We old folks can't stay up much later than 10:00 p.m.; so often the good debates and interviews with interesting, world-famous people are later. Couldn't we have these earlier?

But you have all kinds to please and you are doing a mighty good job.

CBXT's French-language programs are shown in addition to regular network and local programs on the station. They do not replace other programs; thus, the station would not transmit on Sunday morning if no French-language programs were carried.

• Of all the years we've been stuck with *Festival* and *Playdate*, you could count on your fingers the ones that could hold a person's interest. It is not just my opinion. I don't know of a single person who makes a habit of watching them or who, but rarely,

has had a good word to say about them. *Kingfisher Cove*, *Friday Island* and *Speaking French* are in almost the same category.

In most of these, the acting usually leaves much to be desired. It is so very rare an occasion when a character is portrayed in a near-natural manner. However, the script material is so poor that this may hamper the actor.

Other programs such as *Inquiry*, *Lively Arts*, *Quest*, *Close-Up* and *Parade* are at times just as bad, but also have many interesting topics . . . and the content and presentation seem to be of better quality.

Why not give us more programs like *Singalong Jubilee* . . . *Country-time* and *Country Calendar*?

The Brandon Service

• I have just listened to today's *In Reply* program and was very interested in the discussion of CBC broadcasting policy. I can see that the theory behind the new network is good—in practice it doesn't work out so well. We have difficulty in getting good reception from CBW or CBK in the evenings and we must rely on the local affiliate, CKX. Although some of the CBC programs are carried, it is inadequate. It is easy to say from a vantage point in Toronto (where CBL, CJBC and CBC-FM are available) that people in Brandon have adequate CBC coverage. I disagree! Aren't taxpayers in Brandon as important as those in Toronto?—*D.N.A., Brandon, Man.*

We realize that some listeners who are served by affiliates would prefer to have a local CBC-owned station. However, we haven't the resources to put a station in every community, so the national service has always been a co-operative venture, with private affiliates helping to distribute CBC programs. We do plan, when finances allow, to improve our radio coverage by means of power increases and frequency changes in certain areas, by the extension of our LPRT service, and probably also by the introduction of some new stations where they are most needed. But areas with no service or inadequate service must come before those that already have several radio choices.

KEEPING THE WOLF from the door may be enough of a task for most people. But getting him to pose for a picture is even harder.

CBC cameraman Ken Gregg, who photographed the 13-week series *Alberta Game Farm* seen Saturday afternoons on CBC-TV, found the trickiest part of the assignment was getting an effective shot of the farm's wolf-pack. What was needed, producer Ron Bashford, Game Farm proprietor Al Oeming and the whole CBC production crew agreed, was a shot of the wolves seated on their haunches emitting the eerie howls for which they are noted.

Even with Oeming's intimate knowledge of the ways of these wily predators, and his familiarity with the pack on the farm, the men found themselves stymied. Days went by, with the wolves side-stepping every attempt to film them or to record their howls.


Once, while in the wolf warren, Bashford took his eyes off a utility bag that contained his camera and accessories. The pack leader sneaked up behind him and made off with the bag, carrying it into his lair. After much coaxing and threatening, the mischievous animal was flushed out—leaving the equipment inside the lair to be retrieved by one of the crew.

Finally, it was sound technician Leon Gantzert who out-foxed the wolves.

He concealed himself during the dark of night near the door of the lair, and, as expected, the wolves came out at the rising of the sun and greeted it with their customary howls—despite the presence of a microphone and tape recorder.

Step one completed, he proceeded, with cameraman Ken Gregg, to step two.

A speaker was placed high in a tree inside the wolf warren, and the tape of the wolves' early-morning howl was played back to them. Just as was hoped, the pack gathered around the tree and joined in a choral response, while Gregg busily took it all in with his camera.

METROPOLITAN OPERA:

The Flying Dutchman

WAGNER'S ROMANTIC tragedy, *The Flying Dutchman* (*Der Fliegende Hollaender*), to be broadcast from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera on Saturday afternoon, February 2, at 2:00 p.m. on CBC Radio, is a transitional work, for with it the 29-year-old composer shrugged off 19th-century grand opera traditions, with their insistence on what we might now call "wide-screen" effects, and began to evolve his own style.

