



## "Venture" Asks, Why Do We Fish?

WHY DO people fish—to catch fish, bring home trophies, pit their wits and endurance against nature, boast to their friends, or just to enjoy the air and beauties of the outdoors? If anyone knows the answers, Rex Lambert does. This well-known Canadian writer and fisherman has been after the big ones (but, he says, never catches any "monsters," just three-to-four pounders) ever since he first dropped a line over an English canal when he was just a tad. At first it was the thrill of the chase and the various techniques of the sport that intrigued him. But as he grew older he began to find the philosophy of angling just as fascinating.

This Sunday afternoon on CBC radio's *Venture*, he will explore a few of the reasons why men and women fish, and, with the help of other members of the angling fraternity, past and present, lay bare the secret soul of *The Man Behind the Rod*.

The riddle of the man behind the rod has been piquing the curiosity of philosophers-anglers for centuries. Lambert feels the answer is: "Peace and quietness, the voices of birds and beasts, the murmur of streams and trees, the skill and the toil of the fisherman, the thrill and recollection of the chase, the conservation of nature and the magic of the wilderness." That's not only the answer, he tells us, but "a good part of the secret of human happiness."

From the past, Sir Izaak Walton and Henry David Thoreau will state their cases. Walton's *The Compleat Angler*, of *The Contemplative Man's Recreation* (1653), is a well-known masterpiece of fishing and thought. Thoreau, of course, is the eminent 19th-century American poet, naturalist and essayist, who lived for two years in a cabin on Waldon Pond and from this experience wrote his classic work, *Waldon*.

Lambert says he plans to quote from several Canadian writings

*Poet and the City*, a series heard on *CBC Wednesday Night* won first prize for cultural program through a program submitted called *A Message to Winnipeg*, an assortment of poems written by James Reaney with music by John Beckwith.

*The Voices of April*, a program of bird songs and other sounds of spring, produced and narrated by Thom Benson who started at CBC Winnipeg, won first prize for special one-occasion broadcasts.

*Music for Juniors*, a series of music appreciation programs done by the Manitoba Department of Education and the CBC, was produced and organized by Hubert Mayes of Winnipeg. It placed first in the class for programs for primary grades.

*Listening is Fun*, first in the intermediate grades class, is produced in Vancouver by Fred Laight, formerly of CBC Winnipeg.

*Man's Need for Numbers*, winner of an honourable mention for systematic instruction to intermediate grades, also was produced at CBC Winnipeg, by Hubert Mayes.

The submitted program which won for *Summerfallow* an honourable mention was *The Constant Immigrant*, written by Mort Forer of Winnipeg. (His wife, Marian Waldman, is author of the current radio serial *Kapitan's Fortune*).

FRANK STALLEY, Toronto CBC-TV announcer who is especially well-known to Canada's young people through his regular appearances on *Junior Roundup's* Monday and Friday shows, is out of action with injuries suffered in an automobile accident. It is expected that he will be absent from his duties for several weeks.

SIR CEDRIC HARDWICKE, who recently has made appearances on such shows as *Live a Borrowed Life*, and *Open House*, recalls that one of the personal problems faced by King George V was that he was hard of hearing. Sir Cedric discovered this when he knelt to receive his knighthood from the monarch: he was dubbed Sir Samuel Pickwick by His Majesty, who hadn't gotten the name quite right.

about fishing, including W. H. Blake's *Brown Waters*. And he has invited some distinguished anglers to appear with their thoughts on fishing, including Roderick Haig-Brown, author and naturalist; writer Gregory Clarke; Dr. C. E. Atwood, of the zoology department at the University of Toronto, who will discuss conservation; a feminine angler, Laurel Crosby, who has fished the streams of several continents; and Claude Owen, who will tell how he makes his own fly-rods.

Folk-singer Alan Mills will sing a ballad with a title all fishermen will appreciate: *Ode to Barbed Wire*. There will be readings from a poem or two about fishing, and, of course, some fish stories strongly reinforced with elastic.

