Because there is a tendency for Christmas music to be "overexposed" at this time of the year, the CBC makes it a practise generally to refrain from playing carols earlier than 10 days prior to Dec. 25. The Yuletide music of ethnic groups celebrating Christmas after Dec. 25 generally takes the fore in the succeeding couple of weeks, as it is felt that other Christmas music would seem anti-climactic at that time.

Sportscaster Bob Moir has condensed more than 100 hours of tape-recorded play-by-plays of major sports contests into a fast-paced, thrill-filled 30 minutes of action for *Year-End Sports Review.*

Wading his way through ten miles of tape, Bob has picked out the exciting neck-and-neck finishes of the year's top horse races, the turning-points of the Canadian Open and other major golf tourneys, the spectacular plays of the World Series, and knit them together with enlightening commentary.

Be sure to tune in January 1, and see how many of these thrilling moments of sports you can remember.

FOR THE THIRD year in succession, the Cowhide Trophy for the best program segment on a CBC radio farm broadcast during 12 months has come to CBC Winnipeg.

John MacLeod has won the trophy for 1962, it was announced last week, for his segment on the marketing of malting barley, in which he told of the problem of peeled (damaged) kernels, suggesting that some growers should consider the feed varieties of barley as a more profitable crop.

Presentation of the trophy, which is in the form of an embossed cowhide, was made December 13 by J. R. Finlay, CBC director for the Prairie Provinces. It was won last year by Lionel Moore, supervisor of farm broadcasts for the Prairies (the second time he has won it), and the previous year by CBC Winnipeg farm commentator George Price.

RESIDENTS OF rural Manitoba communities visited during the past five years on the Manitoba Mirror series will find listening to CBW Manitoba particularly interesting on New Year's Day.

The mayor of each of the 25 communities has been invited to record a New Year's greeting for the residents of his town and district. These messages will be heard intermittently throughout the day on CBW.

JAZZ

is KING

... this week on CBC-TV and Radio, as *FESTIVAL, PARADE* and *CBC WEDNESDAY NIGHT* present programs exploring this type of music

THE SUBJECT, on three different programs this week, is jazz. On CBC-TV's *Festival and Parade*, and Radio's *CBC Wednesday Night*, jazz will be discussed, dissected, explained, praised, analyzed, experimented with, compared with the classics and performed with energy and devotion by some of Canada's best jazzmen.

Festival on Monday, December 31, will present an hour-long telecast entitled *Tongues of Brass*, featuring jazz musicians and composers who represent many different attitudes and schools of thought. This will be the first jazz show ever presented on *Festival* and it may be one of the most comprehensive expositions to date of the state of jazz in Canada. It represents the thinking, not only of the producer, Paddy Sampson, but of many of the musicians taking part, for the jazzmen themselves were in on the preliminary planning of the show.

Sampson aimed at "the kind of show that would give a representative picture of Canadian jazz—and

all in an hour," and his primary consideration was to allow unfettered freedom of interpretation for the musicians. He placed the players in a large, almost bare studio, and let them play as the spirit moved them, allowing his cameras to roam at will. The result is a show with a fresh, spontaneous character, free of the restrictions that sometimes limit a jazz musician's powers of improvisation.

Taking part in the program will be half a hundred of Toronto's best-known musicians: Trump David-son and his six-man Dixieland group; jazz composer Gordon Delamont, conducting his own composition, *Portrait of Mingus*; singer Don Francks, improvising a vocal blues; Ed Karam, leading his 18-man "big band blues" group; valve trombonist Rob McConnell leading his group in improvisations on *Sunny Side of the Street*; jazz composer Norm Symonds, conducting his experimental work, *Perspectives*, intended to convey in music "what the eye

The Songs and Customs of Christmas

Christmas falls on many dates in Winnipeg. HERITAGE visits eight ethnic groups to see how they mark the joyous holiday

IF YOU THINK that Christmas comes but once a year, you haven't taken into account the ethnic celebrations that take place on various dates in December and January. *Heritage* on Sunday, December 30, visits eight ethnic groups in and around Winnipeg to learn how they mark the Yuletide season.

Music at Christmas is the title of the program, but it will concern itself with more than choirs caroling the Christmas songs of their homelands; there will also be the music of home life, with pots and pans rattling, children laughing and crying, chatter — all as important to the great holiday as the more formal aspects of music.

