# THE QUIET WAR

*First in a series of one-hour film documentaries prepared by the four major English-speaking countries of the world to promote a wider understanding of world problems*

**THE QUIET WAR**, an hour-long film documentary about South Vietnam produced for Intertel by Associated Rediffusion Limited of London, England, will be seen this Tuesday on CBC-TV.

It is the first program to be shown through Intertel, an international television federation formed by the four major English-speaking countries of the world to promote a wider knowledge of contemporary world affairs and a better mutual understanding of world problems. Members of Intertel are: The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation; Associated-Rediffusion; the Australian Broadcasting Commission; the National Educational Television and Radio Centre and the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company, both of the United States.

After *The Quiet War*, Intertel programs will be seen on the CBC-TV network on a once-a-month basis, beginning with the fall schedule. Among the subjects for the first six programs are studies of people in France, Africa, Cuba and China.

The program on Cuba is one of the productions to be done by the CBC. It will be a documentary, interpreting changing events in Cuba to citizens of participating nations in Intertel. It will be concerned mainly with the results of the revolution and is intended to reveal the political, social or economic facts of the existing situation through concrete and dramatic examples of how these facts affect the lives of the individual Cuban people.

Australia has expressed interest in preparing a program on American-Canadian relations, from the point of view of an impartial observer.

*The Quiet War* is a hard, searching look at an independent republic—within a partitioned country—which has been embroiled in a war by stealth for the last five years, or for the entire time South Vietnam has been a self-governing republic.

At the outbreak of the Second World War, Indo-China, then a major component of the French Empire, consisted of five distinct regions (Tonkin, Annam, Cochinchina, Cambodia and Laos). The Japanese occupied the entire area during the Second World War but met stiff opposition in the form of a new native movement, the League for the Independence of Vietnam—*Vietminh* or *Viet Cong* are abbreviated terms for members of this league. The central element of this group was the Indo-Chinese Communist Party, headed by Ho Chi Minh.

France reoccupied Indo-China at the end of the Second World War but found herself faced with revolutionary nationalism. Eventually, in 1949, France signed treaties by which independence within the French Union was accorded to Vietnam (formed from a union of Tonkin, Annam and Cochinchina), Cambodia and Laos.

From December, 1946, to July, 1954, however, the French and their native allies battled the Communist rebels, led by Ho Chi Minh, who wanted complete independence for Vietnam. The end of open warfare came when the two factions signed a cease-fire agreement at Geneva on July 21, 1954. The agreements left Vietnam divided into two sections at the 17th parallel. The northern part of the country is now the Democratic Republic of Vietnam with Ho Chi Minh as president of the Communist-controlled state. South Vietnam, or more properly, the Republic of Vietnam, is headed by President Ngo Dinh Diem.

Although the open conflict stopped with the Geneva agreements, there are still between 60 and 100 people being killed each week in South Vietnam in a full-scale guerilla war being waged in secrecy on both sides.

To tell the story of this "quiet war," the country it is being fought in and the political struggle behind the scenes, Associated-Rediffusion sent an eight-man team to Saigon (capital of South Vietnam) for a two-month assignment. Whenever

# FOUR PHILOSOPHERS

*A new four-part series of programs exploring the history of ideas through the different philosophical views of Plato, St. Augustine, Hume and Kant in an effort to show why their ideas have helped shape the present day world*

THE SPEARHEAD in the assault on truth down through the ages has been philosophy, which Pythagoras called the highest music. In this era of scientific advances some practical people dismiss philosophy as useless and stagnant. But what they might consider is that every science begins as philosophy, and while science progresses through proven fact to bring us knowledge, only philosophy gives us wisdom, by relating fact to experience.

Philosophy's magic lure is the great unknown, the endless universe of thought in which some of the greatest minds of history have boldly explored and recorded their experiences in the wooing of wisdom. And while we smile now at the primitive ideas of early explorers in other fields, the thoughts

of the great philosophers about the problems of good and evil, beauty and ugliness, order and freedom, life and death, etc., are as vital and intoxicating today as they were 200 or 2,000 years ago, and give our modern knowledge perspective.

As Ralph Waldo Emerson pointed out, when a philosophic genius speaks to us he rings a distant bell in our minds, as if in our dim past we had had the very same thought but didn't have the courage or the words to give it form, that we had had the same experiences but hadn't been able to interpret their subtle meanings. Socrates once advised: "Do you then be reasonable and do not mind whether the teachers of philosophy are good or bad, but think only of philosophy herself. Try to examine her well and truly; and if she be evil, seek to turn away all men from her; but if she be what I believe she is, then follow her and serve her, and be of good cheer."

