

CBC TALENT FESTIVAL:**Albertans Dominate Instrumentalists' Awards**

IRENE WEISS, a 16-year-old pianist from Cardston, Alberta, has won the \$1,000 instrumentalist's first prize on CBC Radio's *Talent Festival* series. Violinist Robert Klose of Edmonton was awarded the second cash prize of \$250.

In the vocalists' competition, first and second prize cash awards for \$1,000 and \$250 went to two young ladies from Montreal—soprano Joan Patenaude and coloratura soprano Louise Lebrun.

The final competition in this CBC Radio network series was held Wednesday, January 24. The judges were Edmonton musicologist Richard Eaton, Saskatoon composer Murray Adaskin, baritone and teacher Bernard Diamant from Montreal, and Montreal piano teacher Yvonne Hubert.

A runner-up in last year's *Talent Festival* finals, Miss Weiss made her first major orchestral appearance with the Calgary Philharmonic at the age of 14 in 1961. In 1962 she was awarded a silver medal in the Toronto Conservatory Exams, and went on to gain highest marks at the Calgary music festival.

Mr. Klose, 20, has been playing as a violinist with the Edmonton Symphony since he was 14. He was a 1961 member of the National Youth Orchestra, and is at present a second-year bachelor of music student at the University of Alberta.

An operatic soprano, Miss Patenaude was born in Ottawa, but for the past two years has been living and studying in Montreal. Before enrolling in the Vincent D'Indy School of Music, she studied briefly at the Toronto Opera School and for one year at the McGill Montreal Opera Workshop. Miss Patenaude has toured with Les Jeunesses Musicales, and last April made her debut, at the age of 24, with her first Montreal public recital.

Twenty-three-year-old Miss Lebrun began studying music only seven years ago, but in that short time has won several awards, including the first prize in the 1958 Montreal Sarah Fisher Concert series. She has also won awards in Ottawa and Montreal Music Festivals.

The host and conductor of the 1962-63 *Talent Festival* series has been Sir Ernest MacMillan, who has originated programs from Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton and Vancouver.

The awards were presented by A. K. Morrow, CBC director of the English language networks.

Your MONEY — and Your LIFE

Is it worth more than five cents a month to you to have such killers as heart disease and cancer conquered? Canadians, on the average, give only that much to help support medical research in this country

ACCORDING TO Dr. Ewan Cameron, director of Montreal's Allen Memorial Institute, medical research in Canada would grind to a halt if it were not for contributions from the United States; and even with these, the financial condition of medical research in this country is desperate.

The problems facing research hospitals, their doctors, technicians and students are examined by Elspeth Chisholm on CBC Radio's *Soundings*, Tuesday, February 12 at 10:30 p.m. Titled *Your Money . . . And Your Life*, the program includes interviews with research men from the teaching hospitals and laboratories affiliated to McGill University in Montreal, which has graduated more than half the doctors given degrees from Canadian universities.


Last year, from Canadian sources, the total funds for the support of medical research in Canada amounted to about \$10 million. Of this, the taxpayer, via the Medical Research Council, contributed less than a third. The fund-raising activities of large national organizations such as the Cancer Institute and the Heart Foundation brought in another \$3 million. But, wherever the rest of the \$10-million Canadian contribution came from, the startling fact is that at least another \$10 million came from the United States. That country's National Institute of Health alone contributed over \$2 million, more than half of our own Medical Research Council's allotment.

Perhaps the simplest way of realizing just how badly off Canadian researchers are, is to compare the funds at their disposal with those available in the United States. After taking into consideration the population differences in the two countries, it can be estimated that Americans are 10 times more generous than Canadians in their support of research in their own country.

The repercussions of such meagre support in this country are many. Without sufficient funds, expensive equipment cannot be bought and, in any case, suitable buildings to house such equipment cannot be built. Future researchers cannot be trained in sufficient numbers, and those who are trained cannot be persuaded to remain in Canada, either to conduct research or to train succeeding students.

Some scholarships are awarded by the Medical Research Council, both to students and teachers, but most are subject to annual renewal.

Medical research is vital. Just how vital, is explained by the research leaders interviewed for the *Soundings* program. They compare the work they are able to do with present resources to what they could do with more money—more, that is, than the five cents a month which the average Canadian now donates for the improvement of his health and the safeguarding of his family from death.

The ingenious subsidy designed to increase consumption of butter still hasn't solved the tricky surplus problem.

