The cause of this viewer's dissatisfaction seems to be largely that one station's programming does not include as much to interest her as did several stations' programming in Vancouver. Is this not to be expected?

As for half-hour drama, CBC-TV this year is carrying the Loretta Young Theatre series and the Scarlett Hill week-day serial which has a new story starting each Friday.

Wildlife shows on CBC-TV at present include This Living World (Mondays), and Alberta Game Farm (Saturdays). However, the latter is not carried on the affiliated station watched by this viewer.

Both of the network's two quiz programs, Front Page Challenge (Tuesdays) and Flashback (Sundays), are carried on the affiliate.

Although general questionnaires are not circulated, the CBC does subscribe to several ratings services which give a good picture of what the public watches. CBC programming is not planned on a basis only of catering to the tastes of the majority, however; special consideration is given to the wide disparity of tastes in the country, and it is attempted to schedule programs that appeal to everyone's special tastes at some time, if those tastes are shared by a recognizable group of Canadians.

PRINCESS GRACE SHOWS HER "HOME"

ONE OF THE biggest hits of North American television last year was a tour of the White House conducted by Mrs. John F. Kennedy. Now, another beautiful "first lady" is going to take television viewers on a conducted tour of *her* place. The "place" in this case is the entire principality of Monaco, and the guide will be Princess Grace, formerly the Hollywood actress, Grace Kelly.

Scheduled stops include the royal palace, the Foyer Sainte Devote (an orphanage under the patronage of Princess Grace), the Oceanographic Museum and its scientific centre directed by world-famous "father of skin-diving," Jacques-Yves Cousteau, and the Monte Carlo Opera House.

The hour-long program, entitled A Look at Monaco, originates with the CBS television network, and will be seen on CBC-TV on Sunday evening, February 17.

It has been customary to see Monaco, on the one hand, as an idyllic, timeless little country — a ne plus ultra for sun-worshippers and lovers of the languid life — on the other, as a land of romance, suspense, drama, and abrupt fluctuations of fortunes—all pulsating in tempo with the spinning of a roulette wheel in the glittering Monte Carlo Casino.

This traditional view of Monaco still has some validity. The sun shines as brightly as ever; the Casino still throbs with life, but such a perspective is too small-scaled to be truly representative of Monaco today. Important changes have been taking place in the tiny principality by the sea, causing it to out-grow its legendary dimensions.

For example: at one time, few buildings in Monaco were more

LIGHT ENTERTAINMENT with a fresh approach each week is heard in a new series of one-occasion shows on CBC Radio. For Your Approval, 10:05 to 10:30 p.m. each Friday will present a variety of instrumental groups and vocalists under different Winnipeg conductors week by week.

First of the series, which was to be heard Friday, February 8, presented songs of inspiration by The Altones, well-known male vocal quartet seen on CBC-TV's Red River Jamboree Fridays.

In marked contrast, the second program, Friday, February 15, is to include smooth popular music in the sentimental vein, with an unusual instrumental combination under the baton of Neil Harris. A piano, celeste, flute, clarinet, vibes, electric guitar, bass and drums will create music with an ethereal, delicate flavour, ideal for late-night relaxation. Lorraine West is vocalist.

February 22nd's show, with the Dave Stubbs combo, is still being planned.

Jack Bingham, now of CBC Winnipeg but for several years producer of the widely acclaimed CBC Vancouver variety show *Leicester Square*, is in charge of *For Your Approval*.

VIEWERS IN Flin Flon and The Pas, served by CBWBT and CBWBT-1, now can enjoy news telecasts even though their stations are not on the trans-Canada microwave network. Ten-minute films featuring reports on national and international news events and commentaries from CBC correspondents are flown to the remote northern Manitoba communities. They are shown each evening but Sunday at 11 p.m.

IF YOU were to see a cougar crouching a few feet in front of you, eyeing you hungrily and giving every appearance of making ready for the "kill," what would you do? Don Brown, production assistant on the crew that filmed the Alberta Game Farm series (Saturdays on CBC-TV) was confronted with this situation, but calmly went on with his work INSIDE the cougar cage on the Farm. GLENN GOULD

GLENN GOULD's second Festival special for CBC-TV this season, to be telecast March 4, will include an original Gould composition, So You Want to Write a Fugue. It will be performed by the Canadian String Quartet and a vocal quartet—Elizabeth Benson-Guy, Patricia Rideout, Gordon Wry and Edgar Murdoch.

