



Art Work from Around the World

• The program, *Children of the World*, was most interesting. (An afternoon winter series seen on CBWT, CBXT, CBWBT and CBWBT 1). Often pupils from other grades came over to my room to talk about previous broadcasts.

Some noticed that children in other parts of the world made pictures in much the same way as they did, and that their way of living was different mainly because of the difference in climates. . . . Country Life vs. City Life

• I have listened to the *National Farm Radio Forum* (heard during the winter schedule at 9:00 p.m. on CBC Radio each Monday), and as a farmer and rancher in the West since 1914 I am always amazed at the emphasis placed on "Standard of Living." The whole talk seems to be based on the assumption that the farmers' standard of living is below that of the city man. If they would state clearly that by standard of living they mean it simply in a material sense, it might clear up the subject a bit. The farmer's standard of living is not low . . . he has a certain personal freedom and a great deal of freedom from regimentation. He is not an "organization man," thank God. I know I have a much higher standard of living on the ranch, (50 miles from town, with no electricity, no TV, water from the well, etc.) than I have when in the city, with all the gadgets, nuisance and frustration that goes with it.

Country people have time to read, time to talk, time to think and time to pray if they wish to. The country man is surrounded by beauty, scenery, the songs of the birds, the friendly animals, the smell of the soil. He watches things grow. He knows what a man is, why a man is and where a

man is going. The city has traditionally obtained its fresh blood from the country. Only in North America is the country man not honoured, envied even.

How can you assess contentment, peace, the riches of working single-handed and thinking single-minded, in terms of dollars? . . . It is high time we stopped foisting an urban education on rural youth. . . . If this Canada is ever going to achieve mature nationhood, it's about time we started to preach something better than that ice cream, television, hockey, films, the Twist, high heels, hair styles, college education and faster cars are the end-all and the be-all for our existence on earth.

THE ALBERTA Regional Drama Festival held recently in Lethbridge received wholehearted support of CJLH-TV, CBC affiliated station there. As well as extensive promotion of the Festival with publicity announcements, on the eve of the four-day event an original one-act play, written and produced by CJLH-TV staff members, was televised.

The play, *Chinook*, by Bill Matheson, is a farce which, last September, was selected as winner of a playwriting contest sponsored by the University of Alberta extension department and the Alberta Drama League. Acting in this premiere performance of the play were Larry Sherwood, Ninna Sejersen and Bill McCann of CJOC Radio; Joan Waterfield of CHEC Radio; and Sandy McCallum, free-lance TV artist and elder brother of Neil McCallum, the well-known radio, TV and screen actor.

The television adaptation was done by Charles Foster of the Lethbridge Herald, and it was produced by Dale Nelson of CJLH-TV. Esse W. Ljungh, CBC National Drama Supervisor, watched the performance and afterward had many compliments for the play and its production.

PATRICIA SIWEK, this year's winner of the Rose Bowl competition for singers in the Manitoba Music Festival, is featured Sunday, May 5 at 4:45 p.m. on *Song Recital*, on CBC Radio.

After nine years of study, and two previous tries for the Rose Bowl, Miss Siwek was thrilled with her success in obtaining the coveted award, for which virtually every advanced vocal student in the province competes. This is not her first victory in music competition, however — over the years she has placed high in the junior classes of the festival, and last spring she won first prize in vocal solo in the scholarship series of the Manitoba Music Teachers' Association.

She has also appeared on CBC's *Talent Festival*, and has been heard in previous recitals on CBC Radio.


JOURNALISM in its FINEST HOURS

A new CBC Radio program
entitled **THE FOURTH ESTATE**
recalls great writings
by newspapermen

SOME OF the finest examples of journalism in the English-speaking press will be read in a new CBC-Radio program, titled *The Fourth Estate*, to be heard on 14 Tuesday nights at 10:30. It was to begin April 30 with a program prepared by John Bethune and including readings from the works of five Pulitzer Prize-winners.

The format of the series, says program organizer John Reeves, is similar to a recital of chamber music, the readings by actors being linked by short background narration.

This Tuesday's program, May 7, will deal with works of journalism by men famous in other fields of writing: G. B. Shaw, music critic for London



newspapers and periodicals; G. K. Chesterton, essayist and critic; Charles Dickens, in his early career a House of Commons reporter; and Walt Whitman, who, early in his career, edited newspapers on Long

Ballet Espagnol

Featured on FESTIVAL

Around the world, the Ximenez-Vargas Ballet Company is being applauded. Canadians can join in the applause Monday, May 6, when FESTIVAL presents the dancing of this outstanding group

THE XIMENEZ-VARGAS Ballet Company of Madrid generates a kind of electricity few other groups can offer, transforming folklore into polished art in a brilliant kaleidoscope of moods rippling from tears to laughter. The magnificent spirit, style and speed of the group have made it one of the most famous ballet organizations in the world.

It has travelled widely. In 1955 the Ximenez-Vargas dancers made a triumphant tour of Japan, and were the personal guests of Emperor Hirohito. They've entertained in Toronto and other major North American cities on numerous occasions. While in Montreal last fall the company video-taped an exhilarating program which was presented on the CBC-TV French network in November. It will be shown on *Festival* Monday night, May 6, under the title of *Ballet Espagnol*.