COUNTRYTIME examines the situation Saturday

TO MOST SHOPPERS, the price of butter is a comparatively minor item, just a part of the weekly struggle to stretch an always-inadequate food budget to cover the family's needs. But to the government, the price of butter is a multi-million-dollar problem, one that has been hotly debated and on which many conflicting opinions have been expressed.

The question of why the government is involved in the butter business will be discussed this week on a national edition of CBC-TV's *Countrytime*, to be seen Saturday, February 9. Entitled *The 64-Cent Question*, the program will examine Canada's billion-dollar dairy industry and some of its problems. Taking part will be Dr. Howard Patterson, an agricultural economist, and John Monkhouse, executive secretary of the Dairy Farmers of Canada. Hosts and commentators on the program will be John Foster and Harold Dodds, both of CBC's farm broadcast department.

The program will include a detailed study of butter production in the Renfrew County area of Ontario. Films will be shown of the co-operative plant at Renfrew, where butter is produced by a new, continuous, or "jet" method. The Renfrew plant is one of the few in Canada making butter by this modern method in which no churning is involved. The film will include interviews with Frank Dench, Renfrew County agricultural representative, and several dairy farmers, including Dan McLaren and Alva Collins.

The program's title hints at the reason why butter has become an issue among provincial and federal governments, dairy producers, other special groups, and the general public. Under the price-support and subsidy program estab-

lished some years ago and strengthened last May, the government buys butter from producers at 64 cents per pound, then sells it to the trade at 52 cents. When the consumer subsidy of 12 cents per pound was introduced last May, retail prices dropped from about 70 cents to between 56 and 59 cents per pound.

The support program is aimed at increasing butter consumption across the country by making butter more competitive with margarine, and the cost to taxpayers has been estimated at between 40 and 50 million dollars for its first year of operation.

But despite the cut in retail price, butter surpluses have continued to build up in Canada. An article in the *Toronto Globe and Mail* last November cited a 20.6 per cent increase in consumption, but noted that production increased 4.9 per cent; consumption increased by 25 million pounds between May 1 and October 1, compared with the previous year, while output rose by 10.3 million pounds. The total excess of production over consumption during the summer season was 82.7 million pounds.

Why do producers continue to supply more butter than can be used? And why does the government, in effect, pick up the tab for the resultant losses? The answer may be found in the philosophy underlying price supports for farm produce. Stated simply, the philosophy is that the farmer is entitled to the same security and protection as guaranteed other workers through unemployment insurance and wage regulations. If expenditures to ensure minimum security in other industries have been accepted as a matter of public policy, then, it is argued, the farmers should be entitled to pro-

tection against severe drops in farm prices.

Until recently, Canada's experience with surplus problems arising out of price supports was relatively minor. Temporary surpluses of several products had developed from time to time, but on the whole Canada had not experienced serious difficulty. But in 1958 and '59, burdensome surpluses of four major products — eggs, skim milk powder, pork, and butter — piled up, and the government took action to modify the support program. While some of the problems were cleared away, the butter surplus persists.

Canadian agriculture has had a price support program since 1946. It was a temporary measure at first, originating in the war years when farmers were encouraged to grow more food to help the war effort. In a radio broadcast of December, 1943, the then Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King stated: "If, to help win the war, farmers are asked to accept a ceiling on prices, we believe they are entitled to a floor under prices to ensure them against agricultural depression after the war."

The expected slump in prices didn't materialize immediately after the war, however. Prices remained at high levels, based largely on export demand which continued strong until the early 1950s. Since then, agriculture has been facing a period of adjustment from war and post-war prosperity. Many problems have arisen, and many solutions have been suggested, particularly in settling the difficulties of the dairy industry. Some of these will be discussed at length on Saturday's program.

Gwen Grant Returns for Guest Appearance on Flashback

After a few months out of the TV spotlight, Gwen joins the Flashback panel in identifying yesterday's headline-makers

GWEN GRANT, a popular CBC-TV and radio personality who has been away from the studios and moving around rather cautiously for a few months, because of a fractured coccyx ("tail-bone") reappears on TV Sunday night, February 10, as the guest panelist on *Flashback*. She'll join "regulars" Alan Millar, Allan Manings and Margaret Morris in trying to identify famous persons, objects and facts of the past.

