

TWENTIETH CENTURY:

Franco's Spain

GENERALISSIMO Francisco Franco, Spain's 71-year-old chief of state, assesses his regime and discusses his country's political and social systems in an interview with reporter Walter Cronkite, to be seen during a two-part program on Spain on *The Twentieth Century*, Sundays, March 3 and 10, on CBC-TV.

Filmed in Spain, the program will include interviews with government and opposition spokesmen, who discuss censorship, the strength of the Roman Catholic Church, freedom of expression and association, the changing economic situation, and the miners' strikes which took place in Asturias last year. The program will include scenes of conditions in Spain today, and will examine the country's military agreements with the United States and the pressures that are forcing Spain out of her isolation—American military bases, the influx of tourists, the demands of the new middle class, peasants moving to the cities after leaving their lands, and the armies of Spanish workers who in recent years have tasted other ways of life by being employed in France, Germany, Switzerland and England.



IGOR STRAVINSKY will arrive in Toronto March 27, to conduct the CBC Symphony Orchestra and the Festival Singers of Toronto in a recording session and in an hour-long *CBC Wednesday Night* radio program.

The announcement was made this week by Dr. Geoffrey Waddington, CBC's director of music.

This will be the 80-year-old composer's fourth visit to Toronto in 15 months. During recording sessions he will conduct seven of his compositions, making a total of 16 works he has recorded to date with the CBC Symphony Orchestra.

The *Wednesday Night* program, to be broadcast on the CBC Radio network, April 3, at 9:00 p.m., will consist of the *Symphony of Psalms*, *Norwegian Moods*, and a transcription of Bach's *Vom Himmel Hoch*.

Accompanying Stravinsky to Toronto will be his associate, conductor Robert Craft. While here, Mr. Craft will conduct, for commercial recording, the *Pelleas and Melisande Suite*, by Arnold Schoenberg.

CHILDREN'S ART from the Manitoba Schools Broadcasts series *It's Fun to Draw* will be on display during March at the Coronation Branch, St. Boniface Public Li-

brary, 120 Eugenie St. During February the art work has been displayed at the Fort Garry Public Library.

BRITAIN'S LEO GENN and Australia's Zoe Caldwell play starring roles in *The Doctor's Dilemma*, by Bernard Shaw, now in rehearsal for telecast on CBC-TV's *Festival* series, March 18.

Genn portrays Sir Colenso Ridgeon, and Miss Caldwell plays Jennifer Dudgeon in the 90-minute production by David Gardner. The Australian actress, who appeared in Shaw's *The Apple Cart* on *Festival* last season, is on her way to the new Tyrone Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis, to open in May.

Genn comes to Canada via the United States, where he recently did a guest appearance on the series, *The Defenders*, also seen on CBC-TV.

LORNE GREENE, star of CBC-TV's *Bonanza* series, is building a replica of the Ponderosa ranch house near Phoenix, Arizona.

DUKE NIELSEN, bass player on CBC-TV's *Don Messer's Jubilee* who has been absent from the show since last October, will return on Monday, March 11.

Nielsen, who has been with Don Messer for more than 25 years, was seriously injured in a head-on collision last Thanksgiving Day. His recovery is now almost complete.

DANNY THOMAS, seen Mondays on his own series on CBC-TV, got his first broadcasting job in Detroit as an impersonator of Al Jolson.

Here's Where They Catch the BIG ONES

A visit to the fishermen's paradise on the Pacific Coast is a highlight of Saturday's World of Sport on CBC-TV.

TO A GEOGRAPHY student, the Strait of Georgia is merely a body of water lying between the

mainland of British Columbia and Vancouver Island. But to thousands of avid fishermen, the strait (or "Gulf" as it is known locally) is a paradise, an easily accessible "lake" filled with some of the best game fish in the world: members of the family *Salmonidae Oncorhynchus*, better known as Pacific Salmon.