The Scandinavian celebration of the Festival of Santa Lucia, falling on December 13, will be visited by the cameras. During this festival a beautiful maiden attired in a white robe is crowned with a circlet of candles — harkening back to the time when northern Europeans used to light bonfires on the winter solstice, urging the return of the waning sun.

A Christmas party held December 15 by the Chinese community is shown. The children sing an ancient northern Chinese Christmas carol, a type of music that is fast disappearing on this continent.

The Anglo Saxon Christmas, more familiar to most Canadians, maintains customs that stem from pagan rites of the Druids and ancient northern European tribes. The tree, symbol of everlasting life, to these cultures, was brought into the house to ward off the evil spirits thought to be sapping the strength of the sun. In the program, a Winnipeg family is seen gathered around a bonfire in the Whiteshell Forest Reserve, singing Christmas carols while the men bring in the evergreen trees and Yule logs.

Then a group of Indian children, huddled in a wigwam, reenact their version of the Nativity and sing Father Brebeuf's Huron Carol, written in the mid-1600's by the Jesuit missionary and martyr for the Indians in central Ontario.

The French-Canadian *reveillon* traditionally takes place on New Year's Day in Winnipeg. A group of young people are seen collecting clothing and parcels for the poor, and a French Canadian family is shown at the holiday dinner table, which groans with the delicacies for which they are famous.

A Mennonite family in a farm home at Gretna, Man., are seen marking their Christmas with some of the traditional customs of their German forefathers. A group of youthful Greek carolers is seen going from house to house on St. Basil's Day, January 1. Back home, mother is baking a special bread for the occasion, and soon the family takes its place around it, with dancing, singing and general good fun.

The Ukrainian Christmas is shown as it is marked on January 7, recognized as Christ's birthday by the Christian Church until, in the year 400 branches of the Church moved it too Dec. 25 to coincide with a pagan celebration that stemmed from Roman times.

The celebration of Christmas in Canada is enriched by the blending of customs, cultures and beliefs of many lands and many ages. *Music at Christmas* will help in an understanding of the many components of the joyous holiday. Alwyn Scott is producer.

The Story of Lotte Lenya, Kurt Weill and Bertholdt Brecht

SEPTEMBER SONG

PROJECT '63 *Sunday recalls the trio that gave musical theatre "The Three-Penny Opera" and the ageless ballad, "September Song"*

SEVERAL YEARS AGO, Toronto actor-writer Hugh Webster met Lotte Lenya at a New York party and was deeply impressed by her stories about her late husband, Kurt Weill.

At that time, Lenya was becoming known to a wider and wider theatre audience for her performance in the off-Broadway production of *The Three-Penny Opera* by Weill and Bertholdt Brecht, and the re-discovery of Brecht's sardonic plays was just starting to make its tremendous impact on the world stage.

Weill composed the score for *The Three-Penny Opera* and other Brecht plays, but in later years he was far better known for the beautiful ballads he created in Broadway musicals. He died in 1950 after writing the music for such New York hits as *Knickerbocker Holiday*, *One Touch of*

Venus, Lady in the Dark and *Lost in the Stars*. His most famous song is the tender and bitter-sweet ballad, *September Song*, which was memorably sung by the late Walter Huston in *Knickerbocker Holiday* in 1938.

Lenya sang the role of Jennie in the original German version of *The Three-Penny Opera* in the 1920s, and she rightly told all who would listen that Weill was much more than a Tin-Pan-Alley success. Largely through her dedication to the musical memory of Weill, he is gradually becoming known as a theatre force quite comparable with Brecht, his partner and friend during the 1920s and 1930s.

Brecht and Weill met in Berlin about 1922 when the German theatre was in a ferment of creative activity. Brecht broke sharply away from conventional stage techniques and wrote plays which savagely attacked many aspects of society. He developed a whole new school of acting and direction and ultimately created the Berliner Ensemble in East Berlin, one of the most important theatrical companies of the 20th century. It has been carried on since his death in 1956 by his widow, Actress Helene Wiegel.

From the very first, Brecht felt the importance of music as an adjunct to the written word and he stepped himself in folk ballads and topical cabaret songs. In Weill, he found an admirable collaborator. The shy, quiet and witty Weill was an intensively-trained composer who was familiar with both the jazz idiom of the times and the latest developments in "serious" music.