As Gwen has spent half her life in showbusiness or on the fringes of it, she says her enforced hibernation was like being left alone on a desert island. "Civilization—grease-paint, arc lights, cameras and mikes—will look awfully good to me," she says.

Gwen's model-like proportions and attractive voice have been on stage or on camera steadily since she made her showbusiness début at 10 in a school piano recital, "resplendant in a pink *crepe-de-chine* dress." Later she played pioneer brides in school dramas, where her blushing shyness made the speaking of even one or two lines a trying experience for her. But once in high school she began to branch out with more confidence—sang in glee club performances and even produced a half-hour variety show.

Her family wanted her to study for her B.A., but Gwen was anxious to get out into the world, so she compromised by attending night courses in advertising, psychology and public relations at the University of Toronto, working by day in a newspaper office. Later she did public relations work for a couple of years. She was married in 1943 to an air force man and went to live near the RCAF station at Portage la Prairie, where she assisted in producing shows for the boys.

When her husband went overseas the following year she moved to Winnipeg, and worked with the director of public relations for the Victory Loans. When the director was appointed to head a public relations office in Toronto, Gwen went along as his assistant until the office was closed in 1946. After that she spent a year in Montreal doing P.R. work and in 1947 returned to Toronto to join an advertising agency and assist in producing the first Canadian National Sportsmen's Show.

That same year she was appointed beauty executive for a cosmetics firm and began an interesting international career as a lecturer on cosmetics and beauty, which took her across Canada and the United States and to England, France, Belgium and Italy.

In 1952 Gwen decided to have a fling at television, and went to live in the U.S. to get some experience in the new medium. She worked for TV stations in Florida and New York as a production assistant, and then spent two years in Hollywood, where she acted in *NBC Matinée Theatre*, appeared in the annual Screen Writers' Awards Show, and co-ordinated fashion shows in the Hollywood area and up the Pacific coast.

In 1958 Max Factor sent Gwen on a tour of Hawaii and Australia to lecture on beauty. Afterwards she decided to return to Canada. Since then she has written and recorded documentaries for CBC Radio's *Trans-Canada Matinée*, and on CBC-TV she has conducted interviews and appeared on such shows as *Tabloid* (now *Seven-O-One*), and *Live a Borrowed Life*. She was hostess on CBC-TV's *Open House* for some time—a job, she says, which gave her more satisfaction than any in her career.

Gwen's main interests are in the arts and the outdoors. She enjoys tennis, golf and piloting a plane. She says her unfulfilled ambitions are to be a singer, to learn to do the Charleston, and to jump on a trampoline. This last will have to wait awhile. Though her spirit is willing, she says, her injured "tail-bone" is still weak.

Dramatic Struggle to Establish a Church

THE LITTLE CENTURY-OLD church nestles contentedly in the north end of metropolitan Winnipeg, pondering a hundred years of history that saw its stubborn builders strive for and win the right to their own community in the New West, and a church of their own faith.

Old Kildonan Church, one of the few remnants of the Red River Settlement, stands as a monument to the faith and determination of the hardy Scots who came to this country under Lord Selkirk to establish a new way of life, in the face of the elements, crop failure and the cruel opposition of the North-West Company. The story of its founding as the first Presbyterian church in the area is told Sunday, February 10 in *Church Goes to the Red River*, on CBC-TV's *Heritage*.

Driven from their land in the early 1800's by greedy landlords who found they could make more money by grazing sheep on the fields tilled by the small farmers, the Scots, united under Lord Selkirk's leadership, headed for the open territory of British North America. Selkirk purchased a large tract of land from the Hudson's Bay Company near the junction of the Red and Assiniboine rivers, and allotted 100 acres to each settler, for which they repaid him in produce.

Rivalry between the Hudson's Bay and North-West companies had convulsed the whole of the newly developing land, focussing at the Red River. Indians were incited by the North-West Company to invade the new settlement, already plagued by severe weather, poor crops and the resultant lack of food. Twice the settlement was levelled, the people driven out to take refuge at Pembina, 70 miles south, or at Norway House, far to the north on Lake Winnipeg.

In the face of this difficulty, three-quarters of the colonists left Red River for a new land in Upper Canada. But a hardy core stayed, and soon they were joined by more of their countrymen.

The Settlers all were of the Presbyterian communion, and Gaelic was their mother tongue. They first were ministered to by one James Sutherland, an elder of the Presbyterian church. But the North-West Company, who found this man for some reason to be a thorn in their side, had him removed from the colony.