At that time he was living in Paris (1839-1842) in poverty, taking on all sorts of odd musical jobs to keep himself alive. But in between writing songs, proof-reading, arranging and other odds and ends of employment, he managed to compose *The Flying Dutchman* and *Rienzi*.

It was while returning from a couple of years spent in Riga, Latvia, in 1839, that Wagner got the inspiration for *The Flying Dutchman*. Earlier he had

heard the legend from poet Heinrich Heine, who told him the tale of the cursed seafarer who is compelled to roam the ocean and can land only once in seven years in order to wed. He will be saved only if he can find a wife who will be true to him until death. All his attempts end tragically until he meets a young girl who has seen his picture and is determined to marry him and end his unhappy roaming. He falls deeply in love with her but cannot bring himself to let her share his doomed existence, so sets sail with his crew. But as she sees him leave she throws herself into the water and her drowning accomplishes his redemption.

Wagner left Riga by ship in July, 1839. Although the season was favourable for ocean travel, the voyage ran into dreadful weather. Instead of the expected 10 days, the trip took three weeks. The little ship was buffeted unmercifully by storm after storm, and several times huge waves nearly sank her. Finally the captain managed to bring her into a Norwegian port in the fjord at Sandwyk, for repairs and provisions and to give everyone aboard a brief rest from their terrorizing experience.

The ordeal of the trip and the rugged, mountainous countryside around the fjord brought the story of the Flying Dutchman vividly to Wagner's mind. The sailors to whom he mentioned it said they had heard the legend many times. In its retelling "it gained a definite colour all its own, which only my recent sea adventures could supply," Wag-

CLOSE-UP:

Will Poisons Create A 'Silent Spring'?

Is the balance of nature really threatened by the growing use of insecticides? CLOSE-UP examines the prospects

Sunday, February 3, on CBC-TV

BIOLOGIST-WRITER Rachel Carson caused a lot of dust and spray to fly when her book warning of the dangers to man and wildlife from unrestricted use of insecticides, *Silent Spring*, was published a few months ago; the controversy still is raging.

Miss Carson says she didn't intend to start a Carrie Nation crusade. "I wrote the book," she explains, "because I think there is a great danger that the next generation will have no chance to know nature as we do—if we don't preserve it the damage will be irreversible."

She contends that, since DDT and other organic compounds began to be used widely about 20 years ago, they have spread a lethal cloud over the whole world, and sent poisons deep into its soil. Although, she says, this got rid of myriads of unwanted insects and other pests, it also destroyed plant and animal life, and even threatens man. Unrestricted use of insecticides, she says, is destroying the balance of nature.

Many chemists and agriculturalists violently disagree with her, insisting that her arguments are too one-sided, and they have stated emphatically that the pesticide situation is under control. But members of the general public who know little about chemistry or biology, who remember the cranberry scare of 1959 and similar incidents, are confused and frightened because they don't

know whom to believe. In Ottawa earlier this month, the Canadian Society of Zoologists conducted a symposium centering on Miss Carson's book. Leading scientists presented papers based on nationwide research, which indicated generally that although the insecticide situation is serious, it is improving, and benefits gained from controlling pests are tremendous.

On Sunday night, February 3, CBC-TV's *Close-Up* looks into the problem of insecticides with a program featuring the opinions and research of a wide variety of leading scientists and agriculturalists. They include: Dr. George Cooper, general manager of Canadian Cyanamid Ltd., largest manufacturer in Canada of insecticides exclusively, and makers of aminotriazole, which figured in the cranberry scare; Dr. Ian McTaggart-Cowan, head of the department of zoology at the University of British Columbia, well-known for his CBC-TV series *Web of Life* and *The Living Sea*, who will discuss primarily the intricate and balanced biological system which appears to be threatened by insecticides; Dr. Malcolm Hargraves, specialist in hematology, or science of the blood, at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., who will discuss possible effects of toxic chemicals on metabolism. He has made a special study of environmental poisoning and has many case histories indicating a dangerous relationship, but this study is still in the observational stage.



Also heard from are: Dr. W. C. Hueper, chief of the environmental cancer section of the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Maryland, who is concerned primarily with the threat of general environmental poisoning, air and water pollution, etc., and believes that insecticide threats should be reviewed in their larger concept; Dr. Wayland Hayes, chief of the toxicology section in the communicable disease section of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Atlanta, Ga., who is greatly respected by both sides in the controversy as a detached scientific observer, and who organized an experiment involving DDT exposure in an Atlanta prison; Roland C. Clement, staff biologist with the National Audubon Society in New York, who will discuss effects of insecticides on wild life, specifically the much-publicized gypsy moth campaign in the Northeastern U.S.

