

CBWT Drama

The Kidnapping At Scratching River

TELEVISION DRAMA produced on the prairies is presented on CBWT December 20th, centering around the Red River Settlement. It is the story of Sister Ste. Therese, founder of the St. Boniface Hospital and St. Mary's Academy.

A great deal of research was undertaken by John Harris and Lynn Baur in designing costumes, sets and props to assure scrupulous authenticity. The play was written by local writer William Paluk and is produced by Alwyn Scott.

Mr. Scott feels that the Winnipeg actors are achieving, in our television productions, a standard of excellence equal to anywhere in Canada. The dramas on television are some of the largest, most complex shows we turn out in Winnipeg, and since we do so few, they are still a novelty to our audiences.

Beautiful film footage was shot this summer of Sister Ste. Therese (played by Frances Depres) travelling through forests in a Red River cart accompanied by a group of pioneer men. The filming took place in Assiniboine Park, causing much consternation to passing motorists and creating much interest with the general public. At one time the cart became stuck on the bank of a creek, necessitating a great deal of work to free it, but this was recorded to good effect on the film.

The action of the play is centered in Ottawa, Red River Valley, and Scratching River, (or Morris, as it is now called). The story is carefully documented and based on fact.

During the days of filming, Miss Depres actually travelled the same distance she would have travelled from the Red River to Scratching River, and began to understand, in earnest, how Sister Ste. Therese must have felt under like circumstances, having experienced nausea from the cart's pitching, insects, sun and balking horses.

NORTHERN MESSENGER, CBC Winnipeg's unique message service to the remote areas of the North, will extend its allotted time to 2½ hours this Friday night, December 22nd, starting at 15 minutes past midnight, as it conveys Christmas greetings in three languages.

Several CBC technicians have been busy lately tape recording messages from Eskimos in such institutions as the Charles Camsell hospital in Edmonton and the Clearwater, Manitoba, sanatorium for use on the special program. The heads of these hospitals will speak during the evening as well, bringing their greetings to former patients and others in the north.

This annual broadcast has become an institution at CBC Winnipeg, with announcers sitting up until the wee small hours to convey messages in French and English, and play recordings in the Eskimo tongue. Listeners, to show their appreciation for this extra effort on the part of the announcing staff, have grown into the habit of remembering them with packages of baking and candies, to help the hours slip by while they are on duty.

JACK AISTROP, transcription manager for the BBC in North America, was recently in Winnipeg to talk to CBC programming directors about some of the programs that BBC service has available for possible use in Canada.

For music lovers there is a special series in the offing that has an English historical angle to it. Called *Music from Historical Houses*, an orchestra is taken out to such a place as Hatfield House—a former residence of Queen Elizabeth I—and performs the 16th century music that Queen Elizabeth and her courtiers listened and danced to. BBC transcriptions are continually being made available for the current British Music Festivals.

On the lighter side there is a series of programs featuring Ted Heath's Band, hosted by Canadian actor Paul Carpenter. English "pop" singers such as Lonnie Donnegan, Cliff Richards and Matt Munroe appear on the show and take part in musical skits with Paul Carpenter.

In drama there are numerous transcriptions of plays by current playwrights such as Terence "Separate Tables" Rattigan and Peter "Private Angelo" Ustinov.

Undoubtedly one of the most popular programs the BBC service supplies is the quiz game—My Word. Competing in popularity is The Archers. Mr. Aistrop told us that a separate department has been set up to take care of the Canadian fan mail received on this program about an English farming community.

CHRISTMAS WILL SEEM a bit brighter for the youngsters in Winnipeg Children's Hospital, when Stu Phillips, Peggy Neville and the cast of Red River Jamboree pay them a visit Wednesday, December 20th. While there, they will videotape a program to be telecast December 23rd.

Tchaikovsky's Immortal "Swan Lake"

The tuneful music of Tchaikovsky and the delicate precision of the National Ballet of Canada are combined Monday into a delightful evening of television. *Festival* presents "Swan Lake," featuring Lois Smith, David Adams and a cast of 40 dancers. (See feature, page 5).

