defence project of the United States and Canada, was constructed in 1942 and 1943 at an expense of \$140 millions, excluding the value of right-of-way. An immense undertaking in the short time allotted, the road conquers some of the continent's most rugged terrain. There are 133 bridges, and they total some seven miles in length.

Since 1946, the highway has been administered and maintained by the Canadian army, at a yearly cost of some \$1,400 per mile. Snowfall is light on most of the route, and usually is easily removed. Temperatures, however, vary from 90 degrees above to 60 below.

Announce Programs For Summer TV

A PANEL SHOW presenting a "Battle of the Sexes," the Wayne and Shuster series, Holiday Lodge variety shows from Vancouver and Halifax and the Jake and the Kid drama series are highlights for summer viewing on the CBC-TV network.

The summer schedule, also includes Summer Circuit, a half-hour series featuring six new dramas and repeat performances of the best plays presented on the First Person and The Unforeseen series, as well as a weekly 15-minute program of songs by balladeer Ed McCurdy.

In addition, there will be a series of special programs, with emphasis on Canadiana, and a series of public affairs programs. Programs returning for the summer include last season's popular While We're Young, Parade, Hancock's Half Hour, A Case for the Court, and drama from the United Kingdom.

The panel show, with the accent on fun, will feature four men and four women in a verbal battle of wits, and is scheduled to be seen Wednesday nights, starting July 5.

In Holiday Lodge, Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster will play social directors at a year-round resort hotel, with new guests and fresh situations confronting them each week. The series, now being filmed in Hollywood, will be seen Tuesday nights, starting June 20.

A program from Vancouver will present music popular in the '20s and '30s, and a Halifax show will take the form of a folk song jubilee.

Jake and the Kid, starring Murray Westgate as Jake, Rex Hagon as "The Kid" and Frances Tobias as Ma, is scheduled to start Friday, July 7.

Tommy Ambrose will return as singing star of While We're Young, the showcase program for young Canadian talent, starting Tuesday, June 27. Parade, with no set format, will present a wide variety of musical entertainment.

A Case for the Court, with Gil Christy as host, returns Tuesday, June 27, with real judges and

Verdi's only comic opera, *Falstaff*, will be presented Monday on Festival '61.

Festival '61 presents FALSTAFF

All The World is a Joke

"ALL THE WORLD is a joke," wrote Giuseppe Verdi in the dedication of his only comic opera, *Falstaff*. And he proved it delightfully (at least to the satisfaction of opera lovers with a taste for musical fun) in the sparkling fairy tale, the product of his old age. Monday night Festival '61 presents it in English on CBC-TV. Production will be by Franz Kraemer. It will be the longest Festival '61 so far: two-and-a-quarter hours. The orchestra will be directed by Ernesto Barbini, who conducted two earlier operas on CBC-TV—*The Barber of Seville* and *Tosca*.

The title role in *Falstaff* will be sung by Montreal baritone Louis Quilicot, who drew rave notices in February in the Covent Garden (London) première of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, a new opera by Benjamin Britten. Last October, in his Canadian Opera Company debut, Quilico gave a highly-praised interpretation of Iago in *Otello*. Later he sang two performances each of *Germont* and *Rigoletto* at New York's City Centre and *Amonasro* in Philadelphia. Before going to Covent Garden he sang in a CBC-TV production of Debussy's *Pelleas and Melisande*, made a recital tour of Ontario, and sang in Handel's *Messiah* with the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir. He hopes to sing at the Edinburgh Festival later this season.


The brilliant young Canadian soprano Ilona Kombrink will sing the role of Mistress Ford. She was last seen on CBC-TV in *Elektra* in January, and some time ago sang the leads in CBC-TV productions of *Tosca* and *Eugene Onegin*.

Youthful baritone Donald Bell, one of Canada's foremost recitalists, who has been building an important international reputation,

will be heard in his first major operatic role, as Master Ford.

The only guest from the United States will be mezzo-soprano Clara-mae Turner, appearing as Dame Quickly. Miss Turner joined the Metropolitan Opera Company in 1946 as the youngest member of the Company. Her last TV success was in *The Medium*, for which the composer, Gian Carlo Menotti, chose her to create the role of Madame Flora. She is also well known to movie audiences for her role in *Carousel*.