There followed years of negotiations, attempting to have a Presbyterian clergyman sent to the Red River, but somehow the efforts came to nought. In 1820, a missionary of the Church of England was sent to the settlement, but the ritual of the church was unfamiliar to the Scots, and the English language to them was a foreign tongue.

It was another three decades before the stubborn Settlers were to have a minister of their own faith, and to start erecting their own church. The tale of how it was finally accomplished is a study in perseverance, and acute insight into the early days of the Settlement is imparted in its telling.


Producer Alwyn Scott has used an experimental technique in putting across the story. A narrator sets the framework for brief drama-

tized segments in which actors speak the actual words of the people involved. The stage settings largely are made up of antiques used in the Settlement, and rare photographs of the early days are projected on a screen at the back of the set at appropriate intervals.

The script has been based on numerous documents and published works concerning the era, including the memoirs of Alexander Ross, fur trader, historian and sheriff of Assiniboia from 1839 to 1852. George Waight plays Ross, who was instrumental in bringing about establishment of the church. Narrator is Dave Robertson.

It's Carnival Time In Quebec City

IN NEW ORLEANS, the year's big blow-out is Mardi Gras, in Munich it's the Oktoberfest, and in Quebec the residents shake off their cares during the Quebec Winter Carnival.

This year's Carnival began on February 6 with the crowning of the Carnival Queen and the official opening of the festivities by Bonhomme Carnaval, the giant snowman who symbolizes the gaiety of the occasion and serves as jolly king of the Carnival. During his reign, he presides over a succession of sporting and social events, including canoe races over the partly frozen St. Lawrence, a dog derby, bonspiels, snow-shoe races, hockey games, skiing competitions, daylight and torchlight parades, masquerade balls, street dancing, and many other colourful functions.

Literally hundreds of singers, musicians, and folk dancers will take part in entertainment spectacles during the Carnival, and included in the parades will be a couple of dozen immense, brightly decorated floats and a dozen bands.

CBC television cameras will be on hand during many of the most exciting events, recording for viewers the gay or suspenseful highlights of some of these events. On Saturday, February 9, CBC-TV will present a videotaped program on the official opening ceremonies, and on Sunday, February 24, the television network will carry 90 minutes of videotaped coverage of other activities during the Carnival. These will include the monster torchlight procession and the dangerous but highly entertaining canoe race across the river from Quebec City to Levis and back.





The Lively Arts

Harry Mannis introduces a 20-minute film written and prepared by Ed Rollins made up of still photos by William Notman, a Scot who came to Canada and opened a studio in Montreal in 1856. About 50 of more than 700,000 Notman photos now in the Redpath Museum at McGill University are shown on the program, including portraits of Sir John A. Macdonald, Sitting Bull, Jefferson Davis and D'Arcy McGee.

Also shown is a ten-minute film entitled *The Ring of Time*, devised and animated by Hans Kohlund, consisting of photos and tapes made by Lutz Dille, a contemporary photographer working out of Toronto. About 80 photos are used to depict the passing parade of people and time around the Mexico City Cathedral.

LIVELY ARTS:

Photographs From The Notman Collection

THE CAMERA was only about 17 years old in 1856 when William Notman, a Scottish draper newly arrived in Montreal, became fascinated by the new toy and decided to get in on the ground floor of what he suspected might become a popular moneymaking business. He set himself up as a photographer, and soon bewhiskered gentlemen and ladies in hoops were singing his praises all over Montreal.

His fame spread to other cities and below the border. In 1860 he took a portrait of the Prince of Wales, and shortly was named photographer to the Queen. He photographed most of the Fathers of Confederation and so many famous people, places and events that his huge collection of photographs, now in safe-keeping at McGill University, is an invaluable study of the Victorian era.

Although Notman was best known as a portrait photographer, he took many artistically noteworthy shots of scenery, travelling across the country in special train coaches and selling his work, much of it specially commissioned, at handsome prices. One attractively-bound collection of outdoor scenes, priced at \$150, sold out in no time.

He didn't consider himself an historian. He was a frustrated painter who loved taking pictures more than anything else. Although he took infinite pains with his poses and composition, his work had a fresh spontaneity that lifted it well above that of most other leading photographers of his time.