Marion Waldman takes the part of Hetty Wakely—the woman who induces Sister Ste. Therese's father to reconsider his decision to banish his daughter from his life. She and Miss Depres are members of a small handful of local actors who have created a definitive style of television acting, being able to develop a character in detail. Miss Waldman has come by this technique from lengthy exposure to acting techniques in New York earlier in her career and from writing extensively for television and radio in Winnipeg.


Miss Depres has had possibly more experience in acting for television than any other local actress, but this role makes new demands on her which she considers a real challenge. She must here portray the abnormal combination of humility and dynamism that motivates the tireless Sister Ste. Therese.

As an additional matter of interest, there is still alive a Sister of the Grey Nun Order who knew Sister Ste. Therese, the heroine of the play. She is now almost 73, and as a novice met Sister Ste. Therese during the last four years of Sister Ste. Therese's life. She remembers her as a bright, clear-minded woman even then in her 80's. She too is a nurse and her own amazing personal experiences could furnish the plot of subsequent dramas.

To preserve the full element of surprise, Mr. Scott does not wish to divulge the plot which is truly unique. He feels the title is clue enough. The cast is as follows: Sister Ste. Therese—Frances Depres; Sandy McDonald, her father—George Waight; Hetty Wakely—Marion Waldman; Mother Superior at Red River—Leonie Guyot; Mrs. Martin—Monique Guyot; Susan Martin—Vivian Silver; Pierre Robichaud—leader of the kidnapers—Joe Mauro; Pioneers—Gilles Guyot, Marie Masson, Cliff Scott, Murray Aseltine, Colin Gorrie.

Festival presents Tchaikovsky's *Swan Lake Ballet*

TCHAIKOVSKY'S immortal *Swan Lake*, one of the world's great ballet classics, will be performed on CBC-TV's *Festival* on Monday night by members of the National Ballet of Canada. The cast of 40 is headed by prima ballerina Lois Smith, dancing the demanding double role of Odette-Odile and premier danseur David Adams as Prince Siegfried. Celia Franca, artistic director of the National Ballet, will play the non-dancing, mostly miming role of the Queen Mother. Miss Franca is making her first appearance "on stage" since she retired as a dancer two years ago to devote all her time to directing.

Video-taped last March, the 90-minute performance was produced by Norman Campbell. The augmented National Ballet Orchestra is directed by its permanent conductor, George Crum. *Swan Lake* was performed in its entirety for the first time on North American television five years ago, when Norman Campbell directed a National Ballet production on CBC-TV featuring Adams and Miss Smith.

Other leading roles in *Swan Lake* will be danced by Grant Strate as Benno, the Prince's friend; Yves Cousineau as the evil enchanter, von Rothbart; Howard Meadows as the Tutor; Jacqueline Irvings and Jocelyn Terrelle as the Leading Swans; and Sylvia Mason, Catherine Carr, Roberta Gibson and Valerie Lyon as the Cygnets.

This will be Canadians' only chance to see David Adams perform this season. He is on a year's leave of absence from the National Ballet Company. The TV performance was filmed before he left for overseas, where he is currently dancing with the Festival Ballet of London.

"I'm not quitting Canada. I'm not quitting Canadian ballet," Adams says. "I've just taken a year out to work abroad. I felt it was time for me to go away from the environment I have been in for 10 years now. This is not a question of loyalty, but the basic professional need to work with different people and do new ballets, a need to find stimulus from fresh and tougher competition."

A husky six-footer, 31-year-old Adams was a victim of rickets at an early age, and when he began to

study ballet with Gweneth Lloyd in Winnipeg he was such a spindly wisp of a child that she cast him as a starving boy in a ballet depicting lean years in the Canadian west. Now he is noted for his splendid physique and his superlative leaps, which some of this continent's leading ballet critics have compared with Nijinsky's.