Lambert does most of his fishing as a member of the Noisy River Fishing Club, which has been thriving near Collingwood, Ontario, for about 30 years. For many years he was supervisor of CBC school broadcasts and since his retirement he has been part-time consultant to the CBC schools department. He is writing a history of CBC school broadcasts, various articles on a variety of subjects, and is working on his next book. He has written numerous books on a great many topics, from crime to exploration.

Lambert is extremely knowledgeable about ghosts — has written a book, *Exploring the Supernatural*, and articles on the subject. We asked him if he had ever heard of a ghost fish. He said no, but now that the subject has come up, he will keep his eyes peeled. Perhaps all those that "get away" are really fishy spirits having a bit of sport with the anglers. As Rupert Brooke wrote, speaking for the fish, ". . . This life cannot be All, they swear, For how unpleasant if it were! . . . We darkly know, by Faith we cry. The future is not Wholly Dry. . . . But somewhere, beyond Space and Time, Is Wetter water, slimier slime."

Donald Harron:

# Does 'Success' Spoil an Actor?

WHAT DOES AN ACTOR do when he finds his career going too far too fast? He can probably solve it by one of two ways. Keep going, hoping that the bubble doesn't burst before he has enough money to compensate for the fall; or climb down from the top, take a long searching look and start over again.

Toronto-born actor Donald Harron decided on the latter solution and is still in the midst of realigning his sights in the theatrical world.

Harron's career would probably be the envy of many young actors. He has starred on Broadway, London's West End and the Canadian and British Stratfords. He had a Hollywood contract which paid him \$500 a week. Television and radio offered him lucrative opportunities.

Nonetheless, Harron was not satisfied with the way things were going.

"I never had to struggle to get anywhere," he says. "That's partly the trouble. The only struggle has been inside me, trying to prove to myself that I was the kind of actor I wanted to be."

Actually, Harron's decision to start over again was made nine years ago when he was 28. He was starring on Broadway, in the Christopher Fry play, *Sleep of Prisoners*, when he was offered a long-term contract with M-G-M Studios in Hollywood, calling for \$500 a week to start.

After a year in which he failed to get a role in a movie, the studio dropped Harron, along with other contract artists, because he refused to play a straight man to Jerry Lewis—"I didn't think I was that type."

He also gave up his radio, stage and television work in North

America to go to England, where he worked with the Bristol Old Vic Company. It was an expensive change because his salary dropped to a meagre \$28 a week.

Why the change? "For one thing," says Harron, "I was like an acrobat trying to do cartwheels in four directions at once. It just wasn't doing me any good."

"I was also reaching the point where I was afraid to look back at anything I'd done. Doing 10 different things in a hurry, I was learning, doesn't give you the same satisfaction as doing one thing well."

With the Bristol Old Vic, Harron, who drew on his savings to gain the valuable experience and direction, played everything from an Egyptian slave to a musical-comedy lead, with many difficult parts in between. He stayed for six months and when he left England he felt he had learned just as much as he had in his previous six or seven years.

But even his career since then hasn't given him full satisfaction. (Please turn to page 27)

## On Junior Magazine

### Two Canadian Keyboard Masters

TWO CANADIAN PIANISTS—one who studied in Canada and then became an international star; the other who learned to play the piano in Italy and then gained top recognition in Canada—will be featured Saturday, May 27, on CBC-TV's *Junior Magazine*.


Ray Dudley, whose talent and confidence took him from a small Canadian town (Bowmanville, Ontario) to the big cities of the world, will be the guest soloist for *Junior Magazine's* sixth 60-minute concert of the season for young people.

Dudley will be joined in a duet by Mario Bernardi, who was born

in Kirkland Lake, Ontario, and then moved to Italy when he was six years old. During an 11-year stay in the homeland of his parents, Bernardi learned the piano and returned to Canada in 1948 to become one of the country's most accomplished accompanists and conductors.

Dudley's success started, naturally, at home. His mother, a music teacher and organist in a Bowmanville church, taught him the piano until he was 16.

"He never tried to skip lessons," Mrs. Dudley once said. "He (Please turn to page 7)

worked hard at it and seemed to take to the piano like other boys take to baseball or hockey."