This week, CBC-TV's *World of Sport* visits Canada's west coast to bring viewers a comprehensive picture of salmon fishing as a sport. The film, entitled *Salmon Carnival*, covers many different aspects of the subject, ranging from the instinctive, predictable habits of the fish to the completely unpredictable behaviour of those who go out to catch them. Filmed by Robert Reid, edited by Ron Brown, and produced by Andy Snider, all of CBC Vancouver, the program will be shown on Saturday, March 2. One of Canada's foremost authorities on salmon fishing, Roderick

Haig-Brown, has written the script and will serve as host and narrator.

The program doesn't show a real carnival, in the sense of an organized event, but the title does describe the fun, adventure and excitement that appeals to sportsmen who travel to British Columbia to fish for the big ones. By "big ones" they mean the 60- and 70-pound spring salmon that are sometimes caught. Sometimes, but not often. More commonly, the fishermen go home with the memory of a thrilling, half-hour tussle with a 10-pound Coho salmon, a fish that is an extraordinary jumper and, some say, the liveliest fish an angler is ever likely to tangle with. "Tangle" is sometimes just the word to describe the experience, for many a neophyte has fouled-up his line, broken his fishing rod, and lost all his expensive tackle by trying to land a salmon too quickly, without letting the fish have a good run to tire itself out. To land one of these beauties requires both skill and patience, but the thrill is worth all the training and trouble.

The big time of the year for salmon fishing is the summer, when the fish, returning from their years of ocean feeding, pass through the Gulf of Georgia en route to the many spawning streams in the

A look
at the common
man in Africa is
presented Wednesday
night on CBC-TV'S DOCUMENT

JOSHUA

— A NIGERIAN PORTRAIT

IN THE LAST decade, Africa has become less and less the "dark continent," more and more the focus of the world's attention, as various African nations have emerged, with a new awareness of their identities, to take their places in the world. Economic, political, and social patterns in much of Africa have undergone vast and rapid changes in recent years, sometimes in an atmosphere of calm, well-planned orderliness, at other times amid tension, tragedy and bloodshed.

Whatever the future may hold, it is obvious that the rest of the world must accept Africa as a mighty force to reckon with, and must attempt to understand the character of the millions who populate the second largest continent.

On Wednesday, March 6, CBC-TV will present an hour-long documentary film that attempts to illuminate some aspects of the African personality in the emerging nations, using a resident of Nigeria as an example. The program, entitled *Joshua, A Nigerian Portrait*, is another program in the *Document* series, scheduled irregularly on CBC-TV throughout the season.

Filming has been directed by Allan King, who has contributed to CBC-TV's *Quest, Close-Up, The Critical Years* and other series. His filming trips have taken him to Sweden, Yugoslavia, India, Vietnam and many other locations. He has always shown a deep interest in the everyday lives of the inhabitants of foreign countries, believing that in the habits and customs of the individual many facets of national character can be perceived. Among his earlier films have been reports on Vancouver's skid row, the Swedish welfare state, European refugees, family life in Yugoslavia, and a study of the life of a rickshaw puller in Calcutta. The latter film won first prize in the documentary film category of the Vancouver International Film Festival in 1961.

In his notes regarding the treatment of the subject, prepared before he began the filming of *Joshua*, director King pointed out: "Almost all the attention paid Africa . . . has been concentrated on political upheaval, and therefore the attention has been primarily an attempt to explain and understand political affairs." He goes on to suggest that more attention might be paid to discussion of the "African personality," and states that this aspect of the subject has not been apprehended fully by European commentators. "This is understandable," he continues, "since this pursuit of identity is of much greater consequence to the Africans. At the same time, if we are going to shape policies consonant with the realities of African drives and ambitions, it is a question we can no longer afford to ignore.

"Fundamentally, we cannot hope to deal with any group of people in a satisfactory way unless we know and respect them. I submit that knowledge and respect are characteristics lacking in our appraisals of Africa and Africans. And they know it.

"It is a commonplace to note that in Africa there is a conflict between primitive traditions and the demands of modern civilization. What is involved is the task of a continent conceiving itself anew, of

— Back for another performance-lecture on FESTIVAL this Monday, March 4th

"I KNOW THAT no one believes me," said Glenn Gould at the start of the concert season last fall, "but this will definitely be my final tour." As he predicted, the cynics among the concert-going public nodded their heads sadly, unconvinced by his statement and recalling the numerous and seemingly unending "final tours," "farewell tours," "final farewell tours" and "positively final farewell tours" indulged in by famous musical artists in the past.