Also, Robert Cushman Murphy, curator emeritus of birds at the American Museum of Natural History, considered the most distinguished ornithologist in the world, who headed a group of Long Island citizens who sued the U.S. government for damages as a result of the gypsy moth campaign; Dr. James B. Dewitt, a leading researcher in lab and field effects of insecticides on animals, who is section chief of chemical and physiological studies at Patuxent Wildlife Research Centre, Depart-

Does Canada Need Planning?

The annual Winter Conference organized jointly by the CBC and the Canadian Institute on Public Affairs discusses this topic this year. CBC Radio and TV will be on hand for several broadcasts

HIGHLIGHTS FROM the ninth annual Winter Conference organized jointly by the CBC and the Canadian Institute on Public Affairs will be presented on CBC Radio and Television beginning Friday, February 8.

This year's major discussion question is: Does Canada need planning? And if so, why? What kind of planning? By whom? For whom?

Program organizer Christina McDougall says: "For the past year statements have been appearing steadily in the newspapers and on radio and TV from which the casual observer might deduce that we are all on the planning bandwagon these days, that lions are lying down with lambs and that business leaders, trade union officials and politicians of all persuasions are blending in unaccustomed unity in their fervour to plan for Canada. If this were so, the question mark in our topic would be superfluous. But the matter is one of semantics, and planning means very different things to different people within the national context. The Winter Conference will try to sort out the different aspects so we may better assess whether Canada's economic situation demands some modifications in the present system—call it planning or not—and if so, what form they should take."


A studio telecast on Friday, February 8, will introduce the main aspects of the topic to be discussed at the Conference. The program will begin with a graphic sequence demonstrating the trends in Canada's economy from the beginning of the century to the present, followed by statements on the attitudes of management and labour towards planning, from Carl Pollock, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and Larry Sefton, director, District 6, of the United Steelworkers of America.

Then R. M. MacIntosh, assistant general manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia and chairman of this year's Winter Conference, will introduce Harry Johnson, professor of economics, University of Chicago, who will give his views on whether Canada needs planning, before a studio panel consisting of the men who will direct Conference study groups on the following day. Members of the panel, who will question him on the points he raises, will be: George Bain, economist with the Upper Lakes Shipping Company, Toronto; Clarence Barber, professor of economics, University of Manitoba; Russell Bell, acting director of research, Canadian Labour Congress; Thornjorn Carlsson, labour attaché, Royal Swedish Embassy, Washington, D.C.; Scott Gordon, professor of economics, Carleton University, Ottawa; Michael Hicks, tutor and Fellow in Divinity, Trinity College, University of Toronto; Ian Macdonald, assistant

professor of economics, University of Toronto; S. G. Triantis, associate professor of economics, University of Toronto; and Eric Trigg, treasurer, Aluminum Limited. The statements by Pollock and Sefton will be heard on CBC Radio on Friday night at 7:20.

On Saturday, February 9, the Conference proper opens at 9:30 a.m. at the Education Centre, 155 College Street, Toronto. In the morning there will be four major representations examining different points of view on planning with reference to the situations in Europe, the United States and Canada, which will be recorded for possible broadcast later on CBC Radio. Speakers will be James Tobin Sterling, professor of eco-

THE TELEPHONE HOUR

JOAN SUTHERLAND, the Australian-born soprano who has soared to a place among the first rank of internationally-renowned operatic stars in the space of a few years, will make one of her rare television appearances this week on *The Telephone Hour*, to be seen on CBC television on Monday, February 4.

The program, a potpourri of classical and popular music, will also feature pop singers Pat Boone and Mindy Carson, pianist John Browning, and ballet dancers Erik Bruhn and Sonia Arova. Donald Voorhees will conduct the *Telephone Hour* orchestra.

Miss Sutherland, acclaimed by many as the leading coloratura soprano of our time, has achieved particular fame for conquering operatic roles that, because of their technical difficulty, have long been regarded as near-impossible to sing. Under the direction of her husband and vocal coach, Richard Bonyngue, she has revived many roles that have been neglected for decades simply because there were no singers with the vocal resources needed to master them. On *The Telephone Hour*, she will perform the sleep-walking scene from Bellini's opera, *La Sonnambula*, a role she will sing soon in a new Metropolitan Opera production. This will be Miss Sutherland's fourth appearance on *The Telephone Hour*, the series on which she made her American television debut two years ago.