In his teens Adams won a scholarship to study at the Sadlers' Wells Ballet School in London. He danced with the Sadlers' Wells Theatre Ballet and the Metropolitan Ballet of London, and returned to Canada in 1948. He and Miss Smith met in Vancouver that year, when they were both dancing in the Theatre Under the Stars. Miss Smith had toured the United States in *Oklahoma!* and *Song of Norway*. They were married in 1950, and have been with Miss Franca's company since 1951. Besides dancing all the company's principal male roles, Adams has choreographed several ballets.

The National Ballet of Canada is the only ballet company on this continent with the full-length *Swan Lake* in its standard repertoire. The ballet was first produced at Moscow's Bolshoi Theatre in 1877, but didn't enjoy real success until it was performed 18 years later at the Maryinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg. The second act, which is often presented by itself, contains some of the most poetically beautiful movements in classical ballet.

The legendary story tells of a beautiful maiden, Odette, the Swan Queen, and her companions who are under the spell of von Rothbart, an evil magician. The only spell-breaker that can bring the Queen and her court back to their human forms is the faithful love of a young man. When darkness falls the maidens of the court resume their shapes as young girls, but at dawn must become swans again.

Handsome young Prince Siegfried, bored with a ball celebrating his 21st birthday, dances with a girl he believes is Odette. She is really Odile, the daughter of the sorcerer von Rothbart, who magically has assumed Odette's appearance. Von Rothbart tricks the Prince into a promise to marry Odile. As he pledges his love the Prince doesn't notice Odette vainly beating her wings against the castle window as she tries to attract his attention.

In the last act, set at the lakeside, Odette sobs out her story of Siegfried's unwitting deception, telling the swan maidens that they are now forever in the enchanter's power. Filled with grief she tries to drown herself. In the nick of time Siegfried arrives, pursued by von Rothbart, and the lovers escape by leaping to their death in the moonlit lake, while the swan maidens form the shape of a cross, and von Rothbart's evil spell is broken.




The Living Machine—Part 2

How MUSICAL THEATRE Developed

SIX PROGRAMS from the award-winning *American Musical Theatre* series will replace the National Schools Telecasts on the CBC television network during the Christmas and New Year's holiday period.

The programs to be seen are part of the 13-program series which the CBC received from the Columbia Broadcasting System of the United States earlier this year in exchange for three CBC-produced, hour-long programs—*Pineapple Poll* and *Sir Thomas Beecham's Lollipops*, both from the *Ford Startime* series, and *Music in the Wall*, from the *General Motors Presents* series.

Two of the *American Musical Theatre* were seen last October on the CBC television network. The series, produced by WCBS-TV, New York, in co-

operation with the Board of Education of New York City, is a music workshop which traces the origins, developments and artistic contributions of musicals in America. Among the awards the series has received are a First Award from the Institute for Education by Radio and Television of Ohio State University and an Emmy Award from the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences for the "most outstanding children's or teen-age program."

The six programs to be seen during the next two weeks are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Workshop director Jim Morske is host for the programs. Alfredo Antonini is the regular conductor of the CBS orchestra used during the series.

European influence is the subject of this Tuesday's program, in which the impact on American musical development of the music from three European capi-

On CBC Wednesday Night

Handel's Messiah



AT 56, BANKRUPT, defeated in health and spirit, a has-been after losing a 20-year operatic war in London, his adopted home, George Frederick Handel, son of a German surgeon-barber, reached the heights of musical expression in a field new to him, when he composed the most warmly human, deeply religious, instantly appealing oratorios ever written—Messiah. One of the noblest expressions of the religious spirit, it has become an integral part of Christmas.

It is heartening to remember, in this modern age when commercialism seems at times to be shoving the manger and the Bethlehem star to the background at Christmas, that the annual ritual of renewing acquaintance with the thrill and richness of Handel's great work has spread from England to many other parts of the world.