The role of Anne Ford will be sung by soprano Constance Lam-

Jimmy Gardiner—Fighting Farmer

JAMES GARFIELD GARDINER, someone once said, is "the sort of speaker who could read aloud the phone book and make people want to fight without knowing why they were fighting."

Add this to Gardiner's own political philosophy—"I am a partisan in that I believe in certain principles and am willing to go out and put them over on every occasion"—and you have the formula which carried this "fighting farmer" through 43 years of political service to his fellow Canadians.

The Honourable James Gardiner, whose career in politics ended in 1958 when he was defeated in his constituency during the federal election, has the reputation of being one of the best-liked politicians the Canadian Prairies ever produced. Throughout the wheat provinces he was, and in fact still is, known simply as "Jimmy."

For 22 years, Gardiner was federal minister of agriculture. Before that he was premier of Saskatchewan for five years. In 1948 he was a leading contender against Louis St. Laurent to succeed Prime Minister Mackenzie King. St. Laurent, however, was backed by King and won on the first ballot with 848 votes. Gardiner got 323 votes. He was then returned as minister of agriculture.

This Sunday, CBC Radio's *Venture* will present a 60-minute biographical interview of Gardiner. Entitled *The Fighting Farmer*, the program will recount Gardiner's life story in an interview at his farm home at Lemberg, Saskatchewan, with Dick Lillico. Producer of the program is Hugh Webster and supervising producer is Harry Boyle.

Jimmy Gardiner was born in Farquhar, near Exeter, Ontario, on November 30, 1883. His parents



JIMMY GARDINER— FIGHTING FARMER

(Continued from page 5)

were Canadian-born but of Scottish parentage and both were from farming families, and farmed themselves.

Times were hard for Ontario farmers in those days so when Gardiner was seven years old, he and his parents moved to Lincoln, Nebraska. They found, however, that farming was just as difficult there and soon returned to Ontario. Gardiner finished grade eight and then, at the age of 12, went to work on a farm, earning \$45 a year.

When he was 17 he moved to Clearwater, Manitoba, and worked on an uncle's farm, attending intermediate school in the winter. In 1904 he received his matriculation and moved to Saskatchewan, where he took a teaching course at Regina Normal School.

For the next two years, Gardiner taught in several schools throughout the province, saving money to go to the University of Manitoba. At university, he specialized in history and economics; soccer and debating were his extracurricular activities. In 1911 he received his B.A. degree and that year took part in his first political campaign, on behalf of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Upon graduation, Gardiner took a position as principal of the continuation school at Lemberg, Sask. That has been his home town ever since and he now farms there.

In 1914, Gardiner ran as a liberal candidate in a by-election and won the seat of North Qu'Appelle. In 1917, 1921, 1925, 1929 and 1934 he was returned to office and in 1922 became minister of highways and minister in charge of labour and industries. On February 26, 1926, Gardiner succeeded Charles Dunning, who went into federal politics, as premier of Saskatchewan. He held that post until September, 1929, when he resigned after his government had been defeated in the legislature.


From then until 1934, Gardiner spent his time building up a strong

CBC WINS 21 OHIO AWARDS

THE CBC has retained a wide lead over American networks in educational, cultural and public affairs programming, it was indicated at the Ohio State Awards presentations in Columbus April 28th.

Of 62 prizes for which it was eligible, CBC took 21—15 for radio and six for television. Its closest competitor, the Columbia Broadcasting System, won eight awards, five for television and three for radio.

The awards were announced at the 25th annual American exhibition of educational radio and television programs, sponsored by the Institute for Education by Radio-Television Ohio State University.

Sample programs are submitted to the exhibition by networks and independent stations throughout North America.

Though CBC built up a record of nine firsts and six honourable mentions in the radio classes compared to three honourable mentions by CBS and one first and one honourable mention by the National Broadcasting Company, the race for television awards was much closer.

CBC television programs scored three firsts, two honourable mentions and one special citation; CBS had four firsts and one honourable mention and NBC had one first and four honourable mentions.

The rest of the awards in 10 television and eight radio classes were shared by independents, individual educational outlets, the National Educational Radio and Television Centre network and stations owned and operated by American networks.

Sharing honours with CBC in various radio programs were: Manitoba Department of Education in Music for Juniors; British Columbia Department of Education in Listening is Fun; Ontario Department of Education in Classics; Atlantic School Broadcasts Committee in English Literature and Composition.