It was during these days that Lenya came to Berlin from her native Vienna as an actress-singer seeking to further her career. She was the daughter of a laundress and a coachman and became a circus performer at the age of six. She was never conventionally pretty, but when she came to Berlin she was strikingly handsome, with beautiful legs and a strange, husky voice. She and Weill fell in love, were married and he started writing songs for her. She was an immediate hit.

In 1933, Brecht, Weill and Lenya were driven out of Germany by the Nazis and settled in Paris for a time, where they collaborated on their last joint work, the ballet-opera, *The Seven Deadly Sins*, which starred Tilly Losch as the prima ballerina.

Weill went to New York about 1936 and by 1940 Brecht had settled in Hollywood. He spent six years in California but his radical views and sharp social criticism were not popular. Ultimately, Brecht went back to Germany where he became the boss of the Communist theatre in East Berlin. Although he has been called a Communist, there is evidence that his independent and satirical approach was as difficult for the party bosses to stomach as it had been for the American authorities.

Weill, of course, was a tremendous success in New York and his work was comparable to that of Rodgers and Hammerstein. Indeed, his approach to the musical theatre may have had as important an impact as that of anyone else. His work lost its social bite but he was

TV PROGRAMS MARKING THE NEW YEAR:

CBC-TV WINDS UP 1962 with music, laughter, and a little nostalgic retrospection, and salutes 1963 with gaiety in programs studded with some of the country's most sparkling entertainers. In addition to special festive broadcasts, many regular shows will have a New Year flavour.

On New Year's Eve, December 31, the network begins to hum with good cheer with a special edition of *Don Messer's Jubilee*. Guest artists include singer-instrumentalist Fred McKenna of Marysville, N.B., step-dancer Joan Ann Jamieson of Hull, Quebec, and fiddler Bill Guest of Halifax.

On New Year's Eve the *Festival* series strikes a lively note when it presents *Tongues of Brass*, a big, free-wheeling hour of jazz as jazzmen play it, think about it, talk about it, improvise it and compose it.

Immediately after the National News, His Excellency Major-General Georges P. Vanier, D.S.O., M.C., C.D., Governor-General of Canada, will offer his annual New Year's message to Canadians.

Toronto greets the New Year in a gay hour-long variety show on the network. Its setting is a country club on New Year's Eve, where revellers welcome 1963 with appropriate verve. Participants will include actor Austin Willis, singers Eve Smith, Allan Blye, Betty Robertson and Don Francks, dancers Alan and Blanche Lund, and a dancing chorus of 12.

Then the gala scene shifts to the CBC's Winnipeg studios for 45 minutes of music and song with singer-hosts Doug Crosley and Georges LaFleche, an eight-voice chorus and an orchestra conducted by Eric Wild. Guest artists will include vocalists Lorraine West, Florence Faiers, The Altones (a vocal group from CBC-TV's *Red River Jamboree*), guitarist Jim Pirie, and clarinetist Bob McMullin.

When the CBC-TV network goes off the air, viewers are invited to join the CBC Radio audience for music (Please turn to page 31)

RADIO PROGRAMS MARKING THE NEW YEAR:

THE EXUBERANT gaiety of New Year's Eve celebrations across Canada will be brought to listeners on the CBC Radio network on New Year's Eve. And on New Year's Day, traditionally a time for taking stock of the immediate past, CBC Radio will present a number of programs recalling the year's most notable news and sports events.

CBC's Coast to Coast New Year's Dance Party is a special six-hour program of music and actuality broadcasts from the CBC's regional centres across the country. But programming with a holiday flavour will begin earlier in the evening, when year-end round-ups and special music will be heard on the regularly scheduled programs *Assignment*, *Radio International*, *Songs of My People* and *National Farm Forum*. The annual New Year's Message given by His Excellency the Governor-General will be broadcast immediately following the *National News* and *News Roundup*.

The *Dance Party* will present the first of its originations from Newfoundland, where the New Year will arrive at a time when Vancouver residents will just be finishing dinner. A CBC Radio remote-broadcasts crew will visit the control tower at Gander airport to eavesdrop on radio-telephone conversations between air traffic control centres in Canada, Spain, Britain, Iceland, and other countries. Listeners will hear messages and greetings flashing across the cold, black vastness of the Atlantic, as the New Year makes its first landfall in Canada. The pick-up from Gander will be followed by light music from St. John's Newfoundland, played by the Ralph Walker Sextet.