John Browning, an American pianist widely known through his concert tours and numerous recordings, will play the third movement of Brahms' *Concerto No. 1 in D Minor* on the telecast, and Erik Bruhn and Sonia Arova will dance the *Black Swan Pas de Deux* from Tchaikovsky's *Swan Lake*.

Representing the field of popular music on the program, Pat Boone and Mindy Carson will do a number of solo vocals and will join their talents in duets and production numbers, backed by the singing and dancing choruses. Boone, making his first appearance on *The Telephone Hour* on this occasion, will also serve as host of the program.

berta provides the main theme of this program. Last October 643 head of cattle were driven 12 miles from grazing land in the hills, through a gap to Poverty Flats for cutting out and the drive to their owners' ranches.

Frank Lynch-Staunton of Lundbreck, Alta., who owns a 6,000-acre ranch, describes life in the cattle country and the changes that are taking place. Charles Milvain and Bert Connelley, ranchers of the Livingston Valley district, recall the "old days" of the West. Red Davidson of Lethbridge, 130 miles from Poverty Flats, has grazed sheep in the hills for the past 30 years. He tells of the days when his sheep were driven this distance and compares the trip with the present-day movement of the animals by truck.


Explorations

ner wrote later, and the turbulent music in parts of the opera bears this out.

Wagner's mood when he wrote *The Flying Dutchman* was also affected by the fact that he was living pretty much to himself. His biographer, Ernest Newman, says that the composer was "estranged from his family with hardly a single friend to whom he was really attached, loaded with debts, with as yet no better prospect in life . . . secretly aware that he was wasting both his material and spiritual substance on people and things unworthy of him" — in

fact, Wagner was feeling much as the Flying Dutchman must have felt. The wandering, cursed sailor is probably the most significant of all Wagner's hero identifications.

The Flying Dutchman was first performed at the Dresden Hoftheater on January 2, 1843. It closed after four performances. But although it was slow to find a safe port, its sturdy construction and romantic appeal have kept it afloat as one of the most delightful examples of the young Wagner. It was first sighted by North Americans at the Academy of Music in Philadelphia in 1876, and it dropped anchor at the Metropolitan in 1889.

nomics, Yale University, who visited Europe recently as a special envoy of President Kennedy; R. V. Yohe, president of B. F. Goodrich, Canada, Ltd., who was on the recent Mission to Europe for the National Productivity Council; Jacques Parizeau, professor of economics, Ecole des Hautes Etudes Commerciales, Montreal; and Arthur Shenfield, economic director of the Federation of British Industries, at present a visiting professor at the University of Chicago. In the afternoon the participants will break into nine groups under leadership of the panel members mentioned earlier, and the whole afternoon will be spent discussing the morning's representations.

Professor Johnson's Friday night television address will be repeated on radio Saturday morning; and a report on the day's discussions will be presented on radio at 7:00 p.m.

Highlights from the Sunday afternoon portion of the Conference will be heard on radio from 2:30 to 3:30, and will be seen on CBC-TV that same afternoon. Chairman of the session will be Professor Johnson. Arthur Smith, director of research, Private Planning Association of Canada, will draw together some of the discussion threads which emerged during the Saturday session, and then the Honourable Richard Bell, Minister of Citizenship, and J. W. Pickersgill, Liberal M.P. for Bonaville-Twillington, will debate the idea of planning from the political standpoint, followed by questions from the floor.

Those interested in attending the Conference should contact Tim Reid, executive secretary, Canadian Institute on Public Affairs, 244 St. George Street, Toronto. As in past years, a booklet containing the main Conference addresses will be published within a few weeks by the University of Toronto Press.

Act I. On his homeward journey, Daland is compelled by stormy weather to seek a port of refuge. He leaves the helmsman on watch and he and the sailors retire. The helmsman falls asleep. A ghostly vessel appears astern and is driven silently alongside. Invisible hands furl the sails. A man dressed in black steps ashore. Having broken his troth he is compelled to roam the sea without rest. At the end of every seven years the angry waves cast him upon shore and if he can find a wife who will be true to him forever he will be released. He offers Daland treasure and when he hears that Daland has an unmarried daughter, he asks for her as his wife. Tempted by gold Daland consents, and favoured by the south wind, both vessels set sail.

