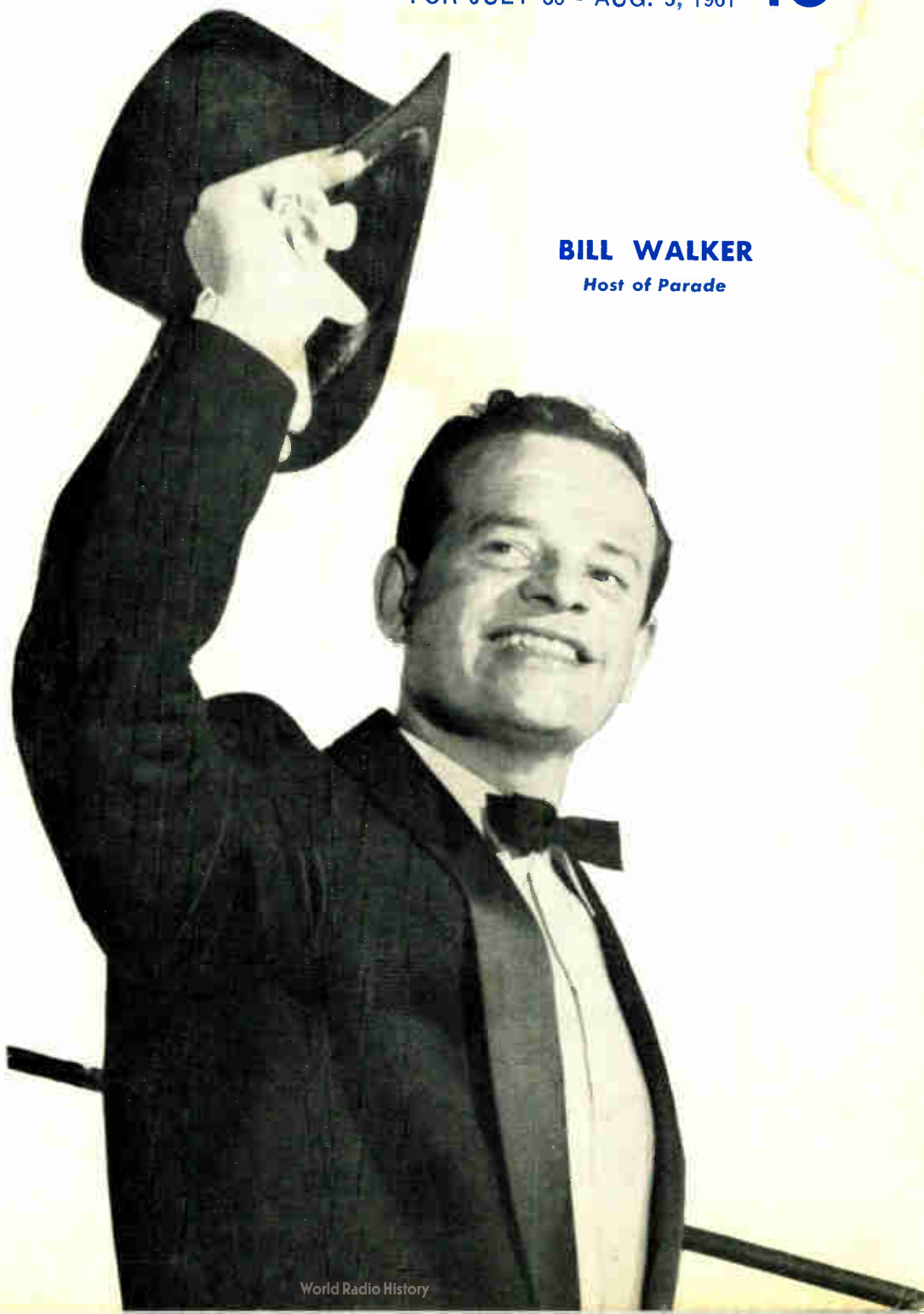

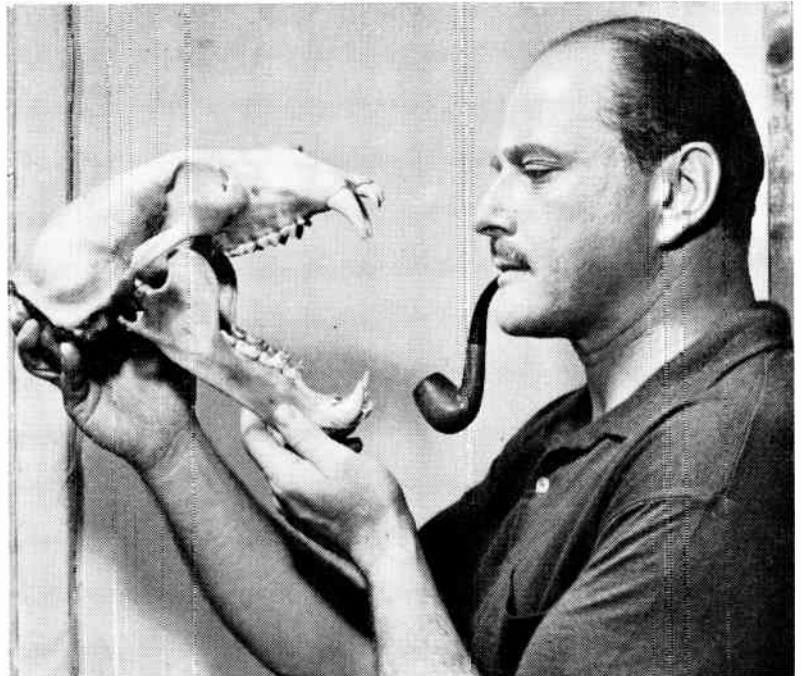

He Wants You to Enjoy Nature



The skull of a polar bear, "one of nature's most magnificent architectural creations," fascinates Prof. Swinton. He has a large collection of skulls.

PROFESSOR GEORGE SWINTON, of the University of Manitoba School of Art, is a painter, teacher, writer, lecturer and, as well, is the weekly host and instructor on CBC-TV's Art in Action series.

Art in Action, a 13-week series of lectures and demonstrations on landscape painting, is seen Sundays. Prof. Swinton's purpose on the program is to show the nature, the scope and the meaning of landscape painting—in its traditional and abstract forms.

As an artist himself, the professor has discovered the enjoyment to be found in attempting to capture the beauty of nature through landscape painting in its many varied forms. On the program Art in Action, he hopes to stimulate in others a determination to enjoy it too.

Prof. Swinton has many other interests, among them, philosophy, religion, music, literature, psychology and sociology.

George Swinton was born in Vienna, Austria in 1917 and came to Canada in 1939. After a year's

army service he married Alice Mantika in Saskatoon. They have twin eight-year-old daughters, Nelda and Moira.

Between 1943 and 1945 he studied oil and water-colour sketching while on military duty in Canada and the Far East. After the war he furthered his studies, at McGill University and, later, at Montreal's School of Art and Design.

He was curator at the Saskatoon Art Centre from 1947 to 1949; then spent a year studying at the Art Students' League in New York.

Since 1949 he has held appointments at Queen's University and as assistant chief of industrial design with the National Gallery Design Centre, Ottawa. He went to the University of Manitoba's School of Art in 1954 to take up his present post there as head of the art department.