About 50 of the most famous and representative photographs in the Notman collection will be shown on CBC-TV's *The Lively Arts* on Tuesday night, February 12, in a 20-minute program written and prepared by Ed Rollins. Included will be portraits of Sir John A. Macdonald, Chief Sitting Bull, Jefferson Davis and D'Arcy McGee.

Man With a Banjo

And, in a way, this was true for one of U.S. President John F. Kennedy's Harvard classmates — Pete Seeger. But this man, largely responsible for the revival of interest in the folk music of American and the English-speaking world, might have added: "Ask me what I did at any time since I was a kid like yourself, and my answer would be the same."

At a tumultuous time in history when living legends are perhaps less rare than they used to be, Pete Seeger still stands out from that select coterie. Folklorist Alan Lomax has written that Seeger is possessed "of that rarest of human qualities—an inquiring mind. This (Please turn to page 25)



QUEST:

Space-Age Drama

SWISS-BORN Friedrich Durrenmatt, considered one of the most interesting living writers in the German language, is a tall, heavy-set, full-jowled man with grave blue eyes behind large spectacles. Aside from writing—novels, essays, and plays for stage, radio, movies and TV—he likes talking best.


When he was staying in New York some time ago, to see one of his plays come to life on stage, he became so morose from his inability to communicate with anyone who wasn't used to his accent and his limited English vocabulary, that he decided to take English lessons. He chose as his instructor an American Negro chauffeur. The result was disastrous but hilarious. The combination of Durrenmatt's decided Swiss-German accent and the ver-

nacular and rhythm of the Deep South baffled New Yorkers completely. Says Durrenmatt crossly: "They refused to even try to understand me."

But what he has to say in his dramas and other writing comes across clearly and provocatively for North Americans in translation. Many critics feel he surpasses any post-war European dramatist in the craft of satiric playwriting. His target is the cruelty and corruption in the world around him, the hollowness of our acquisitive and often faithless civilization.

"People say I am a cynic because I show things that are harsh and funny at the same time," he says. "But I am not. Art is made by man, not by adolescents. I try to show the world as it is, and if people say I am a cynic it is public defense. The fault of most critics is that they think a play or a novel must be based on a thesis. I don't work that way.

"I write something, and then there may or may not be a thesis in it. I don't mean to say that I'm

another Shakespeare, but that is the way Shakespeare wrote, too. He didn't give moral lessons. If Shakespeare came back today to write his plays anew, the critics would call him the worst cynic of all time. I am fascinated by the problem of the duality of justice. The world for me stands for something monstrous, an enigma or calamity, which has to be accepted but to which there must be no surrender."

This attitude is presented forcefully in his short play *The Mission of the Vega*, a dramatic episode set 300 years in the future, when inter-planetary travel could have become common. A translation from the German by Alfred Schild will be presented on CBC-TV's *Quest* on Sunday night, February 10,

The Prince de Bouillon arrives with the frivolous Abbé de Chazeuil. Adrienne appears and is talking with Michonnet when Maurice de Saxe enters.

Adrienne loves him, believing him to be a poor young officer. In reality, he is the hero of the day in war and love. She gives him a bunch of violets and hurries away to play her part.

The Princess de Bouillon also loves Maurice and persuades La Duclos to make an appointment for her with him at the country villa of the actress. The Prince de Bouillon, who is interested for the moment in La Duclos, intercepts the letter and thinks it is La Duclos herself who is making the rendezvous with Maurice. He plans to take Adrienne to supper at the villa and entrap the faithless Duclos. Adrienne accepts the Prince's invitation and he promises her that the famous Count de Saxe will be present at the supper.

Act II. The villa, La Grange Batelière. Maurice enters wearing Adrienne's violets. The princess endeavours, fruitlessly, to awaken his love and departs in a jealous rage. Adrienne comes in, joyfully recognizing in the great Count de Saxe her adored lover. The prince issues orders that no one is to leave the premises, hoping to catch Duclos. Adrienne also thinks that Maurice's appointment was with the actress but he denies it and implores Adrienne's aid in securing the escape of the fair lady. Michonnet enters with a bracelet dropped by a lady who had passed through the garden with Maurice. Adrienne hides the bracelet.

Act III. The salon of the princess. The princess tries to discover from the abbé the name of her rival. Michonnet enters, arranging with the prince for a loan to Adrienne on her celebrated diamonds. The guests, now arriving, all are gossiping about the imprisonment of the Count de Saxe for debt. Adrienne is announced. She wears no jewels. Adrienne shows the guests the bracelet and the princess, to divert attention, asks her to recite. She gives a scene from *Phèdre* in which she covertly insults the princess.