The company is directed by its founders, Roberto Ximenez and Manolo Vargas, performers of tremendous presence, style and control, who do all the choreography for the troupe as well as dance in its shows. Ximenez, who was born in Mexico City and who spent part of his childhood in Spain, is a restrained, intense and precise artist. Madrid-born Manolo Vargas has a flamboyantly exuberant style and volatile personality which complement the more subdued, sophisticated Ximenez like the piquant sauce for a gourmet specialty. Both men appeared in the film *Flamenco*.

Prima ballerina Maria Alba is a haughtily smouldering, statuesque dancer who was born in China of

Spanish-Irish parentage. In some of the duets she and Manolo Vargas dance, their castanets conduct conversations in various moods — jealous, happy, tearful, arch, angry, teasing, tender — which are always highlights of the show.

The rest of the cast includes dancers Pablo Candelas, who was born in Italy of Sicilian-Spanish parentage and studied in New York; Roberto Cortanega, a Spaniard who did his advanced study of the dance in the U.S.; Sara de Luis, Pablo Canas, Josefina Bravo, Angela Serrano, Margarita, Manolo de la O; flamenco singer Chinin de Triana; guitarist Emilio Bonnet and Juan Heñias; and pianist and musical director Carlos Rausch.

On stage the Ximenez-Vargas Company present a flashing, impassioned blend of body and music, an audio-visual symphony, their eloquent feet representing the heavy percussion instruments, their arms, as the violins, shaping melodic phrases, their hands supplying the more subtle counterpoint, or marking the constantly changing rhythms with clapping or finger clicking, and their bodies becoming the brass instruments binding the pieces together, sometimes with mighty strength, sometimes with whispering delicacy. Adding to the spectacle are the designs and shadings of their costumes, from the soft shoes and peasant styles they wear for their Andalusian dances to the high-heeled (for both men and women) shoes, and taut, sophisticated clothes for their more sultry numbers, the women's gowns simple and sleek above the waist, but rippling into a froth of frills be-

low; the men's dark trousers and short jackets emphasizing their sinewy, cat-like grace.

The program the company presents on Monday night includes several Andalusian dances from the 18th century and some Spanish folk dances, including one from the Levant with Moorish melodies. In the *Danza del Chivato*, Manolo Vargas performs a solo demonstrating the genius of his flashing style. Other numbers feature the dances of northern Spain, including a brilliant ritual dance from the Province of Asturias. In the *Preludio sobre Petenera*, a darkly somber ballet, Maria Alba, Roberto Ximenez and Manolo Vargas interpret the legendary tale of Petenera, the Spanish beauty who cast a death spell on all the men who courted her, and who eventually perished from the same spell. The program closes with a gypsy ballet, the style in which the company finds its greatest expression.

Producer of the program is Jean-Yves Landry. Jean Deslauriers conducts. Sets were designed by Jean-Claude Rinfret.

The Valiant Years

Back again is this distinguished series
based on Sir Winston Churchill's memoirs

THE VALIANT YEARS, a television documentary series based on Sir Winston Churchill's memoirs of the Second World War, will be shown on CBC-TV weekly during the coming months. It was to begin on Sunday afternoon, April 28.

The series of half-hour filmed programs, replacing *Citizens' Forum*, was originally presented on CBC-TV two years ago. Produced by the American Broadcasting Company in association with the BBC, the programs cover all major aspects of the war and the pre-war years of crisis, and much of the commentary uses Sir Winston's own words, spoken by actor Richard Burton. Narrator is Gary Merrill, and the musical score was composed by Richard Rodgers.

Film from all parts of the world, some of it photographed by Axis cameramen, was used in assembling the programs, and another valuable source of information was the BBC's vast library of film and sound recordings.

The first episode in the series, sub-titled *The Gathering Storm*, deals with events leading up to the outbreak of the war and covers Churchill's period in "the political wilderness" when his warnings went unheeded. The outbreak of the great conflict saw him back in the Cabinet as First Lord of the Admiralty, a post he had held during the First World War. The series continues, in its second week, with *The Combat Deepens*, covering the invasion of Poland, the sinking of the *Graf Spee*, the German invasion of the Low Countries, and, in "the darkest hour," the formation of a new government under Churchill's leadership. Subsequent programs deal with Dunkirk, the blitz and the Battle of Britain, the war at sea, Nazi conquests in the Middle East, the invasion of Russia, Pearl Harbour, and the desert campaigns. These events of recent history are vividly illustrated through films, still photos and graphics, and the accompanying commentary is based mainly on Churchill's six-volume history of the Second World War: *The Gathering Storm*, *Their Finest Hour*, *The Grand Alliance*, *The Hinge of Fate*, *Closing the Ring*, and *Triumph and Tragedy*. Thus, the programs are not only documentary records, but also bear the stamp of Churchill's personality and they benefit from his intimate knowledge of events during the crucial period of the war years.