A Christmas performance of *Messiah* has become a tradition on CBC Wednesday Night. This week the 14th annual broadcast will come from Montreal at 8:00 p.m. It will be performed by the Montreal Elgar Choir and the Montreal Symphony Orchestra conducted by Zubin Mehta. Soloists are soprano

Pierrette Alarie, tenor Richard Verreau, baritone Donald Gramm, and contralto Lili Chookasian.

In 1741 Handel's spirits were at a low ebb. His last opera, *Deidamia*, had run for only three nights in London. He had recently suffered a stroke which had partially paralyzed one of his arms. His fortune was gone and there were rumors that he was to be clapped into debtor's prison. He had retired from public life and had few friends left.

One August night when he returned to his bachelor quarters in Mayfair from an aimless walk he found an envelope on his desk, left by his librettist, Charles Jennens, a wealthy country squire. Opening it, Handel found a collection of scripture texts titled *Messiah*, based on the prophecy, birth, crucifixion and teachings of Jesus Christ.

Handel was in no mood for writing an oratorio—he felt too depressed, so he tossed the package aside and went off to bed. But he couldn't sleep. The words of the text kept running through his head. Finally he got up and had another look at the manuscript. The magic of the Biblical lines fired his imagination,

METROPOLITAN OPERA

A production of **Das Rheingold**, a music drama in one act (four scenes) by Wagner.

Scene 1: The three Rhine daughters, Woglinde, Wellgunde, and Flosshilde are swimming in the Rhine when they meet the dwarf Alberich, an inhabitant of the underworld. They do not consider Alberich dangerous and despite the warnings of their father they tell him that anyone who can fashion a ring from the Rheingold will own the world and all its mighty power. The magic power to convert the gold into a ring is given to him who does not care for the power of love. Alberich's desire for riches and power is mightier than love and snatching the gold from the Rhine daughters, he disappears into the depths.

Scene 2: A field in front of Walthalla Castle, built by the giants. The gods realize sorrowfully that the giants will receive as their reward the goddess Freia, whose apples confer everlasting youth. When the giants Fafner and Fasolt demand their pay, Donner and Froh attempt to protect Freia. Loge appears and tells of the ring which Alberich has fashioned from the Rheingold. Wotan and the giants are seized with a desire to possess it. Fafner and Fasolt take Freia away by force, but agree to release her if Wotan will produce the gold by nightfall. The departure of Freia causes the gods to lose their youth, and Wotan determines to obtain the ring.

Scene 3: The Nibelheim (underworld). Alberich, having subjugated in Nibelheim all the Nibelungs by the power of the ring, drives them to slavish tasks. A magic helmet, The Tarnhelm, has been fashioned for him which gives him the power to become invisible and to change to any other form he desires. Loge guides Wotan to the regions beneath the earth. Alberich changes himself before the eyes of the gods first into a dragon, and then into a toad. Wotan quickly traps the toad with his foot, while Loge grasps the helmet. The two gods carry Alberich to the upper world and refuse to release him until he has delivered to them the treasure of the Nibelungs as well as the ring.

Scene 4: The Upper World. Alberich loses the ring and declares it will bring death to him who wears it. When the giants return, the gold treasure is piled up for them in a heap. They insist there must be enough of the treasure to completely hide Freia. Loge is obliged to toss in the Tarnhelm but Wotan refuses to give up the ring. Erda arises from the depths of the earth to warn Wotan against the ring and predicts the destruction of the gods. Wotan throws the ring to the giants and thereby Freia is released though Fasolt laments giving her up. The curse of Alberich strikes the next wearer of the ring almost at once. Fasolt is killed in a quarrel with Fafner. Wotan leads the gods to Walthalla on a rainbow, which Donner has constructed as a bridge. During their journey, the complaining song of the Rhine maidens is heard from the depths of the river.



tals—Paris, London and Vienna—will be illustrated. Guests on the program are soprano Barbara Meister and baritone Earl Wrightson.