Act IV. A room in Adrienne's house. Adrienne appears, depressed and sad. Her fellow actors bring gifts in honour of her birthday, and divert her with

gentle . . . fiery and unbeatable spirit pervades his music, his friendships, his beanpole body and his thought." He has also been called "America's tuning fork," a "whole way of life," a "reincarnated troubadour," and "with Sandburg and Frost, a guardian of American heritage." Heady praise for a man who considers himself "just a banjo picker."

Seeger, with his five-stringed banjo and his 12-stringed guitar, will appear on *Parade* Wednesday, February 13. The half-hour program, *Two Links in a Chain*, was taped in Toronto recently. The title of the program refers to one of Seeger's mentors, Huddie Ledbetter (better known as "Leadbelly") and himself, two links in a chain reaction in music that has caused a revolution in the musical appreciation of the American nation.

On the program, Seeger will sing the songs he learned from Leadbelly and show excerpts from a recently discovered film of Leadbelly singing such songs as *Pick a Bale of Cotton*, *Grey Goose* and *Take This Hammer*. The songs Seeger sings were either written or arranged by Leadbelly and includes the popular *Goodnight, Irene*.

Seeger served a long apprenticeship in the folk music and song writing field. Although his mother was an accomplished violinist and music teacher and both his father and later his step-mother gained national recognition for their studies in folk music, he grew up with other plans, although he had played a ukulele since he was eight. Born in New York in 1919, he eventually went to Harvard with the idea of becoming either an artist or a journalist. Neither field beckoned with the force he had hoped, and he turned to his first love, the uniquely American five-stringed banjo and the songs that were sung with it.

He was inducted into the U.S. Army in 1942 and during his 3½-year service he performed for the troops, mainly in the Pacific theatre of war, and organized hospital recreation — "jazz, hill-billy music, whatever it is that soldiers sing."

He suddenly became a name to conjure with when the folk singing group he helped form, The Weavers, recorded *Kisses Sweeter Than Wine* ten years ago. Another of his compositions, *Where Have All the Flowers Gone*, was recorded by the Kingston Trio in 1961. Last year he had another hit in *If I had a Hammer*.

who had been expected to visit England, was not coming."

Immediately Terpiloff began to imagine what might have led to the poet's withdrawal from the delegation. Within a few months he had written a witty drama about it, which CBC-TV's *Festival* presents Monday night, February 11, under the title of *Ivan*. The production by David Gardner stars John Colicos, Mavor Moore, and Gillie Fenwick.

This is Terpiloff's first original play for television. Basing it to a certain extent on journalistic accounts of the "thaw" in Moscow today, Terpiloff has fashioned it as a strong melodrama concerning the interrelations of three men who represent the generations that have lived under communism. The character Zvierkov (Gillie Fenwick), who has known a life outside war, and whose memory spans the Revolution, bears a resemblance to Russian novelist-journalist Ilya Ehrenburg, who grew up in Paris at the turn of the century. A friend of artists Picasso and Modigliani, Ehrenburg wrote and travelled all over the world and didn't return to Russia until the start of the Second World War. He rebelled violently against the Stalin regime, but in spite of his attitude he received the Stalin Prize twice. His recent novel, *The Thaw*, has been interpreted as a stinging attack on Stalin. His autobiography, a further exposé of the Stalin regime, is appearing serially in a Moscow literary journal. The West, says producer David Gardner, considers him to be a brilliant and shrewd

man who has managed to have his cake and eat it, too.

The character of Korchmarov (Mavor Moore), says Gardner, is probably based on more than one person, including novelist Sholokhov, a caustic, outspoken writer who at the same time strongly follows the Party line. He is best known for his epic, three-part novel of the Don Cossacks: *The Silent Don, And Quietly Flows the Don*, and *The Don Flows Home to Sea*.

Ivan (John Colicos), the most interesting of the three, and based on Yevtushenko, represents the generation that matured artistically and emotionally under the Khrushchev regime. At one time he was a member of the Komsomol, Communist Union of Youth, which is usually a stepping-stone to Party membership, but later renounced his membership. Ivan's writing does not adhere strictly to the Party line. He finds his passport withheld on the day he is to leave for London.