In his preface to *The Gathering Storm*, Churchill wrote: "I am perhaps the only man who has passed through both the two supreme cataclysms of recorded history in (Please turn to page 15)



Roaming the Plains and Hills of Alberta

THE RELATIONSHIP of man to his natural surroundings is the theme of two Winnipeg-produced programs to be seen on CBC-TV on Wednesday nights, May 8 and 15, in a series titled *Man in a Landscape*, which will occupy the period formerly filled by *Explorations*. Both programs are set in Alberta and have Albertans as central figures: novelist-playwright W. O. Mitchell of High River, and his son Hugh, and Andy Russell, naturalist and wildlife photographer, and his son Charlie. They have all spent their lives among the hills and mountains in the south-west corner of the province.

In *The Goose Hunt* on May 8, W. O. Mitchell introduces his son to what he describes as "the annual autumn passion of the prairies and foothills—the pursuit of the grey goose." The program was filmed in Alberta's "big country," north-west of Drumheller near the town of Hanna. Its action centres around young Hugh Mitchell's first goose hunt and his first experience in bringing down a grey "honker." Building up to this climax, the film traces the ritual of preparation for the actual shoot: spotting the geese, digging and camouflaging the hunters' pits, setting up the decoys, then waiting in the early dawn for the geese to circle and come in to land within gun-range.

The goose hunt is real, filmed on the spot by hidden cameramen. But Mitchell's script and commentary give the program the same imaginative qualities that distinguish his plays, novels and short stories. *The Goose Hunt* touches on several themes that recur in Mitchell's fiction, particularly the moment of revelation when a boy's innocence gives way to an understanding of the mortality of all living things. Mitchell described this movingly in one of his best *Jake and the Kid* scripts, presented on CBC Radio several times.

In addition to Mitchell and Hugh, the "cast" of *The Goose Hunt* includes two other hunters: Herb Berke, a crony and neighbour of Mitchell in High River, whose knowledge of the goose-hunting country around Hanna helped make the actuality se-

quences possible; and Lorne Johnson, son of Alex Johnson, a Hanna district farmer who allowed the hunt to be held on his land.

Mitchell is the leading contemporary chronicler of life on the prairies and in the foothills, a reputation firmly established by his first novel, *Who Has Seen the Wind*, and confirmed by his *Jake and the Kid* series on radio, his many short stories, essays, and TV dramas.

In showing the wide sweep of the rolling Alberta countryside, and the crowded flights of geese on their fall journey south, the program has captured some of the poetry of the prairies so consistent in Mitchell's writing. The original musical score for *The Goose Hunt* was composed by Sydney Bryans, conductor of the Winnipeg Philharmonic Choir. The film was produced by Peter Kelly and Ken Black with cameraman Ken Gregg.

A picture of wilderness freedom, and the qualities that go with it, will be presented in *Wandering Free*, to be seen on May 15. Andy Russell and his son Charlie share the screen with rugged Alberta scenery and wildlife—elk, mountain sheep, grizzlies—that have been part of Russell's life since he was a boy on his father's ranch. His "territory" stretches from his home at Hawksnest, a few miles north of Waterton Park, into the hills and mountains of Alberta and the B.C. interior. He has travelled this wilderness for years as an outfitter, guide, hunter, and now, with his son Charlie as partner, as a nature writer and photographer.

In *Wandering Free* Russell talks about his outdoors experiences, and the camera follows him and Charlie as they roam on foot, by jeep and on horseback, pursuing a way of life that belongs to fewer Canadians as the years go by. Russell's remarks reveal an expert, intimate knowledge of Canadian wildlife and wilderness country, and show him as a man strongly devoted to the value, and the values, of wilderness country. Knowledge and feeling have deep roots in his own life and family history.

Folksingers to be Regulars On CBC Television Saturdays

ACROSS THE COUNTRY, in crowded auditoriums, intimate theatres and sophisticated nightclubs, audiences are taking their entertainment to the twang of a guitar or banjo, as folk music enjoys a phenomenal resurgence.

Riding this new wave, dozens of Canadian artists have teamed up to perform this music that has always been with us, but which seldom before has been so widely popular. One of the most skilled new folksinging teams is the Winnipeg duo of Reg Gibson and Jim Pirie, who in their association of only a little more than a year have won a name for themselves throughout Canada.

Reg and Jim are the singers heard frequently on CBC Radio's *The Max Ferguson Show*, when the Prairie Region of the CBC makes its contribution to the musical segment, each Tuesday morning. Ferguson, long a promoter of folk music, has said they are "as professional a duo as I have yet heard."

On the Prairies, CBC Radio listeners have been familiar with the young folksingers since January, 1962, when they started a weekly show on the regional network under the title *Shenandoah*. Enthusiastic response kept the show on the air through 26 weeks, until the summer.

In July, 1962, Reg and Jim moved their program to television, calling it *Of Ballads and Bards*. Their simple, ungimmicked style, basis of their popularity on radio, was continued on the TV series. Seen on CBWT Winnipeg and CBXT Edmonton, they won an appreciative audience among summertime viewers in those cities.

Now, *Of Ballads and Bards* is to be presented each week on the national CBC-TV network, starting Saturday, May 4. For the first show, with Jim's accompaniment on the guitar, Reg will sing Buckeye Jim, Lass of the Low Country, and Take This Hammer. Jim will join him for a duet arrangement of Darlin' Corey, and then will perform a guitar solo, Villancico Flamenco. Ray McConnell is producer.