Since 1954 Prof. Swinton has held many one-man art shows, spent a summer with Eskimo carvers in the North, been awarded a Canada Council senior fellowship, and was three times prize-winner at the Winnipeg Art Show.

"But tune in. It might be a giggle; there's always something happening, some good performances from somebody or other; there's usually some unknown bit-player acting me off the screen! Still, that's life. I can always throw myself in the river if this little number comes to nothing."

FILMS AND ART collected in Europe are expected to enrich the fare on CBWT's *Busy Fingers* when the series resumes this fall.

Teacher and hostess Betty Nickerson this summer is to visit Prague, Odessa, Yalta, Moscow, Leningrad, Stockholm and Copenhagen. While there, she will take films and bring back examples of art work produced in summer schools and camps to show to *Busy Fingers* viewers. Mrs. Nickerson is taking with her, art work that has been submitted to the program illustrating how Winnipeg children live, play and learn.

Recently, Mrs. Nickerson received inquiries from teachers in four countries concerning an exchange of children's art work. "This is a wonderful, exciting possibility, and I would like to know of teachers that might be interested," said Mrs. Nickerson.

"From what I have read there are some exciting developments in the field of children's art in the Soviet Union, as well as many interesting leisure time activities that combine learning and playing so successfully that the child isn't sure where one begins and the other ends. One development is a model railway (about a dozen large cities have them), where young people do all the engineering, driving, track laying, and ticket taking."

Mrs. Nickerson says, "My personal belief is that we will have a better and much richer world as we become better acquainted with the people in it. I think that I will find that a young person painting in the classroom in Leningrad is not much different than one painting in St. James, and perhaps if we know this, our younger generation will do a better job of creating a more peaceful world."