But chances are that Gould will live up to his word. In any case, he hasn't closed the door completely on the future, but has left himself an opening through which to squeeze when the spirit moves him. "I'll do some special concerts from time to time," he has said, "but I have no intention of travelling as consistently as I've done in the past."

One reason for the brilliant young (30) pianist's decision to leave the concert stage, where he continues to receive acclaim as a



first-rank international artist and celebrity, is his restless ambition to explore other fields of musical activity beyond the piano keyboard. He's interested in writing, teaching, lecturing, doing research, composing, and is even keen on the slogging, thankless task of being a concert impresario.

Gould doesn't pay mere lip service to his ambitions. He has already completed a number of compositions — his first *Spring Quartet*, given its première performance on CBC Radio some years ago, has been recorded by a major American company. He has written many articles, essays and liner notes for some of his recordings, has given lectures at universities and on television (in CBC-TV's *Festival* series), and has served as a co-director of the annual music festivals at Stratford, Ontario, where he gained much experience in the hard-working mechanics of producing musical events.

On CBC-TV's *Festival*, Monday, March 4, Gould will be given the opportunity to engage in a number of different activities. He suggested

the subject of the program, the fugue, to the CBC, did the research and wrote the script, composed one of the works to be heard, conducted some of the performers in rehearsals, and will serve as host and commentator on the telecast. He also appears as piano soloist, playing excerpts from various works to illustrate his remarks.

Others taking part in the program are the members of the Canadian String Quartet—Albert Pratz, Bernard Robbins, David Mankovitz, and Laszlo Varga — and five singers, sopranos Elizabeth Benson-Guy and Lillian Smith Weichel, contralto Patricia Rideout, tenor Gordon Wry, and bass Edgar Murdoch.

The program concerns itself with a study of the musical form known as the fugue, a type of composition in which many different melodic lines are combined in accordance with a strict set of rules. The science and study of horizontal part-writing, as distinct from vertical chordal structures, is called counterpoint (note against note), and the fugue is a highly sophisticated and complicated version of the comparatively simple musical form called the canon, the best known example of which is *Three Blind Mice*. As used by such masters as Bach and Beethoven, of course, the form bears little resemblance to the children's play-song, but in essence its structure is much the same.

The theory and practice of counterpoint had its beginnings about the 13th century, when composers

FOLKSINGERS TURN TO DRAMA

It's been a fast climb to the top since folksingers Ian Tyson and Sylvia Fricker met two years ago. Now they try their hand at drama, Thursday on CBC-TV's PLAYDATE.

TWO YEARS AGO Ian Tyson and Sylvia Fricker were introduced on the telephone by a friend, found that they both liked singing folk songs, tried out a song together then and there, and soon teamed up to become one of the continent's most promising and attractive young duos.

They began their professional team-work in a small way in Toronto coffee houses, and were launched on the big-time folk circuit after appearing at the Mariposa Folk Festival in Orillia, Ontario, in 1961.

Since then they've toured well-known folk music clubs on both sides of the border, have a record selling well, and this Thursday, March 7, they make their acting debut when they star together on CBC-TV's *Playdate* in a show written especially for them—a comedy-fantasy with music titled *The Cowboy and Mr. Anthony*, by Hugh Kemp. It will feature a special guest appearance by an internationally-known stage, screen, radio and TV actor, Australian-born Murray Matheson.

Hugh Kemp had been pestered for years by an idea for a western play with music, but he had put off writing it because there seemed to be no available performers suitable for the leading roles. But after seeing Ian and Sylvia perform at the Mariposa Festival he was so impressed that he sat down at his typewriter when he got home to Toronto to start banging out the script.

It's the story of a Canadian cowboy-rodeo-rider married to a singer, and an urbane but slippery character, Mr. Anthony (played by Matheson), who comes into their lives and turns them topsy-turvy. Strange things begin to happen when, just as the cowboy is about to die after a fall from an untamed bronco, Mr. Anthony makes a bargain with the singer which can save her husband's life. As the amusing story moves along it offers lots of opportunity for Ian and Sylvia to demonstrate the folksinging technique which has made them so popular.