As a teen-ager, Ray lived in a small room in Toronto while attending the Royal Conservatory of Music. Each Sunday he would return home and his mother would fill his suitcase with enough sandwiches to last him the next week. He graduated from the Conservatory in 1952, winning the \$1,000 Eaton Award as the outstanding student of the year.

Later in 1952, Dudley entered the International Competition for Musical Performers at Geneva. He won the Unanimous Medal of the competitions, defeating the best of 33 nations' young hopefuls. The following year the young pianist gained yet another honour—the Harriet Cohen Medal as "the outstanding young artist in the British Commonwealth."

Dudley was in London at the time of the Coronation and it was then that he was commissioned by the Queen to record his own Coronation March for her.

Since 1953, Dudley has been to Europe several times and has given countless number of concerts in North America. Everywhere he goes, the critics seem to have nothing but praise. He has performed before a standing-room crowd in London's famed Albert Hall; a large New York audience cheered and unanimous New York press acclaim followed his recital at Carnegie Hall; enthusiastic response followed performances in such musical centres as Brussels, The Hague, Munich, Dusseldorf, Gen-







**Voice of the People—Lord Elgin.** James Bruce, Earl of Elgin, was Governor-General of the Canadas from 1847 to 1854. He established the principles of responsible government which Lord Durham had so courageously initiated. This film deals with the year 1849, when Elgin's support of the Rebel Losses Bill raised the ire of the Tory opposition, leading to riots and the burning of the Parliament buildings. It was a difficult moment of decision for Lord Elgin, a moment of drama and suspense. (Elgin, an able statesman, was said to have established the Code of Conduct for Governors-General which has been followed since his time. From Canada he went to China, then to Japan, dying in office as Viceroy of India.)

Cast: Andrew Allan as Lord Elgin; Sandra Scott as Lady Elgin; Lucien Wattier as Sir Louis LaFontaine; Robert Goodier as Sir Allan MacNab; Alexander Webster as Major Campbell, and Michael Kane as Solicitor-General Blake. Produced by Tom Farley, and written by M. Charles Cohen.



Author of "The Pupil"

## Henry James: America's Reluctant Son

NOVELIST HENRY JAMES was an American who was born with a deep, warm feeling for Europe, a "far-away paradise" that beckoned to him often and finally won him almost completely. And it was as a chronicler of the American abroad that he excelled — though, inevitably, some of his countrymen accused him of caricaturing them, especially when describing the contrast between what he called "the distinctively American and distinctively European outlook." Being familiar with both, he could write from the inside out, but objectively, for he never thrust himself aggressively into the picture.

He wrote about the upper-class society he knew best, keeping his action well out of the East Side, Whitechapel or the Left Bank. He longed to write plays, and did turn out a few, but they were not successful, perhaps because his character delineations were so minute and dissective, too subtle for the bolder medium of the stage. But

he cast many of his novels in set scenes which are well suited to dramatization. In television, particularly, they come alive with the intimacy lacking in the more vigorous assault on the emotions required by the stage.

Such a one is his story *The Pupil*, which *Festival '61* presents Monday night on CBC-TV, in a one-hour dramatization by Michael Dyne.

*The Pupil* tells of an ambitious, adventurous American family living from hand to mouth in Europe, putting up a front of affluence as they drift through high society on the lookout for social and financial success. Their youngest son, Morgan, is a delicate, brilliant boy of 15. Into their irresponsible household comes Jack Pemberton (William Job), a sensitive young man who is to tutor Morgan. He is devoted to the boy, and in spite of the fact that his salary is paid only sporadically, and that he is caught up in a series of disturbing family moves and crises, he stays on, but

eventually decides to leave in search of greater security. Just when a solution to his situation is in sight, tragedy takes over. Albert Dekker plays Mr. Moreen, head of the family and a good-natured failure who can be pitied but never quite despised. As his wife, Edith Atwater plays a woman concerned more with making wealthy matches for her two daughters than in facing up to her family's deterioration.