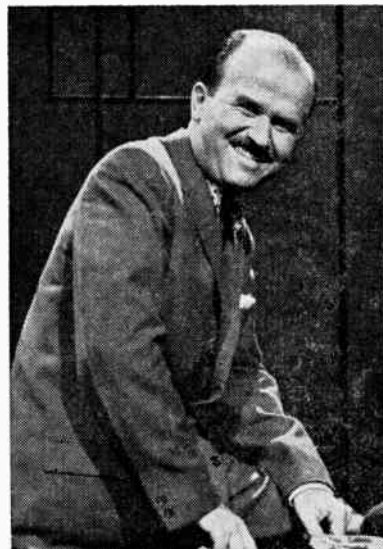

Sir Cedric Hardwicke on "Assignment"

50 Years as an Actor

THIS WEEK on CBC radio's *Assignment*, Sir Cedric Hardwicke reminisces about his 50-year acting career, particularly about the theatre and fellow actors. The profile-type interview will be presented in five segments, one each night (Monday to Friday) during the first half of *Assignment*, heard on the Dominion network.

Colin Edwards, program organizer for CBC radio's *Venture* and *Project* series, conducts the interview. Producer of *Assignment* is Barry Morgan.

"Sir Cedric is a charming personality but extremely diffident says Edwards. "He talks freely about the people he has worked with and about the theatre but it is difficult to get him to talk about himself. You have to pry information about his own career from him and then when you do get him talking about himself it's usually only for a minute or two. Then he turns the conversation right back to other people and things."

Sir Cedric is 68 years old but rather than thinking about retirement, he is embarking on what is really a new phase of his career. This month he completes a three-year engagement as star of the Broadway stage hit *A Majority of One*, which during its two years on Broadway and year on the road, has had more than 1,000 performances. Gertrude Berg, who played opposite Sir Cedric in the play, will continue to star with him as he moves into the field of regular television. The two begin work shortly on an American network series in which Sir Cedric portrays a professor at a college where Molly Goldberg is enrolled.

Although he has had a few one-time specials on television, Sir Cedric hasn't appeared before in a regular series. He thus abandons the oriental role of a Japanese industrialist he portrayed in *A Majority of One* and returns to the role of an Englishman. Mrs. Berg,

however, continues the role of the Jewish woman which she first made famous as Molly Goldberg on radio and television and which has become a second personality with her. In *Majority* she portrayed a Jewish widow from Brooklyn who goes to Tokyo and wins the Japanese industrialist's heart.

Hardwicke was born in Lye, Worcestershire, England, on February 19, 1893, the son of a doctor. He was educated at Bridgnorth School and then attended Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts in London, against the wishes of his parents. "You'd have to make your mistakes in public, but I bury mine," advises his father who, nevertheless, allowed Cedric to attend the Academy. In 1912 he received his first major stage role at Lyceum Theatre, London, in *The Monk and the Woman*.

Later he joined the Benson Company and toured South Africa and Rhodesia, playing roles in Shakespeare plays. In his recently published memoirs, *A Victorian in Orbit*, he writes about that tour: "At another performance, the dining-room stage in the shanty-style hotel was so small that we could get no more than four characters on it at a time. The king, after being run through by Hamlet, could not find a vacant inch on which to die. He thereupon picked

this way carefully over the bodies of Gertrude and Laertes and expired with standing room only in the wings."

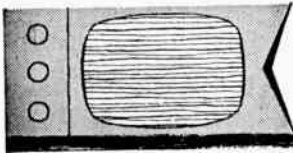
When he returned to England, he appeared in *Macbeth*, *The Taming of the Shrew* and *Hamlet*. He served with the British Expeditionary Forces in France during the First World War and had the distinction of being the last British officer to leave the war zone at the end of the war. His final act as a serviceman in France was to haul down the flag which had flown over General Headquarters.

Upon his return to London he joined the Birmingham Repertory Company, winning fame as a character actor. Among the famous roles he portrayed around that time (early 'twenties) were Churdles Ash in *The Farmer's Wife*, King Magnus in *The Apple Cart* and Edward Moulton-Barrett in *The Barretts of Wimpole Street*, the latter being a long-run play at the Queens Theatre that established him as a dramatic "heavy."