Reg Gibson, now 31, has sung professionally since the age of four, when he helped the family finances in mid-depression by appearing on Winnipeg's vaudeville stage. Soon, as a young man, he established a part-time career as a radio performer on private radio stations and the CBC. When CBC Television was established in Winnipeg, Reg moved into that medium, first as a soloist on *Cabaret*, making guest appearances on many programs, and moving into the *Swingalong* series, which began as a local CBWT program in 1961 and became a national network feature for the summer months of 1962.

Viewers are taken back to the fall of 1959, when the Gallery was officially opened, by means of still photos of the event and the taped voices of some of the participants including Lord Beaverbrook and Dr. W. G. Constable, former curator of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. The Gallery's Graham Sutherland collection, one of the finest in the world, is discussed by director Edwy F. Cook.

The Valiant Years

A repeat of the documentary series based on Sir Winston Churchill's memoirs and made up of authentic newsreel film from World War Two.

After having rejected the orthodox churches because they offer him no solace, he is in despair. Viewers meet him as he starts to grope for comfort among "oddball" cults. Even these fail to satisfy him, and his

mind whirls with fantasies about the scientific world.

In the end he is overwhelmed with the despair of resignation. He looks enviously at everyone around him because they are going to survive after he is dead.

Anatomy of The New York Newspaper Strike

ANOTHER PROGRAM in the series *In View* is scheduled on CBC-TV for Monday, May 6. The half-hour programs of this series, telecast on those occasions when *Festival* runs for an hour rather than 90 minutes, are intended to explore the literary culture of our society in all its forms, and to take a lively and stimulating look at the arts and North American attitudes towards them. The formats of the programs vary from one to another, being designed to fit the particular subject under discussion, and include the techniques of filmed documentary, interviews, and panel discussions.

The host and commentator on *In View* is Nathan Cohen, entertainment editor and drama critic of the *Toronto Star*, and for 10 years referee and moderator of CBC's *Fighting Words* on radio and television. He works closely in planning the programs with producer Don MacPherson.

This week, they have chosen as the subject for examination the recent New York newspaper strike. Through filmed interviews with some of the leading personalities connected with the strike, they will summarize the events of the strike itself and attempt to indicate some of its ramifications and the probable consequences growing out of it.

Among those to be interviewed is A. H. (Abe) Raskin, the chief labour reporter for the *New York Times*, who is regarded as one of the most acute observers of labour-management relations in the U.S., and one of the most outspoken and controversial writers in his field.

Raskin has more than once earned the enmity of those he wrote about in his solidly detailed stories about the U.S. labour movement and its contests with big business. James L. Hoffa, leader of

high cabinet office . . . These 30 years of action and advocacy comprise and express my life-effort, and I am content to be judged upon them."

Few could dispute Sir Winston's place as the towering figure of the first half of this century, with the unique combination of elements—character, political leadership, military perception, and eloquence—which make up the sum of the man. The date of his birth, November 30, 1874, marked the high noon of Victorian imperialism, a year of political battles between

Disraeli and Gladstone in England, the formation of France's Third Republic after the defeat of Napoleon III, and the consolidation of Italy as a unified state. Now, in his 90th year, the world is concerned with satellites, streaking into space, confrontations between great nations, and mankind's continuing aspiration to live in peace. Between those two eras in history, Sir Winston's experience has covered careers in the army, journalism as a war correspondent, diplomacy, government leadership, and the planning of grand strategies. His writings, from a Victorian novel to a *History of the English-Speaking Peoples*, have won him

the Nobel Prize for Literature; his paintings are prized by collectors throughout the world. *The Valiant Years* is, in part, the story of this man's personal growth, tested and tempered by victory and defeat.

The programs will include historical films and photographs covering various periods in Churchill's life, filmed interviews with persons who have been closely associated with him, and wartime footage shot by armed services photographers in the field. Twenty-three British and American writers worked on the scripts for the series, among them many well-known historians and correspondents.

Man in a Landscape

The first of two films on the theme of man's relationship to his natural surroundings. The persons in the films are playwright and novelist W. O. Maynard Ferguson, Carol Sloane, Billy Van Four



MAYNARD FERGUSON

CBC-TV's *PARADE* series, which ranges over a wide variety of entertainment from opera to broad comedy, presents a jazz concert this week. The program, to be seen Wednesday, May 8, will feature trumpeter Maynard Ferguson, singer Carol Sloane, the Billy Van Four vocal group, and the *Parade* orchestra under Jerry Toth.

Montreal-born Ferguson has been one of the top names in U.S. jazz for over a decade, achieving most of his fame for his phenomenal mastery of the trumpet's upper register. His ability to play almost beyond the instrument's upper limits isn't his only accomplishment, however; his playing in the more normal range is rich and warm, and he is also adept on the valve trombone and French horn.

He took up music at the age of four, studying saxophone, clarinet, trombone and trumpet, and finally settled on the latter instrument at age nine. Among his first jobs was a berth in the trumpet section of the Black Watch Regimental Band, and later he played with a number of groups in and around Montreal.