Act II. Girls are singing and spinning in Daland's house. Senta dreamily gazes upon the picture of the Flying Dutchman whom she desires to save. She sings the story of the Dutchman and declares she will save him by her fidelity. Erik, who loves her, arrives and tells her of his dream in which Daland returned with a mysterious stranger who carried her off to sea. She listens with delight and Erik leaves her in despair. Daland arrives with the stranger and is scarcely noticed by his daughter, even when he presents his guest as her betrothed. Senta vows to be true to death.

Act III. Later in the evening the crew of Daland call to the men on the strange vessel to join in the festivities, but without reply. Ghostly forms appear at work on the vessel of the Flying Dutchman and Daland's men retreat in fear. Senta arrives followed by Erik who reproves her for her conduct. She had formerly loved him and vowed constancy. When the stranger overhears these words he is overwhelmed with despair. Now he is forever lost. He summons his men, tells Senta of his curse, and to the consternation of Daland and his crew declares that he is the Flying Dutchman. Hardly has he left the shore when Senta plunges into the sea, faithful to the end. This is his salvation. The spectral ship disappears.



poser of the title music for the *Ben Casey* TV series.

Morton Gould is known to the public primarily as a composer of light orchestral music in which elements of popular and classical music are cleverly blended, but he is respected within the music industry not only for his composing skill but for his abilities as an executive and promoter of American music. He serves as chairman of various committees of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, is an executive with a music publishing firm, and does much work behind the scenes to support and encourage musicians and composers.

Like Gould, Arthur Schwartz does a good deal of his most important work in areas that receive little publicity. Though he is best known as a composer of popular songs — *Dancing in the Dark*, *Body*

and *Soul*, and *Something to Remember You By* are among his dozens of hits — his influence is felt in many other fields of music. The holder of Master of Arts, Bachelor of Law and Doctor of Jurisprudence degrees from Columbia University, Schwartz has worked at various times as a lawyer, writer, film producer, and Hollywood studio executive as well as a composer of songs and film scores.

These men, with their knowledge of the inner workings of music, both as an art and as an industry, may give viewers a new and interesting insight into the nature of music in America.

ment of the Interior, Laurel, Maryland; Bruce S. Wright of the North Eastern Wildlife Station, University of New Brunswick, who has been quoted considerably in the press in connection with the current woodcock controversy.

Dr. Henry Hurtig, associate director, Pesticide Control Programs, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, a distinguished authority on insecticides who discusses not only the world-wide concern about them but also our dependence on chemical control of pests; Dr. C. A. Morrell, director of the Canadian Food and Drug Directorate, who will discuss theory and practice in control, impending changes in legislation governing insecticides, etc.; Dr. G. Fettes, department of forestry, Ottawa, who is concerned specifically with chemical control of forest pests, particularly the New Brunswick spruce budworm program, and with research programs into new and more specific pesticides.

Dr. A. D. Pickett, of the Canadian Department of Agriculture Research Station at Kentville, N.S., an international authority and pioneer worker in the field of alternative methods of pest control, such as biological control, modified spray programs, etc.; Dr. E. Y. Spencer, director of the Pesticide Research Centre, Canadian Department of Agriculture, who will indicate possible future methods of control; Roy McKenzie, director of the plant research branch, Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture, who will discuss a large-scale grasshopper control program in his province, a million-dollar project which has resulted in one death and some controversy.

Dr. Roy Edwards of the University of Saskatchewan, who has stated publicly that he thinks the Saskatchewan program is unnecessary, and has statistics to back up his arguments which he has researched privately; and Joseph Eckhardt and his son, farmers near Durham, Ontario, who were both exposed to carbon-tetrachloride poisoning, at one time critically, and who will discuss the experience and its possible long-term effects.

it, and the settler has to learn to adapt himself to nature, and be thankful for what it gives him. Much of the land is unsuitable for growing crops, but the shallow layer of top soil sustains rich grasses so most of the area is devoted to cattle ranching and sheep raising.

Some of the best summer rangeland is found on the wide plateaus lying 2,000 or 3,000 feet up in the rolling hills, and every spring ranchers drive their beef cattle up into the lush green pastures.