The orchestra will perform overtures from Jacques Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld* and *La Vie Parisienne* as an example of the influence which music from Paris had on the American development. Miss Meister and Wrightson illustrate the British influence by singing some of the selections from Gilbert and Sullivan compositions, including *When I Was a Lad* and *I'm Called Little Buttercup*, from *H.M.S. Pinafore* and *The Moon and I* and *I've Got a Little List*, from *The Mikado*. How Viennese light opera has influenced American composers is demonstrated by Miss Meister's singing of *I Dote on the Military*, from *The Duchess of Gerolstein*.

An example of indigenous American music that flourished under these foreign influences at the turn of the century there will be selections from Goodwin Morse's *Wang*, a work which has been described as an "operatic burletta," which bears strong resemblance to *The Mikado*. Another American whose music was influenced by the European composers mentioned is Willard Spencer. His operetta, *The Little Tycoon*, written at the turn of the century, will be represented as Miss Meister and Wrightson perform *For We're Immensely High Toned*.

On Thursday, December 21, vocalist Eileen Barton and William Gaxton, a star of the American stage throughout the 1920's, pay tribute to the days of vaudeville and musical comedy. Miss Barton will recreate the hit songs of such vaudeville and Ziegfeld Follies' stars as Nora Bayes, Eva Tanguay, Lillian Lorraine and Fannie Brice as she sings *Down Where the Wurzbarger Flows*, *Shine On*, *Harvest Moon*, *I Don't Care*, and *Up, Up, Up in My Aeroplane*. Gaxton reminisces on the glorious days of the Follies in the 1920's.

The program of Tuesday, December 26, features dancer John Bubbles and vocalist Bibi Osterwald in a salute to the revues of American music.

Musical comedy of the twenties is featured on the December 28 program which has guests Joy Clements of the City Center Opera Company of New York and librettist Otto Harbach. Hal Hastings is guest conductor of the orchestra for this program. Miss Clements sings *Alice Blue Gown*, *Irene*, *Love Nest* and *I Love You* while Harbach describes the components of musical production and the roles played by the producer, director and backstage crews.

The Buffalo Bills, who gained fame in the Broadway production *The Music Man*, are guests for the program on January 2 as they trace the origin of barber-shop singing. Among the songs they sing are *Dear Old Girl*, *I Had a Dream Dear*, *Sweet Adeline*, *By the Sea*, *Peg of My Heart* and *Memories*. Hal Hastings will be guest conductor of the CBS orchestra.

balanced, most powerful team in their Conference, and possibly in all football—but these last five games represent the toughest schedule any football team was ever forced to face and I don't believe the Giants can overcome it. There are four outstanding teams in the NFL—New York, Green Bay, Phila-

delphia and Cleveland. All the other clubs can be tough on a given day but, generally, are more easily beaten than the top four. Yet this Sunday's game is the fifth straight game for New York against the other "big three"—Philadelphia twice, Green Bay once, and Cleveland twice. If they should come through the ordeal clutching aloft the Eastern pennant, they'll earn another go at Green Bay—that seems just a little too much for mere mortals.

Canadian fans are becoming more familiar with the great U.S. stars and now know what to expect from them. In this big one, Cleveland will send the powerful Jimmy Brown banging into the N.Y. line, mix in the shifty running of Bobby Mitchell (if he's free from Army duty), and the crisp, short passing of Milt Plum. The Giants can counter with Y.A. (it stands for Yelberton Abraham), Tittle's long or short bullet passes to acrobatic Kyle Rote and Del Shofner, the Texan who has all the moves essential to a great offensive end, and the inside running of Alex Webster and Boby Gaiters.

Saturday, the surprising New York Rangers visit the Gardens to take on the high-flying Toronto Maple Leafs. The Rangers, under new coach Doug Harvey, started very well and almost clinched a play-off spot in the first two months of NHL action. They're busy defending their early lead now, but indications are that they'll be good enough to finish fourth or better. The Leafs, of course, are one of the league's solid teams and should be no worse than second.