James was born in 1843, and began accumulating impressions of the American-out-of-context at an early age. When scarcely a year old he went abroad with his family for several months. On their return, a bust of the Baccante and a vast Prospect of Florence canvas shared the back parlour in their New York home with the latest copies of *Punch* and an ever-replenished decanter of dark plum claret rich in the scent of sunny France. Dickens and Thackeray dropped in, bringing more tantalizing whiffs of European life.

In 1855 the elder James, a philosopher-theologian, took his "four stout boys" to Europe to "absorb French and German and get such a sensuous education as they cannot get here." They spent four years sampling the flavours of Geneva, London, Paris, Boulogne and Bonn, and as far as Henry James was concerned, the die was cast.

However, he returned to the States and entered Harvard in 1862. He went abroad again in 1869 and for the next six years had a foot on both continents, but in 1876 he settled in London in rooms near Piccadilly, because he felt that the "denser, richer, warmer European spectacle," with its "accumulation of history and custom . . . complexity of manners and types," looked like a better "fund of suggestion for a novelist." By then he was emerging forcefully as a novelist. *Roderick Hudson* was

# SHOULD WRITERS LOOK 'POSH'?

FOR HIS FIRST 20 years, the edges of Laurie Lee's world extended only to the rim of the remote Cotswold valley where he grew up in topsy-turvy but richly satisfying poverty. Perhaps it is because this sophisticated poet had so unlikely an upbringing that his writing has a gusto and subtle eloquence beyond the run of similarly cosmopolitan authors.

Wordly and elegant as his style is, he looks as down-to-earth as the leafy valley of his youth, with lively blue eyes, a quick, fleeting smile, and a sensitive awareness of the temper of people and things around him. A couple of years ago, when he returned to his village for the first time in 20 years, wearing the casual clothes he favours and talking with the Gloucestershire burr that still clings to his speech, he was mistaken for the "electricity man"—"a writer would surely look posher than that!"

At 20, Laurie Lee ran away from his archaic valley to see the world and make his fortune. He has lived in London and abroad ever since. But the sights, smells, textures and rich flavours of isolated country life as he knew it back in the days when "the horse was the fastest thing that moved on the landscape and the whole rhythm of life was founded on a maximum speed of six or seven miles an hour" are still vividly alive in his memory.

A year-and-a-half ago he described them enchantingly in his memoir, *Cider With Rosie* (Clarke, Irwin and Company, Ltd., Toronto), which won him the

£1,000 W. H. Smith prize. In accepting it Lee said: "It is seldom in the northern latitudes that an act of pleasure, I might say of self-indulgence, receives a public reward of money. . . . This award is more than I have ever earned in a lifetime of poetry." Apart from the financial success of *Cider With Rosie*, he says, "my best moment was seeing four clerks in a row, in a rush-hour train, all reading it."

Laurie Lee will be paying several visits to CBC radio's *Trans-Canada Matinee* over the next few weeks. This Friday he will be interviewed on the show by Joyce Emerson, a British journalist on the literary editorial staff of the London *Sunday Times*, who was heard on *Matinee* this winter in a two-part interview with Agatha Christie.

Lee will play his guitar in the interview, and talk about himself, his childhood, and his philosophy. Then, starting on June 12, he will read from *Cider With Rosie* on *Matinee* each afternoon Monday to Friday, for three weeks.

Laurie Lee was born on June 26, 1914, he thinks, but he is not sure, for his mother was rather vague about dates. Before her marriage, she kept a pub, which she left to keep house for a widower with four children. He was a grocer's assistant, a photographer and a church organist. Later she married him and had four children of her own, of which Laurie was the third. When he was three his father deserted them, and although he contributed sparingly to their (Please turn to page 29)

being serialized by the *Atlantic*, and he was busy with a round of intellectual soirées and musicales. In the next few years novels, novelettes and short stories elbowed each other in the steady march across his sheets of quarto. He had at least 55 works in his literary regiment by the time he wrote *The Pupil* at 55.

A few years before he had settled into a charming 18th-century house at the top of a little winding street in the town of Rye, where he remained for the rest of his life, in, as one visitor described it "impenetrable respectability."