In the black-and-white starkness of print, philosophies can stimulate like mental pin-pricks. But clothed in the living warmth of the human voice, presented as many of them were originally, in discussion, both serious and lighthearted, between people thirsting for knowledge of themselves and the whys of the world, they can be refreshing and satisfying.

Starting Wednesday night at CBC-TV's *Explorations* will present a quartet of programs exploring the history of ideas through the different philosophical views of Plato, and St. Augustine in the ancient world, and of Hume and Kant in the modern, trying to show why their ideas have helped shape the world as it is today.

Actors will portray the four great thinkers in imaginary philosophic conversations with their contem-

poraries. Chris Wiggins will be seen as Plato; Jeremy Wilkin as the young Aristotle; Michael Stewart as Speusippus, a young man Aristotle's age; Gillie Fenwick as Callicles; Percy Rodriguez as St. Augustine; Ivor Barry as Rufinus; James Doohan as the Roman General Boniface; Norman Ettlinger as David Hume; Hugh Webster as Dr. James Beattie; and Barry Morse as Kant, with many other leading performers.

Host for the series will be Dr. George P. Grant, a Canadian Rhodes Scholar, a graduate of Queen's and Oxford Universities who has been professor of philosophy at Dalhousie University and worked for the Canadian Association for Adult Education for several years. He will introduce and comment on each of the vignettes in interviews with Harry Mannis. Grant is also the author of two of the programs on Augustine and Kant. The other two, on Plato and Hume, have been written by Lewis Miller, program organizer in the CBC talks and public affairs department, who first became interested in philosophy in Professor Grant's classes at Dalhousie.

We asked Dr. Grant why he chose these four philosophers for the series. His choice of Plato, of course, is obvious, because Plato was the greatest of the Greek philosophers. "St. Augustine," Grant says, "represents the mating of ancient philosophy with Biblical religion, and out of his thought European civilization arose. Hume was one of the great philosophers of science, and represents the tradition of humanism and liberalism which are so powerful in the modern world. I think Kant is the greatest of modern philosophers. He understood so well all that happened in philosophy before. He saw what it was to be a modern man better than anyone else. Necessarily these can be only glimpses of the great philosophers, but we hope they will encourage people to look at the philosophers afterwards themselves."

And now a word about the background of the four philosophers.

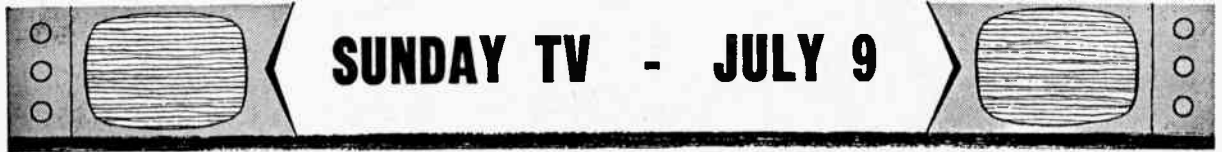

... new summer series

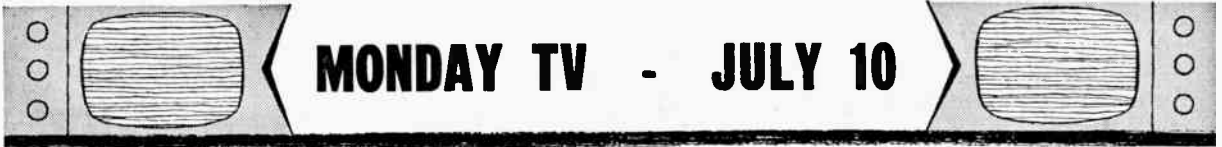
MURDER, COMEDY, robbery, suspense and romance will be turning up on CBC-TV's *G.M. Presents* this summer in a series of British-produced television plays. The first, *The Cupboard*, to be seen Sunday night, was produced by Sidney Newman and directed by David Greene, who were both associated with CBC-TV productions for several years. It stars Donald Pleasance, well-known British stage and screen actor, who paid a brief visit to Toronto in 1955 to star in David Greene's production of *The Tell Tale Heart* on CBC-TV.