In television, CBC shared honours with: Saskatchewan Department of Education in Man's Need for Numbers; National Advisory Council on School Broadcasting in Where History Was Made; National Film Board in Comparisons.

Each class was sub-divided thus: national, for programs heard on an entire network; regional, for programs heard on part of a network.

The nine first-award-winning CBC radio programs were:

Sunday School of the Air, regional—Prairies, in the class of programs designed for special interest groups: agricultural, religious, women's, etc.

Poet and the City, national, in the class of cultural programs: drama, science, literature, etc.

Masters of the Keyboard, regional—Vancouver, in the class of cultural programs: drama, science, literature, etc.

Soundings, national, in programs dealing with personal and social problems.

Voices of April, national, in the class of special one-occasion broadcasts.

Music for Juniors, regional — Manitoba, in programs designed for use in primary grades.

Listening is Fun, regional — British Columbia, in programs designed for intermediate grades.

Outlook, national, in the class of programs designed for use in junior and senior high school.

English Literature and Composition, regional — Atlantic, in program

Prairie Chamber Music

Premiere for Keetbaas Composition

THE MIDDLE PERIOD of the twentieth century has seen a good deal of musical composition in Canada, not all of it distinguished. As we progress into the '60's, however, the country has developed a class of musicians, thoroughly professional in training and technique,

profoundly learned in musical history, aware of every current and cross-current affecting the rather turbulent waters of modern composition, from Hindemith and Britten to such exponents of the atonal system as, for example, Hans Werner Henze.

Such a professional musician is Dirk Keetbaas, of St. James, Manitoba, conductor of the Dirk Keetbaas Players, remarkable virtuoso of the flute, and, in recent times, composer of chamber music of growing skill and power. Mr. Keetbaas' *Quintet for Winds*, his most ambitious work to date, will be given its premiere performance by the Keetbaas Players—a democratic organization, which casts regular votes on the new music it will perform or commission — on Prairie Chamber Music, Thursday, May 18.

Mr. Keetbaas describes his new composition as "in the nature of

THE TIME OF THE LILACS

When CBC Television first presented a French-Canadian cast in an English performance of a play by Marcel Dubé, in the fall of 1958, both the public and the critics responded loudly — many because they were shocked by one of the scenes in *The Man in the House*, but many more because they felt new ground had been broken.

Montreal *Star* critic Pat Pearce wrote: "The experiment came off. If not an unqualified success, it was still so superior to the rest of the drama that has turned up on the English TV network this season it may have set an important precedent."

This week on CBC Wednesday Night Rupert Caplan will direct the first radio broadcast in English of a Dubé play, *The Time of the*

Lilacs (Le Temps des lilas). The radio adaptation is by Montreal writer Mac Shoub, and with a few exceptions the cast is the same one that introduced the play in 1958 in eastern and western Canada, and in Paris and Brussels during the second European tour of the Théâtre du Nouveau Monde.

The Time of the Lilacs is a typical Marcel Dubé play in that it is set in one of the poorer sections of Montreal's east end and deals with the way of life of the people who live there.

"Marcel Dubé speaks for the young people trapped in the tight,

rigid, drab districts of Montreal's east end," wrote Herbert Whitaker in the *Toronto Globe and Mail* in 1958. "And when we say 'trapped' we are not using the word lightly. There are heavy pressures of economy, tradition and language which sharply define the Montreal east end."

The action in *The Time of the Lilacs* takes place in May in a garden in "that part of every city which has little room or little use for gardens." It becomes immediately obvious that the old couple who live there are trying to escape

from the realities of the big city and the world by ignoring them. Their house and garden have become their whole world since the death of their son during the war.

The other main characters in the play are the four roomers in the old couple's house: a young girl who works in an office, an old maid and the man she is trying to capture, and a new roomer—a mysterious bachelor who paints. The only other characters are a young leather-jacketed hood who is in pursuit of the girl roomer, and a city assessor who attempts to buy the old couple's world—their house—from them so that the city can widen the street.

Producer Rupert Caplan has made one change in characterization in his production of *The Time of the Lilacs*. The old maid and her reluctant suitor have been cast as English-Canadians and will be played by Canadians instead of Canadiens. Mr. Caplan explains that he believes this will add more colour and variety to the radio version of the play, and that the old maid is really "an English-minded woman." Author Dubé, incidentally, agrees that the change is a good one.