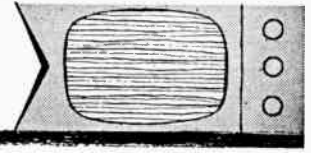
He made his first film as early as 1911 but did not appear on the screen again until the silent version of *Nelson* in 1927. With the advent of talking motion pictures, Hardwicke began to devote an increasing amount of time to screen work, appearing in *Dreyfus* in 1931 (his first "talkie") and then in such epics as *Becky Sharpe*, *Les Misérables*, *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*, *Stanley and Livingstone*, *Song of My Heart* and *Helen of Troy*.

In the theatre he has acted, directed and produced. Among his productions and directions are *Pygmalion*, *Antigone* and *Candida*. Throughout his acting career, Hardwicke "has kept his place as an outstanding actor of what has now become the old school: very consciously an actor and carrying his art over into daily life with a

Army Show. A leg injury prevented him from taking a 10,000-mile tour with the show in 1945.

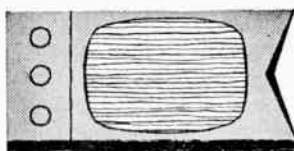
"When I was released from hospital, I found that they had given my part to a sergeant," recalls Yost, "and my commanding officer discharged me with, 'You might as well go back to school, Elwy!'"

Yost returned to Toronto, did radio work on the late Howard Milson's Radio Workshop, and graduated from the University of Toronto with a degree in sociology. He also joined a local drama group, appeared for three seasons in summer stock, wrote and directed a film, and then worked with the Toronto Star in sales promotion.

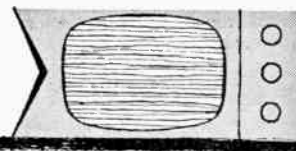
He later married a newspaper reporter from Vancouver and together they went to England, where he worked as a porter in a Devon hotel, studied TV production with the BBC—and went flat broke.

Yost sported a beard in England and this eventually earned him a bit part in John Huston's hit movie, *Moulin Rouge*. A casting agent told Yost to join the actor's union and get some extra work in films. The union wasn't accepting members at the time, but a clause in its contract allowed directors to employ non-union, "national types" for the sake of authenticity, and the hirsute

splendid lack of self-consciousness," as Alan Pryce-Jones, one-time editor of the London Times Literary Supplement, so aptly put it.

It was largely this honest devotion to the theatre and acting which led King George V, in his 1934 New Year's Honours List, to bestow upon Hardwicke the title of Knight Bachelor.

During the last 10 years, Sir Cedric has divided his time between England and North America, appearing in many films as well as stage productions. Among his tours across Canada, have been one with Charles Boyer, Agnes Moorehead and Charles Laughton in dramatic readings of *Don Juan in Hell*, from Shaw's *Man and Superman*, and, of course, *A Majority of One*.

Sir Cedric is also noted for his

many articles on the theatre in leading British and American publications and for his books, which include *Let's Pretend* (1932) and *A Victorian in Orbit* (1961). He believes that the stories of angered and disturbed people are taking the glamour and entertainment out of the theatre. "The theatre is entertaining but it is also something more than entertainment," he says. "It should leave you with something. After all, you probably pay as much to see a play as you would for a good book but today an audience is left with nothing after attending a Tennessee Williams-type play.

"I am also against the beatnik age. The attitude that a man who wears a tie can't act is now in vogue in certain sections of Broadway. I feel that I'm still the Victorian, however, and I'll be happy to be remembered as that type of actor."

Don Wittman talks about soccer, and Per Holting gives points on fly fishing.