CBC Radio listeners needn't wait that long to enjoy a performance by Gould, however. The world-renowned Canadian pianist is guest artist with the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra Sunday, February 17 at 6:00 p.m.

A CBC NEWSMAGAZINE crew left Toronto February 3 for Cuba to prepare a comprehensive report on the current Cuban political, social and economic situation and on Russian military establishment.

Permission for the Cuban trip was granted CBC Newsmagazine by the Cuban information ministry.

As far as is known, no other television reporting crew from North America has been allowed in Cuba since the recent crisis with the United States over the presence of Russian inter-continental missiles. PLAYDATE:

A Stimulating Trio

THURSDAY NIGHT, February 21, CBC-TV's Playdate presents a trio of short plays offering three impressions of how the individual accepts reality. Does life change much in 70 years? These plays say "no." The Stronger (circa 1890), by Swedish dramatist August Strindberg, represents the era before the modern age. The Long Goodbye (circa 1930), by American playwright Tennessee Williams, represents man beaten by the machine. The New Tenant (circa 1960), by avant - garde, Rumanian - born writer Eugene Ionesco, represents man beaten by his environment.

Production of all three plays is by Leo Orenstein. He describes *The Stronger* as "a curious play, a quiet little classic which is as valid today as when it was written just before the turn of the century. It is played by two women, only one of whom speaks. The problem, and Strindberg makes you wrestle

with it, is this: What is strength and what is weakness? In our society we're inclined to believe that people who exhibit strength are strong. But sometimes the weak, who have to struggle against insuperable odds, are really stronger."

Many of Strindberg's plays showed his penetrating interest in the psyche of woman. He hated and loved them sporadically. But in *The Stronger* his understanding rather than his dislike of them is uppermost as he investigates feline rivalry between two actresses, both in love with the same man. The wife does all the talking, but the other woman perhaps says more with her silence. By the end of their little scene together in a restaurant on Christmas Eve, Strindberg has revealed a savage insight into motive and situation. Irene Mayeska plays Mrs. X, and Anna Reiser appears as Miss Y.

In *The Long Goodbye*, Tennessee Williams, a great admirer of Strindberg, offers a romantic view of possessiveness in a little slice-of-life coloured by memory. On moving-day, a young man just about to leave the family apartment for the last time sifts through some bittersweet memories as his posses-

Does Confederation Still Work?

A series of programs this week on CBC Radio and the next four weeks on CBC-TV's Citizens' Forum examines the adequacy of Canada's constitution

HAS THE CANADIAN constitution withstood the test of time? Is Confederation in its present form an inadequate framework for Canada in this age of technological expansion? Are relations between French- and English-speaking Canada in need of a thorough re-appraisal?

From the press, the public, and political figures in Canada there have been numerous indications that these questions are both timely and pertinent. To provide some answers, the English- and Frenchlanguage services of the CBC organized a seminar last month at Ste. Agathe, Quebec. During the two days of meetings, four sessions were held, covering respectively Education, Economic Development, Fiscal Arrangements, and Civil Rights. The discussions were carried on bi-lingually, with simultaneous translations provided, and were videotaped and recorded for presentation on both the English and French television and radio networks.

Entitled Confederation—A Century Later: Does It Still Work?, the programs have been produced by Robert Seguin, regular producer of the French network program, Premier Plan. Jean Blais, assistant supervisor of adult education and public affairs programs, was in charge for the French networks. Margaret Howes, regional supervisor, public affairs (English), Montreal, and Christina McDougall, national program organizer of Citizens' Forum, were responsible for the English programs.

Presenting introductory papers on the four discussion topics will be: Dr. Francis Leddy, vice-president and dean of the faculty of arts, University of Saskatchewan, who will speak on Education; Frank Scott, dean of the faculty of law, McGill University, on Civil Rights; Pierre Elliott Trudeau, of the faculty of law, University of Montreal, on Fiscal Arrangements; and Jacques Parizeau, of l'Ecole des Hautes Etudes Commerciales. Montreal, on Economic Development. Other participants joining in the discussion periods will be: Hon. Robert Bonner, attorney general of British Columbia; D. W. Gallagher, economic advisor to the government of New Brunswick; Peter Waite, head of the department of history, Dalhousie University; Ronald Ritchie, executive assistant to the board of directors, Imperial Oil Company; Hon. Paul Gerin-Lajoie, minister of youth and

welfare, province of Quebec; Michel Brunet, department of history, University of Montreal; Marcel Faribault, president and general manager of Trust General du Canada; and Jean Marchand, president of the Confederation of National Trade Unions. Chairman of the seminar will be Gérard Pelletier, editor of La Presse.