Ginette Letondal, who plays the role of 18-year-old Johanne, has been acting on CBC radio since she was six. Her first role was under the producer of this week's program, Rupert Caplan. She is possibly best known to English Canadians for her roles in Robert Fontaine's comedy series about a French-Scottish family living in Ottawa—*My Uncle Louis*, in which she played first the child Bibi, and later the adolescent Pierre. Miss Letondal managed to squeeze in this CBC Wednesday Night performance during a visit home from France, where she now lives with her husband and two young sons. So popular is the young actress in French Canada that author Roger Lemelin brought back to his series *En haut de la pente douce* (*The Town Above*) the character Miss Letondal used to play so that she



Liberal party in the province and it resulted in his return to power with a stunning victory. Shortly after Gardiner was sworn in as premier again, he was called to Ottawa by Prime Minister MacKenzie King.

On November 4, 1935, he became the federal minister of agriculture and a year later he was elected to the House of Commons in a by-election for Assiniboia. He was re-elected for the constituency of Melville, Saskatchewan, in 1940 and again in 1945, 1949, 1953 and 1957. He surrendered his agriculture portfolio, however, in 1957 when the Liberals were defeated.

In the last federal election (1958), Gardiner was defeated personally, the only time it happened in his career. Since then, Gardiner has been living on the farm which he had been preparing for his retirement from politics.

He seems content to remain on the farm — "I spent my whole life

in politics, but I didn't intend to when I entered it. For myself, I'd have been happier if I'd been defeated 10 years before I was."

"I remember one man whose life was so complicated financially that he volunteered for night duty to keep out of sight of his creditors. ally and harmonically there are constant references to both major and minor modes, which, as Mr. Keetbaas says, "naturally implies acceptance of tonal centres as the basic means of expression." In short, the work, though modern in mood and character, is not atonal.

Dirk Keetbaas was born in Scheveningen, Holland, and lived in Amsterdam for seven years before coming with his family to Ottawa in Canada. A member of a musical family, he began playing the flute at 14, and during the war years was first flutist with the RCAF Central Concert Band. It was at this time that he organized his first wind quintet, and gave a premiere performance of Paul Hindemith's well-known work for this instrumentation.

A little later, he obtained a contract for a trans-continental tour during which he played flute obligato accompaniments for Miliza Korjus, coloratura soprano. He completed his studies after the war with Rene LeRoy, celebrated French flutist.

During an eight years' stay in Toronto, Mr. Keetbaas performed with the Toronto Symphony, CBC Symphony, and many others. He is at present first flutist of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra.

The wind quintet as exemplified by the Keetbaas Players (flute, oboe, clarinet, horn and bassoon), though music was written for it as far back as Mozart's time (by such composers as Antonin Reicha and Franz Danzi), has been to a considerable extent a development of the twentieth century, when a growing body of music in this form has come from such composers as Carl Nielsen of Denmark, Paul Hindemith and Hans Werner Henze of Germany, Servansky of Hungary, and Julius David, whose career has been divided between Germany and England. It is a combination of great charm and delicate balance, calling for the highest standards of performance from all instruments. The Dirk Keetbaas Players of Winnipeg are rapidly moving into the forefront of Canadian ensembles in this section of the chamber music field.

“Mr. Fix-It” has Bulging Mailbox

SINCE BECOMING CBC-TV's Mr. Fix-It five years ago, tousle-topped handyman Peter Whittall can judge his popularity by the amount of mail he receives each year.

Whittall receives more than 33,000 requests for information and letters annually, and manages to acknowledge more than 10 per cent of the letters himself.

Most people write to him for advice on home repairs, ranging from how to fix a door knob, to the most common request—information on how to build a recreation room.

“My garage and basement are full of printed material covering hundreds of different projects I've done on my show,” says Peter. “Despite this, there are still many queries I can't answer, mainly because they're beyond my scope, so I refer them to an authoritative source.

“In one case a viewer sent me a diagram of a plot of land he had purchased and wanted me to design a house and show him the best spot on which to build it. I can't do that. It's a job for an architect.”

Each year Peter shows how to build a recreation room on his Mr. Fix-It program.