Through the remainder of the *Dance Party* program, there will be other remote-broadcast originations, interspersed with dance music and entertainment from different parts of the (Please turn to page 31)

Norman Mailer:

Controversial Author On Past, Present, Future


Nathan Cohen interviews Norman Mailer
Sunday, December 30, on QUEST

"MY NATURE," explains controversial American novelist-essayist Norman Mailer, "is to search for the Devil while I carry with me the minds of some of you." On this search he has discovered some unforbidden paths, usually quite readable, but often writing brilliantly and horribly within the same paragraph. Some critics think he spouts a lot of hot air, that his ideas are too "far out." But often, behind his adolescent fervor, his sarcasm, impoliteness and virulent indignation, is some clear, good sense.

Sunday night, December 30, on CBC-TV's *Quest*, this fiery young rebel will be seen in conversation with Nathan Cohen, drama critic of the Toronto *Daily Star*. They'll discuss many different subjects, ranging over past, present and future.

At 23, Mailer's first book, a hard-hitting war story which became a best-seller, called *The Naked and the Dead*, brought him a lot of money and acclaim—Sinclair Lewis called him "the greatest writer to come out of his generation." Mailer's second novel, *Barbary Shore*, was attacked as "sex ridden" and full of "loathesome decadence," and was a complete commercial failure, though many feel it is his best work to date.

He had to peddle his third book, *The Deer Park*, around quite a few publishers before he found one who would agree to leave in certain earthy passages over which Mailer clucked like a brood hen and refused to delete. When it finally appeared in 1955, its birth pangs left its author a physical and nervous wreck, but it sold well. Mailer thinks one of its

Armed Services Review:

The Bonaventure to the Rescue


THE CANADIAN aircraft carrier *Bonaventure*, with its screen of destroyer escorts, was bucking gale force winds and heavy seas in the North Atlantic one day last October, when radio waves suddenly crackled with a distress call. An American chartered airliner had ditched in the ocean, 500 miles west of Ireland; survivors had been picked up by a Swiss freighter, but several were badly injured.

The *Bonaventure*, with two doctors and full medical facilities on board, sped to the scene. Her helicopters lifted the injured to the carrier and later, when well enough to be moved again, the survivors were air-lifted ashore. It was a smoothly co-ordinated rescue operation, carried out successfully despite heavy weather, and some of its most dramatic moments were captured on film by RCN cameramen.

Their film footage, plus more covering many other interesting and exciting events, will be shown on CBC-TV Sunday afternoon, on *Armed Services Review*, a half-hour program illustrating some of the activities of Canada's armed forces during 1962.

Among the items and subjects to be covered in the program are: Voodoo jet interceptors at bases in different parts of Canada; Bomarc surface-to-air missiles; the launching of *The Provider*, largest ship ever built in Canada for the RCN, displacing 2,000 tons more than the giant *Bonaventure*; the ceremonial commissioning of the new destroyer escort, *Qu'Appelle*; the NATO brigade in Germany taking part in manoeuvres; giant *Hercules* transport aircraft carrying new *Starfighter* jets to Europe for service with the RCAF Air Division; anti-submarine exercises by RCN ships in the Pacific; training of army personnel; the launching of the *Alouette* satellite and many other events.

The program is made up of film footage shot by armed services cameramen in many different parts of the world, compiled and edited by the National Film Board in co-operation with the Department of National Defence.

sees when it looks down a long vista," and many soloists, including trumpeter Guido Basso, tenor, saxist Rick Wilkins, guitarist Ed Bickert and pianist Norm Amadio.

The program thus includes five distinct "kinds" of jazz: Dixieland, blues, big band notated jazz, small group improvisations, and original composition. It ends with a long, free-wheeling improvisation on a blues, with members of all the groups taking part in a number that interweaves 50 years of jazz history in contrasting and ever-changing patterns.

The second jazz program of the week on CBC-TV will be a *Parade* edition (Wednesday, January 2), entitled *Jazz East and West*, which will be produced simultaneously in Toronto and Vancouver. Representing the east will be Phil Nimmons and his group, while the western contingent will be made

up of Dave Robbins and his orchestra, trumpeter Conte Candoli, and singer Eleanor Collins.

Later that same evening (10:30 p.m. on Radio), Canadian composer Harry Freedman will present the first of six half-hour programs to be heard on *CBC Wednesday Night*, dealing with the interesting historical relationship that exists between jazz and so-called "classical" music. The six weekly programs will consist of informal discussion by Freedman, illustrated by means of numerous recordings. With typically irreverent wit, Freedman has entitled the series *Bach, Brubeck and All That Jazz*, following that with a more scholarly-sounding sub-title: *Parallel histories of jazz and concert music*.