Bronco-busting is what Ian likes best next to folk singing. He was born in Vancouver, and learned some of his first folk songs while working as a horse wrangler and rodeo rider. He was also an art student (won a typographical prize for his design of the brochure for the Mariposa Festival in 1961), a lumberjack and a migratory worker before drifting east to Toronto because he realized that he liked singing folk songs better than anything else and wanted to take advantage of the opportunities for

folk-singing which the new coffee houses offered in Toronto.

Sylvia, who comes from Chatham, Ontario, where her mother is a music teacher, was working in an antique jewelry shop when Ian met her. After their Mariposa success they branched out into TV and radio, and have toured almost continuously in Canada and the United States, being featured in folksinging houses in Chicago, Minneapolis, San Francisco, Los Angeles, New York and Miami with great success. Their original bookings often have to be extended again and again.

"We want to be hired as fine entertainers, not just because folk music happens to be fashionable and popular," Ian says. "Folk music can be a highly introspective art, in which the singer is turned inward on himself, rather than outward to his audience—he's concentrating entirely on the purity of his art."

A Cruise Among the Islands

THERE'S A SPECIAL romance about islands, even an off-shore hunk of rock and scrub in a northern lake. This week CBC Television will explore some of Canada's most interesting islands off the east and west seacoasts. On Sunday afternoon, March 3, 20/20 invites viewers aboard the square-sail schooner *Sea Wyf* to join young Captain Bill Randolph of Vancouver and his two-girl crew on a leisurely cruise through the rugged little Gulf Islands between Vancouver Island and the mainland, which are noted for their climate, beauty, and the away-from-it-all living enjoyed by their inhabitants.





tractive camping sites, and fishing opportunities.

The *20/20* film, sub-titled *Tranquil Islands*, shows the crew stopping off at Oyster Cove to discover the succulence of freshly caught and prepared oysters, and, at Clam Bay, to sample the tender little sea delicacies which are so hard to dig up but so well worth the effort.

After a passage through a man-made channel in Thetis Island, the crew chats with outdoorsmen who gather at rural Telegraph Harbour for supplies. Later *Sea Wyf* drops anchor at Tent Island, a government park area for seagoing tourists, and then visits Bidwell Harbour, an international haven for small boats plying between the Gulf Islands and the American San Juan group.

QUEST:

The Wounded Soldier


THE LATEST DRAMATIC work by a CBC graphics artist, Jack Kuper, who turned playwright successfully a few seasons ago, will be presented on CBC-TV's *Quest* on Sunday night, March 3. It is *The Wounded Soldier*, adapted from a short story by American writer George Garrett. The production by Mario Prizek features Robin Gammell as the Veteran; Larry Beattie as the Officer; Bernard Behrens as the Doctor; Sharon Acker as the Girl; Pat Moffatt as the Nurse; and Larry Mann as the circus owner. Kuper has prepared the graphic effects for the show.

The Wounded Soldier is a three-page story in a collection called *New World Writing* which Prizek drew to Kuper's attention last year. The Garrett story, an anti-war fable, a parable about man's inhumanity to man, so impressed Kuper that he decided to attempt the formidable task of turning a short, concise tale into a half-hour drama. The result is basically the original story brought to life, but a good deal of sensitive Kuper dialogue and atmosphere have been added with interesting effect.

The story is about a war veteran with hideous facial scars resulting from a wound in action. After surgeons have failed to correct his disfigurement he determines to go out and face the world rather than accept a pension and spend the rest of his days hidden away from life. The plot concerns the adjustments he has to make to accomplish this, and his gradual winning back to the militaristic view.

It is a brutal story, and, as Mario Prizek points out, completely non-realistic in style, done with broad strokes. It is almost naive in its unfolding, with something of the quality of a nightmare. The dramatization confirms Garrett's original mood with a light hand, in the tradition Kuper has established in his work for radio and television.