Other sports action on CBC-TV this week—the John MacDonald rink of Campbellton, N.B., faces the Doug Cameron foursome from Charlottetown, P.E.I., Saturday, Dec. 16, on *Cross-Canada Curling*. In a second game, Tom Caldwell's rink of Orillia, Ont., takes on Tom Welch of Hudson, Que. Then the cameras go from ice to alley for the weekly bowling competition, featuring many of Canada's top trundlers at the O'Connor Bowl in Toronto.

HANDEL'S MESSIAH

filled him with greater inspiration than he had ever known. He locked himself in his room, began composing with ferocious speed and volcanic energy, and completed the score in just over three weeks, scarcely stopping for food or sleep. The music seemed to come from deep within him, and he felt completely removed from the world. "Whether I was in my body or out of my body as I wrote, I know not," he said later.

After he had finished part two, his manservant found him collapsed over his desk, tears pouring down his face. "I did think I did see all of heaven before me and the great God Himself," Handel said. After 24 days, the magnificent oratorio was finished. Mentally and physically exhausted, Handel fell on his bed and slept for 17 hours.

Those who have seen the original manuscript for *Messiah* have been struck by the urgently leaning notes speaking of the nervous and passionate intensity with which they were written. Handel's pen could hardly keep pace with his driving mind. But there is scarcely a change or a crossing-out in the 265 pages of the score. On one page there are traces of the tears Handel shed at the story of the Crucifixion. Under the notes is written: "He was despised and rejected of men."

Handel, too, had known the bitterness of rejection, but he made it the basis of a brilliant work of hope and happiness. The greatness of *Messiah* as a permanent message to mankind probably lies in the fact that it was an intensely sincere expression of Handel's inner emotional life. He was a man of the world, a *bon viveur*, with sophisticated ways, but like Johnson he had a deep spiritual side to his nature, and this appreciation of both the convivial and the

religious aspects of life speaks out in the oratorio to all men. There is no mystical feeling in it. It is purely a musical interpretation of one man's personal faith.

Apparently Handel didn't consider having *Messiah* performed at first. It was just something he had to get out of his system, an act of spiritual release, and he was reluctant to share such an intimate thing with a hostile world.

For some time the Duke of Devonshire, then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, had been urging him to visit Dublin, and in November, 1741, a few weeks after completing *Messiah*, Handel consented to go. The Duke had asked him to compose a new work for the visit, so Handel took the score for *Messiah* with him. He planned to sail from Parkgate to Dublin, but when he arrived at Parkgate he found that the weather was too rough to sail, so during his enforced wait he took the opportunity of rehearsing parts of *Messiah* with boys from the local boarding school and some choristers from Chester Cathedral, with a public audience.

In Dublin a new concert hall in Fishamble Street on the south side of the Liffey (now the premises of an ironmonger) was chosen as the site of the premiere of *Messiah*, scheduled for April. Dublin was in a state of great excitement over it. Everyone wanted tickets, and in order to squeeze as many patrons as possible into the hall, newspapers begged fashionable ladies to leave their hoops at home, and the men were urged not to wear their swords.

Although he was in dire financial straits, Handel announced that profits from the concert would be used "for the benefit and enlargement of poor distressed prisoners for debt in the several marshalseas of the city of Dublin."

He had brought the female soloists with him from London—Signora Avolio and Mrs. Susannah Maria (Please turn to page 31)

HANDEL'S MESSIAH

Cibber, wife of the notorious actor, Theophilus Cibber. The male soloists and choruses were supplied by the choristers of the two big Dublin cathedrals. The orchestra consisted of 20 string players, with about 10 oboes and bassoons; there were trumpets and drums, and Handel presided at the organ. The performance was a triumph. (This was at a time, incidentally, when the sites of all Canadian cities that were later to present **Messiah**, except Montreal and Quebec, were a wilderness.)