Basis of the series is the fact that jazz and concert music has developed along almost exactly similar lines, from polyphony through Classical, Romantic, Impressionistic and Neo-Classical periods, and on to the present, in which avant-garde experimentalism co-exists with a "return to the past" movement.

This is how Van Bridge sets the scene of the drama. Beyond them is the valley, grim and foreboding in the winter months, lush and beautiful in the summer. In the gardens of most of these houses are structures built originally as



tool sheds, but which have become, for some of the older men, havens of peace, makeshift cloisters. Here, in the evenings, pipes are lit, old times are talked about, and the government is set to rights.

"In one of these retreats the play opens. It is the 'castle' of Will Harker, a retired locomotive engineer. He is here now, in the company of his old friend, Dick Sedgewick, a man of similar age, about to retire. They are smoking, sipping from glasses of beer, and generally enjoying the fact that in their type of companionship there is no burning necessity for constant chatter."

FROM OPERA to belly-dancing, from the legitimate stage to TV, from chi-chi supper clubs where the tab for two can be astronomical to the burlesque clubs where there is no "cover" for the patrons and hardly any for the performers—the entertainment business in Canada is buzzing with greater and more varied activity than ever before. And on Sunday night, December 30, CBC-TV's *Close-Up* takes a light-hearted look at the situation in a fast-paced show called *Eight on the Aisle*.

Eight men and women who make their living out of show-business and have something to say about it will comment on their entertainment specialties. They are: Harvey Hart, free-lance Toronto drama producer who has directed many important productions on CBC-TV; Leon Major, young stage and TV director of opera, drama, operetta and revue; John Colicos, internationally-known Canadian stage,

radio and TV actor; Herman Geiger-Torel, general director of the Canadian Opera Company; John Hirsch, artistic director of the Manitoba Theatre Centre in Winnipeg; Alan Lund, dancer-choreographer who has appeared many times on CBC-TV; Dino Vale, Montreal nightclub host and singer; and Sandy Scovil, Montreal nightclub singer and dancer.

Their remarks will be lavishly illustrated by producer John Kennedy, using filmed segments shot in Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal theatres, nightclubs, supper clubs and backstage at CBC-TV studios.

Their highly personalized comments are objective, offered with more practicality than sentiment. Show-business is a hard life, but a good life, they agree, and they wouldn't trade it for any other. Harvey Hart offers some hard-hitting but constructive remarks on TV drama, and the cameras move onto TV sets in Toronto to show what he means.

Leon Major, who, on April 1, begins work as artistic director of the Neptune Theatre Foundation in Halifax, will be seen talking to Martha Henry, a

Pelléas and Mélisande. Music drama in five acts by Debussy.

Cast: soprano Anna Moffo as Mélisande; bass Jerome Hines as Arkel; tenor Nicholas Gedda as Pelléas; baritone George London as Golaud; and soprano Blanche Thebom as Geneviève.

Act I. A forest. Mélisande, a pale, mysterious creature with long golden hair, is discovered weeping beside a well by Golaud who is lost in the forest. She runs from him terrified and begs him not to touch her. She replies vaguely to his questions and claims that she once wore a crown. Eventually he persuades her to allow him to take her to some shelter.

Scene II. A hall in the castle. Arkel hears a letter from Golaud which tells of his marriage to a maiden he found wandering in the forest. Pelléas intercedes for him with his mother and Arkel. Arkel quietly accepts the situation with the philosophy of age.

Change of Scene: a terrace in front of the castle. Geneviève and Mélisande walk together. Pelléas enters and they talk together of ships and the sea. She shows regret when he speaks of departing the next day.

Act II. A fountain in the grounds. Pelléas and Mélisande are seated on its rim. She takes off her marriage ring and tosses it in the air, catching it in her hand. She throws it too high and it splashes into the water. Pelléas cautions her to tell the truth of its loss to Golaud.

Change of scene: a bedroom in the castle. Golaud has been thrown from his horse and hurt. Mélisande ministers to him and he notices the missing ring. She claims she dropped it in a cave by the sea and Golaud tells her to take Pelléas with her to find it.

Change of scene: a grotto by the sea. Pelléas enters with Mélisande. Three old blind beggars have taken refuge in the cave and Mélisande recoils in dread.