He formed his own band when he was 15, and toured with it for about three years; then, in 1947, he went to the United States to

Gamble for a Throne

OFTEN, AFTER a revolution, groups will be found secretly plotting and organizing a restoration of the old regime. England was no exception under the protectorate of Oliver Cromwell, who, in the eyes of the Royalists, was usurping the position of the future King Charles II, exiled on the Continent. The resistance movement of that time, called the Sealed Knot, consisted of small groups of Royalists tied by loyalty to the heir apparent and carrying out his sealed order of rebellion against what they regarded as a usurping dictatorship.

Gamble For a Throne, a six-part BBC series beginning on CBC-TV Thursday afternoon, May 9, tells the story of such an uprising and how it affected the lives of an impoverished Royalist family. Colonel Rushwick, head of the family, played by Colin Douglas, collects and hides consignments of weapons for the uprising, aided by his young son, Jeremy (Richard Palmer), a nephew, Stephen Elkin (John Bonney), who has suffered even more than the Rushwicks from the new regime — his house burned down and his father exiled in France; and Damaris, a pretty, headstrong niece, played by Katy Wild. Their schemes, however, are more than once thwarted by a sinister Cromwellian agent, the offensive, bigoted and extremely wealthy Colonel Habbakuk Capstick, played by John Woodnutt, who is assisted reluctantly by Stephen's fiancée, beautiful Kay Chance, played by Annika Wills.

The story offers a blend of excitement and romance, with such enduring "attractions" as urgent messages sent by fast horse, stabblings, sudden house-searchings, men in hiding, secret rooms, surprise arrests, desperate rescues, disguises, secret caves, mysterious footprints, fights (fist, gun and knife), bribes and murders.

Gamble For a Throne was written by Henry Garnett, adapted by Barbara B. Harper, and produced by David Goddard.

Smith and Dale:

Good Jokes Never Grow Old

... And neither do good comedians, as this comedy duo of long standing prove when going through their time-tested routines Friday on THE TOMMY AMBROSE SHOW

CARTOONIST George McManus once said that an audience will always laugh when someone falls down. He might have been thinking of a bicycle collision that occurred over 70 years ago at the corner of Delancey and Eldridge Streets on New York's lower East Side, when two precocious lads named Joe and Charlie, headed in opposite directions fast and carelessly, suddenly found themselves sprawled in the dirt with raw faces and bruised elbows. A crowd gathered to laugh at the sight of the angry boys who, raring for each other's blood, picked themselves up, prepared to fight it out and then saw the funny side of the situation—and the public has been laughing, too, ever since.

Joe Smith and Charlie Dale are still going strong. Smith is just past 80, Dale is almost that old. With the same full heads of hair, boundless energy and many of the same preposterous jokes they started with, they're an enigma among balding, ulcer-

toting comedians half their age who nervously employ a whole stable of gag-writers to keep them on top of the heap.

"But who needs new material when they're still laughin' at the old?" demand Smith and Dale, who, last fall, proved their durability by opening a new show, *Old Bucks and New Wings*, at New York's Mayfair Theatre. It not only drew large crowds of older folks, but also showed younger sick-joke addicts that an evening of old-fashioned corn—for Smith and Dale unashamedly admit that their act is pure corn—can leave with them a contented, relaxed, rather happy feeling, their egos as invulnerable as ever, and with no hangover of secret embarrassment from a couple of hours of naughty snickers.

Smith and Dale will demonstrate their technique on Friday night, May 10, when they're guests on CBC-TV's *Tommy Ambrose Show*. Undoubtedly they'll include some gags from their classic *Dr. Kronkeit* skit which they originated in 1906 and have included, in whole or part, in all but five shows they've done since. The skit was born on the stage of the old Hammerstein Theatre at Broadway and 42nd Street in New York one night when Smith and Dale ad libbed some jokes about a mythical doctor and his patient. And *Dr. Kronkeit* has gone with them through all the big cities and many of the tank towns in North America and Europe.

They never get tired of the doctor. "We like him too well," says Dale. "He's been taking pretty good care of us for a long time," says Smith, "and besides, the people wouldn't let us drop him if we wanted to. It's a fine situation."

British Entertainment On London Calling Canada

AN HOUR-AND-A-HALF of light entertainment from Britain is presented every Saturday night at 8:30 on CBC Radio. Entitled *London Calling Canada*, the program began following the conclusion of the National Hockey League season, and consists of a potpourri of music, drama, and comedy features obtained with the co-operation of the BBC Transcription Library.

Included in the assortment of BBC variety programs will be excerpts from a series called *Something to Shout About*, a light-hearted look at the advertising world starring Michael Medwin, Eleanor Summerfield, Fenella Fielding and Joan Sims. The satirical half-hour episodes revolve around the highly improbable activities of a small advertising agency with big ideas. Among the musical programs to be heard through the season are excerpts from the series *From Days of Yore*, a musical tapestry of traditional and folk songs of Britain performed by the George Mitchell Choir and a section of the New Symphony Orchestra; *Sing It Again*, a half-hour of non-stop singing of old popular favourites; *Interlude for Music*, featuring many different British instrumental groups; *Sing Something Simple*, a singalong show starring the Adam Singers, a 16-voice choir, and the Jack Emblow Quartet; and other programs featuring such well-known British musicians as Humphrey Lyttelton and Ray Ellington.