These men were invited as individuals, points out Miss McDougall, not as representatives of an organization or party, but because they were in touch with many levels of Canadian society and had shown themselves to be concerned with some of the workings of the British North America Act as applied to the citizen in his day-to-day life. Last year, when the Citizens' Forum Committee of the

ONE OF THE most encouraging things in the outlook for mental illness is the fact that the public is learning that psychiatry is not some sort of esoteric black magic, that psycho-therapy isn't threatening or secretive. As the layman sees mental illness for what it really is, a sickness that could befall anyone, like a heart attack or T.B., many more frightened and unhappy men, women and children with serious emotional problems are seeking and getting medical help, and returning to normal lives—sometimes to an even happier and more rewarding existence than they knew before they became ill. Now they and their families understand each other better, because they have learned to communicate.

Four such cases will be studied on CBC-TV, starting Wednesday night, February 20, when Explorations presents its second series about mental illness, The Disordered Mind, produced by Robert Anderson Associates Limited. It covers four phases of mental disturbances: psychosomatic conditions, psychotic conditions, paranoid-schizophrenia, and delinquent conditions. Viewers will see actual cases at the beginning of psychiatric treatment and again several months later when the patients are well on the road to recovery.

The programs were filmed with the full co-operation and permission of the patients and their relatives and friends who appear "on camera." No actors have been used. Producer and host is Robert Anderson, who feels that most viewers will find the series disturbing but instructive, because there are elements in the four cases which are common to all of us, no matter what our stage of mental health may be. Consultant for the series is Dr. H. E. Lehmann,

clinical director, Verdun Protestant Hospital, and associate professor of psychiatry at McGill University.

Because the public is often called upon to make the first diagnosis in mental illness, it is important for everyone to recognize the symptoms of emotional lack of equilibrium, Dr. Lehmann points out, and to learn how it can be dealt with. "Everybody knows when he has a cold," he says. "He feels sick, washedout; he has a fever, headache, and so on. But most people do not know when they are mentally ill. And the public is called upon again, more than with any other illness, in patients' rehabilitation period, in understanding and tolerating them. But understanding is attained only if they know a little bit more about how the illness came about.

"We don't have good formal statistics, but I'm quite convinced that there is almost certainly a real increase in neurotic conditions—emotional disturbances, serious emotional disorders, anxiety and tension, and states of depression. The psychoses, the paranoid states, probably have not increased, but the behaviour disorders, such as delinquency and alcoholism, and the anxiety states, are increasing. However, the increase in numbers of patients being treated is partly due to the fact that there are so many more facilities for treating them today, and that we know a good deal more about how to treat them."

Dr. Lehmann points out that: "Intelligence is not the same as emotional security or strength of personality. Somebody can be highly intelligent and very well educated and still have psychological troubles. Real mental illness, or what the layman used to call insanity, is by no means incurable, and in fact in most cases nowadays of acute mental breakdowns, patients will be cured or certainly restored to normal within two to four months. And the avant-garde of the public, the leaders, the executives, etc., are, some of them, ready and willing to take a man back on staff after he has been in a mental hospital."

Dr. Lehmann believes that if parents know how to raise children they should be able to spot the first danger sign. "Parents should learn that if they are emotionally pre-occupied, tied up, and have troubles of their own, they are almost certainly damaging their children. And therefore they ought, like some-body who has an infectious disease, to be careful to keep away from others in order not to damage them. They should realize automatically, when they are emotionally disturbed for any length of time, that this is going to have an effect on their children, and they should ask for help—if not for themselves, at least for the children."

The first program, on February 20, concerns a widespread psychosomatic condition: obesity. The patient is a 13-year-old girl who is fat—though by no means grossly so—and is unhappy about her compulsive eating habit. She and her whole family receive psychotherapy. The psychiatrist involved is Dr. Vivian Rakoff. Viewers will see the girl and her family at the time their weekly treatment began, and

CBC Radio's PROJECT '63:

Focus on Formosa

The world is not permitted to forget the island off the China coast which remains a trump card in the hands of the free world



ABOUT 100 MILES off the South China coast lies an island with two names. The Chinese, who first took control of the island in 1683, call it *Taiwan* (Terraced Bay); the rest of the world knows it by its Portuguese name—*Ilha Formosa* (Beautiful Isle)—and the world has good cause to know the name well, for few areas have been so consistently in the public eye during the past 15 years.