Act III. A turret of the castle surrounded by a winding stair. Mélisande talks to Pelléas through the window. Golaud enters and becomes suspicious of the pair. He departs with his brother.

Change of scene: Vaults under the castle. Golaud and Pelléas explore them. While near a chasm Golaud places his hand on Pelléas' shoulder as if tempted to push him in. Pelléas shudders and shakes off his grasp. They depart without further word.

Change of scene: A terrace. Golaud now openly warns Pelléas about Mélisande, who is with child.

Change of scene: Before the castle. Golaud questions little Yniold about Pelléas and Mélisande. He becomes exasperated by the uncertain nature of the replies.

Act IV. A room in the castle. Pelléas and Mélisande arrange to meet for a last farewell. Pelléas departs and Golaud enters in frantic excitement. He forces Mélisande to her knees and drags her about by her long hair.

Change of scene: A fountain. Pelléas and Mélisande confess their love for each other. They cling to each other in a desperate farewell. Golaud enters and slays Pelléas with his sword.

Act V. A bedroom in the castle. Mélisande lies in bed pale and wan. She has borne a child. Golaud is brought to the

Drama on Theme Of Civic Politics

ON SUNDAY NIGHT, December 30, at 8 o'clock, Radio's *CBC Stage* will present a new drama by Canadian writer Brian Swarbrick, entitled *A Symbol of the People*. A play about the human element in city politics, it was announced originally for December 2 and then postponed.

The protagonists in *A Symbol of the People* are Arkwright, a mayor in declining health and advancing years who will neither retire from public office nor admit to the slum conditions under his nose, and

Phil Gordon, a reporter whose girl-friend was killed by a young tough nurtured in the appalling conditions which the mayor won't do anything to improve.

When Gordon comes upon undisputed evidence of Arkwright's civic neglect, the reporter determines to expose it just before the election. Gordon admits that Arkwright is the sort of smiling, benevolent "father" of his people who can turn up with a can of beans for a starving family when the spirit moves him, but, as Gordon points out, there's a certain lack of taste in offering a basket of groceries with one hand, and signalling a news photographer with the other. As Gordon peels back the often grimy layers of Arkwright's civic neglect, the mayor doesn't appear any more admirable, but Gordon's approach to life and to civic progress receive a much-needed shaking up.

IN CLOSING OUT the old year and ushering in the new, CBC television will provide viewers with some dandy sporting entertainment. The two big attractions are the National Football League final on December 30, and the Rose Bowl Game on January 1.

one of the great architects of the Broadway musical, which has been claimed as America's most important gift to the arts.

While her husband was rising to new heights, Lenya found it difficult to resume her career in the United States. She appeared in Weill's *The Firebrand of Florence* in 1946 but was in virtual retirement until after her husband's death. A concert appearance in excerpts from *The Three-Penny Opera* led to the off-Broadway production of the play which ran for a phenomenal seven years. In 1961, Lenya gave a memorable performance in the film, *The Roman Spring of Mrs. Stone*, which starred Vivien Leigh. More recently, Lenya performed in the off-Broadway production, *Brecht on Brecht*, with Viveca Lindfors, Dane Clark and others.

The Lenya story—and her association with Weill and Brecht—will be told on CBC Radio's *Project '63* Sunday, December 30, from 5:00

to 6:00 p.m. Hugh Webster, who was so impressed with Lenya's remarks, will produce the program in collaboration with John David Hamilton, Canadian-born documentary producer and writer who lives in New York and who has been interested in Brecht, Weill and Lenya for a number of years. Hamilton interviewed Lenya at length in New York and also talked to German associates of Brecht-Weill in New York and Munich. The program will consist of Lenya's story, in her own words, along with the music of Weill. Hamilton says of Lenya today:

"She is a small woman, not at all pretty, but with a face full of character. Her voice has lost some of the range shown in the old recordings but it conveys the spirit of Weill's music sharply and with impact. Both on and off the stage, she has remarkable presence and she has a talent for bringing alive the world of the Berlin theatre in the 1920s. She is eager to take other roles on the stage and in the films and has great self-confidence. A remarkable woman."

most perceptive reviews was by a *New Yorker* critic who called it "a big, vigorous, rowdy, ill-shaped and repellent book, so strong and so weak, so adroit and so fumbling, that only a writer of the greatest and most reckless talent could have flung it between covers."