Terpiloff says, "My father and his family emigrated to New England from White Russia in 1900. My grandfather returned to Russia in 1905, was caught up in the war and killed. I spent many years with my grandmother (who spoke no English) so my emotional understanding of Ivan might be traced to my father and grandmother. I was born in New York City in 1929, and was brought up there and in Maine. My mother, a short-story writer of French-English extraction, died in 1932.

"I went to Tokyo in 1946 to serve as an information-education specialist in the U.S. Air Corps, (Please turn to page 29)

and later was a newspaper and magazine editor. I returned to New York in 1949 to attend Columbia University. I wrote short stories and a novel there, and finished my first play just about the time I graduated in 1953. I got a job with International News Photos but left early in 1954 to spend all my time playwriting, working at odd jobs in my spare time, which reversed the usual practice of young writers. I wrote 11 full-length stage plays between then and 1961, and 10 shorter plays."

One of them was presented off Broadway in 1955, several were given concert readings, and another won first prize in a national contest. In 1958 Terpiloff

went back to steady employment for a while, as a civilian yeoman attached to the U.S. Navy, on Caribbean and Mediterranean runs. During that time he began his 10th play, *Birds Still Sing*, now re-titled *Silly on a String*, which has been close to production several times. Terpiloff hopes it will be produced in New York this winter.

In 1958 he was given a Playwright Observership by the Rockefeller Foundation, which enabled him to join a Broadway-bound show, *A Majority of One*, from the first rehearsal through the out-of-town try-outs to the New York opening. Besides learning how a play evolves from first script to opening night, Terpiloff tried his hand at acting, in nightly walk-ons. In 1951 he went to England, where he is currently writing plays for television.

Bernard Naylor To Conduct English Music

NOTED ENGLISH composer Bernard Naylor who is also a part-time resident of Winnipeg, con-

ducts a string orchestra in works by Purcell, Elgar and himself Wednesday, February 13, at 10:30 p.m. on *CBC Wednesday Night*. Soloist is soprano Phyllis Thomson.

Naylor's own work on the program is *Cantata for High Voice and Strings*, composed in 1947 and given its premiere on the BBC Third Program in January, 1950. In four movements, the cantata sets to music four poems by the obscure 17th century poet Rowland Watkyns of Berlockshire, Wales, entitled *The Gardener, The Spring, The Merciful Samaritan and Upon Christ's Nativity*. Watkyns was a vicar who became dispossessed of his living, probably then taking up the practice of medicine. He published one volume of verse, in 1662, full of good poetry, entitled *Flanna Sine Fumo*. At the end is a small treatise on medical subjects. He was considered a religious poet of considerable distinction, quietly effective in a gentle way.

The Cantata includes "solo parts on all five sections of the strings, (Please turn to page 33)

Young British Composers Featured

WHILE "NEW WAVE" plays and films have been relatively successful in Europe and North America, *avant-garde* music is still a box-office nemesis. British concert programs, comparatively conservative at the best of times, rarely include revolutionary, untried works by new composers, and it is mainly through BBC broadcasts, and concerts arranged by the British branch of the International Society for Contemporary Music, that the works of young composers are exposed to the public.

When British music is programmed, it is generally the music of Holst, Vaughan Williams or Delius, with occasional smatterings of Britten and Walton, and even more rare samplings of Tippett, Arnold, and Rawsthorne. Such names as Malcolm Williamson, Peter Maxwell Davies, Richard Bennett, Harrison Birtwhistle, Nicholas Maw, Cornelius Cardew, John Exton, and Alexander Goehr are almost completely unknown, but these young men probably represent a major part of the future of British music.

This week, on *CBC Wednesday Night* (February 13), works by three of these composers—Exton, Goehr, and Davies—will be presented, in a broadcast beginning at 8:05. The program is a BBC transcription made at a concert given last June in London under the auspices of the International Society for Contemporary Music. It will consist of three works: *Partita for string quartet*, by Exton; *The Deluge*, a cantata for soprano, contralto, and chamber ensemble, by Goehr; and the first *String Quartet*, by Davies.

with considerable divided strings otherwise," says Mr. Naylor. It is performed in some 11 minutes.

Bernard Naylor is the scion of an English family of musicians. Born in 1907 at Cambridge where his father was assistant master at the Leys school and organist of Emmanuel College, he studied at the Royal College of Music in

London under Vaughan Williams, Holst and Ireland. At Oxford in 1927-31 he was organ scholar at Exeter College and conducted the Oxford University Opera Club.