This week, CBC Radio's *Project* '63 (Sunday, February 17, 5:00 p.m.), will present an hour-long study of Formosa. Prepared by freelance writer-broadcaster Kerry Ellard and produced by Jack Vance of the *Project* '63 staff, the program will present interviews with Formosans and Chinese living on the island, including Chen Cheng, vice-president of the Chinese Nationalist Government and legally ordained successor to President Chiang Kai-Shek, and James Shen, senior Nationalist information officer.

The program is the result of a six-week visit made to the island by Ellard, who has lived in the Orient for the past two years and who prepared the two programs on Japan heard on *Project* '63 last fall.

Formosa, or Taiwan, is a leaf-shaped island about 60 miles across by 175 miles long. Two-thirds of the country is covered by tropical forest—banyans, Japanese cedars, teak, black ebony, and most of the world's camphor trees. The island's backbone is formed by two mountain ranges, running north to south, which thrust up some 50 peaks of 10,000 feet or more. On the east coast, the mountains become sheer rock walls, dropping 1,500 to 7,000 feet into the sea. On the west, facing the mainland, they fall away, in the terraces that give the island its Chinese name, down to a wide coastal plain.

The climate and fertile soil combine to produce large amounts of rice, tea, sugar, and fruit, and in their paddy fields many Formosans grow two crops of rice each year and follow these up with a third crop of turnips or cabbages.

But the "Beautiful Isle" has some shortcomings. In early fall it is often whipped by typhoons, and it averages 330 earthquakes a year. In addition, the island has no less than 12 varieties of poisonous snakes, including the deadly "hundred pace snake," named for the belief that its victim walks 100 paces, then falls dead.

The 1950 census gave Formosa's population as 7,554,399, but with the influx of Chinese from the mainland this figure has increased to about 10 million.

Formosa's recorded history began in the 15th century, when Chinese started to settle along the island's western coastal plains. The next century saw the arrival of Europeans — Portuguese, Dutch, and Spaniards — using the newly-discovered sea-routes to the Pacific via the Cape of Good Hope and the Horn. Through the 1600s, there was almost constant fighting among the three European groups, the Chinese, and the head-hunting Formosan aborigines, who were forced to retreat to the west into the mountain areas where they have lived in impregnable isolation ever since.

Between 1622 and 1660 the Dutch were the dominant invaders, establishing strong forts and laying claim, effectively supported by force, to a long strip of western coastline. But in 1661 the Dutch were overrun by South Chinese, Ming loyalists who were fleeing before the Manchu invaders of China. The Ming forces, supported by an ex-pirate named Koxinga, who boasted a personal army of 25,000 and a large fleet, set up an independent regime that lasted for 22 years until the island was captured by the Manchus in 1683.

Formosa remained part of the Manchu empire for 212 years, but during that period the Formosans became different from mainland Chinese, in much the same way that Americans developed a different type from their British stock. They spoke a Fukienese dialect, and few could converse (Please turn to page 27)

Quest Presents

Satire on Morals

AN EPISODE from Letting Go. a long first novel by a controversial young American writer, Philip Roth, has been dramatized by M. Charles Cohen for presentation on CBC-TV's Quest on Sunday night, February 17, under the title of Paul Loves Libby.

Letting Go is a richly witty satire on contemporary morals, as reflected in academic life and in a middle-class Jewish community. Its author has been compared to J. D. Salinger, but, while feeling flattered, Roth thinks the comparison is ridiculous. "If you italicize a word you are accused of mimicking Salinger," he says.

Paul Loves Libby is about a Jewish boy who wants to marry a Roman Catholic girl he met in university. When his parents hear the news they dissolve in tears, not only because of his decision to marry outside his faith, but also because of their own impotence in trying to dissuade him. "They had somehow reared a boy whom they could not bludgeon or make hysterical," Roth says.