Mailer's *The Deer Park* discussed sex-oriented life in Palm Springs, followed by *The White Negro*, in which he ground out a sort of "hip" philosophy which he hoped would make the Beatniks look like slob. Next he offered *Advertisements for Myself*, a clinical exposé of his personal life, a sort of interim report on his writing activities, in which he blubbered away about his ambitions, frustrations, troubles with publishers, and the books he intended to write but lacked the will to get on with.

"I am everything but my proper age of 36, and anger has brought me to the edge of the brutal," he sobbed. "I have not gotten nicer as I have grown older . . . Fitzgerald was an indifferent caretaker of his talent, and I have been a cheap gambler with mine . . . I spent my first 30 years abusing my body, and the last six in forced marches on my brain, and so I am more stupid today than I ought to be, my memory is half gone, and my mind is slow; from

fear and vanity I paid out too much for what I managed to learn. . . . How poor to go to death with no more than the notes of good intention."

But Mailer pulled himself together and a year ago another book hit the market, with a collection of his poems which had so shocked a sophisticated New York audience when they were read aloud that the curtain had had to be rung down suddenly, as his publisher gleefully claims. One critic suggests that the lines in the book which sum it up best are these: "Or do I delude myself and merely spit like a hoodlum in the wake of phaetons which drive away."

Lately Mailer has been writing a monthly column for *Esquire* magazine called *The Big Bite*. In a recent column he sounded off about the fact that "we use our heroes as fast as we make them." In another column he discussed a remark of his in *The Deer Park*: "There was that law of life, so cruel and so just, which demanded that one must grow or else pay more for remaining the same." Mailer says "I think that line is true. I think it is biologically true. And I think its application is more ferocious in America than anywhere I know. Because we set ourselves out around the knoll and get ready to play King of the Hill. Soon one of us is brave enough to take the centre and insist it belongs to us. Then there is no rest until the new king is killed."

country. As midnight approaches in each time zone, CBC will take listeners to the ballroom of a major hotel in that region to share in the fun and excitement of a New Year's party

On New Year's Day there will be two special "round-up" programs on CBC Radio, the first (at 8:30 p.m.) dealing with sports highlights of 1962 and the second (at 10:10 p.m.) with important news events of the past year. The *Year End Sports Review*, being carried for the fifth consecutive year, will originate in Winnipeg, compiled and written by Bob Moir. For the program, more than 100 hours of recorded coverage of sports events have been condensed into a fast-paced 30 minutes of radio time.

Every year at this time, CBC's correspondents in foreign posts return to Toronto to take part in meetings, broadcasts and telecasts about the world news picture. The eight correspondents—Knowlton Nash and James M. Minifie, Washington; Tom Gould, United Nations; Donald Gordon and Morley Safer, London; Stanley Burke, Paris; Michael Maclear, Tokyo; and Norman DePoe, Ottawa — will all be heard on the *Year End News Review*, at 10:10 p.m. During the program they will recall and discuss some of the major news stories of the year, including the Cuban crisis, the Sino-Indian war, the federal

general election, school integration in Mississippi, the Common Market, the Saskatchewan Medicare issue, Algerian independence, the appointment of U Thant as U.N. Secretary General, and others. Recordings of speeches by leading world figures and tapes of other actuality broadcasts will be used to bring the news events vividly to mind.

new actress who appeared recently on the Toronto scene, about her role in Jean Giraudoux's *The Enchanted*, which he directed in December at Toronto's Crest Theatre. In this brief, intimate interval, viewers will see how a director and a performer help each other to get inside a role, how through their enthusiasm and conversation they develop a *rapport* in which the character they hope to bring to life suddenly emerges as a real person. Major will also present a capsule editorial in which he comments on some of his ideas about the state of the legitimate theatre in Canada. The theatre has developed many styles through the ages, he says, and he thinks it is returning to the old epic style. But he points out that there is no "right way" of presenting theatre. "Any style of production is 'right' if it stimulates an audience," he says. "And what the theatre badly needs is more guts."

Actor John Colicos discusses the differences between acting on stage and acting on TV. An actor's whole technique must be compressed on TV, he says. The cameras move in on a rehearsal of a TV *Festival* production in which Colicos was featured, to show how this compression is applied.

Herman Geiger-Torel feels that opera in Canada has matured at last, and backs his opinion with the tremendous success of the Canadian Opera Company's season at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre this fall, when the average attendance was over 97 per cent, as high as the most successful company anywhere in the world. The Canadian Opera Company's tour featured Canadian casts almost exclusively, and the

biggest tour to date is lined up for this spring—43 performances. Torel says the day is not far off when there will be two COC troupes touring, both with orchestras.