In the last year or two, CBC-TV has presented several Kuper dramas, including *The Sun in My Eyes*, *The Police*, and *Lost in the Crowd*, and he has had several plays produced on CBC Radio. He has started to work on an adaptation of *The Magician of Lublin* by Isaac Vashevish Singer for the *Festival* series, and he's writing a novel. Coming up later this season on *Quest* is *Run!*, a film he made a couple of summers ago for the series. It has been shown at four international film festivals.




ERNIE RICHARDSON of Regina could be rated Canada's all-time greatest curler by the end of the national championships in Brandon.

Richardson is shooting for his fourth Canadian title and Scotch Cup, representative of the world championship. He is tied with Ken Watson of Winnipeg and Matt Baldwin of Edmonton as the only three-time winners of the Brier tankard.

He recently won the Saskatchewan title for the fourth time and as the names of other contending rinks at the Brier started to come in from across the country it became apparent that Richardson's road to the championship may be easier to ride than at any other time.

The top opposition for Richardson should come from Jimmy Shields and his veteran rink from Calgary. Shields and his second, Ron Baker, and lead Fred Storey were with Stu Beagle when he won the Alberta title in 1960 and finished behind Richardson in that Brier. Act I. Ballroom at the Chateau de Coigny. Gerard, with other servants, is preparing for a ball. As a revolutionary, Gerard awaits his escape from servitude. The countess enters with Madeleine and her attendant Bersi. The guests arrive, among them, Andrea Chenier, a young poet. Madeleine coquettishly asks Chenier to improvise upon the theme of love, which he willingly does. He speaks of the pride of the rich and its effect upon the poor. All are indignant at his lack of taste and the countess orders the musicians to strike up a dance. A clamour is heard without and Gerard appears, followed by a crowd of ragged men and women.

Act II. Paris, 1794. The Cafe Hottot. Chenier sits by himself at one table, Bersi and the spy at another. Bersi asks whether it is true that spies are being sent through the city and the spy notes the query in a book with the opinion that both Bersi and Chenier will bear watching. Roucher brings Chenier's passport and begs him to leave Paris. He refuses, saying that he loves an unknown lady who he is to meet that day. When darkness falls, Madeleine comes to meet Chenier. The spy is watching and hurries away to report to Gerard. They avow their love and are about to fly when Gerard intercepts them. Roucher interferes and escorts the girl to her home. Chenier and Gerard fight and Gerard is wounded. He warns Chenier that he is condemned and begs him to save Madeleine.

Act III. The Revolutionary Tribunal. The spy tells Gerard that Chenier has been arrested and that Madeleine is not far away. He is urged to sign papers denouncing Chenier, as Madeleine appears on the threshold. He tells her Chenier is in prison and passionately declares his love for her. Madeleine's grief moves Gerard and he promises to do what he can. The mob comes into the Tribunal. The prisoners are brought in and Chenier is denounced as a traitor. Gerard rushes forward crying that the indictment is false and inspired by

CATCHING THE BIG ONES

area, including the mighty Fraser River, which has been described as the greatest salmon river in the world. But some salmon never leave the Gulf, spending their whole lives, summer and winter, within tantalizing reach of a fisherman's line. This fact, coupled with the west coast's comparatively mild climate, makes salmon fishing a year-round sport. The Gulf isn't the only good area for salmon, of course. There are fine streams in the Queen Charlotte Islands, and Rivers Inlet, on the mainland just north of the northern tip of Vancouver Island, is one of the best spring salmon locations. But these spots are too remote for most fishermen, and the Gulf remains the most popular fishing grounds.

Salmon Carnival views many different facets of the sport: the research that is constantly going on to increase the numbers of fish by controlled spawning and the seeding of new streams; the tackle that is recommended for use in going after the big ones; the many fishing "derbies" in which dozens of boats go out loaded down with anglers bent on winning a prize for the biggest fish; and the fishermen—the professionals, the experts, and those who are complete and casual amateurs.

Most of the sports fishermen visit the Gulf in the summer, and set up

shop in trailer camps. When they have a good day of fishing, many cook their fish barbecue-style over an open fire, and there are those who maintain that there is nothing in the world quite so delicious as fresh-caught, fresh-cooked salmon. Sometimes, when the fishing yields a bountiful harvest, the fishermen smoke their catch in smokehouses at the campsite, while others bring along canning equipment and can the fish right on the spot.