Paul is doomed to failure if he marries this girl, they keep harping, and failure, in their family, is a shameful inheritance. Roth explains: "Paul Hertz had uncles who had failed, too, but that was in the world of commerce. Mr. Hertz bought and sold with little talent and saved where interest amounted to pennies. When he finally emerged from his fourth failure - this last in frozen foodshe had nothing to show for himself save a sinus condition and a holy dread of heart failure. He took to melting camphor under his nose on a spoon and arranged for a small bank loan so as to purchase, for his heart's ease, an easy chair, and then he settled down to wait for the end."

Paul won't listen to his parents' warnings, but when his uncles, the





failures, offer him advice about marrying, he begins to feel uneasy. Sensible as some of their suggestions are, Paul realizes that the final decision is his, and he makes it in a funny, sad, but true-to-life way that reflects the feeling of the whole novel: despair.

Roth feels that modern American life is radically wrong. "It stupefies, it sickens, it infuriates, and finally it is a kind of embarrassment to one's own meagre imagination." He criticizes other authors who insist on being hopeful. He says: "If the world is as crooked and unreal as I think it is becoming; if one feels less and less power in the face of this unreality; if the inevitable end is destruction . . . then why is the writer pleased?"

A curious thing about Letting Go is that almost every critic has described the book as unsatisfactory, but admits that he enjoyed Roth's writing. The Saturday Review found it "the kind of bad book that only a good writer could have written." Time called it "a failure of a quality few writers could achieve."

than four storeys in height; now, sky-scrapers are an increasingly common sight. The dream-like atmosphere has been pushed aside to some extent by a business boom that dates from 1956 and shows no signs of abating. At one time the Casino brought in nearly all the public revenues. Today it provides but a small fraction.

One big reason for the economic boom has been Monaco's tax-free status, which has attracted investors from abroad. The other big reason undoubtedly has been Princess Grace.

Her presence is credited with doubling Monaco's tourist trade. Each year approximately 100,000 visitors stay in Monaco's hotels. Each day one or two thousand of them visit the palace in the hope that they will see the Princess.

She is the dazzling jewel in Monaco's crown. She has given the Monegasques an heir to the throne and thus ensured their state's perpetuity. She honours gala occasions with her beauty and poise. In the best tradition of all royal families she has bestowed her patronage generously on worthwhile community organizations.

Viewers will have the opportunity of seeing the new Monaco and its glamorous princess for themselves on Sunday evening.

Canadian Association for Adult Education was collecting suggestions for the coming season's programs, two topics that came up again and again were changes in the BNA Act, and relations between French- and English-speaking Canadians. The aim of the programs is simple: to initiate discussion for the benefit of the Canadian public on whether the BNA Act responds to the needs of modern Canada.

The following questions give an indication of the starting points:

Education: Is the present system of provincial control adequate to supply the educational services required?

Economic Development: Should the "have" provinces assume a greater responsibility for developing the resources and raising the living standards of the "have-not" provinces?

Fiscal Arrangements: Does the existing system of sharing out the national wealth between the central government and the provincial governments ensure justice and efficiency in federal-provincial arrangements?

Civil Rights: Are fundamental freedoms and human rights inadequately protected by the BNA Act? Should they be entrenched in a constitution which overrides provincial authority?

On television, the discussion sessions will be presented weekly, in the regular Citizens' Forum time period (Sunday afternoons) February 17 and 24, March 3 and 10. On radio, the four sessions will be broadcast on consecutive evenings, February 19 to 22 inclusive. at 10:30 p.m., under the title Confederation.

CBC STAGE:

On Situation In South Africa

THE NOOSE-KNOT BALLAD, a radio verse-drama by H. W. D. Manson, Professor of English at the University of Natal, will be presented on CBC Stage Sunday, February 17, at 8 p.m. on radio.

Script editor Lenore Clare describes the play as a brilliant piece of writing, telling of a violent cycle set in motion by repression in a South African community. She says it was first submitted to the CBC in 1960 as a TV drama. At that time the CBC could not find a place for it, so Mrs. Clare suggested that Manson rewrite it as a radio drama, which he did with

such finesse that she has asked him to submit more plays for possible CBC production.

Manson says: "The Noose-Knot Ballad isn't a political play, but it deals indirectly with the sorts of repressions that a violently bigoted Calvinism imposes on the minds of people. And also it is, I believe, a civilized play insofar as it deals with this sort of problem in a sympathetic manner. I would like Canadians to feel that some sort of civilized standards still exist in this unfortunate country.