In 1916 Henry James suffered a stroke and died. And America drew her reluctant son home for good when his ashes were buried in Cambridge, Mass.

eva, Zurich, Milan, Madrid, Barcelona and Lisbon.

He has also made extensive tours throughout the United States and Canada, appearing as soloist with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra, the Toronto Symphony, under Pierre Monteux, Hart House Orchestra under Boyd Neel, CBC Symphony, Winnipeg Symphony, Victoria Symphony and others.

Dudley now combines teaching—he gives master classes in piano at Indiana University, Bloomington—with his extensive touring schedule.

Mario Bernardi studied the piano in Italy, later turning to organ and composition. When he was 12 years old he became organist of a small Italian cathedral.

"I was scared," he said recently. "It looked so big and the music was also big for a young lad to control. This, by the way, was the organ which had been given to the cathedral by Pope Pius X, who had at one time been curate there."

While in Italy he learned not only to speak and read Italian but also Spanish and French. When he returned to Canada he had to learn the English language again. He continued to study piano at the Royal Conservatory of Toronto with Lubka Kolessa and also turned to conducting.

In 1956 he conducted a radio performance of Puccini's *Gianni Schicchi* and also conducted *Hansel and Gretel* at the Royal Alexandra Theatre for the Toronto Opera Festival. Since then he has served as accompanist and pianist for a variety of engagements, ranging from classical recitals to a dance band, as well as continuing as a free-lance conductor in Toronto.

He is often the accompanist on CBC radio's *Distinguished Artists* series and has been conducting the orchestra for the youth concerts this season.



While he finally managed to escape from being typed as a classical actor — two seasons at Stratford, Ontario, contributed to this situation—Harron found himself being type-cast again, this time as a neurotic, following a successful run on Broadway last season in Dr. Tyrone Guthrie's *The Tenth Man*, in which Harron played a "sick" young lawyer compelled to suicide.

Since breaking off with M-G-M, he has had one role in a motion picture, playing in 20th Century-Fox's *The Best of Everything*. And here, too, he found the studio calling him "half Leslie Howard, half Montgomery Clift."

"I don't want to be half one type and half another, though," explains Harron. "I want to be a whole Harron. It's as simple as that."

Perhaps that is the reason Harron agreed to play the leading role in this week's *General Motors Presents* production on CBC-TV.

Harron will be playing the role of Martin Miller, a small-town high school teacher who battles apathy to instigate a search for a missing girl pupil, in Jacqueline Rosenfeld's *The Town That Didn't Care*. The drama will be seen this Sunday.

For Harron it will be one of his few appearances on CBC-TV in recent years. Two years ago he starred with John Colicos in another *GM Presents* production by Mrs. Rosenfeld, *The New Men*, and was also a star in CBC-TV's *A Phoenix Too Frequent* recently.

upkeep from time to time, he never returned.

Laurie says that as a boy he felt different from the rest of his loving but helter-skelter family, and secretly believed that he was of royal birth, until one day he caught a glimpse of himself in the mirror and saw his father's debonair face looking back at him.

The little feudal world he and his seven brothers and sisters grew up in was roughly beautiful, violent, silly at times, and brimming with unusually vital characters acting out their extraordinary lives through the fat, buzzing summers and long, lean winters. That thousand-years-old world is gone in a cloud of automobile dust, but Lee does not mourn its passing, nor sentimentalize over its memory. In *Cider With Rosie* he simply tells what it was like, and how it affected him. He says: "It was something that we just had time to inherit and dimly know — the blood and beliefs of generations who had been in the valley since the Stone Age. That continuous contact has at last been broken, the deeper caves sealed off forever. But arriving, as I did, at the end of that age, I caught whiffs of something old as the glaciers."

When he was still a lad, Lee met up with an itinerant musician who sold violins for sixpence a week and, while you were paying off the instalments, would teach you to play for a further sixpence a week. By the time Lee was 16 he was touring Gloucestershire with his own dance band, and writing poetry. At 20 he left home and walked to London, where he fell in love with a girl and a city, then wandered off to Spain with a violin, two pounds in his pocket and one Spanish sentence in his vocabulary: "Will you give me a glass of water, please, quickly?"—which led to a bad case of colic. He lived there with the peasants, playing his violin in the streets and cafés. After 13 months he returned to London with a profit of £18. When the Civil War broke out in

Spain he went back, making a winter crossing of the Pyrenees to join the International Brigade.