*The Cupboard* is a thriller about an apparently inoffensive little man, Fred Watson, living in a basement apartment in a decrepit London house. His landlady, Mrs. Sparrow, discovers him papering over a cupboard in his bedroom, and infuriates him by insisting that he cannot do such alterations because she is selling the house. She is far from satisfied about his explanation about the whereabouts of his wife, who has "gone away" rather mysteriously. Then Mrs. Sparrow herself disappears - and Fred walls up another cupboard. When neither Mrs. Sparrow nor Mrs. Watson can be found, Fred's sister-in-law grows suspicious and calls in the police. The cupboards are empty! Then Detective Sergeant Roberts discovers Fred has been selling his wife's jewelry to a dealer, and by this time Fred is really for it.

In the last year Donald Pleasance made news in London, England, with his brilliant performance in *The Caretaker*, an unusual play with only three characters, all men. Pleasance has no theatrical tradition in his family - he was born to a second generation railwayman. He began his career in Jersey as an assistant stage manager at 30 shillings a week. Since then he has had considerable success as a stage and film actor. But it was tele-

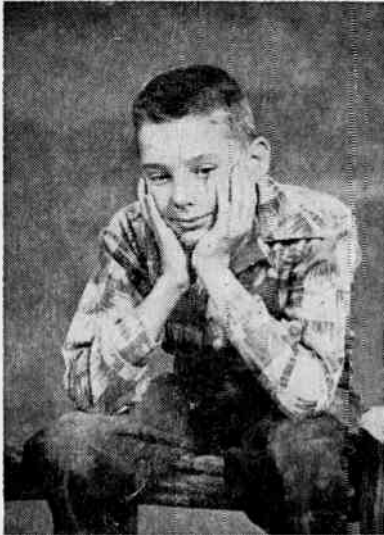

The National League won both games last year, but the American League leads in the overall series 16-13.

## All-Star Games on CBC-TV and Dominion Radio

The 30th and 31st Major League Baseball All-Star Games will be carried on the CBC-TV and Dominion radio networks, July 11 and July 31.

Candlestick Park (capacity 42,800), the home of the National League's San Francisco Giants, is the site of the Tuesday, July 11 game. The Monday, July 31 game will be played at Fenway Park (capacity 33,357), home of the Boston Red Sox of the American League.

The All-Star Games between the National and American Leagues started in 1933. Last year the National League won both games, 5-3 and 6-0, to cut the American League's series lead to 16-13, the closest since 1940.

Each team will be allowed 25 players for the first game and 28 for the second. The eight starters, except for pitchers, will be chosen by players, coaches and managers, who vote for players - other than teammates - in their respective leagues. Elected starters must play at least three innings in both games.

The All-Star managers, Paul Richards of the American League Baltimore Orioles and Danny Murtagh of the National League Pittsburgh Pirates, select the remainder of the squads and the starting pitchers. They'll name three additional players for the second game, to take advantage of playing spurts by men not selected for the first game. Each of the 18 major league teams (10 American League and eight National League) must be represented by at least one player.

Plato, who, with Aristotle, casts his shadow over all the speculative reason in the West, was born in 428 B.C., and lived to be over 80. His family was aristocratic. He grew up in comfort, a handsome boy who got his name because his shoulders were so wide. He was an excellent soldier and an athlete, and not the sort of young man, you might think, who would develop into a philosopher.

Meeting Socrates, an old family friend, changed his life. Reason

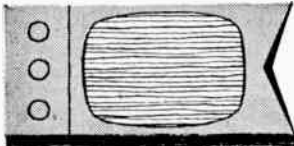

became at first just a sport for Plato, then a consuming interest. When Plato was 28 Socrates was condemned to death for his unorthodox views, and this filled Plato with such outspoken scorn for democracy and the mob that Athens became too hot for him and he had to flee the country. He travelled for 12 years, seeking wisdom wherever he went, sampling every creed and way of life, looking for a method whereby the wisest of thinkers could be discovered and enabled to rule. When he was 40 a wealthy patron bought his freedom, making it possible for Plato to return to Athens, where he founded his famous Academy and began to offer his students their freedom through thought. His open-air school among olive trees thrived for nine centuries — the ancestor of our universities. Its aim was to change men's thoughts from becoming to being, to help them reason for themselves, to explore their common sense.