"A friend of mine, Professor van Hoyningen, just back from a lengthy holiday in Canada, tells me that the standard of broadcasting in Canada is unusually high and that serious plays are quite often presented. She has also told me about some very fine productions in Stratford, Ont.—far better, she said, than productions she'd seen in Stratford, England. It's very encouraging to hear such things. In this country the general standard

has fallen shamefully. It's just about impossible to listen to Radio South Africa without getting into a hopeless rage. I haven't even tried, as a result, to place any of my work with our local broadcasting company."

Manson goes on to say: "I have written nine full-length verse-plays. Two of them have been published and another four have been accepted for publication in this country at six-month intervals. None of them, except *The Noose-Knot Ballad*, is in radio form.

"I'm on eight-months' writing leave from my teaching at the university and am engaged in a new play. The university has been good enough to grant me this leave with four months' pay—the first time it has ever been done at a South African university as far as I know. It is quite a 'victory' for one engaged in 'mere writing.' Work in other spheres, especially research, has always been met with sympathetic attention."

FOCUS ON FORMOSA

with mainland Chinese without the aid of an interpreter. In 1895, Formosa passed into Japanese hands, following Japan's victory in the Sino-Japanese war. For the next 50 years, during which the island was a Japanese colony, its natural resources were developed, contributing greatly to Japan's economy, and the living standards of the Formosans became among the highest in Southeast Asia. Immigrants from Japan were comparatively few, numbering no more than 250,000, and the urban popuremained predominantly lation Chinese. During the Second World War, Japan used Formosa as its principal air and naval base for the South China seas.

At the Cairo Conference of December, 1943, it was decided that Formosa should revert to Chinese sovereignty after Japan's defeat. And after that defeat occurred, the island came under the administrative control of Chiang Kai-Shek's Nationalist Government. After the communist conquest of the mainland, only Formosa and a number of other islands remained to the Nationalists, and the Chiang Kai-Shek government and loyal members of the armed forces moved to these islands, setting up a complete government-in-exile.

The native Formosans, never closely associated with mainland China and drawn still further away from Chinese customs and traditions during 50 years of Japanese rule, at first resented the coming of the Nationalists, but in latter years they have apparently become more content, as the economy of the island has grown rapidly under Nationalist rule, with strong support from the United States.

The civil war which began on the mainland has been continued during the past 15 years, and incidents between rival Chinese forces have been frequent. But these hostilities have been confined, in recent years, to minor engagements —clashes between small gunboats, and guerrilla activity by Nationalist groups on the mainland. The

military situation is a complete stand-off, for, while the Nationalists are said to possess a well-trained and well-equipped army, they cannot move against the mainland without logistical support in the form of ships, supplies, and ship-and-air cover. And that support, the United States has made clear, is not forthcoming in the immediate or foreseeable future.

While the internal economy and industrial progress on the island seem to be satisfactory to the Nationalists, the Government faces at least one major problem that grows in importance with the vears: the choice of a successor to 75-year-old President Chiang. The obvious successor is Chen Cheng. 65, who is second-in-command not only in the Government but in the ruling Kuomintang (Nationalist Party) where he has been deputy director-general since the 1957 Party Congress. But Chen Cheng has been reported to be in ill health, and speculation has it that the next in line for the presidency may be Chiang's eldest son, Chiang Ching-kuo, now 52, army general, deputy secretary-general of the National Defense Council, director of the Chinese Youth Corps, and chairman of a commission in charge of retired servicemen.

sions are carted off for storage. James Beggs plays the young man, Joe; Len Birman appears as his friend, Silva; and Beth Morris as Joe's sister, Myra.

As he demonstrates movingly in this play, Williams has great compassion for "the people who are not meant to win"—the lost, strange, fragile people who long to break out of their lonely cells, to identify themselves by reaching another person. "Hell is yourself," Williams insists.

The New Tenant, by a master of the theatre of the absurd, Eugene Ionesco, points out the uselessness of sentimentality, particularly over possessions. Ionesco does this with cold calculation that is also wryly witty, when he tells of a new tenant who moves into an unfurnished room with the accumulated possessions of a lifetime. Ionesco carries this situation to an absurd conclusion but he does it with grace and precision that assume ballet proportions before the ridiculous ending.