In 1932 he came to Canada, founding the Winnipeg Philharmonic and Male Voice Choirs, and the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra. He returned to Oxford in 1936, but by 1942 was back in Canada to found the Little Symphonies Orchestra in Montreal, which he conducted until 1947.

He has since held university posts in England, and has resided in Winnipeg at various times. In 1953 he was commissioned by the CBC to set King Solomon's Prayer for the coronation of the Queen. His compositions include choral works, vocal chamber music and works for solo voice and orchestra. His *Stabat Mater* for chorus and orchestra is to be performed at the Three Choirs Festival in Hereford Cathedral, and he has been commissioned to write a work for the Sir Henry Wood Promenade Concert in Albert Hall.

Other works on the program are Purcell's *Fantasia No. 1 in G Minor* and *Serenade for Strings* by Elgar. Jeffrey Anderson is producer.

CHOCOLATE ROLL

- ½ cup sifted cake flour
- ½ tsp. baking powder
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 4 eggs—room temperature
- ¾ cup fine granulated sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2 tbsp. granulated sugar
- ¼ tsp. soda
- 3 tbsp. cold water
- 1 cup whipping cream
- ¼ tsp. almond extract

Sift flour, baking powder and salt.

Into mixing bowl put 4 eggs and ¾ cup sugar, beat at high speed until very thick and light. Fold in flour mixture all at once.

Melt chocolate over hot water. To chocolate stir in 2 tbsp. sugar, ¼ tsp. soda and 3 tbsp. of cold water. Fold this into previous batter.

Line bottom of 15x10x1 jelly roll pan with waxed paper, grease, pour in batter and bake at 375° for 15-20 minutes.

When done, turn out on tea towel which has been sprinkled with icing sugar. Take off paper. Trim off crusty edge of cake, cool 5 minutes and roll towel and cake together. Put on wire rack to cool. To serve, unroll cake, spread with whipped cream which has been flavoured with ¼ tsp. almond extract. Spread cream to within 1 inch of edge. Re-roll, icing with more whipped cream.

'HOSS CARTWRIGHT'

Gentleman Giant Blocker Was Well-Educated Teacher

WHILE STUDYING physical education and playing college football, a tall, stout, young man was asked to take a non-speaking part in a college production of *Arsenic and Old Lace*. No one bothered to mention they just needed someone strong enough to carry bodies out of the basement.

The experience changed his life and it was at this point that Dan Blocker, best known for his role as Hoss Cartwright in *Bonanza* (Sundays on CBC-TV), began his acting career.

Dan Blocker was born in Bowie County, Texas, in 1930, the only son of Shack and Mary Blocker. He weighed 14 pounds at birth, 105 pounds when he entered grade school, 200 pounds when he was 12 years old, and nearly 300 pounds when he was signed for his *Bonanza* role.

When he was 10, Blocker worked alongside grown men on grain trucks and could often outdo them in feats of strength. He worked in grain elevators, picked cotton and did general construction work.

Blocker went to Sul Ross State, at Alpine, Tex., on a football scholarship. At this time he was only 17 years old, weighed 275 pounds and stood 6 feet, 4 inches. He wore a 58 long suit coat and size 14½ shoes.

Following his first "show business" experience at Sul Ross, he switched from physical education and graduated in 1950 with a drama degree. He turned down a pro football offer to play summer stock at the Brattle Hall Theatre in Boston. From there he went into the Broadway production of *King Lear* which starred the late Louis Calhern.


Shortly after the outbreak of the Korean war, Blocker was drafted

and sent overseas, ending up as a first sergeant with the 45th Oklahoma Division. He was discharged two years later and returned home to marry his college sweetheart, Dolphia Parker. They have twin girls and two boys, Debra Lee and Danna Lynn, 9, David Douglas, 7, and Dennis Dirk, 5.

He returned to Sul Ross to work on his master's degree, dropped out a year to teach high school in Texas, and returned for his M.A. in drama and English. Afterwards, he taught school.

In 1956, while working for his doctorate at UCLA, Blocker landed a feature part in an episode of *Gunsmoke*. "I made more money in four days doing this part than I made in a month of teaching."

He quit teaching and moved to California with his family. Since then "Hoss" has risen rapidly as an actor. He's made guest appearances on many major western shows and dramas on American networks. He has also made several feature films, including *The Young Captives*.