Aside from two trips to Syracuse, Plato stayed teaching and writing at the Academy until his death. He was not only a great thinker but a brilliant writer, too—his *Dialogues*

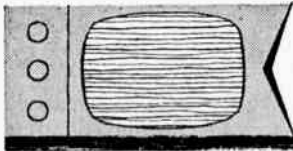
the film crew travelled in the countryside it had to have an armed guard.

The film concentrates on the life of one family, that of Mr. No, a farmer near Thu-Duc, a town in the midst of a sugar plantation. It shows the farmer, his wife and children at work, at play and in prayer. It also goes to the 17th Parallel where a river separates South Vietnam from Communist North Vietnam; to a school for reformed prostitutes in Vin-Long; to the ancient city of Hue, where traditional dances were filmed; to Cap St. Jacques, which the French built in imitation of the French Riviera; to Cholon, the Chinese city where a tea-room is visited and a girl sings a song in Chinese.

Elkan Allan, who wrote the script, sums up the feelings of the unit which went to South Vietnam thusly: "It has its uglier aspects but it is also a place with which to fall in love. The grace and beauty of the women, the stoic cheerfulness of the men and the sometimes fierce, sometimes gentle warmth of the climate make it a place to go back to. . . . But it is also a dangerous place. Boiling up inside this little country is a situation that could make the quiet war into a loud war, shattering all our eardrums. How this can be avoided is the theme of our program."

## THE MAGNIFICENT "SILENTS"

*Reminiscences of Old-time film Stars*

"THE FUNNY THING about the big stars of the silent screen era is that they're the most talkative people I ever came upon—you just can't stop them!" says Toronto freelance reporter Tony Thomas.

Recently Thomas spent four weeks in Hollywood and New York, reminiscing with some of the old-time stars about the heyday of silent movies—from the First World War to the advent of sound around 1929—finding out what Hollywood was like then, how it compares with the film world now, and trying to pinpoint that hard-to-define thing, luck or something more mysterious, that made idols out of seemingly ordinary performers.

He recorded their conversations—probably as colourful and revealing a set of ad lib dialogues as any of them ever spoke in the days when screen actors often made up the words as they went along. They were edited by Dita Scholz and *Venture* presents them on CBC radio Sunday afternoon. Horace Lapp will set the scene in each interview with piano music reminiscent of the tinkling accompaniment which theatres used to provide for silent movies.

Thomas discovered that most of the big names of the *Magnificent Silents* are still living in the past and rhapsodizing about the good old days.

"Whatever became of the fans who stalked the highways . . . who dared to stop trains, break through restaurant plate glass windows just for a glimpse of their adored one?" asked Francis X. Bushman, whose adoring fans used to send him torrid love letters and proposals by

the thousands. Whatever it was that eventually lifted the veil of mystery surrounding the old-time screen idols, revealing them as human, Bushman recalls that "when the public learned I was married and had five kids, I was through. Today I'd be a big star because of the family."

Bushman made 400 films before he was 35. At the height of his fame in the pre-income tax days he grossed a million dollars a year, lived on a 280-acre estate in a mansion crammed with trophies and antiques, kept a kennel of 300 Great Danes, and an aviary stocked with 1,500 birds. He lost nearly everything in the 1929 crash, but radio soap operas rescued him in the 1930's—he appeared in *One Man's Family* for years.

Thomas says Gloria Swanson, one of the all-time greats in the entertainment world, is the most realistic of the stars he talked to—lives less in the past. They met in her beautiful Park Avenue apartment overlooking New York harbour. "It's remarkable how that woman holds back the years," he says. "She's so vital, full of energy, with a multitude of business interests, and she sculpts and paints, too."

"I have to be on the move," she says. "If I had a chance to spend 11 months in Paradise, I'd probably want to spend the other month in Hell. That's the way I am, and I don't expect to change. I'm a direct person. I don't have time for chitchat or bridge or cocktail parties. My life is not joining committees because someone else is on the committee. Mine are the hard

fighters—for pure foods, preventive medicine and things like that. I'm busy. There's so much to be done and somebody's got to do it. I'm a do-er, and I don't have time for people who aren't do-ers. I define a bore as someone who is bored. A bore will only cross my threshold once."

Gloria Swanson has been a star since she was 14. Back in the days of the silents, she says, "we didn't need dialogue—we had faces." She's one of the lucky ones who was able to bridge the gap between the silents and talkies.