Critics have labelled Ionesco everything from "insanely funny writer" to "the poet of double-talk." He claims that his plays really aren't intellectual. "They're primitive, and people have lost the habit of thinking primitively, in terms of images," he explains. "They confuse reality with flat verbal realism." He likes quoting the opinion of his 18-year-old daughter who once remarked: "Just between the two of us, papa, I won't repeat it, naturally, but won't you admit that your plays are rather silly and a little childish?"

As Leo Orenstein points out, *The Long Goodbye* and *The New Tenant* are about sacred cows. Williams sees poetry in them, evaluates them emotionally. Ionesco takes a clinical view and does his assessing intellectually. Williams agitates the heart; Ionesco the mind.

Book Clubs: Good or Bad?

SINCE THE Book-of-the-Month Club was founded in 1926, it has distributed 180 million volumesmore than are in all the libraries in the United States, including the Congressional Library-according to Harry Scherman, chairman of the club. Since its success first became apparent, many other book clubs have been organized, and now the book - club business is a huge, highly profitable one. CBC Wednesday Night will examine it from many points of view in a radio program on February 20 at 8:05 p.m. It has been prepared by William French, literary editor of the Globe and Mail, Toronto. Production is by Weldon Hanbury.

Interviews were recorded in New York and Toronto with a book critic, a novelist, executives of the Book-of-the-Month Club (including chairman Harry Scherman), executives of specialty book clubs, book-club members, and Peter Bruithuis, associate professor of English literature at Victoria College, University of Toronto, who is a critic for the *New York Times* Sunday book section, an author, and a former book club member.

The program finds out how book clubs operate, what their effects are on the literary scene in North America, and how their promoters and the general public feel about them. Nearly everyone interviewed had more to say in favour of book

clubs than against them, reports Weldon Hanbury.

Professor Bruithuis was an exception. "Book clubs cater to lower middle-class taste," he says. "After all, they are in the business to sell books, and in this respect are like any distributor of a mass product. be it washing machines or vacuum cleaners. They choose books which they know will appeal to the largest number of people in their readership. This has the effect of debasing taste. It caters to a kind of homogeneity of mind which in the end reduces the value of the literary product. There is nothing, I think, in most of the books that are put out, to really challenge the mind, to demand hard thought, to disconcert people, to upset their ideas. On the whole they (bookclub books) serve to confirm their readers' built-in complacencies and their respectable attitudes." Professor Bruithuis adds: "With book clubs the commercial values come first, the literary, the critical values come second."

Charles Poore, book critic for the New York Times, disagrees. "I would say book clubs have broadened reading tremendously," he says. How do novelists feel about them? Gerald Green, author of The Last Angry Man, expressed the general consensus of opinion when he said: "I'm in favour of them. I think all authors are."

again four months later, when there has been a noticeable change in their attitudes.

The second program, on February 27, concerns the obsessive-compulsive, in this case a middle-aged man who had struggled all his life with a crippling neurosis which, despite his great intelligence and excellent education, had prevented him from taking his proper place in society. For five years he had not been able to hold a job. He will be seen at the start of his treatment, when, to him, his case seemed hopeless, and again after eight months' intensive psycho-therapy with Rita Beauclair, R.N., of St. Mary's Hospital, Montreal, who is assistant to Dr. Karl Stern, chief of psychiatry at St. Mary's, associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Montreal, and professor of psychiatry at the University of Ottawa. Dr. Stern will discuss the case on the program.

"The trouble is," says the patient, "that you can't reach down inside you and pull out your defective emotions and cast them away for better or for worse."

A man suffering from paranoid schizophrenia will be studied in the March 6 program. At the height of his illness he believes that an "organization" involving the whole world is out to destroy him, and he becomes extremely withdrawn and suspicious. He is now recovered and has returned to a responsible job with a large company. His case is discussed on the program by Dr. Henry Durost, senior psychiatrist at Verdun Protestant Hospital.

There will be no program in the series on March 13, when *The Telephone Hour* will be presented. The fourth program, about a compulsive car thief, will be seen March 20. It concerns a 21-year-old who has been stealing cars—and getting caught—since he was 10. Now he's serving a term in Kingston Penitentiary, where his psychiatrist is Dr. George Scott. The program was produced with the co-operation of the Penitentiary Service of Canada. Officials seen on the program include Juvenile Court Judge W. W. Creighton and Magistrate R. A. Connor, former Police Chief, of Port Arthur, Ontario.