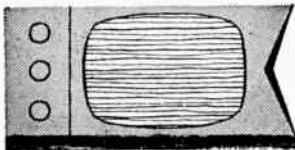

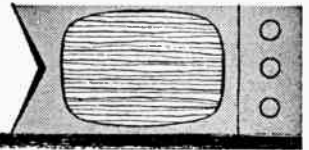

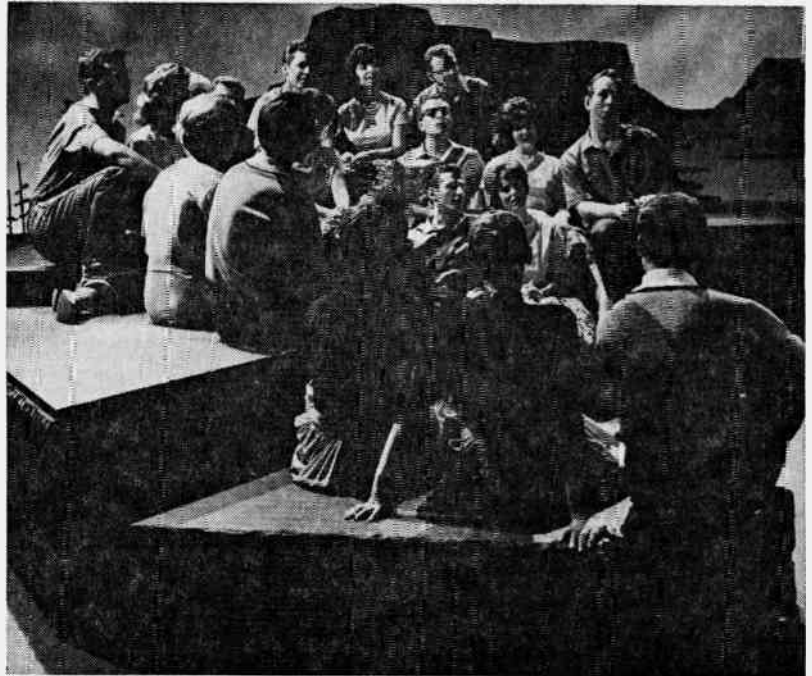

Yost continues to write—he's now writing a western novel—teaches 10 high school classes a day, appears weekly during the regular season on *Live a Borrowed Life*, is taking a course in educational television, and now is seen as moderator of *The Superior Sex*.

Educator Yost believes that TV has much to offer in the educational field. Viewer Yost enjoys watching TV and is selective but not narrow-minded in his viewing habits. 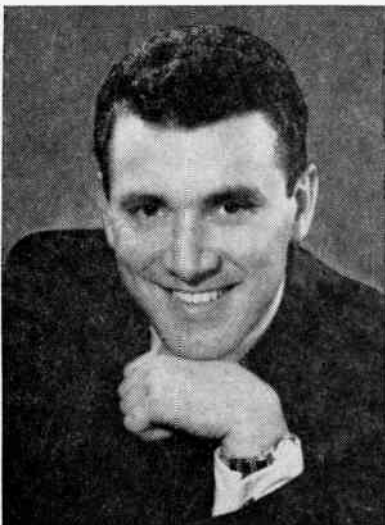

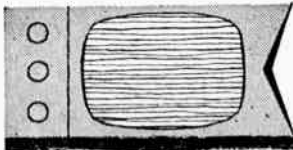

Venture Presents . . .

The Strange Land "Down Under"

THIS WEEK CBC radio's *Venture* will be devoted entirely to the continent of Australia. The hour-long broadcast, entitled *When the Wombat Dies*, will be heard Sunday on the Trans-Canada network.

Included in the program will be *The Death of a Wombat*, a documentary in words and music of the deadly havoc that can be worked by bush fires in Australia. The feature, which won the Italia Press Prize in 1959, was produced by the Australian Broadcasting Commission. Ivan Smith wrote the script and George English composed the music. Narrator is Alister Duncan.

Other items to be heard prior to the ABC production will consist of information about life in Australia, some legends of the Aborigines and music of the world's smallest and only island continent. The program will be produced by Dita Scholz with the co-operation of Tony Partridge.

The Death of a Wombat tells how a bush fire starts and then follows the various animals in their attempt to escape the raging inferno. Most of the action is focussed on the wombat, an Australian animal belonging to the marsupial family. Because it lacks grace and speed, the wombat has the most difficult time of all the animals in escaping from the fire and eventually dies before he can reach the river and safety.

Wombats—the name was given to them by the Australian Aborigines—are large, stoutly built and rather clumsy animals with short and extremely powerful limbs. They move about like a small bear

and are burrowers, the reason the Australians refer to them as badgers. While the limbs and stout claws are fine equipment for penetrating the ground, the animals have difficulty hurrying because of their close proximity to the earth.

The common, or naked-nosed wombat, lives in a burrow which ranges in length from 15 to as

much as 100 feet and has a nest at the end. By day it will hide in its den and when darkness has made the world safe for it, this coarse-haired creature emerges to search for food. Strictly a vegetarian, it feeds on grasses, roots and the inner bark of trees. Such a diet needs stout teeth and the wombat

Farming . . .

NEXT TO THE FROST

Farming Next to the Frost, the story of the Yukon farmers, will be presented by CBC radio's *Summer-fallow* this Monday night, on the Trans-Canada network.

Fifty years ago there were many people living in Canada's Yukon territory who believed that the black earth held a potential fortune, not in gold, but in growing crops. Today, in the shadow of the Arctic Circle, that belief is generally a thing of the past. Some men and women, however, still grow food within inches of the perma-frost in the Yukon but it is mostly for themselves because the prices they would have to charge to gain even a small profit aren't low enough to compete favorably with the "imported" products from the southern regions of the country.