Harold Lloyd thinks the stars of that bygone era were "almost unreal, not of the human race." Lloyd still lives cut off from the madding crowd. Thomas says his visit to Lloyd's fabulous estate in California was one of the most interesting parts of his trip. The "lovable, bungling, wistful but triumphant hero in horn-rimmed glasses," reputedly the most daring silent screen comedian, lives in what Thomas describes as unbelievable luxury, in a gigantic, 45-room stone chateau in Beverly Hills with its own golf course, swimming pool, and gardens modelled on the Tuileries. "One room the size of a castle banquet room," says Thomas, "is fitted with 30 hi-fi speakers. Lloyd has 5,000 or 6,000 stereo record albums and racks and racks of records, numerous tape recorders, and recording and listening equipment of the sort you'd find in the best-equipped big city studio. We spent an entire evening playing tapes. The ceiling of the room was hand-painted by an Italian artist

# The Life of Louis Pasteur

THE LIFE and accomplishments of Louis Pasteur, whose whole world was defined by the field of his microscope and who is considered by most Frenchmen as among their most illustrious countrymen, will be reviewed this Thursday on *Science Review*, heard on the CBC Trans-Canada radio network.

Guest speaker for the program will be Dr. Norman E. Gibbons, assistant director of the food microbiology section of the division of applied biology, National Research Council, Ottawa. Dr. Gibbons, a native of Niagara Falls, Ontario, specializes in the bacteriology of sea fish; fish handling and curing; bacteriology of meats and bacon curing; eggs and egg products; and halophilic bacteria.

"The amazing thing about Louis Pasteur," says Dr. Gibbons, "is that working in a new territory he was able to devise methods and make fundamental contributions in so many of what are now special branches of microbiology — microbial physiology, industrial microbiology, medical bacteriology, virology and immunology. Not only have these contributions stood the test of time, but his methods and his philosophy of work and research have been an inspiration to workers in all branches of science."

Pasteur was born on December 27, 1822, in Dole, France, a small town on the plateau below the Jura Mountains. His father, a tanner who had fought with Napoleon in Spain, settled down in Arbois shortly after Louis' birth and here the young Pasteur grew up.

During his first 20 years, Pasteur showed little signs of becoming either an above-average student or an experimental genius. But while he was attending a small college in Arbois, he showed a trait that was to be the main influence of his long and colourful career: the ability to stick to a problem until it was

either solved or demonstrated plainly as impossible to solve.

Pasteur's schoolmaster at Arbois suggested that he should become a teacher and so Pasteur enrolled at the Ecola Normale Superieure, the famous school started by Napoleon to train teachers for the universities. Here, under the influence of chemistry professor Antoine Balard, and of Jean Baptiste Dumas, the most famous chemist in France, Pasteur turned his interest to science and research. When he graduated in 1847, Pasteur was allowed to remain at the school to continue his work instead of being assigned immediately to a teaching post.

He was fascinated by the study of the crystals of tartaric acid and his studies in this field stamped him as a coming scientist of unusual ability. Pasteur proved that

there were four, not two, types of tartaric acid and within three months he was surrounded by older chemists and learned men who realized this young chemist was destined to become great.

Following his discovery in the field of tartaric acid crystals, Pasteur was made a professor at Strasbourg, where he fell in love with Marie Laurent, daughter of the rector of the university. They were married in May, 1849, and, fortunately for Pasteur, his wife understood her husband's love of science and undoubtedly contributed much to his success.

In 1854, Pasteur was offered the chair of chemistry at Lille and at the same time he was to be dean of the university.

"To be dean at 32 was revolutionary in the French system," ex-

plains Dr. Gibbons, "but this indicated Pasteur's reputation even in these early years of his career."

Lille was the industrial centre of northern France and it was Pasteur's contacts with the industry which started him on the next phase of his life and his studies in microbiology. Through his experiments with bacteria, he exploded the myth of spontaneous generation. His work on wine, vinegar and beer led to pasteurization and he was able to save the wine industry of France, which had been steadily decreasing because wine was going sour until Pasteur discovered that by heating it, the taste would remain unaffected but

the bacteria which soured the wine would be destroyed.

After developing a method of pasteurization, the chemist continued his probe into the microbes. He saved the silk industry which was being ruined by a disease among the silk worms. Pasteur discovered that tiny brown spots on the eggs were caused by germs and that these germs later infected the hatching worms and that only eggs from healthy moths should be selected for hatching. After six years of hard work, the disease was conquered and the south of France once again became prosperous. Later he developed the technique of vaccination against anthrax and extended it to hydrophobia.