Roderick Haig-Brown does much of his fishing near his home at Campbell River, on the northeast coast of Vancouver Island, where he serves as a magistrate. He is the author of several books on sports fishing, including *The Western Angler*, *Return to the River*, *Fisherman's Spring*, *Fisherman's Summer*, *Fisherman's Winter* and (in preparation) *Fisherman's Fall*, has written many articles on fishing for publication in magazines and newspapers, and has prepared a government pamphlet on the Pacific Salmon.

"Whether you go fishing in a rowboat or a yacht," he has written, "in the end all men are equal on the fishing grounds. Only knowledge counts, and past experience—understanding the tides and well-rigged tackle—all the indefinables that go to make up water sense and fish sense. Catching the big fish is a serious business. Luck can play a part, of course, and sometimes does. But the percentages in the long haul are with skill."

DISTINGUISHED ARTISTS

Contemporary Canadian Music

DURING MARCH, CBC Radio's weekly *Distinguished Artists* series will devote four programs to the presentation of contemporary Canadian music. The programs, to be heard Monday nights at 9:30, will include one concert of choral-orchestral music, a chamber music recital, and two programs featuring first performances of new string quartets.

The first broadcast in the series, to be heard March 4, will be given over to a performance of *Cantata for a Joy*, a setting by Pierre Mercure of a text by his fellow Montrealer, poet Gabriel Charpentier. The work will be performed by soprano Mary Morrison, the Festival Singers of Toronto directed by Elmer Iseler, and the CBC Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Dr. Geoffrey Waddington.

The second broadcast, scheduled for March 11, will consist of two

works: *Sonata* for violin and piano, by Vancouver composer Robert Turner, to be performed by Albert Pratz and Pierre Souvairan; and *Divertimento* for oboe, clarinet and bass clarinet, by Violet Archer, to be played by Melvin Berman, Emilio Jacurto, and Jilles Maisan.

The Canadian String Quartet, which also takes part in the *Festival* presentation on CBC-TV this week, will give the other two programs in the *Distinguished Artists* series. They will be heard in the première performances of quartets by Francois Morel (March 18) and Murray Adaskin (March 25).

Canadian composers are also represented, in a different way, on this week's edition of CBC Radio's *Soundings* (Tuesday, March 5, 10:30 p.m.). Broadcaster Tony Thomas will examine the state of music in Canada through interviews with a number of leading composers, including Jean Papi-neau-Couture, Violet Archer, Harry Somers, Godfrey Ridout, Harry Freedman, Louis Applebaum, John Weinzweig, and Alexander Brott, and with John Adaskin, executive secretary of the Canadian Music Centre in Toronto.

transforming the myriad institutions, tribal myths, social values and traditions into new forms which will enable the new nations to deal with us as equals. This is much more than a direct rational process. It is the rebuilding of consciousness.

In attempting to transform those ideas into concrete form, King took his cameras to Nigeria and focussed them on a resident named Joshua, a business man who lives in Lagos. The film will examine and illustrate for viewers those things that Joshua takes for granted in everyday life—family relationships (he has three wives), personal problems, the effects of the tribal structure on his life, educational problems and accomplishments, the role of the civil service in Nigerian life, the relationships between Africans and Europeans, wealth and the class structure, the rights and powers of women in society, the blood ties that cut across divisions of tribes and villages. Viewers may find themselves looking into a vastly different world than the one they are used to, a Wonderland in which things seem to be familiar but turn out not to be. It can be a disturbing but eventually a rewarding experience.

"I think folk music is big business because it's a reaction against the bad quality of most pop music," Sylvia says. Ian agrees. He thinks it's "part of a general trend back to our early traditions in North America. Another big thing is that it's a do-it-yourself type of music. You don't just listen and wait to be entertained. Anybody can learn three chords on a guitar or banjo and play folk music. And then he can accompany himself."