During the Second World War he wrote documentary films and booklets for the Ministry of Information. His first complete volume of poetry, *The Sun My Monument*, was published in 1944, followed by *The Bloom of Candles* in 1947, and more recently, *My Many-Coated Man*. While his output is not large, his lyrical poetry has been described as the most sensitive of our time. In 1955 he published a travel book on Spain, *A Rose for Winter*. He has written two verse-dramas: *Peasants' Priest*, performed at the Canterbury Festival, and *The Voyage of Magellan*, written for the BBC's Third Program (similar to CBC Wednesday Night), and since published.

In 1950 Laurie Lee married a beautiful French girl whom he had first met in the South of France when she was five — Catherine Francesca Polge, a niece of sculptor Jacob Epstein. They divide their time between the Cotswolds, Algeciras, Spain, and the Fulham Road in London. "All I want from life," Lee says, "is £10 a week and no questions asked—though sometimes I dream of being a court painter to an Indian prince or a wandering fiddler playing at weddings and funerals in Ireland."

people, and his pupils were the children of former head-hunters. Mr. Young and his wife were the only Europeans in the area and as there were no roads, Mr. Young walked between his schools through swamps and jungles. They learned the Dyak language and although they had no medical training, the Youngs found themselves doing medical work in the area where there were only two doctors and one small hospital for a population of some 100,000. Mr. Young, who is now with the College of Education, University of British Columbia, talks about his experiences with Eileen Laurie, the CBC's Morning Commentator in Vancouver. Listeners will also hear a recording of jungle children playing bamboo flutes they made themselves.

**Women Police in London.** The Women Police in London are fully-trained officers having the same powers and responsibilities as the men, but they specialize in work with women and children. Their head is Chief Superintendent Barker, who joined the Metropolitan Police in 1941. A report on the annual Dominion Drama Festival will be seen Tuesday, May 23rd at 11:30 p.m., immediately following the regular *Reportage*. This is of particular interest for St. Boniface-Winnipeg viewers, since a St. Boniface troupe, Le Cercle Molière, will be participating in the finals. ## The Luck of Brian Moore

*Author of the widely-acclaimed novel The Luck of Ginger Coffey, Brian Moore is interviewed May 17th on CBC Wednesday Night*

SOMEONE HAS CALLED Brian Moore a literary Charlie Chaplin. There are greater overtones of tragedy than of comedy in his work, and also something mystical.

The "little guy" links hands with pity and laughter as he stands on the brink of a great pool of happiness. The tragedy in life, he shows us, is that he is afraid to jump in.

Moore writes with compassion about the shy, the downtrodden, the weak, the underdog. He is concerned with the endlessness of time when it's lonely, with the little battles and petty triumphs that fill the days of those who haven't made the grade and never will.

Moore's third novel, *The Luck of Ginger Coffey*, published by Little, Brown and Company, made enough headlines when it came out last year to "make any writer delirious," as one reviewer put it.

*Newsweek* said: "Brian Moore is an Irish-born novelist who can break your heart so painfully you sometimes wonder why you are punishing yourself by reading the books. The answer is (he is) overpowering . . . Moore sometimes gives his readers' souls the kind of washing-out which Aristotle laid to high tragedy only. (He) has climbed to true classic stature."

A few weeks ago *The Luck of Ginger Coffey* won the Governor-General's Award for Fiction. A couple of days afterwards Moore won a Canada Council Grant.

This winter, when Moore was in Toronto briefly to promote the book, Robert Fulford, book critic for the *Toronto Daily Star*, recorded a 25-minute interview with him. It will be heard on CBC radio May 17th, on CBC Wednesday Night. On June 19 a dramatization of *The Luck of Ginger Coffey* will be presented on CBC-TV's *Festival '61*.