In November, 1888, the Pasteur Institute was opened in Paris. It now includes a clinic for treatment of hydrophobia and a teaching and research centre for work on virulent and contagious diseases. Pas-

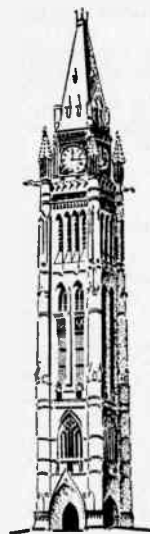

and the walls are of hand-carved wood. The house is strung with corridors inches deep in Persian rugs. As Ed Wynn once remarked—it's just a little place of 45 rooms, but it's home."

Thomas spent two days at Pickfair, Mary Pickford's west-coast home, where she lives among acres of hillside gardens in a style second only to Lloyd's. "It's a place of contrasts," Thomas says. "In the basement she has a western room with a big wooden bar which was brought around the Cape in the California Gold Rush. The room contains all the Fairbanks relics—swords, costumes, souvenirs."

Miss Pickford, of course, is Canadian-born. She grew up in Toronto as Gladys Mary Smith, and right from the start was a hard-headed business woman. She went on the stage at 12. A year later, when David Belasco cast her in a Broadway play she told him "I'm 13 years old, and at the crossroads of my life. I've got to make good between now and the time I'm 20, and I have seven years to do it in. I'm the father of my family and I've got to earn all the money I can." Later, in Hollywood, Adolph Zukor told her: "Mary, sweetheart, I don't have to diet. Every time I talk over a new contract with you and your mother I lose 10 pounds."

Mary Pickford, Fairbanks and Charlie Chaplin started an independent studio, United Artists, with D. W. Griffith, who became one of the big names in Hollywood. Griffith is dead, but Thomas recorded recollections of his heyday with his brother Albert. One of the people Griffith pushed ahead at the old Biograph studios was Lillian Gish. Years later Griffith said "she is not only the best actress in her profession, but she has the best mind of any woman I have ever met."

Thomas found Miss Gish, the First Lady of the Silent Screen, looking "extremely youthful, with soft baby-like skin." They met in New York, where she is appearing in a stage play, *All the Way Home*.

She shares an apartment with her sister Dorothy, also a silent screen star. After seeing Lillian Gish in *Way Down East* John Barrymore described her as "the most superlatively exquisite and poignantly enchanting thing." The late George Jean Nathan felt that "her particular genius lies in making the definite charmingly indefinite." But when sound film arrived her voice proved to be unsuitable, and she turned to the stage, where she continues to charm. Her biographer, Albert Bigelow Paine, says "she never played a part as lovely as herself."

Thomas also visited Buster Keaton, the comedian with the deadpan face who could look stern and unmoved through any chaos. Self-named champion pie-thrower (he insisted on quality rather than quantity), Keaton joined his parents' acrobatic act at three, later got into films with Fatty Arbuckle, made a great fortune, ran through it in the 1920's, had a couple of decades of meagre living, then made a comeback in the 1950's. Thomas talked to him at his farm in the San Fernando Valley where he keeps poultry in the backyard, has a comfortable house of reddish-brown wood, a big barn, and is happy as a clam being a farmer—can hardly tear himself away when his professional life sometimes calls him back to the bright lights.—*June Graham.*

### CBW—LATE CONCERT

The Transposed Heads, by Peggy Glanville-Hicks, an opera in six scenes commissioned by the Louisville Symphony Orchestra for the Kentucky Opera Association will be concluded on the Late Concert with tonight's performance.

The libretto for The Transposed Heads was extracted from Thomas Mann's novel of that name, and is, according to the composer, a miraculous blend of humour, realistic drama and metaphysical discourse.

The story tells of two young Hindus both in love with the wife of one. In the course of events, both young men are decapitated in a kind of vicarious sacrifice involving an element of "love-guilt." The young maiden implores the giant Goddess Kali to restore the lives of the two young men. But in granting the wish, the goddess makes the most fantastic "Faux-pas" of all time, placing the husband's head on the lover's body, and vice-versa. Question: Which now is the legal husband, and which is the friend? Tonight on Late Concert—in English—Scenes 4, 5, and 6. Produced by Ben Horch.

AN ORIGINAL interpretive essay on the history of socialism in Canada will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night, on CBC radio. It will be illustrated by dramatized speeches, discussions and interviews with many people, old and young, in all walks of life, who have been involved with socialist development in this country at some time from its early beginnings before the turn of the century to the formation this year of the New Party, which will hold a convention in Ottawa from July 31 to August 4.