John Hirsch has helped to bring about an exciting revitalization of the theatre in Winnipeg, and the success of the Manitoba Theatre Centre venture is sounding echoes in other parts of Canada—notably in Halifax, where Leon Major will undertake work similar to Hirsch's in the spring. Now, Hirsch points out, star actors are attracted to the Manitoba Theatre Centre—such performers as William Hutt, Sharon Acker, and Austin Willis gladly taking advantage of offers to appear in such a well-run theatre. Hutt and Willis are shown in scenes from a production there. Hirsch points out that the current theatre boom has meant that 1,800 performers in Canada are finding work—opportunities have increased ten-fold in the last five years.

Alan Lund notes that the dance is still good box office in Canada, and its popularity will probably continue, although the availability of jobs for dancers is slight compared with other types of performers.

One of the most charming parts of the program is the intimate and amusing conversation between Dino Vale and Sandy Scovil, in which they discuss nightclub acts from the "inside," so that viewers will have the impression that they are eavesdropping on an after-the-show chin-wag backstage. As they chat, the cameras cut away to nightclubs for scenes of chorus girls, belly dancers, and other entertainers in the dim smokiness of late-night entertainment meccas.

CHEESE SOUFFLE

3 *tblsp.* butter
3 *tblsp.* flour
1 *cup* skim milk
4 *eggs*
 $\frac{1}{2}$ *tsps.* salt; pepper, nutmeg,
cayenne
 $\frac{3}{4}$ *cup* grated cheese

Melt butter in saucepan, blend in flour until smooth. Add milk gradually and cook until thick. Add egg yolks one at a time while still on stove and blend well. Add seasonings. Remove from stove and add cheese, stirring until melted. Let cool, then fold in well-beaten egg whites. Pour into buttered souffle dish and bake at 325°F about 50 min. Serve immediately with following sauce.

Mushroom Sauce for Souffle

$\frac{1}{2}$ *lb.* fresh sliced mushrooms
1 *green* pepper (cut into squares)
2 *tblsp.* butter
1 *tsp.* salt
 $\frac{1}{4}$ *tsp.* pepper
1 *clove* garlic (on pick)
 $\frac{1}{2}$ *cup* chicken stock
2 *peeled* and cut up fresh
tomatoes

Saute mushrooms and green pepper in butter 3-4 min. Add salt, pepper, garlic (on pick). Add chicken stock and simmer 5 min. Remove garlic clove and add tomatoes. Heat gently. Serve hot on souffle. Thicken if desired.

The Billy Van Four . . .

THE SURVIVAL rate of small entertainment groups in Canada is generally low. Vocal and dance trios and quartets come and go like the seasons, sometimes barely surviving a year together.

One of the few exceptions seems to be the Billy Van Four, appearing on shows like CBC-TV's *Parade*, *A Summer Night* and *The Tommy Ambrose show*.

Though organized only two years ago, the quartet is looking forward to a rosy future. Whenever you talk to Billy Van, leader of the group, he's breathless.

"Just remember I've got a jingle (commercial) to do at five o'clock. Can only stay 20 minutes," he may say breathlessly. Or: "Can't stay after the show. I have to rush off to New York for the weekend."

The breathlessness and rush are significant. When the quartet rehearse, they work hard physically, often arriving before their scheduled starting time to brush up a song or dance routine. The rush is indicative of the amount of work they have planned.

The quartet comprises Billy Van, his wife Patty, Les Leigh and Jack Northmore. What is the secret of their success? Producers say they work hard, they move well, they're versatile, they look good and they sound good.

Their maxim is "we'll try anything once." For a wintry *Parade* show last season they put up with sub-zero temperatures for days doing a remote telecast on winter sports, and suffered banged shins when they put on skates for a hockey game sequence. Patty was covered with snow several times when she landed in drifts at the end of a toboggan run.

In an edition of *A Summer Night* they made a big splash for a number in a swimming pool. In this sequence Patty learned how to dive the hard way. Giving directions, producer Stan Harris said: "And now you dive in." Patty dived for the first time in her life.

Compatibility is a big reason for the group's success. During a five-month tour in England, in their first year together, there were many times when four people could fall out. But they remained in harmony, both vocally and temperamentally, and still do.