Murray Creed, a producer in the CBC-TV features department, recently visited the Yukon and talked with some of these self-sustaining farmers. After returning to Toronto with these tape-recorded interviews, he prepared the script for

Farming Next to the Frost. He'll be heard throughout the program as narrator, interspersing his own observations of the area in north-western Canada with those of the people he interviewed.

During many months of the year, this wild and mostly barren land lies under the paralyzing hand of winter. Temperatures might go as low as 80 degrees below zero at any time throughout the winter, freezing the earth so solid that much of it fails to thaw even under the summer's sun when temperatures in some places reach the 100-degree mark. This frozen soil is known as perma-frost.

Creed talked to Hector Hortie, a soil expert and superintendent of a Canadian government experimental farm located about 700 miles north of the British Columbia border and 160 miles west of Whitehorse. According to Hortie, barley and oats are the best cereals to grow in perma-frost regions while wheat seldom matures because of the short growing season

(July and August). Legumes are difficult because the frost lies within eight inches of the surface but shorter-rooted crops, such as grasses, are excellent growers, receiving plenty of water from the ice melting under the top soil.

Creed also talked to Mrs. Murdoch McCush, who, along with her husband (a Northwest Mounted Policeman), moved to Dawson City in 1906. The easy panning of gold was a thing of the past by then but they were among the people who hoped the soil would enable them to live comfortably. Eight years earlier, prices of food were fantastic: \$5 for a mug of milk across the bar; \$5 for a pound of tomatoes compared to two baskets for five cents in New York; \$1.50 for one onion; a fresh egg was almost too expensive to eat.

The McCush's, along with other settlers, cleared the area and started to farm along the southern slopes, realizing it would be hard, but even then they were being optimistic. Today around Dawson City, the farm buildings are gone or are caving in and most of the cleared land is abandoned. There are a few farmers, though, like Adam Johns, a gardener who moved from a Prairie dairy farm. He has several greenhouses and a backyard full of transplants.

"Where there was once 30,000 people, Dawson City now has less than a thousand," says Creed. "And when Adam Johns quits farming, it's a question if anyone will take over. Most things can be trucked in from the outside almost as cheaply as he can raise them. Potatoes are still \$10 a bag, in June, when they are on 'special while they last' and celery is 50 cents a bunch.

"The men who foresaw small fortunes in subarctic farming are all gone now. Their dreams are gone too, shattered by the long, dark winter, the high cost of supplies, the low cost of imported food and the dwindling population."

But there are a few people who carry on. They have their reasons, hopes and ambitions (some exciting ones, too) about farming in the Yukon, next to the frost.



Let's Go Festival-Hopping

FOR THE SECOND consecutive year, CBC radio is presenting a series of daily broadcasts on the Trans-Canada network of music from festivals held in Canada and Europe. The series, entitled *CBC Summer Festival 1961*, began July 23 and continues through Saturday, August 12.

This week's schedule includes music from festivals in Vancouver, Stratford (Ontario), Aldeburgh, Bergen and Montreal. Already broadcast have been portions of festivals in Cologne, Rotterdam, Zagreb, Schwetzingen, Vienna and Mount Orford, Quebec.

The idea of combining broadcasts from many different festivals into one series is a reflection of what has become, in recent years, a fairly common practice among those who can combine a love of music with time enough for a long holiday. The practice might be called "festival hopping" — travelling in succession from one famous music festival to another over a period of a few weeks. Many of the major European festivals are so

scheduled that the traveller can spend a few days at each and take in most of the main programs.

CBC Summer Festival attempts to provide the listener with the same entertainment without involving him in the expense of travelling. During the remaining part of the series' schedule, there will be seven programs originating from the Vancouver International Festival and three from Stratford, as well as the ones from Aldeburgh, Bergen and Montreal.

A feature of this week's broadcasts is the one from Montreal. As part of the annual Montreal Festival, now in its 26th season, several concerts of contemporary experimental and electronic music will be presented during the First International Week of Today's Music. The concerts are planned under the direction of Pierre Mercure of Montreal, who is a well-known composer of many important works.

The fact that a full week is being devoted to the study and performance of electronic and other avant-

Women Want to Know About Alcoholism. Two guests answer questions about alcoholism on Matinee Highlights today. They are Edward D. Impressions of Canada (Part 2).