Among the other features included in the programs are a number of BBC dramas, comedies and thrillers, as well as talks and interviews with leading British actors, writers and personalities from many different fields. One of the dramatic offerings is the *Spy-catcher* series, based on the wartime activities of Colonel Oreste Pinto, a member of the Allied Counter Intelligence Service. Another drama series scheduled for later in the season is *The Sand Leopard*, an eight-part serial starring Canadian actor Neil McCallum and Christine Finn.

In the 1880s his grandfather trekked west in a Red River cart to settle in the foothills country. Russell's father was the first white child born in what is now the city of Lethbridge. Andy's boyhood was spent on his father's ranch near the town of Pincher Creek, where he went to school. By the time he had reached his teens he was an accomplished horseman, trapper and hunter. His passionate interest in the outdoors and his early bent as a naturalist were given impetus and direction when he married the daughter of Bert Rigal, a keen, informed student of the flora and fauna of the Alberta foothills and mountains.

Russell succeeded his father-in-law as outfitter and guide for tourists who visited Waterton Lakes Park in the south-west corner of Alberta. For 26 years he roamed the Alberta and B.C. wilderness country, guiding hunters, sometimes taking out pack-trains of as many as 40 horses, and building up knowledge of game animals and their habits.

Several years ago Russell embarked on a new career. With his two eldest boys, Dick and Charlie, he took up wildlife photography and writing. The Russell family's film safaris have taken Andy and sons over thousands of miles of wilderness, from the B.C. interior and the rain forests of the West Coast to the Yukon and Alaska. Andy's articles, stories and illustrations have appeared in many sports and outdoors magazines. For most of the last two years he and his sons have devoted themselves to making a film study of the habits and habitat of the grizzly, an animal Andy met for the first time at the age of nine.

In *Wandering Free*, Russell leads viewers to three grizzlies, a mother and two cubs, who were caught by the camera during one of the jaunts into the mountains. Producers Peter Kelly and Ken Black, and cameraman Ken Gregg worked on this film as well as *The Goose Hunt*. The original musical score was written by Leslie Mann, a clarinetist with the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra and frequent performer on CBC Radio. Program organizer is Catherine McIver.

Smith and Dale have some 35 routines they can breeze into without rehearsal. From time to time they add fresh material, but the doctor routine is their favourite. It's hardly ever found its way onto paper. They can adapt it to any time limit, type of audience or situation. They have a three-minute version, a 12-minute version, and plenty of versions in between. They can even start at the end or the middle and work back.

Part of their skit might run like this: Dale: "I'm the doctor." Smith: "I'm dubious." Dale: "Glad to meet you, Dr. Dubious." Smith: "Where did you practice?" Dale: "In Cairo." Smith: "A chiropracter, too . . . Doc, I'm sick as a dog." Dale: "You come to the right place. I also am a veterinarian." Smith: "Every time I eat a big meal, I don't feel hungry no more." Dale: "What kind of dishes you eat?" Smith: "What am I—a crockerydile?"

Either Smith or Dale can add a new line on the spur of the moment and the other will carry on without a second's hesitation. Someone once remarked that they know each other's minds as if they were wired together. They never seem to get angry or bored with each other. "For one thing, we're friends," explains Dale. "And the other," says Smith, "is that we do so much arguing on stage that we don't have anything left to argue about off-stage. If you want to have an act, make it like an argument. People always like to watch a good argument. They'll stop in the street to watch one."

Hawk-faced Smith, the dominant member of the team, is a compulsive talker, and round-faced Dale has to fight to get in a word offstage, though he has plenty to say onstage. They began working together for laughs in 1898, first as amateur entertainers at clambakes and political clubs. They turned pro on March 15, 1899, as blackface singers and dancers at the old Atlantic Garden in the Bowery. They've been associated with many big names in their time — Ed Wynn, Elsie Janis, Jim Jeffries and Christy Mathewson. For some time they were half of the famous Avon Comedy Four, which teamed up around 1900. Smith and Dale were at Morrison's at Rockaway Beach when Will Rogers made his first vaudeville appearance with what were to become his standard props: chewing gum and a lariat. While they were playing Philadelphia, Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., tried to sell them his roadster so he could afford a train ticket to California to try his luck in the movies. While they were rolling them in the aisles at Denver's Orpheum Theatre, Paul Whiteman was playing second fiddle in the pit.

They show no signs of retiring. "We play clubs and TV pretty often," says Dale. "It keeps us young. We get enough offers to turn some down." They're a puzzle to slick gagsters. Dorothy Parker once remarked that "the funny people you like best are the ones you laugh *with*"—and that applies to Smith and Dale. They offer their audiences wonderful release—a chance to laugh wholeheartedly without any conscience pricks, until, as Josh Billings recommended, their "souls get thoroughly rested."

ONCE AGAIN it's Derby Time in Louisville, Kentucky, which means it's also Derby time in Canada. CBC Television brings to Canadian viewers one of the oldest horse races in North America from Churchill Downs, at Louisville, in the heart of the "blue grass country."