"I never stole money or things like that because I was always well provided for," says the young patient. "But any type of vehicle: bicycles, motorcycles, cars—it made me feel good to be behind the wheel." His behaviour baffles his parents, his friends, city officials in his home town, and the magistrate. But Magistrate Connor strikes a hopeful note when he says "I have a great deal of faith in psychiatrists and psychologists in assisting those of us in the correction field to find the solution to the problems posed by this type of individual."

VALENTINE DESSERT

4 egg whites Few grains of salt 1 cup confectioners' sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

Beat egg whites and salt until they hold a stiff peak. Beat in ½ cup sugar, I thsp. at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is dissolved. Meringue should be thick and glossy after adding all the sugar and vanilla. Sprinkle ½ cup sugar over meringue and fold in. Grease and flour a cookie sheet, shape meringue into a heart, having sides of heart raised. Sprinkle with a little more sugar. Bake 250° about 40 minutes. Turn off oven and let dry in oven 4 or 5 hrs.

Filling

CUSTARD

4 egg yolks 1 tbsp. sugar

Few grains salt

2 cups milk (1 cup skim, 1 cup evaporated)

1 pkg. strawberry jelly powder ½ tsp. peppermint flavour

Beat yolks slightly, add sugar, salt and scalded milk. Cook over double boiler until custard coats a spoon. Add jelly powder. Stir until dissolved. Cool.

Fold in 34 cup whipped cream. Add flavouring. Pour into baked meringue shell. Let set overnight.

SAUCE

3 15-oz. pkgs. frozen raspberries thawed and sieved

1½ tbsp. corn starch

Reserving ¼ cup cold juice, put rest on stove to heat, blend cornstarch with reserved juice and stir into hot juice, cook until thick and transparent. Spoon over custard. Garnish with whipped cream.

He Plays Music to Chuckle By

WHO ARE Samuel Hersenhoren's favourite comedians? — Wayne and Shuster, quite naturally.

The wavy-haired veteran musician with a neatly-trimmed goatee has conducted the orchestra for Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster since they started in CBC Radio almost 20 years ago, and he made the transition to CBC Television with them in 1954.

"The long association I've had with Johnny and Frank," says Hersenhoren, "has been most harmonious and enjoyable. Their sense of humour—on and off the air—is a constant source of delight for me. And they're gentlemen! They are very talented themselves and they respect ability in others."

The Toronto-born musician-conductor, 54, has worked in radio since the mid-1920s and on CBC Television since its inception.

Although neither his parents nor his two brothers were actively interested in music, Sam started studying violin at the age of five. When he was 13, he was invited to accompany famed Toronto musical instructor Jan Hambourg to Europe as his protege and spent the next three years on the continent under Hambourg's tutorship.

"I was most fortunate," says Hersenhoren, "in that even my practice sessions were under constant supervision. I couldn't develop bad habits; if I did something wrong while practising in my room I immediately heard from downstairs."

Hersenhoren returned to Toronto in 1925 and immediately began substituting for violinists in groups providing musical accompaniment for silent films in Toronto neighbourhood cinemas.

Hersenhoren soon began getting work in radio orchestras. He played and conducted on many Toronto stations identified by call letters long since forgotten. Often the studios were rented apartments hung with drapes to improve the acoustics.

He also played or conducted for concerts, vaudeville, opera and

ballet. Never forgetting his classical training, Hersenhoren formed the New World Chamber Orchestra in 1932 and toured Ontario schools, giving hundreds of concerts after-hours for music-hungry students. He first conducted for CBC Radio in 1933, when the CBC was known as the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission. Among the top musicians in the orchestra at this time was his good friend Percy Faith, now a well-known figure in music in the United States.

A member of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra for 17 years, Hersenhoren has played with the CBC Symphony the past three years. He won the LaFleche Trophy for outstanding contribution in broadcast music for a conductor three consecutive seasons, in 1945, '46 and '47.

Hersenhoren lives with his wife Jeanie and their 10-year-old daughter Suzi in an old, three-storey house in downtown Toronto. Jeanie's family were in the furniture business for 150 years and the Hersenhoren home is tastefully furnished in Victorian style including an antique settee built by her great grandfather.

Although music is a hobby and profession with Sam, both he and Jeanie like to garden. During the summer they raise mixed vegetables at a cottage on the Bay of Quinte, near Napanee, Ont.