Ginger Coffey is a big, affectionate, selfish Irish dreamer. When, in his 40th year, none of his castles have materialized, he blames it on rotten luck, not on the fact that his pockets are like sieves where money is concerned, and that he can't resist telling his boss how to run his business. When a legacy surprisingly comes his way, Ginger determines to quit Ireland, where he is not appreciated, and light out for the New World with his wife and daughter.

Six months later, swaggering through the streets of Montreal in his Tyrolean hat, sheepskin-lined coat and splendid moustache, looking, he hopes, every inch a Dublin squire, he is confident that no one would suspect him of being a man who has lost three jobs in as many months, and, unknown to his wife, has spent his return fare to Ireland.

"In his tragic-comedy odyssey in search of work," says the publicity on the book jacket, "he must face the jetsam of a strange city—drunken proofreaders, YMCA eccentrics, diaper delivery men, leather-jacketed boys, jailbirds, and policemen; even worse, in his new environment he no longer understands his wife and daughter and is in constant danger of losing both to other, more promising males. In his attempts to fight back, Ginger Coffey, the Dublin squire, penniless and exiled in his new world, must face his illusions and at last discover 'some of the facts of life.'"

Robert Fulford feels that the book has "an element of timeliness that even the author could not have anticipated. In its portrait of a mean mind and a meagre imagination . . . character with no character . . . *The Luck of Ginger Coffey* is a superb, nearly perfect novel. It is, of course, the revelation of this character which occupies most of Moore's and the

reader's attention; but the book is also valuable as an immigrant's despairing glance at the underside of Canadian life. It contains a reminder—perhaps the first one in serious fiction—that Canada in our time is not the paradise for immigrants that we (and sometimes they) tend to call it."

Moore came to Canada in 1947 and had a tough time making a living for a while. His first job was as a clerk in a construction camp in Ontario. Fed up with that after a few months, he went to Montreal, where he joined the *Gazette* as a proofreader, working up to be a reporter and re-write man. In 1952, after selling a few short stories here and abroad, and saving a bit of money, he decided to gamble on a novel. He became a writer, he says, because "it is a classic Irish tradition. In Ireland writing is looked up to as something worth doing."

Tucked away in a cabin in the Laurentian mountains, Moore spent a year on his first novel, *Judith Hearne*. His wife, Jacqueline Sirois, kept on with her job as a newspaper feature writer.

*Judith Hearne* made an immediate impact in Canada and Britain. It won the Author's Club Award for the best first novel published in the United Kingdom in 1955; the Beta Sigma Phi Award for the best first novel by a Canadian to be published that year; and the Quebec Government Prize for the best book published in the English language by a Quebec resident in the period 1952-56.

Moore tries to work at his typewriter for a fixed number of hours a day, six days a week, usually nine in the morning till two or three in the afternoon. He polishes and repolishes his work, sometimes making as many as 15 drafts before he is satisfied. He sets no quota for his daily output, but "as a former newspaperman, the thought of having to go back to 10 hours a day on the re-write desk spurs me on."

"Ginger Coffey represents what I've always been afraid would happen to me," Moore says.

## BEAN SALAD

1 can green beans (french or whole)

1 can wax beans (long-frozen)

1 can kidney beans

1 green pepper-sliced

1 spanish onion-sliced

Drain beans. Mix all ingredients in salad bowl and make dressing:

½ cup cider vinegar

½ cup olive oil

¼ cup sugar

Salt and pepper to taste

Shake all ingredients and pour over vegetables. Marinate for several hours and serve on lettuce leaves.

## BARBECUE BEAN SALAD

1 can tomato paste

¼ cup chili sauce

2 tsp. prepared mustard

1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. basil

1 crushed clove of garlic

2 tsp. onion juice

2 tbsp. horseradish

1 tsp. chili powder

¼ cup vinegar

½ tsp. oregano

Mix all ingredients. Cook gently for 8 minutes. Strain. Cool and add to mayonnaise. Pile lettuce in salad bowl. Pour in 1 can drained and chilled kidney beans. Pour on dressing and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.