Cheered by this success, Handel went back to London determined to produce **Messiah** there, which he did, the following year, but not without considerable opposition of an extremely petty nature. As fast as handbills announcing the coming event at Covent Garden were put up, they were torn down. Jealous musicians and society matrons who were opposed to Handel organized dances and concerts on the nights of the performance to try to keep audiences away. Then some of the clergy tried to put a stop to the production on the grounds that it was sacrilegious to use the word **Messiah** as the title for a "musical entertainment given at Covent Garden."

In desperation, Handel re-named this work **A Sacred Oratorio**, and the London premiere was given as scheduled. As the magnificent strains of the **Hallelujah Chorus** burst on the audience, King George II was so impressed that he sprang to his feet. The audience followed suit, and remained

standing through the chorus. The custom of standing for the chorus still prevails.

In spite of this spontaneous salute, the three performances of the **Messiah** in Covent Garden were practically a failure. Six years later Handel announced that he would give a performance to open the new chapel of the London Foundling Hospital. This time the audience was enthusiastic—partially influenced, Handel realized, by the fact that it was a society event, and the church setting provided a more appropriate atmosphere than a concert hall. Handel found himself a hero again. Repeat performances were demanded, and he was even invited to present **Messiah** in Westminster Abbey. During his lifetime it was performed in London 34 times, and established itself as the most beloved work in English music.

On April 6, 1759, eight days before his death, Handel conducted his famous oratorio for the last time. Old, infirm and blind, he directed from the harpsichord in Covent Garden as masterfully as ever. But at the words "The trumpet shall sound" his face began to twitch, his hands faltered, and the audience held its breath as he quickly improvised until he had regained his composure. After the final Amen he fainted, and was carried home to bed. It was Easter time, and he said: "I want to die on Good Friday in the hope of rejoining the good God, my sweet Lord and Saviour, on the day of His Resurrection." He died early on the morning of Holy Saturday. His burial in Westminster Abbey was one of the most magnificent scenes, short of a coronation, that has ever taken place there.

In the footsteps of Julius Caesar who loved Cleopatra, Queen of Egypt, but who abandoned her to the Roman Empire, Titus chooses honour before love.

The French tragedian Jean Racine has achieved a vivid portrayal of the intense love of Bérénice and Titus, the Queen's hope in face of all the odds, her revolt at Titus's decision and finally her ultimate resignation in the face of what is considered a must. The five-act play, perhaps the most dramatic and certainly the most stirring of Racine's many tragedies, also draws a fine portrait of Titus, the all-powerful Roman Emperor, profoundly hurt in having to oppose his duty and his love and to whom the Queen can only say, in her parting adieu: "You are the Emperor and yet you cry!"

Very much involved in the drama is a third person: Antiochus. He is also in love with the Queen and a pillar of the Empire. It is he that Titus picks as the bearer of his somber decision. Antiochus would like to flee abandoning his career . . . but he is held back by his great love of Rome.

Yet another victim is scheduled to fall to the all-powerful Roman Empire.

Gisèle Schmidt plays the title role of Bérénice, with Jean-Louis Roux as the Emperor Titus, Gilles Pelletier as Antiochus. Other roles are held by Nicole Filion (Phénice), Henri Norbert (Paulin) and Albert Millaire (Arsace).

TV viewers will remember the powerful performance of Henri Norbert recently in "Volpone," seen November 30 in the same series.

An interesting footnote to the production: On "Télé '61" Monday, December 18 at 7:45 p.m., Paul-Dumont Frenette will question the Rev. Jean-Paul Audet, Dominican priest, professor at the French Biblical and Archeological school in Jerusalem, on the similarities and dissimilarities of the two queens: the original Bérénice who had travelled to Rome from Palestine in the year 28 A.D. in order to ask the Emperor that he alleviate the taxes on her people, and Racine's royal figure who is the personification of love.

"Bérénice" will be shown Thursday, December 21 at 9:00 on Channel 6, the CBC's French Television station in Winnipeg.

CBC Radio and TV Programs Study Quota Marketing

FARMERS today sometimes face low and uncertain marketing prices, inadequate and unstable incomes. Often they produce too much for the market to clear, resulting in a lowering of prices and farmers' incomes.