Appearing in a play with music is nothing new to Murray Matheson. He was a song-and-dance man before trying straight dramatic roles. He has played leading man to Beatrice Lillie, Shirley Booth, Judith Anderson, Madeleine Carroll, Joan Fontaine, Yvonne De Carlo, Jennifer Jones and Hermione Gingold, and many other famous performers. He came to Canada in 1948 and has appeared many times on CBC-TV since 1952. His headquarters is now in New York, where he plays villains on TV quite frequently. In one year he killed off 18 people and a cat before the cameras and was amused when his cat-killing caused more outcry from viewers than all the humans he's "slaughtered" put together.

Manitoba's champion is young Winnipeg lawyer Hersh Lerner, who along with third Cole Staniloff, second Bob Lemecha and lead Allan Dudar, won nine consecutive games in the Consols playdowns to capture the provincial championship. Oddly enough, Lerner's rink scored four six-enders in what is generally regarded as one of the toughest provincial playdowns in the nation.

Other rinks already known at press time are Glen Harper, the Virden, Manitoba, boy who represents British Columbia; Jim Kent of Quebec, who actually is from McCreary, Manitoba; Doug Gathercole of Copper Cliff, representing Northern Ontario; Bob Mann of Hanover, representing Ontario, and Doug Cameron of Charlottetown, who has been in the Brier several times.

Canadians from coast-to-coast will get top coverage on the Brier from the CBC. Wednesday night of Brier week the top game of that day will be telecast on CBWT, and it's expected the championship game will also be telecast.

Nightly radio reports will go to each region. These will be 10-minute broadcasts.

Manitoba television viewers will also get reports through *On the Scene* on Tuesday night and the nightly sportscasts on *Spotlight on Sports*. My own daily sportscasts will also go to CBW radio listeners direct from the scene of the Brier.

Curling isn't the only sports fare on the CBC this week. Saturday night's National Hockey League telecast will feature the New York Rangers and Toronto Maple Leafs.

Cross-Canada Curling plays Quebec against Prince Edward Island and there will be the usual five-pin bowling telecast.

began to venture into the realm of harmony by adding complementary melodies to the traditional, single-line tunes of Gregorian plain-song. Since music in those early days was predominantly vocal, these primitive forms of counterpoint were definitely a vocal art, and the term commonly used to describe works of the kind is polyphonic (many-voiced).

Polyphony reached its zenith in the works of the 16th century composers of madrigals and motets, and in the music of Lassus and Palestrina. In the 17th century, the art of counterpoint was developed mainly in instrumental music, chiefly among German composers, and reached great heights in the music of J. S. Bach.

Interest in contrapuntal techniques dropped off sharply in the generation that succeeded Bach—his sons regarded their father as something of an old fogey, composing in an old-fashioned outmoded style—and was largely replaced by homophonic, vertical music, in which one voice leads melodically while the others take simple accompanying roles. This is the style that has predominated in music for the past 200 years, and is the musical language employed by Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, and the great majority of other composers throughout the Classical and Romantic periods.

Almost all, however, have turned at one time or another to the older, more formal patterns of counterpoint, and the form is used with increasing frequency by modern composers, as music slowly changes from the free-wheeling, romantic expressionism of the 19th century to the stricter, more intellectualized formalism of the 20th.

Is Freedom Returning to Russian Literature?

THE TENTH ANNIVERSARY of the announcement of the death of Stalin falls on *CBC Wednesday Night* this week, March 6, and provides an appropriate occasion for examining the dramatic "thaw" in Russian literature since then, and for taking a look at what has happened to freedom in the Soviet Union in the last decade, as revealed in its popular novels, poetry and biography. The documentary program, entitled *Voice of Freedom*, to be heard at 8:05, has been prepared by Mark Gayn, a specialist in Communist affairs and an editor of the *Toronto Star*. Born in Moscow, he has been a journalist in North America for many years. Two years ago he spent several weeks in Russia, observing at first hand the changes in the literary temperature there.

Ten years ago Russian literature was under tight government control. Most writers were afraid to step over the party line. But gradually, as the *Wednesday Night* program shows, political events changed this situation, important among them being Krushchev's exposé of the Stalin regime in 1956, and the removal of Stalin's body from the Kremlin in 1961. Soviet writers made tentative steps into freer literary pastures, and were allowed to stay and graze. For five or six years they constantly probed at the limits of freedom, but were usually hauled back to politically safer ground before they had gone too far. But they inevitably tried again, and were restrained once more. Last fall some of them

hit their freedom limit, and this time the literary fetters clanked into place with a more solid ring. Even so, the contrast between current literary freedom in the Soviet Union and that of 10 years ago is striking.