This lucrative race (\$125,000 added) for three-year-olds will be carried live and will again have a Canadian-bred horse competing — that is barring a last-minute scratch by owner Russell A. Firestone. Firestone's horse, Jet Traffic, has been a consistent winner on Eastern United States tracks and won the \$10,000 Hallandale Purse at Gulf Stream Park in Miami, Florida, only a couple of weeks ago. Jet Traffic has beaten several Derby hopefuls in his races this year and in addition to being eligible to run in the Derby this Saturday, is also a nominee for the Queen's Plate as well as nearly every major three-year-old race in Canada and the U.S.

In the latter part of March, Jet Traffic broke an all-time record at one of the U.S. tracks and in nearly every outing has run close to record times. As a result, this horse, bred by Frank Conklin of Brantford, Ontario, has to be given better than an outside chance of winning the Derby.


This year's favourite is Candy Spots, with Never Bend ranked as a top contender. Other horses given strong support are No Robbery, winner of the \$91,000 Wood Memorial, and Bonjour, which ran second behind No Robbery in the Wood Memorial.

Horsemen all over the country will be paying keen attention to this year's Derby since last year's race, won by Decidedly, was run in record time. Decidedly knocked a

full second off the previous record set by Whirlaway in 1941.

Also on Saturday, CBC-TV's Baseball Game of the Week, will feature the Baltimore Orioles at Detroit. This is a big game for both clubs; each is figured to give the Yankees a run for it in the American League pennant race this year. At the time of this writing the Orioles top the AL with a half game lead over New York and Chicago, while the Tigers are a full game off the pace as a result of dropping three out of four games to the Boston Red Sox in the weekend series of April 19-21. This game could well be for first place in the standings, and will be carried by the full Trans-Canada network with the exception of Winnipeg, where it will be blacked out due to a Northern League game at the Winnipeg Stadium.

Five-pin bowling direct from the O'Connor Bowl in Toronto is on Saturday's bill of fare with details on this to be announced later. For CBC Radio listeners, the very interesting and informative Saturday Sports Date, 2½-hour show, is scheduled in the afternoon (see schedules for times). This show includes live and delayed broadcasts of many sports events and is a must for all sports fans who still prefer the "wireless" to the "tely."

join Boyd Raeburn's orchestra. Later he moved on to such top-name bands as those of Jimmy Dorsey, Charlie Barnet, and Stan Kenton, worked as a studio musician in Hollywood for a time, then, in 1956, organized his own band.

Three-time winner of the *Downbeat* award as best jazz trumpeter in the U.S., Ferguson has appeared with great success at the Newport Jazz Festival, New York's Birdland and many other clubs, and at the Stratford (Ont.) Jazz Festival.

It was at one of the Newport Jazz Festivals (in 1961) that husky-voiced vocalist Carol Sloane got her first big break into the recording field, one of the most important areas for today's aspiring artists. She started her career at age 14, singing with a dance band in her native Providence, Rhode Island, later moving on to other groups and in 1958 touring with Les Elgart's band. She has made two LP records: *Out of the Blue* and *Carol Sloane at 30th*

Street, has appeared frequently on TV and is kept busy filling engagements at night clubs and doing voice tracks for television commercials.

Though her predominant singing style puts her in the line of descent from such jazz singers as Sara Vaughan, June Christy and Ella Fitzgerald, Carol Sloane doesn't like to be "typed" specifically as a jazz vocalist. "It's too limiting," she points out. "I want to get into the big leagues where I'll be known just as a singer, period, like Lena Horne."

The Billy Van Four—leader Billy Van, his wife Patty, Les Leigh and Jack Northmore—have appeared on many *Parade* shows in the past. Most often they have supplied support for other stars, but a month ago they were the featured performers and had the entire show to themselves. Formed in Toronto about three years ago, they first appeared on CBC-TV in the summer series *Swing Gently*, later took part in *A Summer Night*, *Parade* and a number of other CBC-TV and radio shows, and have toured the night club and theatre circuit both in North America and Britain.

the Teamsters' union, once was reported as saying to Raskin: "Some day you're going to scratch yourself on that typewriter of yours and die of blood poisoning." A graduate of City College of New York, class of 1931, he has been with the *Times* since the mid-'30s, working first as a general reporter, later as an expert on labour relations. His city editor has stated that Raskin "has had so many exclusives it's hard to recall them all," and even Raskin's chief rival, the labour reporter of the *New York Post*, has pointed out that "everyone who has ever worked with Raskin regards him as the best in the business."

The 114-day strike, which began on December 9 and came to an end on the last day of March, was the longest and costliest newspaper black-out in the city's history. Economic losses were estimated to range between \$190 million and \$250 million. The publishers, who normally put out 5,700,000 papers daily, were estimated to have lost more than \$108 million in advertising and circulation revenues, while the 19,000 newspaper employees lost about \$51 million in wages and benefits. Repercussions were felt throughout all aspects of the city's commercial life, causing economic losses to large corporations and individuals alike.