Last week, listeners to Matinee Highlights heard Indian journalist Amita Malik give her impressions of the Maritimes. Today, she will talk about the province of Quebec. Mrs. Malik spent Christmas Day in a French-Canadian home in the Laurentians and also visited many other parts of the province. garde music is indicative of the interest in the art form among professional composers, many of whom believe that the resources of conventional instruments alone have been nearly exhausted. In an attempt to find new ways of expressing their musical ideas, some composers are using such methods as re-recording everyday sounds until they lose all identity—the sound of a sneeze, for instance, when processed through a complicated series of tape recorders and mixers, can sound like music from Mars. There are other examples, too: the art of drawing "sounds" on film (a process in which Canadian Norman McLaren has specialized); creating completely artificial sounds by passing current through electronic tubes; using ordinary instruments and voices in completely new and different ways, often in combination with tape recorders or other electronic instruments.

Some of the best-known exponents of this "new music" will be represented in the Montreal Festival: John Cage and Morton Feldman of the United States; Serge Garant of Canada; Edgar Varese of France; Bruno Maderna of Italy; Mauricio Kagel of Argentina.

Part of the opening program in the First International Week of Today's Music will be broadcast Thursday, August 10, at 9 p.m. The conductor will be Kagel and two soloists will perform: Canadian soprano Claire Grenon-Masella and American pianist David Tudor. The ensemble of conventional instruments will be augmented by a large number of percussion instruments in addition to tape recorders and other electronic devices.

The broadcasts from the Vancouver International Festival will include four orchestral concerts, two solo recitals and a string quartet program. Victor Feldbrill, permanent conductor of the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, will be guest conductor of the CBC Vancouver

has them; powerful gnawing instruments which continue to grow throughout life, like a rodent's.

Endowed with a reasonable share of intelligence, the animal makes a good pet and readily responds to kindness. In captivity it shows an even disposition and will eat all kinds of vegetables, especially new hay which it will eat stalk by stalk. A hoarse growling cough is the loudest sound it produces, making it ideal for people who dislike dogs barking or cats wailing at night. Wombats, which may live a long time—some tame ones have been known to survive as long as 30 years—are solitary in their habits except at mating time. The breeding season is from the middle of April to the end of June and usually the mother raises only

one young at a time and carries it around in her pouch in typical marsupial fashion.

The wombat is found in the coastal regions and the hills of southeastern Australia, from New South Wales to Queensland, Tasmania and Flinders Island. The naked-nose variety owes its name to a bare patch on its muzzle. In colour, the wombat varies from almost black to yellowish buff or grizzled. It is practically tail-less and about 40 inches long on an average, but large wombats may come closer to four feet and weigh as much as 80 pounds. The common wombat is only one of a number of different kinds which make up the family *Phascolomidae*. Another kind, in contrast, has soft fur and a hairy nose. The thick coarse covering of some common wombats has been used to make door mats and the flesh is said to taste something like pork, but it is not a favourite dish.

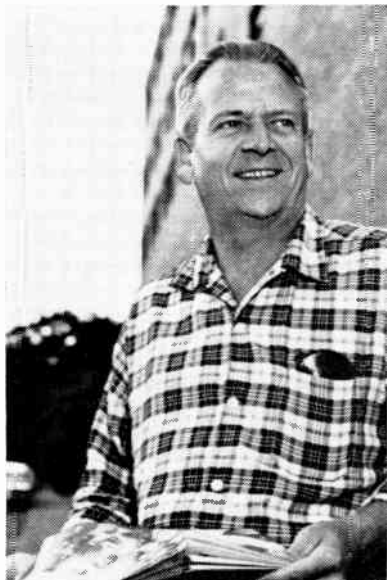

MORNING DEVOTIONS

CBW — Rev. David Clink, Grant Memorial Baptist Church, Winnipeg;



EARL CAMERON is seen reading the CBC-TV National News by some three million people five nights a week. But most strangers don't recognize him in person.

A salesman in a store kept staring at Earl recently and eventually commented: "Fellow who reads the news on TV looks just like you. Ever watch him?"

"No," truthfully replied Cameron.

"People often look at me on the street," says Cameron. "They seem to want to say hello, but aren't sure whether I'm somebody's brother or a guy they met at a party last month."

Cameron's parents settled in Moose Jaw, where he was born in 1915. His father, a railway mail service employee, sang baritone and won top honours in the Saskatchewan music festival so often it almost discouraged other contestants from trying.

Earl attended high school and junior college in Moose Jaw, then went to Normal School and received a certificate to teach. This led to a brief—albeit spectacular—career as an educator.