Gayn says that the "protesting" literature appearing there today is being published because it is anti-Stalinist. But he points out that it is really anti-regime in many cases, and that the anti-Stalin aspect of it is sometimes only a writer's gimmick to get it published. When an author's purpose becomes too obvious, he gets rapped on the knuckles by the political authorities.

The program will be illustrated with readings from poetry, novels and reminiscences by current Soviet writers, showing how radical some of their work is and why it has often brought down Party wrath on their heads. Listeners will hear extracts from *One Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich*, who spent ten years in a slave labour camp in Russia; and from the writings of Ilya Ehrenberg, novelist-journalist who was born in Russia but grew up in Paris, travelled all over the world, and didn't return to his homeland until the start of the Second World War. He rebelled strongly against the Stalin regime, has been markedly outspoken about it in his writings, and received the Stalin Prize twice. His recent novel, *The Thaw*, pulls no punches in its attack on the Stalin era, and his autobiography, appearing now in a Moscow paper in serial form, is equally outspoken.

Angry young poets who read their own work aloud at street gatherings and public meetings are tremendously popular in the Soviet Union. One of the best-known of them, Yvgeny Yevtushenko, has given well over 200 readings for enthralled young Muscovites in the past year and his books are selling by the hundreds of thousands. The *Wednesday Night* program will include the reading of one of his poems, with original music by a Russian composer.

4 eggs
4 tbsp. water

2 tbsp. butter

Ed Sullivan:

Most Durable TV Star Is Not a Performer

ED SULLIVAN is not an actor, singer, dancer or comedian. He is, in fact, not a performer at all. But Sullivan is the most durable personality in the television field.

It is considered unusual if a television show runs for five or six years. Sullivan's weekly, hour-long variety program started on the CBS-TV network June 20, 1948. CBC-TV has carried the program since September 13, 1953. And the show still is going strong.

Originally called *Toast of the Town*, the program was renamed *The Ed Sullivan Show* in September, 1955, in recognition of Sullivan's personal contribution to its continuing success.

Sullivan's first show, seen 15 years ago, featured a pair of young comics, Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, who split a \$200 fee for their work. Today, this sum wouldn't buy a trained-flea act.

Since that first show, Sullivan has presented thousands of star performers and has travelled more than one million miles to bring the best of performers from all parts of the world to the viewing public. He has filmed shows in 18 nations.

Sullivan has been responsible for many television "firsts." *The Ed Sullivan Show* was the first program to: broadcast from outside a studio; use overhead cameras and rear-screen projection; turn its cameras on the studio audience and introduce personalities in the audience; hide cameras in sets and suspend cameras from booms; present an ice show; have a permanent chorus line; present portions of Broadway shows while these shows were still running; show miniature previews of forthcoming movies; perform in the Soviet Union for the Russian people. (This list goes on and on.)

Newspaper columnist Sullivan entered show business in the early 1930s as a master of ceremonies for benefit shows. He then branched out as an emcee in vaudeville and radio. His Dawn Patrol stage troupe played throughout the U.S. for years and starred leading performers from vaudeville and nightclub circuits.

In radio, Sullivan introduced to the airwaves such notables as George M. Cohan, Florenz Ziegfeld, Jimmy Durante, Jack Haley, Frances Langford and Irving Berlin. Popular radio-TV comic Jack Benny made his radio debut on the Sullivan program March 29, 1932.

In television, Sullivan merges the varied talents he has helped develop in other media — vaudeville, radio and journalism.

Ed Sullivan has been responsible for the television debuts of scores of popular artists, including Victor Borge, Walt Disney, Bob Hope, Dean Martin, June Allyson, the late Humphrey Bogart, Rita Hayworth, Van Johnson, Hedy Lamarr, Burt Lancaster, Jane Powell, Lana Turner and Esther Williams.