The strike was originally called against four papers, and the other five major dailies suspended publication under the terms of an agreement among the publishers. News-hungry New Yorkers turned to other communications media during the strike, while advertisers tried to fill the gap with handbills, fliers, radio and television commercials, and display advertising in public transportation facilities.

The chief architect of the settlement was New York Mayor Robert Wagner, who lent his services after a number of fact-finding boards and committees had been unsuccessful in finding a solution to the dispute.

Island as well as the *Brooklyn Eagle* and the *Brooklyn Times*.

The May 14 program, adapted by W. H. Brodie, will concentrate on two 18th-century periodicals: *The Tatler* and *The Spectator*. *The Tatler*, published three times weekly, was dedicated to "accounts of gallantry, pleasure, and entertainment." *The Spectator*, published daily, was "mainly concerned with manners, morals and literature . . ." and was "meant to enliven morality with wit and to temper wit with morality."

The May 21 program, written by Lyon Todd, features readings of critics and reviewers, among them Kenneth Tynan of the *Observer*, and playwrights Oscar Wilde and G. B. Shaw. The May 28 program, written by Tommy Tweed and featuring writing of Canadian journalists, is based on the premise that Canadian writers work best when they are opposed to something.

Later programs will deal with crusading columnists (adapted by Henry Comor); the *New York Tribune's* Horace Greeley (adapted by James Bannerman); columns and articles on capital punishment (adapted by Ian Thorne); war reporting (adapted by Alan King); court reporting by women, with examples of works by Rebecca West and Sybille Bedford (adapted by John Bethune); libel (adapted by Lister Sinclair); verse which appeared originally in periodicals (adapted by George Whal-

ley); humour (adapted by David Brock); and sports (adapted by Scott Young).

Jim Pirie, although just 21 years old, has established himself as a guitar virtuoso of the first order. He is seen regularly as featured guitarist with the Selkirk Settlers on *Red River Jamboree* (Saturdays on CBC-TV), and is heard on the radio show of the same name (Tuesdays).

Jim took up the instrument when seven years old, after becoming, like most of his childhood contemporaries, impressed with Roy Rogers. By the age of 11 he was playing regularly with a Western music group, and as a teenager he spent four years with The Wagon Masters, sponsored by a Winnipeg radio station.

When 17, Jim joined the Tumbleweed Trio on CBC-TV's *Stu Davis Show*, and from there it was an easy move to Ted Komar's Selkirk Settlers on *Red River Jamboree*. He also plays jazz, and is equally at home on the steel and Spanish guitars. To add to his musical knowledge, Jim has been studying the piano and theory.

Having added *Of Ballads and Bards* to the network television schedule, the CBC is recognizing the widespread enthusiasm for folk music. With musicians of the calibre of Reg Gibson and Jim Pirie performing such music, this enthusiasm should be more than a passing fad.

CREAM OF ONION SOUP

Saute 2 large onions finely sliced in 2 tablespoons butter, add 2 tablespoons flour and blend gradually. Add 2 cups beef consommé and 1 Oxo cube. Simmer for 20 minutes.

Add 1 cup scalded milk. Make croutons of any old French bread. Put soup into bowl, place crouton on top of soup, sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese and freshly grated pepper. Broil for a few minutes.

FRENCH ONION SOUP

- 1 large Spanish onion (thinly sliced)
- 1 tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1½ tsp. flour
- 4 cups beef consommé
- Salt and pepper to taste
- ¼ cup dry sherry if desired

Saute onions in butter, sprinkle with sugar and allow this to caramelize. Add flour and blend, then gradually add consommé and seasoning. Simmer for 10 minutes. Then add dry sherry.

Stars of Last Decade Return

Great Movies Back for Another Season

NOW THAT THE tumult and the shouting of the National Hockey League season has died, CBC television's Saturday night schedule has reverted to its annual summertime format, with the series *Great Movies* for 90 minutes each week. This year, there are a number of films of exceptional interest in the line-up, all of them dating from the last decade. Included are such imported items as *The Entertainer*, starring Sir Laurence Olivier (July 6); *I'm All Right, Jack* (July 20), in which Peter Sellers gave such a compelling performance as a British labour union shop steward; and the charming comedy *Wee Geordie* (June 8), the film which introduced giant Bill Travers to North American audiences. Another Sellers vehicle, *The Battle of the Sexes*, dating from 1960, will also be seen during the series, on June 22.

The other films to be seen in coming weeks are all M-G-M releases, and include a wide variety of films, ranging from searing dramas to light-hearted musicals, starring top-ranked Hollywood and international personalities. Frank Sinatra and Debbie Reynolds will be seen in the 1956 romantic comedy *The Tender Trap*, this Saturday, May 4; Kirk Douglas will star in the biographical film about Vincent Van Gogh, *Lust for Life*, to be shown on August 17; and Fred Astaire and Cyd Charisse will be featured in the musical *Silk Stockings*, scheduled for May 25. The same dancing duo will also star in *Bandwagon* (August 31). Among the other feature films to be seen are *The Wreck of the Mary Deare* (July 27), a 1960 release starring Charlton Heston and the late Gary Cooper; *Executive Suite* (July 13), one of the first of the big-business epics, starring William Holden and Barbara Stanwyck;