As a solution to this problem, many responsible economists, farmers and politicians are advocating a system of quotas which would keep farm production at about the same level as demand, with the price of commodities being maintained at a level "fair" to both producer and consumer.

Quota marketing, however, is a controversial subject. While many people believe it is the answer to the farmers' plight, others maintain that it could result in making it difficult for aggressive and efficient producers to expand production and would help to keep less efficient producers in production. Also, if quotas worked well in reducing output, climatic or other factors might produce a deficient supply in any given year and the price would be forced too high. Trade problems could arise because to make stability fully effective, there might also be a demand for import controls and policies of exporting at special low prices.

During the week of Dec. 9-15, two CBC farm programs discuss the pros and cons of quota marketing, using as examples some of the quota plans now in operation. On Sunday on the CBC television network, *Country Calendar*, in a national edition of the program, explains the principle of setting an agricultural marketing quota to avoid over-production of a commodity and as a means of maintaining farmers' net cash returns.

As an example of quota marketing, the program considers the control exercised by the Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco Marketing Board which licenses the acreage a farmer may use for tobacco growing, sets a yearly quota on the

amount of tobacco a farmer may market, provides for inspection of premises and books and stiff penalties for violation of quotas.

In an attempt to show what could happen if limitations were applied to livestock production, particularly hogs, the program examines the possibilities of such an undertaking. Among those with whom host Harold Dodds discusses the problem are Professor Robert Marshall, economist and livestock marketing authority at the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph; and two farmers, J. H. McKee of Shelburne, Ontario, and S. S. Berg of Ardrossan, Alberta. Producer of *Country Calendar* is Murray Creed.

CBC radio's *National Farm Radio Forum*, on Monday night at 8:30 on the Trans-Canada radio network, also discusses the entire question of quota marketing.

The question of quotas is raised in a statement of farm price and marketing policy objectives by the Canadian Federation of Agriculture in which it says:

"Effective planning and stabilization of prices and controlled marketing of farm products must be achieved. The need is for farmers themselves to achieve effective control in the marketing of farm products. State direction and control of marketing are sometimes desirable, as in the case of grain, and the state must have a co-operative and supporting role to play in such matters as price supports and farm legislation. Overall planning and control by the state are not desirable."

If one agrees that some kind of planned program should be established to bring production nearly equal to demand, the idea of quotas in some form arises. There are also the questions: If quotas are put into effect, who is to limit output? Who is to set the quota? Does every farmer get an equal share? How are such shares established? Can they be traded on the market? Where does the new farmer come in?

BAKLAVA

PASTRY

- 2 cups sifted flour
- ½ cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg and water to make ½ cup

FILLING

- 2 cups sliced almonds
- ½ cup brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg

SYRUP

- 1 cup water
- 1 cup sugar
- Grated rind of 1 orange
- Grated rind of 1 lemon

To Make the Pastry: Cut shortening into flour and salt until mixture looks like cornmeal. With a fork, blend the egg and water. Add to dry ingredients, mixing until all dry ingredients are thoroughly dampened. Turn onto waxed paper. Knead eight times. Roll into ball and let rest half hour.

To Make the Filling: Mix together all ingredients for filling.

To Combine Baklava: Divide pastry into four portions. Roll out one portion very thin on a lightly floured board, into a rectangle 8 x 16 inches. Cut rectangle in half to form two 8-inch squares. Place one square in bottom of 8 x 8 x 2-inch baking pan. Spread 2 tablespoons of the filling over this pastry. Place second layer of pastry on top of filling. Roll out another portion of pastry as above. Continue making layers of pastry and filling. Spread no filling on the top layer of pastry.

To Make the Syrup. Mix ingredients for syrup in sauce pan. Boil five minutes.

To Bake Baklava. Cut Baklava into eight servings. Pour three tablespoons of syrup over Baklava. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 35 to 40 minutes. Serve remaining sauce (cooled) over the hot Baklava.