The program has been written and will be narrated by Paul W. Fox, assistant professor of political economy at the University of Toronto, who also conducts the interviews. Gordon Cullingham is program organizer and production will be by Del MacKenzie.

Cullingham says "We intend to examine the roots of socialism in Canada, indicate how influences have differed in various parts of the country, trace the birth and record of the CCF up to the formation of the New Party, and explore the various interests that are simultaneously being appealed to now (farm, labor, and 'liberally-minded persons.')

The effect of all these sources and interests on doctrine will be considered at each stage of development."

In addition to talking to old-time socialists, Fox explores the attitudes to socialism of three young men who are just entering active politics. He asks one of them, who is associated with the socialist movement, what special appeal it has for young people, and he asks the other two, who are identified with older political parties, why they did not become socialists.

"Socialism in Canada has had many different sources," Fox tells us. "The main ones have been British influence, the Fabians, Hyndman, Blatchford, and the Independent Labour Party. Marx

was also an influence. There was a good deal of influence from the United States, too, in particular from Eugene Debs, who came to Canada to speak publicly.

"The roots of Socialism in Canada go back to before the beginning of this century. A number of British workingmen brought socialist ideas over with them. We interviewed some who are still alive and found their ideas had changed very little.

"One of the oldest socialist parties in this country was the Socialist Party of Canada, which originated in British Columbia very early in this century. It had a number of militant Marxists in it, who, when they were not arguing with the rest of society, spent most of their time arguing among themselves. They engaged in political action, but some of them said they ran candidates only for propaganda reasons, while others apparently thought they were going to win political power. One of the former used to campaign for office himself, giving all the reasons why the voters should support a Marxist and then telling them that it didn't really matter whether they elected him—Marxism was going to rule eventually, anyway.

"Later, in the 1920's the Socialist Party split on the issue of whether or not to accept direction from the communists in Russia.

it is hard to know when he had his tongue in his cheek. He felt, as few men have, the haunting sense of divinity and mystery in the world, but while bowing before the power of the universe, taught the great truth that "things are knowable." Of his famous *Republic* Emerson said: "Burn the libraries, for their value is in this book."

St. Augustine was born in North Africa of African parents in 396 A.D., and was brought up a Christian. At 12 he began attending at school of grammar, and at 17 a wealthy patron sent him to Carthage to study rhetoric. Around that time he became a convert to the Manichaeism philosophy, which offered slick solutions to problems about the nature of God, the Scriptures and the origin of evil. At 20 he went to Rome to teach, with his mistress and their young son, and then to Milan as professor of rhetoric. There he began to see through Manichaeism and largely through the influence of Archbishop Ambrose and St. Augustine's persistent mother he was received back into the Christian fold. He returned to Africa and joined a religious community, later becoming Bishop of Hippo. St. Augustine was a most human, kindly person who lived simply but wasn't ostentatiously ascetic. He died in office during the long siege of Hippo by the Vandals. When the city was finally captured and razed his huge library of 232 books and countless manuscripts was miraculously saved. His *City of God* offers a profound view of the actual and the ideal in Christian society. But it is in his *Confessions* that we have the best account of him. There he candidly recalls the excesses of his youth and his long battle with sin ("give me chastity, but not yet," he prayed), and his efforts to reconcile Bible teaching with Platonic philosophy.

David Hume was born to a distinguished Edinburgh family in 1711. He entered the university at 12 to study law, left after three years, had a nervous breakdown and then tried the business world as a cure. It wasn't, so when he inherited some money at 23 he

went to France for three years, where he worked his speculations into systematic form and it became his most important book, the brash and forthright *Treatise of Human Nature*, from which all his philosophy developed. Hume was a thorough sceptic, advocating common sense and faith as lifebelts in the sea of uncertain knowledge. His book fell flat, partly because he used it to make short shrift of established religious principles. (An amusing footnote to this is the fact that the Edinburgh street where this agnostic lived was later named St. David's after him!)

Hume tried in vain to get professorships at Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities, became tutor to a young nobleman (had to sue for back pay), and then secretary to a general who travelled in Austria, Italy and France. In this job Hume saved enough money to retire to Edinburgh and devote himself to the study of history, political economy and philosophy. His *History of England* finally brought him the fame and fortune he craved. He returned to France, where he blossomed out as the darling of the French salons. Though Hume was fat and clumsy, with a broad Scots accent, he was at his best in a drawing room—amiable, friendly, completely trusting, unenvious, a stimulating conversationalist. For two years before his retirement he was British Under Secretary of State.