Do You Recognize This Man?

"I was engaged to teach in a little town called Kildare," explains Earl. "This was during the great western drought of the '30's and it hadn't rained in Kildare for a long time. The second day I taught in the town there was a downpour of 3½ inches of rain. I figured I had done enough for the town, so I left."

After this, Cameron held various jobs. He shovelled coal 10 hours a day for \$18 a week, worked as a railway section hand for 25 cents an hour, drove a hearse and worked as a lifeguard.

Cameron then auditioned for a job at Moose Jaw radio station, CHAB. "I had about 70 competitors for an announcing job," recalls Earl. "The whole public-speaking class at the 'Y,' I guess." But he got a summer relief job and went on to become chief announcer and commercial manager. He went to CKY, Winnipeg for four years, then came to the CBC in Toronto.

"I had two ambitions when I came East," says Cameron—"to read the national news on CBC radio and to find an apartment for my wife, Adelaide, and our child. Being a fresh, young kid from the West I didn't dare mention my desire to read the news, but I told everybody in town about my need for an apartment. With a lucky break I was reading the news within a month—but it took four months to locate a place to live."

Cameron has specialized in news reading for the 17 years he's been in Toronto, but he still does his share of regular announce duty,

such as reading station identification cues. He also announces the challengers on CBC-TV's Front Page Challenge and does two radio programs for the farm broadcasts department.

Viewers often write to ask why Earl doesn't smile.

"Well, I've really got nothing to smile about while reading news," he answers. "How do you report a tragic plane crash or a political crisis and end up with a grin?"

Cameron spends his leisure time reading, golfing and putting around in his home workshop. Peter Whittall — CBC-TV's Mr. Fix-it—who lives nearby, and Earl often spend hours working on a project. They've built two boats in the Cameron backyard.

The Camerons have two sons—Clark, 17, and Harold, 10. An 11-year-old dog, Rexy, who still thinks he's a pup, rounds out the list of inhabitants of their modest but attractive Richmond Hill, Ont., bungalow.

ELEMENTS OF CHESS - PART II

From a series earlier this year on CBWT's "Stop, Look and Listen"

NOW THAT WE have mastered the moves of rook and king, we are ready to consider the moves of the bishop. The only way that a bishop can move is diagonally or cornerwise. The diagram shows this move and will emphasize the point that a bishop which starts the game on a white square will finish the game, if uncaptured, on a white square. Note, however, that one bishop plays on the whites while the other is on the blacks, so that between them they can cover all the squares. The bishop, like the rook, can only move in a straight line as long as its path is clear—and captures by replacing any opposing piece in its path.

The queen, the strongest piece on the board, moves like a rook or like a bishop, that is to say it moves on ranks, files and diagonals in straight lines as long as the way is clear. A glance at the diagram will show that a queen can cover as

many as 28 of the 64 squares, or nearly half the board.


HAVING FIXED the moves in your mind try to checkmate the opposing king using first a queen and bishop, then queen and king, and finally two bishops and king. The secret in the last situation is to drive the lone king into a corner.

Now you should be ready to try some more complicated manoeuvres. You will find it fun, for instance, to play with a bishop and rook against a queen, or with other more or less equal combinations opposed to one another. You will have to watch out now for some other attacking manoeuvres. The first of these is the pin. If the king and another piece are standing on the same diagonal and an attacking bishop moves onto that diagonal, either the piece will be "pinned" (do you see why?) or if the king is the nearer piece it will be in check and will have to move, giving the bishop an easy capture. The dia-


grams illustrate this situation. In (3) the rook can't move because in doing so he would expose the king to check which is illegal. If he cannot be covered by one of his own pieces, he is lost. In (4) we see that the king in moving out of check exposes his queen to capture. Similar situations can occur on ranks or files when rooks are "checking" or "pinning."

A SOMEWHAT similar situation is called "discovered" check. In this case a piece is removed from a rank or file or diagonal, exposing the opposing king to check. If the piece moved attacks another piece at the same time then we will have a double attack which usually means a capture. The lesson to be learned from these positions is to look very carefully before putting pieces on the same diagonal or rank and file unless they cover each other, that is, can move in to recapture an attacking piece.




THE PIECE = THE SYMBOL




QUEEN'S MOVES CAN COVER 28 of the 64 SQUARES

2. THE BISHOP




THE PIECE = THE SYMBOL




N.B. ONE BISHOP ON WHITE SQUARES ONE ON BLACK