In October, when cold winds begin to sweep the valleys of the foothills, the cattle are rounded up, driven back to the ranches below, and split up into the smaller herds of the individual owners. The round-up, which recalls the fabled days of the old West, is the most exciting event of the year for the ranchers, but it also involves a lot of hard, muscle-testing work. Strays have to be hunted out in remote canyons or on steep hillsides, the frisky herd must be driven intact down through the valleys. Poor cattle have to be cut out, young calves have to be helped along on their new, shaky legs, and finally

the various individual herds have to be sorted out, branded if necessary, and driven home to the ranches of their owners where they are put up for the winter.

One such cattle drive will be the highlight of a filmed program to be seen this week, Monday, February 4 at 8:30 p.m. on CBC-TV's *Camera Canada* series entitled *Big Country*. The hour-long program will present expansive filmed coverage of a round-up and cattle drive, and will trace the seasonal rhythm of life in a typical foothills ranch throughout the year.

Viewers may find that the work-a-day life of a cattleman is fully as exciting as the fictional adventures of the gun-slinging cowboys depicted romantically but inaccurately in hundreds of movie and television westerns. The drive to be seen on *Big Country* was filmed last October, when 634 head of Hereford cattle were driven from their summer grazing land on a forest preserve in the hills, down through the hills to the tiny settlement of Poverty Flats.

The cattle drives in this area may soon be a thing of the past, for the steep-sided gap through which the animals were driven has been surveyed as the potential site of a dam.

ANGEL CAKE

*1 cup and 2 tbsp. cake flour—
sifted 3 times*

½ cup sugar

1½ cups egg whites

¼ tsp. salt

1¼ tsp. cream of tartar

*1 cup fine granulated or
icing sugar*

1 tsp. vanilla

¼ tsp. almond extract

Add salt to egg whites and beat until foamy. Sprinkle in cream of tartar and beat until whites hold a firm peak. Gradually add 1 cup of sugar 2 tbsp. at a time beating well after each addition — add flavouring. Sift cake flour with other ½ cup sugar. Fold in gently. Rinse pan in cold water before putting in batter. Bake at 325° for 1 hour. Invert pan and let cake hang until cold. Remove from pan and ice with your favourite icing.

PEACE

— "A Respectable Word Again"

ON TUESDAYS, January 29 and February 5, at 10:30 p.m., CBC Radio's *Soundings* will present programs outlining the ideals and activities of leading volunteer peace groups in Canada. The programs have been prepared by writer-broadcaster Muriel Clements, who found, in her many interviews across the country, that "peace has become a respectable word again."

"Christmas cards and ornaments display the dove symbol, and visitors to other countries told me that this is also the case there. Members of peace action groups seem to have a much more realistic outlook than those of a few years ago. Peace groups dating back to the First World War still have a hard core of idealists, but younger peace groups feel they are working for peace out of sheer necessity, and on a personal level. I discovered differences of opinion about how much political action should be taken to maintain peace, but most feel they have to work for it through political channels, by getting up petitions, writing their M.P.s, and through marches. Most of the peace action groups support or work closely with the United Nations."

In the first program, Mrs. Clements interviews members of groups such as the Canadian Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, World Federalists, Fellowship of Reconciliation, Voice of Women, Canadian Peace Congress, and others, who discuss their aims and projects; the stands they have taken on questions like Canada's defence policy, disarmament, use of nuclear weapons, the East-West ideological split; whether the communist taint sometimes clinging to peace groups has been a real drawback to them; and whether protest marches are effective.


In the second program, on February 5, Mrs. Clements interviews and tells the story of Dr. Norman Alcock, nuclear physicist and founder of the Canadian Peace Research Institute, and outlines the Institute's current projects.

Speakers include Dr. Hugh Keenleyside, chairman of the British Columbia Power Commission; Maynard Marsh, social scientist and director of research at the school of social work, University of British Columbia; Scott Gordon, an economist at Carleton University; Dr. Franc Joubin, geologist and mining company president whose field is uranium; writer-broadcaster Lister Sinclair; Alan Thomas of the Canadian Association for Adult Education; Willson Woodside, national director of the United Nations Association; Dr. John Paul, professor of sociology at the University of Western Ontario; and Dr. Ursula Franklin, physicist with the Ontario Research Council.