“Since January of this year, my daughters and I have filled about 18,000 requests for rec room kits,” says Peter. “In one week during February we were mailing more than 1,300 kits each day. The figure as it stands now surpasses the record 1959 mark by 5,000.

Peter is proud of his girls, all five of them. His regular “little helpers,” sometimes joined by neighbourhood children, are Shelly, 10, Judy 13, and Mary, seven, who helps occasionally. His two other girls are Sandra, 23, and Nola, 24. Sandra will graduate as a teacher

this year, and Nola is working in New York.

Peter's objective is to show the home handyman how easily he can do something, not “how I do it.” He recommends five basic tools for the do-it-yourselfer — a hand saw, hammer, nine-inch block plane, combination mitre-square, and a 30-inch spirit level. “These are all a person needs, with the odd exception, to keep a home in good repair.”

Of the many requests Peter receives, some ask information on subjects he prefers not to discuss, either by letter or on his show. Some of these include plumbing, electrical work, building furniture, or about any trade that infringes on the skilled craftsman's ground.

“I'll give advice on how to re-finish and repair furniture or build a plywood cabinet for a hi-fi set, but I won't make furniture or put hi-fi set components together,” he says.

Once in a while Peter takes time out from his busy schedule of planning his TV show, personal appearances, and answering mail. While at the Central Canada Sportsmen's Show in Ottawa this spring, he was made an honorary chief of the Mohawk Indian tribe. He was named “Chief Chipping the Wood.”

LEMON OR PINEAPPLE SHORTCAKE

PASTRY:

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 slightly beaten eggs
(reserve 1 tbsp. for top)
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup sugar
- 2 tsp. soda
- 1 cup salad or sour cream
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup chopped walnuts or
pecans
- Whipped cream or ice cream
(optional)

Sift flour and salt; blend in shortening with pastry blender until it forms fine particles. Mix all other ingredients except walnuts and stir into flour and salt mixture. Knead a few minutes. Refrigerate. Press $\frac{3}{4}$ of the dough into the bottom and sides of a greased 15" x 10" x 1" jelly roll pan. Spread with desired filling and sprinkle with nuts. Roll out remaining dough on floured board to $\frac{1}{8}$ " thickness. Cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips. Criss cross over filling to form lattice top. Seal strips to edge with fork. Brush with reserved egg and bake in a 350-degree oven for about 30 minutes. Serve with whipped cream or ice cream, or cut into small pieces and serve as a tea-time dainty.

LEMON FILLING:

- 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ cups water
- Juice and rind of 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ lemons

FROM OUR MAILBAG

About Calgary Radio . . .

• I hear you are considering improving reception for Calgary listeners. . . . At present . . . we have on each side of 1010 k.c. (CBX, Alberta) powerful local stations that interfere at all times; then, by late afternoon and early evenings, U.S.A. stations practically dominate this wavelength. . . . So, gentlemen, you will have to give us a clear wavelength.

I hope you can do something . . . we are CBC listeners all the time.—
W. S. M., Calgary.

Ed.: In answer, we quote from the CBC Radio program In Reply of March 5:

" . . . It has now been announced just what form (the improvements in radio reception in Southern Alberta) will take—provided, of course, that we get the necessary approval from the Department of Transport and the Board of Broadcast Governors.

- 1 cup sugar
- 2 tsp. corn starch

Cook until thick and add piece of butter approximately the size of an egg. Cool, spread on pastry.

PINEAPPLE FILLING:

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup white sugar
- 2 tsp. corn starch
- 1 can (1 lb.) crushed pineapple

Combine all ingredients and cook over low heat until thick and transparent. Cool and spread on pastry.

"Engineering studies have shown that in order to provide improved service in Alberta it will be necessary to replace the present CBC facilities at Lacombe with two new high-powered transmitters in the vicinity of Edmonton and Calgary. CBC studios already exist in Edmonton, of course, and studios will be established in Calgary. This means that the program service will include regional and local programming as well as service from the national network. Our engineers are starting their planning now, so that by Fall we should be able to apply for the necessary licenses—and if we get the permission we need, the new facilities should be ready to go into operation about 18 months later."

In further reply to your question, we may add that the question of interference on 1010 k.c. is being considered by our engineers as part of the overall problem of coverage in the Calgary area.