One small group did this and then became the Communist Party of Canada. But most Canadian socialists refused to, and went on to create a socialist movement which was democratic, parliamentary, non-violent and peculiarly Canadian."

"It was out of this group that the creators of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation emerged in 1933," Fox says. "This marked

the birth for the first time of a nationwide Canadian democratic socialist party. It included a number of western farmers, co-operators, intellectuals, and some trade unionists."

Immanuel Kant was a little, dwarf-like figure, scarcely five feet high, and matchstick limbs, a high, squeaky voice, and the intellect of a giant. He was gay, witty, young at heart, sincere, and he lived by the clock. Winter and summer he was up at five, studied for two hours, and worked at his desk from nine till one. Then he dined in a restaurant, but he had to keep going to different ones because crowds flocked to see and hear him everywhere. He loved to linger over his lunch with friends until late afternoon. Then he took a brisk hour's walk, rain or shine, and was back at his books by dusk. This funny little man overthrew the vast army of Materialism and showed that beyond the senses and the tangible things on earth that can be fitted into categories of our understanding is a spiritual, transcendental quality, something the intellect cannot actually fathom.

He was born to a poor family in Königsberg, East Prussia, in 1724, and stayed there all his life. He studied at the university (first theology, then philosophy), tutored for a while, until at 31, he became a lecturer at the university.

# Tommy Ambrose: Young Man With Fan Clubs

FROM A START as a Youth for Christ rally singer, 21-year-old Tommy Ambrose has become a popular television and recording artist.

Tommy returns for his second season as host of *While We're Young* on Monday, July 3.

Also returning to this summer variety show for young adults will be featured singer Bonnie Hicks, who recently became Mrs. Tommy Ambrose; the *Swinging Voices*; the *Bob Van Norman Dancers*, and a 21-piece orchestra conducted by Gordon Kushner.

Tommy credits most of his success to TV personality Charles Templeton, who "actually started me singing.

"I was only five when Charles, then director of Youth for Christ, put me on stage at Maple Leaf Gardens to sing spiritual and gospel songs to my own guitar accompaniment," said the young singer. "I wasn't scared, just embarrassed because of the man-sized guitar which almost hid me from view."

Between the ages of eight and 16, Tommy sang regularly with his three brothers on *Songs from Heaven's Airways* on Toronto radio station CKEY. One of his brothers, Jimmy, is now Tommy's personal manager.

It wasn't until the summer of 1957 that Tommy turned his attention to popular singing, although he says he will still gladly sing at religious gatherings.

Tommy made his television debut in 1958 on *'Cross-Canada Hit Parade*, which was followed by guest appearances on *Country Club*, a sophisticated-type variety show. Later, he formed a five-man rhythm band and toured the night-club circuit.

The curly-haired vocalist made his first recording in 1958. It feat-

ured two new songs in the Italian vein, *Tu Sei Mia Amore* and *Remember, Remember*. Since then Tommy has made several more single recordings and hopes to have his first long-play album on the market soon.

Appropriately titled *While We're Young*, the album will feature standard pop-type tunes such as *Margie*, *Just For a Thrill* and *Good Bye*.

Last fall, *While We're Young* received two awards from *Le Gala du Music Hall Canadien*, an organization which annually presents awards to variety artists and programs seen in French Canada.

Tommy received an award for the best English-speaking male vocalist of the year. The second award, made to producer Dave Thomas, was based on the show's high performance, standard and contribution to the Canadian variety field in the presentation of new, young, Canadian artists.

When not rehearsing, Tommy keeps busy answering mail, occa-

sionally visiting his two fan clubs, or studying basic tap dancing.

## BARBECUE SAUCE

- 1 cup strong coffee
- 1 cup ketchup
- ½ cup Worcestershire sauce
- ½ cup brown sugar
- ½ cup butter or margarine
- Juice of ½ lemon

In a saucepan, combine all ingredients. Simmer for 5 minutes.

Cool. Store in covered jar in refrigerator. Yield—4 cups. Use to marinate steaks, chops or chicken, for several hours before cooking them. Also use for brushing on steaks, hamburgers, chicken, etc., when barbecuing them.
